Single member voting systems introduced

Prison survey ended, public hearing slated

Project favored by 210-93 plurality

The prison survey was completed, Tuesday and the results were 210 for and 93 against. Because of the count and the interest shown by the community, the Floydada Development Company (FDR) has scheduled a public hearing for April 20, Monday, at 7:00 p.m. at the Massie Activity Center.

"The public hearing is just step two," said Bill Hale who is the newly elected president of the Floydada Development Company (replacing Alton Higginbotham). "We are going on with this hearing because of the positive results of the survey," said Hale.

"Presently, practically all state prison facilities are located in East Texas; however, there is currently consideration in the Legislature to build some minimum security type prisons in various regions of the state and only time will tell what decisions the legislature will make."

"The competition from other community's is fierce," said Hale, "and if we desire to pursue the location of a facility here we must proceed with our proposal with all possible haste."

"Regretfully, the Texas Department of Corrections will be unable to attend our public hearing," said Mr. Hale. "A decision was made March 31 by the TDC that because of the large number of requests for them to speak to communities interested in prison location they were going to be unable to attend any of them for the next few months and then they may only speak in regional areas."

"We will have local speakers at the hearing giving us their thoughts on the proposal, and answering questions. Anyone wishing to speak at the meeting should contact me," said Hale.

Williams named FNB senior loan officer

The Board of Directors of First National Bank of Floydada, has named Thomas M. (Monte) Williams vice-president and senior loan officer, according to an announcement by bank president, Tom Farris.

At-large, Precinct 3 trustee races

A choice of six names for an at-large seat appears on the ballot Saturday when Floydada school district voters make their annual sojourn to the polls to name trustees. In Precinct Three, a trio of men are offering themselves for school board duty.

Something different faces April 4 voters. They will be making choices, for the first time, under the recently adopted single-member district system for electing trustees.

All voters within the school district are eligible to cast ballots in the at-large race. However, only citizens residing in Precinct Three (north portion of Floydada) will have a voice in naming that trustee.

The six at-large candidates include (listed in order of appearance on the ballot): D. Alan Benson Jr., Michael Hinsley, Amado Z. Morales, Cyndiann

Williams, Joseph Stepp and Kenneth Pitts.

Ruben Barrientos, Adolfo Garcia and Bob Phillips are the Precinct Three aspirants.

Retiring from the school board are Harvey Allen and Bill Orman, both veteran trustees.

BALLOTING AT COURTHOUSE

Commissioners courtroom of Floyd County Courthouse will be the site from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Saturday for all school voting. However, two ballot boxes are to be utilized, one for each trustee race.

The single-member voting system instigated by the Floydada Independent School District recently was given the green light by the Justice Department.

(Photos of trustee candidates appear on this page and biographical data is found on Page Three. Also, a city map shows precinct divisions.)

Jack Stansell is the school election judge.

Due to a mix-up in the printing of ballots for the school board election, the order of appearance on the ballot was not printed as drawn by the candidates. The ballot lists Barrientos, Garcia and Phillips in Precinct 3 and Benson, Hinsley, Morales, Williams, Stepp and Pitts in the at-large race.

School Superintendent Jerry Cannon stated, "I was unaware of the error until it was brought to my attention on Monday (March 30) morning. It is too late to do anything about it, so I am contacting all the candidates and offering an apology for the error."

Entire city governing body faces voters

City of Floydada residents face split polling sites and a single-member district voting system for the first time this Saturday.

Due to the fact that no municipal balloting was conducted last year while the system was being finalized and approved by the U.S. Justice Department, all seats on the city governing body are to be filled this year.

Under the single-member district arrangement, four council places involve districts while the other two council positions and mayor involve an at-large situation.

With the various districts also come four separate polling sites Saturday.

All eligible voters residing within the city limits may vote for their choice for mayor and the two at-large berths. By contrast, an individual must reside within a given district in order to vote for a council candidate in that district.

This means that all voters will have a voice in choosing the mayor and three of the six city council members.

ONE CONTESTED RACE

A single race has developed in the April 4 municipal election.

Nancy H. Willson, Wayne Tipton and Fred Thaxton (listed in order of ballot appearance) are vying for the District Four seat.

The new system of electing officials also resulted in the city governing body

being enlarged by one council position. A mayor and six council persons will comprise the body after the election, compared with a mayor and five council members at present.

All incumbents are seeking another term. In addition to District Four, candidates in Saturday's municipal balloting include (place, length of term and candidate):

Mayor (two-year term) — Parnell Powell

District One (one-year term) — Don Green

District Two (two-year term) — Ginger Warren

District Three (two-year term) — Leroy Burns

At-large (one-year term) — Frank Breed

At-large (one-year term) — Wayne Russell.

POLLING SITES

The four polling sites Saturday, open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., include:

District One — courthouse (south end of first floor)

District Two — fire station

District Three — Community Room of First National Bank

District Four — Massie Activity Center.

A map showing the city's division by districts is again published in this issue of the Hesperian.

Election judges named for Saturday balloting include: District One, Peggy Medley; District Two, Sharon Quisenberry; District Three, John Key West; and District Four, Kathy Green.

EXPENSIVE ELECTION

Sixteen persons — a judge, an alternate judge and two clerks at each polling site — have been chosen.

The expense of having the four boxes is substantially greater. With the necessity of more personnel, salaries will be \$960 plus a greater amount of supplies.

Correct deficiencies or close jail, state commission warns

If "deficiencies" noted in a March 17 inspection report are not corrected by May 27, the Floyd County Jail will be "closed," according to a notice of a remedial order received early this week by County Judge William D. (Bill) Hardin and Sheriff Fred A. Cardinal.

Signing the order was Mrs. William Cree, chairman of Texas Commission on Jail Standards.

The communique from Ms. Cree outlines five points: "Ordered that the Floyd County Jail be and is hereby:

"1. In addition of non-compliance, and all previously issued variances are cancelled.

"2. Ineligible for further variances.

"3. Closed.

"4. Prisoners will be transported at Floyd County expense to a jail in compliance with Texas Minimum Jail Standards to be housed there at a per diem to be agreed upon by the contracting Commissioner Courts.

"5. This order is stayed until May 27, 1987 at which time unless all the deficiencies noted in the March 17, 1987 Inspection Report and the September 19, 1986 Notice of Non-Compliance have been corrected, the order will be invoked."

The order was issued March 25, and a copy has been forwarded to Governor William Clements.

During the recent inspection: Joe Slater of the Texas Jail Standards Commission recommended to Floyd County Commissioners Court that "a third floor expansion area be planned to increase jail capacity (this area is approximately 1,000 square feet."

He noted that "Due to inmate population currently housed," the county jail "does not provide adequate

facilities to separate different classifications of inmates." Slater pointed out that the Floyd County jail contains nine bunks and that the average population for the past nine months exceeded seven daily. In March, the facility averaged nine inmates daily.

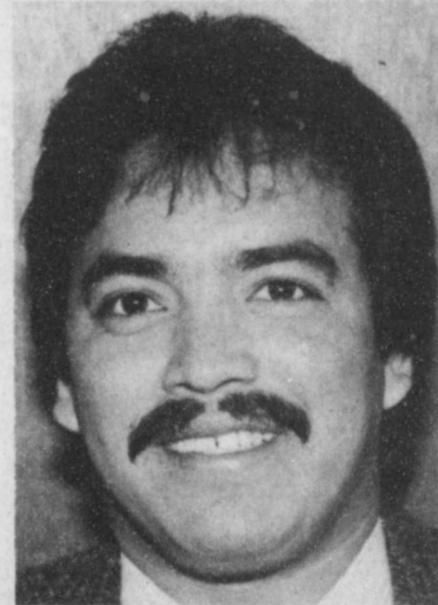
The TJSC representative also suggested other physical improvements and several procedural changes.

The correspondence from the commission further stated:

"On March 17, 1987, the Floyd County Jail was inspected by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards and deficiencies and over population were found. These deficiencies and over population were notified to the Commissioners Court and Sheriff of Floyd County in the Inspection Report dated March 17, 1987.

"In discussion on March 25, 1987 at a regularly scheduled meeting of Texas Commission on Jail Standards it appearing to the Texas Commission on Jail Standards that the appropriate corrective measures have not been initiated to effectively remedy the deficiencies and over population stated in the attached Notice of Non-Compliance dated September 19, 1986 (which are expressly incorporated herein as though copies at length verbatim), in accordance with the authority granted by Art. 5115.1 V.A.T. Civ. S., by Part IX, Title 37, Texas Administrative Code, and by Rule 217.25 of the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, and effective fifteen (15) days after receipt hereof by the Sheriff and Commissioners Court of Floyd County, Texas." This wording precedes the order.

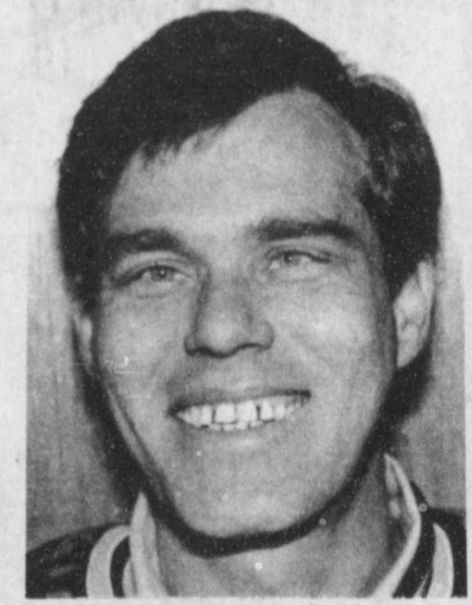
County officials stated that the commissioners court will begin immediately to try to remedy the situation and be in compliance before the May 27 deadline.

In addition to the four, Sue Givens is the holdover trustee whose term does not expire this year.

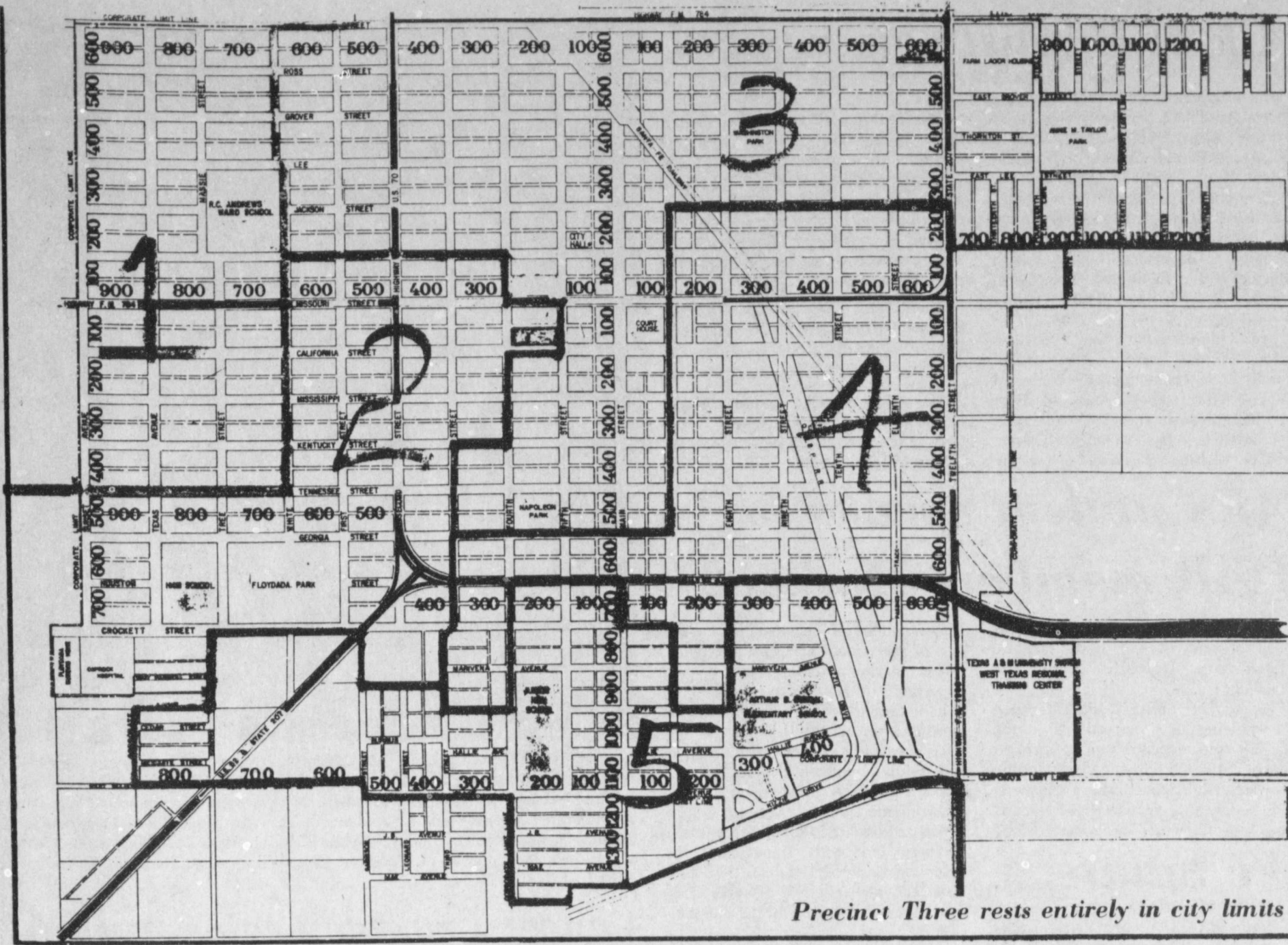
Henderson serves as board president, Johnson is the vice president, Mrs. Givens is secretary, Kinnibrugh is the

School board candidates profiled

PRECINCT 3

Profiles of candidates for election to Fisd school board positions are presented in this section. The candidates are listed in order of appearance on the ballot.

Appearing first on the Precinct 3 ballot will be Ruben Barrientos. Barrientos is an area life insurance sales person affiliated with American National Life Insurance Company through the Plainview office. His wife Elida is employed at the Floydada Nursing Home and the couple has one child, a son, Ruben James. The six-year old is a kindergarten student at A.B. Duncan Elementary.

Barrientos attended Floydada High School and is active in the Spanish Assembly of God Church, Templo Getsemani. He serves as Sunday School superintendent and is one of the organizers of the Royal Rangers youth group for boys. He is the Senior Commander of the church sponsored organization locally and serves as commander for this area.

Second on the ballot for the Precinct 3 post is Adolfo Garcia, a resident of Floydada for the past 22 years. Garcia is a director on the Floydada Chamber of Commerce, has served as parish board president at St. Mary Magdalen Church for the past four years, and is currently the scoutmaster of Troop 355 capping a 15 year involvement in scouting.

Garcia attended school in Odem, Texas and received a GED in Crosbyton in 1975. He and his wife Irma have four children, Irma, Adolfo Jr. (graduates of FHS), Ray and Roy. Mrs. Garcia is employed as a Teachers aide at A.B. Duncan Elementary. Mr. Garcia has been employed by McCandless O.K. Tire Company for more than 20 years and serves as manager at present.

Active in community affairs, Garcia has served as a board member for the Regional South Plains Health Provider, the Neighborhood Improvement Committee for the City of Floydada and the Senior Citizens organization. He has also served on the advisory committee of the General Mechanical Repair Vocational Education Class of Fisd, the committee for adult education, the Task Force committee, and the Discipline Management Plan committee.

Bob Phillips is listed third on the ballot for Precinct 3 Trustee. Phillips is the owner and operator of the Floydada My-T-Burger. He and his wife Linda are partners in the business. He managed Mr. Burgers in Stillwater, Oklahoma, Plainview and Childress prior to moving

to Floydada in 1978.

Phillips graduated from Plainview High School and served four years in the U.S. Navy. The family is active in the Bible Baptist Church and Phillips was a volunteer fireman for four years. They have one child, a daughter who is six years old and attended kindergarten at A.B. Duncan Elementary.

AT-LARGE

The six way race for the at-large position on the Fisd board of trustees has attracted a host of candidates.

Listed first on the ballot in this race is D. Alan Benson, Benson, a retired minister, has been a resident of Floydada for nearly nine years. Benson received his bachelors degree from Howard Payne University in Brownwood, Texas and a masters from Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth. He did graduate work at the University of Texas in Austin, Grove City College in Pennsylvania and the Pasadena Fine Arts Conservatory in California.

Benson has taught at the junior high, high school, college and seminary levels. He is a past president of the Brazos Independent School District Elementary PTA and served 45 years in church staff positions. He was director and administrator of the Plains Baptist Assembly for 7 1/2 years and currently teaches the Auditorium Bible Class on TV at the First Baptist Church.

Benson and his wife Fay have two daughters, D'Alan Benson Bates, of Irving, Texas and Carol Benson.

Drawing the second spot on the ballot is Michael Hinsley. Hinsley is a Floyd County farmer. He graduated from Floydada High School and from Texas Tech University. He and his wife, Linda have three children. Angie, 16, is a student at FHS, Amy, 14, is a student at the junior high and Chad, 10, is a student at Andrews Elementary. Mrs. Hinsley is co-owner of The Palace, Cards and Gifts.

Hinsley is president of the adult leaders of the local 4-H organization and serves as president of the Floyd County Livestock Show Association. He serves on the board of Consumers Fuel and attends the Methodist church.

The third name on the ballot for at-large trustee is Amado Morales. Morales, a resident of Floydada for the past 27 years, is self employed as a contract trucker.

Morales and his wife Frances have three children. Six year old Monica is in kindergarten at A.B. Duncan Elementary. Veronica, 5, attends pre-kindergarten there also. Amado Jr. is 3.

Morales graduated from FHS and attended WTSU for one year and Wayland Baptist University for one year. He served three years with the U.S. Army, most of the time spent at a duty station in Germany.

The family attends St. Mary Magdalen Catholic Church.

In the fourth position on the at-large ballot is Cyndiann Williams. Williams has lived in Floydada for five years and is the owner of Williams Florist. She is married to Floydada native James Williams and the couple has two children, Austin, age 11, and Ashleigh, age 7.

Williams is a graduate of the University of Texas. She is a former school teacher with experience in both elementary and secondary grades. She is a member of City Park Church of Christ and is past president of the Women's Division of the Floydada Chamber of

Commerce. Williams has also served as treasurer of the 1956 Study Club and has coordinated the Miss Floydada Pageant for the past three years.

Appearing in the fifth position on the ballot for trustee-at-large is Joseph Stepp. Stepp has lived in Floydada for the past three years. He is employed by Applan Corporation at Thrasher Pit as a plant operator. He is a graduate of Irvin High School in El Paso, Texas and is pursuing a degree in civil engineering. He received training in drafting after high school and was employed by the Texas Highway Department for two years.

Stepp has more than twenty years experience in retail sales and management, having been employed by Furr Foods and S.S. Kresge Company as assistant store manager and by Winn's as a store manager. He was a self employed sales consultant for several years before holding supervisory positions on road building crews for both Amarillo Road Company and Jake Diel Dirt and Paving of Hereford.

Stepp and his wife, Juanita have two daughters, both students at Floydada High School. Sabrina is a senior and Marti is a junior. Mrs. Stepp is employed by the Floyd County Hesperian.

The sixth candidate in the at-large race for trustee is Floydada farmer Kenneth Pitts. Pitts has lived in Floydada since 1970. He graduated from Matador High School and received

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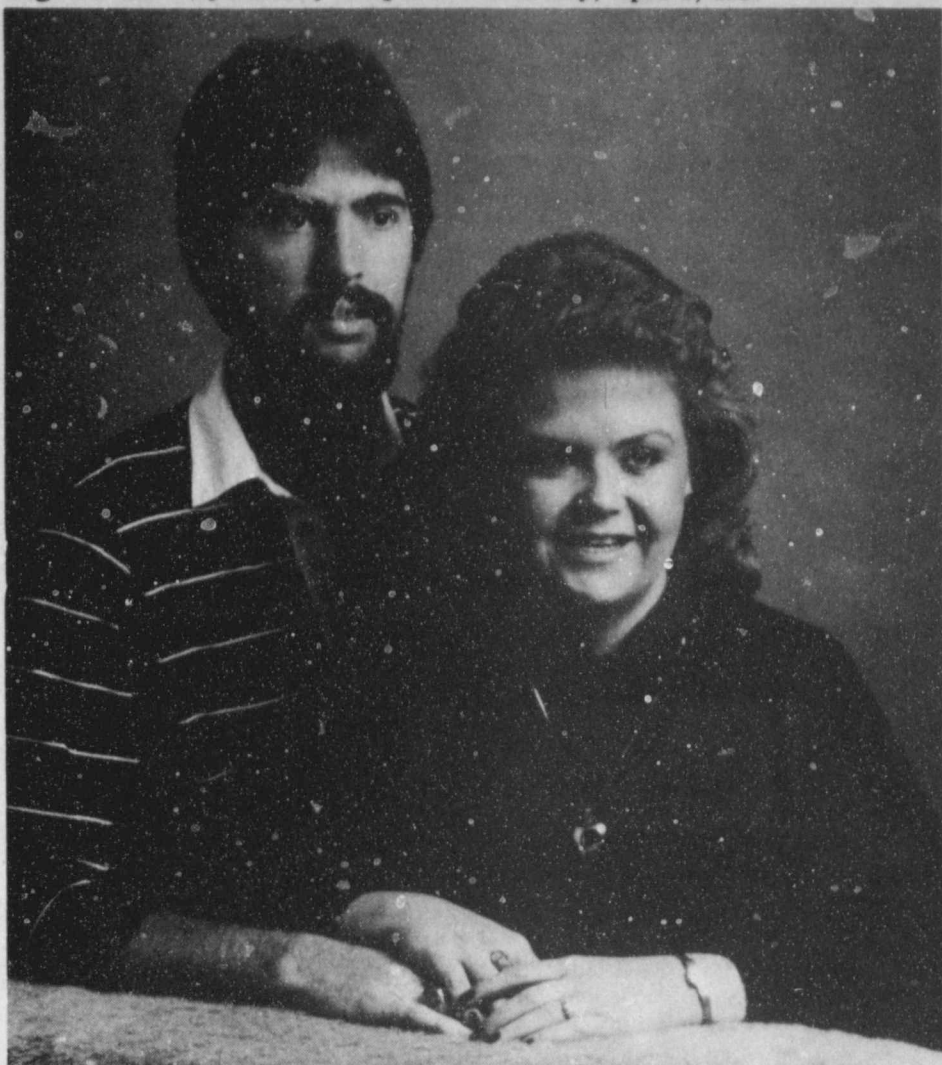

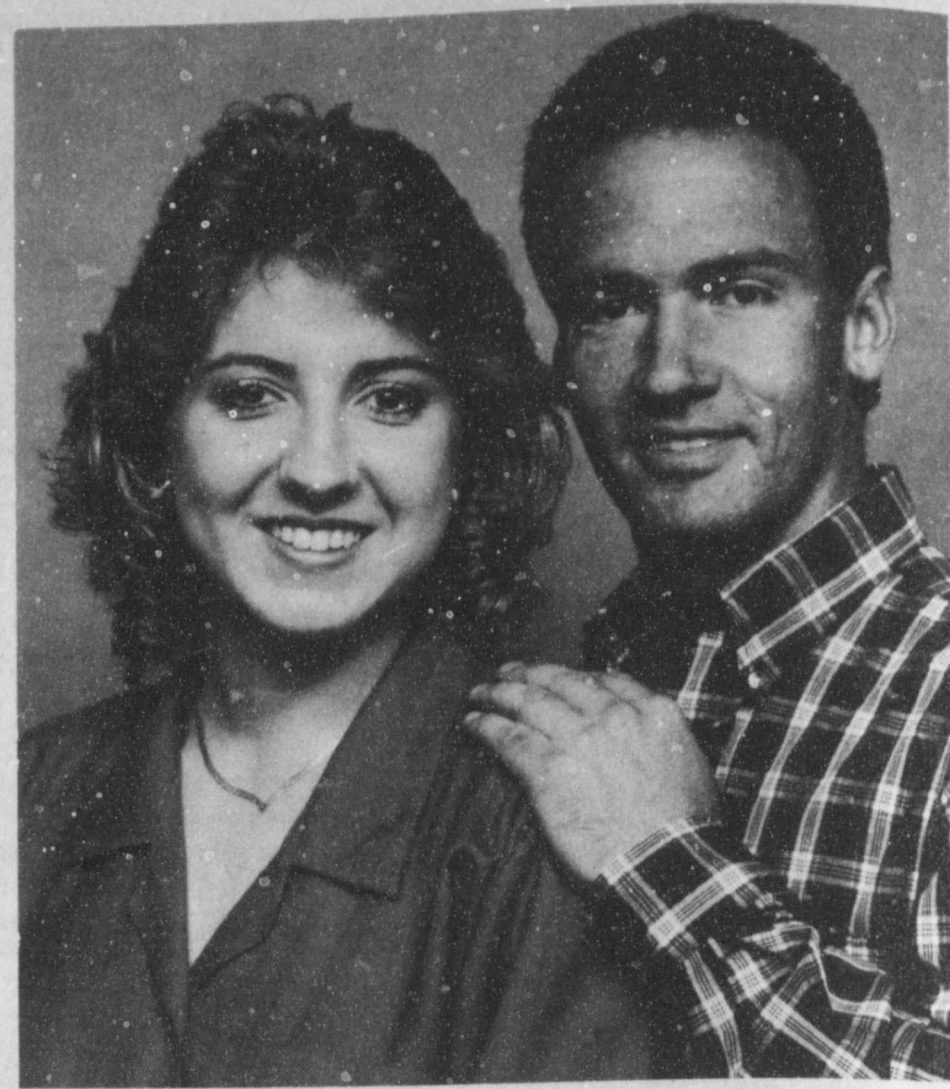

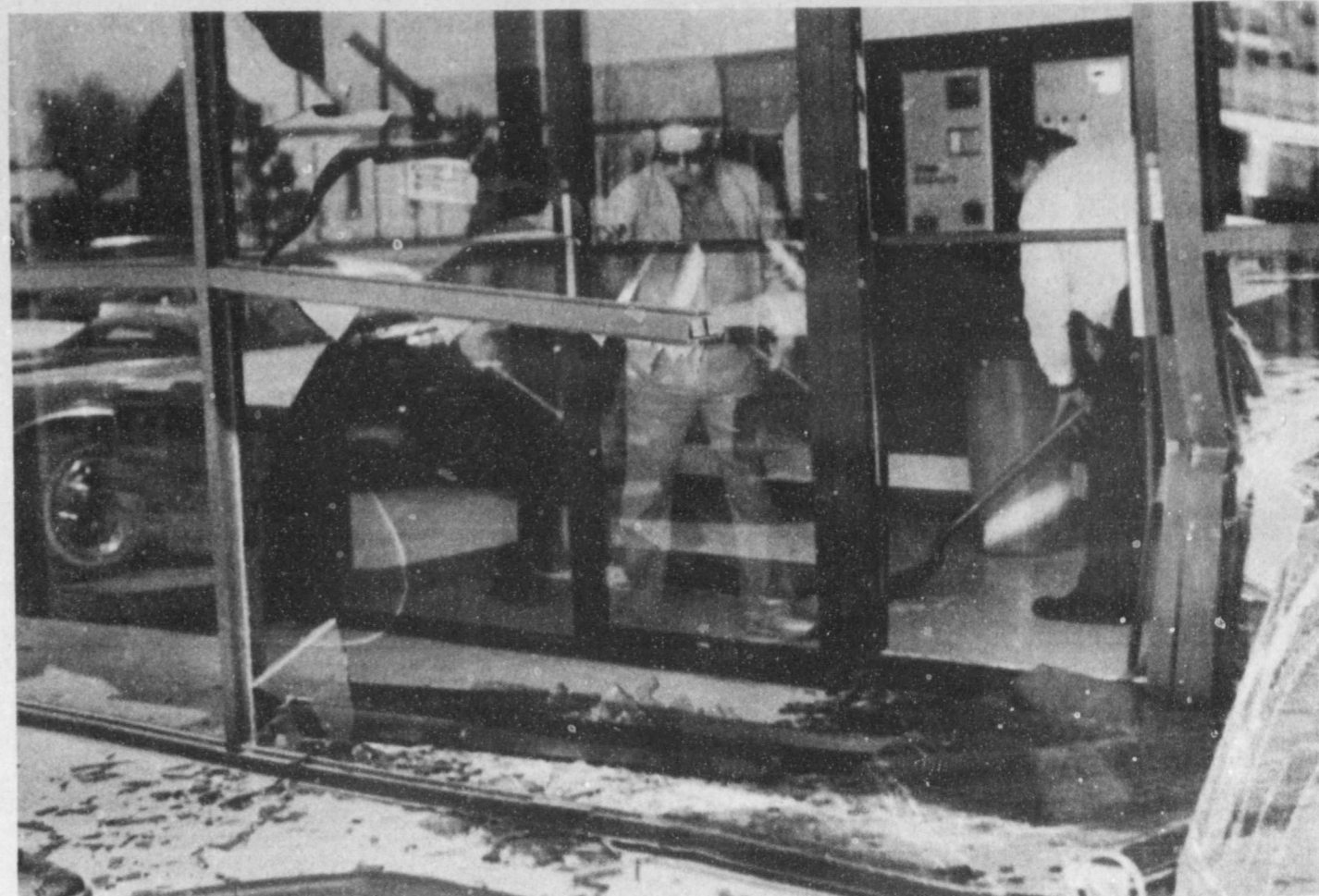

TV STOLEN

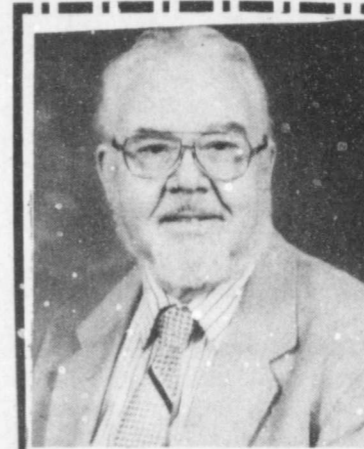

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Friday, March 27, 1987:

Things are always quiet around the Capitol any morning at 7 a.m., but on Friday at this time, it is unusually quiet. The legislature meets Monday through Thursday, mainly during the first half of the 140-day session. However, the 29 members of the Appropriations Committee will meet today and Sunday.

We are working at a fever pitch to wrap this two-inch thick document up that involves well over 200 agencies and separate items and runs into the \$36 billion figure. I'm well pleased with the progress the Appropriations Committee has made. We should have this wrapped up by the end of next week.

For the first time, we did make some important cuts in the Arts budget. I would have zeroed this unjustified program, but one can't have their way on every item.

In the past, we have had this Capitol full of the rich art enthusiasts the day the Arts Commission is heard. There was a most noticeable absence of their presence at this time. I am told the rich folks are becoming self-conscious about their welfare programs for the rich.

Recently, I've had some calls from a few people in support of a bill to make handguns legal to carry. I'm for one's right to own handguns and the usual rifle and shotguns, but I think it would be a mistake to go back to the wild west days and legalize the rights of every individual to indiscriminately carry a handgun.

If one's life has been threatened, there is a procedure through the court system, or otherwise, where citizens with no criminal record may obtain authority to bear such arms. The bill doesn't have a chance in the legislature. If I were a peace officer and this legislation was passed, I'd resign the following day. Our law enforcement officers are in enough jeopardy now, with all the crazed dope users.

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Roy Muniz cited for role in saving woman's life

A Hidalgo County Sheriff's Department deputy and an Edinburg Police Department officer have been recognized for their efforts in rescuing a woman from a fire.

Sheriff's Deputy Roy Muniz and EPD Officer Frank Cadena were each recently presented with a certificate of appreciation from the Edinburg Police Department for efforts "above and

beyond their duties."

Muniz is a son of Eddie Sr. and Mary Muniz of Floydada. He is a Floydada High School graduate who was formerly a Floydada peace officer.

Despite heavy smoke and flames, Muniz and Cadena entered a burning apartment last July 18 at the Albores Courts housing complex and carried Lena Munoz Franco from her bedroom to a window, where spectators assisted them in lifting her out of the house, according to the police report.

The 34-year-old woman suffered second and third degree burns over 60 percent of her body.

Cadena checked the woman and noticed that she was breathing and her eyes were open, but her skin was peeling. He radioed for an ambulance and then used a lawn hose to pour water over her body until the ambulance arrived.

Fire Chief Johnny Economedes arrived before the ambulance service and applied first aid to the woman. She was transported to Edinburg General Hospital and later to a burn treatment center in Galveston.

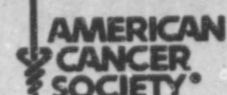
Cadena was on duty at the time of the incident and responded to the fire. Upon arrival he went to a window of the apartment, where several people were screaming and informed him that a person was inside the apartment.

From the window he saw heavy smoke coming from a bedroom, which was blocked by flames from the fire. He

I am a candidate for school board trustee-at-large in the upcoming April 4 election. I would like to point out to your readers and the voters that an irregularity has already occurred regarding this election.

A drawing for positions on the ballot was held March 5 at the school administration office as required by law. The order on the ballot determined at that time was: Precinct 3, Bob Phillips, Adolfo Garcia and Ruben Barrientos; At-Large, D. Alan Benson Jr., Joseph Stepp, Cyndiann Williams, Kenneth Pitts, Michael Hinsley and Amado Morales.

This ballot order was duly reported in your newspaper on March 12, 19 and 26. Absentee balloting began March 16 and is scheduled to end today.

The evening of March 27, I was informed that the ballot being used in absentee voting had the candidates listed in a different order. The ballot lists Barrientos, Garcia and Phillips in Precinct 3 and Benson, Hinsley, Morales, Williams, Stepp and Pitts in the at-large race.

School superintendent Jerry Cannon has stated that he nor anyone else at the FIDSO offices was aware of the error until I spoke with administrative assistant Jimmie Collins concerning the matter on Saturday, March 28.

I have spoken with two attorneys, a member of the state school board and the secretary of state's office. All assure me that such changes are not legal according to the state election code. The secretary of state's office quoted section 52.006 of the state election code which provides for correction of an incorrect ballot even at this late date.

Our superintendent has chosen to offer an apology to the candidates for the error he says occurred because of a lack of communication between a staff member and the printer. He has not indicated any possibility of correcting the ballots before the April 4 election.

I feel that this incident is yet another instance in which the best interests of the district and the people it should be serving have not been properly considered. Education and setting a good example for our youth was again shuttled aside.

Thank you for the opportunity to bring this before the public.

Kiss apathy good-bye

Perhaps Floydada can kiss apathy good-bye. At least in some quarters. It seems that more individuals are awakening to the fact that additional jobs opportunities are essential within this or any community which is not content with an economic downslide.

These persons are realizing more each day that a community — not unlike an individual business, churches, etc. — rarely stands on a level plateau. The trend is either upward or downward.

Some South Plains communities apparently have accepted the status quo, which equates to "downhill," given today's agricultural economy.

In West Texas, agriculture has always been the economic backbone for rural communities and, for the most part — whether or not they realize that fact — cities. Agriculture will remain as the economic frontrunner, but the facts point out that fewer people are involved in this industry. This creates a population and job void.

Therefore, communities which have a desire for something better than declining population, smaller school enrollment, more empty church pews, fewer businesses and individuals sharing in the tax load, etc., etc., will seek more employment opportunities.

These don't come easy. With the economy hurting in the agriculture and oil patches, an array of progressive communities share the same goal. Industrial competition is hot and heavy.

Frequently, concessions are necessary to entice an industry to relocate or expand into a given area.

Obviously, progressive-minded communities strive to locate the obvious. At this point in time, the opportunities seem brightest for some West Texas community to become the home of a state minimum-security detention center. That should produce well over 100 jobs and will lend invaluable stability to that town chosen as its home.

However, for the most part, Floydada and comparable size towns — from this viewpoint — have facilities to accommodate smaller industries. Think, for example, what four companies with six employees each could mean to this community's economy.

According to national statistics, five or six jobs create another job in an unrelated area. It produces a mushroom effect.

Aside from the monetary standpoint, let's examine what those hypothetical 24 additional jobs would do for Floydada. Assuming that half would be filled by present residents, that means that a dozen "new people" would establish residence here to fill the positions.

If each represented a household including three persons, that would mean 36 new people to become a part of this community. Some would occupy church pews, and at least a few of the 36 would be public school students.

Producing new job opportunities, and thereby newcomer residents, is never easy. As mentioned above, competition is keen. Industrial leaders might make two dozen contacts before being successful.

But, community attitude is the first step. That seems to be coming around — on the part of some citizens — judging from statements we've heard recently.

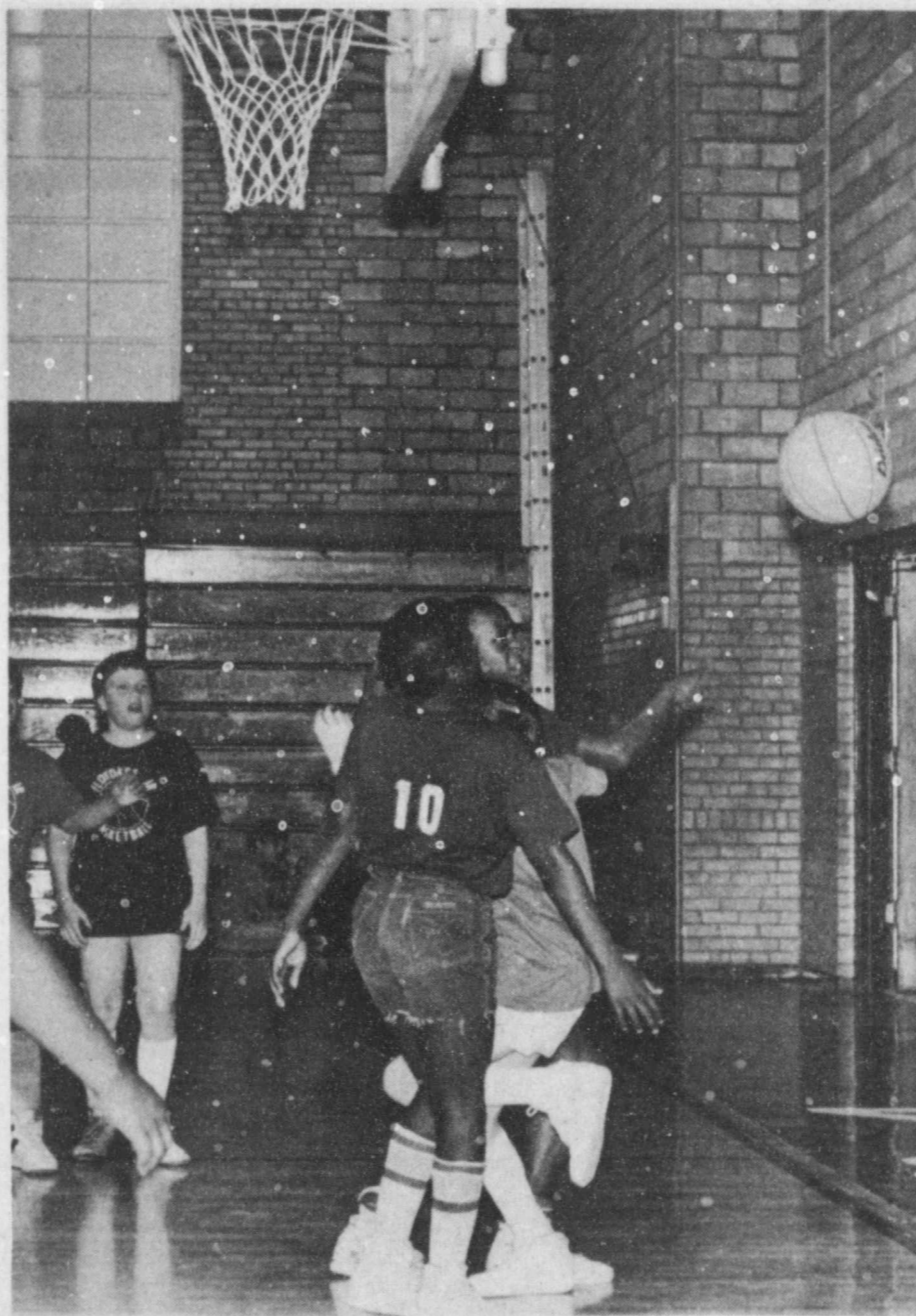

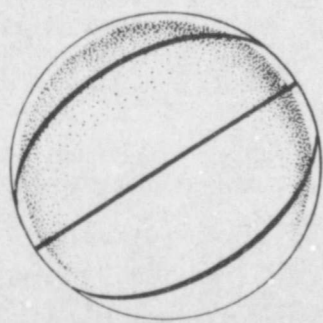

221 cans of 'tall boys' confiscated by lawmen

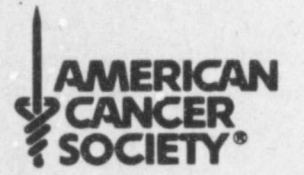

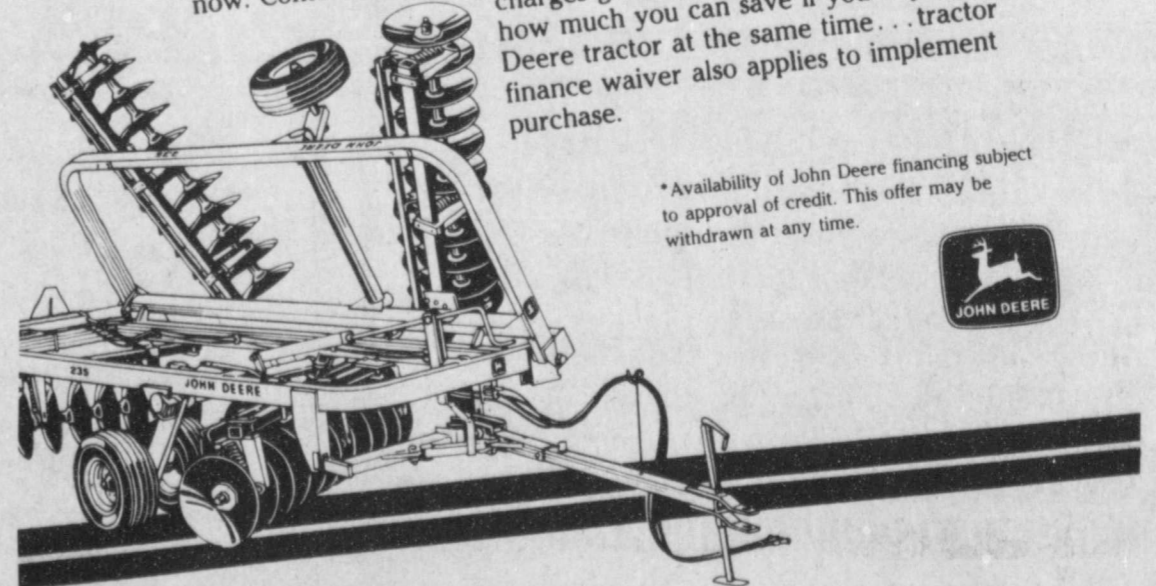

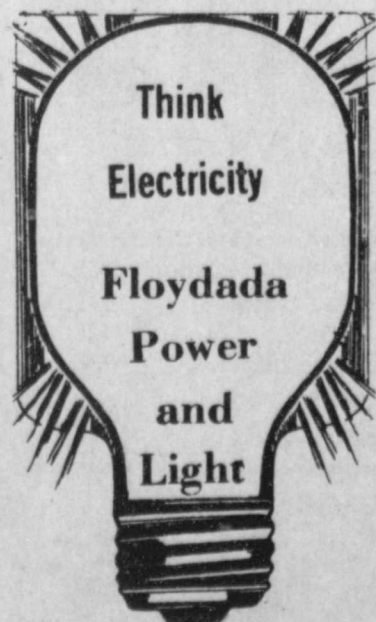
