SCHOOL OFFICIALS across this part of the country are up in arms about a proposal which the state's schools may be threatened with: that of extending the school day to nine hours per day.

A subcommittee of the Texas Select Committee on Public Education has recommended that the public school day start at 8:30 a.m. and end at 5:30 p.m. each week day. Governor Mark White has given tentative approval to the proposal.

The rural areas of the state, in particular, are dead-set against the proposal. Farm families need their youngsters for chores at the end of the school day. If the nine-hour school day comes to pass, kids would not get home until dark most months of the year, especially when you add school bus time, every morning and evening.

Businessmen who depend on part-time workers after school hours also would be affected.

School administrators from this area gathered in Bushland on Monday for a meeting with State Senator Bill Sarpalius, who wanted to "sound out" the administrators, who are against the proposal, almost to a man.

Sarpalius says his telephone virtually has not quit ringing since the news first came out in regard to lengthening the school day.

Sarpalius says he is in favor of stronger educational requirements, but doubts that extending the length of the school day would improve our educational facilities.

And, from what some school officials have heard about the proposal, adding the extra time that children would spend in school would not necessarily mean that much additional instructional time.

Rumor has it that particularly in the lower grades, the schools might be asked to act mainly as "Day Care Facilities" for the extra two or three hours that the children would be at school.

Some have said they would be in favor of extending the school year, or the number of days students attend school each year, rather than extending the length of the school day.

Apparently, Ross Perot or some other "experts" have mistaken "quality" and "quantity."

You could keep students at school 24 hours every day, but if the incentive, and the potential for learning is not there, then it's just a waste of time.

Legislators expect that the extended school day may be on the agenda for a special session of the Texas Legislature, which may be called for later in the year.

If you are opposed to the ridiculous ideas being offered up for education, which would almost certainly place an additional tax demand upon already-strained school districts, then it might be a good idea for you to contact your state representative, senator and Governor Mark White.

Perhaps if voters make enough noise, the officials will drop this zany proposition, before the "movers and shakers" have a chance to spring it.

County Barrow Title Reclaimed

A 13-year-old 4-H youngster from Lazbuddie exhibited the Grand Champion Barrow at the 37th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show Thursday, reclaiming the honors for her community in the division of the show once totally dominated by Lazbuddie exhibitors.

Thursday was somewhat different, however, since Susan Redwine's Hampshire win was the only breed champion captured by her school.

Friona area entries captured four breed champion trophies and Farwell had two.

But when barrow judge congratulated Susan Redwine as having the winning barrow in the 1984 show, that allowed Lazbuddie entries to claim its 23rd barrow title in the show's 37-year history and 20th in the past 24 years.

Beth's mother's family, the Seatons, have won nine barrow show titles in Parmer County.

Reserve champion honors went to a barrow that had a substitute showman. The animal was owned by Beth Johnson, who exhibited last year's grand champion of the show. It was shown by Kemal Tongate, since Miss Johnson had sustained a broken ankle in a recent auto accident.

The reserve champion barrow was also a Hampshire, as the show's top two animals came from the same class and breed division.

Hampshire barrows have now won ten banners in the county show since 1948. Duroc is second with eight and crossbred animals have won seven titles.

Winning breed champion trophies, and showing their animals during the "grand champion drive" were Clint Hurst, Friona 4-H youngster, who exhibited both the Duroc and Spotted Poland China winners; Terri Loafman, Friona, Chester White breed champ, and Melanie Gallman, Friona, crossbred winner.

Other breed champions were exhibited by Eric Williams of Farwell, Berkshire and Darren Haseloff, Farwell, Yorkshire.

Jim McManigal, judge of the barrow show, congratulated the youngsters on their fine projects, and complimented the quality of the animals. McManigal is known for taking his time, and giving every entry in every class equal time.

In the sheep show, held Friday morning, Terry Moore, Bovina FFA member, made it two consecutive years by capturing Grand Champion honors. Moore guided his Suffolk light heavyweight class winner to the show's top award.

Sheldon Mason of Lazbuddie won the reserve champion honors in the show with his mediumweight Suffolk.

Other breed champion honors went to Wendy Jarman, Lazbuddie, fine wool; Mark Clayton, Bovina, fine wool cross; Terry Moore, Hampshire; Gavin Ellis, Friona, Southdown; and Jennifer Smith, Friona, "other breeds and crosses."

In the first-ever county goat show, Greg Salyer of Friona exhibited the grand champion, from the mediumweight class, and Sheldon Mason of Lazbuddie had the reserve champion, from the heavyweight class. Twenty-one animals were entered in the show.

Aside from a strong north wind on Thursday, the 1984 show has been blessed with much better than average weather, beating by far last year's snow and ice.

(The helper and steer show results will be given next week. These events were held after the Star's press time on Friday.)

Entertainment will be provided by the Clovis Senior Citizens Kitchen Band.

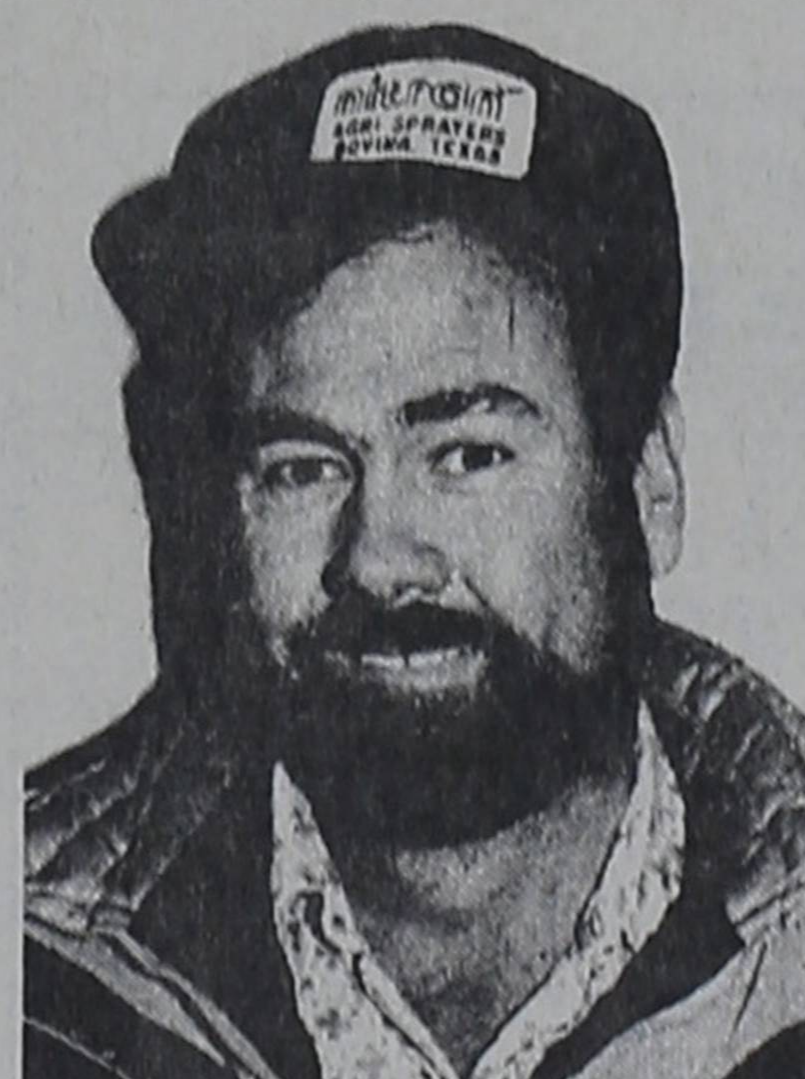

Robert White, 39, a longtime resident of Farwell, authorized the Friona Star to announce the candidacy for the Commissioner's Court, Precinct 3.

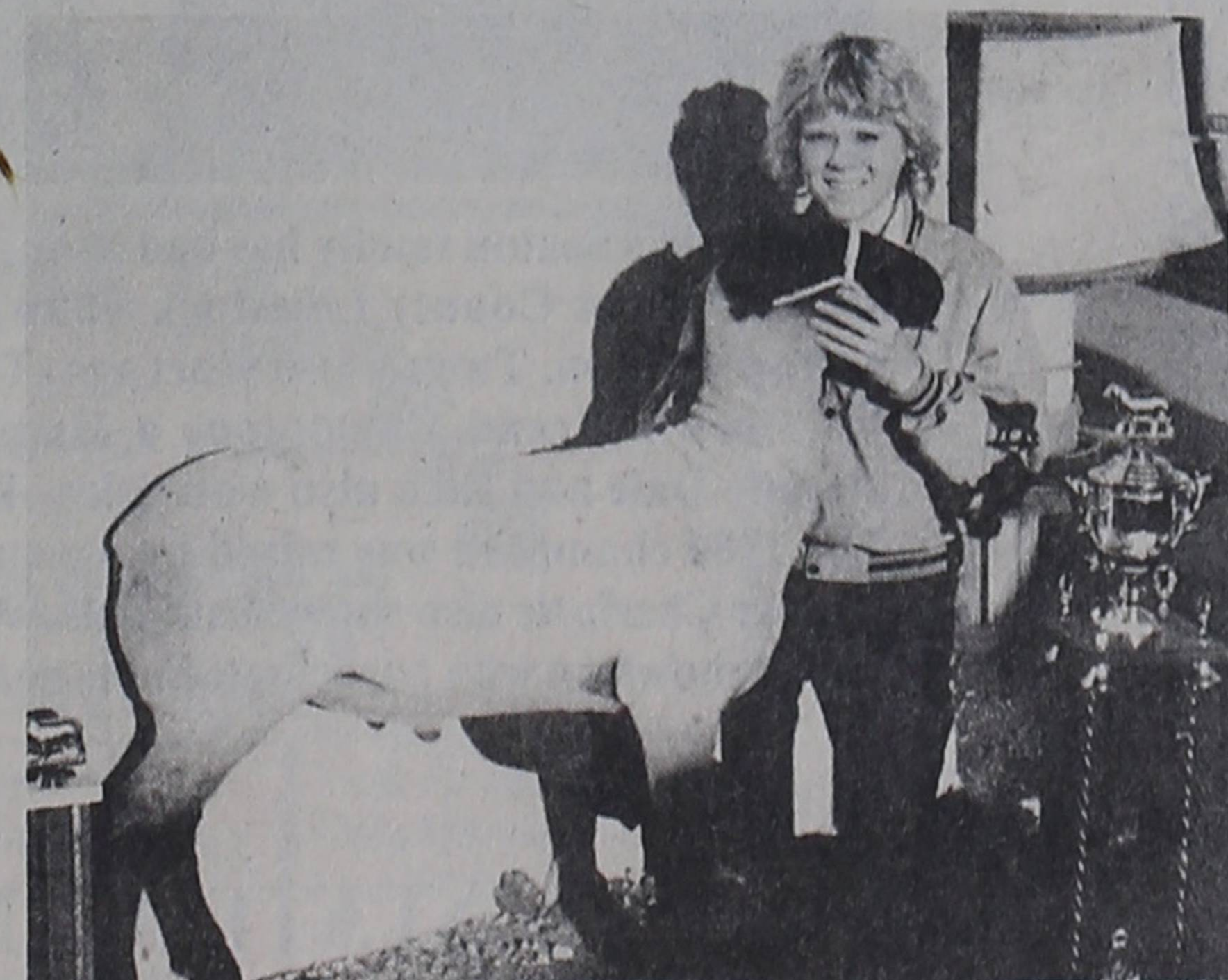

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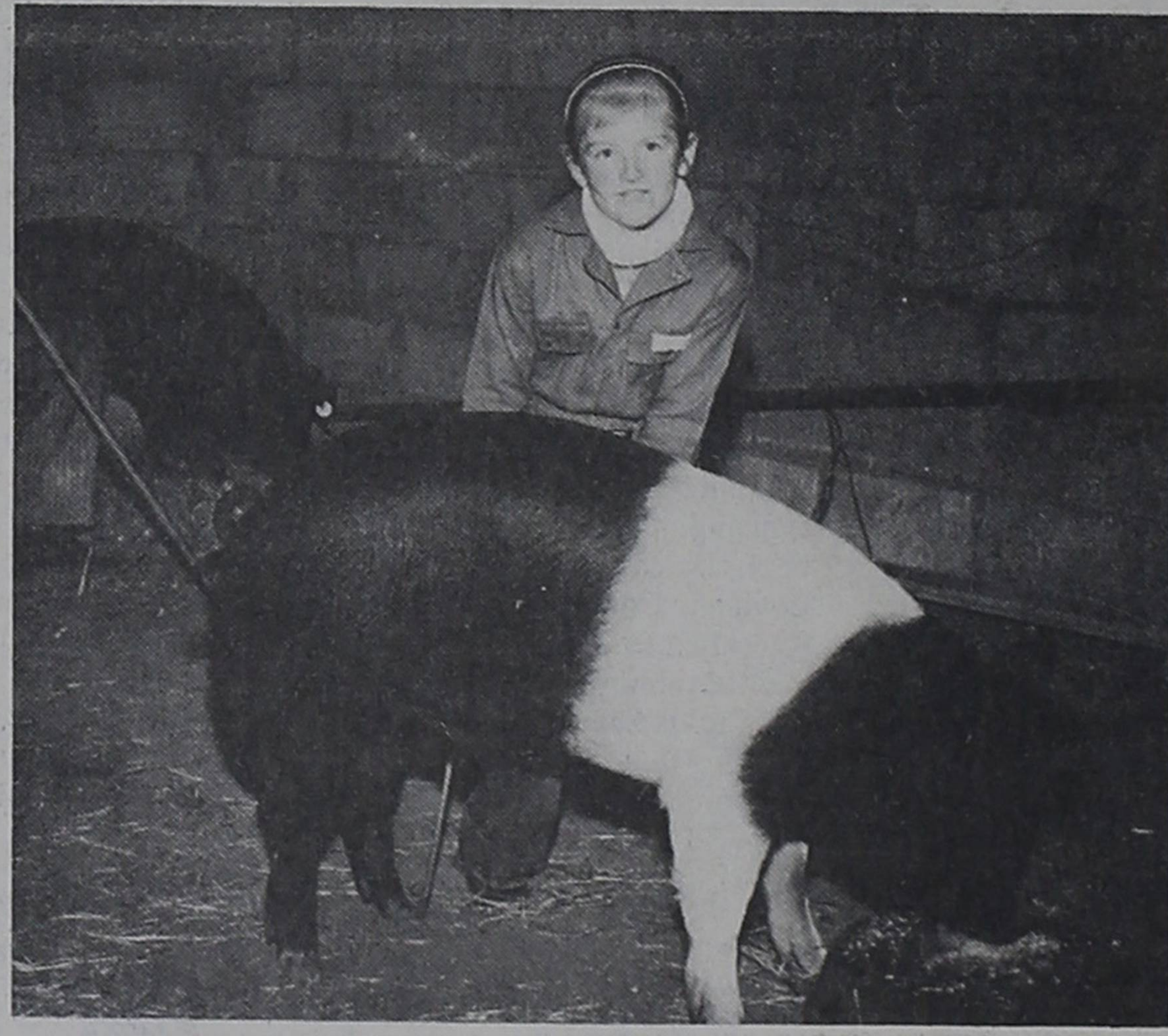

Just for good measure, Charlie Morgan tossed in 12 points, all from the field.

Friona led throughout the game, but never by a comfortable margin. The Chiefs held quarter leads of 20-18, 34-30 and 49-46.

But unlike so many times earlier, they held together for a good finish, outscoring the home team, 25-24 in the final quarter.

The point total tied Friona's high for the season, as the Chiefs gained a measure of revenge. When the two teams met here January 13 in the district opener, Tulia had a hot-shooting night, and won the game, 78-62.

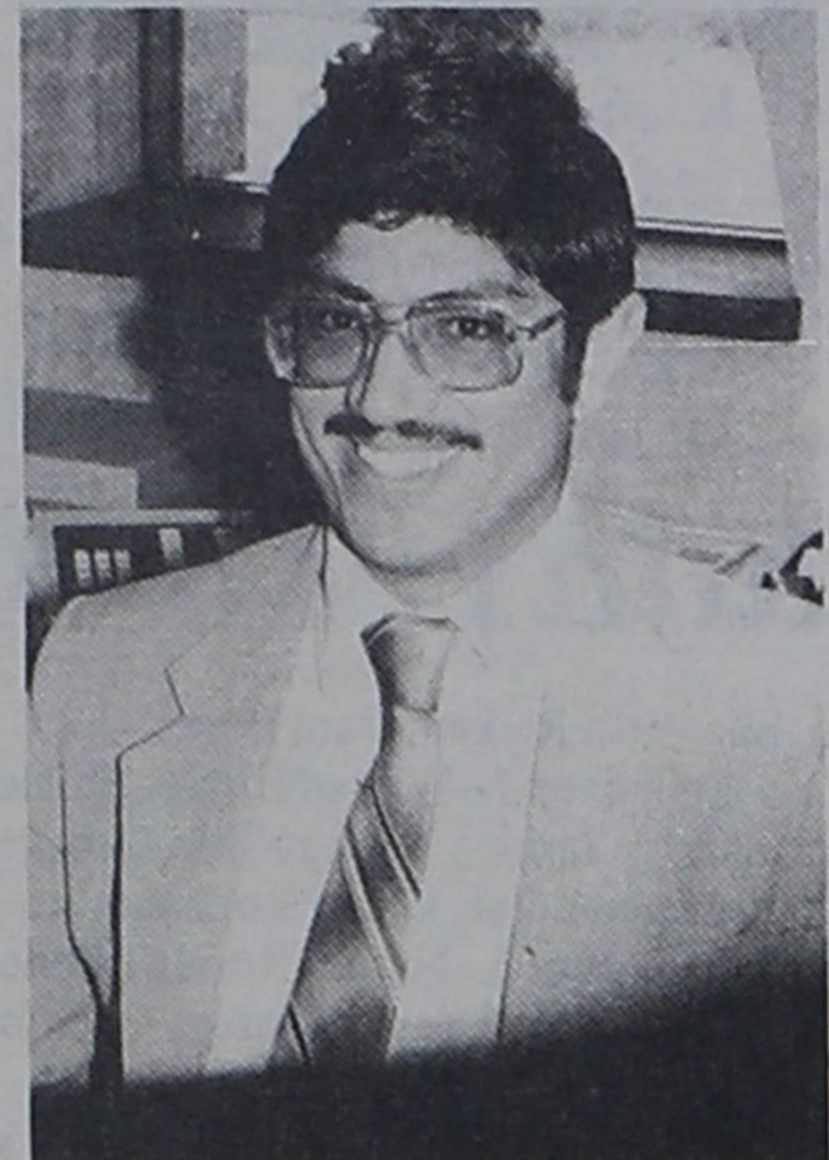
Joe Mejia started employment with Friona State Bank in February, 1974 as a part-time bookkeeper under the

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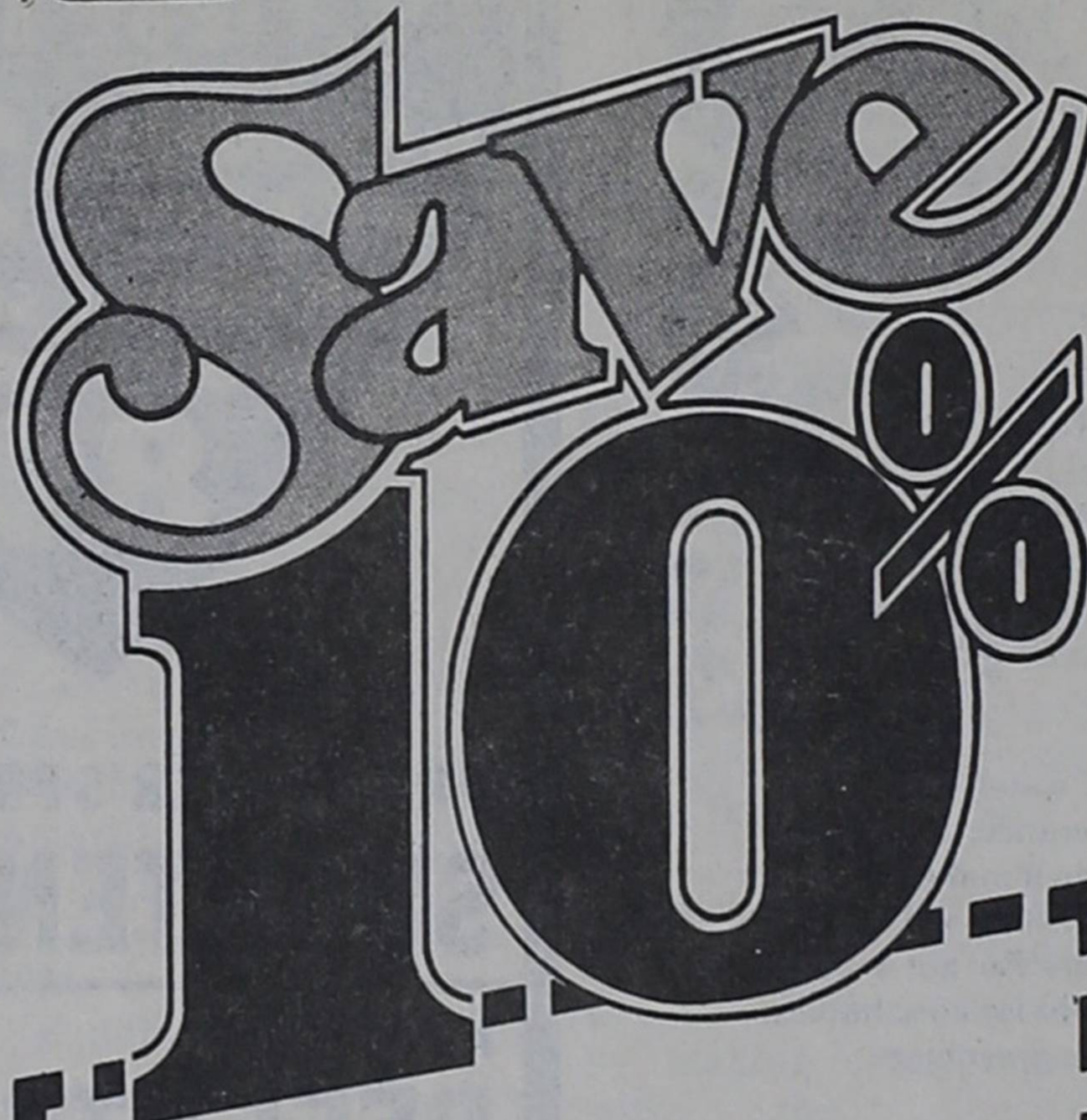
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Squaws Drop Two In District Play

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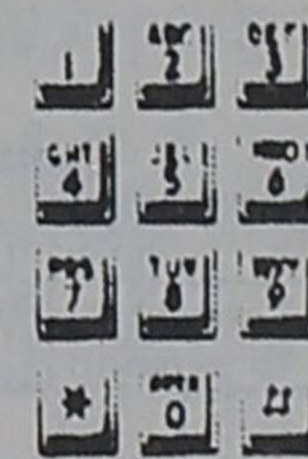
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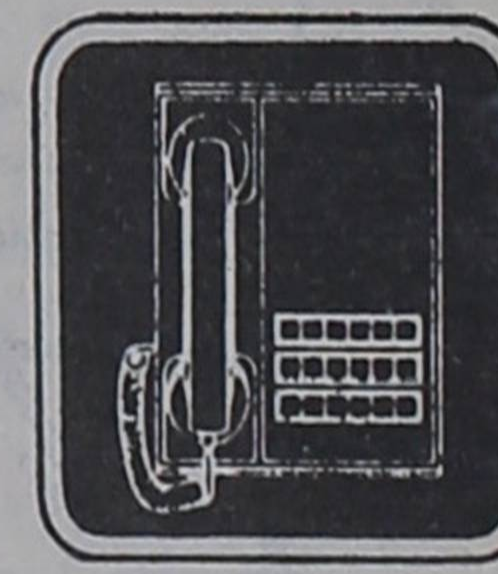


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Wendy Hinkle Honored As Top Student

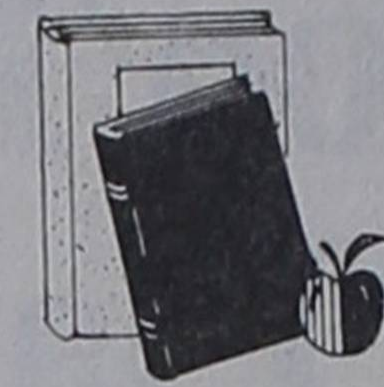

To begin the new year we circulated 1,464 items to 672 patrons and registered 18 new readers. Other statistics are Story Hour attendance: 34 children in 3 sessions; film viewing attendance 799; and interlibrary loan requests filled: 31. STATISTICS, STATISTICS, AND MORE STATISTICS! If you've ever wondered (as have we all) why we have to keep so many, there is meaning to the madness. We have just completed our annual report to the Texas State Library which is used to determine areas of priority, interest and need for state and federal funding. And, if any of you happened to notice the article in the *Amarillo Daily News* recently about per capita circulation figures of Amarillo Public Library, perhaps you would be interested in what the figure for our library would be.

Our circulation total for 1983 was 14,142 items circulated to a population of 3,809 for a ratio of 3.71 to 1 compared to Amarillo's 5.06 to 1 ratio. Our statistics do not reflect the 'items used but not checked out' statistic (which we will be keeping in 1984) as does Amarillo; nor does it reflect the population of Friona's surrounding rural area. What we check out interlibrary loan from Amarillo is reflected in both libraries' statistics, however. We currently hold 12,841 volumes in our collection.

We want to remind you that we do have IRS forms and booklets available including a reproducible set of hard-to-locate forms.

We received a \$125.00 donation for books from the Modern Study Club plus a \$75.00 donation to our general fund plus their Friends dues for the year. Organizational dues are \$25.00 per year and we do appreciate our generous-minded civic clubs who contribute in this way.

The book "Great Cars and Grand Marquess" has been donated to the library by Morton's Mob in memory of Dale Smith. A continuing subscription to the *American Heritage Magazine* has been donated by longtime friend and supporter, Hugh Moseley.

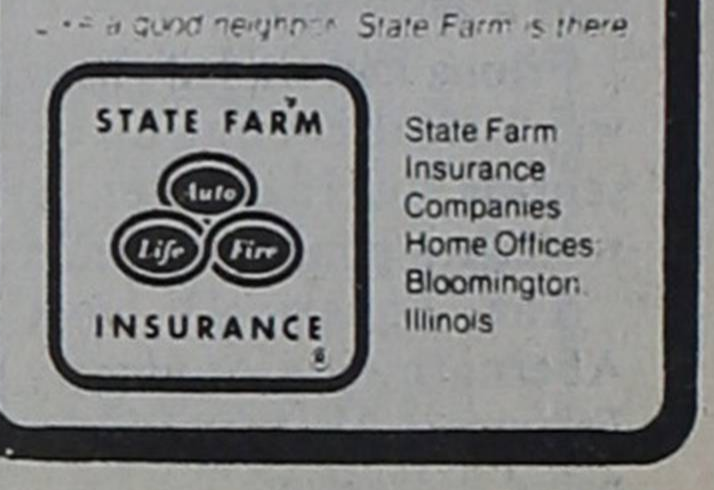

A proposed settlement to a class-action lawsuit has been reached by the parties in *Guzman, et. al., v. The Hereford Independent School District, et. al.*, CA 2-83-226, Northern District of Texas, Amarillo Division. A class, defined as all Mexican-American voters residing in the Hereford Independent School

District and all Mexican-American persons who in the future will become eligible to vote in elections for members of the Board of Trustees of the Hereford Independent School District, has been certified by the Court.

The proposed settlement adopts a new method of electing Board of Trustees members for the Hereford Independent School District. Five members will be elected from single member districts with only the registered voters of each district

voting for the candidates running from that district; candidates for these seats must live in the district they seek to represent. Two members will be elected at-large with every registered voter of the Hereford Independent School District able to vote for the two seats; candidates for these two seats may live anywhere in the Hereford Independent School District. A map of the districts is set out below. District II and the two at-large seats will be up for election in the April, 1984 election.

Any member of the above defined class who objects to this plan may file such objection in writing, stating specifically the reason for the objection, with the Honorable Mary Lou Robinson, United States District Judge, Northern District of Texas, P.O. Box F-12340, Amarillo, Texas 79189. Any such objection must be received by the Court no later than February 29, 1984. As the Court may hold a hearing on any objection so filed, anyone filing an objection should be prepared to present their objection in open Court.

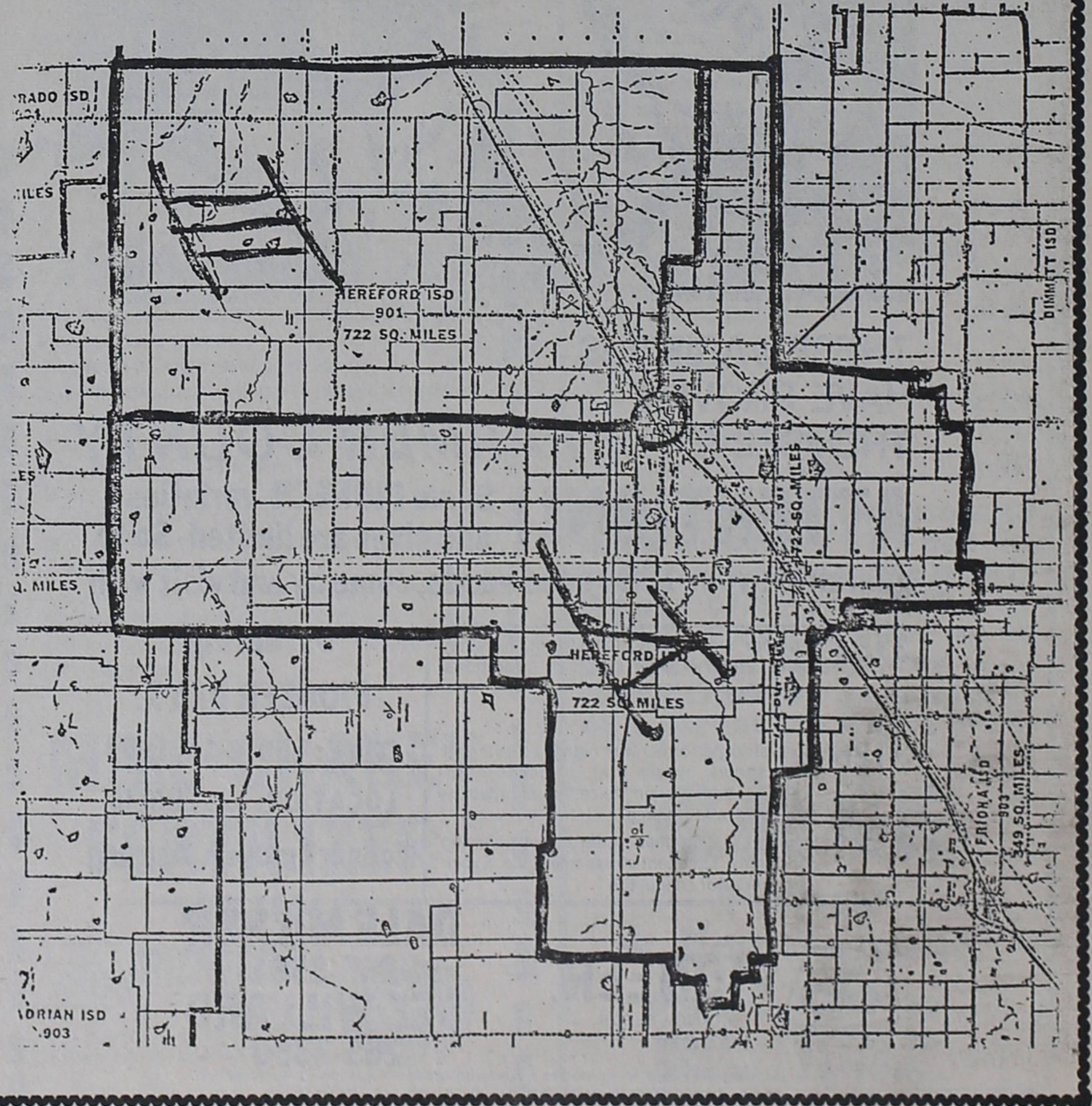
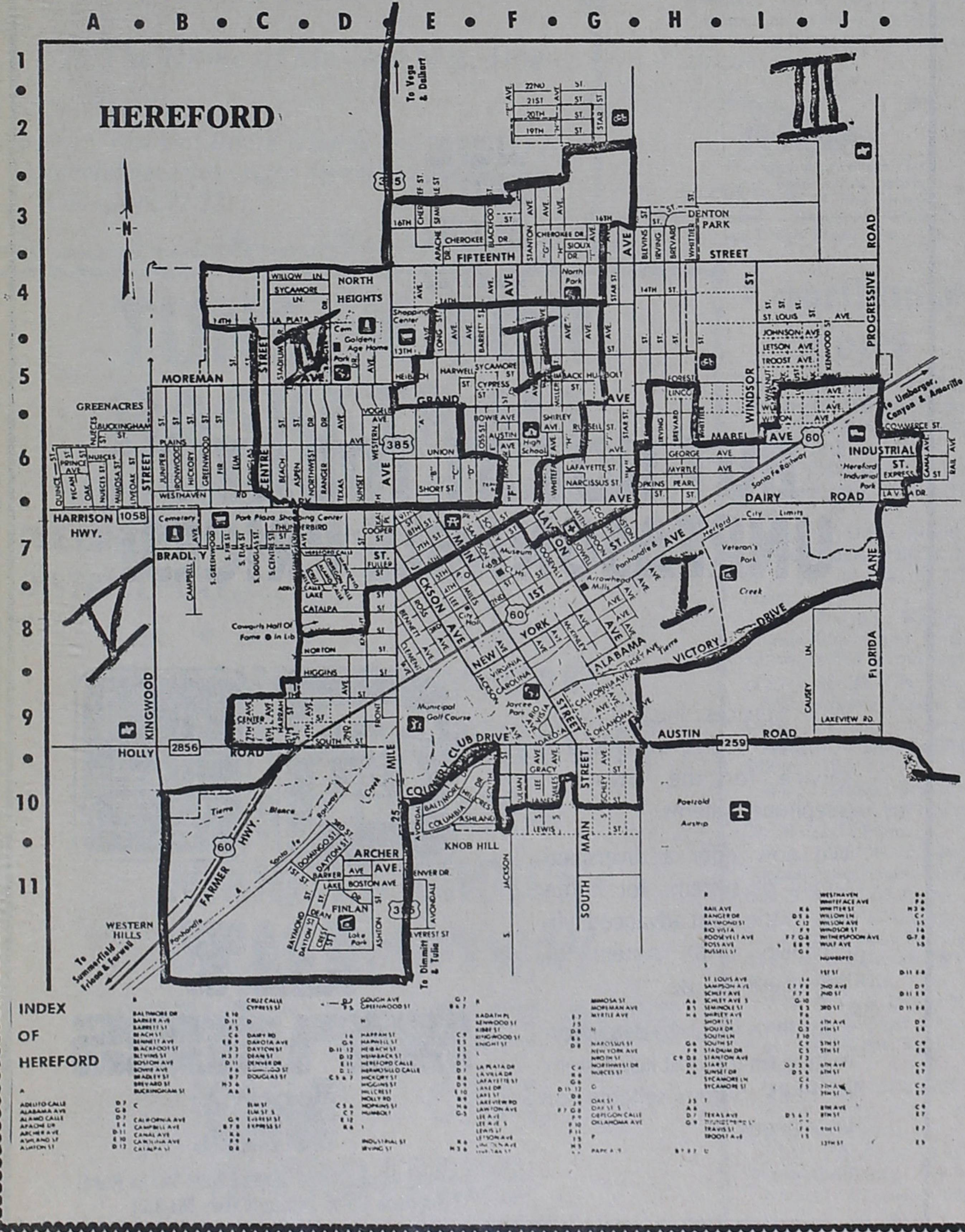

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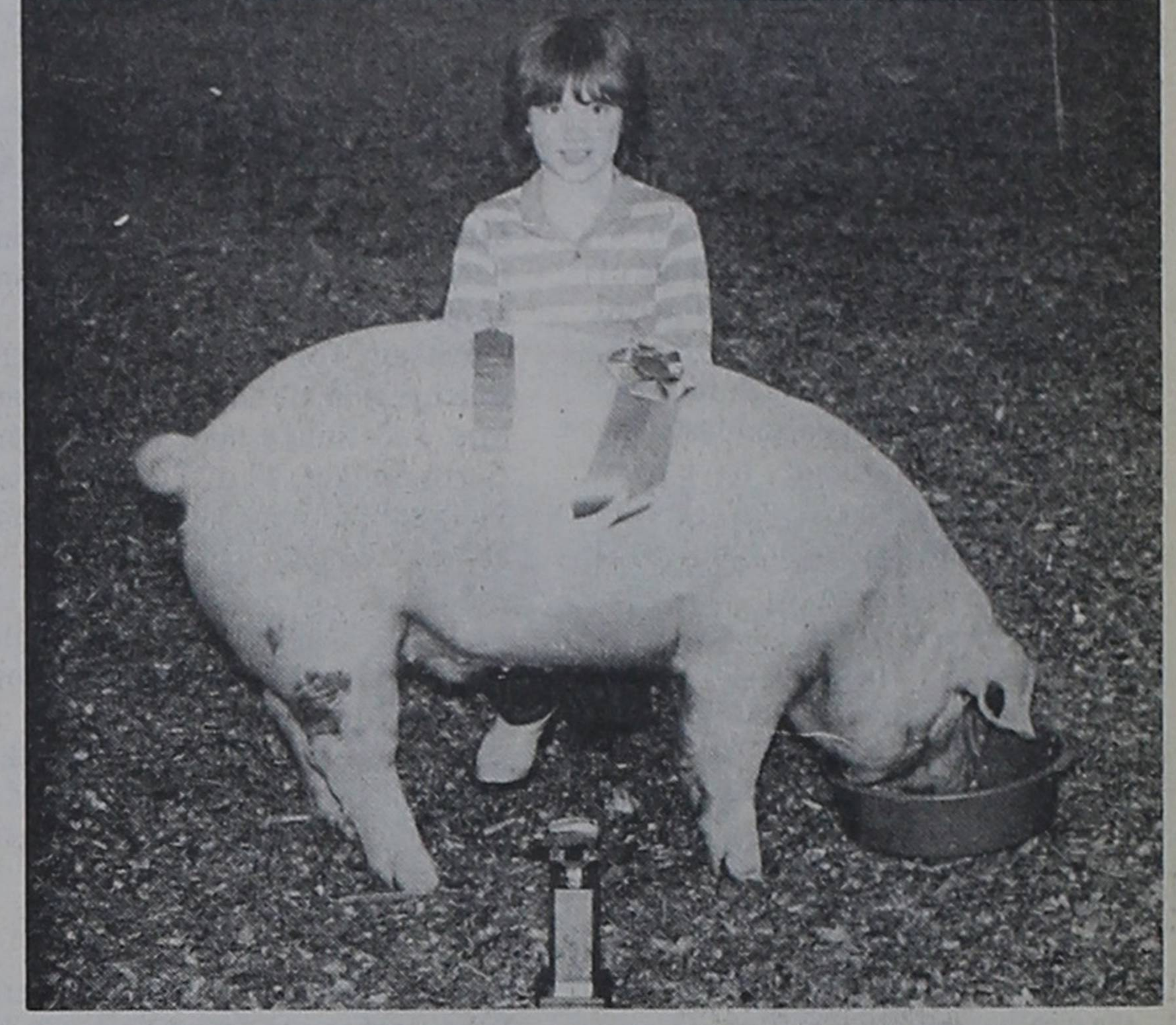

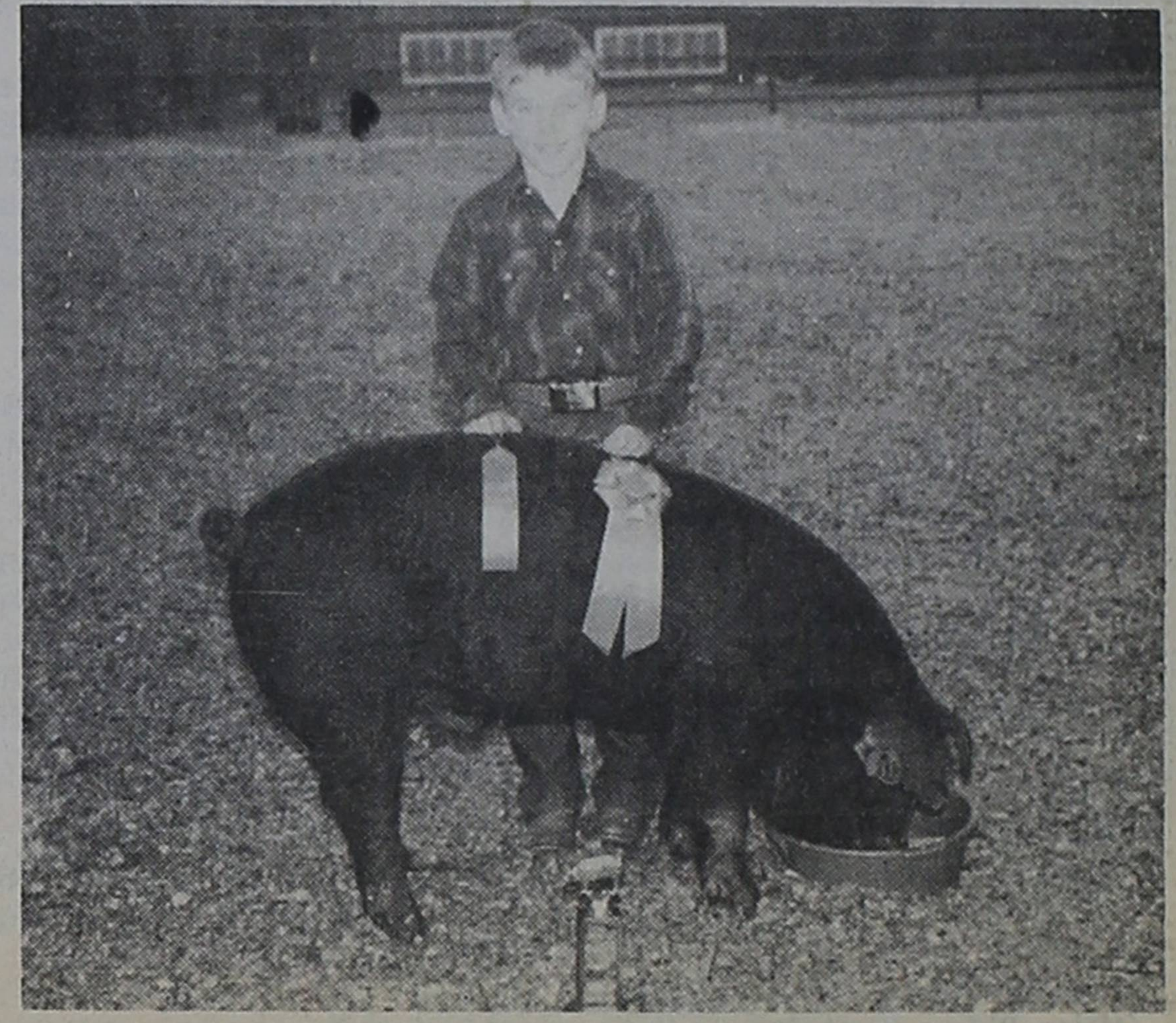
