THE PLIGHT OF THE farmer has been much in the news lately, especially in light of the filibuster by farm state senators which held up the confirmation of Edwin Meese as Attorney General.

President Reagan in his first news conference of the year referred to the plight of the farmers, and the willingness of his administration to lend a helping hand.

But the problem with all of this was underscored by former congressman Kent Hance in a speech in Amarillo this past weekend.

According to Hance, little help can be forthcoming from the government, simply because few people involved in politics actually understand agriculture. He pointed out that fewer than 83 members of congress represent agriculture.

Hance added that in his personal opinion, he didn't see a lot of help for the farmers in the current farm bill being debated in congress. "It has been three or four decades since anyone in the administration understood agriculture," the former congressman said.

Hance said that supply controls are needed to help answer the farmers' problem. Credit is not the answer to agriculture's problem, he said--only a price for their product will yield a solution.

A good price for commodities also will help ease the national deficit because at this time farmers are so broke they are not paying any income taxes. Hance reminded that money turns over seven times in the agricultural industry when things are going good; but when farmers are doing little spending, there aren't as many dollars to "turn over."

The Dimmitt native brought up a plan which he and Congressman Charles Stenholm proposed in 1981 for the farm bill. They advocated a loan price tied to set aside, which, he said, would encourage more people to participate.

The former congressman explained that set aside is needed "because government action has kept us from having a free market." The Federal Reserve Board's tight money policy has made the dollar so strong that other countries can't afford to buy our products, Hance said.

Hance added that work needs to begin with the trade policy because a policy which allows other countries to put quotas on American goods without any reaction on our part is no good.

A reciprocal trade policy was the solution advocated by Hance--one that would take the average tariffs and, if one country lowered the average by a certain percentage, the other would follow suit.

"The trade policy of today is set in such a way that we can't participate throughout the world," Hance concluded.

Court Revises Stand On School Money

In a surprise move in an early session, the Parmer County Commissioners reversed their decision from the previous meeting to divide the permanent school fund among the county's four schools.

County Attorney Charles Aycock met with the court to discuss possible problems involved in dividing up the fund, and

advised the court that in his opinion the court should reverse its decision.

A motion was made by Commissioner Ernest Anthony, seconded by Robert White, and passed by a 3-1 vote (with Commissioner Tommy Williams opposing), to reverse the decision on the permanent school fund, until a written opinion is received

from the state attorney general's office, at which time the request to divide the money will again be considered.

The court was meeting early so that its members could attend a state meeting for county judges and commissioners at Texas A&M the week of February 25-March 2.

In other matters, L.E. Opperman met with the court to discuss the possible leasing of the county's school land in Gaines County.

After some discussion, a motion was passed unanimously to advertise for bids to lease labors 8 and 9, league 315 in Gaines County. The bids are to be opened on March 25 at 10 a.m.

A motion was passed to pay Hale County \$115 for holding a hearing in a mental case which involved a Parmer County resident.

A request for help on a funeral expense was denied, due to the court's guidelines as to the type of situation in which the county can participate in funeral expenses.

Murder Victims Are Buried Here

Bodies of the three murder victims from Liberal, Kansas were brought to Friona for burial this week.

The bodies of Maria M. Maltos, 48, Marcella C. Maltos, 25, and Joshua E. Maltos, five, were found early Sunday afternoon by police officers after an acquaintance of the family saw a body through the kitchen window of the house.

Police said the grandmother, mother and son were killed early Sunday morning.

Sedgewick County Deputy Coroner William Eckart conducted autopsies on the victims.

Eckart told police the elder Maltos had been stabbed 30 times

in the upper torso, including a single, fatal wound to the heart.

Marcella received 15 stab wounds to the upper torso and arms, and the five-year-old had a single stab wound to the neck.

All three victims were dressed in night clothes, and although there was no evidence of forced entry, police said signs of a struggle were evident. None of the bodies appeared to be sexually molested, police added.

No items appeared to be missing from the house. Kansas Bureau of Investigation, along with authorities from Texas, New Mexico and Colorado are investigating, in an attempt to locate a suspect in the slayings.

Gwen Greeson Is New Mrs. Kansas

Mrs. Greeson, now of Sublette, Kansas, said she hoped the experience would allow her to make "my people--my family, church, etc., real proud. I had the opportunity in the Mrs. Kansas pageant to share with everyone that I was a child of God, and it was a wonderful experience," Gwen said.

Position One--Clark Andrews and Kenneth Frye.

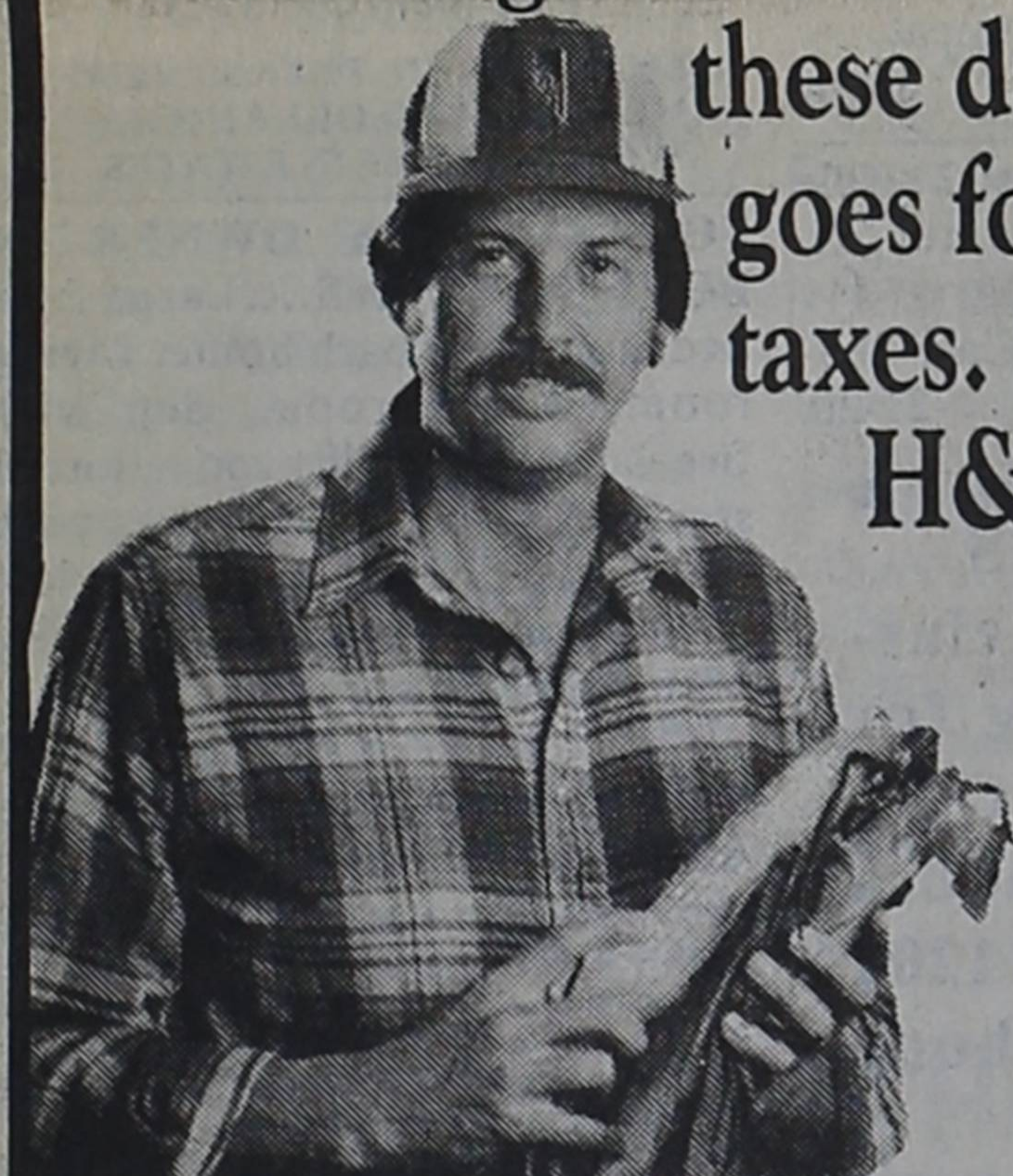
Position Two--Donald Wright and Don Richardson.

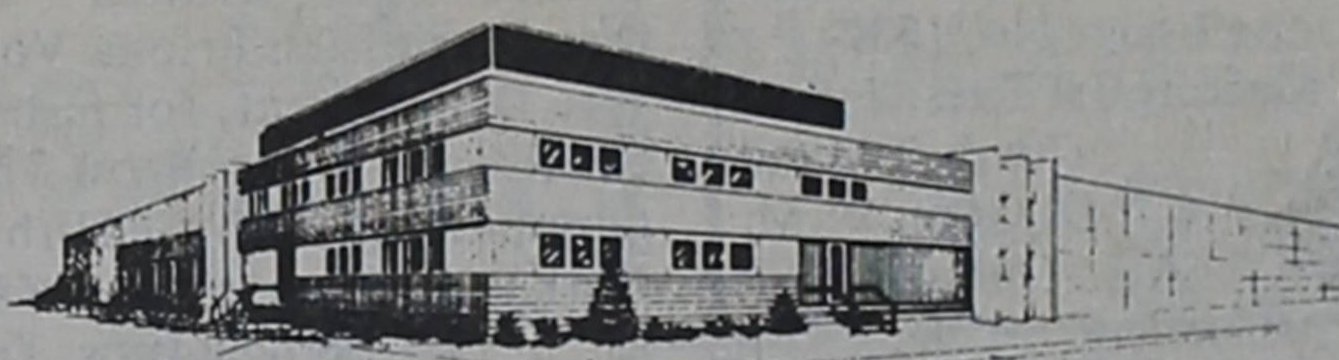

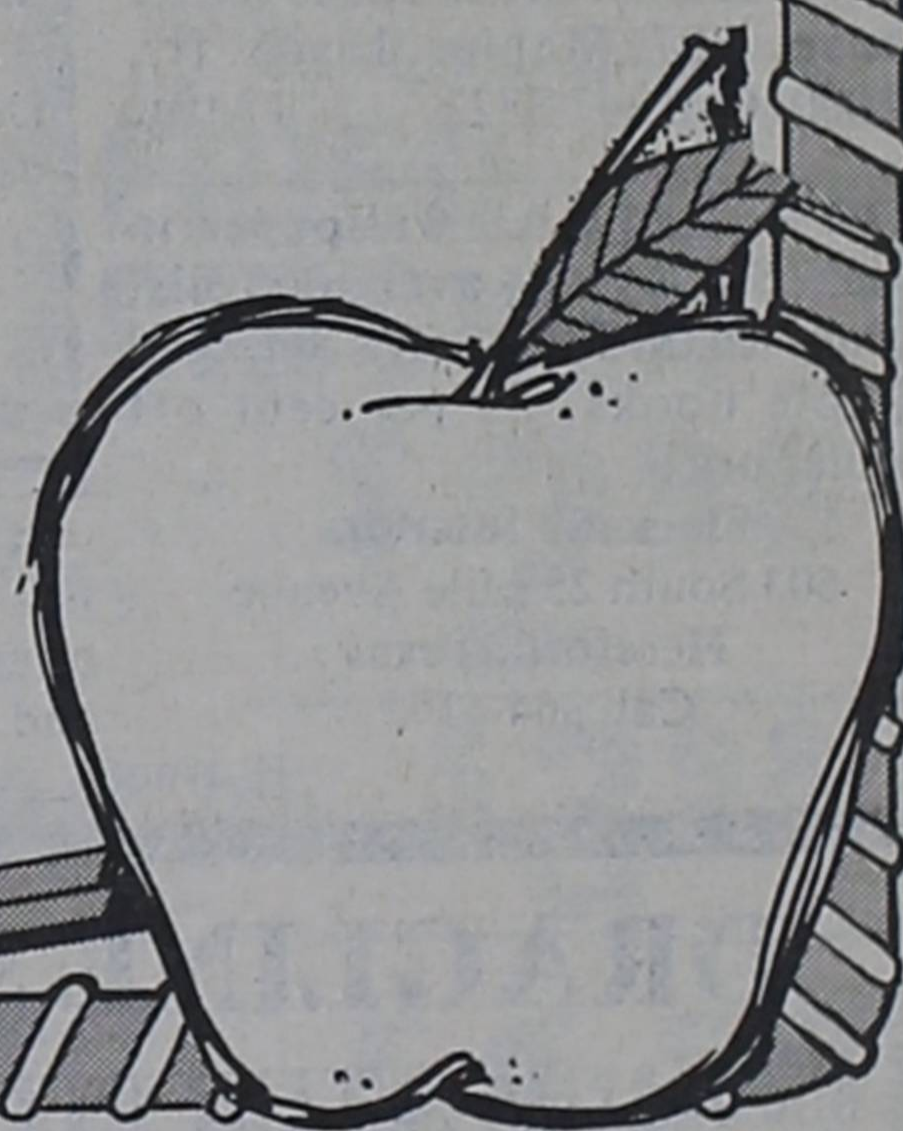

City's February Check Encouraging

The City of Friona has received its February sales tax check from the state comptroller. The check amount was \$14,856.69, which indicated a healthy 30.1 per cent increase over the check of \$11,416.40 received at the same time a year ago.

The nice increase could be attributed somewhat to an increase in Christmas sales, since the February checks represent taxes collected on sales made in December.

For the year the city has received (two checks) a total of \$21,344.44, which is up 22.3 per cent from the \$17,451.98 it had received at the same point in time in 1984.

Other Parmer County communities had varying results in their monthly sales tax checks. The City of Farwell's check, in the amount of \$2,836.71, was \$8.00 less than its check for the same period in 1984.

Bovina's check was for \$3,681.54, an increase of 24.4 per cent over its check for \$2,958.63 received at the same time in 1984.

The three Parmer County municipalities received \$21,374.94 for the month, and their current payments to date, \$30,636.82, are 18.38 per cent ahead of the same period in 1984.

Some cities across the state were disappointed with their current checks, which averaged only six per cent more than they had received the previous February. The period covered by the tax checks included some of the Christmas retail sales.

The City of Houston actually showed a decrease of one per cent from its check of a year earlier.

The small statewide increase was attributed as much as anything to new items being taxed for the first time, as it was to growth in sales.

Around The House

Winter clothing sales are going on now. Some stores in our area have their clothes marked down as much as 50 per cent. When buying wool clothes, even on sale, consider the cost per wearing. Simply divide the total cost by the number of times you estimate you will wear the garment.

Because wool clothing is durable, resists tearing and often doesn't show wear, it can generally be worn for several seasons. So the per wearing cost of buying "investment" clothing such as a wool suit may be lower than the cost of less expensive clothing worn over a shorter period of time.

When shopping for wool clothes, look for the woolmark, which may be on the label or a hang tag. In addition, certain descriptive terms on the label may indicate wool quality origin or quality:

•"Virgin" wool has never been used before. The term indicates use only and not quality.

•"Reprocessed" wool has never been worn but is remanufactured from fabric scraps and is usually of lower quality than virgin wool.

•"Reused" wool has been remanufactured from items used before and is usually of lower quality than reprocessed wool. It is often used in blends.

Wool is often blended with other fibers to produce fabrics which cost less than pure wool or to enhance care, appearance or wearability features for a particular type of clothing. But if a garment contains at least 50 per cent wool fiber, it will behave much like pure wool.

While you are out looking for a bargain at the winter sales, you could be contributing to the Texas wool industry. Texas is the number one wool producing state and it provides almost 50 per cent of the nation's fine grade wool. The \$120 million dollar industry also employs about 10,000 Texans in fiber production, warehousing and some processing.
