Dryland Yields Are "Super"

AS MOST PEOPLE know, our state will observe its Sesquicentennial, or 150th anniversary of its birth as a nation in 1986.

Our once independent nation, today is still a remarkably diverse land. Modern-day Texas is world-recognized for its computer technology, medical research and space exploration, as well as for its cowboys and oil wells.

We have received a lot of material to help promote the Sesquicentennial. Among these are a series of articles which have been collected, entitled "News From the Republic." They were gleaned from old newspapers published during the time Texas was about to battle for its independence.

Some of the articles give a glance at how people saw events of that day and time. Some contain recipes (yes, newspapers even ran them 150 years ago!), of highly unusual nature.

We will be presenting excerpts from the "News of the Republic" series from time to time, as our means of calling our readers' attention to the Sesquicentennial. Here are a couple:

(From an Extra of the Georgia Messenger):

TEXAS

A meeting of citizens was held in this place, on Tuesday evening, (which, we think, was the largest we have ever witnessed here), for the purpose of expressing their sentiments relative to the struggle for liberty in Texas, and devising means to aid that cause. The proceedings will be found below, which will show that the spirit of '76 is still alive among us; that we have those, not only ready to repel tyranny from our soil, but like true philanthropists in the cause of liberty, will go beyond our borders, to tender the aid of their persons and arms to a people weak in numbers and means, who are threatened with oppression. We are gratified to see this spirit prevailing to such an extent. Those who embark in it, have the sympathies and best wishes of our whole community; and we cannot but anticipate for their efforts, a glorious and successful termination.

The cries of our fellow-countrymen of Texas have reached us, calling for help against the Tyrant and Oppressor. Let all who are disposed to respond to that cry, in any form, assemble at the Court-house on Tuesday evening next, at early candle light.

Macon, November 9, 1835

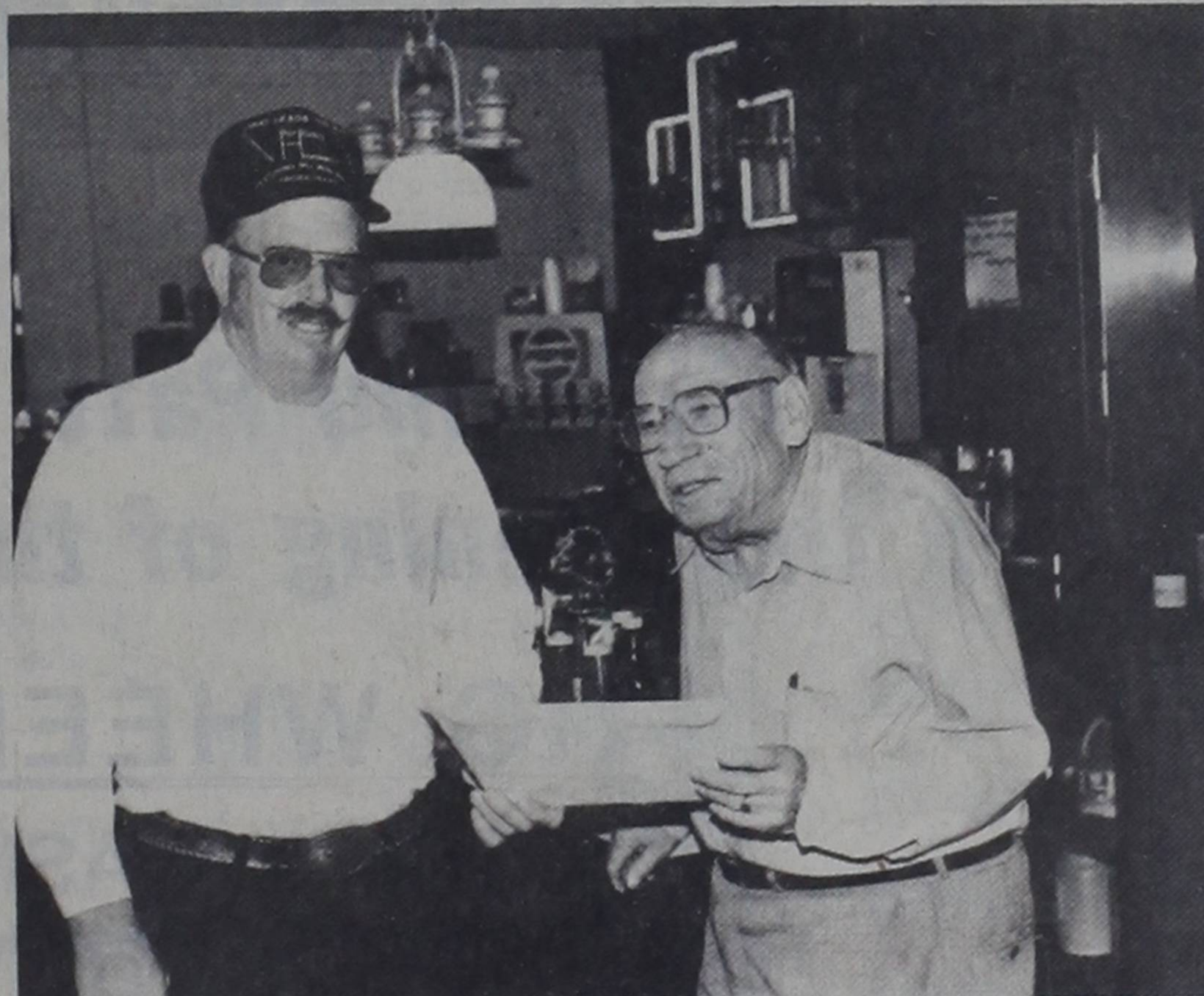

Harvest of the dryland wheat and barley is well underway in the Friona area--being accomplished around rain showers. Producers and elevator officials are geared for a bumper crop of wheat.

Ron Smiley, manager of Friona Wheat Growers, said Friday morning that Wheat Growers had already received 15½ million pounds of wheat--all dryland. "It's a much earlier harvest than usual, and so far it looks good," Smiley said.

Smiley indicated that the quality of the dryland wheat that has been received has been good--averaging about 60 pounds test weight per bushel. Yields are running from 30 to 50 bushels per acre, which is a great year for dryland.

Farmers are hoping that the rust problem, which threatened the area wheat, may not be as big a problem as was at first feared.

First loads of wheat delivered to Friona elevators were by Bob Clark to West Friona Grain on Friday, June 7, and by Floyd Reeve to Friona Wheat Growers on Saturday, June 8. Clark indicated his dryland field would average something over 30 bushels.

Reeve said he had been farming for 20 years, and this was by far the best yields his dryland wheat had ever done. "One place I farm, ten miles west of town, has been in my family for 50 years, and most years it's 'just there to hold the world together'. This year, a 50-acre field of wheat made 50 bushels to the acre," Reeve said.

Reeve had another field near town that made 45 bushels to the acre. He, like most other farmers, has not started on his irrigated fields, as they are still too wet. "We need some dry nights, and we'll be ready to start cutting it (the irrigated wheat)," Reeve said.

Smiley said he had not received any samples on the grade or protein content on this year's crop as yet, so the protein value of the crop is not yet known.

Don Huckabee, manager of West Friona Grain, said the dryland wheat is "much better than expected in most fields." They're cutting their best wheat right now, and there could still be some rust damage, but so far this hasn't hurt the yields as badly as we were afraid it would," Huckabee said.

Wheat price locally was \$2.93 per bushel, and everyone agrees it's a shame the price isn't better for the farmers, since they have some good yields for a change. However, they can net \$3.09 per bushel if they go the government loan route, and can also get an additional premium if they have good protein.

Showers have slowed the harvest somewhat, but haven't stopped the early run.

The City of Friona logged a shower of .09 inch Tuesday morning, June 11, and had another thunderstorm which yielded .26 inch in a short time Thursday night. Temperatures were again mild for the week. The high temperature on Wednesday reached only 71 degrees, and the low two different mornings was 51.

The .35 inch of rain recorded this week brought the total rainfall for the month of June to 1.99 inch, and hiked the calendar year's total to an even 11 inches, which is much above average.

Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--JUNE 6, 1930

One of the saddest affairs that has visited Friona and community in many years occurred Monday morning, resulting in the death of Paul Highfill, the fourteen year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Highfill, whose farm home is a few miles southeast of Friona. It appears that Paul had ridden his pony to the pasture to bring in a cow and young calf and nothing more was known of him until the pony appeared at the home with his lifeless body attached to it by means of a small rope, one end being tied around the boy's body while the other was tied to the pony's neck. The body was considerably mangled and death had evidently resulted from being dragged or kicked by the pony.

50 YEARS AGO--JUNE 7, 1935

Much of the news due to appear in the Friona Star today does not appear because a first class mail sack was stolen from the Santa Fe station in Panhandle Tuesday night, which contained letters from Friona with news and advertisements, as well as hundreds of other pieces of mail. The mail pouch, according to bank officials, contained a large number of checks for Panhandle banks.

45 YEARS AGO--JUNE 7, 1940

Mr. Harley Bulls, music director in Friona Schools, has been recently appointed as seventh district chairman of the Rural School Music, a division in the Texas Federated Music Clubs. The seventh district covers something over forty-five counties, including the Panhandle and extending south beyond Lubbock.

40 YEARS AGO--JUNE 1, 1945

Mr. and Mrs. C.W. Owens of the Hub Community south of Friona, have received word from their son, Pvt. Juel Owens, informing them that he has been liberated from a German war prison, where he had been since the 4th of last October, and is in good health. He was liberated April 29. Pvt. Owens has been overseas a

year and took part in the invasion on D-Day and was in combat most of the time thereafter until he was taken prisoner.

35 YEARS AGO--MAY 26, 1950

The Friona substation of the Southwestern Public Service Company, has been completed and is ready for operation, C.D. Hardesty, district manager for the Southwestern Public Service Company, announced this week. The installation of a new voltage regulator completed the project, Mr. Hardesty added.

Vera Ann Jones was named state champion over all typing contestants throughout Texas. She chalked up a highly enviable score of 155.02 with 97 per cent accuracy at Austin recently. This surpassed the state record for both 1948 and 1949.

30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 3, 1955

Farmers east of Hub received two and one-half inches of rainfall Monday afternoon in a short period of time. The heavy rain washed the newly planted cotton completely away. The thunderstorm occurred halfway between Hub and Dimmitt, and will cause the farmers in that area to replant all the cotton.

Gaylord Maurer was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the United States Air Force Reserve upon graduation.

25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 2, 1960

Farm-to-market roads are still being built in Parmer County in spite of the greatly curtailed state-federal program. A contract for 9.7 miles of construction on FM 1172 was awarded a Lubbock firm this week, it was announced by the State Highway Commission. James C. Kerr submitted low bid of \$128,914 on this project. It covers grading, structures, base and surfacing from State 86 (3.5 miles west of Castro County line) to Lazbuddie. Eventually, it is planned to continue this road northward to tie in with Highway 60 near the community of Black.

20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 3, 1965

Open House for the new \$100,000 addition to Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona will be held from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday.

15 YEARS AGO--JUNE 4, 1970

Congressman Bob Price has been advised by the Department of Agriculture that the budget limitations have been removed to permit preliminary work to proceed on 25 watershed projects in 16 states--including Running Water Draw and Lower Running Water Draw Watershed projects in the 18th Congressional District.

10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 1, 1975

Graduation exercises were held for 112 members of the eighth grade class of 1975 at the Grade School Auditorium Thursday, May 29. Leading the class scholastically were Donna Rector, valedictorian, and Chris Barnett, salutatorian.

Commencement exercises for the senior class of 1975 were held in the Grade School Auditorium Friday, May 30. A total of seventy seniors received their diplomas. Top students from the class were Carol Bavousett, valedictorian; Jeanine Jarboe, salutatorian and Pam Wilcox, who presented the class history.

5 YEARS AGO--JUNE 22, 1980

Violent weather made a pass at the Friona area again this week, as a cloud bearing hail and a tornado funnel menaced the eastern and southern portion of the area. A number of Friona residents spotted the funnel in the cloud as it moved across the area just before sundown. One resident of the area southeast of Friona, Patsy Bandy, made a picture of the funnel cloud.

The first load of wheat was delivered to Friona Wheat Growers on Monday, June 16 by Ernest Osborn. The first load of barley had been brought to the elevator by Merle Massie on Thursday, June 12.

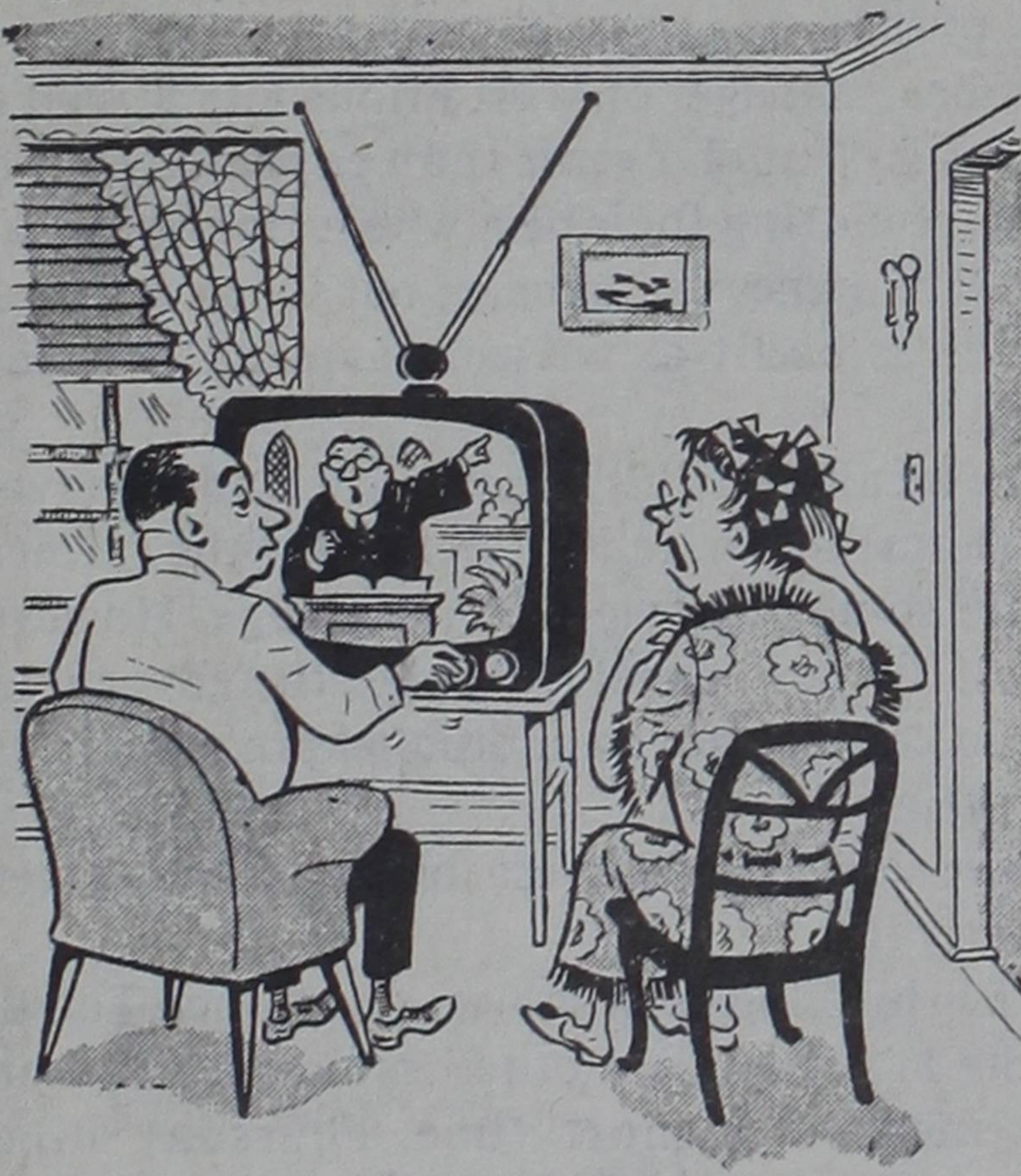
- 1) Have your agent perform a survey of your operations. This should be done without obligation and will help avoid coverage gaps.

- 6) Determine what, if any, product liability coverage you might need to protect yourself, even though you aren't the manufacturer.
- 7) Most important, re-check your coverage annually to make sure it stays current.

Sad Dog Banks Are Important

The Friona Animal Humane Society has placed several Sad Dog Banks in various Friona businesses.

"Since FAHS is a non-profit organization, donations are our only way of doing our best in dealing with the animal situation in Friona," said Susan Weiland.

"The money collected from these banks help FAHS help you with the cost of humane animal control--euthanasia by the intravenous injection of Sodium Pentobarbital; and veterinary cost for (1) shots given to each animal that we place in a home, (2) treatment for injured animals that come to us, and (3) supplies for those who care for strays until they can be placed in homes," Mrs. Weiland continued.

"The Sad Dog Banks are placed in order to help fund FAHS. Penny, nickel and dime donations may not seem like a lot but they add up and help our organization that much more. It is our hope to build a new animal shelter in Friona within the next year so as to house and care for abandoned and homeless animals daily and with the kindness and love that they deserve," the spokesperson said.

"The next time you see a Sad Dog, please donate what you can. Remember...Animals, it's their world, too!" Mrs. Weiland concluded.

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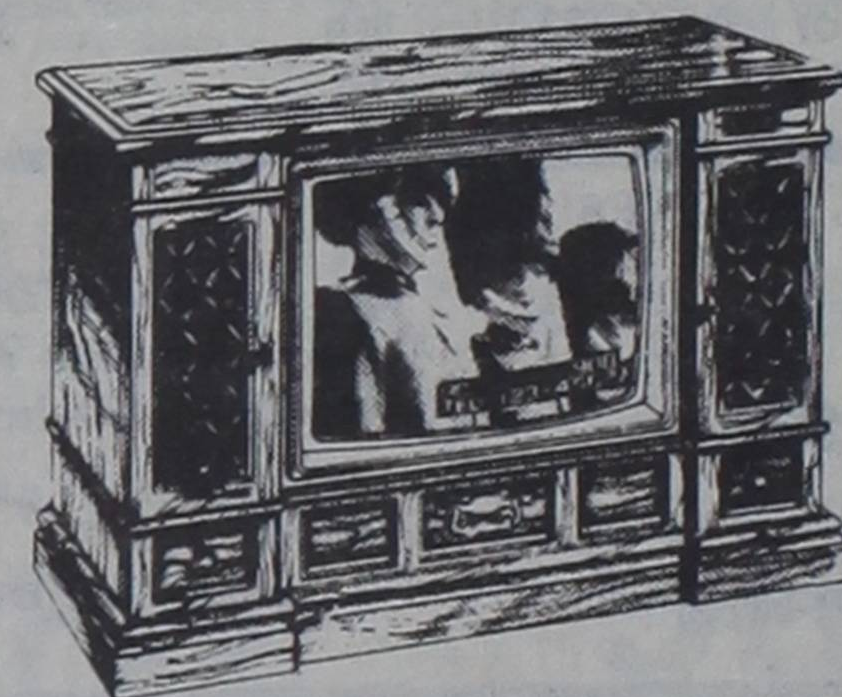

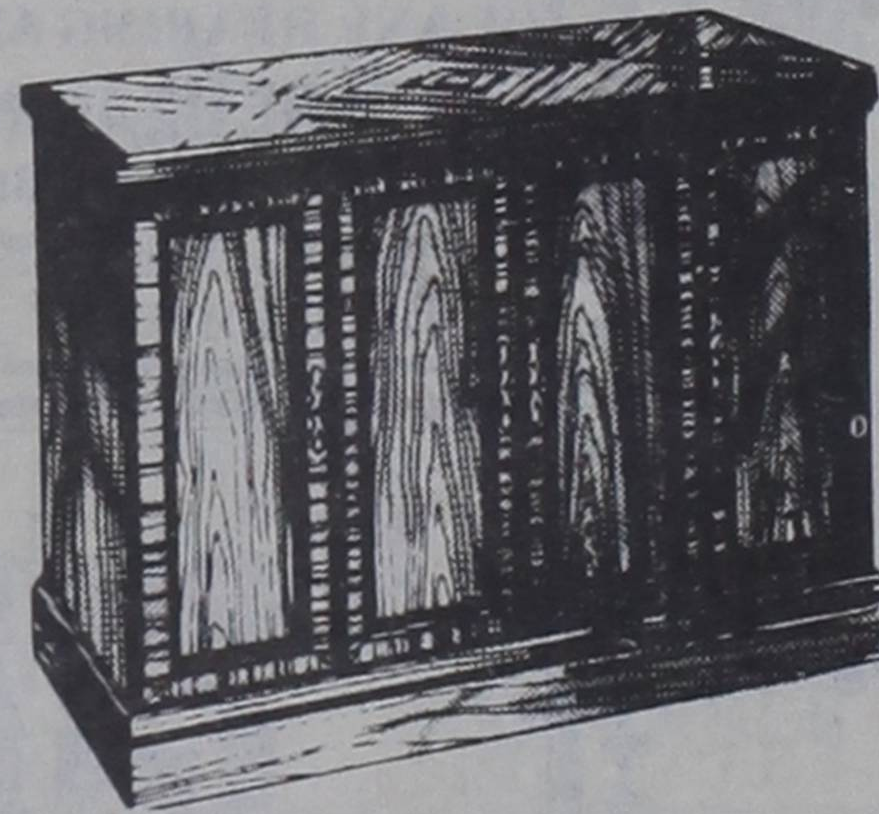

Unique Auction Set June 22 To Benefit Community Center

What do Arnold Palmer, Gov. Mark White, Julia Childs, the Dallas Cowboys and Billy Graham have in common?

They are among 100 celebrities who have sent items for the Celebrity Auction scheduled June 22 in Farwell.

Farwell's auction, believed to be the first of its kind in the entire Eastern New Mexico-West Texas area, is a fund raiser for the Farwell Community Center. Thus, items purchased at it can be listed as tax-deductible donations.

Several Farwell groups, such as the Rotary Club, Study Club, ESA and Beta Sigma Phi, have joined together to sponsor the auction. It starts at 6 p.m. and includes a supper that can be purchased.

When the Farwell residents decided to seek a novel idea for a fund-raiser for its new Community Center on Ninth Street, the idea of enlisting the aid of celebrities was thrown out.

So more than 600 letters were sent to celebrities, including movie and TV stars, professional football and baseball teams, state and national politicians, area universities and prominent people, asking for donated items to be auctioned off.

The results have been stupendous, said Lesley Lunsford, chairman of the fund-raising event.

Here is a partial list of the more than 100 items that have been donated:

--A Washington Redskins football signed by Joe Theismann and a football signed by the Detroit Lions football team.

--A warmup suit (small men's size) like those used by the U.S. Olympians at Los Angeles.

--Autographed TV scripts from Gary Coleman, Bob Newhart, "Boss Hogg" and "Knight Rider."

--Scarves from Dyan Cannon and Mrs. Gerald Ford.

--Autographed book marks from Julia Child and a poem signed by Erma Bombeck.

--Autographed pennants from

the Dallas Cowboys, Seattle Seahawks and Texas Rangers. T-shirts with emblems from the Los Angeles Dodgers, Atlanta Falcons and New York Mets.

--Two autographed baseballs from Johnny Bench.

--Books from Billy Graham, Jerry Falwell, Desi Arnaz and Mary Martin.

--Texas flags that flew over the state capital in Austin, from Sen. Bill Sarpalius and Rep. Pete Laney.

In addition to collecting the celebrity items, Rotarians have visited businesses in Clovis, Muleshoe, Texico and Farwell seeking donations. Dozens of items have been collected, including a stereo, Bibles, a talking doll, 25 gospel records, fertilizer, clocks, etc.

"We're very excited about this auction," said Mrs. Lunsford. "It's the first of its kind and the interest is mounting. It's a perfect place to pick up one-of-a-kind items either for your children or for gifts at holiday time."

The *Lubbock Avalanche Journal* ran an article on the Celebrity Auction May 21, prompting several calls from other communities also interested in putting on such an auction, such as Dimmitt.

After the article appeared, it was discussed on KSEL Radio in Lubbock. The outcome was that KSEL would conduct an auction of a T-shirt from one of its DJ's, with proceeds going to the Farwell Community Center.

In addition, KZZO-FM Radio, in Clovis, has agreed to broadcast live from the auction, plus promoting it heavily in the week beforehand.

"We expect folks to come to the auction from as far away as Lubbock and Amarillo," said Mrs. Lunsford. "It will be a chance to get items you simply can't get anywhere else. Kids will especially like the opportunity to have sports and celebrity items, for example, that will be one-of-a-kind in their community."

The doors to the Community Center, where the auction is slated, will open at 6 p.m. June 22. Folks can view the items for an hour, plus have a chance to eat supper (spaghetti dinners and hot dogs will be available).

The auction will start at 7 p.m.

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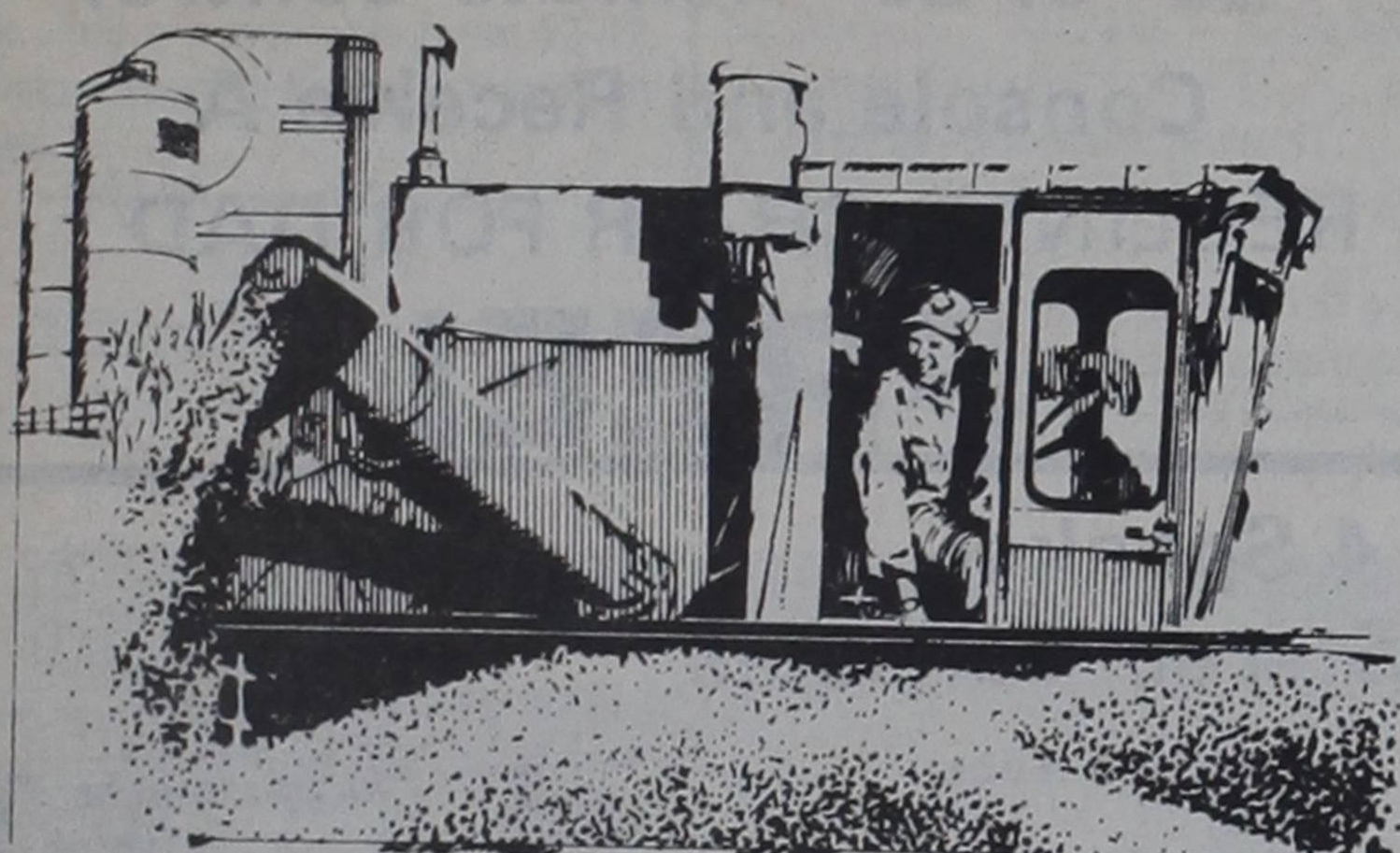

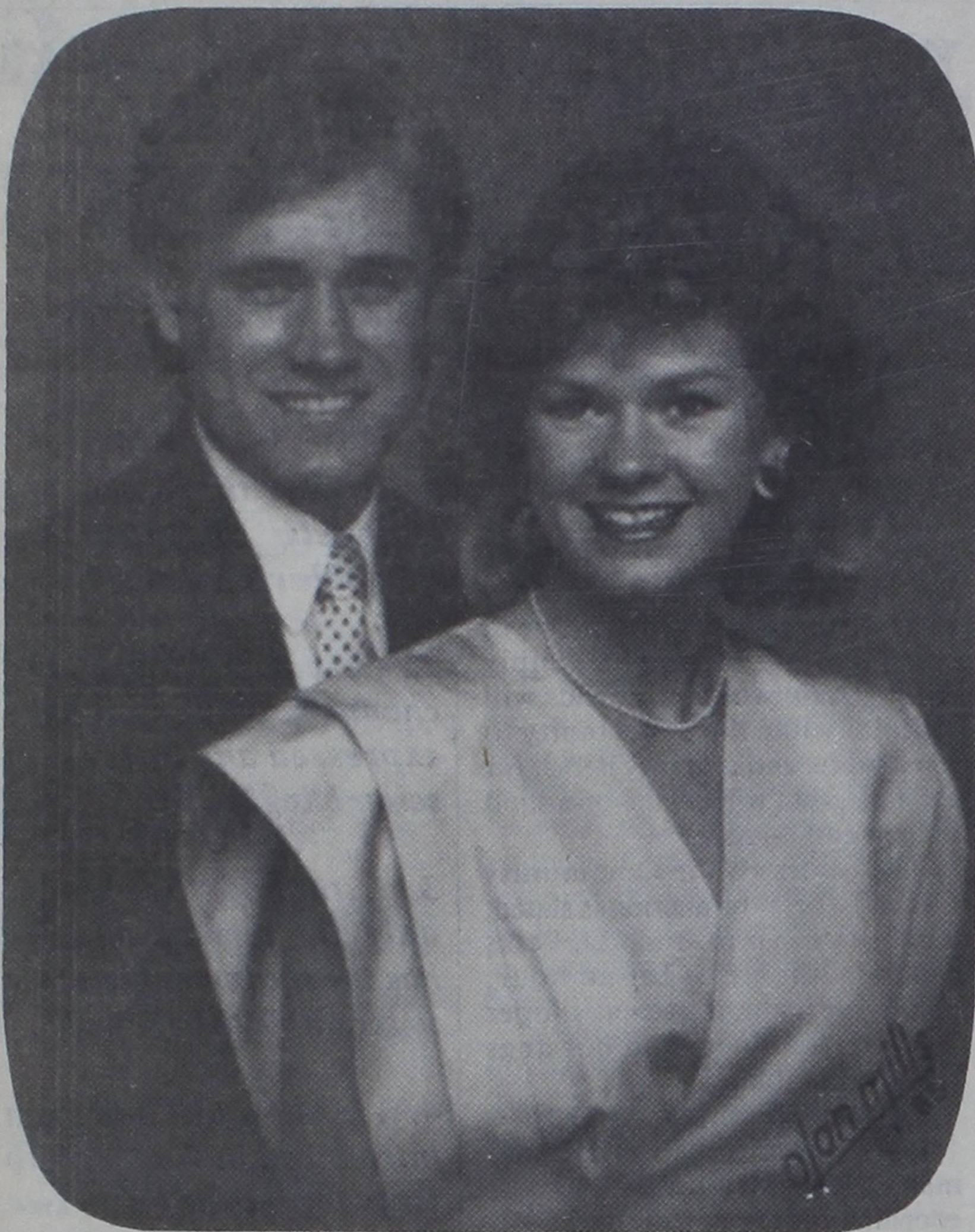

The market will open Saturday morning, July 13 at 8 a.m. and be open every Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday throughout the produce season.

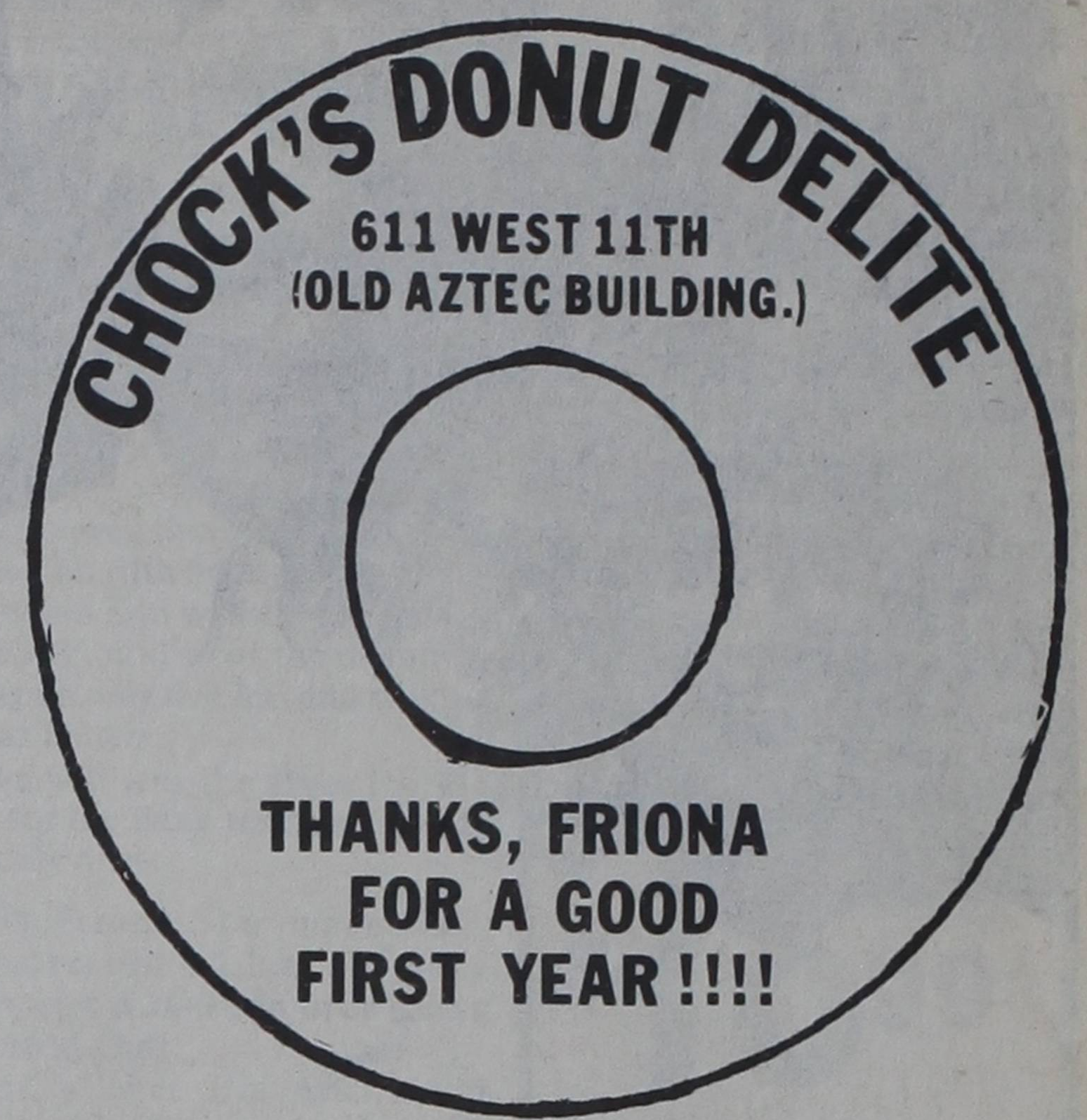

excellent location for both wholesale and retail sales."

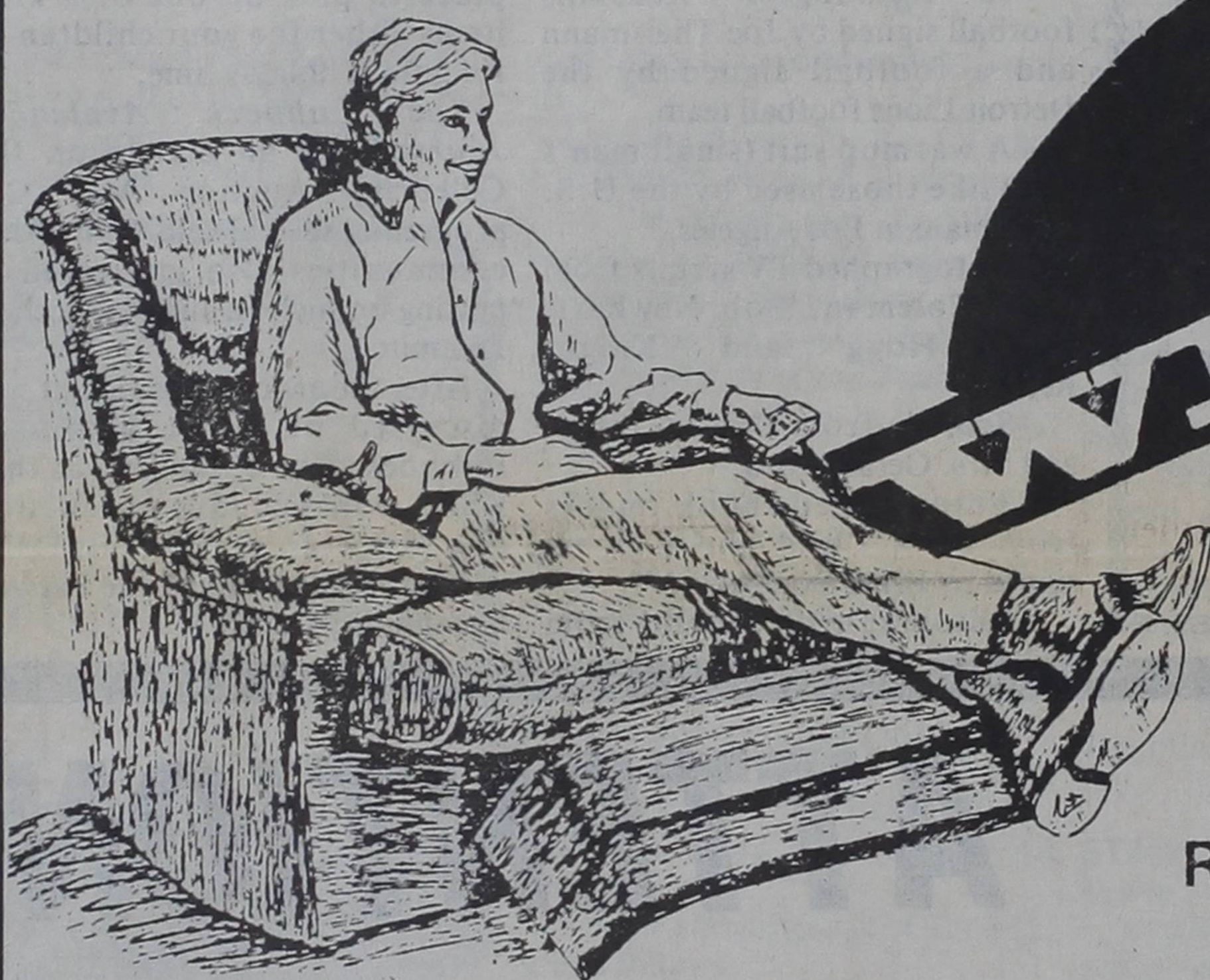

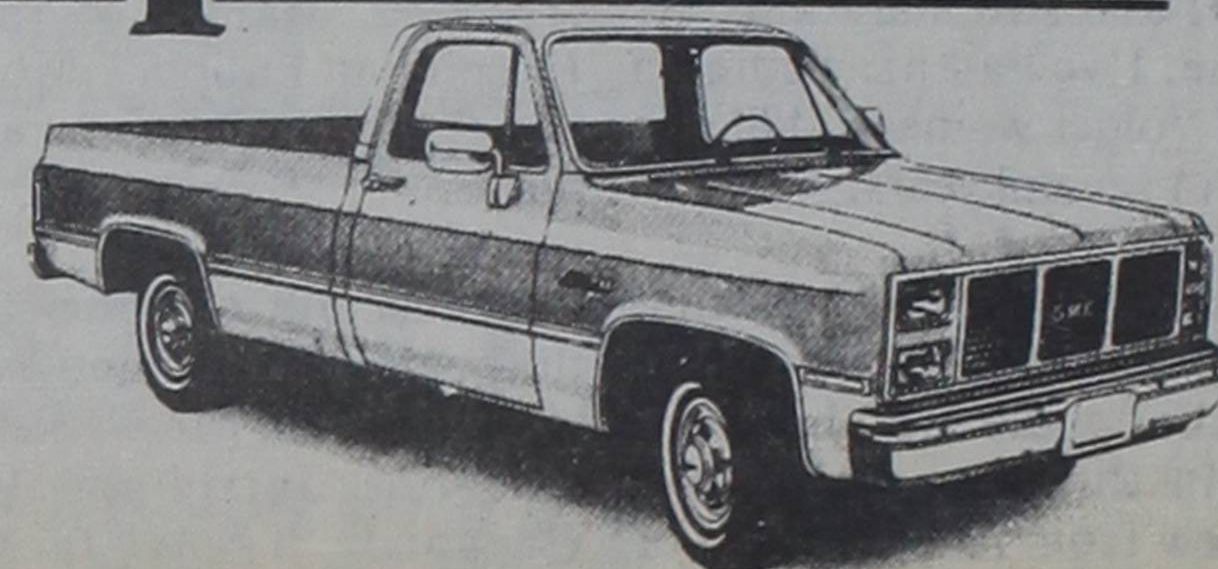

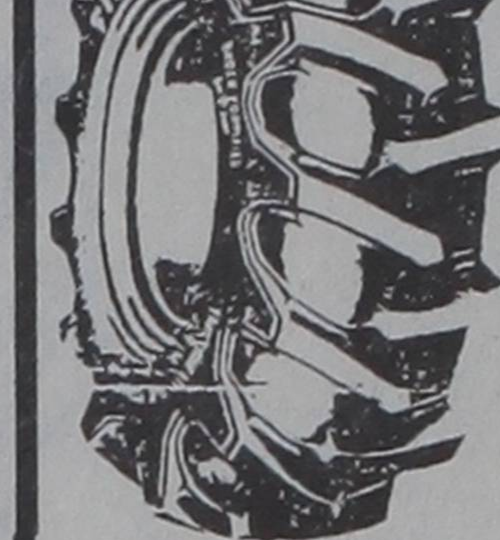
S. Ellis Gets Scholarship

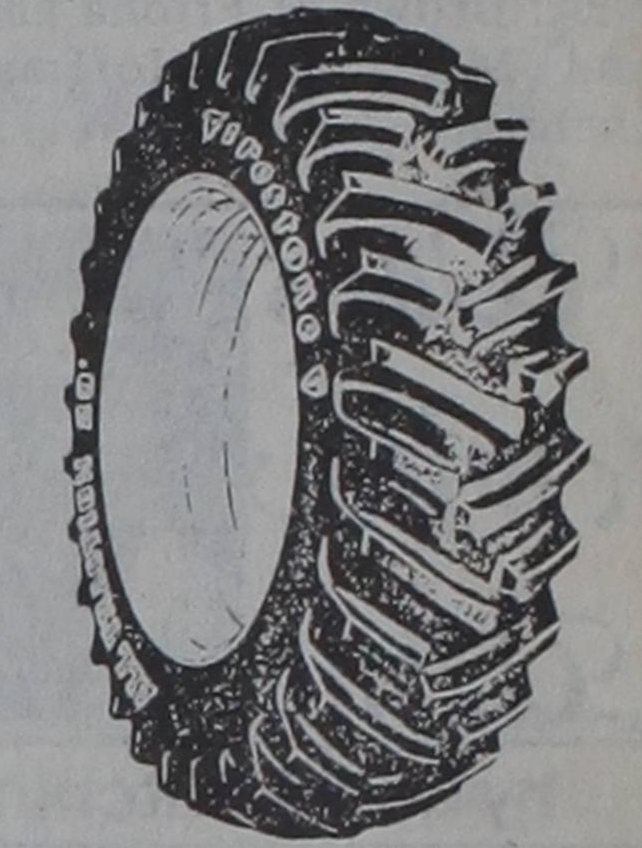

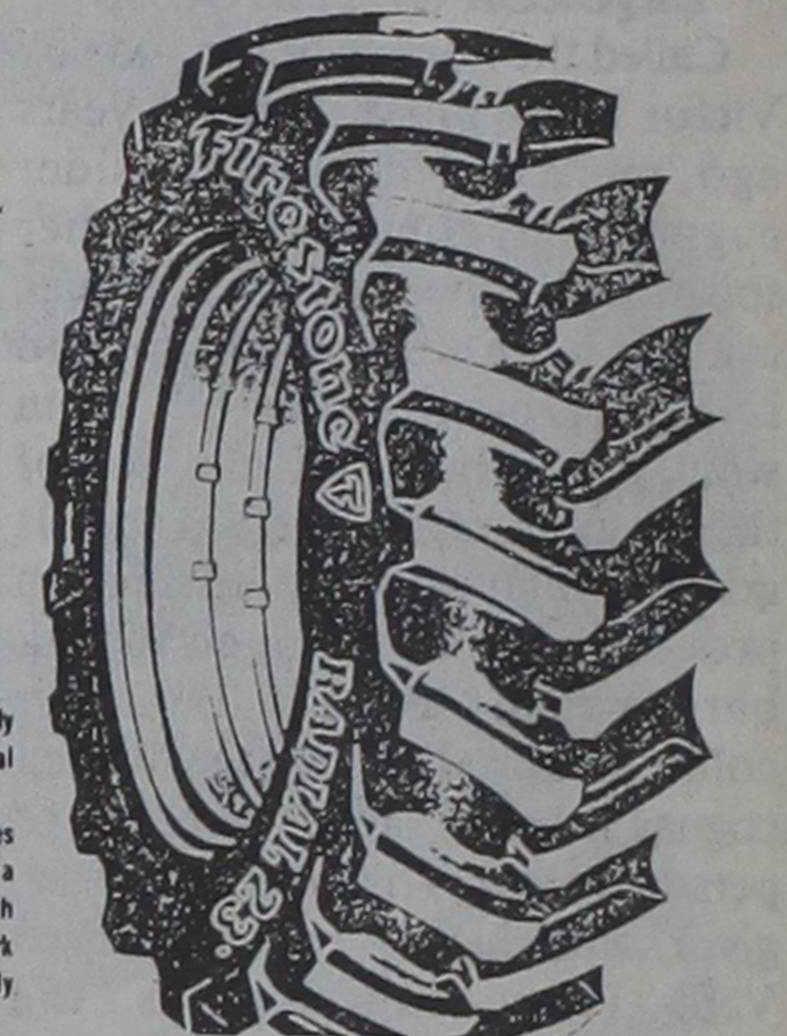

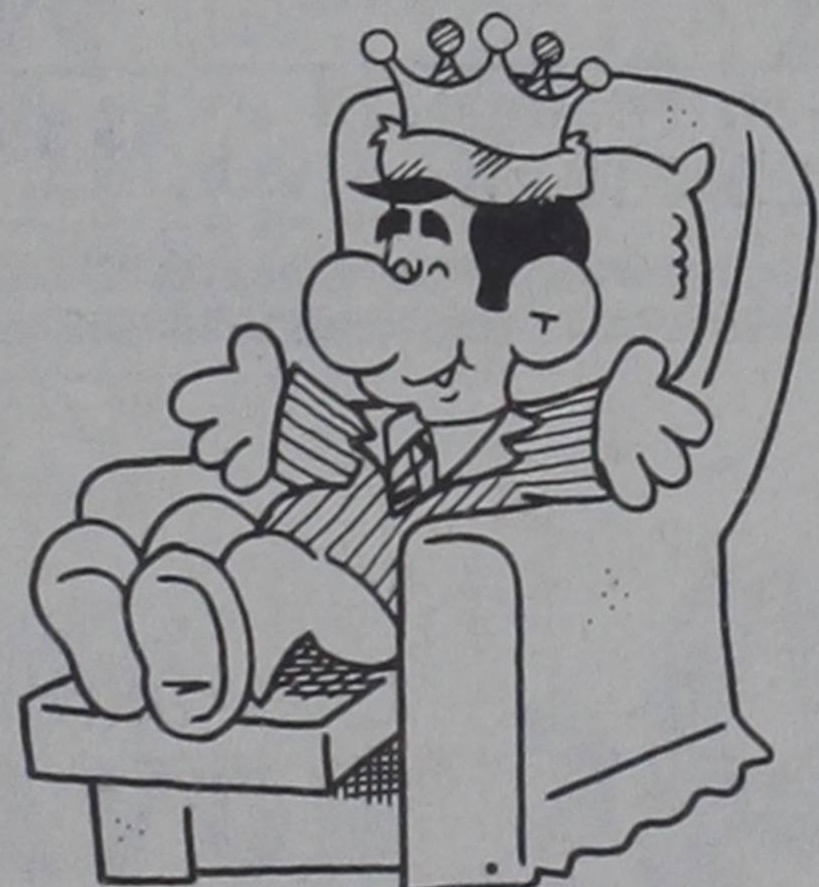
