In an effort to establish a western Mirabeau B. Lamar sent an expeditio of merchants, along with a military escort, to Santa Fe in 1841. The group June and in August arrived in this vicinity, where they established campsites at the confluence of the Los Lingos and Quitaque Creeks ( $1 \mathrm{~m} . \mathrm{E}$ ). the expedition encountered numerous hardships. Provisions, food, and water were reduced to dangerously low levels,
harrassed the group, killing some.
Facing the impassable ravines of the
caprock, the military caprock, the militarsy commanders dece--
ded to divide the group. One party was sent to find new Mexican settlements and seek help, while the second
remained. Commander Hugh Mcleod
drew up decision to split the command, and the
site became known site became known as Camp Resolution.
Finally reaching New Mexico September, the men were met by Mexican soldiers and were mot by
