Star Lites

HOW LONG HAS IT been since you could sleep with a window open during a November night? Or better yet, during an entire week of them?

What an unusually mild week or two the area has enjoyed. After experiencing one of the earliest freezes on record (September 21), it now looks as though Mother Nature's fickle personality might let the area go two additional months before another killing freeze.

Someone remarked to this writer the day or two after the early freeze that in all likelihood, we might just go another two months without another freeze. We thought at the time the remark was mainly in jest, but it will at least come close to that prediction.

The mild fall, one of the mildest in recent years, has allowed harvest operations to move almost uninterrupted. Except for the nice rain the area received the week of October 17, outside activities have not been seriously limited.

The corn harvest is just a memory for farmers, and the harvest of other crops is well underway. We see trucks of sugar beets and carrots headed toward Hereford, or in the case of the beets, toward Friona's Holly Sugar dump station.

Cotton was the crop most affected by the early freeze, as it could have surely used the additional time for maturity and extra yield. Harvesting of the area's cotton crop is just getting underway, and as usual, this will be the latest crop "finishing up."

OUR CONGRATULATIONS to the Friona Chieftains on a very fine football season. Like most of their fans, yours truly suffered along with the team in their 9-3 loss to Muleshoe last Friday, mainly in the way the loss came about.

In reality, the Chieftains should have been going into Friday's regular season finale against Littlefield with a playoff position clinched, but such was not the case.

Last Friday's bitter loss to the Mules is one of the hardest-luck sports losses we can recall in which the Chieftains were involved. It probably ran a close second to the 1975 FHS basketball team's triple-overtime loss to Dimmitt in the district playoffs, when Dimmitt went on to win the state championship.

It's probably little consolation, but we want the 1983 Chieftains to know that we think they're one of the best football teams to represent Friona High School in the past 20 years.

And, if they don't make the playoffs it will be a shame for a team with this much talent to be watching from the sidelines. Sports are supposed to be a reflection of how things are in real life, and it's true that they can make the participants aware that life has its share of bitter disappointments.

But this group of guys deserved at least one more celebration before their disappointment.

AN ELECTION will be held on Tuesday. It's one that is vitally important to a number of the state's residents, yet one in which only a smattering of them will take part.

This year's general election offers voters 11 proposals to change their state constitution. Many voters shy away from this type of election, but they should take part.

We have examined the proposals, and unlike most times, each proposition has some merit. Voters would not go too far wrong in approving each of the 11 proposals. Each one seems designed to correct a "wrong" in our system.

CONGRATULATIONS TO the Friona Young Homemakers and to other local clubs and club members on the local Halloween Carnival last Monday.

The event was well-attended by local residents, with scores of young spooks attending the event.

The booths were imaginative, and for a first-time effort, was very fine. Hopefully, it will become an annual affair.

Poll Places Given For Tues. Vote

Voters will be asked to give their approval or disapproval on eleven proposed constitutional amendments in next Tuesday's general election.

Although the group of proposals contains some law changes which would benefit a great many people, the voter turnout is expected to be very light.

In fact, County Clerk Bonnie Warren said this week that only three absentee votes had been cast in the entire county. This included the regular period at the court house as well as three days in Friona.

Friona farm leader A.W. (Dub) Anthony urged voters to vote in favor of Proposition 3, which would allow farmers a method of promoting their products through research and advertising. "An article appeared in the Austin newspaper this week which said that most farmers were opposed to this amendment, and this is definitely not the case. If that causes many big-city voters to go against the proposal, we may have trouble approving it," Anthony said.

School leaders are urging voters to approve Proposition 5, which would assure a reduction of interest costs to taxpayers on future school bond issues. Friona Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe gives further details on his interpretation of the amendment in a letter on Page 2 of this issue.

Many officials have also come out in favor of Proposition 6, which would help collect child support payments which are legally due.

A complete list of the proposals is presented on Page 8 of this issue, courtesy of Friona State Bank.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Tuesday.

Commissioners Table Bids

Parmer County Commissioners, in their regular meeting Monday, October 24, opened bids which had been sought for a new motorgrader for Precinct 4, but took no action on the bids pending further study.

The court is weighing the prospect of an outright cash purchase versus a lease-purchase agreement, to see which would better benefit the county.

Permission was granted a company to conduct a vibroseis survey on county school land in Gaines County.

A motion was passed for the court to go on record in favor of proposed Amendment 6, for enforcement of court-ordered child support payments.

An easement was granted the Five Area Telephone Cooperative to install buried telephone lines in Parmer County.

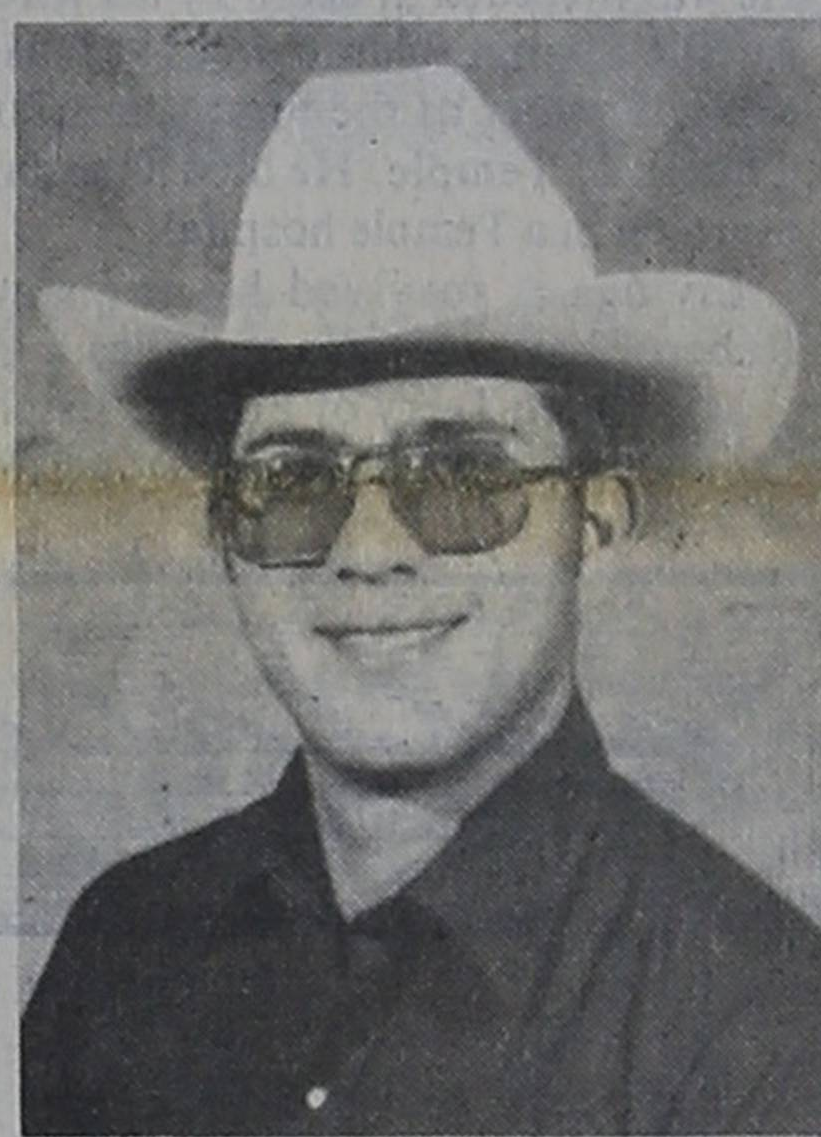
At the suggestion of Benna Felts, county treasurer, a motion was passed to reinvest money from three certificates of deposit maturing October 31, as follows: \$100,000 from the general fund; \$100,000 from the farm-to-market fund and \$170,000 in right-of-way funds. The new CDs will mature November 22, 1983, and will allow the funds to earn income prior to the time they are to be disbursed.

A motion was passed appointing Paula Wilson as presiding judge for voting box 2-2 in Friona.

Soil conservation work was approved on the farms of Danny Black, L.J. Fowler, A.L. Glasscock and Kim Rundell. Work is to be done when county machinery is not otherwise needed, with the county to be reimbursed.

S. Ralston Resigns As County Agt.

Seth Ralston, who has served as Parmer County Extension Agent since 1978, has tendered his resignation to the Parmer County Commissioners effective December 1.

On that date, Ralston will become CEA in Castro County.

Ralston has been especially active in 4-H project work on a county-wide basis, and has had an active role each year in the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show.

Commissioners are currently seeking a replacement for Ralston.

A native of Spearman, Ralston graduated from Spearman High School, and attended college at Clarendon College and Texas A&M. He graduated Cum Laude from A&M in 1976 with a B.S. in Agricultural Education.

He is a member of Alpha Zeta and he received a Distinguished Student Certificate for Academic Excellence at A&M.

Ralston is currently working on his master's degree at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, N.M.

He served as Castro County's first Assistant County Extension Agent from May of 1976 to May of 1978.

He was promoted to County Extension Agent in Parmer County in 1978 and has served here since.

Ralston is a member of the Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church in Farwell, and has served on the Administrative Board and as Sunday School teacher.

He is a member of the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association and director-at-large of West Texas Pork Producers. He also is a member of the Farwell Development Corporation.

Ralston and his wife, Anita, have two children, Danna, eleven, and Wesley, six.

United Way Kicks Off On Monday

Friona's 1983 United Way Campaign will hold its kickoff luncheon at 12 noon on Monday, November 7 at the Girl Scout House.

Dr. Winfred Moore of Amarillo, noted civic leader, will be the speaker for the kickoff luncheon. He has been a United Way worker in Amarillo for a number of years.

Dr. Moore, longtime pastor of Amarillo's First Baptist Church, was just this past week named president of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, meeting in Amarillo.

The goal for Friona's 1983 United Way Campaign is \$12,460, which is a slight increase over the 1982 goal.

Kathryn Goddard and Archie Echols are co-chairmen of the campaign this year. The pace setters and rural workers have been working on the United Way for the past several weeks.

Scores Dive In Contest

A rash of upsets in the high school and professional ranks caused scores to nose-dive in the Friona Star's Football Contest in the contest's ninth week.

Somehow, one contestant, Bill Carter of DeLeon, managed a score of 16, and claimed the weekly first prize of \$10.00.

No one else even had 15 games picked right, and for second and third prizes, the scores of 14 had to be consulted.

Mike and Mary Jo Leonard of Canadian took second and third place, respectively, on the basis of their tie-breaker scores. Mike missed the Friona-Muleshoe score by seven points. He picked the score Friona 10, Muleshoe 9 (which really should have been the score). Mary Jo Leonard missed the score by ten points, picking Friona, 7-3.

Thus, the three weekly cash prizes went to out-of-town contestants. This is the first time this has happened in the contest, at least in a number of years.

Two other contestants, Jackie Morgan and Billy Espinoza, had scores of 14. Morgan missed by 20 on the score and Espinoza by 11.

Contestants correctly picking 13 games were Rick Castaneda of Hereford, Jim Beard, Bobby Drake, Eddie Mann of San Angelo and Tommy Moss.

A number of the contestants missed all eight of the pro games.

Chiefs Hoping For Miracles

The Friona Chieftains went into their Friday night game with Littlefield clinging to a thread of hope for making the playoffs. But at least a little hope is better than none.

After dropping their 9-3 heart-breaker loss to Muleshoe last week in a game in which Friona could have clinched a playoff spot, the team was hoping for a round of miracles.

Miracle number one would be upsetting the potent Wildcats, last year's class AAA state finalists and top-rated during the course of this season.

Miracle number two would be getting an assist from Tullia, which would have to beat Muleshoe and hand the Mules their second district loss.

Miracle number three then, would be winning a three-way coin toss between themselves, Muleshoe and Tullia for the playoff spot.

If the team can survive the first two pre-requisites, they would already feel like Las Vegas veterans. And besides, Coach Tommy Moss still has the 50-cent piece he used to win last year's Friona-Muleshoe-Dimmitt tie-breaker.

The Chieftains were expected to be in good physical condition for the game. Rudy Bermea was slowed somewhat with his ankle injury, and Harvey Lafuente had a sore shoulder, but both were expected to play.

NEW TEAMS ADDED

Changes Given For District Alignment

Friona's already tough District 2-AAA was made even tougher, according to school officials, with the semi-annual re-alignment of districts, announced this past weekend by the University Interscholastic League (UIL).

Abernathy, a member of the district for the past two years, drops out of the district due to enrollment. Moving into the district for the next two years are Idalou and Floydada.

The new district alignment is composed of Dimmitt, Friona, Idalou, Floydada, Muleshoe, Littlefield and Tullia. The seven-team district created some scheduling problems, causing an open date to fall each week of district play.

This factor caused five of the seven district teams to have to go with a nine-game schedule. Friona and Dimmitt drew open dates during the first two weeks of district play, and were able to fill them, giving these two teams the regular ten-game schedule.

A number of district coaches, notably Jerry Blakely of Littlefield, were adamantly opposed to the odd-number of teams in the district, which created the scheduling limitations.

Coach Tommy Moss announced that to complete the 1984 schedule, non-district games have been lined up with River Road, Boys Ranch, Bovina and Morton. Due to the larger

district, the conference schedule begins on the fourth week of the season, rather than on the sixth week, as it has for the past several years.

Longtime county rival Farwell also dropped in classification, into conference A, where it will compete with the likes of Vega, Nazareth, Anton, Amherst, Lazbuddie, etc.

The Friona-Farwell series will be interrupted for only the second time since the 1930s. Once before, the Steers dropped into a six-man schedule (in the 1940s).

However, the Chiefs re-gained another county rivalry with neighboring Bovina, last met in football in 1973. Morton is a former district opponent, and also was last played in 1973.

Non-district opponents the past two seasons, Dalhart and Shallowater, will drop off the schedule.

Letter To The Editor

Dear Bill,
I would encourage the voters to cast a vote "For" Constitutional Amendment 5 on the November 8 ballot. This amendment will allow the Permanent School Fund and income from this fund to guarantee bonds issued in future year by school districts in the state. This guarantee could easily assure every district a Aaa or Aa bond rating, thus reducing interest costs to taxpayers on school buildings built in future years.

This amendment will in no way remove any local control from patrons in school districts. The voters in every school district will still determine whether or not to approve the issuance of bonds. IT will not cost money, but save tax money.

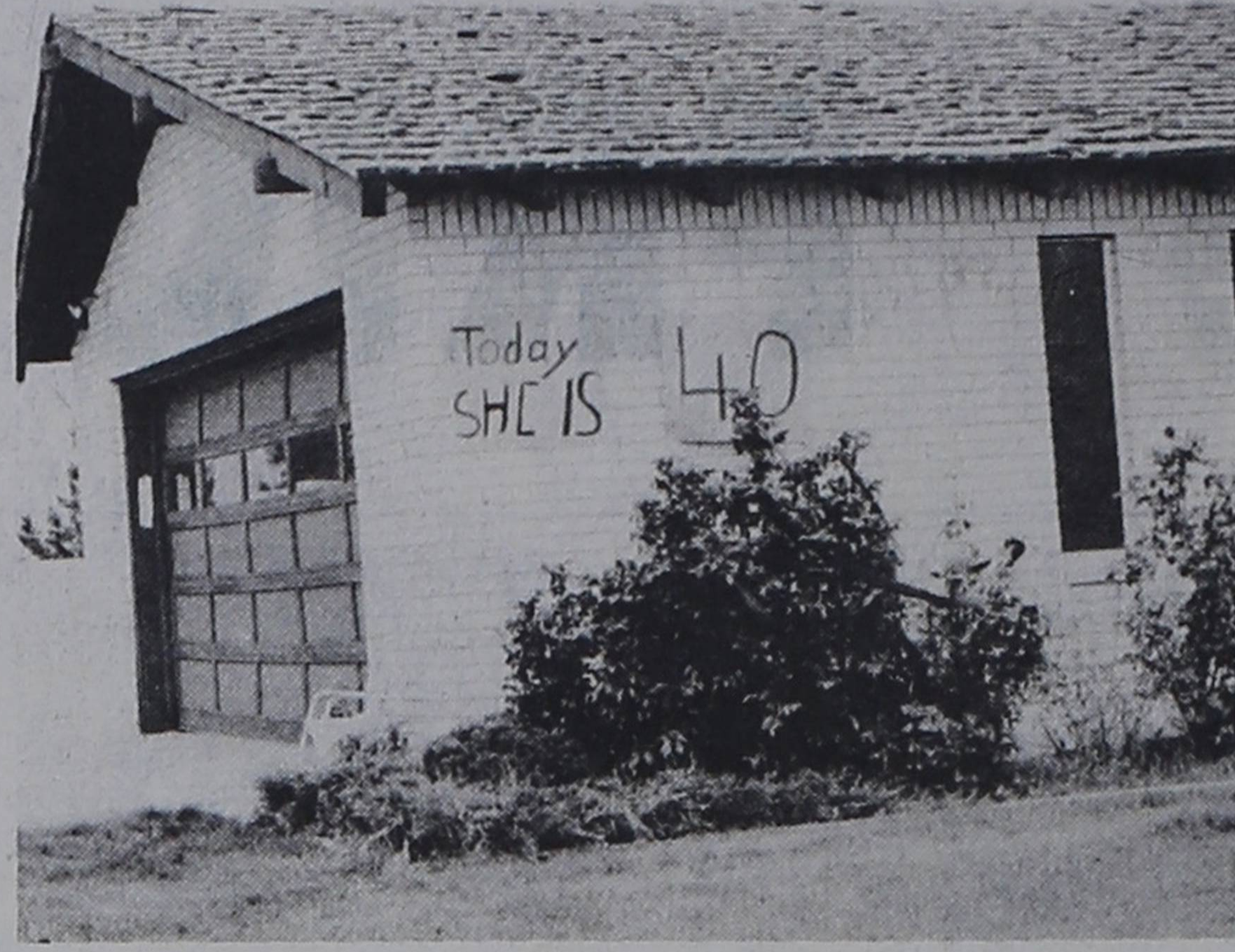
As an example of the savings, a \$1,000,000 bond issue for 15 years at current interest rates in a district with an A bond rating would cost about \$825,690 in interest. With the passage of amendment 5, there would be a saving of about \$79,250 if the district has a Aaa rating.

The Permanent School Fund was created by the 5th Legislature in 1854. The Fund was made a perpetual state trust fund by the Constitution of 1876. The present size of the Fund is about four billion dollars and the General Land Office has estimated that by year end 1989 the Fund will near nine and one-half billion. All interest and dividends generated from investments of the Fund flow immediately into the Available School Fund, from which money is distributed to the schools on a per capita basis. This will in no way change with the passage of amendment 5.

Should a school district default in payment, the amendment calls for payment of the defaulted payments from the Fund, but the defaulted payment would be recovered, along with any statutory interest, from first state monies payable to the school district. It should be noted that no Texas public school district has ever defaulted on any of its bonds.

It makes good sense that a savings to taxpayers throughout our state in future years can be insured without placing the Fund in jeopardy. I join with the elected officials serving on the State Board of Education in supporting the passage of Constitutional Amendment 5 on November 8.

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

Stanley Ellis Member Of Tech Band

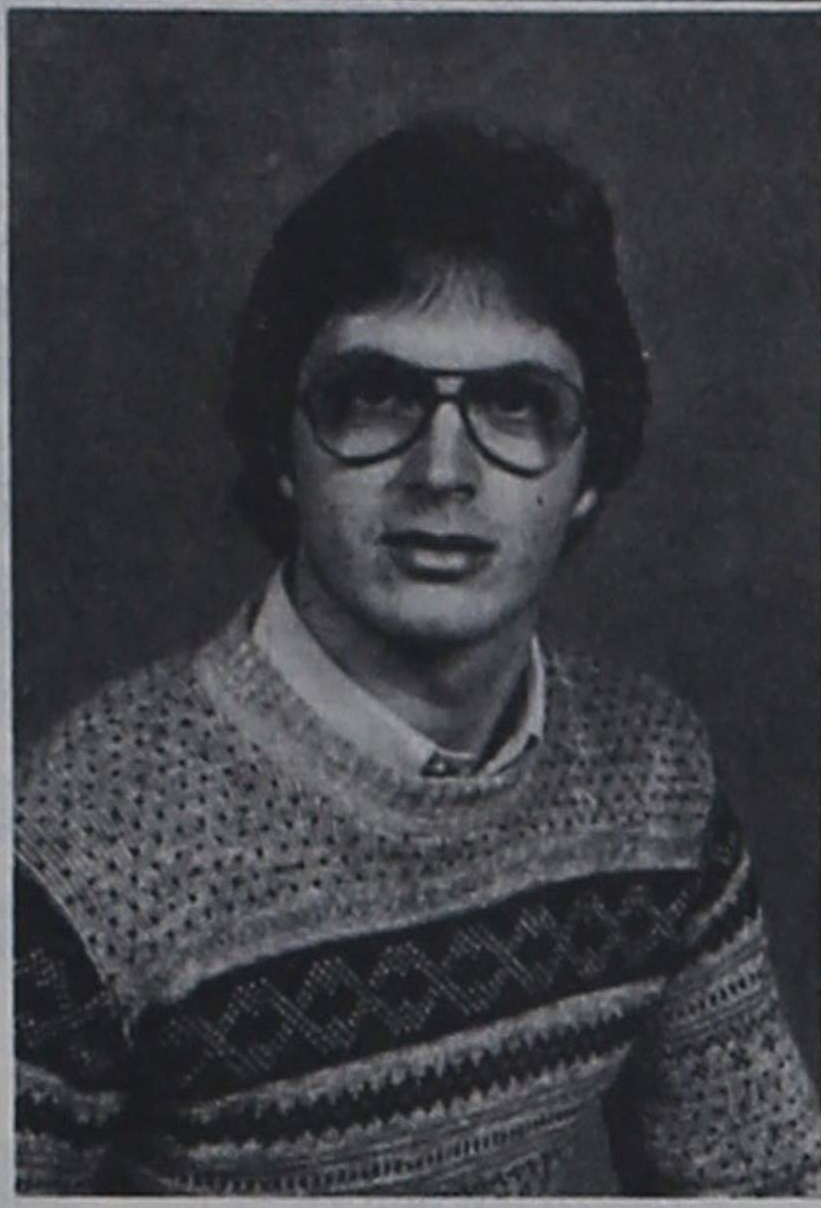

CONTROVERSIAL FLAG RUINS COMEBACK

Muleshoe Wins Defensive Struggle, 9-3

For a brief instant it appeared that the Friona Chiefs had snatched a thrilling victory from Muleshoe in the two teams' vital district game at Chieftain Field last Friday.

But alas, a penalty flag lay in the middle of the field after Charlie Morgan's pretty 20-yard run to

paydirt, and the score was nullified.

Had the run been allowed, and Doug Carthel kicked the point (he has been virtually perfect all season), the Chiefs would have claimed a 10-9 win. As it was, Muleshoe took a 9-3 win, and virtually nailed down the number two playoff spot in district.

The fact that the winning score was called back has been made even worse as Chieftain coaches and players reviewed the game film.

A holding call was the official's reason for bringing back the TD.

"We have looked at the film a hundred times, and none of our players were holding—particularly not the player they singled out. We just got beat out of the game by a bad call," said Chieftain coach Tommy Moss.

The penalty call nullified the climax of what had been an outstanding last-ditch drive by the Chieftains, after they had fallen behind for the first time in the game with 3:52 to play.

The TD scamper by Morgan should have climaxed a 73-yard drive in just seven plays, which used up only 2:40 of clock time.

But the yellow flag denied the Chiefs the opportunity to win the big district game, and most likely knocked them out of the playoffs, which would have been their second time in a row after an absence of 16 years in post-season play.

For the better part of four quarters, the Chieftains and the visiting Mules had battled like a pair of heavyweight boxers, both putting up their defense, but neither able to

deliver a "knockout punch."

The score was tied at the half, 3-3, and that score remained until Muleshoe used a fourth-period turnover to take the lead, which turned out to be the difference in the game.

The Chiefs had three early opportunities, but Muleshoe's stout defense denied them any points. Jose Sammarron recovered a Muleshoe fumble on the fourth play from scrimmage, giving Friona the ball at the Muleshoe 39.

However, three plays found the Chiefs back at the 41, and the team had to punt.

The Chiefs put together its first drive late in the opening quarter, going from their own 44 to the Muleshoe 24, where they faced fourth and one. Charlie Veazey's pass sailed over the receiver's head and Muleshoe took over.

On Muleshoe's series, Troy Crutchfield intercepted a pass, and was knocked out of bounds at the Mules' 21-yard line.

Three plays found Friona with another fourth and one situation at the eleven. Charlie Morgan dived, but was stopped short of the first down. Three good chances, but still no points.

But the team didn't give up. The Chiefs' stout defense held the Mules and forced a punt. Charlie Veazey fielded the punt at his own 45, and rambled to the Muleshoe 22. A clipping call moved the ball back to the 37.

Alfredo Mata raced 18 yards around left end to the 19 and a first

down. However, the next three plays gained nine yards, and Friona faced fourth and one for the third time, deep in Muleshoe territory.

This time Doug Carthel was called on to try a field goal, and his 28-yard kick split the uprights. Friona took a 3-0 lead with 5:22 remaining in the first half.

Muleshoe came out fighting. Mack Moton's diving catch of a pass was ruled good at the Friona 43, a big 37-yard gain. Another pass moved the ball to the 25, and Muleshoe was threatening for the first time.

However, after moving to the Friona ten, the Chieftain defense stiffened, and on fourth down the Mules had to settle for a field goal, which tied the score at 3-all, just 26 seconds ahead of the halftime gun.

Friona had a threat going in the third quarter, which ended on a weird set of circumstances. A pass, Veazey to Morgan, moved the ball to the Muleshoe 40 for a first down. Reese Fleming, Mata and Morgan combined for ten yards to the Muleshoe 30, and then the team got to the 22, seemingly on a serious drive.

But at this point adversity struck. A pitchout intended from Veazey to Mata went astray. Mata recovered for a 19-yard loss, back at the Muleshoe 41. Going from bad to worse, a low snap on fourth down caused punter Ricky Barnett to be tackled for a 15-yard loss. Friona had gone in two plays from the Muleshoe 22 back to their own 45.

The team survived this bad break, only to get another one, when Veazey's pass was intercepted by Muleshoe's big John Isaac, giving the Mules possession at the Friona 39.

This time, the Mules took it all the way, sparked by the running of Trent Hysinger (19), who got the touchdown from three yards out. The PAT kick was ruled wide, and Muleshoe had just a 9-3 lead with 3:52 left in the game.

Mata ripped off a 16-yard gain on first down, to the Mules' 43, and after Fleming gained five, Mata took off around left end for another 28 yards, almost breaking all the way. He finally was stopped at the Muleshoe 25.

Morgan lost a yard, but Mata gained six, setting up a third down and five situation from the Muleshoe 20.

Morgan took the handoff and headed to his right. Mata's block allowed him to cut back in, and the Chieftain speedster saw a lane to the goal-line.

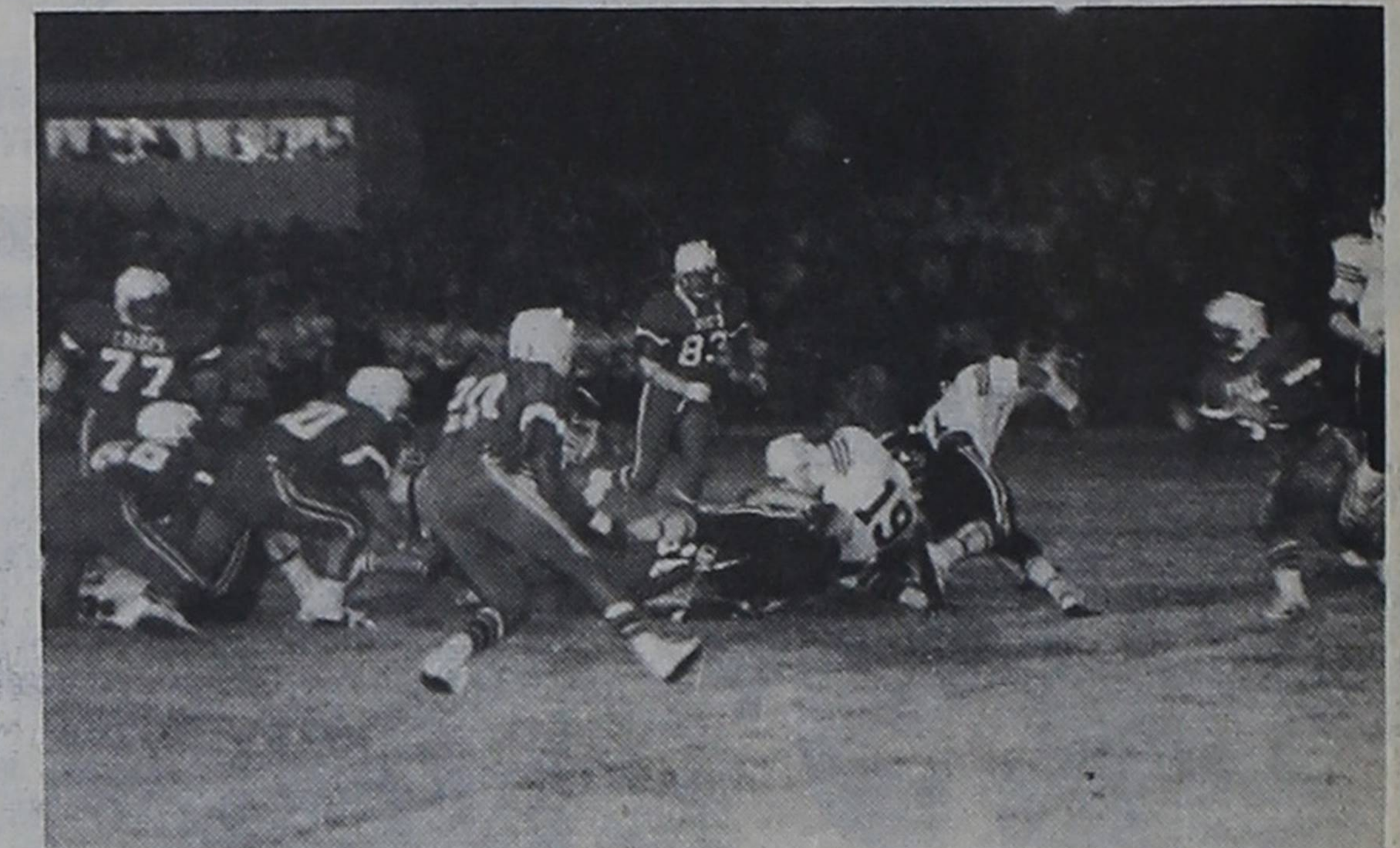
The Chieftain fans were just starting to celebrate, when the yellow flag was spotted in the middle of the field. And, with just 1:12 left on the clock, that was the game for all practical purposes. Muleshoe shored up its defenses, held and took over the ball.

"The kids played about as well as they could have. We were proud of

every one of them. They were bitterly disappointed to have lost the game in the manner they did, but after they had watched the game film and seeing how well they had played, I think they felt a little better about it," Moss said.

The Chieftain defense played an exceptional game, holding Hysinger, Moton and company to less than 100 yards. But the Mules had good balance, equalling their 95 yards rushing in the passing department, for 190 total yards.

Another critical call came when Muleshoe was on its drive which ended in the tying field goal. Two Muleshoe passes were batted down by Eloy Caballero, and on third down, John Aguirre went up with the Muleshoe defender and knocked the ball out of his hands. But much to the dismay of the Chieftain fans, Aguirre drew a flag for pass interference. Films again showed that John had not hit the receiver's body.



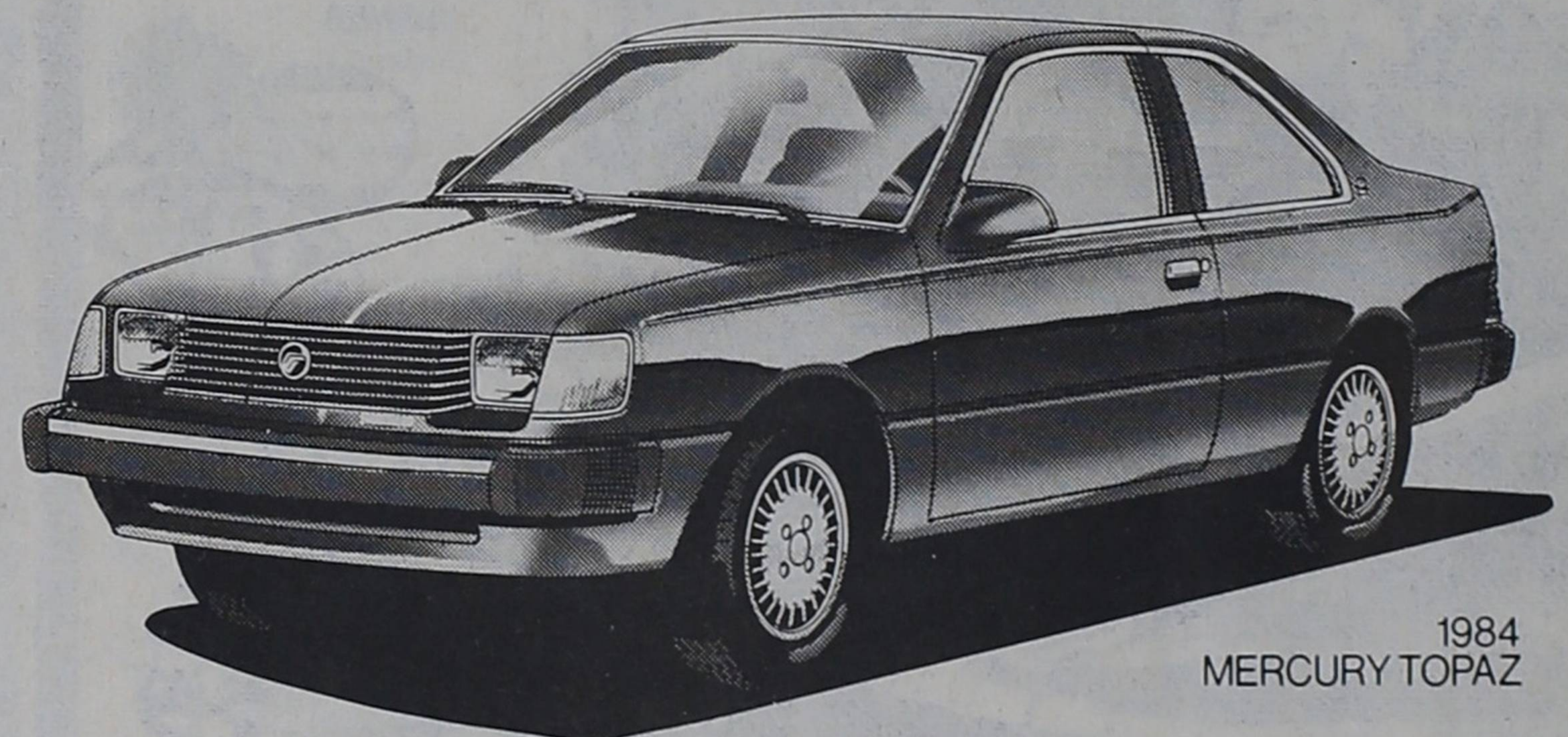

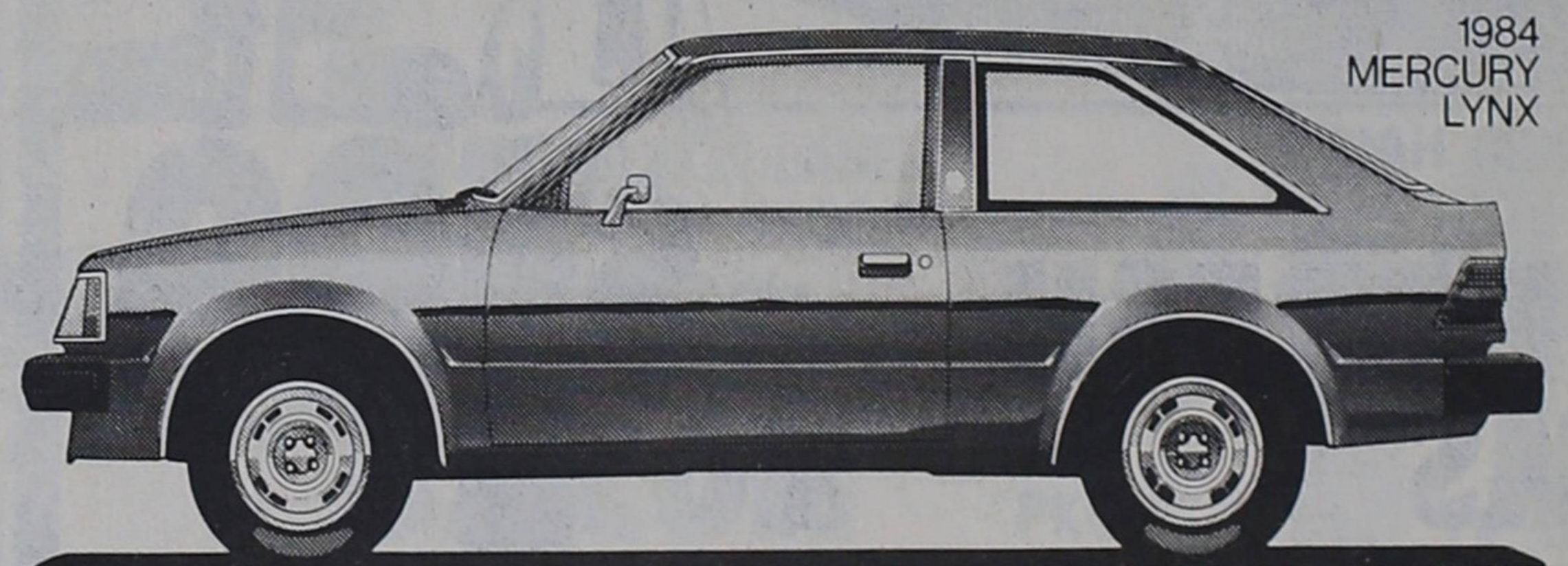

Troop 215 served and the judges handed out prizes. Then everyone was served cookies, cupcakes and witch's brew.

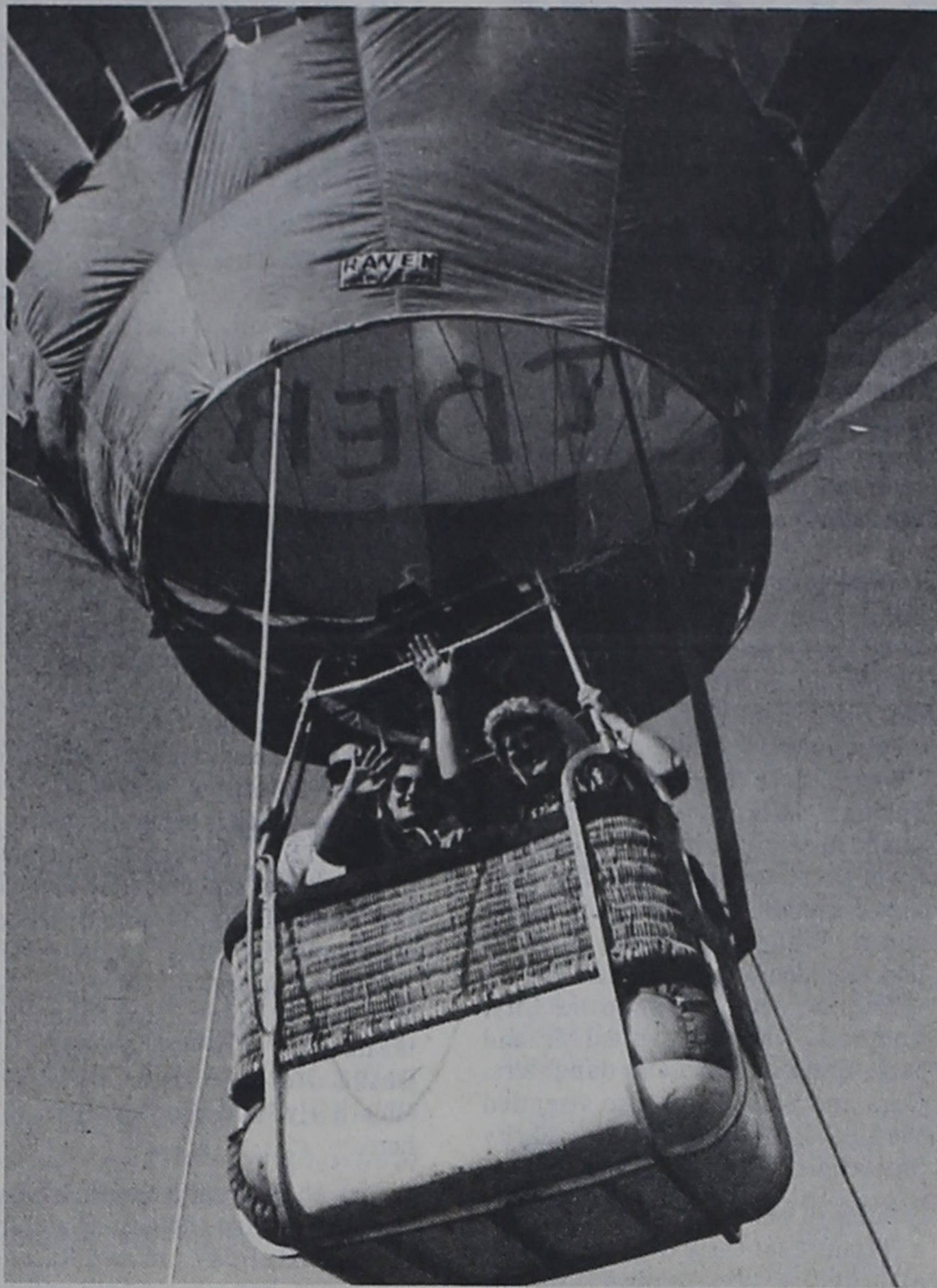
Children's Art Contests Set Nov. 12
