City Sets Clinic On April 23

A rabies clinic will be held by the City of Friona Saturday, April 23 at the Fire Station, between the hours of 2 and 6 p.m.

Dog owners are urged to bring their pets for rabies shots and city tags. Total cost of the two will be \$6.00.

Owners were reminded this week by City Manager Jerry Lewis that according to city ordinance, animals will be impounded if caught running free in the city, and owners will be required to pay a fee of \$7.50 or \$5.00, plus a daily handling fee of \$3 or \$5. Any animal which is held in quarantine for observation purposes shall be charged an additional \$5 per day.

Big Push Slated On Clean-Up

The "big push" for Clean-up Week in Friona will be on Saturday, April 16, as clubs and organizations will be joining in the clean-up effort.

Among the groups who will be participating will be the Boy Scouts, who are to meet at the City Park at 10 a.m., and will be picking up trash in the Reeve Lake area adjacent to the Scout Hut. The Scouts will work until noon.

In addition, there will be a "cash for cans" booth set up in the City Park all day Saturday. This will give residents a place to sell their aluminum cans which have been collected.

Commissioners To Aid Rural Dump Site

At the regular meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners on March 28, the court had further discussion on the dump site in the Lazbuddie precinct, and possible solutions.

A motion was passed to work the site on a lease basis. Johnny Atkinson, attorney for R.M. Sherley, is to inform the Texas Department of Health as to the decision.

A resolution was passed to support HJR 91, which would allow commissioners' courts in counties of less than 30,000 population to set the number of justice of the peace and constables needed.

Motion was passed to amend the articles of incorporation of the Panhandle Regional Housing Finance Corp., to add the City of Follett.

Approval was granted to Wayne Allison to meet with the county employees to present an insurance program, which would be handled on a payroll deduction basis.

Sheriff Bill Morgan met with the court and explained the needs of his department for a camera. Morgan also is to apply to the PRPC for additional equipment for his department.

Approval was unanimously given to bond all sheriff's deputies and dispatchers, since they have to handle money belonging to prisoners.

A motion was passed approving insurance coverage on the county's vehicles, in the amount of \$12,705.

The bank depository contract for 1983 and 1984, with Friona State Bank, was received, and unanimously approved.

Notation was made of a public health control seminar to be held in Canyon April 12. It was also noted that a special recognition day for longtime state representative W.S. (Bill) Heatley has been set for April 9 at the Vernon Center.

Tax Assessor-Collector Hugh Moseley called the court's attention to a number of double assessments on

the tax roll, and asked that they be cancelled. Motion was unanimously passed in this regard.

Bills amounting to \$4,805.08 and \$2,781.62 were approved to pay for clearing of right-of-way for proposed Farm-to-Market Road 3333.

At the suggestion of County Treasurer Benna Felts, a motion was passed to renew certificates of deposit in the amount of \$100,000 for 180 days in the right-of-way fund; another \$100,000 to mature May 6 in the Farm-Market fund; \$100,000 in General Fund monies to mature May 6, and \$10,000 in permanent improvement funds, for a 180-day period.

Mrs. Elizabeth Ann Tabor and Mrs. Leroy Berggren appeared before the court asking that their ditches be worked so as to keep drainage water from threatening their respective homes. The court assured them the situation would be studied for a solution.

Bands Set Separate Concerts

In a departure from what has been the procedure for a number of years, Friona bands will present two separate concerts this spring.

The junior high band will give its concert on Thursday, May 12, beginning at 8 p.m. at the Junior High Auditorium.

The high school band will give its concert on Thursday, May 19, beginning at 8 p.m. at the High School Auditorium.

Admission for each concert will be \$2 and \$1.

"We hope this will alleviate some of the congestion which always happens during these concerts," says Jim Parker, director of bands.

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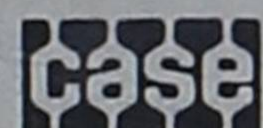

On The Farm By SETH RALSTON

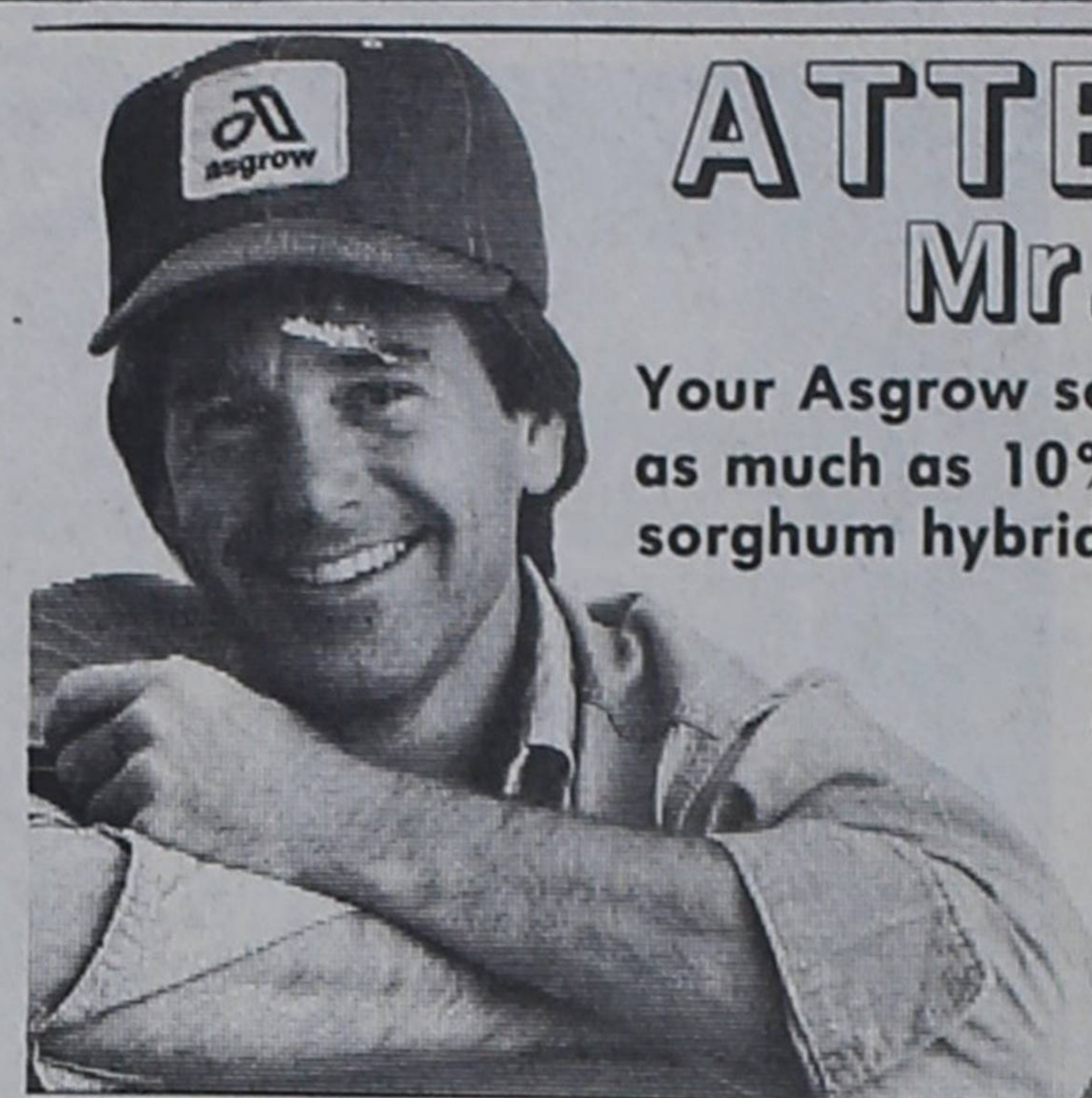
I would like to share the following information on wheat pasture bloat. This information comes from Dr. John McNeill, Beef Cattle Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Bloat in cattle grazing wheat pasture has been a major problem this spring. Excellent moisture and warm weather has stimulated good plant growth. When this type of plant material is stressed by frosts and freezes, conditions are conducive to a widespread health problem. A limited amount of non-legume, low nitrate hay will help reduce bloat conditions. Many producers have had excellent results by feeding ground grain (corn or milo) at the rate of 1-4 pounds per head per day. Others have added Rumsensin and a mineral mix to the grain and used approximately 5-7 per cent salt to restrict intake and

offered the ration free choice and have not encountered the degree of bloat problems as their neighbors.

Some of the forage collected from fields where cattle were bloating has been shown to be high in ammonia which when consumed readily in high volumes can lead to conditions that result in bloat. Daily feeding of a readily digested energy source such as milo or corn can help alleviate the problems caused by high levels of dietary ammonia.

Bloat Guard (Poloxalene) is a feed additive that is effective against foam buildup that causes frothy bloat. It must be consumed on a daily basis at the recommended levels (1-2 gm./cwt.) in order to be effective. The most satisfactory intake patterns have been achieved when the ingredient is mixed with grain or a molasses lick.

Happy Homemaker

One of my favorite books is entitled "The First Ladies Cook Book" and contains, along with a lot of early American history, favorite of the wives of each president from Martha Washington to Lady Bird Johnson.

As space permits we plan to share some of this information and recipes with our readers. Many customs have changed since Martha Washington's day. And, many of these are reflected in recipes.

Martha Washington was trained in childhood by her mother to know about such things as how to handle servants and how to entertain and feed numbers of guests. Included in the art of training servants was the job of teaching them to cook. She was also taught the arts of dancing, playing cards and doing needlework. Her training was for the role of mistress of a Virginia plantation and most of her skills came in real handy when she became the very first First Lady of the nation.

Mrs. Washington usually served tea and cakes with breakfast, as well as at other times of the day. She made most of the cakes, as well as other desserts.

Her recipe for Rich Custard goes as follows:

1 quart milk, scalded
 1/2 cup cold milk
 1/2 cup sugar
 Pinch of salt
 6 eggs, whole
 1/4 teaspoon vanilla or almond extract
 Scald 1 quart milk, add 1/2 cup sugar and pinch of salt. Beat six whole eggs and add cold milk to them. Stir, and gradually add to the hot milk mixture. Cook in top of double boiler until custard coats the spoon. When cold, add the flavoring.

Chess Cakes

1 cup butter
 1 cup sugar
 6 egg yolks, beaten
 1/2 cup dry white wine
 1 tablespoon lemon juice and grated rind of 1 lemon
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 Pastry for one nine-inch pie or twelve tarts made in muffin tin or fluted patty pans.
 Cream butter and beat into it slowly 1/2 cup sugar, reserving the rest of the sugar. Beat egg yolks with salt until light and lemon colored, then slowly beat in the remaining 1/2 cup

sugar; with a whisk fold in the lemon juice and grated lemon rind. Combine with the creamed mixture, stirring in the wine.

Pour into pie shell or tart shells and bake at 350 degrees for 50 to 60 minutes until set.

Before Abigail Adams became First Lady, she and her husband, John, the second president of the United States, had spent several years in France and England. She combined ideas from each of the three countries in her recipes and meal planning.

An interesting recipe, which was selected for the cookbook was for Baked Salmon.

Salmon
 Skinned eel
 1 pint oysters
 2 tablespoons oyster liquid (reserved)
 4 cups bread crumbs
 3 tablespoons melted butter
 3 eggs, beaten whole
 1 tablespoon chopped parsley
 1 teaspoon thyme
 Dash of pepper
 1 teaspoon salt
 Dash of cloves
 Dash of nutmeg
 Pint of claret

Clean the salmon; wash and dry it. Lard it with a skinned eel. Combine a pint of oysters (reserving out the liquor), 4 cups bread crumbs, 3 tablespoons melted butter, 3 whole eggs, beaten, chopped parsley, thyme, pepper, salt, cloves, nutmeg and 1 tablespoon oyster liquor.

Fill the salmon with stuffing. Baste well with butter. Lay salmon on a rack in a roasting pan, pour over it a pint of claret, and cover salmon with buttered paper. Bake in a preheated oven (550 degrees for 10 minutes; then reduce the heat to 425 degrees and bake 20 to 35 minutes longer. Allow four minutes per pound for the first four pounds and five minutes for each additional pound.

Baste several times. Ten minutes before the baking is done, uncover and bake until done.

Sauce
 Drippings from the salmon
 Some shrimp
 Pickled mushrooms
 2 anchovies, buttered and rolled in flour
 Boil ingredients together for sauce. Garnish with fried oysters, toast slices, lemon wedges and watercress.

Prevention Of Wind Erosion Is A Must

During February, March, April and May the prevention of wind erosion is a "must" to maintain soil productivity.

Most of the tillage, used for the incorporation of fertilizer and herbicides, is done during these months leaving the ground flat and exposed to blowing winds. Previous crop residues are turned under.

Wind erosion transports the finer, more fertile soil removing expensive and essential nutrients such as nitrogen and phosphorus.

Wind erosion is started by a process called saltation in which fine grains of soil are moved along the surface by a series of short bounces caused by the direct pressure of the wind. These bouncing grains of soil collide with other soil particles

disturbing them which causes them to be picked up by the blowing wind and transported for long distances or until the wind velocity is reduced.

Due to 90 per cent of the soil being transported by wind is below a height of one foot and 50 per cent is below a height of two inches, much of the blowing soil can be stopped and even prevented by leaving crop residues on the soil surface. Burning corn stubble and other crop residues increases the chances of wind erosion due to leaving the ground bare. Also by burning crop residues, the organic matter content in the soil is reduced causing less aggregation (combining together) of soil particles, increasing the possibility of wind erosion. Emergency tillage with sand fighters or chisels will prevent wind erosion when moisture is below the surface. Ridges produced by listing or sweeping reduce wind erosion tremendously compared to a flat, smooth field. Leaving your crop residues on the soil surface by reduced tillage can help prevent wind erosion and save fuel, thus increasing your profits.

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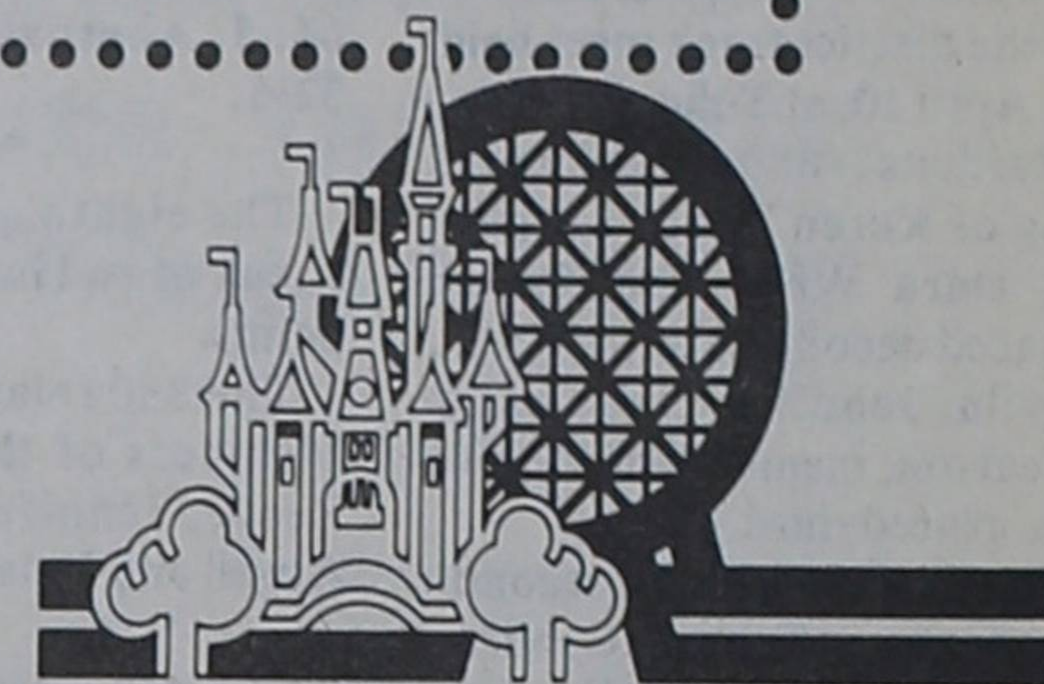
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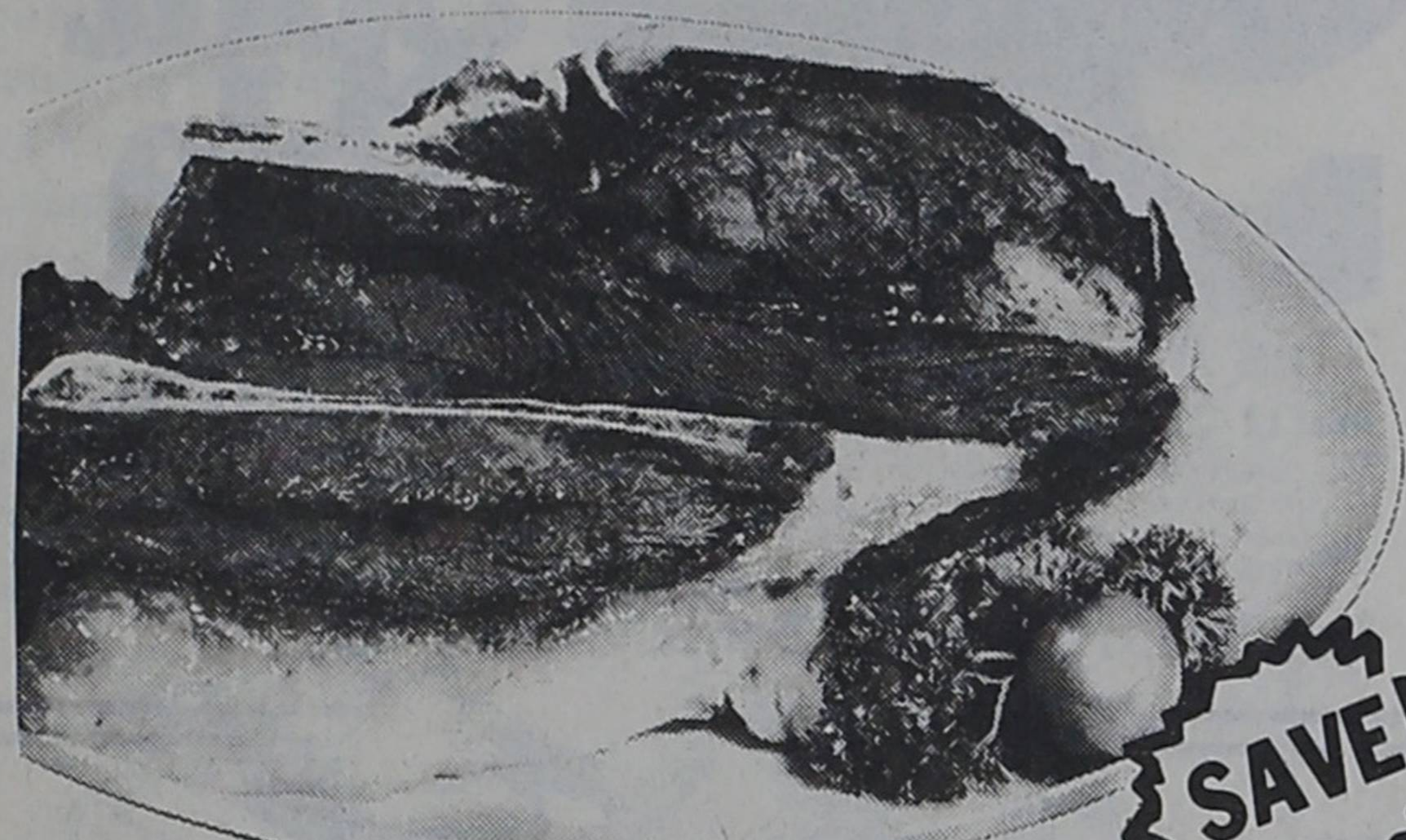

Telephone Co. Starts Long Distance Policy

As of April 1, 1983, coin telephone users wanting to charge a long distance call to a third number will be subject to having the charges approved by someone at the third number.

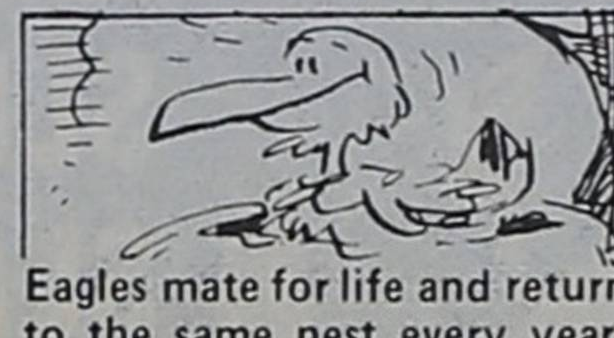
The verification procedure is being initiated to help eliminate fraudulent billing of long distance calls and ensure customer protection from having unauthorized charges appear on their monthly statements.

Under the new procedure, if an individual at the third number does not answer and approve the charges, the caller will be asked to provide alternate billing, such as another third number that will approve the charges, a valid calling card, a collect call or correct change to pay for the call.

O.D. Hearn, General Telephone Operations Manager in Brownfield said, "Customers who frequently use

public coin telephone facilities for third number billing may find that the calling card may represent an attractive alternative. Besides being faster and more convenient than the third number and collect calls, most calling card calls are cheaper." In a growing number of locations, customers can direct dial calling card calls without operator assistance from public telephones. The calling card also provides the customer with a printed monthly statement of long distance calls placed.

Customers can call their local telephone business office to obtain a calling card. There is no charge for the card.

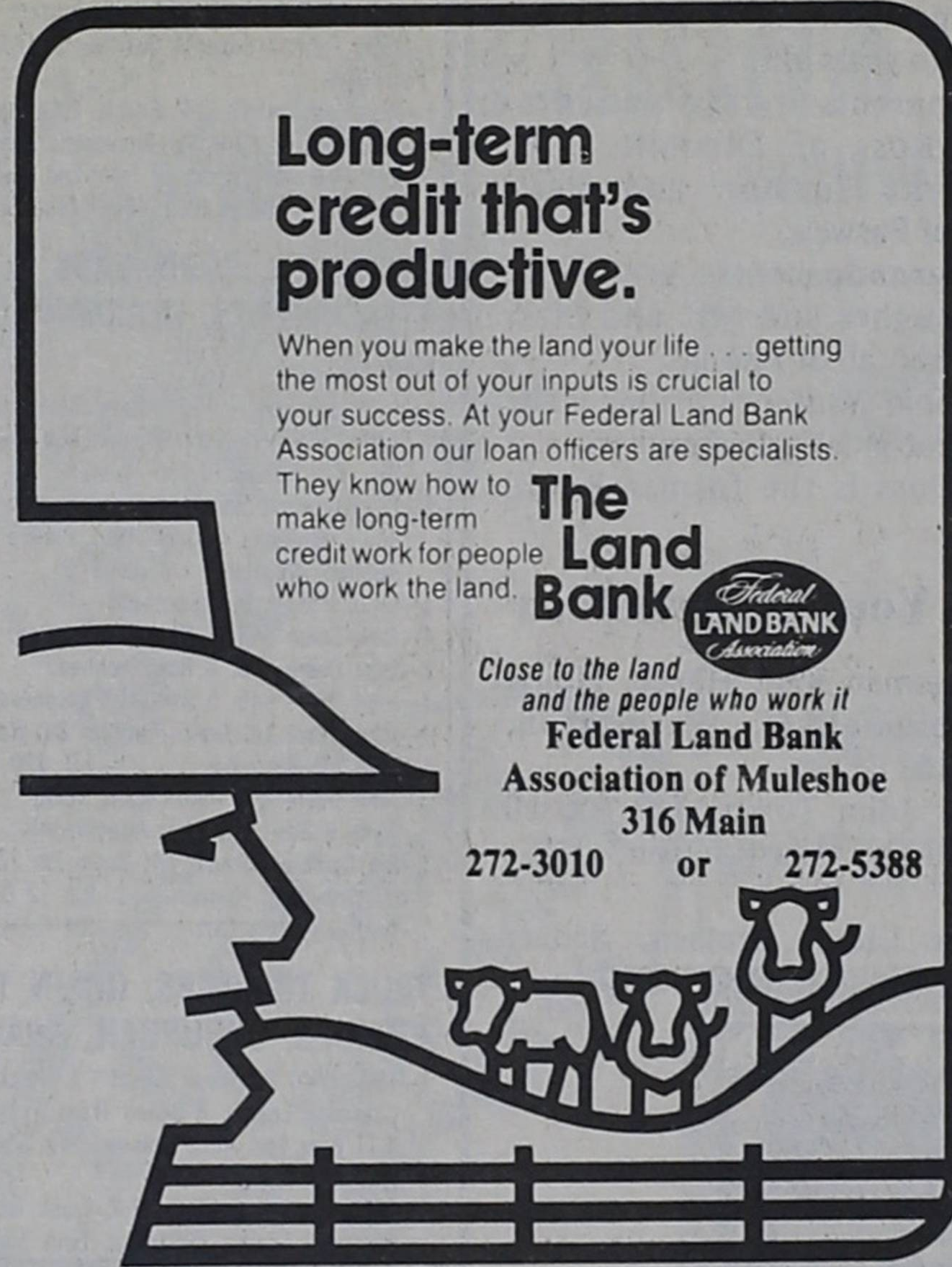

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Lois Shaw Pioneers Golden Nail Awards

Lois (Mrs. Edward C.) Shaw is a natural for pioneering Amarillo's first Golden Nail Awards. She is one of a handful of women who has been in the forefront of arts in Amarillo, with two decades of work with the Symphony and Art Center. Lois Shaw was the first woman from Texas elected to the national Women's Council of the American Symphony Orchestra League. She has the background, skill, and stamina to start something new.

The "something new" is the Golden Nail Awards program to thank businesses, foundations, and individuals for financial support of arts in the Panhandle. The Golden Nail group, chaired by Mrs. Shaw and operating under the Arts Committee of the Board of Convention and Visitors Activities, is planning the first gala--a dinner on Friday, April 22, at the Amarillo Country Club.

Mrs. Shaw wanted, and got, "the top artists in the country" as guest of honor and speaker for the Gala. He is the Hon. Daniel J. Terra, Ambassador at Large for Cultural Arts, U.S. Department of State. Mr. Terra, named to this new post by President Reagan, is a Chicago businessman, internationally known for his collection of American art. He is also the founder/builder of the Terra Museum in Evanston, and of a new museum of American art on the drawing board for Chicago, 1987.

The Golden Nail Awards goal, according to Mrs. Shaw, is to encourage continued backing for arts of the area by long-time supporting businesses, and to stimulate new giving in 1983. Mrs. Shaw has been actively involved in the arts funding process during 25 years with the Symphony, Inc., and Symphony Guild, on whose board she now serves, and at Amarillo Art Center, where she served on that board 16 years. She recently completed her term on the Texas Arts Alliance Board of Governors.

An artist and art teacher, her community involvement has not been confined to the arts. She has worked with the Girl Scouts as a leader and a board member, on many service projects of the Amarillo Junior League and on their board, and with local and Diocesan organizations of the Episcopal Church.

The Golden Nail Award committee has received nominations for the Golden Nail Awards from arts groups throughout the Panhandle.

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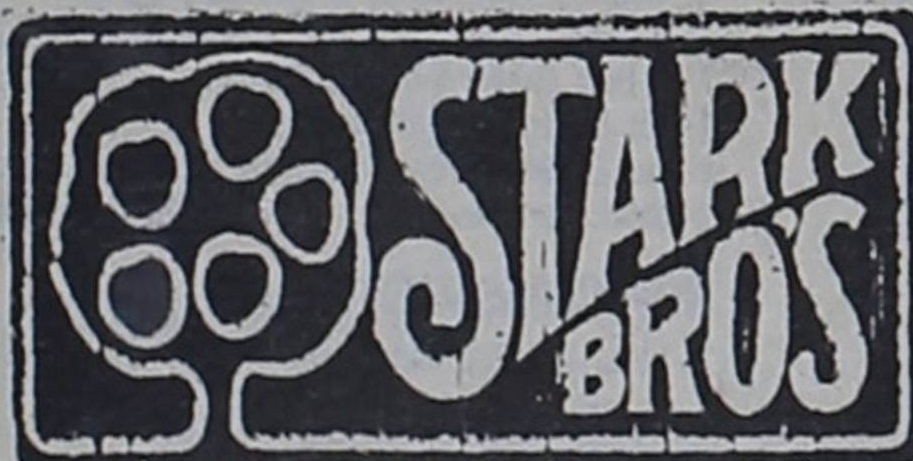
