"MY TURN"

THE TWO BEST-selling items in any bookstore are the cookbooks and the dietbooks. The cookbooks tell you how to fix the food and the dietbooks tell you how not to eat any of it.

Nine out of ten people make a New Year's resolution to lose weight every year. An Associated Press article which summarized the year of 1990, recently stated that there were about 2.7 billion pounds of chocolate consumed in the U.S. last year. Also, there were about 48 million adult women and 30 million men on diets during the year. Do you suppose one might have anything to do with the other?

Bill's Uncle Ed and Aunt Nancy are a real forward-thinking couple and they eat out a lot at fast-food joints. Aunt Nancy has the cleanest kitchen in Ada, Oklahoma, and also the most crowded. There's no room left on her counter tops, or underneath the counters either, for that matter. Uncle Ed buys her a new kitchen gadget every year for Christmas. This past Christmas was no exception. He got her a thing called the "Kitchen Whiz."

The instruction book that came with it said it was a conversion computer. You use it if you want to convert measurements or temperatures from metric system to U.S. numerical system or vice-versa. (One of my kids' math teachers once made the comment that, "We've all lived for decades with feet, fathoms, furlongs, acres, bushels, B-cups, Queen size, petite and Xtra large...so how can we be confused by the metric system?") Among some of the items found on her counter tops (and under them) are: a waffle maker, a slow cooker, the Snack Master for making fancy little sandwiches, a food processor, the salad shooter and the salad spinner. Those are two different salad doodads.

She also has: a blender, a coffee bean grinder, a coffee maker, an espresso/cappuccino maker, popcorn popper, Fry Daddy deep fryer, a roto-fryer that turns around while it cooks, steamer, roaster, smoker, microwave oven, convection oven, and naturally the electric range and cook-top.

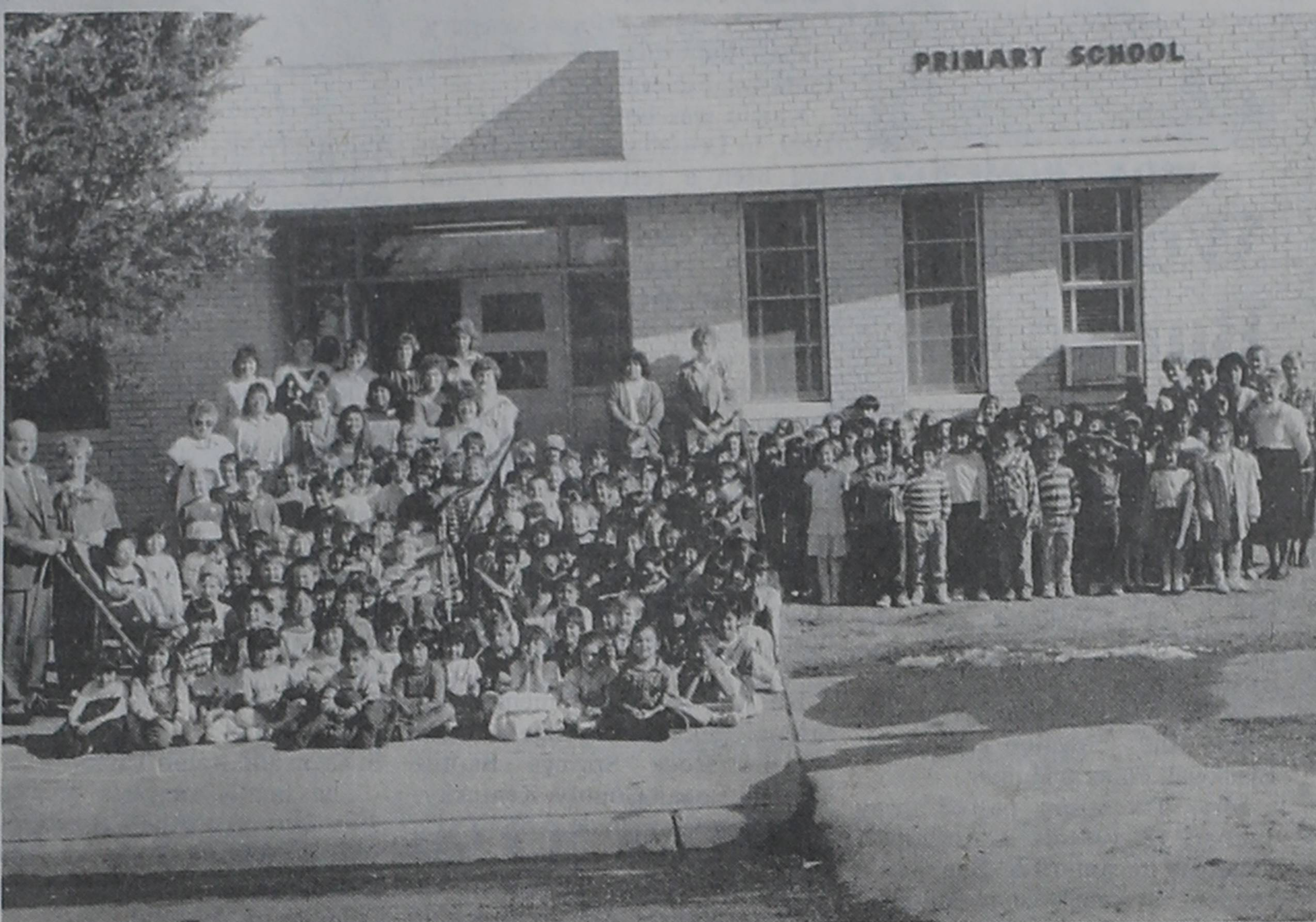

On her counter she also has: a Meal Maker, a kitchen scale, can opener/knife sharpener, the Freshlock Vacuum Seal, a fondue pot, ice shaver, a gadget organizer, and a stripper that peels potatoes, peels fruit and cores apples.

Aunt Nancy says she'd have to go back to college and get a degree in Kitchen Technology in order to figure out how to operate all that stuff and it's a lot easier to run out to McDonald's. Besides, there isn't any room in her kitchen to get in there and prepare a meal anyway. We're all wondering what she'll get for Christmas next year.

Dr. R.S. Alexander retired from the board September 30, 1990, after serving from 1976-78; 1981-84 and then from 1987-90. Procter filled Dr. Alexander's spot after being appointed by the Friona City Council.

The board meets at least once a month to review policies, operations and financial statements. These members serve as volunteers.

Prairie Acres' construction began in 1975, and the facility opened in August of 1976. The original bond, which was passed by local voters, was paid off in August of 1987.

Construction to add onto the facility was begun in October of 1989 and completed in May of 1990, with a ten-year bonded indebtedness. The addition expanded Prairie Acres' capacity from 65 to 83 beds, expanded the front lobby, and added a chapel area to the dining room.

Students Excel In Testing

The board of trustees of Friona Independent School District held their regular monthly meeting on January 14.

The board approved a district-wide plan of technology.

The board also adopted and rescinded policy statements according to TASB Localized update 38.

Superintendent Hal Ratcliff reported on the results of the October, 1990, TAAS (Texas Assessment of Academic Skills) test results.

District-wide, 63 per cent of all Friona students passed all tests, compared to 57 per cent statewide. This was also the highest percentage for any school in Friona's District 2-3A.

By campuses, a total of 67 per cent passed the tests in the third grade; 52 per cent passed in the fifth grade; 45 per cent passed in the seventh grade; 71 per cent passed in the ninth grade and 80 per cent passed in the 11th grade.

Superintendent Ratcliff's contract was reviewed and extended through the 1993-94 school year.

Teams Drop Two To Tough Tulia

Friona High School teams lost a pair of games to tough Tulia cagers last Friday night at Tulia.

The Squaws lost their first district game and also lost the services of high-scoring Jenny Procter for the season, when Miss Procter was injured in the first half.

The Chieftains started out like a house-afire, before falling to the taller Hornets, 81-71 in a torrid-shooting battle.

With Miss Procter hitting Friona's first six points, the Squaws jumped out to a surprising 6-3 lead over the state-ranked Lady Hornets. The Tulia girls rallied for a 13-10 first quarter lead.

Although the Squaws were hanging close, they missed the front end of five consecutive one-and-one free throw opportunities, which could have produced ten points.

Kendra Gordon's basket made it 23-24 with 1:49 left in the half, just prior to Miss Procter's injury at the 1:20 mark.

Tulia scored eight points in the final 1:19 of the half for a 32-27 halftime lead.

The Squaws came out fired up after intermission, and Renee Downey zapped a three-pointer,

and then another jump shot, as the Squaws made it a 34-36 game with 5:36 left in the quarter.

A flurry of baskets by the home team gave Tulia a 44-37 lead after three quarters.

The Tulia girls put on a full-court press throughout the final quarter, and did not let up when they had the game well in hand, to rack up the final margin of 75-49.

Curtis Brady's jump shot gave the Chieftains a 5-4 lead in the boys' game. Charlie Snead then canned a pair of jump shots, the second from three-point range for a 10-6 Friona lead.

The Hornets tied it at 10-all, before Koby Rogers completed a four-point play. Rogers was fouled while sinking a three-point basket, then added the free throw for a 14-10 score. Rogers sank another three-pointer the next trip downcourt, and Friona had its longest lead at 17-12.

Friona was outscored by the Hornets, 11-1 in the final 1:47, as they took a 23-18 lead.

Brady made a pair of layups, David Barnett, Steven Dickson and Warren Duke all hit pairs of free throws, and Duke's turning jump shot made it a 34-35 game with 3:49 remaining in the first half.

Tulia led at halftime, 45-36. The Hornets' lead was up to 14 points at one time, but Friona kept coming back. Snead and Barnett each scored as Friona pulled to within eight, 76-68 with 2:11 to play.

Snead paced Friona's scoring with 24 points, and Duke had a good night with 18. The Chieftains' torrid shooting accounted for nine three-point goals, over one-third of their point total.

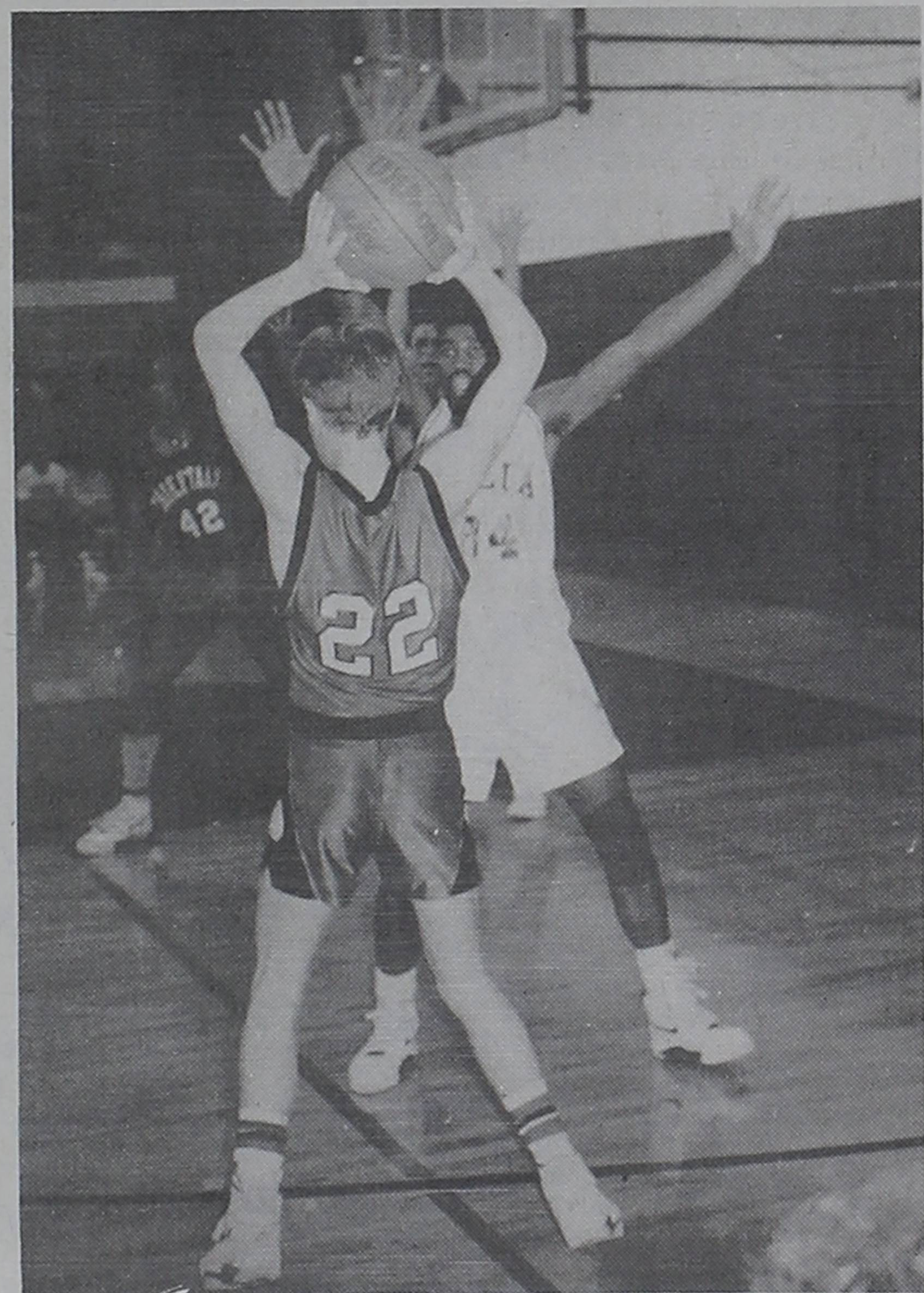

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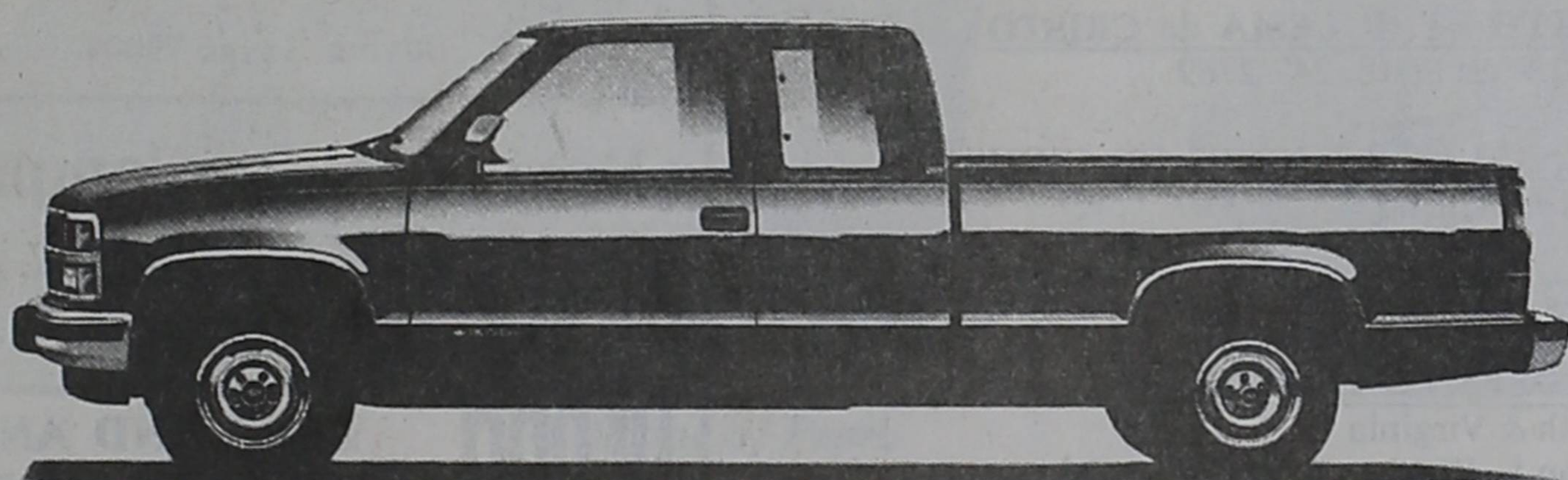
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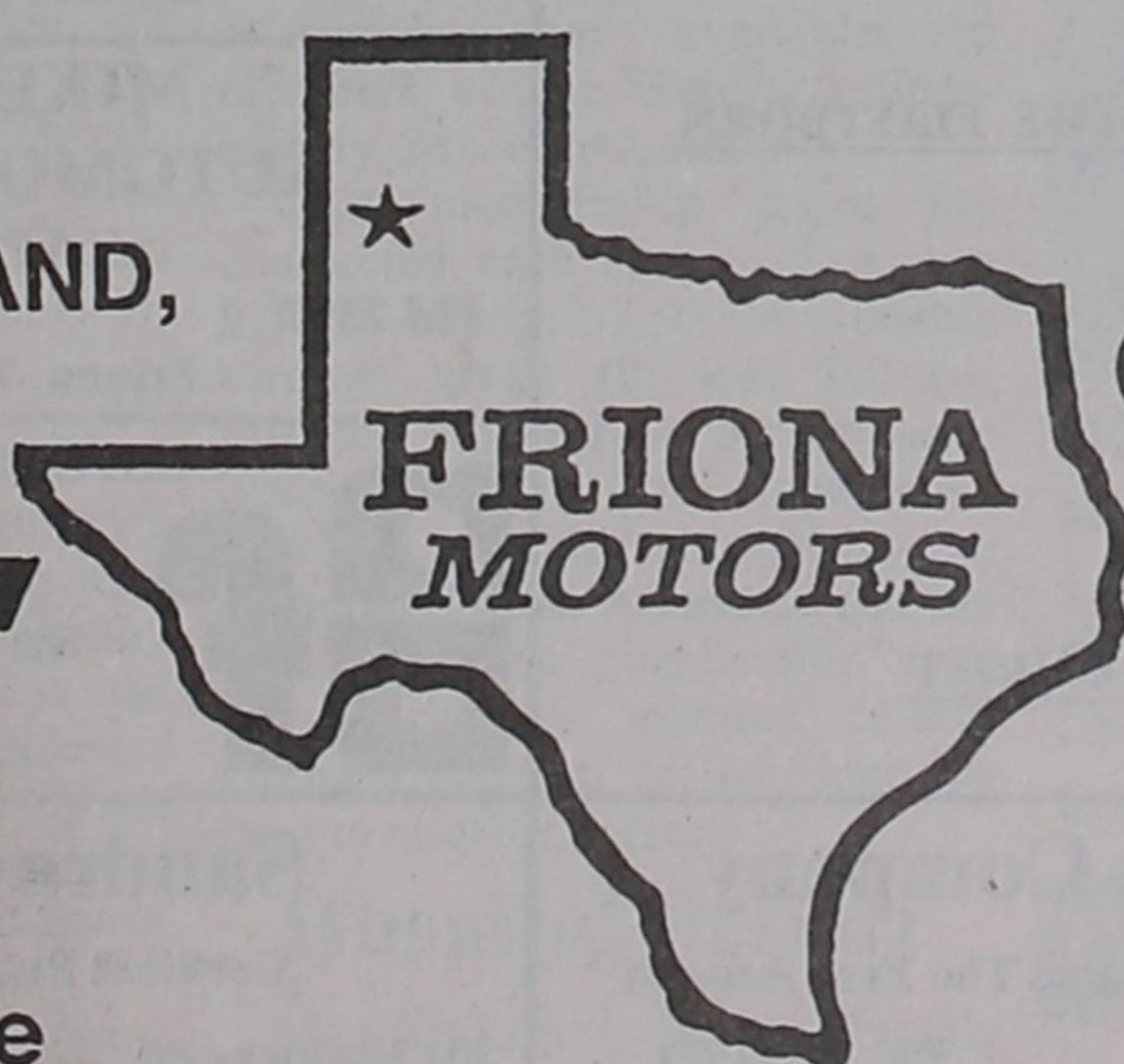
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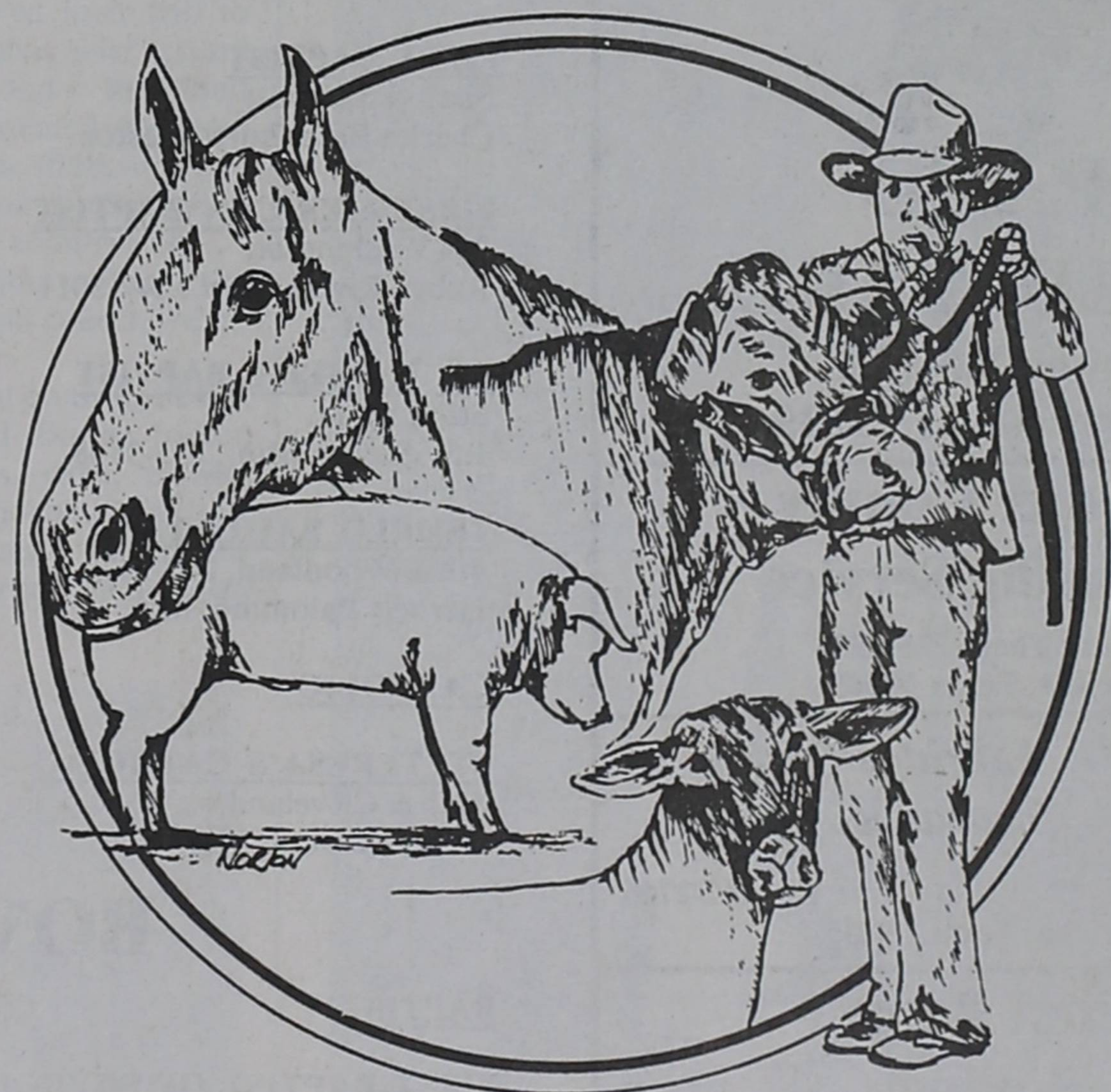
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Facts About The **BIBLE** *BY JOHN LEHTI*

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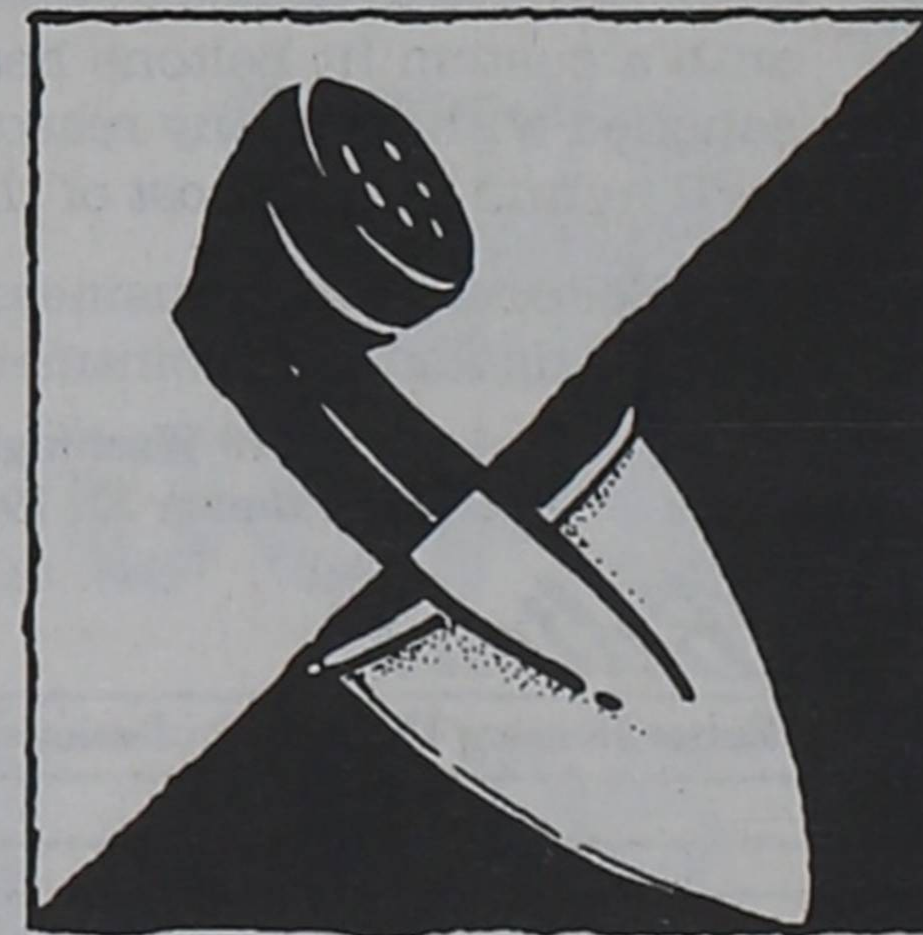
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Molly Lappin, Timothy Clem United In Church Ceremony

Of course, the huge profits often reported for small growth stocks alarm me because they fail to reflect the many losses that are absorbed in those numbers. With those words of caution, let's look at the startling correlation between the size of companies and the growth of their stock prices.

Some recent figures from Ibbotson Associates, a financial research firm, compare how one dollar invested in 1926 would have grown if invested in New York Stock Exchange (NYSE) companies of different sizes.

The chart illustrates how the companies with the smallest market capitalization yielded the largest long-term gains to shareholders.

For example, one dollar invested in the Standard and Poor's 500 Index would have increased to \$406 by the end of 1988, the latest date for which information is available. By contrast, the same dollar invested in the smallest NYSE companies with total shares worth less than \$44 million, grew to \$7,049.

These figures illustrate that, historically, small companies have shown a greater increase in share price for the stockholders.

An article distributed by "Mutual Fund News Service" argues that the performance of small companies was no long-term fluke. In fact, detailed studies in almost all meaningful periods of 10 years or more show that small companies outperform big ones.

These performance figures are particularly impressive today because they come during one of the longest periods of under-performance by small companies. In recent years, takeovers, an inflow of foreign money and the popularity of indexing have all favored big companies. Yet, small companies, on average, continue to make bigger profits for their shareholders.

For aggressive investors willing to risk capital for the possibility of winning big, these figures should be welcome news.

On the other hand, if you prefer life in the slow lane, remember the tortoise crossed the finish line first.

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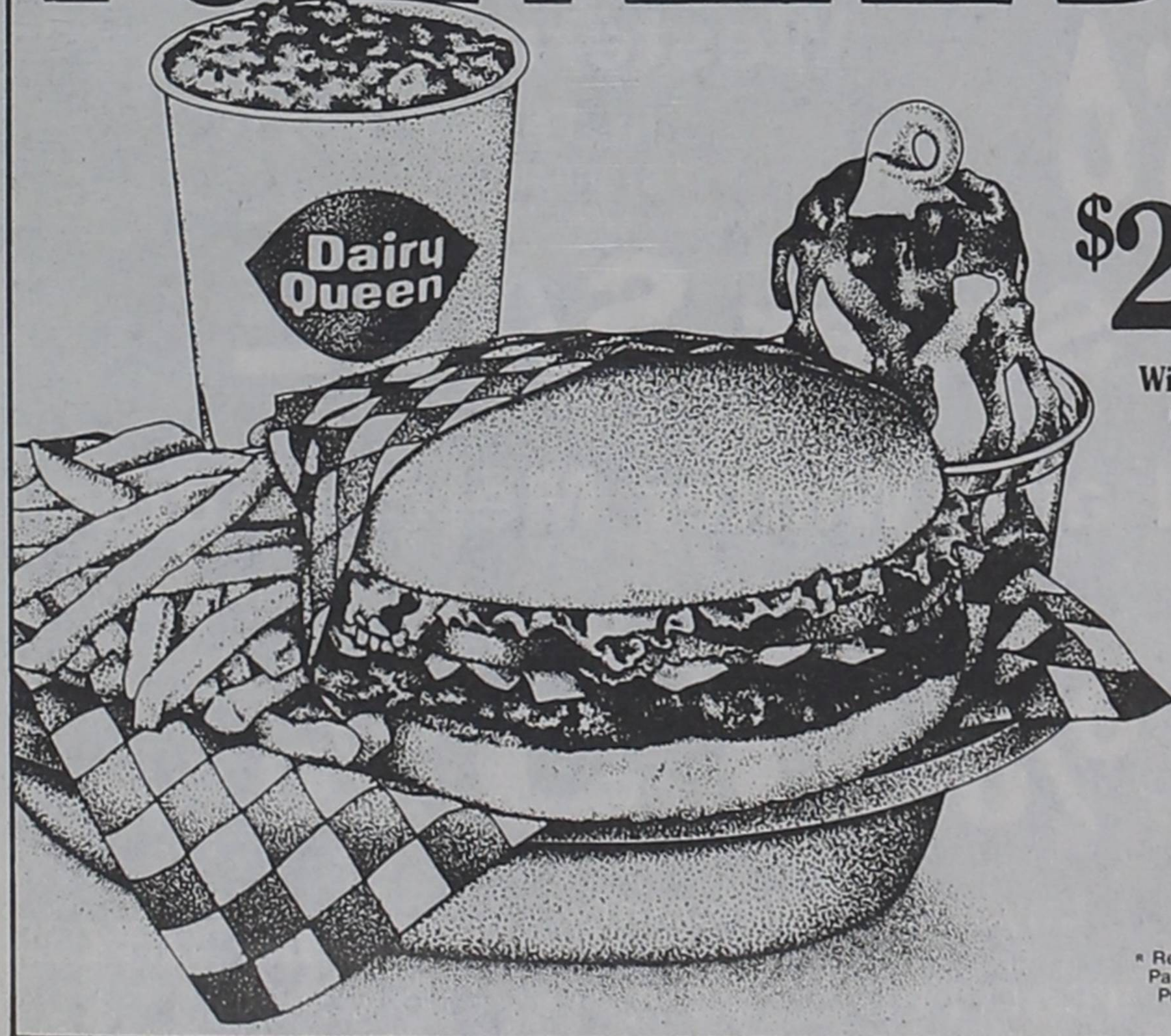

When you buy in glass containers, you're buying a package made up of 30% recycled material, according to the Glass Packaging Institute (GPI).

"Glass container manufacturers are reusing old glass containers to make new ones at a rate today that is approaching 30%," said Gail Ederer, executive director of the MidAmerica Glass Recycling Program, a regional arm of GPI. "Our industry has always recycled old glass into new, but in today's new environmental consciousness, people and programs are recycling glass in record volumes," she said.

According to a recent survey of its member manufacturing plants across the nation, GPI reports that nearly one-third of the ingredients going into glass-making furnaces today is recycled glass, or cullet. "In fact, the only thing we use more of than cullet is silica sand...the primary ingredient in glass-making," Ederer noted.

In an atmosphere of increasingly confusing environmental

claims by manufacturers, it's comforting to know that used glass containers can be made simply into new ones again and again and again...indefinitely with nothing lost in the process. The result is a product that is equal in quality and purity to ones made from 100% virgin materials.

"Today we're at 30% recycled content. Our industry is determined to raise that percentage to 50 or higher in the coming decade," Ederer stated.

Her mother, Thelma Jackson, resides in Friona.

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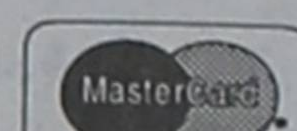
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Teams Take Littlefield In Exciting Games Tuesday

FHS varsity teams scored a pair of hard-fought decisions over visiting Littlefield in District 2-AAA games here Tuesday.

The Squaws, playing their first game since losing high-scoring Jenny Procter, took a 66-62 win, and the Chieftains held on for a 67-64 victory, their first district win.

The Squaws scored their second district win in three outings, and ran their impressive season record

to 19-4. They were helped by outstanding performances by seniors Kendra Gordon and Holly Grimsley.

Miss Gordon scored four baskets and hit a free throw in the opening period as the two teams fought to a 14-14 tie.

She continued with four more baskets and a pair of free throws, and Miss Grimsley warmed up with a trio of two-pointers, as the Squaws took a 36-26 lead to the dressing room at halftime.

The scoring trailed off in the third quarter as Littlefield pulled to within two at 41-39. Baskets by Alicia Widner and Elaine White gave Friona a 45-39 lead at the three-quarter mark.

Miss Widner's turning jump shot gave Friona a 49-41 lead with 6:34 to play, but Littlefield kept coming back.

Miss Grimsley made a pair from the free throw line for a 55-46 lead with 4:56 to play.

But Littlefield stole an inbound pass for an easy layup, and then sank a three point basket with 45 seconds left to tie the game at 62 all.

Sophomore Mindy Milner sank a big basket for the Squaws with 24 seconds left, giving Friona a 64-62 lead, and Elaine White put the frosting on the cake with a pair of free throws with five seconds left.

Miss Gordon led all scoring with 23 points. Miss Widner added 13 points and Miss Grimsley 12.

The Squaws hit an outstanding 45 per cent from the floor, 25 of 56 shots. They were only 16 of 28 from the free throw line, 57 per cent.

The Chiefs met a Littlefield team with only a 4-14 season record that was hungry for a win.

Three-point baskets by Charlie Snead and Koby Rogers helped the Chiefs to an 8-2 lead, and Friona held a 12-9 advantage at the end of a ragged first quarter.

Littlefield's shots began to fall, and the Wildcats moved to an 18-12 lead with 5:50 left in the half. David Barnett's free throws broke the scoring drought for the Chiefs four seconds later.

The Wildcats had a 21-20 lead with 2:10 left in the half before the Chiefs unveiled "The Charlie Snead Show." Snead made four of four free throws, a jump shot and then scored on two fast-break layups, the final one with a second left, to hike Friona's lead at halftime to 33-23.

The junior sparkplug had scored 10 points in the final 1:15 of clock time for the Chiefs.

Littlefield outscored the Chiefs, 9-0 in a three-minute period to make it a two-point game at 36-34. Snead had a pair of three-pointers in the third period as Friona held a 47-43 lead.

The Wildcats posted leads of 53-49 and 57-56 with 3:26 left to play.

But Chad Hamilton's basket with 3:15 left gave Friona the lead to stay, although it was hectic the last three minutes of the game.

Snead's layup gave Friona a 62-57 lead, but a pair of baskets by the Wildcats made it a 63-62 game with 1:44 remaining.

Friona was nursing a 65-64 lead with 17 seconds when Barnett went to the free throw line. He made his first shot, Warren Duke

rebounded, and Barnett went back to the line with 12 ticks left. He again hit one and that was the ball game.

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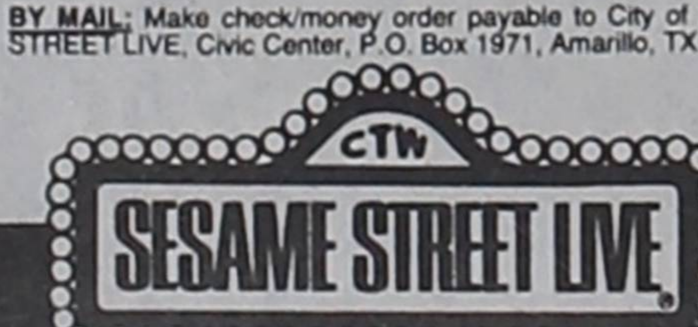
