Reward Offered For Vandalism Info

COUNCIL APPLIES FOR PAVING GRANT

The Floydada city council Tuesday night passed a resolution authorizing payment of \$100 reward for information leading to the conviction of any person for vandalism or destruction of any city property. Recent vandalism involving city fire hydrants prompted the reward offer. The \$100 reward is to be paid upon conviction of vandals.

The council authorized filing of an application with the Department of Housing and Urban Development for a \$100,000 grant for 14 blocks of paving, curb and gutter in the city. The proposed project includes paving on Lee and Ross Streets from Highway 70 to Fourth Street and on Third and Fourth Streets from Jackson to Price. Estimated cost of the entire project is \$112,593.

Also authorized was the publication of a public notice stating the proposed paving project will have no significant impact on the environment.

The council authorized City Secretary Jimmy Lou Stewart to file a planned-use report for revenue sharing funds from the July-December, 1976 period. The report shows the city plans to use \$15,000 of the estimated \$19,463 total to purchase a new backhoe machine, and the rest for "public safety."

Fire Chief Jim Green appeared before the council to request funds for materials to install paneling, acoustical ceiling tile, and a circulation fan for the

basement in the new fire hall. The council okayed the estimated \$1,200 expenditure. Fire Department volunteers are to provide labor for the project.

The council denied an application for a billiard parlor license on the grounds that the proposed location does not meet specifications of the city's "pool hall ordinance." (City Ordinance #489).

Mosquito spraying for the summer was discussed, and the council gave City Manager Bill Feuerbacher authority to clear with the Federal Aviation Administration plans to use airplane spraying should the city need the aerial spraying in addition to ground spraying. Mayor Parnell Powell said the city probably will not need aerial spraying unless an epidemic breaks out.

The council called a special meeting to discuss power and light customer boundaries with Lighthouse Electric Cooperative representatives. The special council meeting was set at 7 a.m. Friday (May 14) at King's Restaurant.

In routine business, the council approved minutes of the last meeting and "paid the bills."

Present at the regular monthly meeting Tuesday night were Mayor Powell, Councilmen Leroy Burns, Gary Carthel, Wayne Russell, Johnny Sue, Jerry Thompson, City Manager Feuerbacher and City Secretary Stewart.

Senior Citizens' Mini-Bus Gets County Support For A Year

Floyd County Commissioners Court voted 4-1 Monday to support for a one-year period at up to \$125 per month, a "mini-bus" which has been serving senior citizens of the county. The "mini-bus" has been supported by the Governor's Committee on Aging, the Green Thumb Program, and the Regional Office on Aging. On July 1 Federal funding for the maintenance and operation of the bus will end. The Regional Office on Aging and Green Thumb program will continue to provide a driver, but the agencies lack the money to provide gas, oil, and maintenance.

About 20 persons from senior citizens' groups in Floydada and Lockney were present at the

Commissioners Court meeting to request that the county support the "mini-bus" service. Menard Field of Floydada was spokesman for the senior citizens.

Commissioner Bob Jarret moved that the Court table the mini-bus question until the June meeting. The motion died for lack of a second. County Judge J. K. Holmes moved that

the mini-bus be funded for a period of one year, from July 1, 1976 to June 30, 1977. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Grigsby Milton and carried by a vote of four to one, with Holmes, Milton and Commissioners Jack Lackey and Aaron Carthel voting for and Jarrett against.

In other business Monday afternoon, the Commissioners Court hired Larnce McCain to work in Precinct 2, Lisa

Steen Nichols to work as dispatcher in the Sheriff's Office, and Mrs. Edna Cochran to work in the County Attorney and County Judge's offices. Part of Mrs. Cochran's salary will be paid by the County. She replaces Mrs. Ann Ferguson, who has resigned the position.

The Court also voted to transfer \$40,000 from Road and Bridge Fund No. 2 to the various precincts (\$10,000 to each of the four precincts) to organize an equalization board, and paid properly-presented bills.

All members of the court - County Judge Holmes and Commissioners Carthel (Precinct 1), Jarrett (Precinct 2), Milton (Precinct 3), and Lackey (Precinct 4) - were present.

Fireplug Vandalism

Costly To City

Sometime early Sunday morning between midnight and 2:30 a.m., vandals opened several fire hydrants all over town, according to City Manager Bill Feuerbacher. Feuerbacher reports that the vandalism cost the City of Floydada about \$1,000 in water loss and damages. (Two tire plugs were broken in the incident.)

"It would have put us in an awful jam if there had been a fire and no water and there is danger of burning out pressure pumps," Feuerbacher said.

The city manager asked Floydada citizens to be on the alert for these vandals and to report such incidents immediately to City Hall or the Police Department.

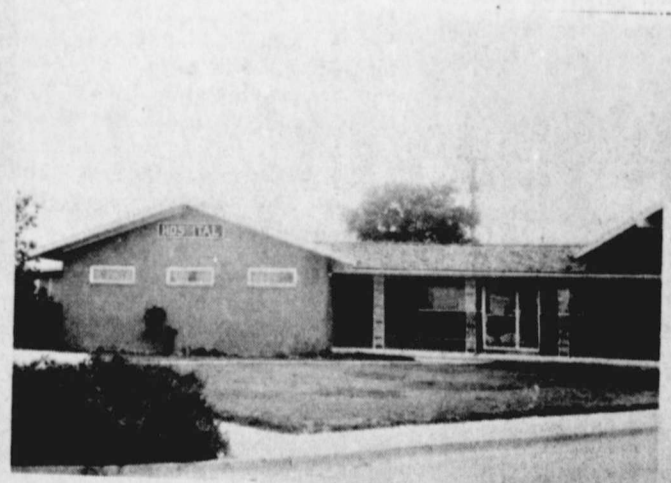

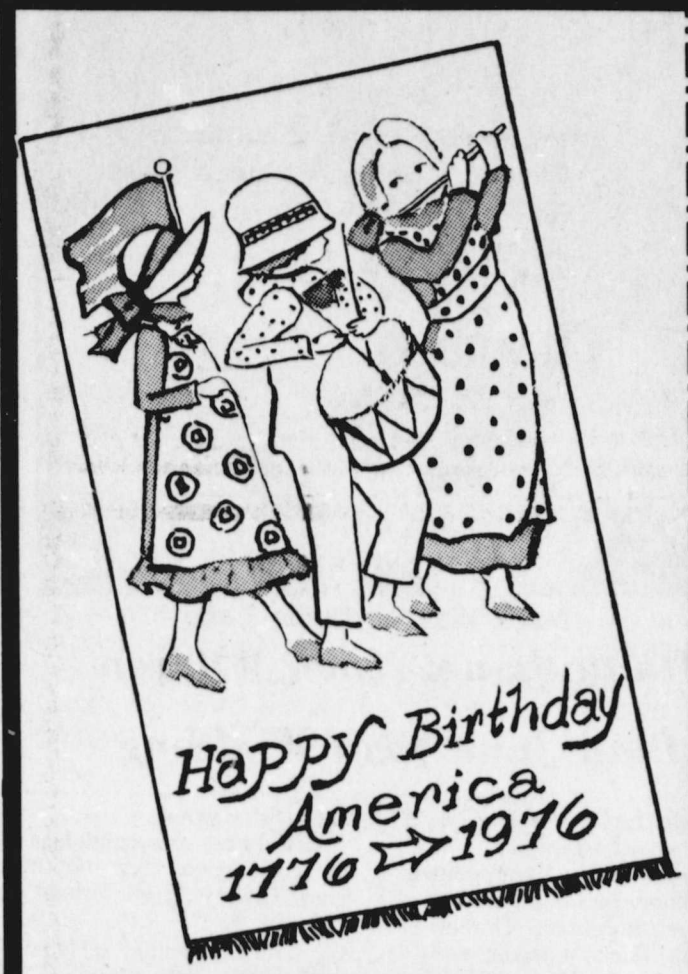

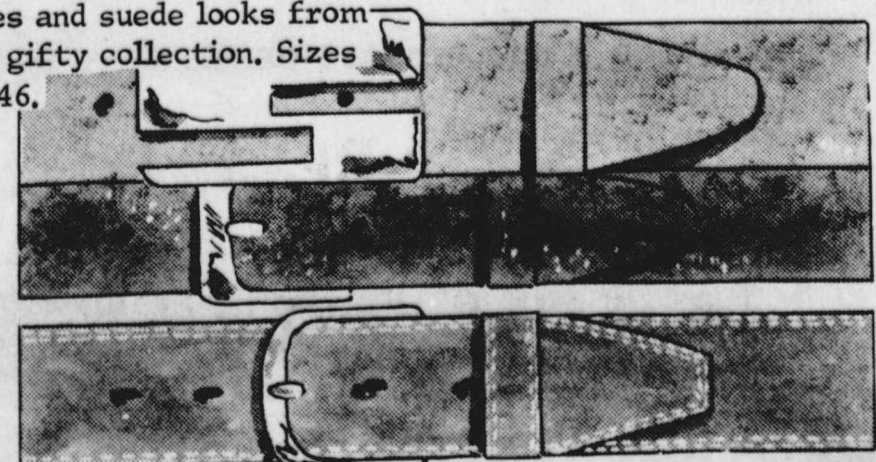

His address should be on the package. To be considered safe, jar lids must make and hold a seal. Test by checking for a concave appearance the day after canning or by pressing the center of the lid, and if it will not move, the jar is sealed. Also if there is a clear ringing sound when the center of the lid is tapped with a spoon, the seal is good. Lids should be checked again before use.

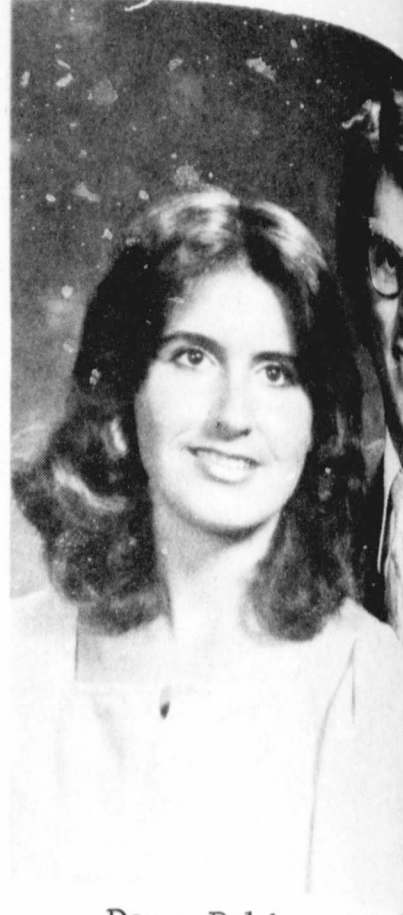

'Swine Flu' Questions Answered

President Ford has asked Congress to authorize a program to vaccinate every American against swine flu, to protect against a possible epidemic this Fall. Congress has responded rapidly, appropriating about \$135 million to manufacture and distribute the vaccine and to organize the massive im-

munization effort. A few weeks ago, Dr. Fratis L. Duff, director of the Texas Department of Health resources, met with his counterparts from around the country to the National Center for disease Control in Atlanta, Georgia. The purpose of the meeting was to answer some of the questions that many people have about swine flu and the possible epidemic. Dr. Duff has provided these answers to some of the questions Texans are asking:

QUESTION: What exactly is "swine flu"?
ANSWER: Swine flu is a strain of influenza virus that affects swine herds; it's commonly found in hogs and pigs, and is occasionally transmitted to man from swine, particularly those that deal very closely with the swine herds.
QUESTION: Why is there so much concern over swine flu all of a sudden?
ANSWER: I think to really understand this concern, you have to go back in history a little bit, to the 1918 epidemic of influenza. It was a pandemic occurring all over the world. It killed about 20 million people, with over 500 thousand deaths in the United States. At that time we did not have a means of isolating the influenza virus, so this strain of the virus was never isolated. The first virus that was isolated was in 1931, at which time the swine influenza virus was isolated from swine herds. Now, the interesting thing is that people who were old enough to have had the 1918 influenza show antibodies against this strain of influenza, the swine strain. The reason for the concern at this time is that we had a

small outbreak of influenza at Fort Dix, New Jersey, in February of this year that was caused by the swine strain, and was transmitted from man to man. This means that this is the first instance of the swine influenza being transmitted from man to man, and really represents a new virus appearing in the population. When a new virus appears, it's normally followed by an epidemic.

QUESTION: Will it really be necessary for everyone to be vaccinated against swine flu?

ANSWER: Well, to be protected against the disease, everyone should be vaccinated with the influenza vaccine containing the swine strain. To prevent an epidemic, it is certainly necessary that practically all of the people be vaccinated.

QUESTION: How will such a massive immunization program be carried out in Texas?

ANSWER: The vaccine will be furnished by the federal government, at no cost to the state, to the State Health Department. We'll distribute it to the local health departments, the regions, and to private physicians. Then we'll develop an implementation plan which will really have to involve practically all the capabilities of private and public medicine to accomplish this big job in a short period of time.

QUESTION: How soon will the immunizations begin?

ANSWER: We hope to have the vaccine by the first of September at which time we'll have our plans complete and begin vaccinations immediately. We were told just recently that there will be a special vaccine for older

people and people with chronic illness that we hope to receive by the first of July.

QUESTION: You mentioned that some people already show that they have antibodies against swine flu, presumably from the previous epidemic. What about those people-do they need to be vaccinated, too?

ANSWER: These are people who were probably exposed to the virus in 1918, so they should be re-vaccinated because their antibody level would be very low.

QUESTION: Is there any danger that people who are immunized will catch the disease from the vaccine?

ANSWER: No, this is a killed-virus vaccine, so it can't transmit the disease.

QUESTION: Who will be responsible for organizing the immunization program

in Texas?

ANSWER: The State Health Department, basically, but we will be, of course, working with all other groups. Volunteers will be very important. We will work with all the different medical organizations and use the capabilities of all these in accomplishing this task.

Mail Box Improvement Set May 17-22

"Mail Box Improvement Week," a traditional Spring observance which contributes to improve security and appearance of the nation's nearly 24 million mailboxes, will be held May 17-22. Postmaster Ed Wester said today.

Held annually, this event has long served as the starting signal for many community efforts to repair, repaint and make other improvements to the nation's approximately 24 million rural, curb-line and star route mailboxes, 669 of which are served by the Floydada Post Office.

In many communities around the country, Civic groups, the press, municipal governments and Chamber of Commerce have led their citizens in the spring campaigns to "spruce up their property and mail receptacles often damaged by severe winter weather. "Because more Americans receive their mail today on

rural routes than ever before, 'Mailbox Improvement Week' is more important than when first observed generations ago in rural areas and small communities," Postmaster Wester said.

Very minor repair is all that is needed many times, so make a visual check some morning as you get your mail. A few things to check is: The FLAG; does it work? It may need a bolt and nut! The LID; Will it close? The box; does it need paint, is your name clear, is it painted on the side that can be seen by the carrier as he approaches the box? Is it Waterproof? The STAND; is it too high or too low for the carrier to serve? About 42-46 inches from the ground to bottom of the box is about right (check with carrier for proper adjustment). Do you need a new post, is it steady, is box secured to the Post? APPROACH TO YOUR

BOX; is one of the most neglected items. The patron is to maintain this and keep it unobstructed at all times, especially around mail time. After rains, the ruts should be filled in, preferably with rocks or gravel where it will not cut down each time. This chore is usually left to the Highway Department and County Commissioners but even though they are willing to do their part, the responsibility is the patrons and you should not wait for the maintainer. Please examine the appearance of your box and make the adjustment, either before or during 'Mail Box Improvement Week', May 17-22, the Postmaster urged.

For The Birds

Birds may become an early warning system of environmental disasters. And research on herons has already begun.

In highly industrialized areas, waste, products such as mercury, lead, and cadmium often escape into waterways. Pesticides seep in through drainage. Dredge-and-fill operations, dikes, and other activities of coastal development wreak havoc with life and land. Poisonous chemicals can and do pollute fish, shrimp, crabs, oysters, clams, birds, reptiles, and mammals.

New research by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service shows that fish-eating birds like herons accumulate a wide variety of environmental pollutants. In addition, they are especially sensitive to changes in their environment. By studying the habits, habitats, and reproductive success of these striking looking birds with their long necks, legs, and bills - which nest in huge colonies often numbering in the thousands - scientists hope to predict and avoid calamities such as Lake Erie disaster.

As part of its heron study, the Service will observe a breeding colony of herons in captivity and monitor nesting behavior with time-lapse photography. Empty shells will be placed in some nests and mini radio transmitters will be fitted inside eggs to record how often they are returned by the parents and other incubation patterns. Pollutant levels inside regular eggs and in baby herons will be tested, too.

Birds may send future warning signals of pollution. But plenty of signals have been sounded already. To find out how you can help fight pollution in your community, contact your West Texas Lung Association - the "Christmas Seal" people - today.

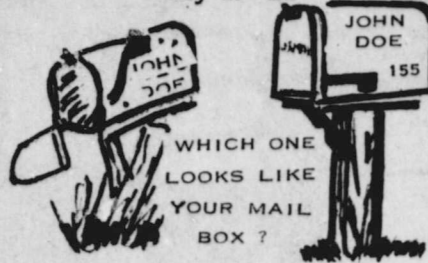

Doctor in Area

SILVERTON — A doctor originally from North Vietnam is expected to begin his residency here during the summer for the practice of medicine.

A letter of formal acceptance has been received by the Briscoe County Clinic Association board of directors from Dr. Truong Co Hoang, who is presently residing near Fresno, Calif.

In his letter, Dr. Hoang (pronounced as Hwong) wrote: "I have the pleasure to inform you and the members of the medical board of my formal acceptance to cooperate with (your) medical program for the benefit of the residents of Silverton."

"However, due to the fact that I need a certain period to fulfill my

moral responsibility to my patients at the medical office where I am serving now. I can...start your medical program the first week of August 1976..."

The people of Silverton have seen a number of doctors come and go in recent years. The last was Dr. Stephen Zions, an osteopathic surgeon, who practiced here a few months in 1974 and 1975. Since then, Briscoe County has not had a doctor.

Dr. Hoang is a North Vietnamese who fled from Hanoi where his father was governor general prior to the Communist takeover. Later his father was a high official in Saigon.

Dr. Hoang served as administrator of a 100-bed hospital in

Saigon, where he was an ed surgeon and had nine years of practice. His wife was an old daughter.

The Hoangs came from Saigon to the United States in 1975. He has practiced here already made a show of his talents. He also visited Floydada and hospital in Tulsa.

Dr. Hoang is now on a medical test scheduled in July.

A fund has been set up for donations to aid Dr. Hoang's family until he can practice here.

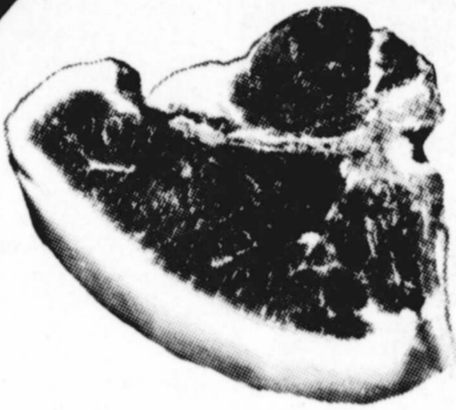

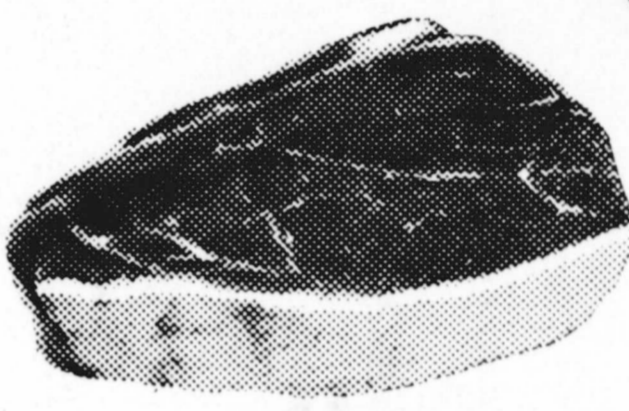

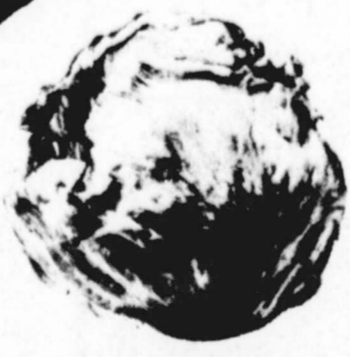
