**PRESIDENT REAGAN'S** tax proposals have been the major topic of conversation since his nationwide television address on the subject May 28.

The president proposes to radically change the federal tax structure, calling for a much more simplistic system. He calls the present system unjust and un-American, and says that it promotes cheating on one's taxes.

The new system that President Reagan proposes will see (the experts say) 79 per cent of American families paying the same or less taxes than they now do, while the other 21 per cent of the taxpayers would pay more taxes.

Among the provisions in the president's program are an increase in the personal exemption, a tax (for the first time) on some health insurance payments made by employers for their employees, and an end to the tax deduction for state and local taxes.

Even the Democrats in the congress have recognized the need for tax reform. Dan Rostenkowski of Illinois, chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, which will write the tax plan, called the president's plan "a starting point."

The oil and gas industry, which has orchestrated a hard and fast lobby in an attempt to keep its tax benefits, will also come under the austerity axe, if the president's proposals are adopted.

Under Reagan's program, oil and gas will be asked to pick up a larger share of the national tax burden by losing the "old oil" depletion allowance. However, the industry would be allowed deductions for the exploration and drilling for new oil.

Of course, the new tax bill isn't written as yet, so it's hard to say how it will affect most people, and in reality it affects everyone differently.

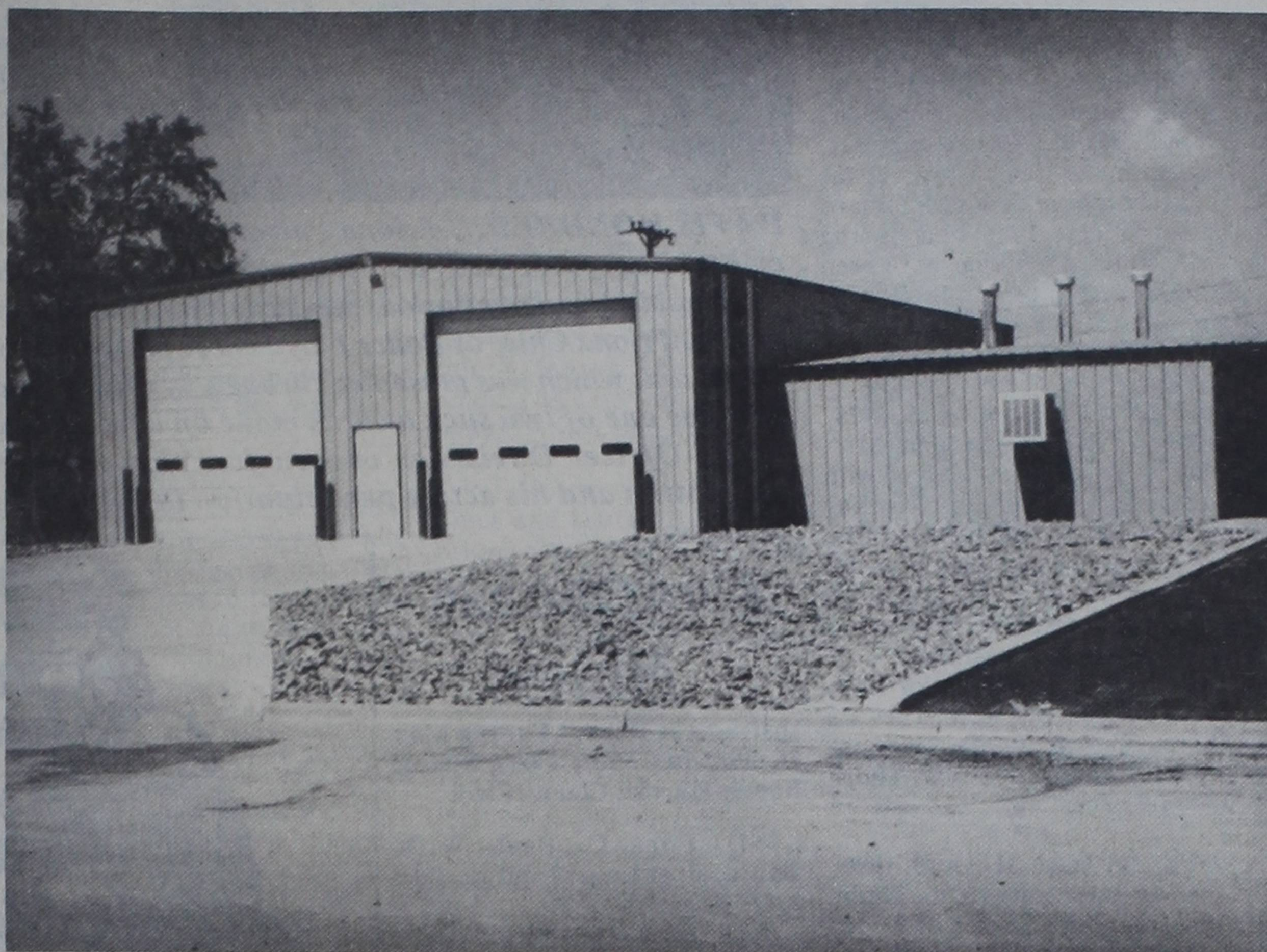
One tax said that the immediate result, in his opinion, would be that the president's plan would benefit those taxpayers who do not itemize deductions on their returns. This category was estimated to contain around two-thirds of the nation's taxpayers.

Tax reform will undoubtedly be a subject of which we'll hear considerably throughout the summer. With all of the built-in security enjoyed by so many in the upper tax brackets, you have to applaud the president for even broaching the subject.

## New Truck Wash Facility Opens Here

Friona's newest business, Big Wheels Truck Wash, located on East Highway 60, will open on Monday, June 10, according to Hack Corbell, owner.

Big Wheels will be the only fully-equipped, full-service truck wash outside of Amarillo and Lubbock, Corbell says. The company will be open from 8 a.m. until midnight, seven days a week.

The company is advertising a grand opening special elsewhere in this issue. The grand opening will be held from Saturday, June 15 through Sunday, June 23. During the special week, truck-tractors will be washed for half of the company's regular price.

The washroom at the new facility measures 44 feet by 75 feet, and can handle two trucks and trailers at one time, or six cars and pickups. Their equipment is specially designed for trucks.

A truck-trailer can be washed at the new facility in a time span of ten to 15 minutes, while a car or pickup will be turned out in about five minutes, Corbell says.

The company has provided a spacious 40x40 office and lounge, where the customer can come and have a cup of coffee and relax while their vehicle is being washed. There is a pool table, some video machines, and a snack dispenser in the lounge area.

"We noticed, in the facilities we visited, that there was hardly anything for the driver to do, other than watch his truck being washed. We think they will enjoy this," Corbell says.

The new business owner said their survey showed that when Millard and Prime International reach their peaks, with the traffic already generated by Excel and the area feed yards, there will be between 400 and 500 trucks per week in and out of Friona. And this figure doesn't include local trucks or "through traffic."

A recent survey by the Texas Highway Department showed that

sixty per cent of the traffic on Highway 60 in this area consists of trucks, Corbell says.

The new business is hoping to cash in on the "new image" being portrayed by truckers, of keeping their trucks clean and neat in appearance. "Most trucks are thought of as rolling billboards, and the drivers or companies want to keep them looking nice," Corbell indicated.

While some companies with large fleets will have washing facilities at their headquarters, it is nothing unusual for the driver for such a company to be on the road for a month at a time, he said.

Big Wheels Truck Wash also will be selling diesel, as an added service to the truckers, and has provided a nice-sized, paved area behind the wash facility where the truckers can fill up.

"We will be catering to the truckers, but we'll wash anything anyone wants washed," Corbell says.

Corbell and his wife Patty have been residents of Friona for the past 16 years. He is well-known in the area as a pilot and crop duster, but says that he hopes to keep his flying down to strictly a personal basis.

## Ford Gets Bid On Co. Pickup

Friona Ford-Mercury Sales was awarded the bid for a new pickup for Precinct 1 at the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners May 28.

Two bids were received, the other being from Reeve Chevrolet-Olds. The bid accepted was for a trade difference of \$9,069.16.

Another bid awarded was to West Texas Equipment Company for a motor grader for Precinct 2. The bid was for a trade difference of \$37,547, with two maintainers being traded in.

Sheriff Bill Morgan met with the court asking for a new car for his department. Although commissioners Anthony and McGeehee voted against, Judge Porter Roberts broke the tie, voting in favor of seeking bids.

The court voted to hire a janitorial service, R&G Enterprises, on a 90-day trial basis, to begin on June 1.

A motion was passed to reinvest a certificate of deposit amounting to \$125,000 from the general fund.

Another motion was passed to seek bids for a used tractor to be used in Precinct 2.

## Library Sets Films And Bookmarks

The Friona Municipal Library announces an "Awesome Adventure" for its summer Reading Club members. Films will be shown on Tuesday, June 11 and Wednesday, June 12, at 10 a.m. for kids ages nine and over.

## Area Receives Good Rainfall

A nice rain was received in the Friona area Tuesday and Wednesday of this week. The totals varied from 1.2 inches to around three inches, with nothing but good rainfall the most common report.

The official measurement in the city of Friona was 1.59 inches for the Tuesday-Wednesday morning period. About half of the total was received during the daytime on Tuesday, June 4, and the rest--around .8 inch, coming in a shower that fell after midnight in the early morning hours of Wednesday.

Farmers in the area welcomed the latest rain as "just right." Some of the reports heard in visiting around included: Jerral Wright, two inches; Dickie Garner, two inches; Clyde Woodard at Hub, three inches; and Billy Wayne Sisson, north of town, 1.2 inches.

The latest rainfall brings the total received in Friona to 9.07 inches since March 1, and this should be a boon to farmers, whose main expense and/or worry is getting enough moisture on their crops.

The latest rain will delay the start of wheat harvest to some extent, as the wheat and barley was on the verge of being ready to cut. However, the rain has not been detrimental to the wheat in any way.

For the calendar year, according to Rodney Dunnam, the total received for the first five calendar months, plus the first six days of June amounts to 10.65 inches, which is about two inches above normal for this time period.

The rainfall for 1985 has been broken down as follows: January, 1.28 inches; February, .30 inches; March, 2.87 inches; April, 1.37 inches; May, 3.19 inches and June, 1.64 inches, for a total of 10.65 inches.

The latest round of showers also cooled things off after the mercury had climbed into the 90s the previous week. On two days the past week, the high temperature was in the 60s.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

## 55 YEARS AGO--MAY 30, 1930

A force of men arrived here and began work on the construction of the new Farmers' Elevator here this week. The work is progressing at a satisfactory rate and the manager in charge of the work proposes to have the building complete in time to receive the new crop of wheat when it comes in. The new elevator is being built on the south side of the track near the old one and will be owned and operated on the same plan.

## 50 YEARS AGO--MAY 31, 1935

In spite of the fact that it seemed that all wheat in this territory had been ruined by the wind and dust storms of the past several weeks, it now appears that there will be some wheat grown here if no unfavorable weather conditions arise. The good rain of two weeks ago has placed sufficient moisture in the land to admit planting of the spring row crops.

## 45 YEARS AGO--MAY 31, 1940

The Santa Fe Grain Company, under the direction of the manager G. (Preach) Cranfill, is making extensive additions to its plant, which, when completed, will place Friona among the high-ranking grain buying cities of the Panhandle. The work now under construction, will add five larger metal storage bins to the company's storing capacity. Each bin will have a capacity of 20,000 bushels of grain, making a total capacity of 100,000 bushels.

## 40 YEARS AGO--MAY 25, 1945

So far as the growing wheat in this locality is concerned, the situation has already become serious from the long continued dry spell. Some farmers report that they have already plowed under a portion or all of their wheat crop, while others are talking of turning their livestock in on their wheat and thus reaping as much as possible from its pasture.

## 35 YEARS AGO--MAY 19, 1950

Victim of a freak explosion, Clyde Fields, about 30 years old, is in the Parmer County Community Hospital, suffering painful

injuries, cuts and bruises. The forefinger on the left hand was severed and part of another finger was cut off in Tuesday's accident. Fields' left eye was injured but the damage is not believed to be permanent. As he and C.L. Mercer were walking along the country road from the pickup to their irrigation ditch, Fields unearthed a partially covered object about the size of a fountain pen. On closer examination, he took the top off the object. When he did, the unidentified missile exploded in his face. His condition was pronounced as painful but not critical. One theory is that the object was a detonator left by a seismograph crew that worked in that vicinity last year.

## 30 YEARS AGO--MAY 27, 1955

Coming to Friona to fill the position of grade school principal is Mr. Kenneth Fields who is a brother of Rev. C.M. Fields, pastor of the Friona Baptist Church. Fields began his teaching career in Sudan where he taught the eighth grade for two years. From there, he went to Farwell, where he served the past few years in the capacity of principal of the elementary grades.

## 25 YEARS AGO--MAY 26, 1960

Friona Lanes, Friona's newest addition to the skyline along Highway 60 will officially open their doors for bowling enthusiasts at 8 a.m. Friday morning.

Members of the Friona Star and Plains Publishers staffs honored J.W. (Uncle John) White with a birthday party Monday afternoon. This "grand old man" of the Star was observing his 92nd birthday. He was the first editor and publisher of the Friona Star. The first issue was printed July 5, 1926.

## 20 YEARS AGO--MAY 27, 1965

J.W. (Uncle John) White quietly observed his 97th birthday on Sunday, May 23. The old gentleman, Friona's pioneer newspaperman, spent a quiet day with his daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. W.H. Flippin, Jr.

Friona Feed Yard, Inc. was a major attraction on the first day of

a three-day tour of the West Texas-Eastern New Mexico area beginning Monday by a group of Englishmen who are members of Corn and Agricultural Merchants, Limited. There were sixteen men in the group.

## 15 YEARS AGO--MAY 28, 1970

Greenbugs have been found on small sorghum plants in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties, according to Jack King, Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board research director. This is the earliest that greenbugs have been found on sorghum in the Plains since they first became a threat to the crop in 1968.

## 10 YEARS AGO--MAY 25, 1975

Mrs. T.E. Lovett and Mrs. Woody Wilson were honored with a retirement tea by Mrs. Troy Ray at Mrs. Ray's home Tuesday. Mrs. Lovett is retiring at the end of this school term after 22 years of teaching school. Mrs. Wilson has logged 36 years of teaching.

The FHS cheerleaders for 1975-76 were elected this week. They are Sherri Thorn, Paula London, Lucinda Aguirre, Johnna Thorn and Mary Schilling.

## 5 YEARS AGO--JUNE 15, 1980

On Sunday, June 15, the Union Congregational Church of Friona will celebrate its 72nd birthday. The Congregational Church has the distinction of being the first church organized in Friona.

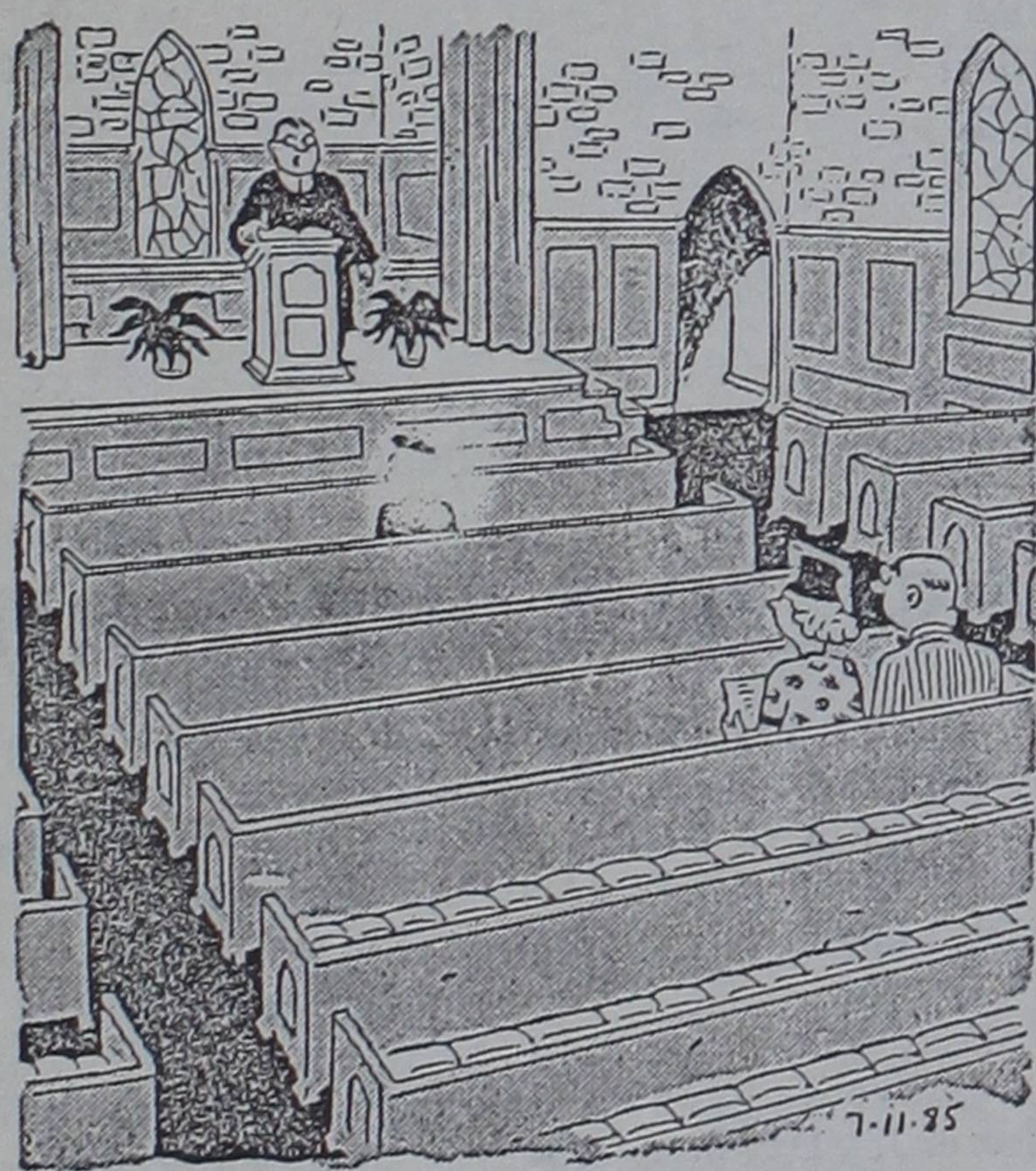

Reeve Chevrolet remained winless, dropping three outings. On May 28, the Bank topped

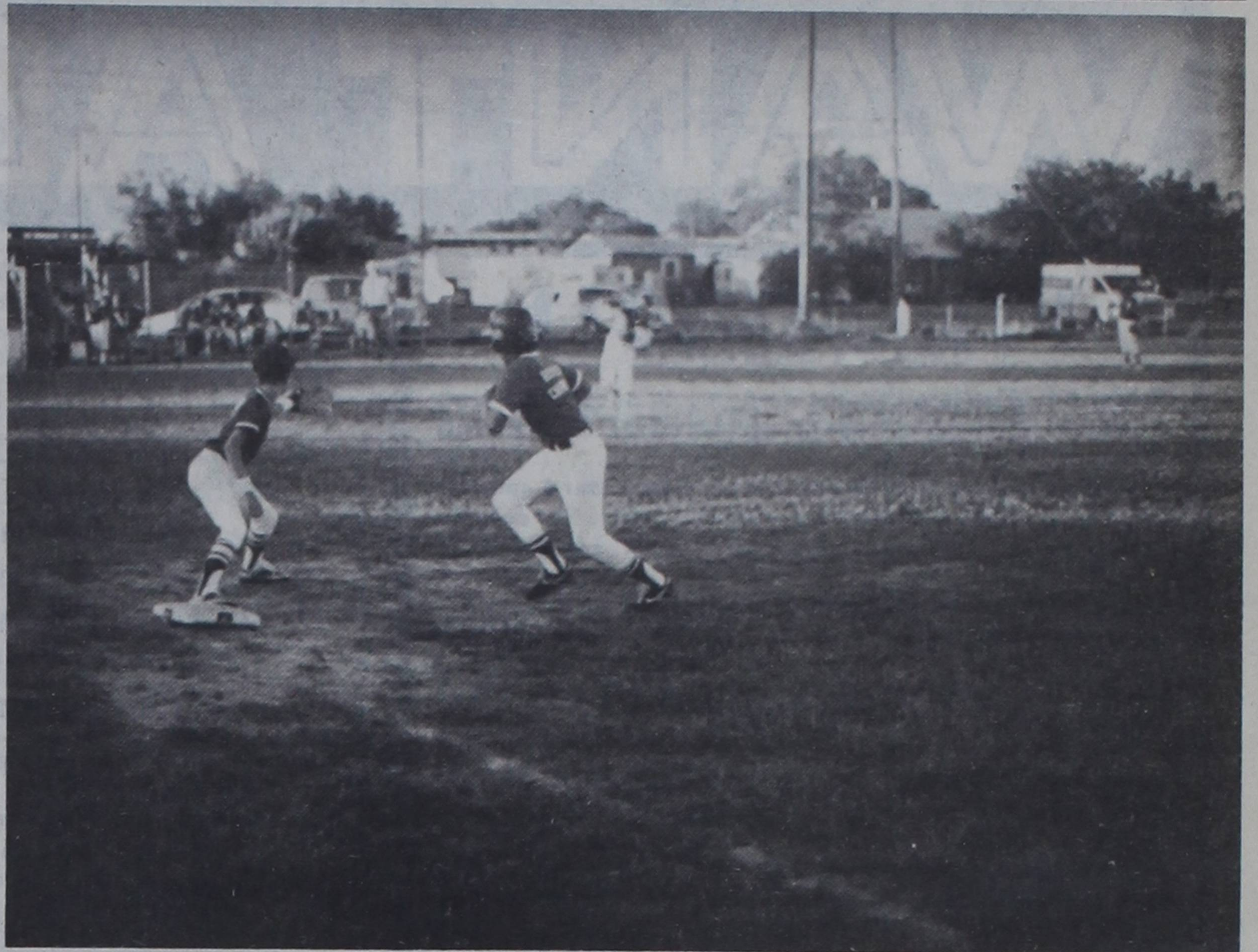

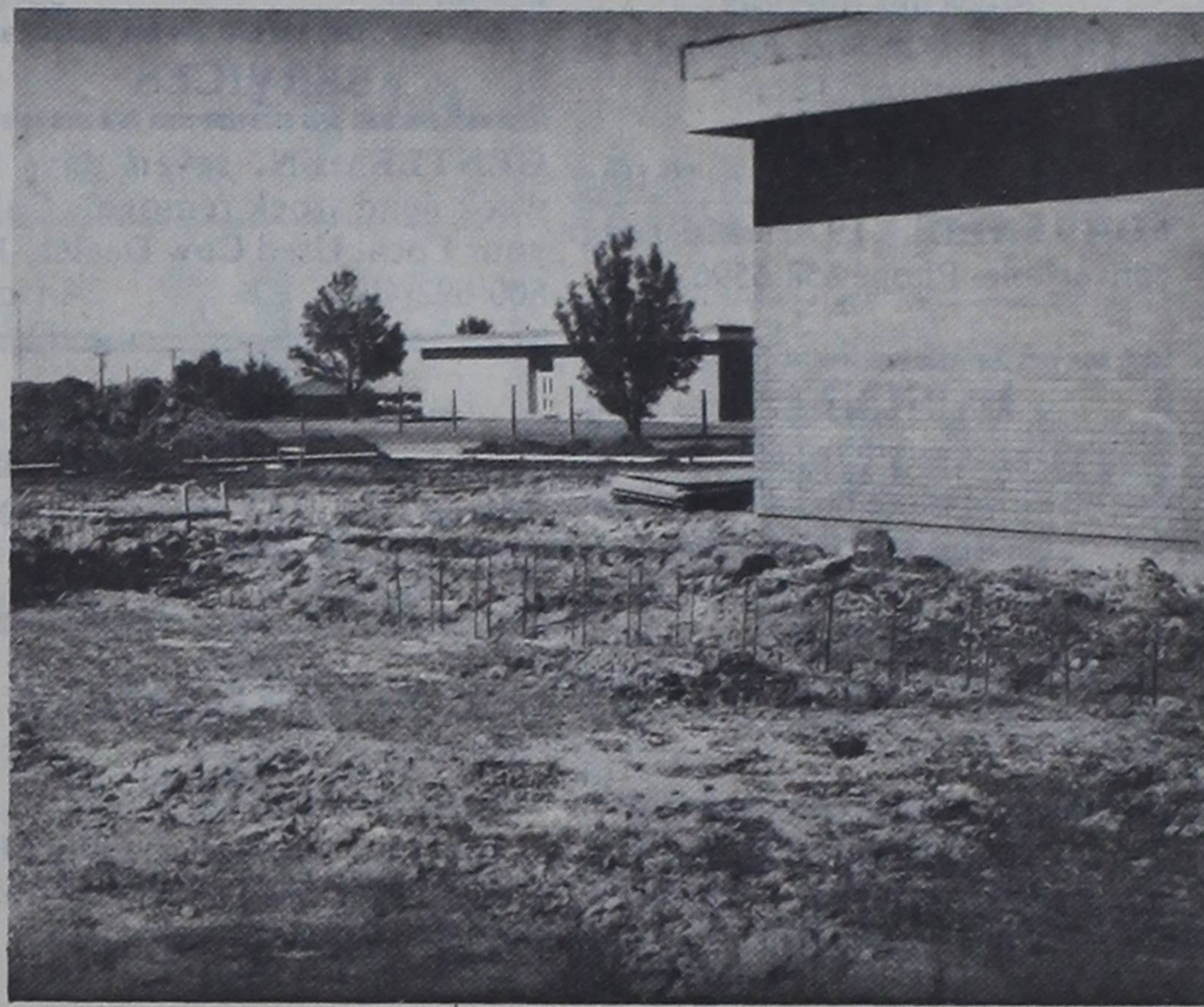
On Tuesday, June 4, the Bank bounced back for a 7-4 win over Reeve Chevrolet-Olds, in one of the better games of the season.

**JUDGING BY COLOR**  
 The color of wine generally, but not always, indicates something about its quality. In white wines, look for varying shades of yellow, gold or straw. Amber tones indicate a flaw. In rose wines, the "pinkness" can vary but it should not be tainted with either amber or purple. For red wines, the general rule is that the heavier the color, the heavier the wine. If one gets a light red taste from a deep-colored wine, something is amiss. The color of red wine depends almost entirely on the variety of grape used. In any case, amber tones are an indication of oxidation and are undesirable.

For hobbies, she says she enjoys



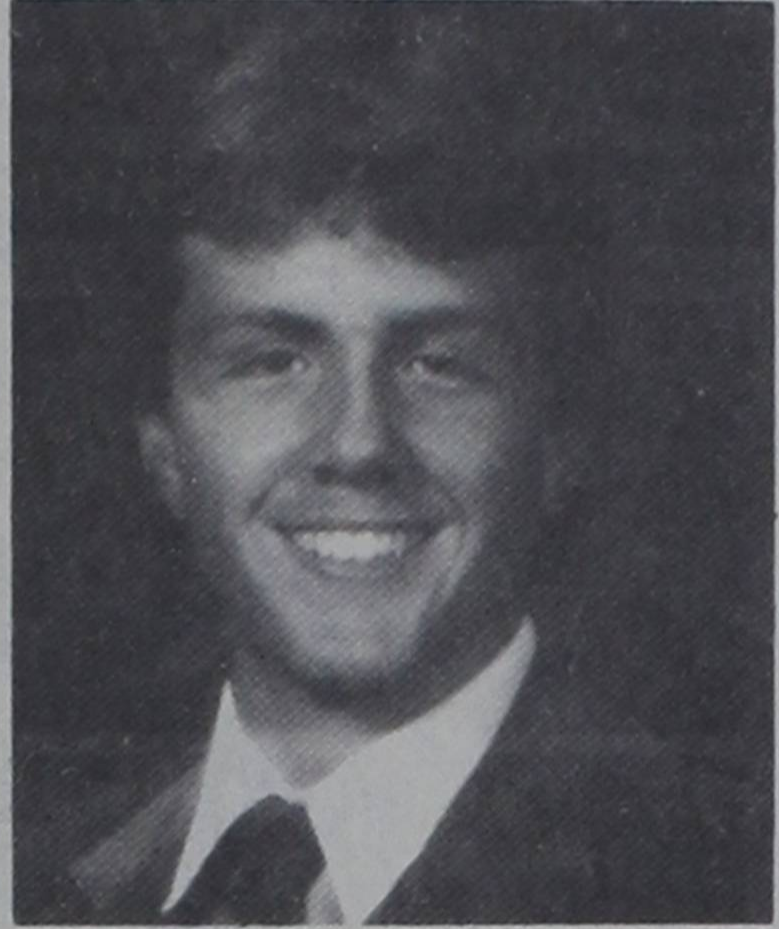

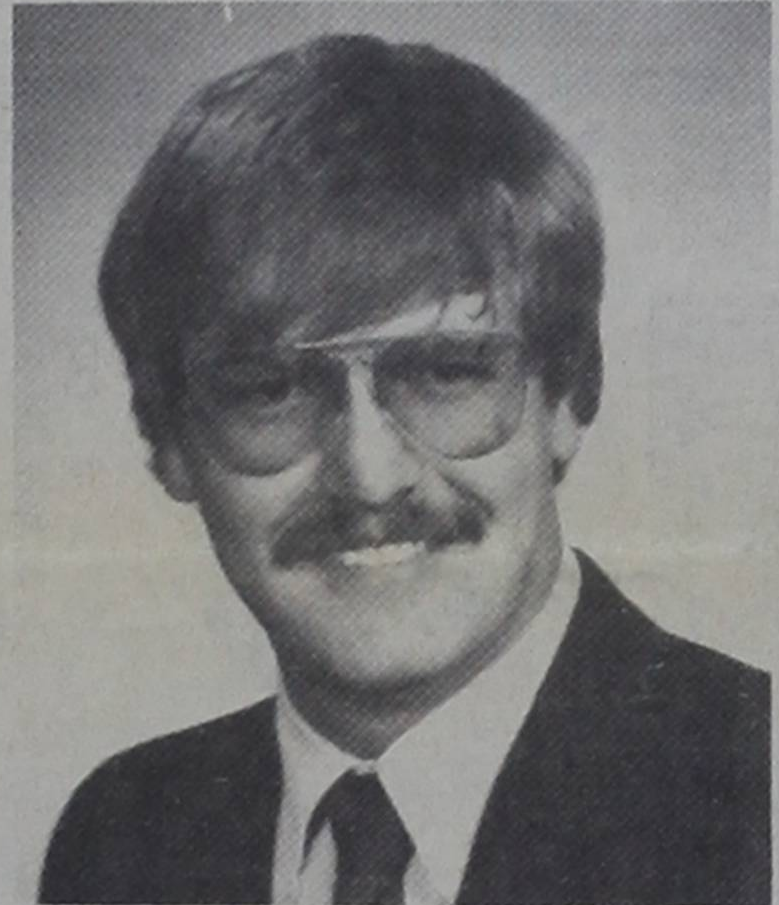

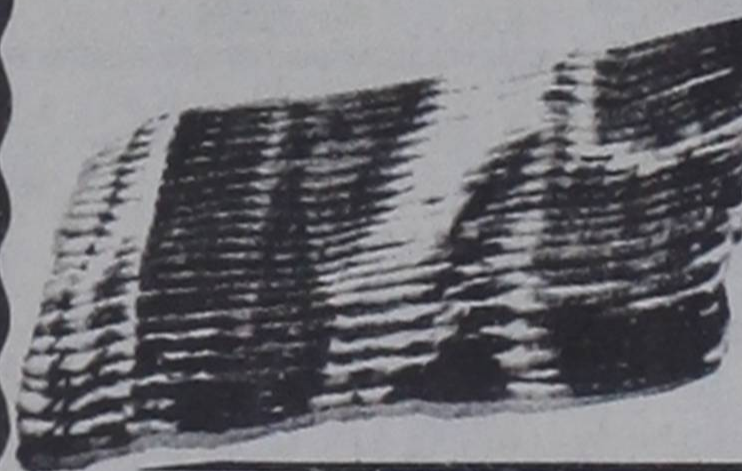
