WHEN YOU VISIT the campus of Texas Tech University, having been a student there during the last of the 50s, it's hard to believe this is the same place you attended college.

Skyscrapers have replaced the low-lying buildings that were on the campus in the days of our youth. When yours truly enrolled at Tech for a journalism degree, there were old army-type barracks (remember those?) being used for everything from classrooms to the campus hospital (infirmary).

Look as hard as you can, but you won't find a single army barrack anywhere on the campus. They have been replaced with either a new, modern building, or maybe an asphalt parking lot, which in itself is an improvement (there weren't many of those items in existence in the 50s, either).

More than likely, the campus infirmary has been replaced by Lubbock General Hospital, the huge, well-equipped facility located on the western edge of the Tech campus. The hospital is also used as the teaching unit for the new Texas Tech School of Medicine.

When Carol and I studied journalism at Tech, the journalism building was a small facility, with the old, noisy flatbed press and all of its ink and hot type, located in the basement.

Today, the Mass Communications Department is one of those modernistic buildings in the center of the campus. Students can secure a number of degrees in their chosen field of television, radio or newspaper-magazine work.

When we were there, advertising or art majors had to go through the engineering department, and could not combine their work with journalism. Today, advertising art is one of the degrees available in the Mass Com Department.

Business majors can take pride in their new building, which is called, "The Tower," and is currently receiving an addition to make it even larger.

The entrance to the campus has changed considerably. Old Will Rogers still rides his trusty steed "Soapsuds" into the sunset, and the tradition still holds that the statue of Rogers will dismount and tip his hat, if a certain event happens.

Now, of course, the pretty fountains have been added to what we called the "Broadway entrance." I'm not sure you can still enter at that point.

When yours truly was a student at Tech, the boys' and girls' dormitories were at least half a campus apart. That was in the days of panty raids and other such goings-on.

Today, some of the dorms are practically co-educational, with girls living in one half of the dorm and boys in the other half--the two dorms sharing cafeterias.

We were just wondering to ourselves if things can change that much again in another 25 years.

WE ALWAYS GET a copy of the Tech newspaper, having started our journalistic career on that publication. We got a big laugh about the names of the intramural basketball teams. Seems like they, like everything else, are more liberal than before. Here are some examples:

Ladies Division Sets Projects

The joint beautification committee of the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture and the Women's Division, met this week.

Plans were discussed to begin upgrading the City Park. Plans were made to contact the Santa Fe Railroad about the possibilities of obtaining the old depot building to be moved to the park and preserved and used for Chamber offices and/or a museum.

An overall plan for landscaping the park and installing more playground equipment will be needed, and professional help will be obtained for this. The committee plans to contact West Texas State University and Texas Tech University to see if they have classes which might consider this for a project. Also, an estimate will be obtained for the cost of upgrading the bandstand in the park.

Beth Thompson, who is Friona's Sesquicentennial Chairman, asked that the committee consider designating a project for this celebration, scheduled for 1986.

The barrels owned by businesses were discussed. The need to remove the dead shrubs and replace them with something else was discussed. A member of the committee will contact Guthals in Clovis for suggestions and costs of putting something colorful in the barrels.

Much community help and support

will be needed for these projects, and the Beautification Committee is optimistic that the community will "come through with flying colors" as usual when called upon.

World Day Of Prayer Event Set

Friday, March 2, is World Day of Prayer. This annual celebration, sponsored in the United States by Church Women United, unites women of faith in some 5,000 communities in the United States and 170 countries around the globe in a common day of prayer.

1984 marks the 97th consecutive observance of the event which began in 1887 as a day of prayer for mission by lay women of the Presbyterian Church. Today, it has grown to include countless thousands of Christian women of various races, cultures and traditions on six continents of the world.

World Day of Prayer services in Friona will be at Calvary Baptist Church on March 2, at 7 p.m. The program is under the direction of Karen Renner.

This year the World Day of Prayer service was written by Christian women in Sweden on the theme "Living Water from Christ, Our Hope." The authors have used water as a focus, drawing upon many examples from scripture where this essential element symbolizes life and hope. In recognition of the fact that water is one of the most serious deprivations from which the world's people suffer, this service seeks to motivate not only prayer, but action to alleviate physical and spiritual thirst in the world.

Church Women United is the national ecumenical movement that brings Protestant, Roman Catholic, Orthodox and other Christian women together into one "community of caring." World Day of Prayer, together with World Community Day in November and May Fellowship Day in May, are three ecumenical celebrations sponsored annually by Church Women United. Offerings from these celebrations make possible the mission of Church Women United including the Intercontinental Grants Program that funds national and international projects in support of the empowerment of women, human rights, justice and peace.

55 YEARS AGO--FEB. 22, 1929

Another line of business was opened up last week with Friona, as its base, when V.E. Hart began a regular schedule of motor truck service between Friona and Amarillo. The need for such service has been apparent for some time, and Mr. Hart says he will make three trips per week, on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

45 YEARS AGO--FEB. 24, 1939

About 28 of the business and professional men of this city met on Thursday night of last week at Friona High School, for the purpose of reorganizing the seemingly defunct local Chamber of Commerce.

J.A. Blackwell was elected president; C. Carl Dollar, secretary; J.R. Roden, vice president; and Loyde Brewer, treasurer.

40 YEARS AGO--FEB. 18, 1944

In spite of a sandstorm and freezing weather and therefore a small crowd, the Bond Rally at Friona went over the top at the rate of \$346,350 last Thursday at the Grade School Auditorium.

At a called meeting of the Friona Board of Education last Thursday afternoon, the three Friona school administrators were re-elected for the 1944-45 school term. They are Superintendent O.B. Ginn, Lora Mae

McFarland, registrar and Dean of Girls at Friona High School; and Ocoee Warden, elementary supervisor.

30 YEARS AGO--FEB. 18, 1954

An announcement for a competitive examination for the position of Postmaster at Friona has been made by the Civil Service Commission. Leo McLellan has served as temporary postmaster since the resignation of Sloan Osborn last October.

10 YEARS AGO--FEB. 24, 1974

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Ogallala Depletion Rate Drops During Study

The rate of depletion of the Ogallala aquifer in the 5,216,600 acre, 15-county area served by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District has dropped by 54 per cent during the past five years (1979 to 1984) as compared to the previous five years (1974 to 1979). Depth-to-water level measurements made annually in a network of 948 wells in this 15-county area were used to make this observation.

The average annual change in water levels in the area served by the

Water District for the past ten years (1974 to 1984) has been a decline of 1.40 feet per well. In the first five years (1974 to 1979) of this ten-year period the average annual change in water levels was a decline of 1.90 feet per well. During the past five years (1979 to 1984) the average annual change has been a decline of 0.88 of a foot per well. This indicates a 54 per cent reduction in the rate of depletion. In 1983, the average change in water levels throughout the Water District's service area was a decline of 0.56 of a foot which is 40 per cent of the ten-year average.

In the southern part of the Water District (Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd, Crosby, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock and Lynn Counties) the average annual change in water levels during the five-year period 1974 to 1979 was a decline of 1.52 feet per year. The average annual change during the period 1979 to 1984 has been a decline of 0.45 of a foot per year. This indicates a reduced rate of depletion of 71 per cent for the past five years as compared to the previous five years.

In the northern part of the Water District (Potter, Randall, Armstrong, Deaf Smith, Parmer and Castro Counties) the average annual change in water levels for the five-year period 1974 to 1979 was a decline of 2.67 feet and during the period 1979 to 1984 the average change has been a decline of 1.69 feet per year. This indicates a reduced rate of depletion for the area of 37 per cent for the past five years as compared to the previous five years.

The following are examples of the conservation techniques that area farmers have utilized which have resulted in the reduced rate of depletion of the aquifer. Irrigators report that through the installation of furrow dikes to capture and hold precipitation in place until it has time to soak into the soil they can annually

save an average of three inches of irrigation water per acre. Pumping rainfall runoff water which collects in the playa basins instead of pumping ground water has resulted not only in ground water saved for future use but has also reduced fuel costs by 50 per cent or more.

Replacing open irrigation ditches with surface or underground pipeline has resulted in reduced water losses of 10 to 20 per cent per 1,000 feet of replaced open ditch. Through modification of existing irrigation systems utilizing technical assistance provided by the Soil Conservation Service (SCS) and the mobile field water labs provided by the Water District, 10 to 20 per cent improvements in water use efficiency have been attained. This in turn has also reduced pumpage from the aquifer. Utilizing soil moisture information provided by the Water District and the SCS to determine pre-plant soil moisture needs and using soil moisture monitoring devices during the growing season to determine the quantities of water which need to be applied to the plant soil root zone has resulted in reduced over irrigation thus saving water for future use.

Selection of crop varieties which require less water as well as switching to crops such as grain sorghum instead of corn has also helped. Grain sorghum requires approximately 30 per cent less water than corn. Maximum utilization of irrigation tailwater collection systems has resulted in a 20 per cent or more savings of ground water by some irrigators.

Most farmers are currently utilizing one or more of these techniques and many are planning to incorporate more water saving practices into their farming operation as their economic conditions permit. Ultimately this will even further reduce the rate of depletion of the aquifer.

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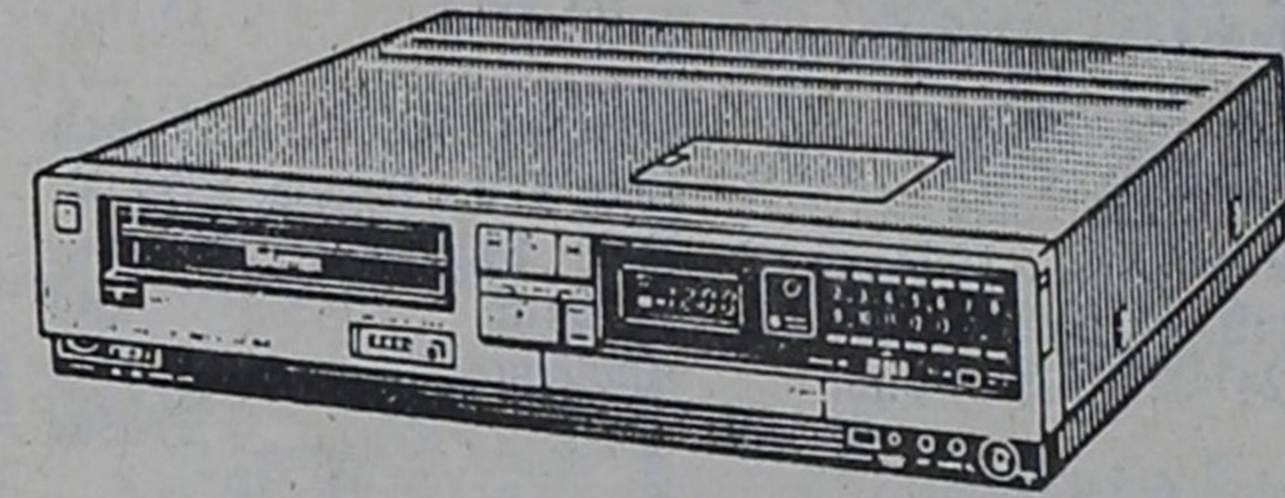

FI Report Shows Nice Increase

Friona Industries, Inc. achieved an increase of 49 per cent in net earnings on a 21 per cent gain in sales for the second quarter ended December 31, 1983.

"Higher cattle feedyard occupancy and increased poundage of hamburger meat processed and delivered to more restaurants accounted for most of the improvement in the financial results," said Ron Davenport, chairman, president and chief executive officer.

Net earnings of \$1,133,000, or 48 cents per share, on sales of \$78.3 million compared with net earnings of \$761,000, or 36 cents per share, on sales of \$64.4 million in the same quarter of fiscal 1983.

"The second quarter benefitted from the same factors present in the first quarter. All segments of the company's operations reported increased operating profits for both the second quarter and first six months with the exception of Company-owned Cattle and Animal Health Supplies," said Davenport.

In the first half of fiscal 1984, net earnings were \$1,821,000, or 78 cents per share, on sales of \$144.3 million. For the same six months of fiscal 1983 net earnings were \$1,989,000, or 94 cents per share, on sales of \$126.4 million.

Meat Processing and Distribution had operating profits significantly above those of the first six months of fiscal 1983. The number of Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburger Restaurants provided with ground beef, dairy products and produce climbed 105 units for a total of 879 restaurants in 15 states by the end of the second quarter.

Average occupancy at the Company's four feedyards was 11 per cent higher for the six months and was even higher (25 per cent) on a second-quarter to second-quarter comparison.

Commercial Feeds tonnage sold was about the same as in the first six months of the prior fiscal year, while average sales price per ton rose slightly as did operating profits. Sales and operating profits from Grain operations also increased on the basis of more tonnage sold.

Company-owned Cattle sustained a slight loss of \$52,000 for the six months, resulting from depressed cattle prices and higher costs. Sales and operating profits from Animal Health Supplies were below those of the first six months and second quarter of the previous year.

"Our proposed acquisition of Country Queen Foods is progressing as expected, and their directors and shareholders will probably vote on the issue in March," said Davenport.

Shareholders of Country Queen Foods would receive 210,000 shares of Friona common stock. Friona Industries will have approximately 2,532,000 shares outstanding following the acquisition.

Country Queen Foods has plants in Grand Rapids, Mich., Bellview, Fla., and a 50 per cent interest in Country Queen Foods, Ltd., Brampton, Ontario, Canada. These plants process egg products such as frozen chopped, hard cooked and fried eggs and omelettes for the restaurant industry and institutional users. Country Queen Foods had sales of \$7,175,000 and \$8,649,000 in calendar years 1982 and 1983, respectively.

Property Taxes Drawing Penalty

An important deadline occurred the first of February.

Property taxes assessed for 1983 were due by the end of January.

Taxes not paid by February 1 were delinquent and began accruing penalty and interest.

Delinquent taxes for 1983 will incur a six per cent penalty and one per cent interest charge on February 1. Charges will continue to add up at the combined rate of two per cent per month or portion of a month that the taxes remain unpaid, until they reach a total of 18 per cent on July 1.

After that, interest accrues at one per cent a month. Taxes delinquent for a year would incur penalty and interest charges of 24 per cent of the original tax.

Under Texas law, taxes are owed on property whether or not the owner receives a tax bill, and there are only three exceptions to the February 1 delinquency date: When the option of split payment is offered by a local government; when tax bills are mailed after January 10 or when a tax rate rollback election succeeds in lowering a tax rate after tax bills are mailed initially.

Not all taxing units offer the split payment option. When it is available, half of the 1983 tax must have been paid before December 1, 1983. The second half is due before July 1 this

year. Penalty on a delinquent second half payment is 12 per cent of the tax due, and interest will be added at one per cent a month from July 1 on. In some taxing units, tax bills may have been mailed after January 10, or a successful tax-rate rollback election may have necessitated mailing corrected tax bills by a unit other than a school district. In both cases, the delinquency date is postponed and the new date must appear on the most recent tax statement, but penalty and interest will be added if taxes aren't paid before the new date.

Further penalty can be incurred by a tax delinquent on July 1. If a private attorney rather than the city, county or other public staff attorney, is contracted to collect delinquencies after July 1, up to 15 per cent of the total tax, penalty and interest may be added to defray the cost of those collections.

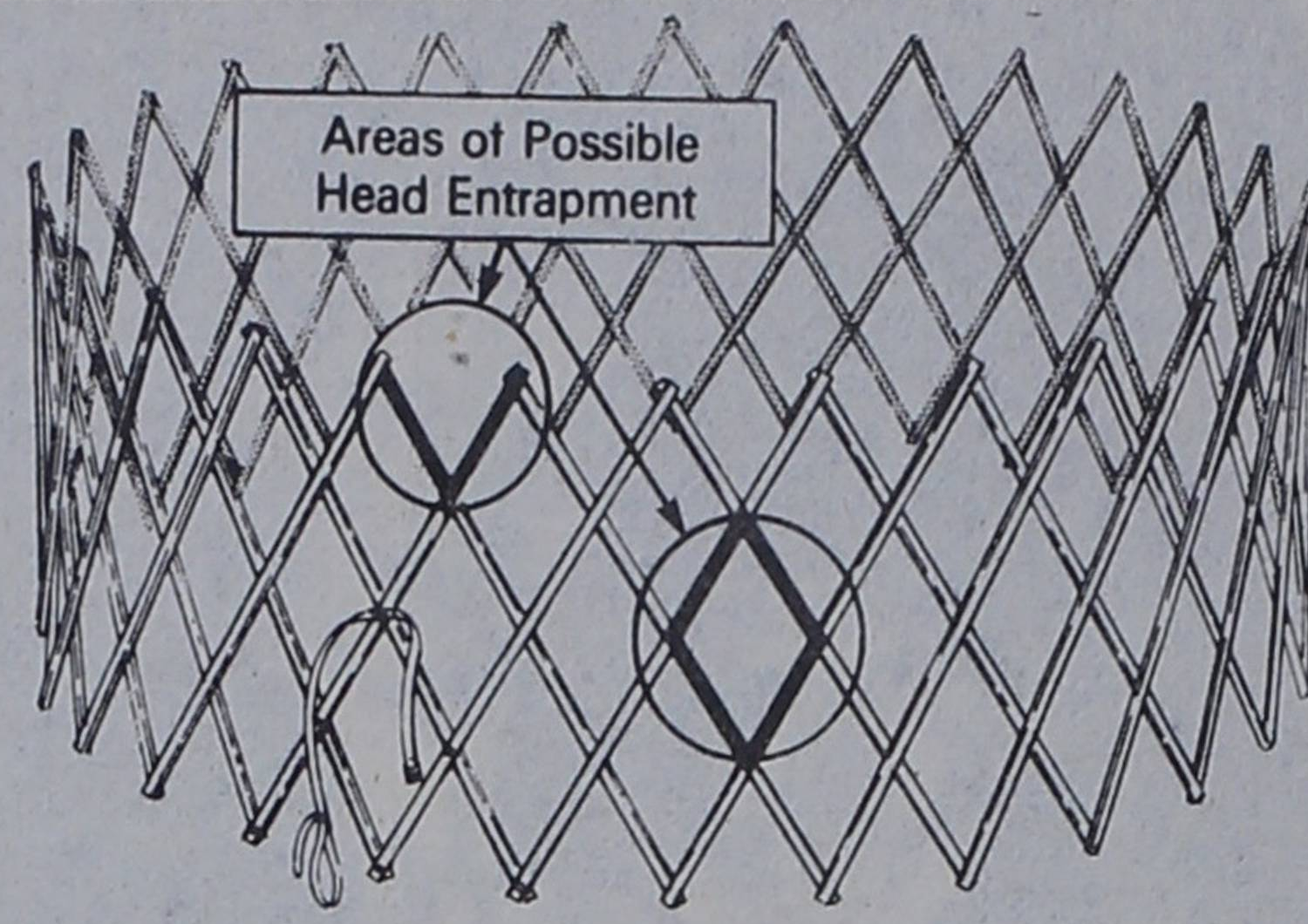
Property Tax Code does provide some relief for taxpayers who are unable to pay delinquent taxes, penalty and interest all at one time.

A property owner aged 65 or over may file a sworn affidavit with the appraisal district to defer paying any or all delinquency amounts of his homestead. However, the amounts are still owed on the property and continue to increase until paid or until the property changes hands.

Another option, but one which must be in a written agreement between the tax collector and property owner, is to pay delinquent tax, penalty and interest installments over a period of not more than 36 months. With this option, too, the tax is still considered due until paid and penalty and interest accrue on any unpaid balance.

Under certain conditions, a tax collector may choose to follow steps allowed by law to seize personal property, which is then sold to satisfy delinquent taxes.

Property owners should contact their appraisal districts or local tax offices with any questions about delinquent taxes or payment and to find out if collection for taxing units in the appraisal district may have been consolidated in the appraisal office or in a particular tax office.



Example Of Enclosure

Around The House

Consumer Product Safety Alert from the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, Washington, D.C. 20207.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission, in cooperation with the Juvenile Products Manufacturers Association, warns consumers that children's circular expandable wooden enclosures may present a potential strangulation hazard to children due to neck or head entrapment in v-shaped openings along the top edge and in diamond-shaped openings in the sides of the enclosures.

Since 1980, the Commission staff has conducted investigations of three deaths and one incident of brain damage involving unsupervised children whose necks became entrapped in the v-shaped openings along the top edge of the enclosures, apparently as they were attempting to climb out of the enclosures. In addition, the staff has investigated or received reports of four incidents involving minor or no injuries to children whose heads became entrapped in the diamond-shaped openings in the sides of the enclosures.

The enclosures are constructed of criss-crossed wooden slats riveted together which expand to form continuous circular structures of varying diameters and which are used primarily to restrict the movement of young children to the area within the enclosure. They have been sold nationwide through various retail and children's products stores over the past 15 to 20 years for approximately \$20 to \$40 per unit.

The CPSC staff estimates that

approximately 239,000 of the more than 500,000 enclosures produced are presently in use.

In the opinion of the CPSC staff, it is dangerous to leave children unattended in the enclosure without close continuous supervision. The Commission is aware of incidents which occurred after children had been left for only a short period of time. This is a particular concern since the enclosures are intended to keep children away from other hazards, and consumers may leave children unattended, believing them to be safe.

The Juvenile Products

Manufacturers Association is working to develop a voluntary standard to reduce the possibility of injury associated with enclosures and manufacturers voluntarily stopped production and sale of the existing style of the enclosures pending development and adoption of the safety standard.

In the opinion of the CPSC staff, owners of the expandable enclosures should discontinue using them.

For further information, consumers may call the CPSC's toll-free hotline on 800-638-CPSC. A teletypewriter number for the hearing impaired is 800-638-8270.

Under laws administered by CPSC, over 293 million potentially hazardous products have been called back from the marketplace and consumers since 1973 (when CPSC was created). Most of these were voluntarily recalled by manufacturers who established programs to repair or replace the products, or to refund the purchase price.

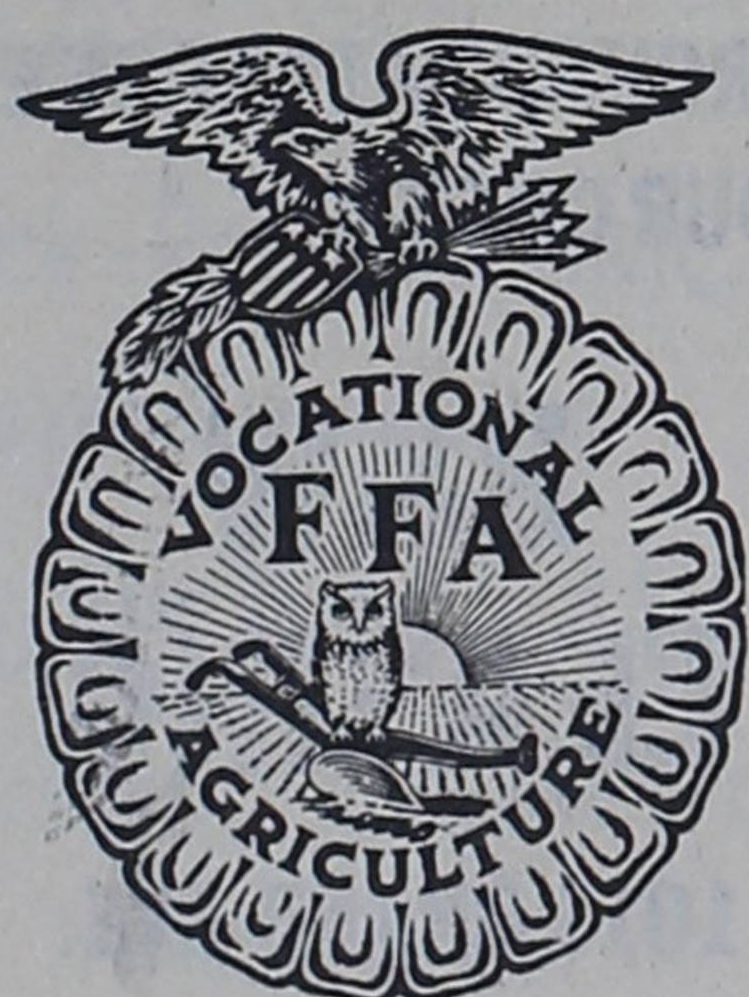

'Netter Jackson Is Top Scorer

Wenetter Jackson was the leading scorer for the Friona High School Squaws during the 1983-84 basketball season, a tabulation of season statistics revealed this week.

Miss Jackson, a senior who has been a four-year varsity member, closed out her basketball career at FHS with 348 points, appearing in 26 games, for a 13.4 points-per-game average.

Miss Jackson had the high individual game totals, scoring 24 points against both Bovina and Vega. Miss Perez scored 23 points against Lazbuddie in the local tournament for runnerup honors.

Trey Hinkson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hinkson II of Lazbuddie, a fifth grader in Lazbuddie Schools, was also a bronze medal winner. The winning essays are as follows:

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN

On September the third, 1783, the Treaty of Paris was signed by four men. Among them was Benjamin Franklin.

Who was he, this man who is so important to American history? He was son, brother, husband and father. He was also a printer, scientist, inventor, educator, diplomat and politician. And he was successful in every area.

He was born January 17, 1706 to a Protestant family. His father, Josiah, was a candle-maker, and Abiah was his second wife. Franklin was the fifteenth child and youngest son of a large family.

Franklin read at an early age. He said once that he couldn't remember a time when he wasn't reading.

He went to the Boston Grammar School at age eight, but soon his father had to withdraw him because it was too expensive. Franklin then entered George Brownell's school of reading and arithmetic. He proved to be an excellent scholar.

Franklin's father tried to teach him the trade of candle-making, but this did not appeal to Benjamin, so Josiah set him to work as an apprentice to his half-brother James, who owned a printing shop. Franklin enjoyed the trade, and he also liked to write and wanted to publish his work. Knowing James would never put something Franklin wrote in the newspaper, Benjamin wrote a letter, signed it Silence Dogood, and slipped it under the door of the shop at night. He

wrote sixteen all together. When James found out who really wrote the letters he was very angry. He was even stricter than before, causing Franklin to run away to Philadelphia in 1723.

A few months later, in 1724, he went to London to buy some printing equipment. He printed "Dissertation On Liberty and Necessity," and "Pleasure and Pain" in 1725.

A year later, he returned to Philadelphia, and in 1730 he was made public printer of Philadelphia. He married Deborah Read that same year.

In 1757, after the French and Indian War had ended, Franklin was sent to London. He complained that William Penn, the founder of Pennsylvania, was not paying war taxes as the other colonists did.

Later, when Parliament passed the Stamp Act, angry colonists again sent Franklin to England. He was called before the House of Commons. He pleaded the colonists' cause and the Stamp Act was repealed.

Some years later the Revolutionary War broke out. Franklin drafted and signed the Declaration of Independence. After it was adopted he was made Minister to France.

Franklin asked France to help America fight the Revolution. The French declined at first, but when the Americans won the battle of Saratoga, they agreed.

In 1778, Franklin signed the treaty of alliance with France. But John Jay and John Adams were afraid that France was going to betray America, and they decided to ignore the alliance.

Adams, Jay, and Franklin began peace talks in April, 1782. A preliminary treaty was signed on November 30, 1782. Benjamin Franklin drafted and signed the actual Treaty of Paris on September the third, 1783. This treaty covered the rights to fish in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence and off New Foundland. It ended the Revolution and gave North America its freedom.

Franklin resigned as Minister to

France in 1785 and returned home. He was a member of the Constitutional Convention, which met in May, 1787.

Benjamin Franklin signed a memorial to Congress on February 12, 1790 asking Congress to stop slavery. This was his last public act. He died April 17, 1790. People everywhere mourned for this great man, who had played such an important part in America's history.

HANDCRAFTS 200 YEARS AGO

It was a fall day in the mountains of Kentucky. I was fishing in the creek. Mother came outside and told me Daddy needed some help. I put my fishing pole down and went to help him. Daddy was chopping wood, so I knew what to do. I started stacking it all. This was the time of year when we chopped wood every day. If we didn't do it we would be freezing inside the cabin. It seemed I had been there for two hours, but it was really about thirty minutes.

After we got through I took the little pieces that Daddy chopped to Grandpa so he could whittle. He was very good at whittling, he could make animals, wagons and cabins, almost anything, with his sharp knife and only scraps of wood. I started whittling also, but I wasn't near as good as he. He takes his figures to the General Store and sells them.

I heard a wagon coming down the road. It was aunt and uncle, who came down to help with the candlemaking. Candlemaking is not the funnest thing to do. We seal molds in a metal tank, then we run a wick through it, then we pour wax in it and put it in cold water to harden it. Mom told me she was going to teach me to make candles. She said we needed more money, we could get more candles made if I made some. More candles meant more money. Sometimes we also make candles for light inside the cabin. Well, we all got together and started making them. Mom had to help me for about 15

minutes, then I started doing it myself.

Mom also taught me how to make baskets. We soak about ten spokes and then put them across each other, then mother weaves and it comes out as a basket.

Another thing I learned was broommaking. We soak some stalks in water and then drain them, then we bind them around the top with cord. Broommaking is funner than candlemaking. Broommaking looked fun so I started doing it. I did it every day for about three or four weeks.

After a while I went to the creek and started fishing. Mom came out of the cabin and told me we were short on food. My cousin came and we started fishing, so we could have a nice dinner. I caught three middle-sized trout, my cousin caught five pretty big trout. We all had a good dinner, we had fish, potatoes and corn.

After the big dinner, and a long day I need to go to sleep. Tomorrow will be another hard day.

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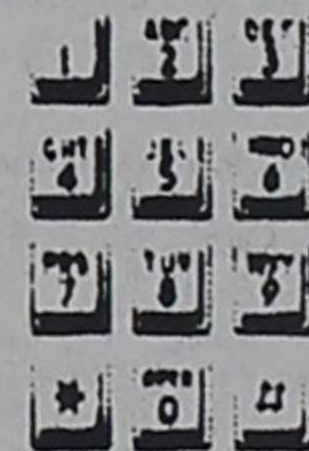
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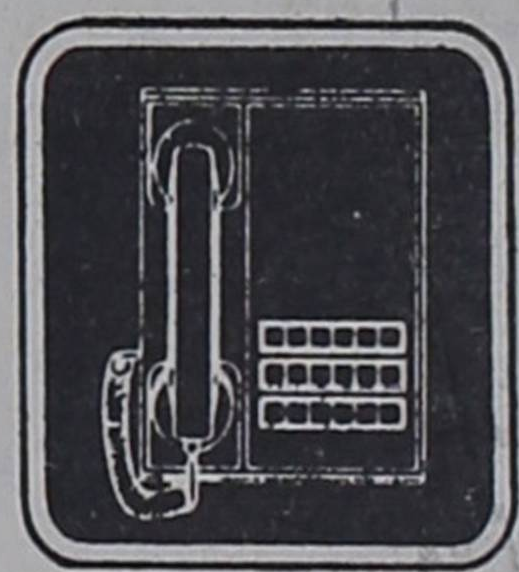


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Town Talk

She has four sisters that live in Houston and she is out of the hospital now and recuperating in the home of her sisters for awhile. She should be coming home soon.

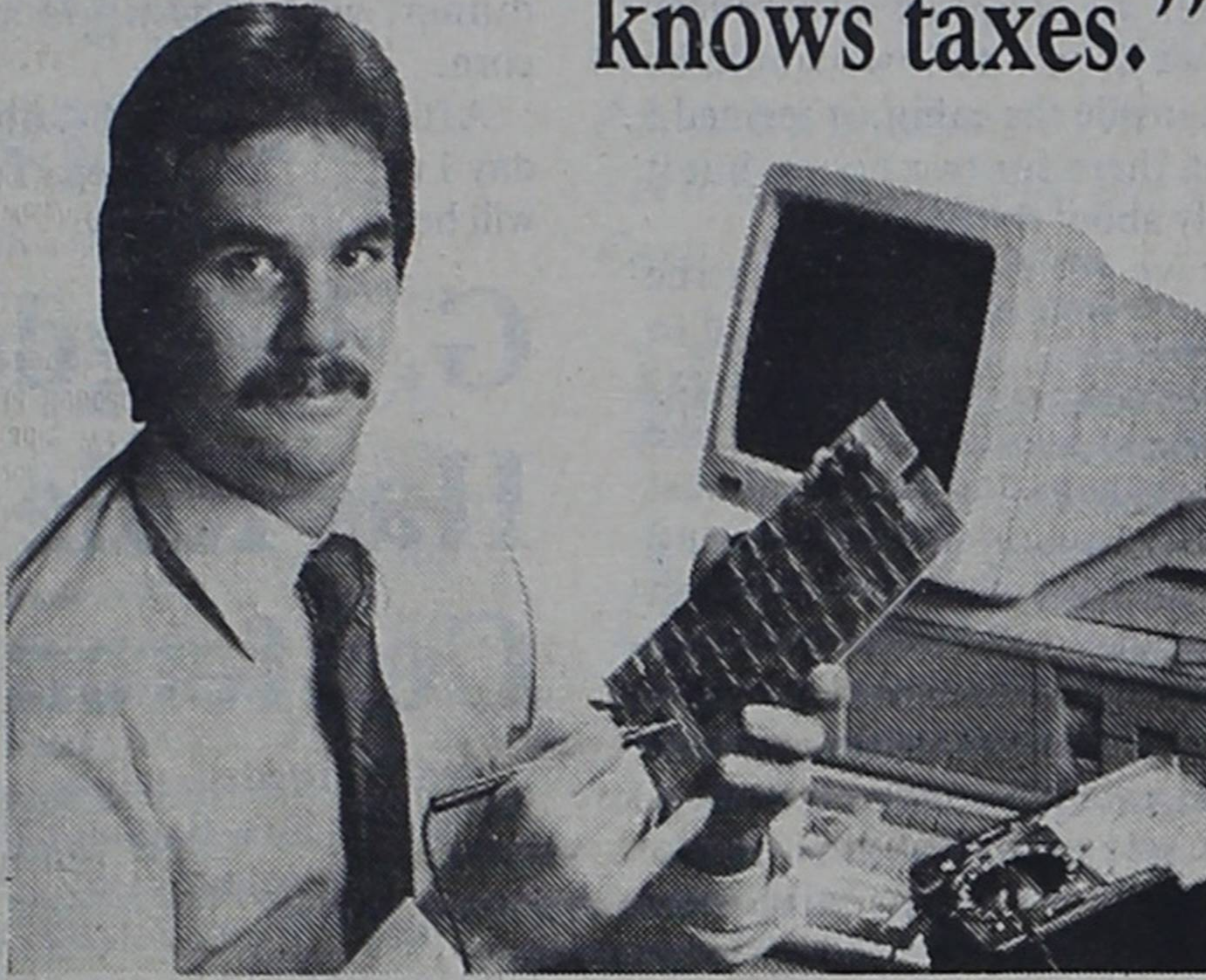
