THE SAGA OF the Rev. Jesse Jackson, Demo Presidential candidate, Peace Guru and Upholder of All Things Holy, continues without letup.

The latest chapter in the life and times of the by now somewhat predictable Jackson has been reeled off this week in Central America, where he has offered not only platitudes for peace but perhaps created more problems than he has solved.

After his arrival in Panama, where he chastised the U.S. for building the Panama Canal, which he called "A badge of disgrace," to stopovers in El Salvador, Cuba and Nicaragua, the Rev. Jackson was big on words but little on real accomplishment.

Back home, one has to wonder not only what President Reagan and Demo leader Walter Mondale must be thinking, but what a majority of Jackson's fellow Americans think about being held up to ridicule.

It is one thing to be an ambassador for peace and goodwill, and we find no fault in individuals acting in that context as long as it is understood they are doing so as private citizens, but it is another to involve high level policy in such efforts.

Jackson has repeatedly done this, whether it was in his highly publicized journey to Syria where he obtained the release of a U.S. airman, or the present trip to Cuba, where Premier Fidel Castro made a token gesture of goodwill by releasing some political prisoners.

It should be obvious, even to the most rabid among Jackson followers, that he is being blatantly used, or at best, tolerated by those who host him.

Premier Castro, El Salvador's President Duarte, the Panamanians and Nicaraguans know Jackson does not make U.S. foreign policy, nor for that matter really influence it.

What they do know, however, is that the man spouting peace slogans mixed with a moral overtone has a wide appeal among many in the world, including those of his own race and others who never stop to take a realistic look at the world.

While upbraiding the U.S. and American citizens at every opportunity, the Rev. Jackson conveniently ignores the role of Cuban-Soviet Marxism in Central America or terrorism in the Mideast.

In all his "preacher" moralizing, he never gets around to talking about what those prisoners were doing in jail in Cuba in the first place, about the wrongs of the rebels, about the innocent people who die at the hands of terrorists.

Jackson may tread where diplomats don't dare. But "taking the show on the road" and being a hit at the box office—that is, solving anything—are two different things. And that precisely is the point. It may be good show, but what else? It is a question the Democratic Party and American voters also must answer sooner or later.

Everyone is invited to attend the tournament and support the local All-Star team.

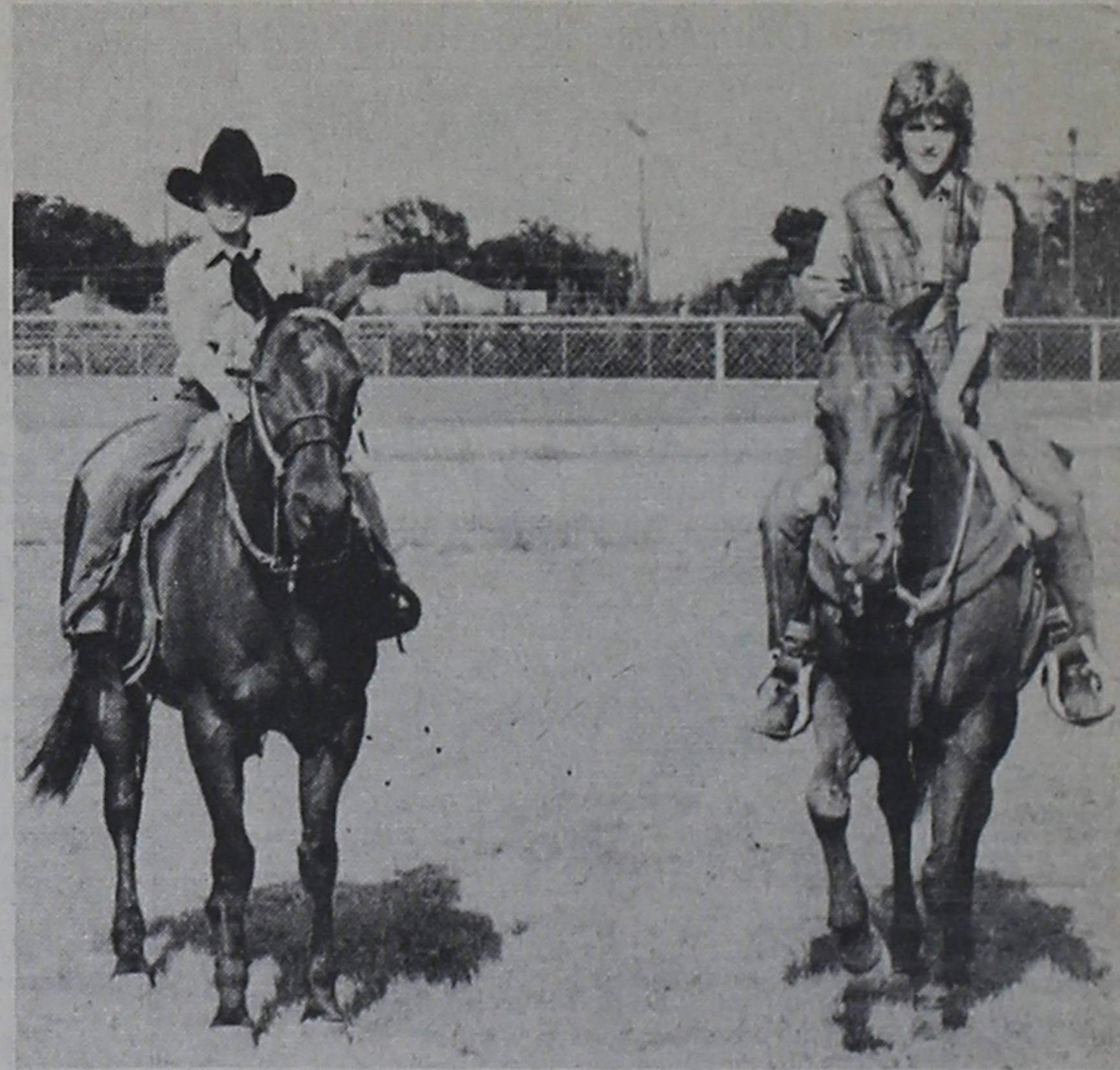
Two 4-H'ers Qualify For State Show

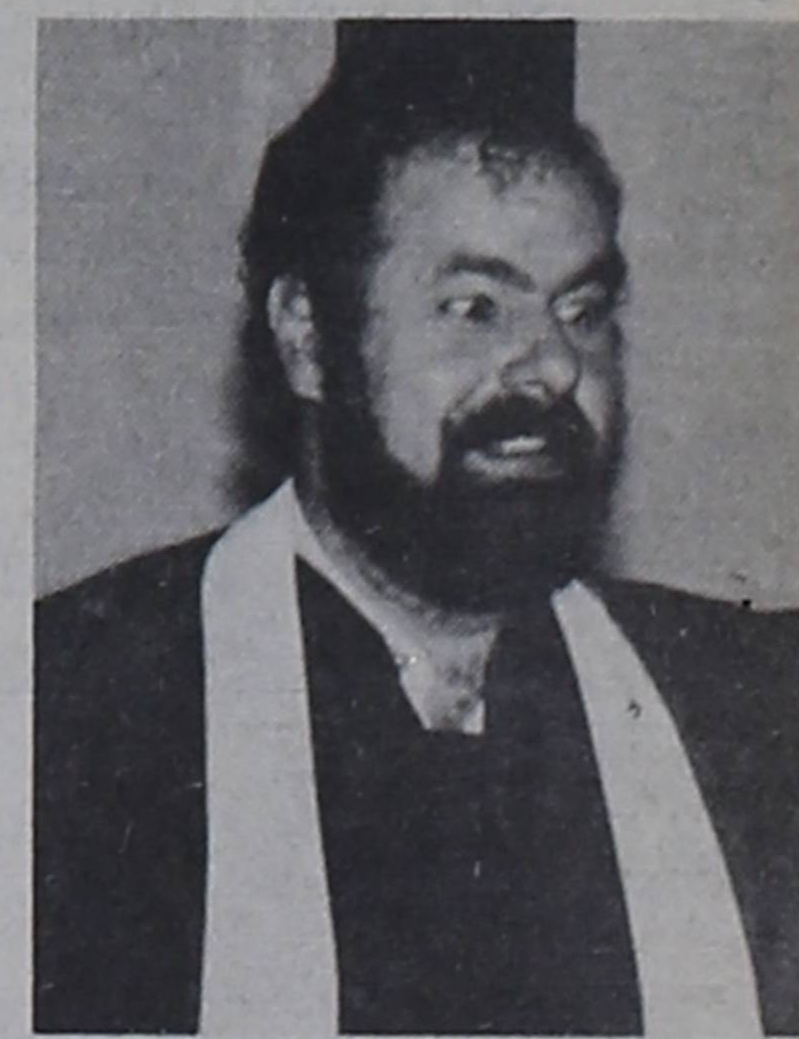
Gary Smith New Pastor At U.C.C.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--JUNE 28, 1929

Pearl Drake, 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A.O. Drake of Friona, who was shot three weeks ago in the abdomen with a 22-calibre bullet when a rifle in the hands of her brother was accidentally discharged, died Thursday night at the Deaf Smith County Hospital in Hereford.

Work is almost completed on the wholesale station for The Texas Company in Friona.

50 YEARS AGO--JUNE 29, 1934

The 1934 harvest season in the Friona territory has been unusually quiet as compared to that of the past six years, when the elevators were working double crews and long rows of trucks stood waiting in the streets for their turn to unload. Despite the fact that the harvest season appears to be at its height at this time, there are no such scenes. The fields of the locality are giving a yield of from four to 15 bushels to the acre, with an apparent average of about 8 or 9 bushels.

45 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1939

The County Commissioners, in session here Monday, passed a resolution submitted by County Judge Lee Thompson, which will limit the amount of financial aid to be

extended indigent persons of the county. In offering the resolution, Judge Thompson said that in recent months the county had received bills from hospitals for care given county residents with bills that had never been authorized officially and he felt that some action must be taken to curb practice of this nature.

40 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1944

B.P. Abbott, of Bovina, has been in this community frequently during the past week, an employee of the Parmer County Extension Service or AAA, assisting farmers who have no combines in contacting combine owners who are prepared to do service harvesting.

30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 24, 1954

Announcement is made this week of the sale of the Friona Lumber Company to Carl McCaslin of Hereford. McCaslin, long-time lumberman, will operate the local firm under the name of Carl McCaslin Lumber.

25 YEARS AGO--JUNE 25, 1959

Plans are being made for a community wide meeting of the American Legion Hall Monday evening of next week at 8 p.m. This meeting will be open to the public and

anyone interested in the upkeep and improvement of the cemetery should be present.

Virginia Patton, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Coy Patton of the Black Community, was elected Grand Representative from Michigan at the Grand Assembly of the Order of the Rainbow for Girls held in San Antonio last week.

20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 25, 1964

The Friona Star won awards in three of the five contest divisions, including the first place plaque for news pictures, it was announced at the annual Texas Press Association convention in Houston last Saturday. The Star was the "second winningest" newspaper in its bracket of weekly newspapers published in towns of 2,001-3,500 population. The Star also placed second in the "appearance" division, and third in the news writing division.

15 YEARS AGO--JUNE 26, 1969

Ordinance Number 411, which was adopted and approved by the Friona City Council last July 8, was underscored this week by City Manager Jake Outland. "This being the first Fourth of July that the anti-fireworks ordinance will have been in effect, we felt we should remind the public of the ordinance, and the fact that it will be enforced," Outland said.

10 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1974

Funeral services were conducted for Charlie A. Turner, a pioneer resident of the Friona area, at 3 p.m. Sunday, June 23 in Friona's First Baptist Church.

Dennis W. Anthony was listed on the Dean's Honor List at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

"Star Lites," the weekly column written by publisher Bill Ellis earned for the Friona Star a first place plaque in the 1974 Texas Press Association newspaper contests.

5 YEARS AGO--JULY 1, 1979

Figures released by A.L. (Jake) Outland, official weather recorder, indicated that through June 29, a total of 8.88 inches of rain had been logged in the city of Friona during the calendar year 1979.

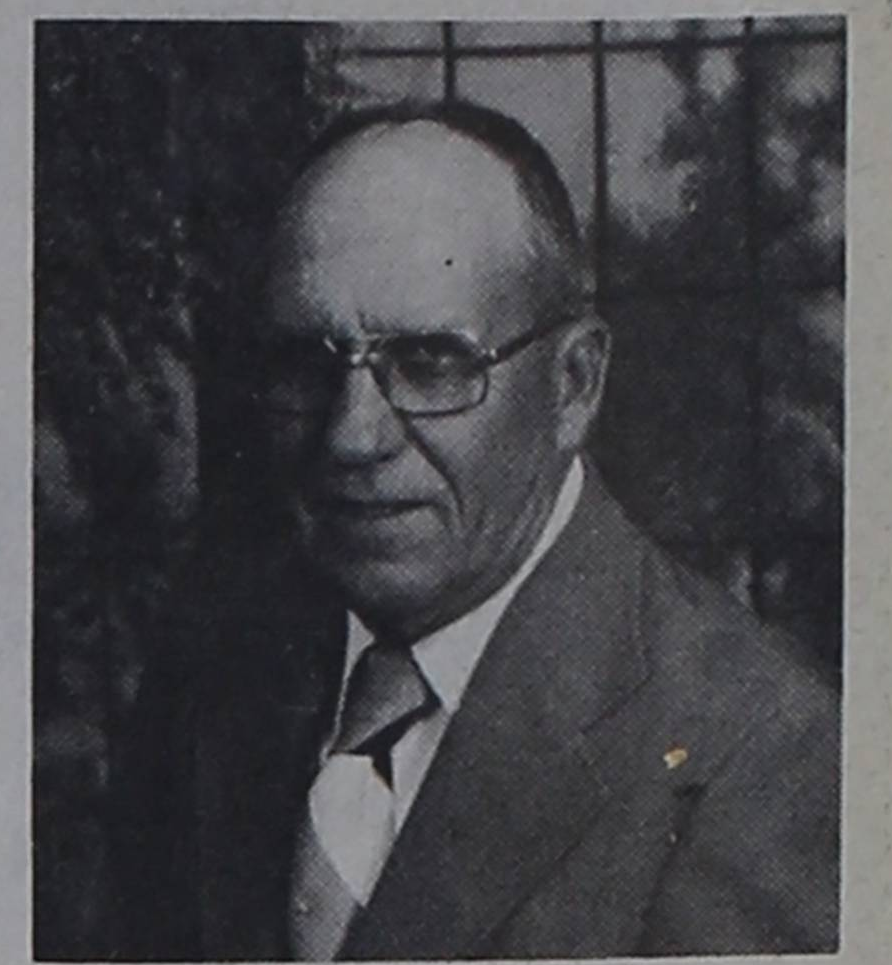
Coffman's Rites Held In Farwell

Benny Pryor and Paul J. Smith, local advisors and their wives will attend the convention with the Friona students.

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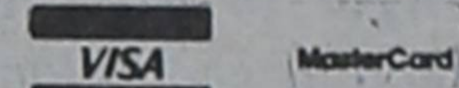

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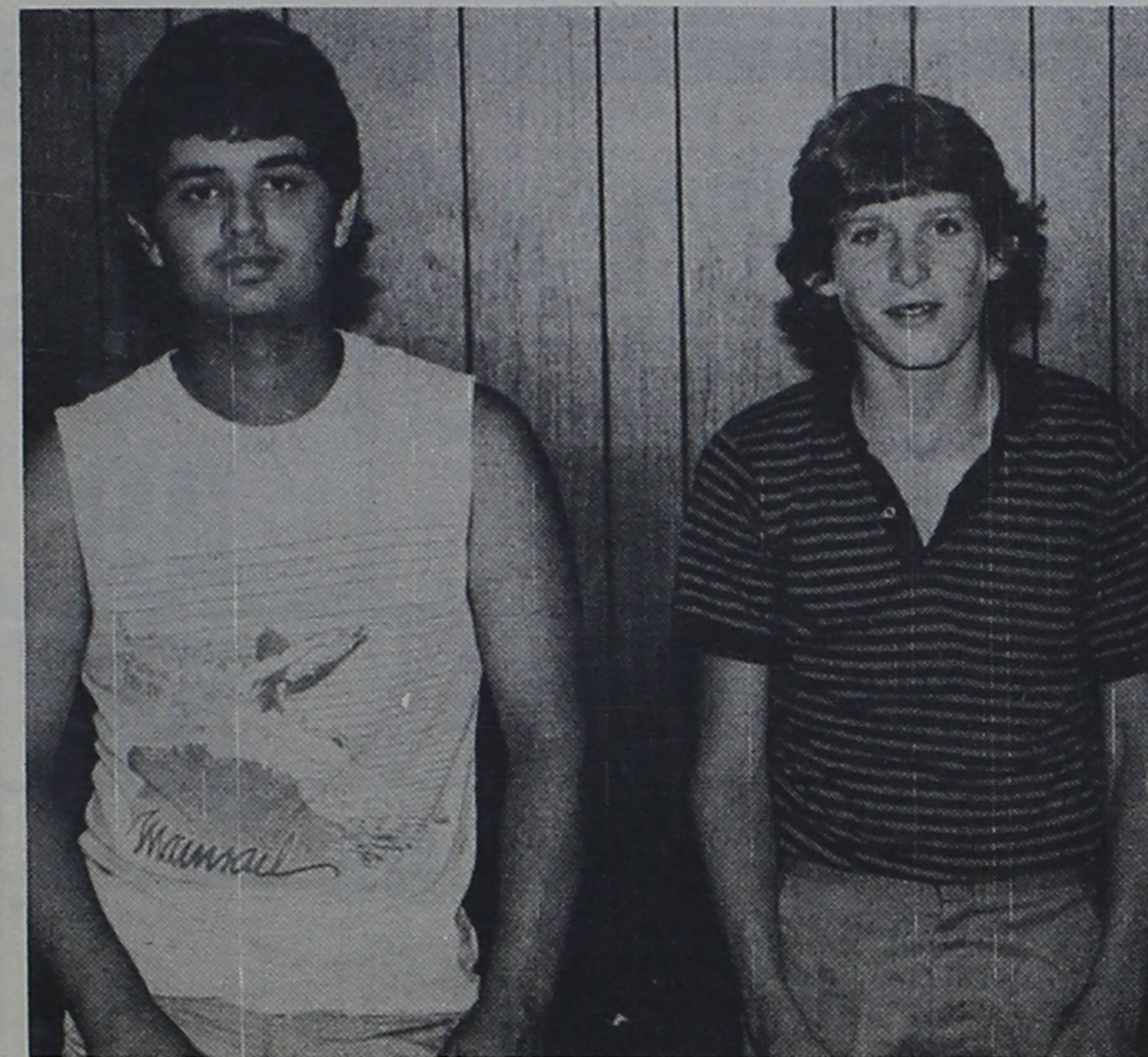

Local Farmers Form Seed Co.

About the same time, Dr. Carl Claussen, a native Kansan, started work on hybrid oilseeds, primarily sunflower, and formed the Pacific Oilseeds Company.

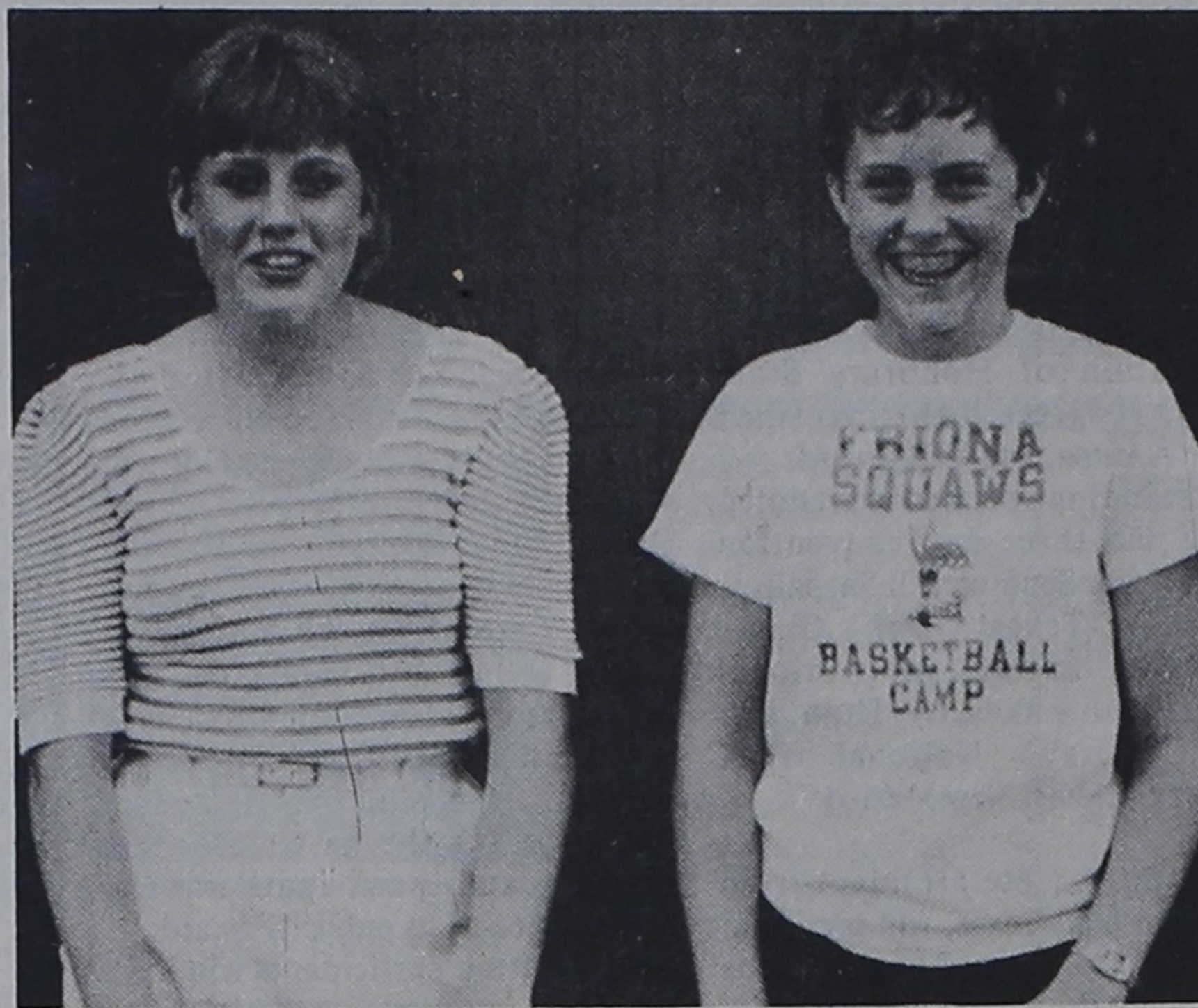
In 1976, these two fine companies joined forces and now have become SeedTec International with operations at Hereford; Fargo, North Dakota and at Woodland, California. Armon Lauderback, one of the previous owners of WAC Seed, Inc., is vice president of SeedTec and general manager of the WAC Division. Lauderback is past president of the Texas Seedsmen's Association.

SeedTec International continues to be a dynamic research/service oriented company with rapidly growing sales in sorghum, sunflowers and corn. Emphasis presently is being put upon two major problems in sorghum production—a new pathotype of Downy Mildew that is becoming a problem to previously resistant hybrids in South Texas and the new Bio-type Greenbug that is

becoming a problem to most of the sorghum growing areas. A recent release is hybrid sorghum WAC 686 that has tolerance to Bio-type E Greenbug. It has an excellent yield record in the research trials in Texas and the early reports from the field indicate that it is doing well in the commercial field trials in South and Central Texas in 1984.

The emphasis on corn research in Texas is directed toward food-grade corns such as yellow on white cobs with hard, smooth starch caps, high oil content and low cooking loss that will yield at satisfactory levels on the commercial farm. Recent releases, 922 and 923 from SeedTec's work, have been accepted by Lincoln Grain of Atchinson, Kansas for production by their contract growers in that area. Lincoln Grain's primary interest is food-grade corns.

SeedTec sunflowers have the finest record of any commercial company at Clovis, New Mexico, and at Hays, Kansas, where sunflower trials have been conducted by both Texas states. 338 and XR28 consistently have been at the top of these trials for both yield and pounds of oil per acre. Grain Sorghum Has Higher Feed Value

New test results show grain sorghum has an 11 per cent higher feeding value than the old National Research Council feed composition tables indicate. Cattle feeders who feed sorghum have realized they are getting better performance than the 83 per cent value these tables placed on milo.

Beef cattle specialist, John R. Brethour said, by taking advantage of new management skills in processing, he found the feed value of dry rolled grain sorghum to be about 94 per cent of that of dry rolled corn. Brethour is a beef cattle scientist at the Hays Branch Agricultural Experiment Station of Kansas State University. The research at Hays shows that considerable improvement can be made in dry processing grain sorghums.

Brethour said, "The main purpose of grain processing is to rupture the kernel, reduce the particle size and increase the surface area so digestion can occur more rapidly and thoroughly. The feedlot with a roller mill would want to go to a fine roll to reduce the particle size of the kernel. That, in itself, will improve the value about 5 per cent." Feedlot operators

New Surface To Be Applied

The contractor is expected to begin this month placing asphalt surfacing on FM 3333 from U.S. Highway 60, five miles northeast of Farwell, east to FM Highway 1731, Rhea E. Bradley, Supervising Resident Engineer, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation of Littlefield, said this week. Base is being prepared for surfacing at the present time.

It is anticipated that this project will be completed by August. The public is urged to watch for warning signs and drive slowly through the project.

who have been concerned that finely rolled grain might cause bloat and acidosis probably can alleviate those concerns by feeding Rumensin or Bovatec, adding buffers and keeping feed in front of cattle at all times.

A summary of eight experiments at the Hays Branch Station using rolled corn and finely rolled milo showed there was very little difference in average dressing percentages, quality grade or carcass cutability. In those trials, partially funded by Kansas Grain Sorghum Commission, the indicated net energy (for gain) content of finely rolled milo was 1.39 Mcal/kg dry matter (55 Mcal/100 lb. air dry) compared to 1.48 Mcal/kg dry matter for dry rolled corn. Brethour summarized, "The value of grain for feeding cattle is closely associated with net energy content, so in those tests, finely rolled milo was worth 94 per cent as much as corn."

Brethour went on to say, "That may even underestimate the true value of grain sorghum because many cattle feeders use steam flaking or high moisture processing. It seems grain sorghum is much more responsive to the more sophisticated processing procedures and, consequently, under those procedures the energy value of grain sorghum is probably equal to that of corn."

"Because computer linear programming is often used in ration formulation, net energy coefficients often determine feed ingredient prices. These coefficients should take into account the manner in which the grain is processed to be accurate in the value of sorghum. As the upward coefficients of sorghum grains are figured into the computer linear programming," Brethour concluded, "then this should enhance the relative price of grain sorghum."

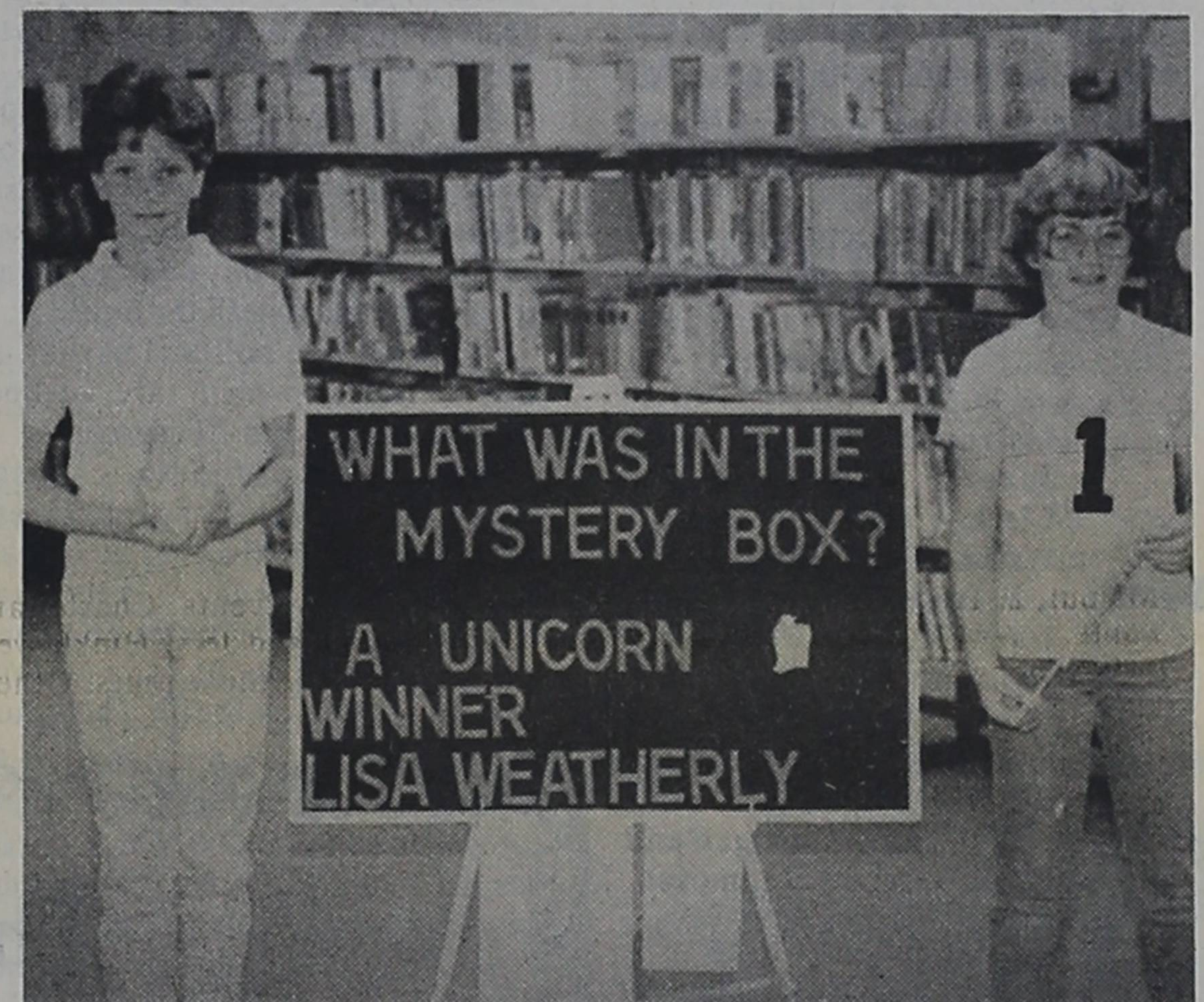

County SWCD Offers Aids For Irrigators

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 is joining with County Soil and Water Conservation District Boards to provide landowners and/or operators with a local source for obtaining soil moisture gypsum blocks and resistance meters. These blocks and meters are being provided to the Soil and Water Conservation Districts on a consignment basis and are available for purchase from either the local Soil and Water Conservation District office or local office of the Water District.

Producers who have used the soil moisture blocks during the past few years are very satisfied with the results. Jerry Smith, a Parmer County farmer, states, "I like them well enough that I don't want to try watering without them." David Wied, a Lynn County farmer who uses the blocks on irrigated cotton indicates, "I've found out that the moisture is not necessarily where I thought it would be. Also, it is

amazing to me to see how wet the soil profile can be and then in just a matter of a few days, how the moisture can be gone." A Crosby County farmer, Alvin Morrison, states, "They give me a picture of what is really happening from planting to harvest. They are an educational tool."

Soil moisture gypsum blocks are inch-long porous cylinders imbedded with lead wires. The blocks are installed after crop emergence and buried in the soil root zone at one-foot intervals to a depth of four feet. Readings taken with a meter which measures electrical resistivity will indicate to the producer the amount of moisture currently available in his soil profile. Electrical resistance in the block varies with the amount of moisture in the soil and readings taken over a period of time will show the producer the rate at which his crop is using moisture. Once information on current moisture levels and the rate of use by the plant is known, decisions as to when to irrigate and the amount of water which needs to be applied can be made.

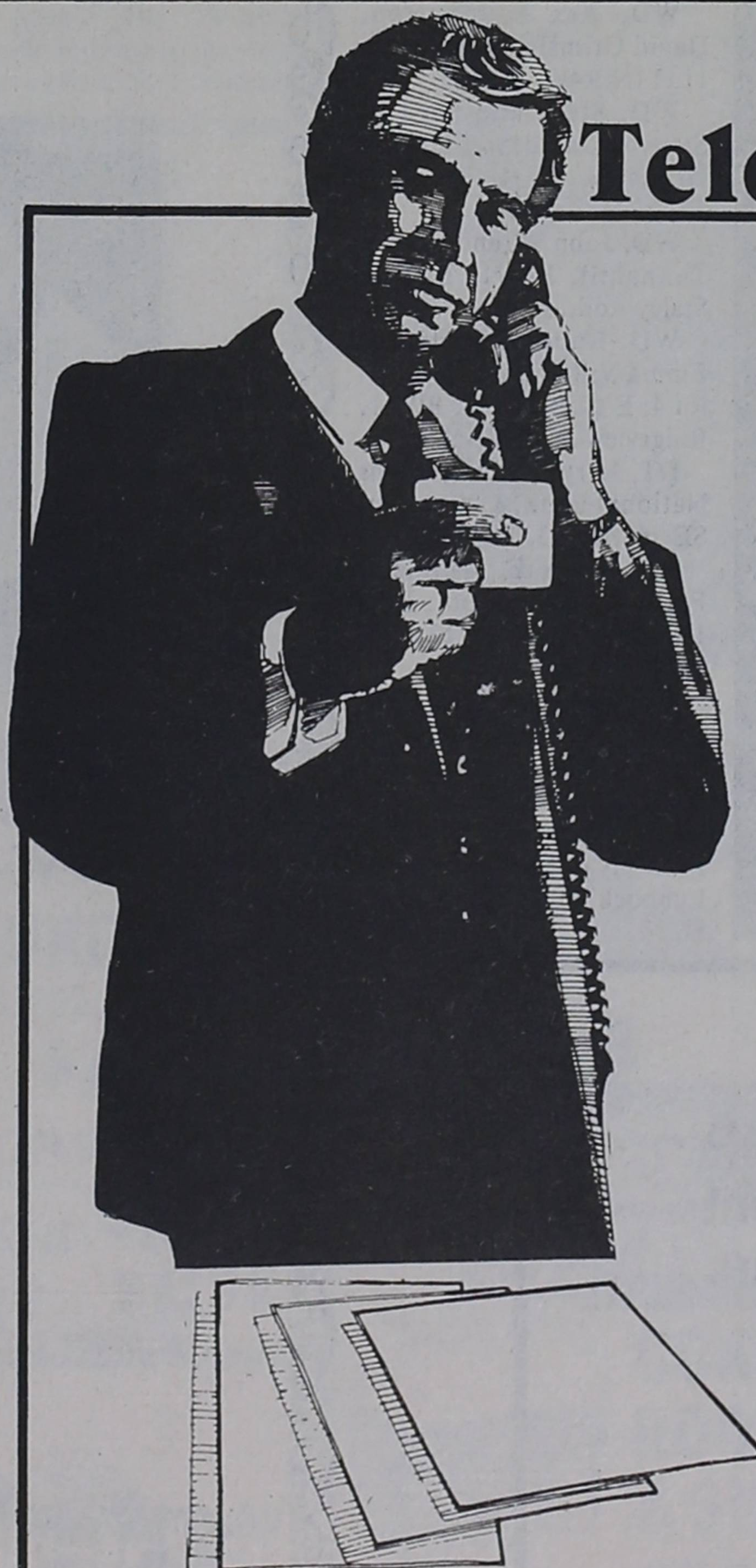

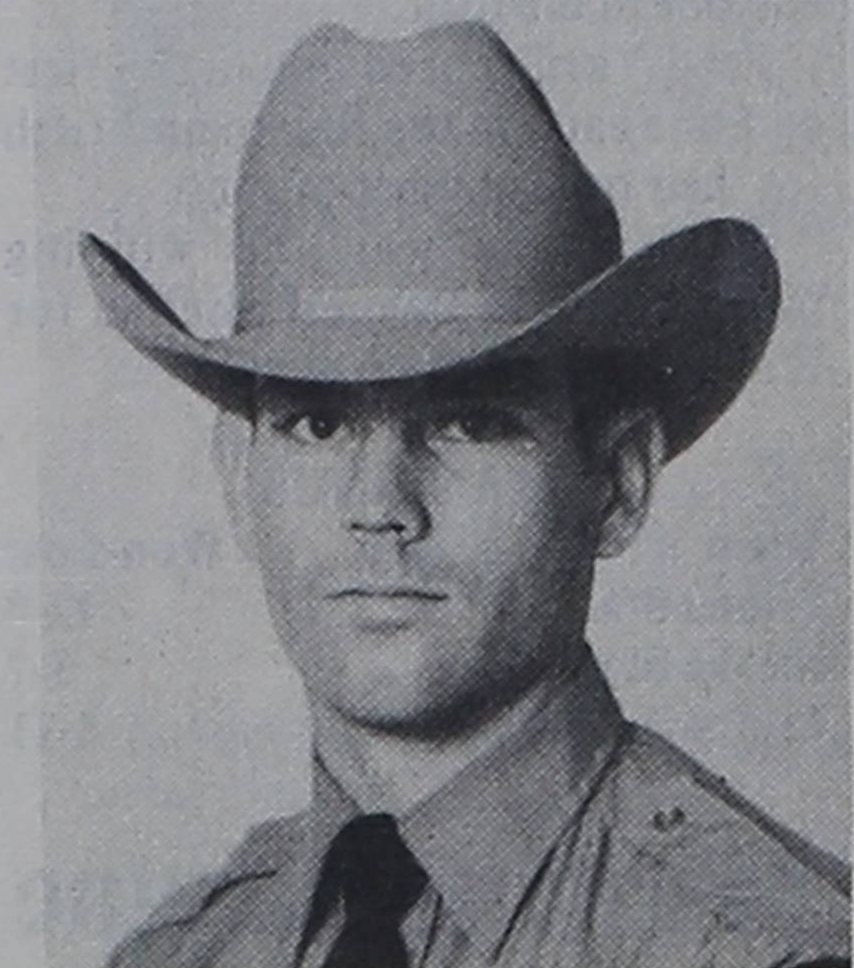
A comptroller's representative is available to assist local residents at the Courthouse the third Wednesday of each month.

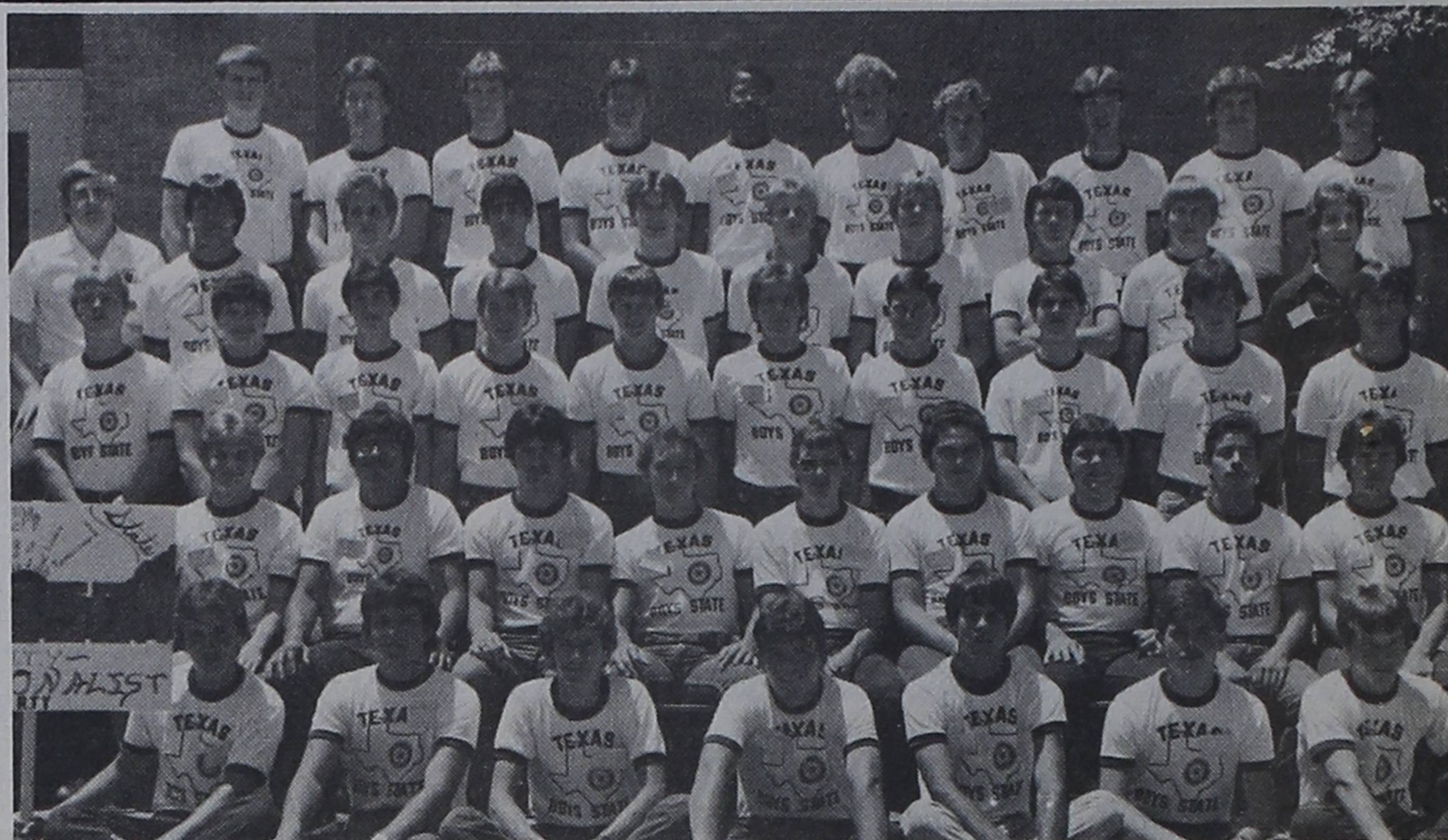

Here is his report on the trip:

We are divided up into cities, counties, and districts as evenly as possible. In each individual organization, candidates go about getting endorsements for a certain position they wish to fill. Those not

wanting to run or lost an election for office are appointed to one. This insures everyone a responsibility and a privilege to act as an active member in their county, state, etc. This formality is used for the reason of every boy to assume a role in their governable political system and have a say so to decisions being made.

The objective of the Boy's State is to "educate our youth in the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities of American citizenship."

I, as a Boy's Stater, ran for County Sheriff of Keig County but lost the election by ten votes. I was later appointed to the Texas State Guard Advisory Board. Running for County Sheriff was a great experience of competition and it gave me an outlook on how some offices are being obtained.

I was a member of Gibson City in Keig County and active in the Boy's State Band as well as other activities such as volleyball.

I would especially like to appreciate Ralph Taylor and Peggy Hamil for

helping me get my materials together and preparing me for my visit at Boy's State. Also, for getting me interested in Boy's State. Thanks again for sponsoring me and giving me the opportunity to go to Boy's State. It was exciting and a worthwhile experience.

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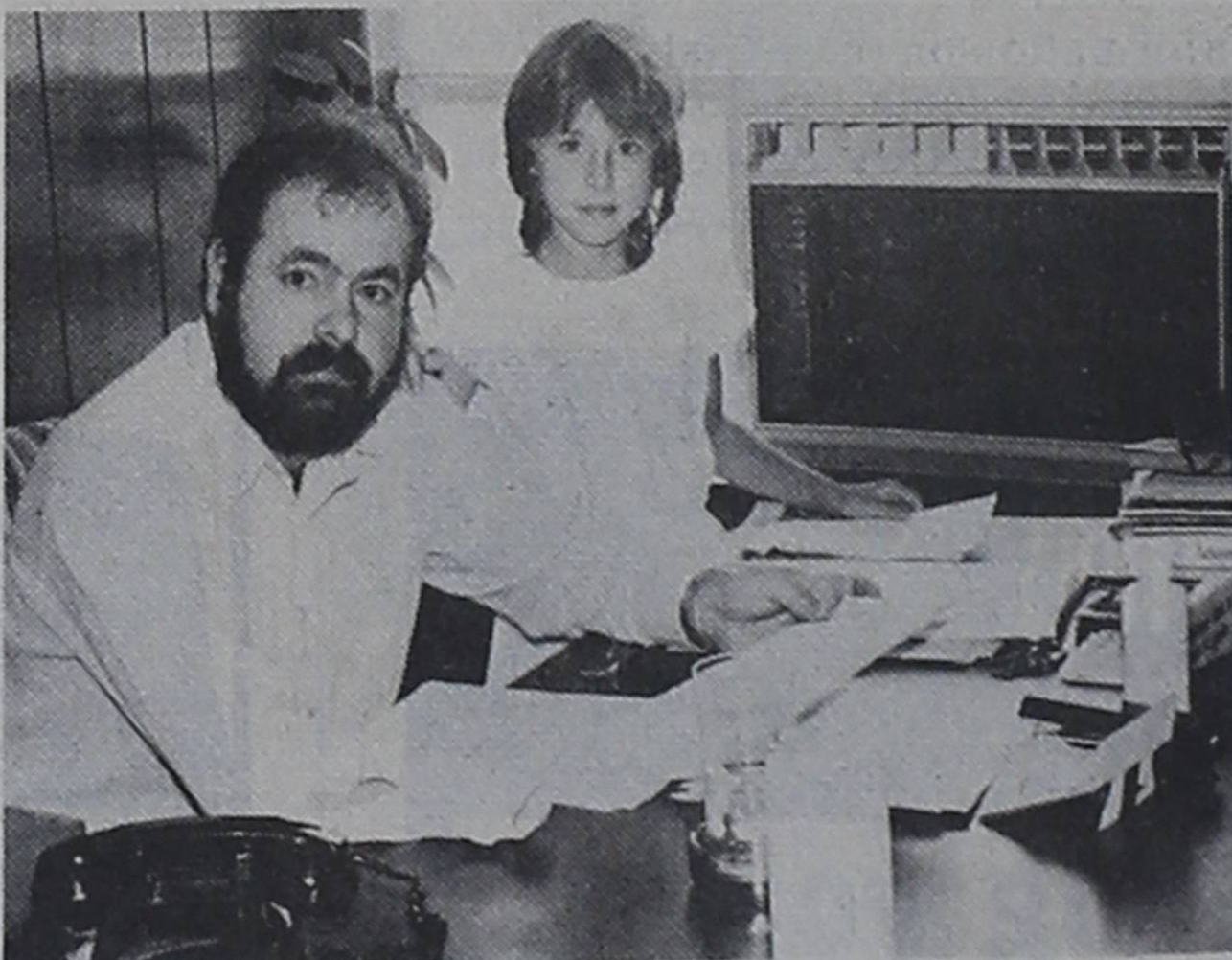

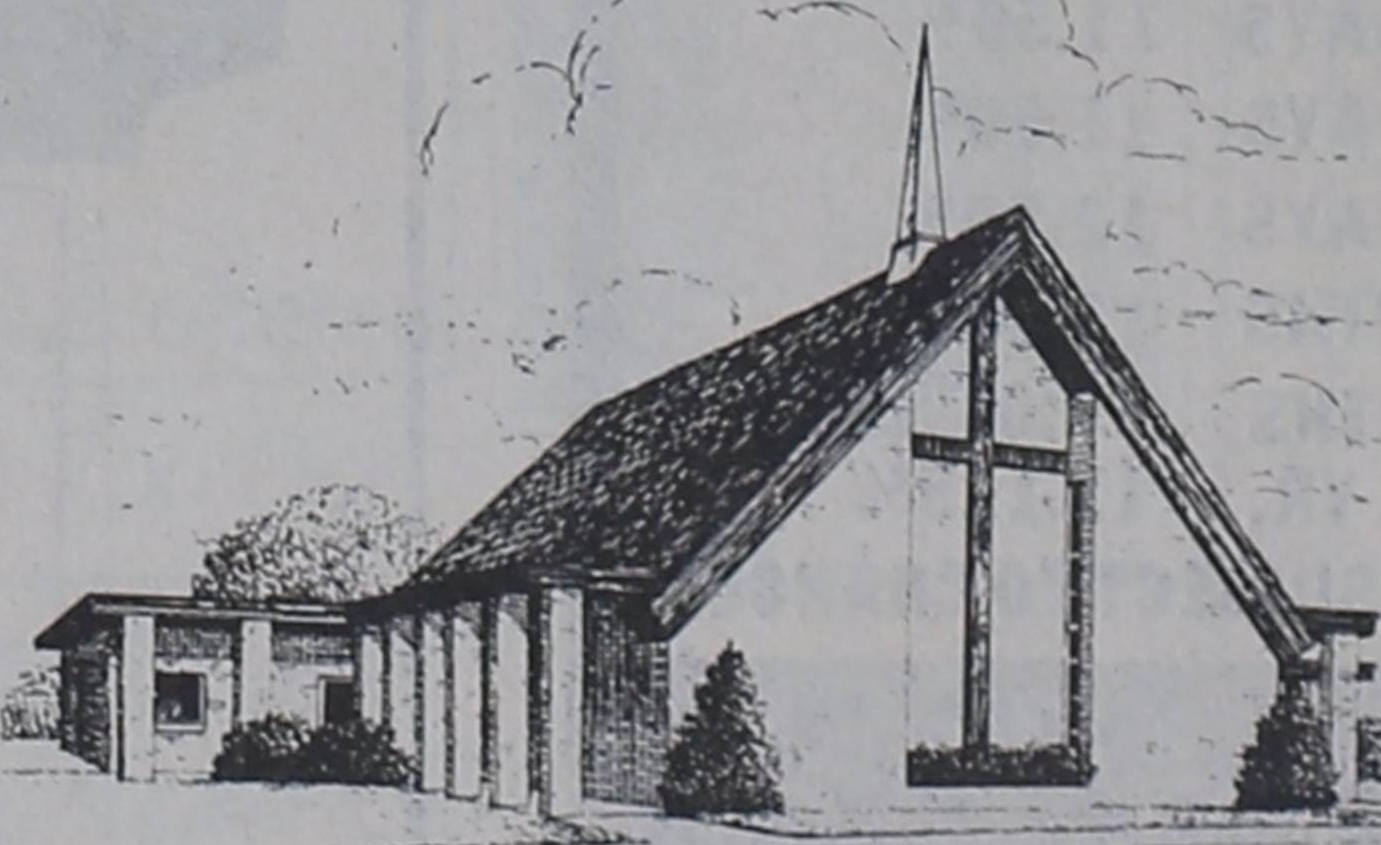

Library Corner

As we grow older many of us dread adding up the years and sometimes we'd like to stop counting; but one birthday we never tire of celebrating is our nation's birthday, July 4th. Let's all hope for 208 more happy, peaceful birthdays!

The only lady I know who never complains about more birthdays is The Statue of Liberty who was 100 years old July 4, 1984. She was presented to our ambassador in Paris on July 4, 1884. The years are beginning to tell on her though, and a massive \$29 million restoration effort is underway to be completed by October 1986, the 100th anniversary of her debut in America. In all, \$230 million will be needed to make the repairs to the statue, and to pay for the restoration of Ellis Island and the 1986 celebration.

There were problems from the beginning when the statue arrived in America by ship in 214 crates in 1885. In reassembling the statue neither the head nor the arm was positioned as designer Bartholdi and engineer Eiffel had planned thus weakening the structure considerably. The statue has always doubled as a lighthouse and when some thought it didn't give off enough light windows were cut into the torch flame causing it to leak badly ever since. The torch is the most damaged part of the structure and was in danger of falling off. The statue itself was not designed for public use and certainly not the current 8,500 daily visitors; it is very hot (120°) in the summer and the ventilation is very poor.

Repair plans include replacing the torch and flame (the flame will be gold plated and surrounded by a ring of quartz-iodine lamps), strengthening the shoulder, adding a ventilation system, stripping and cleaning the inside surface, repairing and replacing the stairs, adding a new elevator, adding a new mezzanine level and shoring up the internal support system using stainless steel. All replacement copper will be pre-patinized in an acid bath to match Liberty's beautiful patina finish.

Surprisingly enough, the most exposed part, the 3/32" thick copper skin, is in the best shape and has weathered beautifully; and so, with

all her repairs Miss Liberty will look much the same.

As with the original project it is a joint effort between French and American architects and engineers; and, as in the beginning, the project will be totally financed by the public. Original cost: \$400,000 for France, \$250,000 for America for the pedestal base. Total height: 305 ft. Address for donations: Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation, 101 Park Avenue, New York, New York 10178.

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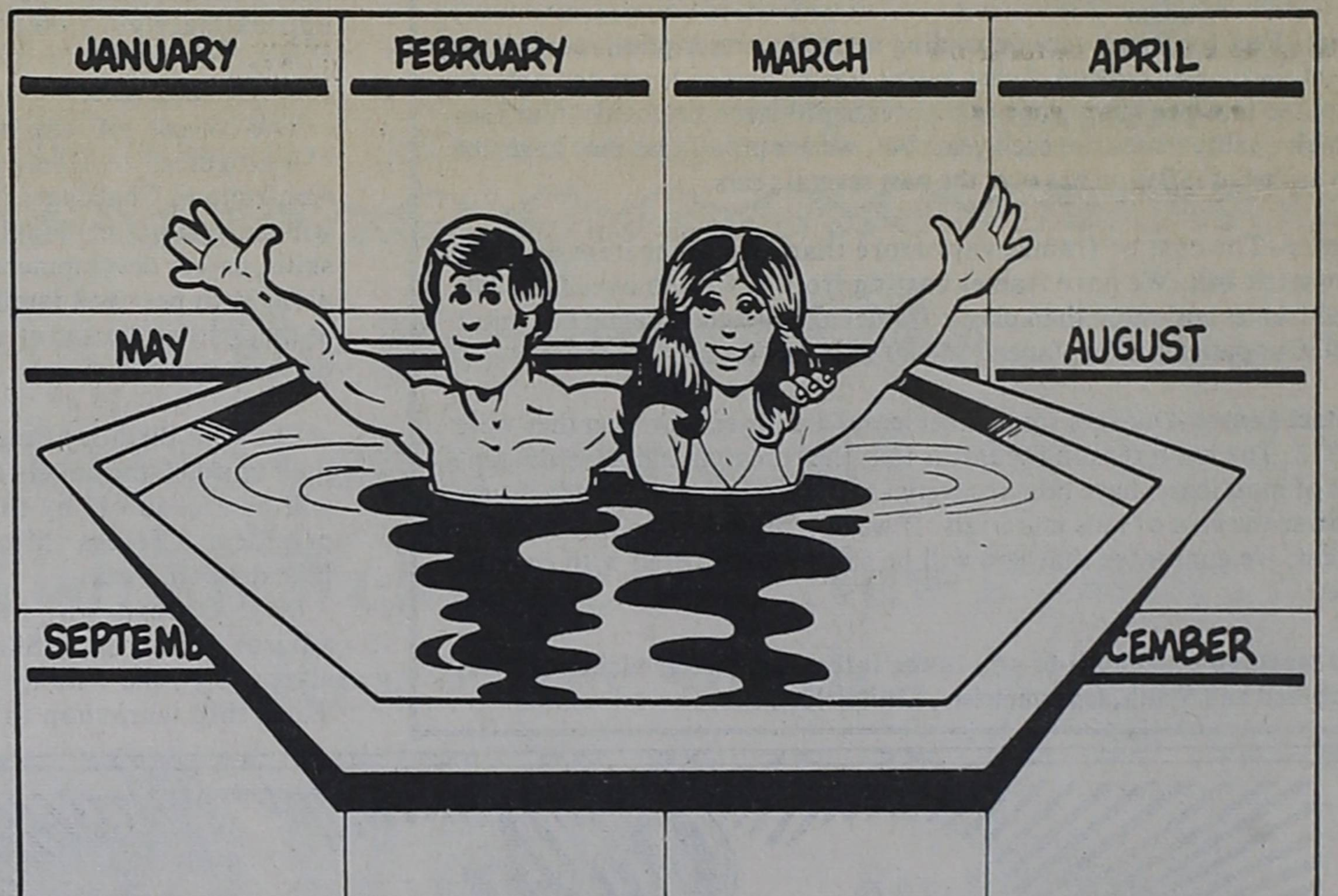
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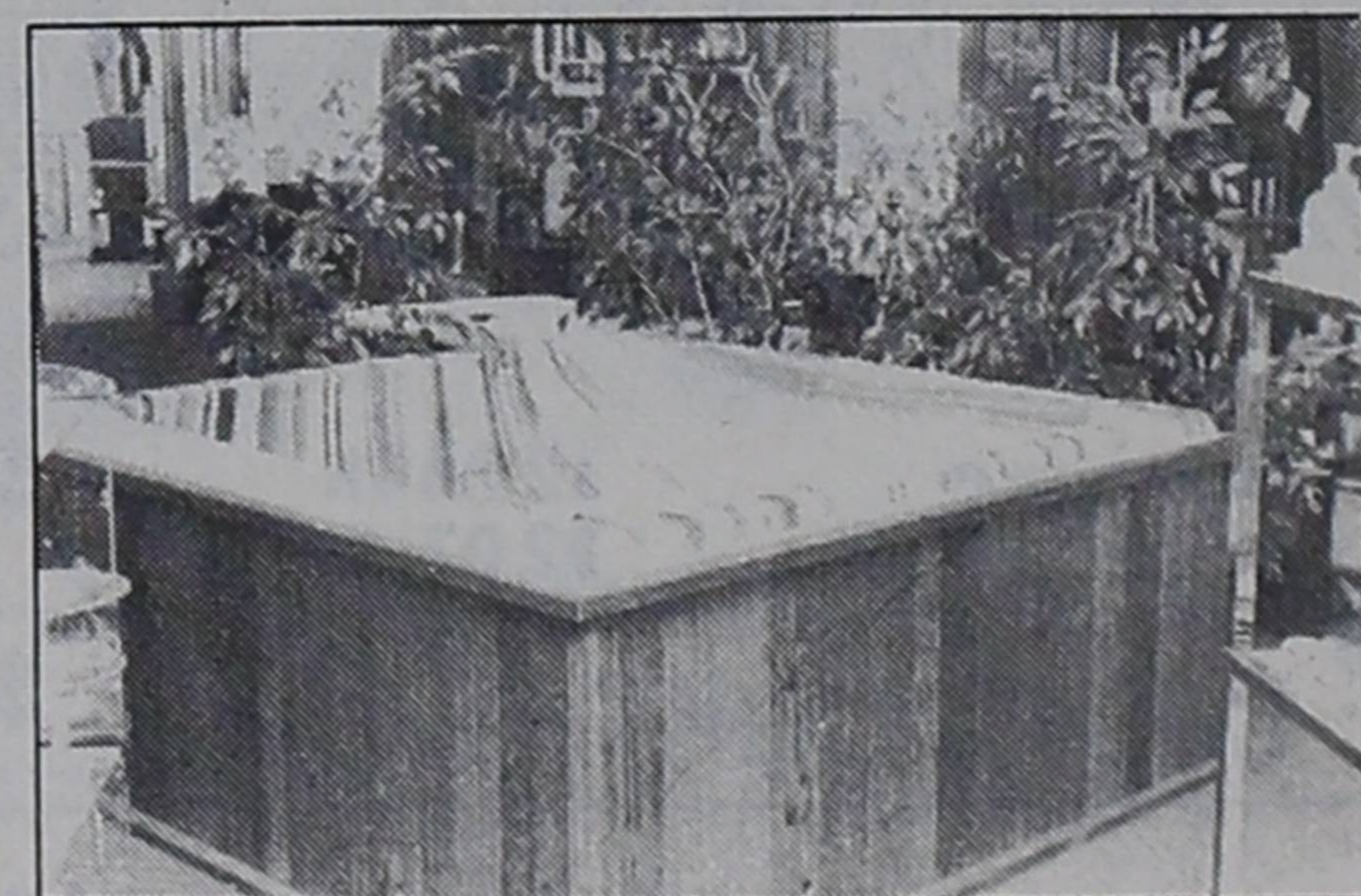
