## Friona Area Receives Slow, Soaking Rain

**THE IDEA OF a memorial day is not new.** It can be traced back thousands of years to the ancient Greeks who lauded the dead who had given their lives in defense of their country.

More than a hundred years ago, President Lincoln paid this nation's most perfect tribute to America's war dead when he said at Gettysburg... "in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate, we cannot consecrate, we cannot hallow this ground. The brave men, living and dead who struggled here, have consecrated it far above our power to add or to detract. The world will little note, nor long remember, what we do here; but it can never forget what they did here."

These were but an echo of the words of Pericles, the Athenian statesman who said of the Athenian dead in 400 B.C.: "So they gave their bodies to the commonwealth and received each for his own memory, praise that will never die and with it the greatest of all sepulchres, not that in which their mortal bones are laid, but a home in the minds of men..."

Our American National Cemetery sites, both foreign and domestic, have been chosen because of their historical locations. For example, the Normandy American Cemetery is located on top of a cliff overlooking famous Omaha Beach, which was the scene of the greatest amphibious troop landing in history. The official name, "Normandy," is derived from the name of the province in which the cemetery is located.

The American Battle Monuments Commission is responsible to the people of the United States for the construction and permanent maintenance of military cemeteries on foreign soil. World War I cemeteries are in England, France (which has six) and Belgium. World War II cemeteries are in England, Luxembourg, France, Belgium, Italy, Holland, Tunisia, Manila and Honolulu.

Each of these hallowed places are beautifully landscaped with gardens and well kept lawns. Every grave has either a cross or Star of David, according to the hero's religious persuasion. These dead, who gave their lives in our country's service, came from every state in the Union and the District of Columbia. A few of them came from England, Scotland and Canada.

Many Medal of Honor recipients rest in foreign cemeteries. However, we must come to our own Arlington National Cemetery for the greatest number in any one place. Since the inception of Arlington, much water has flowed down the Potomac to the sea; many have died in defense of our commitments and ideals.

There are those who say there must be a "free new world," in which there is no room for love of country, love of family or love of God. Yet Arlington Cemetery stands as a symbol of these very same values. Beneath the rows of white headstones rest men who went out boldly and died bravely for their country-heroes all, from Civil War to Vietnam. There is no gloom at Arlington; sadness yes, but no gloom. The warriors rest at last in a quiet place of green trees, winding paths, shady lawns and gently sloping hillsides. Arlington is a peaceful place to visit. It is solemn but not somber. Its graves tell the story of our nation.

Today, 275 individuals who performed actions above and beyond the call of duty, rest in peace along the Potomac.

## U.W. Board To Meet

The board of directors of the Friona United Way will meet Tuesday, May 28 at the Friona State Bank Community Room at 10 a.m.

The budget for the 1985 drive will be established at this time, and all board members are urged to be present.

The Friona area has received a soaking rain during the past week, which amounted to 3.19 inches in the Friona city gauge.

Rodney Dunnam, official weather recorder, reported that a total of .95 inch was received last Friday and Saturday, May 17-18, with another .08 being in the gauge at 7 a.m. Sunday.

Then on Tuesday night, May 21, and into the early hours of Wednesday, a slow-falling rain registered 1.84 inches in the local gauge. This picture-perfect rain was ushered in by an electrical storm.

Late Wednesday afternoon, May 23, an isolated cloud dumped another .32 inch into the official gauge in a short time. This was a

hard-driving rain, and registered almost .8 inch at Friona Cablevision, while in the outlying areas, nothing at all was received.

2.56 inches, and pretty well qualifies as the annual "end of school rain." The moisture has been seen as the finishing touch for the area's wheat crop, as well as a great start for the row crops, most of which are up and doing well.

The week was a mild one temperature-wise, with Sunday's high temperature reaching 80. Last Friday, which was rainy virtually all day, the high temperature reached only 57, the low that morning being 45 degrees.

## FHS Duo Wins At Sci-Fair

Both Trey Collier and Melanie Gallman of Friona High School, returned from the International Science and Engineering Fair, held in Shreveport, Louisiana May 13-18, with awards, it was announced by FHS science instructor Rick Tullis.

Tullis was beaming due to the fact that Friona High School was the only Texas school attending the fair to come home with two awards.

Collier won the U.S. Department of Energy's "Grand Award," which entails an expense-paid trip for a week to the Sandia Laboratories in Livermore, California. He also placed fourth overall in the engineering division, which Tullis calls one of the toughest of the show. Collier's project is entitled "Fluidized Bed Combustion—a Hot Idea."

Miss Gallman won the U.S. Patent Office award for "Most Creative and Original Science Project," out of the 615 projects entered in the fair. Her project was entitled "Moods and Music."

With only about 40 per cent of the students attending the International Fair able to win awards, FHS students attending during the past four years are far above average, with four of the five students going to the fairs coming back with awards.

## School Ends '85 Session

School was dismissed at 2:45 p.m. Thursday, heralding the last day of instruction for the 1984-85 school year.

Friday night's senior commencement will be the last official school function for the year.

## Board Awards Addition Pact

The Friona School board awarded a contract for the addition of four new classrooms to the high school building, at a special meeting of the board on May 9.

Six bids were received for the project, which calls for the addition of the classrooms to the northwest corner of the present building, to be connected to the main building by a corridor.

The bids ranged from \$265,199 to \$301,000. The board awarded the bid to The Ritter Company of Amarillo, who had the low bid of \$265,199. Completion of the project is slated for next October.

At the regular meeting of the board on May 13, two ladies, Sharon Black and Dianne White met with the board regarding the proposal to organize a local PTA organization in the fall.

They presented a set of by-laws, and indicated that there seemed to be considerable interest in the community for such an organization.

The board indicated that it would support such an organization, pointing out that the key to its success would be parental interest and participation. The organizers agreed that if they were unable to secure the needed parental participation, the drive

would undoubtedly be dropped. Tax collection report showed 93 per cent of the local tax roll collected as of the end of April.

The board discussed the need for re-roofing the fourth-fifth grade wing of the grade school building, and will seek bids for such a project.

Band director Jim Parker met with the board and presented the proposed band budget for the 1985-86 school year. The budget was approved as presented.

The board approved updated policy manual changes as recommended by the Texas Association of School Boards. The proposed changes are to bring the district's policies in compliance with the new school reform legislation.

Contracts for technical assistance and curriculum services with the Region XVI Education Service Center were renewed for the 1985-86 school year.

Board member Pat Fleming was selected to be Friona's delegate to the annual Texas Association of School Boards' convention, to be held in San Antonio in September. Kathryn Goddard was selected as alternate.

Routine reports on the status of various school funds were presented by Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

## Friona Industries' Merger Plan Aided

Friona Industries, Inc. and Eller Enterprises announced today that CHS Holding, Inc. has agreed to purchase the 592,525 shares of Friona common stock now held by David Eller and Eller Enterprises, Inc. for \$19.00 per share on or before June 20, 1985.

Friona Industries agreed to reimburse Eller Enterprises for certain expenses relating to Eller Enterprises' efforts to acquire F-I, and Eller and Eller Enterprises agreed to vote their shares of Friona common stock for the merger of CHS and Friona Industries.

Eller Enterprises also agreed not

to purchase any shares under its tender offer for F-I, and, upon CHS' purchase of Eller's and Eller Enterprises' shares, to withdraw the tender offer and dismiss its lawsuit against Friona Industries, CHS and their affiliates.

CHS and Friona Industries have agreed to rescind CHS's acquisition of Friona's Hi-Pro Feeds division, which occurred last Monday.

According to Ron Davenport, Friona Industries' chief executive officer, the settlement reached by CHS and Eller removes the remaining obstacles to consummating the merger of CHS and F-I. As previously announced, Friona Industries expects to mail proxy materials to its shareholders to vote on the merger as soon as SEC clearance is obtained.

## Slave Auction Re-Set

Due to the weather of last weekend the Slave Auction was cancelled. Plans are progressing to have it on Saturday, June 1.

Beginning at 10 a.m. the Chamber will serve coffee and doughnuts. At approximately 10:15 a.m., Larry Potts Auction Service will begin to auction ten very interesting gentlemen.

These gentlemen will clean the streets and spray for weeds, providing they each bring \$50.00 on the auction block.

## Loan Rates Set For '85 Wheat

Parmer County farmers may obtain price support loans on their eligible 1985 wheat at a rate of \$3.29 per bushel, and barley for \$2.12 per bushel.

ASCS official Martin L. Chandler says the rates vary from county to county in relation to cash prices, production and consumption.

The wheat loan rate is for wheat grading number one or better. The barley loan and purchase rate is for barley grading number two or better.

The price support loan program serves as a marketing tool for farmers by enabling them to take advantage of any increase in market prices at a later time.

**55 YEARS AGO--MAY 16, 1930**

At about four o'clock Sunday morning three masked men made their appearance at the front of the Friona Consumers Oil Company filling station and with their pistols staring the attendants in the face, bade them stick up their hands and keep them up, while they rifled the cash drawer of its contents to the amount of between forty and fifty dollars. No evidence of the identity of these has yet been found out.

**50 YEARS AGO--MAY 10, 1935**

Forty-one seniors will graduate in exercises beginning Sunday morning. The number is the largest graduating class that Friona has ever had. Commencement will be Friday evening, May 17, at 8 p.m.

**40 YEARS AGO--MAY 11, 1945**

Wayne B. Stark, formerly Santa Fe station agent at Friona and agent at Black for several months, has returned to Friona, and again taken charge of the local depot as

agent. Mr. Stark's many Friona friends are truly pleased to have him here to serve them again, and he expresses his pleasure at being back.

**30 YEARS AGO--MAY 13, 1955**

Latest business to open in Friona is the Tasty Cream firm across from Friona Consumers on Main Street. Owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Williams, the business opened last weekend and plans are to remain open from 10 a.m. until 10 p.m. each day.

**25 YEARS AGO--MAY 12, 1960**

With all the "Chamber of Commerce" figures going down the drain in the three towns in Parmer County, official reports from the district census director's office in Amarillo, revealed that the total county population in Parmer County are as follows: Friona, 2,035; Bovina, 1,023; and Farwell, 1,009. The figures are said

"subject to revision."

**20 YEARS AGO--MAY 13, 1965**

The Friona City Council annexed a total of 52 acres of land in its meeting Monday night, bringing in two new subdivisions. The newly annexed land is comprised of Western Addition, of which 24 acres were annexed, and Welch Acres, a 28-acre plot, belonging to Nelson Welch.

**15 YEARS AGO--MAY 14, 1970**

Norman (Skip) Mohr, Friona High School senior, returned from Austin last Saturday with the first place plaque and medal in informative speaking in Class AA. Mohr has been district champ in the event three straight years. It also was his second trip to Austin, having won regional as a sophomore, and placing third in the state meet that year. The son of Rev. and Mrs. Paul Mohr, Skip's honor adds to an already impressive list of achievements, including class valedictorian.

**10 YEARS AGO--MAY 11, 1975**

Mrs. E. D. Matlock of Friona received the title of "Pioneer Woman of the Plains" for 1975 at the Pioneer Roundup in Plainview last weekend.

**5 YEARS AGO--JUNE 1, 1980**

A vicious storm system moved across Parmer County Wednesday afternoon, May 28, depositing rain and up to tennis ball-sized hail, leaving considerable damage behind in a strip a couple of miles wide, running mainly north of Highway 86 across the entire county.

Jim Dixon of Friona was among a group who climbed the third and fifth-highest mountains in North America earlier this year, Pico de Orizaba, 18,851 feet tall, and Popocatepetl, 17,887 feet tall, both in Mexico.

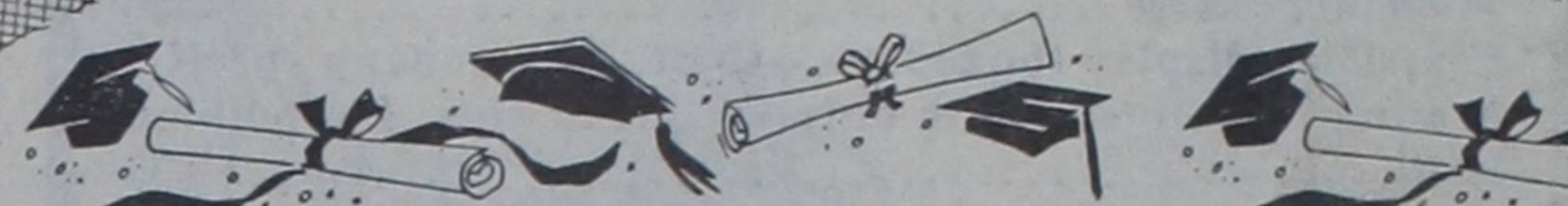
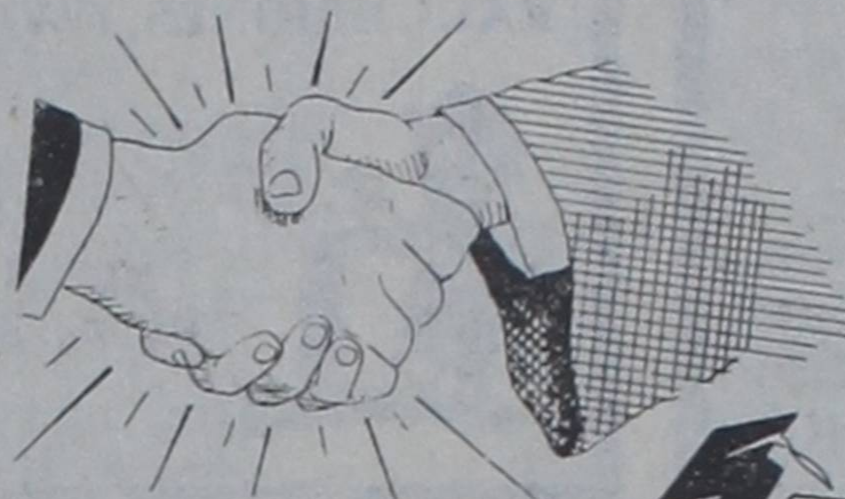
Caudill competed in the regional tournament in debate all four years in high school. He achieved 90 or above four years, and is the historian (third-ranking) student in his graduating class.

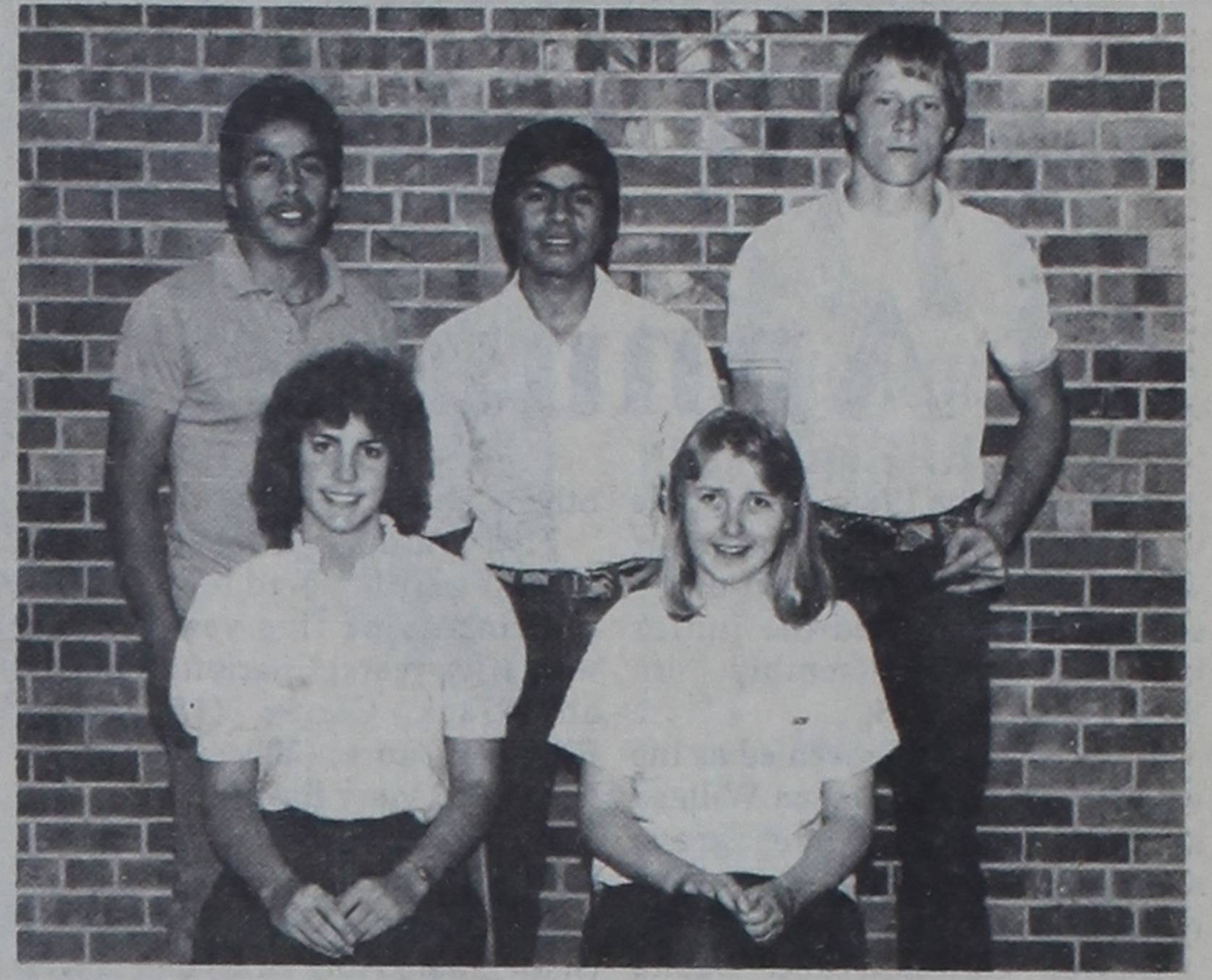

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

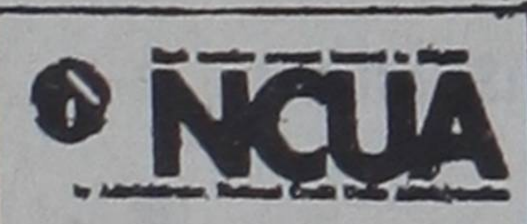

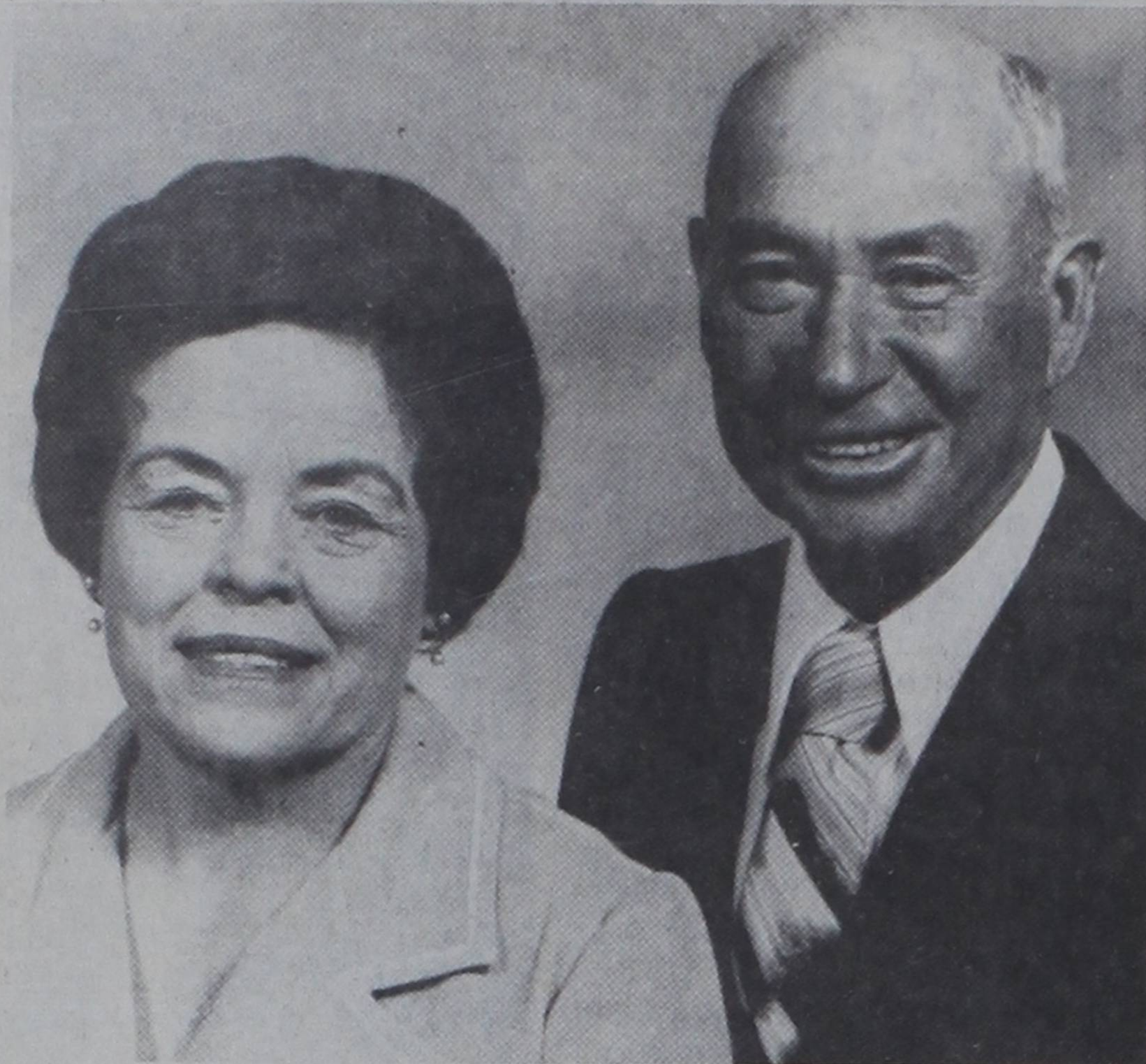
