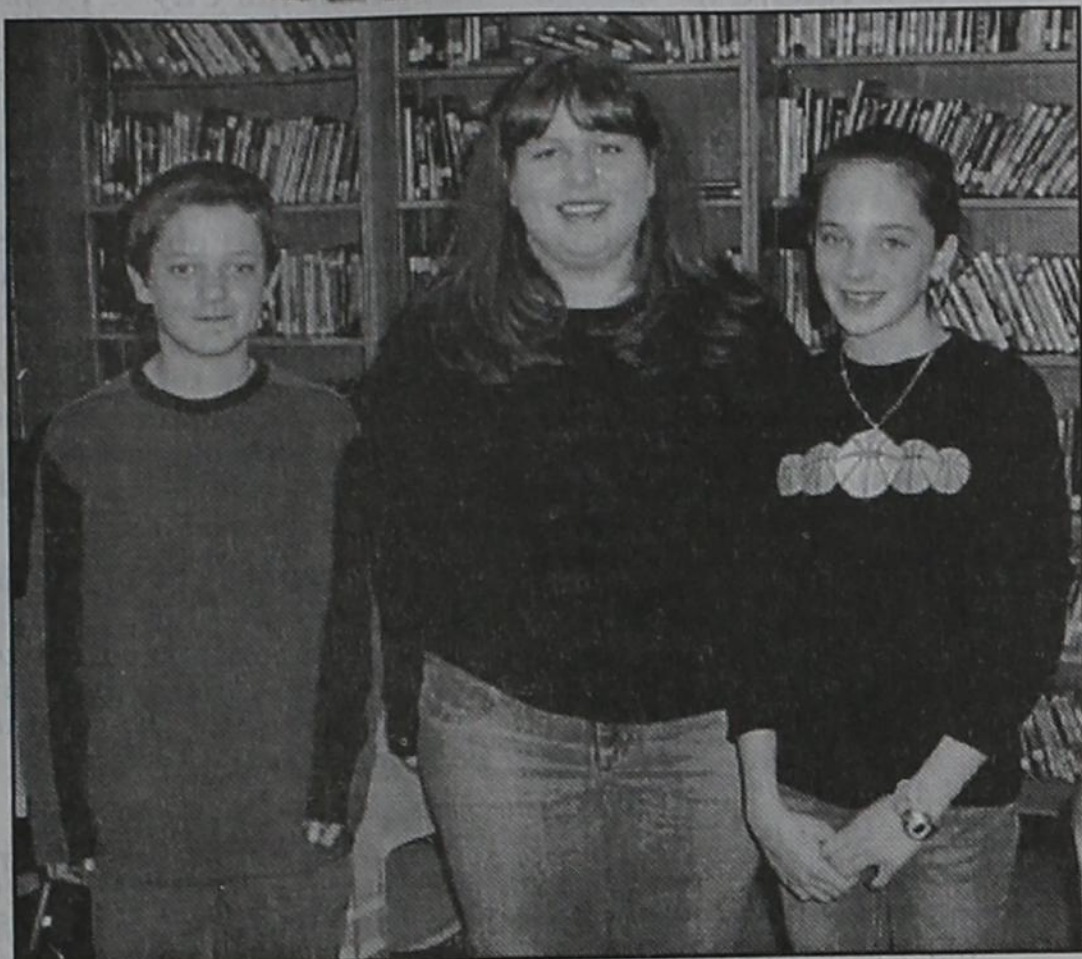

## Ex-Chieftain Coach T. Moss Dead At 54

Funeral services for former Friona High School head football coach and athletic director Tommy Moss, 54, were held in El Paso on Sunday, February 23, 2001.

Moss died of heart failure on Wednesday, February 19.

Services were held at St. Mark's United Methodist Church in El Paso, with Rev. Tom Nagle, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Santa Teresa, N.M.

He was born February 7, 1948 in Eunice, New Mexico He married Vickie Howse on January 26, 1968 in Altus, Oklahoma.

He is survived by his wife, as well as two daughters, Christy, a senior at UTEP, and Cindy, who is a senior and a cheerleader at Franklin High School in El Paso.

Moss had contracted rheumatic fever as a child, and this caused damage to his heart.

Moss coached for nine years

in Friona, from 1981 through 1989. When he took over, Friona was coming off an 0-10 record its previous year and was 1-19 for two years.

His first year in 1981, the Chieftains went 5-5. In his second year, they went to the playoffs.

He had the most career wins of any Friona coach, 47. His 1986 team was his best. Friona was coming off a 9-3 record.

That team won Friona's first-ever playoff game, a 14-10 upset win over Perryton. The 1986 team's record of 9-3 was Friona's best record until James Morton's team of 1996 (13-2). He left Friona after the 1989 season, and had coached in the El Paso area since that time.

Moss coached at El Paso Coronado High School from 1990-93 as an assistant. He then went to El Paso High in 1993 as head coach and took a team from an 0-10 record to 6-4 in his first season, and was named "Coach of the Year" by the El Paso Herald.

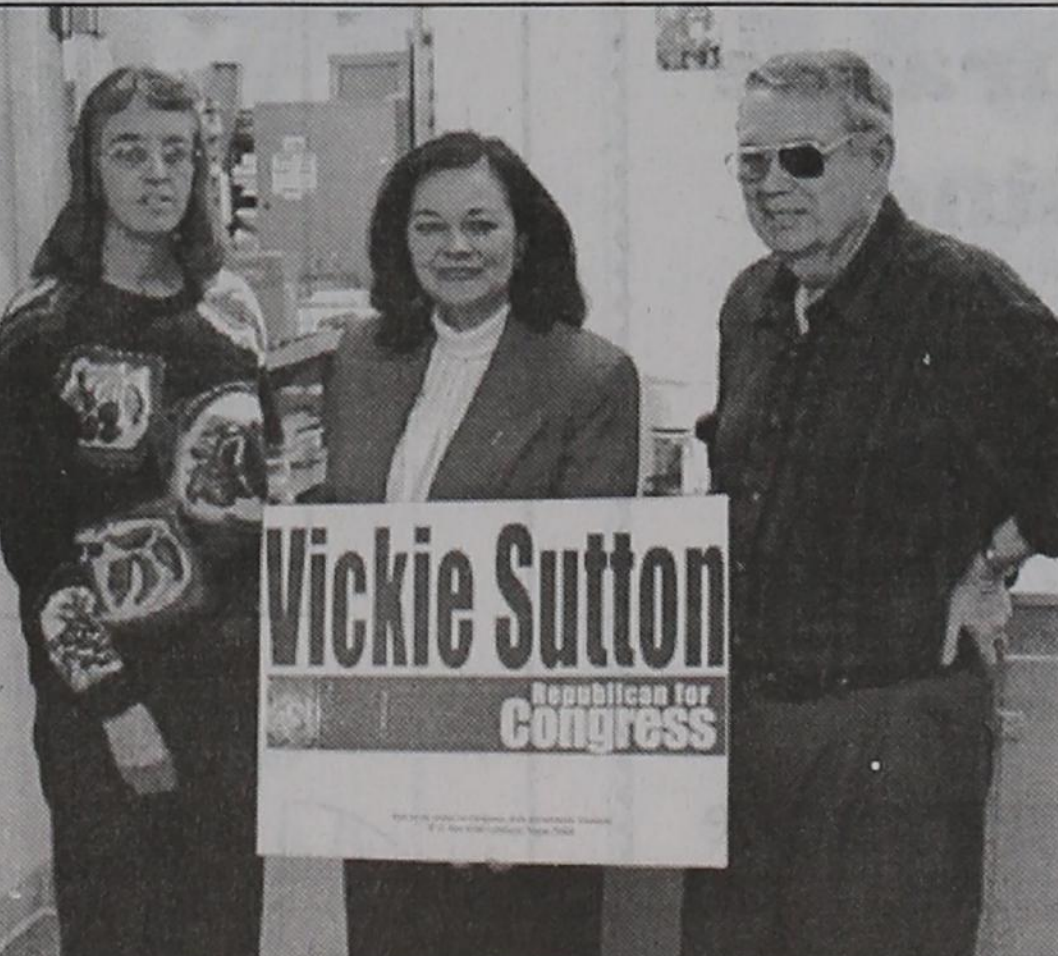
In 1995, Moss took over as head coach at El Paso Montwood, and his second year there took that school to its first playoffs ever. His Montwood teams then made the playoffs for five consecutive years, winning bi-district in 1999.

At the time of his death, Moss was coaching at Santa Teresa High School, just across the state line in New Mexico, about a mile from the Moss' home.

The school is only five years old, and hadn't won a single game until this past year, when they managed two under Moss, despite the fact that seven of the team's opponents made the playoffs.

Prior to coming to Friona, Moss was an assistant coach at Lamar Consolidated in Rosenberg, Texas when that team went to the state quarterfinals.

Among those attending Moss' funeral services were the Donny Carthens, Kenny Austins and Donald Herbert.

Biodefense, Law and Public Policy at Texas Tech University.

She said she is very interested in our area's water supply, as well as the role farmers and producers play in our nation's security.

"The next representative from this area needs to tell those on Capitol Hill that the success or failure of agriculture is essential to our national security, as well as feeding and clothing our people," Sutton said in the interview.

"We need to stabilize the prices (farmers receive) and the volume they can produce. Most people have forgotten the Great Depression, when our nation suffered food shortages," she said.

"When China joined the World Trade Organization (WTO), they agreed to buy a certain volume of cotton from U.S. farmers. But they have reneged. China has dumped cotton onto the world's supply (which keeps prices low for producers)."

She noted that if the U.S. leaders make deals to import vast amounts of food from third world countries, this could get our country in a bind, especially if we get into a wartime situation. "Buying from developing countries would be a very unstable arrangement at best. We cannot depend on third world nations for our food and

# Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

### 75 Yrs Ago - Mar. 2, 1928

A new business has sprung up in Friona during the past few months which only a comparatively few of our citizens are aware. It is the buying and shipping of mules by W.H. Warren to the Fort Worth market. Mr. Warren shipped a car load Tuesday morning, which he says makes ten car loads, or about 300 head he has shipped since he engaged in the business.

### 65 Yrs Ago - Mar. 4, 1938

A recent interview with Judge J.M.W. Alexander revealed the fact that Parmer County is now in a fair way for receiving designation from the State Highway Commission of a north and south State Highway across the county. This highway is contemplated between Dalhart and Dallam County and Morton in Cochran County, and possibly extending as far south as Seminole in Gaines County.

### 60 Yrs Ago - Feb. 26, 1943

With basketball season nearly at a close, the Friona Squaws played a close game with the Cowgirls at Oklahoma Lane on Friday night. The Squaws trailed the Cowgirls, 23-12 at the third quarter, and in the last quarter, came to within three points, 25-22. Cobb was high point for Friona with 12 points.

### 55 Yrs Ago - Feb. 27, 1948

Mr. and Mrs. E.V. Rushing of Clovis, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Hub Collier and baby of Pampa and Mr. and Mrs. Herschel Johnson and children, Linda Kay and Joe Bob, were dinner guests of Mr. and Mrs. David Mosely last Sunday. Mr. and Mrs. Rushing are former Friona residents, where they were engaged in the mercantile business for several years prior to his election as County

### 40 Yrs Ago - Feb. 28, 1963

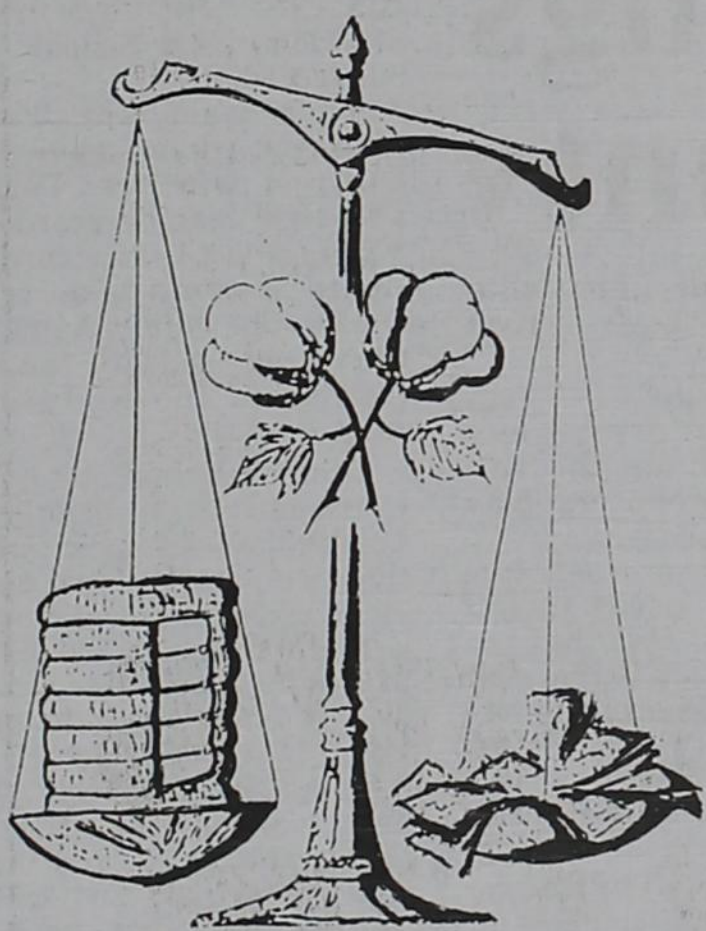

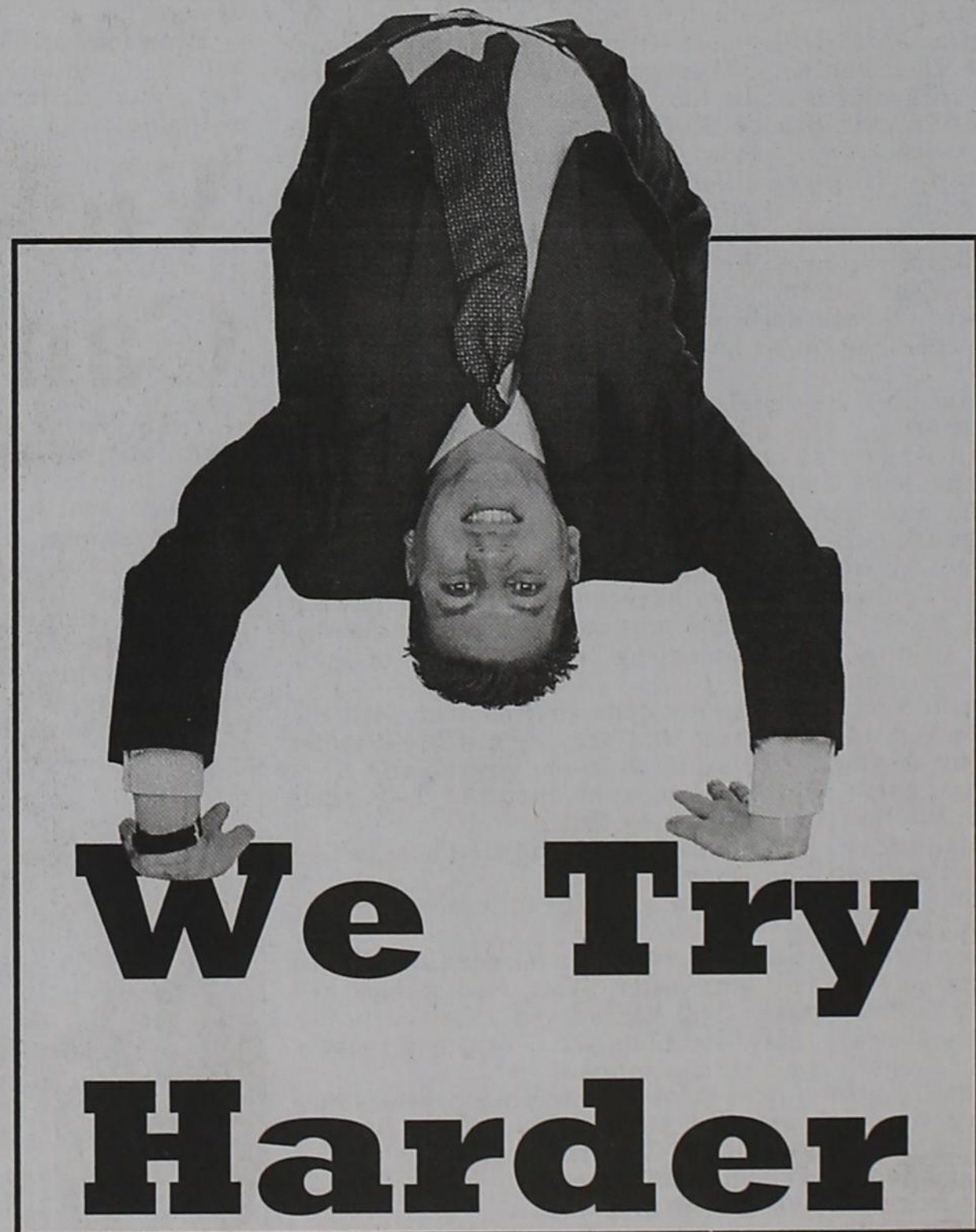

## March 3 Is Deadline For Scholarship Applications

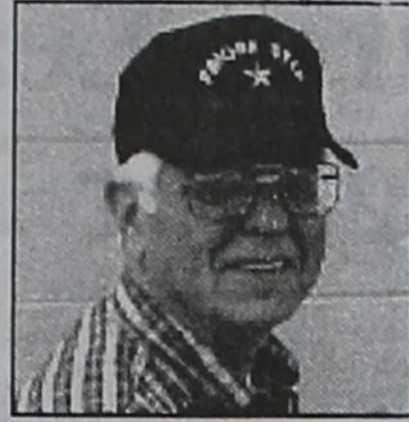

# Out Here

What About Personal Responsibility?

Big money, big money! That's what people yell when they spin TVs Wheel of Fortune. It's also what most of us would like to have. Lot of us had big money at one time or another but managed to turn it into small change. What is big money to one is not big money to another. I've seen the time when 100 bucks was pretty huge.

To see first hand what big money can mean, give \$5 to the next homeless person you pass.

I've always been intrigued with the stories of what money does to people. Personal responsibility often takes a back seat if big money is in sight.

The Amarillo Globe-News reported this week that up in Cactus, Texas, the city secretary is alleged to have pilfered almost \$500,000 from the city treasury.

The fun part of the story is that the woman who did the alleged pilfering is the mayor's wife. He sits on the city council which is charged with keeping up with city finances.

I'm not married any longer so refresh my memory fellows. Is it possible that your wife could bring home an extra half a million dollars and you not know about it? If she completely redecorates the house with new furniture and appliances on a Cactus city secretary's salary, does that raise some kind of red flag in the marriage?

At what point in the embezzling process do you ask yourself how much longer you can get away without being caught? Do embezzlers have a goal when they start out stealing other people's money? A certain amount they want to get and then they will

quit? Evidently not. Seems the lure of easy big money becomes an addiction like drinkin' and smokin'. The Cactus case should make for some interesting reading.

There are other ways to get big money. I have been waiting for years for something to happen in my life that I could sue somebody for. Heck, I haven't even been able to qualify to join a class action lawsuit yet.

Then there is gambling. Taking little money and trying to turn it into big money. They make it sound so easy.

(Trivia: did you know there are only three states that do not have some form of legal gambling? Utah, Hawaii and Tennessee.)

So now there is the case of David Williams, as reported in last week's USA Today.

David is 53, never been married, a former state auditor in Indiana. Friends say he was always frugal, clipping coupons, paying off his house early and paid credit card bills in full to avoid interest.

He had a life savings of about \$175,000, not big money by some standards but when it is your life savings, it's pretty serious money.

David lost it all over a period of three years, most of it poured into slot machines at a riverboat casino near downtown Evansville, Indiana.

He once lost \$21,000 in 48 hours and then \$38,000 during a four day gambling spree. That is a lot of slot machine handle pullin'. Oops, I forgot. Most modern slot machines operate with buttons.

He is bankrupt now, and is doing the only American thing he can do under the circumstances: suing the casino in federal court to recover the losses. "I had fun, it was great, but now I want my money back."

He says the casino knew he was addicted to gambling and had an obligation to turn him away from the slot machines.

Critics of gambling argue that the number of addicted gamblers will grow which in turn will increase the social and medical costs to taxpayers.

Learned experts say the economic costs to society of addicted gamblers includes lost wages, bankruptcy filings, lost purchases of consumer goods and increased crime.

As usual, they don't say anything about personal responsibility, which cannot

be legislated.

Mr. Williams was, in fact, banned from the riverboat casino in March 1998. Eight months later he snuck back in and it was August of 2000 before casino managers discovered he was at it again.

One casino official made this astute observation: "Compulsive gamblers don't look different and they don't act different."

The trial is set for April. Maybe he will promise if they give his money back he won't lose it again.

Big money can be a good thing, but without personal responsibility it can turn into small money pretty quick.

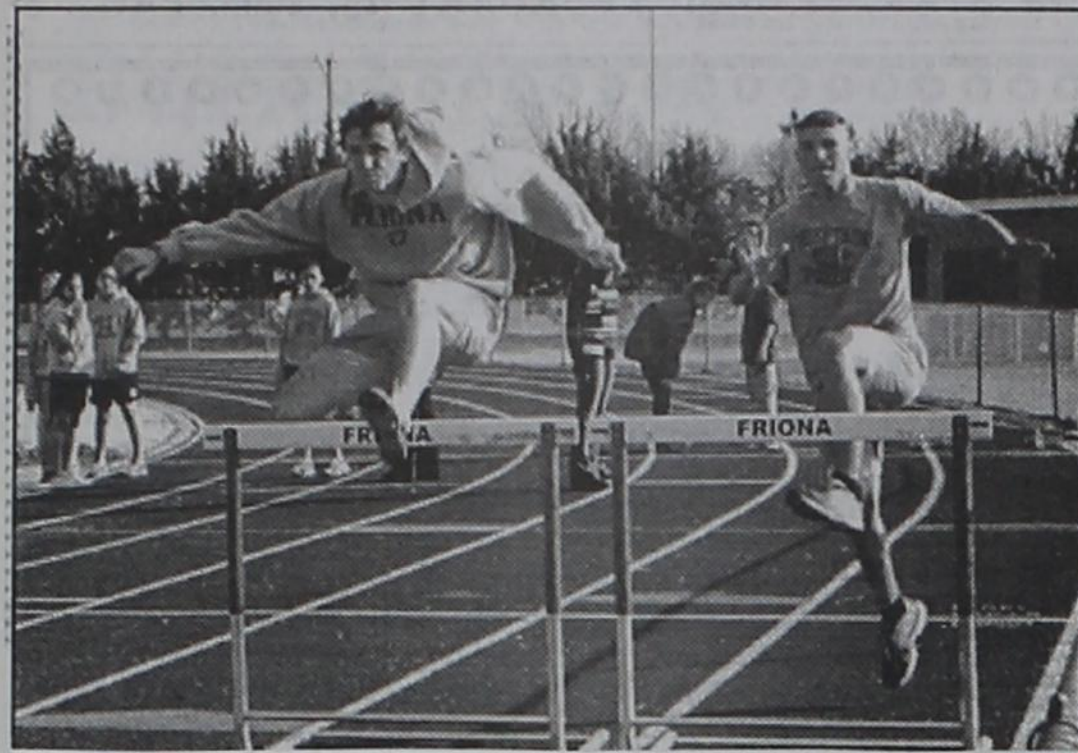

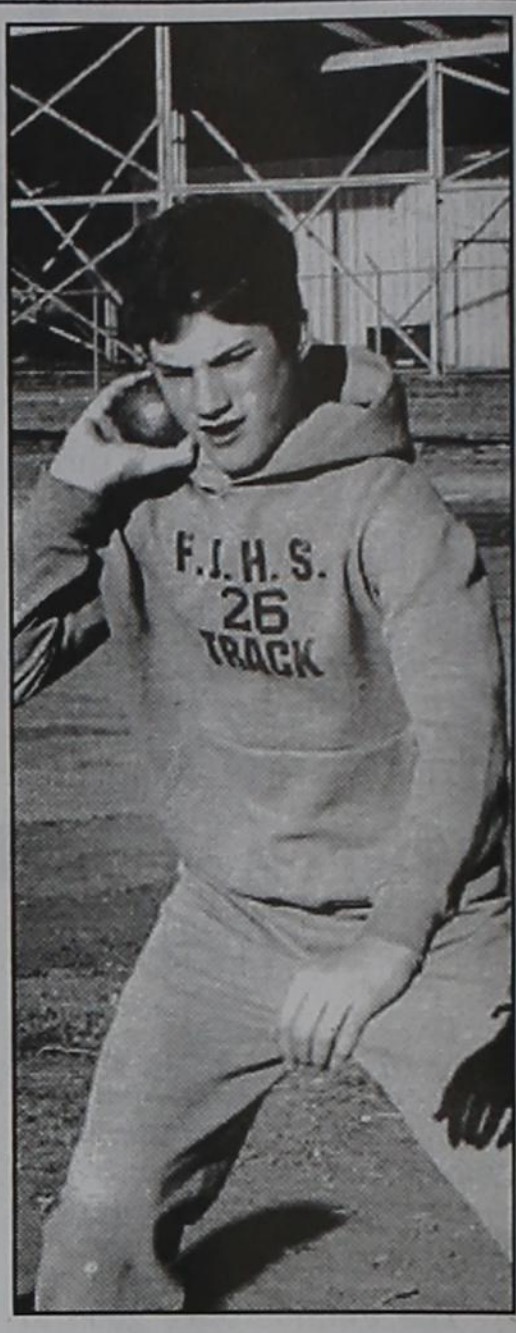

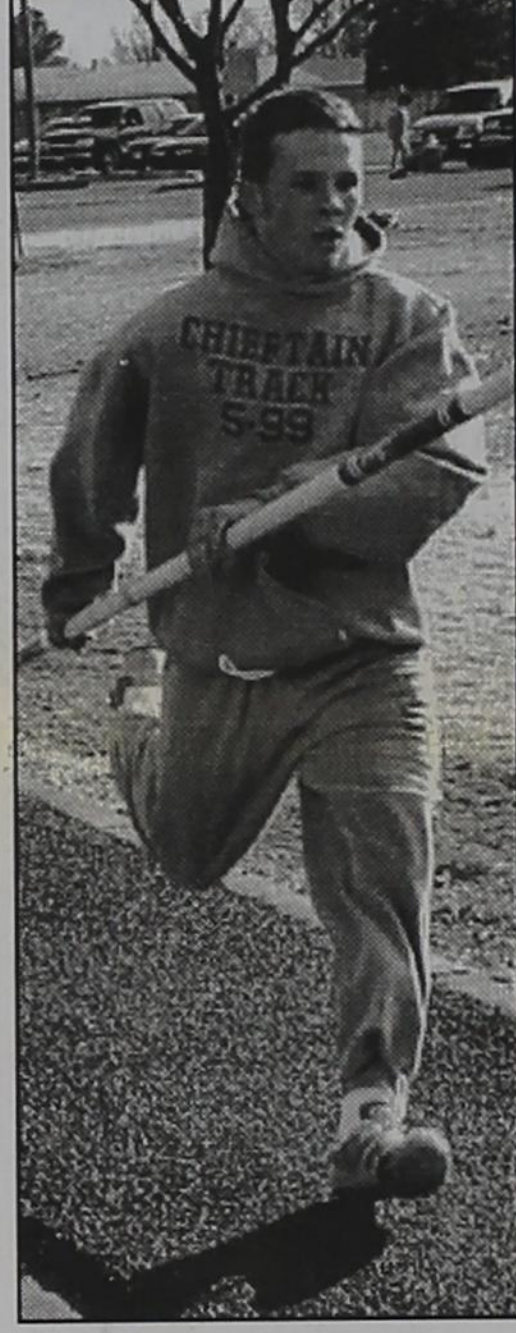

## LEGAL NOTICE

On February 6, 2003, VALOR Telecommunications of Texas, LP (VALOR) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to establish surcharges to recover lost revenues and increased costs associated with seven hundred thirteen (713) Expanded Local Calling Service (ELCS) routes implemented in and between VALOR's Texas telephone exchanges and in many instances, exchanges of other local telephone companies. The application is filed based on the Commission's Substantive Rule 26.221 titled, "Applications to Establish or Increase Expanded Local Calling Service Surcharges".

ELCS expands a local calling scope to include one or more additional telephone exchanges, if customers in a petitioning exchange approve by ballot, the payment of an ELCS fee in lieu of long distance charges. The costs and lost revenues associated with VALOR's surcharge application are those not recoverable through the ELCS fee.

In the application, VALOR proposes to implement on an interim basis a monthly per line surcharge of \$ .99 for residential customers and \$1.98 for business customers beginning with the April, 2003 bill cycle. This proposed surcharge will apply in addition to any monthly ELCS fees. If rates at or above the level of the interim surcharges are not ultimately approved by the Commission, VALOR will refund all or part of the interim surcharges, as directed by the Commission. Ultimately, VALOR seeks approval of monthly surcharges of \$3.38 for business lines and \$1.69 for residential lines to replace the interim surcharges. Additionally, the application proposes that customers currently billed ELCS fees lower than \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line, will have those fees raised to \$3.50 per residential line and \$7 per business line.

The net annual effect on the revenues of VALOR will be zero since the requested surcharge replaces lost revenues and reimburses VALOR for the increased cost of service associated with ELCS. The estimated total lost revenues and increased costs VALOR seeks to recover through this proceeding is \$7,601,145 annually.

(Continued from Page 1) energy supply," she stated.

Sutton said that the nation's textile industry is also needing support, and pointed out that our area produces 50 percent of the nation's cotton.

"Water will be a major issue in the next ten years for West Texas. Our area of the state has only 20 percent of the state's population, but uses a disproportionate amount of water due to irrigation. The big cities will put more pressure on water usage in our area," the candidate stated.

Sutton also addressed healthcare and prescription drugs situation, especially as it affects senior citizens.

"The administration has made a good start in assisting healthcare. I would sponsor legislation to limit the liability of drug companies and doctors in lawsuits (tort reform). We can speed up the process of getting drugs produced and approved," she said,

indicating that lawsuits causes both healthcare and drug prices to stay higher than they should be.

Concerning the situation in Iraq, Sutton said "We can't allow a war to be on Saddam's timetable. We've got to hit this problem head on. We can save the world a lot of sadness by getting Saddam out of power."

She added that the U.S. and its allies are fortunate to have Turkey as an ally in this situation, terming this as vital.

The university professor was acquainted with the Texas Tech research professor who was in the news dealing with the misappropriation of the plague germs recently. "I can't figure out why he would risk his reputation in such a manner," she concluded.

Accompanying Sutton to Parmer County was her campaign treasurer, Ruth Schiermeyer, who owns farmland in this area.

## YOUR EYES

### Treat Young Children For Amblyopia

Making sure a child with lazy eye (amblyopia) wears his or her eye patch is critical, because the therapy will not work after a certain age. Yet, a study in the British Journal of Ophthalmology reported that only about half of the parents followed the doctor's regimen for treatment of amblyopia due to "poor knowledge." Some were unaware of a critical period, and many didn't follow details of the regimen properly.



Amblyopia is a lack of developed central vision that usually occurs in only one eye. Amblyopia generally develops before age six. Amblyopia is best treated during the childhood years because visual results are better with earlier intervention. Left untreated, the condition may cause a total lack of vision in the affected eye. The brain stops seeing through the blurred or crossed eye and only with the stronger eye. Treatment options include vision therapy, the correct prescription for nearsightedness or farsightedness, or surgery. Wearing a patch may also help eliminate the problem. If you suspect any problems with your child's vision or see any kind of crossed-eye condition, be sure to make an appointment with your vision care specialist.
