IF YOU HAVE NOT had a service call from the telephone company lately, it could be that you need to know some of the new policies which have sprung up as part of the recent "deregulation" of telephone companies.

Last year, the Public Utilities Commission, in approving a smaller rate increase than General Telephone Company was asking, gave blanket approval for sweeping changes by the telephone company in its rate structure for service calls.

If you report a telephone out of order, the receptionist at the business office will tell you something like "I am required to inform you that if the trouble turns out to be in the wiring of your telephone, there will be a minimum charge of \$17."

Previously, the telephone company serviced its 'phones, on which the customers were paying a monthly lease, at no charge to the customer. Now, if they come into your home or place of business, there will probably be a charge of at least \$17.

Not only that, but the telephone company has a proposal before the PUC which would permit General Telephone Company to charge up to \$25 per jack for replacing faulty wires in a telephone. If the jack itself has to be replaced, this is an additional charge.

A service call for a telephone user could run as much as \$77 per visit, if the proposal is passed by the PUC on May 19.

If you can unplug your telephone and bring it by one of the service centers which the company has established, it won't cost you anything to have a faulty telephone repaired. Being able to unplug the 'phone may then be the only problem, as only the newer style telephones are designed to unplug from the jack.

If you have a telephone that you have purchased and are using on your system, the telephone repairman will work on this type of 'phone at the same charge system as noted above.

If you refuse to let the repairman work on a telephone, preferring to do it yourself, this is well and good, but the company can disconnect you in the meantime, and then charge you an additional \$20 to reconnect.

The charges mentioned here, along with the past year's rate increase, were approved by the Public Utilities Commission.

Many observers feel that with the advent of "deregulation," that "consumers' rights" have gone downhill in a hurry, and may continue to do so.

There is currently a further rate increase request before the PUC, and telephone customers are destined to be paying even higher rates for some of their service in the future.

Earlier, GTE began charging customers \$1.20 per month (residential) and \$3.25 (business) for the use of Extended Area Service (EAS), such as from Friona to Hub and Parmer exchanges. Previously, customers had free use of the service.

"As long as the telephone company continues to answer their service calls and can prove they are taking care of their customers, these increases probably will continue," said one city official this week.

With the pricing system by the telephone company in a constant state of flux, some feel that in the future, telephone customers may be required to pay a portion of their long distance charges (even if they are on the General Telephone system) to Southwestern Bell, or other systems over whose equipment their calls travel.

Under this type of arrangement, it is conceivable that 'phone customers might be receiving two or three different statements each month.

One thing telephone users can do to help fight the constant increase in 'phone rates is to report instances of repeated irregularities to their city officials. Or customers might write their congressman if they feel the service pricing has become more of a burden than one should expect.

Controversy Boils As Police Chief Selected

A turn of events following the naming of a new Chief of Police for Friona saw the resignation of the assistant chief, Rex Williams, and the acting chief, Mark Asher on Wednesday of this week.

Already short-handed by virtue of the fact that the force needed a Chief of Police and a patrolman, the action left the city with only one full-time certified police officer plus another who will complete his certification in a week.

The new chief will be William D. (Bill) Thieman, Jr., 36, who is currently director of the Criminal Justice Program at the Clovis Campus of Eastern New Mexico University.

Thieman served as a U.S. Army military policeman from October,

1968 through May of 1970. From June, 1970 to April, 1971, he was chief investigator for Montgomery Ward & Co. in Kansas City.

The new chief served as a patrolman at Lexington, Missouri and Odessa, Missouri from May, 1971 through August, 1974. He was an instructor in law enforcement at Des Moines, N.M. Community College from 1974 through 1979, and has held his present position since 1979.

Thieman holds a B.S. in law enforcement and psychology and an M.S. in Criminal Justice Administration from Central Missouri State University.

As of Thursday morning, the only members of the city's patrolman crew were Lloyd Niece, who has been employed by the Friona Police Department about three months, and Steve Jones, who is completing his certification work in Amarillo.

However, City Manager Jerry Lewis said that a patrolman was hired on Thursday, and then, after the news story was aired on Channel 7 Thursday evening, he received a couple more promising applications for patrolman.

"I think I can get one good patrolman as the result of that contact, and if so, we'll be back to four full-time officers, which is where we were before all this," he said.

Lewis also said that with members of the Reserve Peace Officer crew filling in on patrol duty, the citizens were getting good protection, since the reserves get the same training as certified officers. "Also, we have plugged a gap which existed from 5 a.m. to 7 or 7:30 a.m., to give true 24-hour police protection," he added.

The new Chief of Police will not be able to move onto the scene until June 1 "or thereabouts."

The three finalists in the running for the Chief of Police's position were interviewed by the City Council on Monday, and Lewis was left with the job of naming the new chief.

One of the finalists was Asher, a member of the local department with eight years law enforcement experience, including three years as Chief of Police at Clarksville.

Asher had been named by Lewis as Acting Chief of Police about a week earlier.

It was pointed out that the man chosen as the new chief is not a Texas certified police officer.

"I regret quitting without giving notice, as I have never done that before. However, I felt that if I wasn't qualified to be Chief of Police, then I shouldn't be considered qualified to run things while the new man goes through the academy and becomes certified," Asher said.

"I really enjoyed working in Friona. It's a fine community, and I would like to have made it my home," he continued.

Williams had also originally applied for the chief's position, but later told Lewis he wasn't interested in the job. Williams has been on the local force since 1980, and has served as assistant chief.

"We've been trying to get some help for the department, and have been working seven days a week. Jerry told us we had to hire a certified officer, then he goes out and hires a non-certified man for Chief. I hate to quit due to the people of Friona, but had taken all I wanted to," he said.

The former members of the force felt that longtime Chief of Police Bill Denney had been forced into his resignation due to a personality conflict with the city manager.

55 YEARS AGO--MAY 18, 1928

45 YEARS AGO--MAY 20, 1938

Ray Landrum, proprietor of the Regal Theatre, is offering reduced rates to the public during this week, making it 15 cents for adults and 10 cents for children, and Ray has an unusually good program of pictures on for this week, too.

40 YEARS AGO--MAY 21, 1943

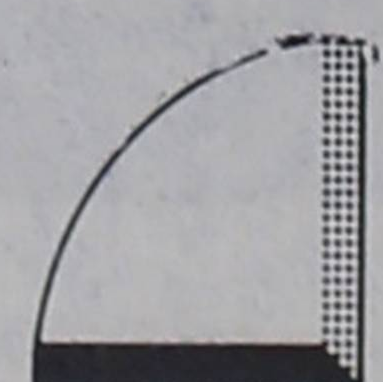

SPS Employees Get Promotions

Two longtime Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) employees have been named chief engineers and added to the SPS management committee.

James B. Matthews of 3713 Teckla, Amarillo, and W.T. Seitz of 6009 Hanson, Amarillo, were promoted May 1.

Matthews was named chief engineer, generation plant design and construction. He had been group manager of the generation plant design group at SPS since March 1978.

Seitz became chief engineer, general engineering. He had been general engineering group manager since March 1978.

The two join fifteen others on the SPS management committee.

Southwestern Public Service is a publicly traded utility company that primarily provides electrical power to more than one million people in a nearly 70,000-square-mile area in the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, the Oklahoma Panhandle and southwestern Kansas.

The company is one of two in the United States whose power generation plants are designed completely by in-house engineers who also oversee turnkey construction of the generation plants.

Matthews is a native of Vera, Okla. He attended Shidler, Okla. schools and was graduated from the Edmond, Okla. high school. He attended Central State College at Edmond, and received a bachelor of science in mechanical engineering in 1949 from Oklahoma State University at Stillwater.

Matthews joined SPS in August 1949 as a maintenance mechanic's helper and auxiliary operator at the Moore County, Texas power plant. He became Moore County Plant engineer in 1950, and was assistant plant manager from 1951 until 1957. In 1957, Matthews was made plant manager at the Cunningham Station near Hobbs, New Mexico.

He was a project engineer, consultant for SPS from 1968 until 1972, when he was named chief engineer, generation plant design, a position he held until 1974. He was manager of engineering, generation plant design, from May 1974 until March 1978.

Matthews is a registered professional engineer in Texas, and a member of the Texas Society of Professional Engineers, the National Society of Professional Engineers, and the American Society of Mechanical Engineers.

He served in the United States Air Force as a pilot from 1942 to 1946, attaining the rank of captain.

Matthews and his wife Betty Jane have four children, Susan, Sallie, Marc and Paul.

Seitz was born at Mobeetie, Texas. He received a bachelor of science in electrical engineering in 1951 from Texas Tech University at Lubbock.

He joined Southwestern Public Service in June 1951 as a junior engineer, and was promoted to engineer in March 1954. In January 1956 he became a power sales engineer, in 1965 senior design engineer, and in 1968 senior operations engineer. He was named division superintendent in 1973; in May 1974, he became manager, planning, a position he held until March 1978.

He is a registered professional engineer in Texas, and is a past chairman of the Texas Panhandle chapter of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers.

Seitz is a member of First Baptist Church, Amarillo, and is a past board member of the Amarillo YMCA.

Seitz served in the Army Air Corps from 1943 through 1945.

He and his wife Mary have two children, Dwayne and Paula.

Excell Opening Boxed Beef Plant

Excell Corporation announced Thursday it will begin operating a new boxed beef fabrication plant adjacent to its modern facilities in Dodge City, Kansas on Monday, May 16.

When fully operational in December, the new boxed beef plant will employ 600 workers in two shifts, and process 3,800 cattle carcasses daily into vacuum-sealed beef, trimmed of excess fat and bone, said William G. Fielding, president of Excell.

At that time, Excell's Dodge City employment will be about 1,100, he said. The fabrication plant currently employs about 300 people in a single shift, and the slaughter plant has about 500 employees.

"To be a major, competitive factor in beef processing today, slaughter and fabrication facilities have to be adjacent to one another and located near the cattle supply. The new fabrication plant in Dodge City enables us to serve customers more efficiently and to bid more competitively for cattle. The new plant's location also fulfills a commitment Excell made to the community when we dedicated our slaughter facility in March of 1980," Fielding said.

He said the new facility will provide jobs for about 300 to 350 residents of the Dodge City area. Fielding said 180 of the 450 workers expected by the company's decision to eliminate the second shift at its Wichita fabrication plant have transferred to Dodge City. In addition, spouses of 50 transferred workers will be employed at the new fabrication plant.

Prior to the opening of the Dodge City plant, all cattle slaughtered there were shipped to Wichita for fabrication.

Excell announced in March that it would eliminate 450 jobs at the Wichita plant when the new Dodge City boxed beef plant began operation.

The Wichita fabrication plant now employs 500 workers to process specialty beef products. The 220,000-square foot Dodge City fabrication

plant features advanced automation and computerization in its processing system, which make it one of the most modern and efficient in the industry, Fielding said.

State-of-the-art technology in the plant's storage and shipping department include computerized robotics that automatically shelf and ship boxed beef after it has been properly chilled. The plant has storage capacity for 3,000,000 pounds of boxed beef at one time.

Boxed beef processing techniques developed in the 1960s take about 45 minutes to turn beef carcasses into vacuum-filled beef portions, trimmed of excess fat and bone. Those portions are shipped more efficiently and economically in cardboard boxes than hanging beef carcasses.

Today, more than 70 per cent of the beef purchased by consumers arrives at supermarket beef departments in boxed beef form. Supermarket butchers then open the vacuum packages and slice the beef into retail cuts.

USDA Gets PIK Grain

The U.S. Department of Agriculture today announced it had arranged to acquire approximately 735 million bushels of corn, 145 million bushels (81 million hundredweight) of sorghum and 210 million bushels of wheat to satisfy payment-in-kind (PIK) program needs.

On March 29, USDA invited farmers with these commodities under Commodity Credit Corporation loan to submit bids during the period April 4-15.

Deputy Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng said USDA accepted all bids which did not request more than 20 per cent of compensation in like grain.

In addition, he said, for 1981 and older crops of wheat, bids between 20 and 25 per cent were accepted to help meet program needs. Since reserve entry price levels for these crops of wheat were significantly lower than the current level, the higher per cent of compensation paid is cost-effective, Lyng said.

Farmers offered approximately 1 billion bushels of corn, 205 million bushels (115 million hundredweight)

of sorghum and 340 million bushels of wheat, Lyng said.

"We accepted sufficient quantities of corn and sorghum to meet our expected needs," Lyng said, "but an insufficient amount of wheat."

"USDA will exercise its previously announced option of requiring some wheat producers to obtain CCC loans on their 1983-crop wheat to satisfy the remainder of its PIK program needs."

Fay Pinckley was born in Merkel, Texas, where she grew up. She was the sixth of seven children of the late Mr. and Mrs. J.S. Pinckley. She and three of her sisters, who have all retired, followed in the footsteps of their mother. Mrs. Pinckley and four of her five daughters graduated from North Texas State University, Denton, and taught for many years.

Miss Pinckley's first teaching position was in the Perryton, Texas public school system. At the end of her fourth year as a fifth and sixth grade social studies and music teacher, she married the high school principal, Hadley Reeve, son of the

Floyd, a 1962 FHS graduate and a 1966 graduate of West Texas State University, Canyon, and his wife, the former Betty Drake, and three daughters, Debbie, Denae and Becky, live southeast of town. Floyd is a farmer and Betty is a registered nurse. She's also a 1962 graduate of Friona High School.

Sharon graduated from FHS in 1963 and from McMurry College, Abilene, in 1966. She also holds a master's degree from West Texas State University, Canyon.

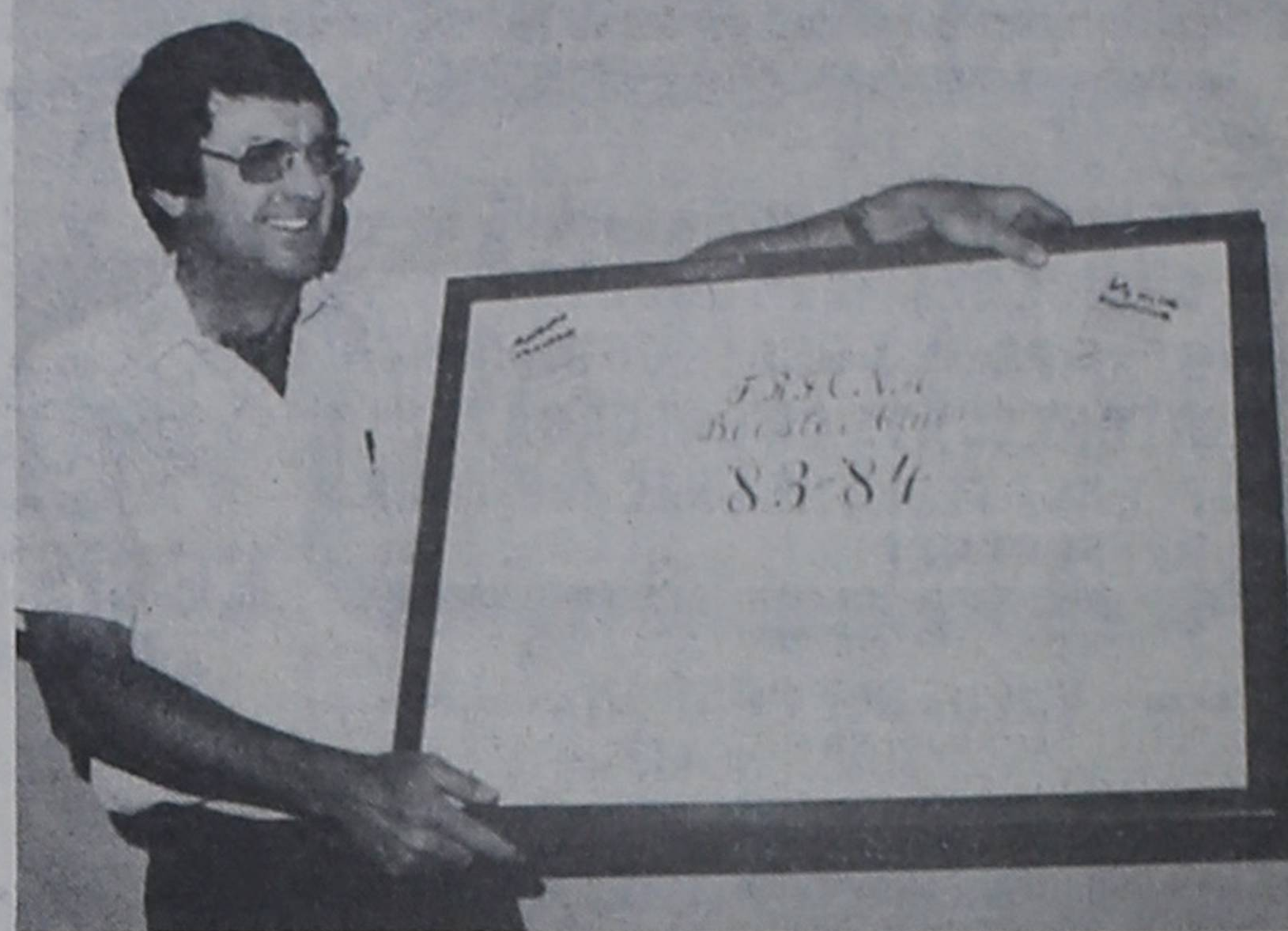
She's a member of Modern Study Club and Delta Kappa Gamma and has held offices in each organization.
