THE PHEASANT SEASON for 1983 opened on a windy note last Saturday, and at this point in time, it appears that the second weekend may feature cold weather.

However, Sunday, December 11 was a fairly decent day, and from all reports, hunters have for the most part been able to get their limit of birds.

Chuck Cosper, game warden for the area which includes Parmer County, estimated this week that the influx of hunters on the opening weekend was down by approximately 40 per cent from previous years.

Cosper said that normally on the first weekend of the pheasant season, at least in recent years, around 10,000 extra hunters have visited Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties. This year on opening weekend, Cosper estimated that only about 6,000 hunters invaded the county.

As far as could be determined, there were no serious accidents relating to the hunt. We urge our hunting friends to continue to exercise caution in this regard.

EIGHTY YEARS AGO this weekend, Orville and Wilbur Wright made history by becoming the first persons to fly, when they achieved their historical moment at Kitty Hawk, N.C.

It is amazing when you stop to think about the progress that travel has made in the past 80 years, no doubt spurred on by the Wrights and other pioneers of that era.

Whenever this writer takes a plane trip, it never ceases to be amazing that the large steel machine can get off the ground, and with its load of passengers, go hurtling through the air at hundreds of miles per hour, and then land safely at its destination.

I suppose in reality I must have some leanings for the "Man Was Not Meant to Fly Society" (which, by the way, has its annual meeting this weekend, also). Not that I mind flying that much—air travel just boggles the imagination.

Perhaps you heard the story about how the Wright Brothers sent a telegram to their parents after their first flight, in essence telling them how their flight was a success, staying airborne for a certain number of seconds. The telegram ended up by stating that Orville and Wilbur would see their folks on Christmas.

Like all proud dads are prone to do, Mr. Wright, excited about the accomplishment, took the telegram down to their local newspaper. He was expecting a big headline, right?

The editor, with the usual nose for news, scanned the telegraphic message, and came up with one of the all-time gems. His headline stated: "WRIGHT BOYS TO BE HOME FOR CHRISTMAS," with no mention of the foolishness connected with their oversize kite project.

You have to realize that an editor has to get at the REAL news, and eliminate the extraneous material.

Larry Knowles reported on the meeting held with Chloe Johnson of the Texas Economic Development

Roxanne Hurst reported on the growth of the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce. "Although we are already 25 members strong, all women in Friona who have an active interest in our city are urged to join," Mrs. Hurst said.

School Board Sets Bid Deadline

Tuesday, January 24 has been set as the deadline for receiving bids for new band uniforms for Friona High School's band. The action came Monday night at the monthly meeting of the Friona school board.

Bid specifications are being prepared, with advertisements to be made for such bids.

Kathryn Goddard was selected by the board to serve on the self-study committee, which is in preparation for the writing of a new five-year plan for the school district during the 1984-85 school year.

James Warren reported on his investigation of a computer system for the central office to handle bookkeeping, payroll and fixed assets inventory. There will be a called meeting of the board on Monday, December 19, for the board to hear a representative of Region 16 Education Service regarding capabilities of the IBM PC Computer for this use.

The board approved the employment of Brenda Riddle to fill the 8th grade reading position as of January 3, 1984.

Superintendent Tom Jarboe reported that the State Property Tax board has had representatives in Parmer County making a study of county market values.

The superintendent reported that tax collections through November amounted to \$214,682.54, which is 17 per cent of the school's tax roll.

Accountant Bernje Gowens presented the annual audit of all school district funds.

The date for the January meeting was changed to January 23 to allow more time for financial reports after the holidays.

First Snowfall Surprises Area

The area's first snowfall of the season caught the weather prognosticators by surprise Thursday.

A total of three inches of snow was received in the Friona area. The prediction for Thursday had been for "mostly sunny," with no moisture in the prospect.

But a minor front developed to the southwest, and swung across the Panhandle-South Plains. The entire Texas Panhandle had a covering of snow.

Light snow began falling about 9:45 a.m. Thursday, and by noon around two inches had accumulated, as the flakes became big and moist. Travel on city streets became hazardous, as the snowpack was turned to ice.

The temperature had started out at 33 degrees early Thursday, and it

slowly went downhill with the passage of the snow showers. Temperatures were in the mid-20s throughout most of the day.

Friona was spared the extreme cold that was registered in Amarillo on Friday morning, where the mercury dropped to one degree below zero. Our low in Friona was a more comfortable 21 degrees.

Due to the extreme dry conditions, farmers welcomed the snowfall. "I hope we have a foot of snow by Christmas," was one farmer's holiday wish. And weathermen say we have another system which should reach the area early next week.

The season's first snowfall was considerably later than average, coming on December 15. The area almost always has at least light snow in November, and it has fallen in late October in some years.

Limits Set On Some SS Claims

Avoid the last minute rush and act now. Because there are time limits for submitting medical insurance claims, you have only until December 31, 1983 to file claims for services you had 10/01/81 through 09/30/82.

The Medicare office reports that you will receive more accurate and expeditious service if you will submit your medical insurance claims as you incur the charges during the year. Since many people wait and submit their claims January of each year, this causes extremely heavy workloads which in turn causes delays in the processing of your claim.

They also report that if Medicare needs to contact either you or your provider for additional information on a particular service and charge, it will delay your entire claim until the matter is resolved.

Squaws Win Championship In Own Tournament

The Friona High School Squaws won the championship of their own tournament last weekend, scoring impressive victories over Farwell on Friday night, and Melrose, N.M., in the finals on Saturday.

The Squaws had opened the tournament with a 49-24 win over Lazbuddie on Thursday night.

But on Friday, the team's game was anything but easy. The team managed to take a 16-13 lead after one quarter, thanks to the scoring of Wenetter Jackson and Diane Johnston.

But the team's scoring tapered off in the second quarter, and Farwell took advantage to take a 22-19 lead at the half.

Neither team could do much scoring in the third quarter, which ended with Farwell still nursing a three-point lead, 30-27.

The Squaws mounted a rally which put the team into the lead in the final quarter, and they managed to hold off the Steerettes in the final seconds.

Wenetter Jackson's 18 points paced Friona's scoring, and Miss Johnston added ten. Suzahn Inman paced Farwell with 20 points.

The title game on Saturday had a strange first half.

Melrose took an early 2-0 lead on a basket by Brenda Hightower after a minute of play. But that was to be Melrose's first and only points of the quarter.

Wenetter Jackson scored a basket and a pair of free throws, Kristi Britting sank a set shot, Amanda

Perez a jumper, and Diane Johnston a pair of baskets. Friona was running a full-court press, which visibly bothered the Melrose girls.

When the buzzer sounded ending the first quarter, Friona had run up a 15-2 lead.

However, the visitors quickly adjusted between quarters, and soon had turned the tables on the Squaws. Melrose scored the first 12 points of the second quarter, and went from the 15-2 deficit to a 15-14 score in less than three minutes. Miss Hightower's jump shot at the 5:21 mark completed the comeback.

But Miss Jackson got Friona on the scoreboard with a follow-up of a missed shot, and then added a pair of free throws a few seconds later as the Squaws upped their lead to 19-14.

The teams traded baskets the rest of the way. A jump shot by Terri Wilcox a minute before halftime gave Friona a 23-16 lead at the intermission.

Amanda Perez's layup shot to open the second half gave Friona a nine-point edge at 25-16. But Melrose countered with three straight baskets to pull to within three points at 25-22.

This challenged the Squaws, and they scored the last eight points of the quarter, with Sharon Frye coming in to hit a pair of baskets, and Friona took a 33-22 lead at the quarter mark. Once again, the visitors were scoreless for 4:33 of clock time.

The final quarter was the only one in which the two teams more or less swapped baskets, without one dominating for a period of time.

Melrose was forced to foul, and Friona responded by hitting eight out of ten from the foul line in the final quarter.

Scoring was evenly divided. Miss Jackson scored 11; and Misses Britting, Perez and Wilcox each scored eight.

Squaws Win Opener In Tournament

Friona High School's Squaws fell to the Bovina Fillies in a game at Bovina Tuesday, 47-44; before rebounding for a first-round win in the Farwell tournament at noon Thursday.

The Squaws beat the Hereford junior varsity, 60-28 in the tournament game. The win and loss left the team with a 7-4 season record after Thursday.

It was a case of waiting too late to turn on the after-burners in the team's game at Bovina.

Bovina led throughout the game, but Friona pulled off a frantic fourth-quarter rally in which they outscored the home team, 20-8. But the rally fell three points short.

The Fillies held leads of 12-8 after one quarter and 25-17 at the half.

Wenetter Jackson scored four baskets and six of six free throws in the fourth-quarter spurt, accounting for 14 of Friona's points.

Hurting the Squaws' cause was the fact that guard Diane Johnston fouled out of the game.

Miss Jackson was Friona's leading scorer with 24 points. Sonya Mayfield scored 15 and Marie Pesch 11 for Bovina.

The Fillies, favored to win their district, were 8-2 following the win.

Coach Don Herbert was able to allow his entire bench to see considerable action in the tournament game Thursday. The Squaws broke out to a 23-6 first quarter lead and were never seriously challenged.

The Squaws had four players in double figure-scoring. Miss Jackson scored 15 points; Amanda Perez added 12; Diane Johnston and Sharon Frye scored 11 each.

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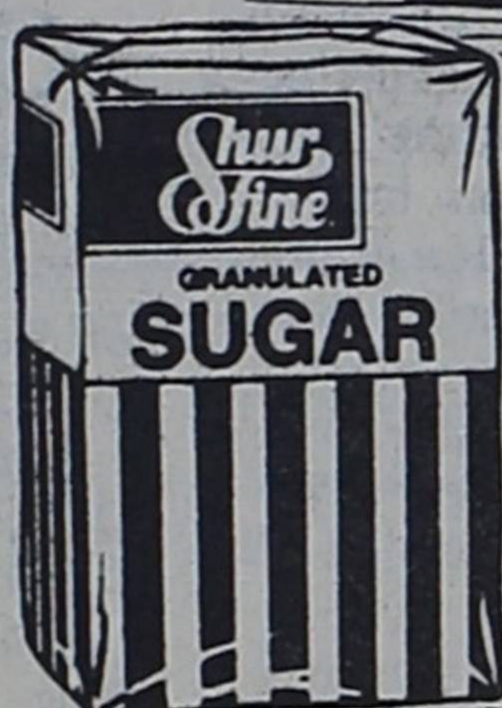

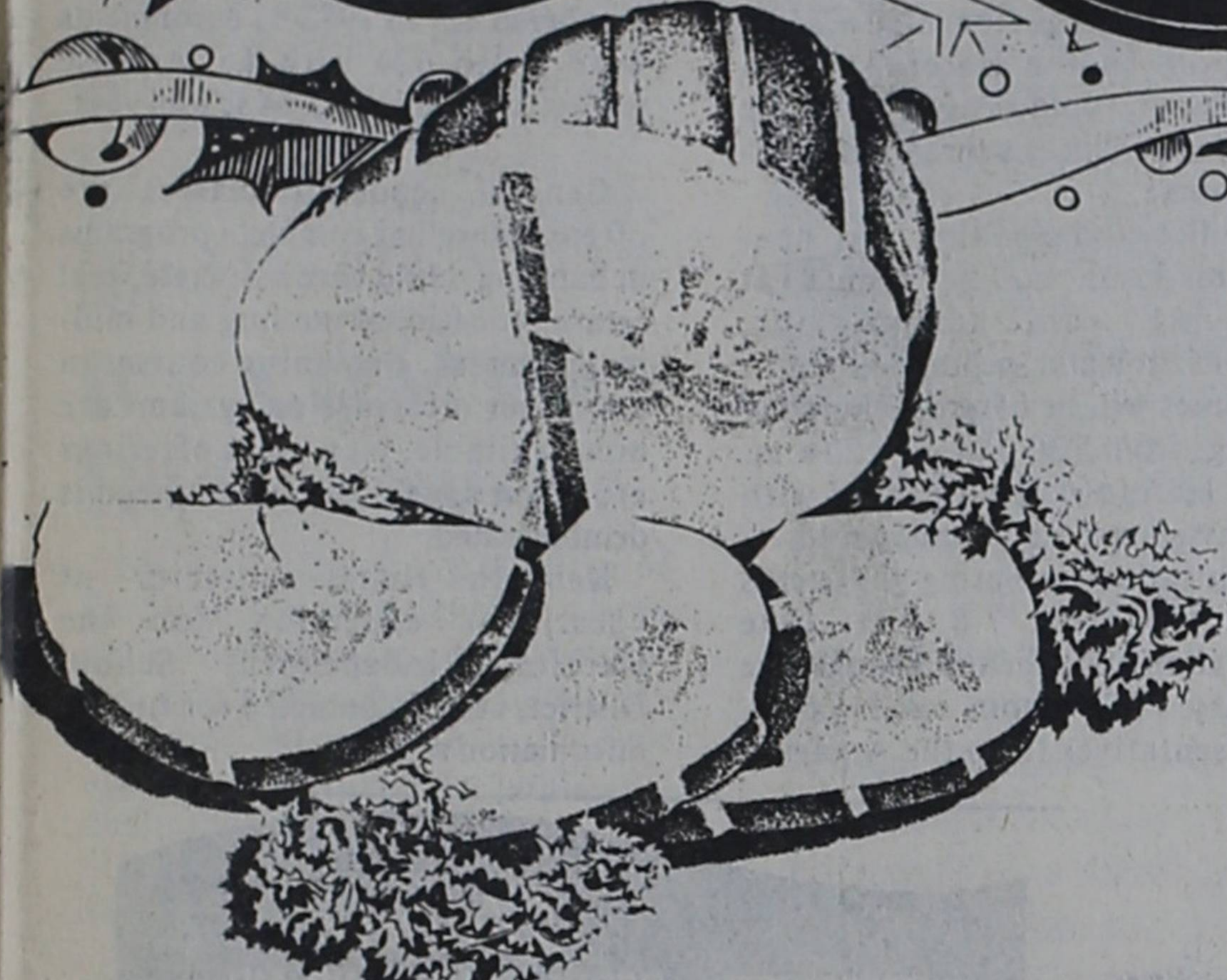

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

Residue Management Aids In Conservation

Leaving crop residues on the surface of fields will keep top soil on the fields and can help save moisture and fuel.

Since our windiest months are just ahead, November through May, now is a good time to think about how to protect soil from wind erosion. All soils in Parmer County are at least somewhat susceptible to wind erosion, but the lighter fine sandy loam soils need more residues left on surface for protection than the heavier clay loam soils. As general rule the clay loam soils need about 1000 lbs./acre of residue while the fine sandy loams need about 1750 lbs./acre. The amount of residue produced depends on the type of crop grown and its yield. For instance, a 200 bushel/acre corn crop can leave about 14,000 lbs. of residues, 20 bushel wheat about 2000 lbs. of residues, 3000 lbs./acre grain sorghum gives 4000 lbs. of residues while 1 bale cotton leaves about 1500 lbs. of residues.

The number of tillage operations and types of implements used can be managed in a way that leaves the proper amounts of these crop residues on the surface of the field. Implements such as chisels, sweeps, or tandem discs can be used more freely in a residue management system since they only cover about 20-25 per cent of the residues with each trip. Offset and one-way discs, mold board plows, and listers cover from 50-90 per cent and so should be used only when preparing a clean

Don Richards Announces As Candidate

Don R. Richards, 36, of Lubbock, has announced that he will be a candidate in the 1984 Democratic Primary for the election to the U.S. House of Representatives for the 19th Congressional District of Texas.

Citing the need for continued strong representation in Washington to protect West Texas' interests in farming, energy and the economy, Richards emphasized the areas which he feels will be the major issues in the upcoming race.

"The development of the 1985 Farm Bill is crucial to the agriculture industry in all of Texas, but particularly in West Texas," he said. "We have hundreds of farmers who are being forced into bankruptcy or liquidations, largely due to events beyond their control. There is no way we can predict the adverse effects of this on our local merchants, banks, ag-related businesses and workers who are dependent on a healthy farm economy. Despite the temporary inroads of the PIK program, farmers today have no idea what will be the farm policy after the first of the year. A long term farm bill that protects the interests of West Texas sits at the top of the agenda."

"West Texas and the Permian Basin also have a proud tradition in the energy industry and have made tremendous contributions to the nation's energy supply over the years. Two years ago the oil and gas industry employed thousands of workers in good-paying jobs in an eager attempt to fill the nation's energy needs. Today's slump in the energy field has left drilling rigs sitting unused on vacant lots. Congress must provide this nation with a sensible energy policy

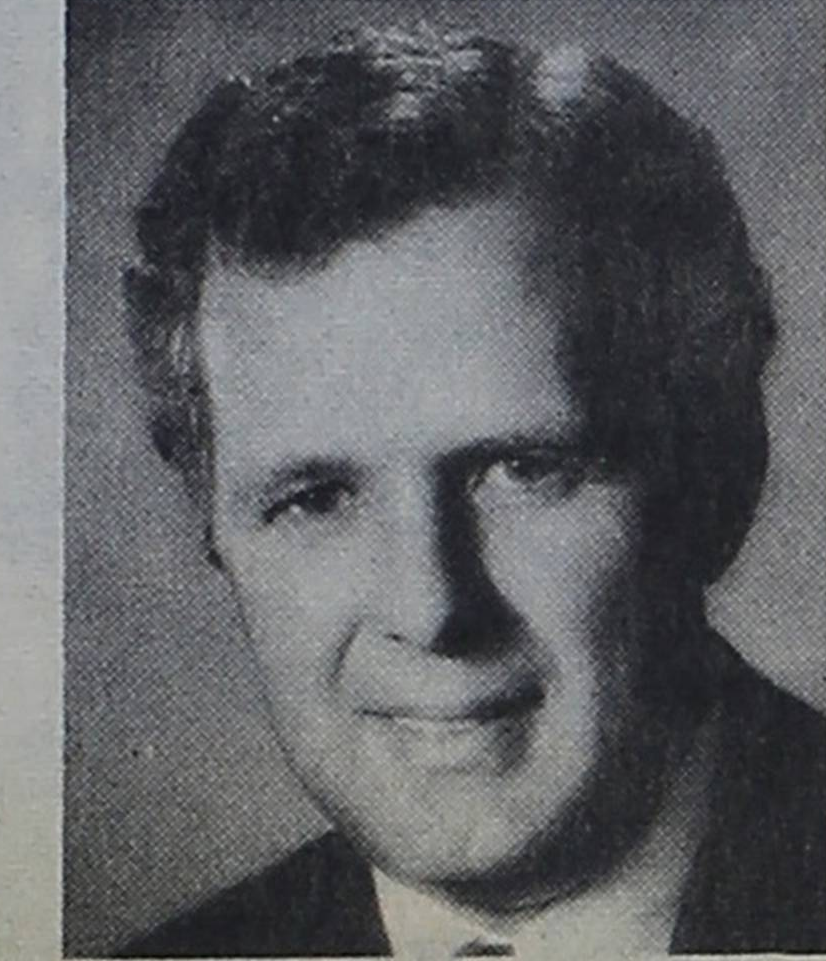

A seedbed on which residues have been properly managed can help the next crop to emerge and start growth. Residues can help by conserving soil moisture and by making the most of effective rainfall. Crop residues left on the surface shade the soil and prevent excessive evaporation losses. Also, the residues will slow runoff and increase infiltration to keep the rainfall in the field where it belongs. This will help stop water erosion as well.

The extra moisture conserved in your field can mean savings in fuel costs. Crops may need less water pumped to them in the beginning of the growing season, and you can make fewer trips across the field, compared to the number of trips normally required. Also, during this windy season, if you cover up or burned all the residue you might have to make another trip with a sand fighter or rotary hoe to keep the top soil from blowing. Why not leave more residue on the soil surface to control this problem? This will also improve possibilities for pheasant hunting since these residues can provide both food and cover for wildlife.

At a time when savings are important, it makes sense to manage your crop residues in a way that can conserve soil, water, fuel and wildlife.

independent of foreign economic demands. When consideration of that energy policy is done, the interests, and the potential contributions, of West Texas and the Permian Basin must be protected by someone who is familiar with their problems and their capabilities."

Richards also noted that the water problem in West Texas is not just a state problem.

"State Sen. John Montford has done an excellent job in setting the pace in working toward a sensible water policy. It's also a regional problem involving several states which lie over the Ogallala formation. I want to help John make sure that the federal government provides the type of cooperation with Texas to solve our water needs in West Texas."

"We also cannot overlook foreign affairs, because foreign affairs have a way of becoming domestic affairs," he added. "When we embargo grain to the Soviet Union, we affect farmers in West Texas; when they have an OPEC oil embargo, we have to stand in gas lines in Texas; and when they have a civil war in the Middle East, it's your sons and your neighbors' sons who are sent in to preserve peace."

"I am a native of West Texas and I understand the diverse interests involved. The 19th Congressional District is larger than eight states and the needs of the northern portion are not always the same as in the southern portion. I feel I have a real sense of the West Texas people and what their needs are in each portion of the district. Add to that my background in government and foreign affairs and I know I can be effective immediately in serving the needs of West Texas."

Richards is a former administrative aide to Congressman Kent Hance. He worked in Washington for two and a half years and learned foreign affairs as the legislative assistant for military and foreign affairs. He learned of U.S. military posture through his experiences including touring the Minuteman Missile Silos in South Dakota, the B-52 Nuclear Bomber Wing on stand-by alert at Ellsworth AFB, and the underground "war room" at the Air Force's Strategic Air Command near Omaha, Neb. He also has attended briefing seminars on foreign affairs at the United Nations in New York. Richards was cleared by the FBI for a Top Secret security clearance in order to attend Department of Defense classified briefings on military strength and strategy of the Soviet Union.

The City of Friona received \$8,725.35 for the period. This was up from the total of \$4,984.98 for the comparable period a year ago. The city has received \$92,944.78 for the year, down by 1.2 per cent from the total of \$94,137.72 a year ago. The county's three municipalities have received \$139,644, just \$268 less than for 1982.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Wednesday any talk about how much money the state will have in 1987 is "speculation, pure and simple."

"There is no change in my estimate of current state revenues," Bullock said. "There is no financial Santa Claus in Austin and there is no more money available now than there was when I issued the latest revenue estimate two months ago," he said.

Bullock said forecasts of any growth that might be expected in state revenues three to four years in the future would have to be based on the modest economic recovery now underway in Texas. "I hope and pray this recovery will continue and we'll have more money for the next state budget, but there's no way I can guarantee that happening," Bullock said.

"I will issue an estimate forecasting state revenues 30 months in advance the next time the Legislature meets. I've got a pretty good record of accuracy in these forecasts--three per cent on the conservative side--but I'm not ready to start looking in my crystal ball four years into the future. That's counting chickens from eggs that haven't even been laid yet."

Registration for Spring semester is January 5 from 7-8 p.m. Late registration and schedule changes are January 17 from 6-7 p.m. Representatives from the Amarillo

College Registrar's and Business offices will be available as well as textbooks for courses.

Instructors for the AC courses in Hereford number 12 to 16 a semester. Forty per cent of these are full-time Amarillo College faculty with the remaining supplemental staff coming from both Hereford and Amarillo.

Amarillo College has offered classes in Hereford since spring of 1974 when course enrollments numbered 52. In 1982-83 enrollments were up to 624 with an increase projected for the 1983-84 school year.

General academic classes are offered as well as complete programs in banking, child care associate, real estate, vocational nursing and mid-management. Beginning courses in computer information systems are now available. New class offerings are opened when sufficient need is demonstrated.

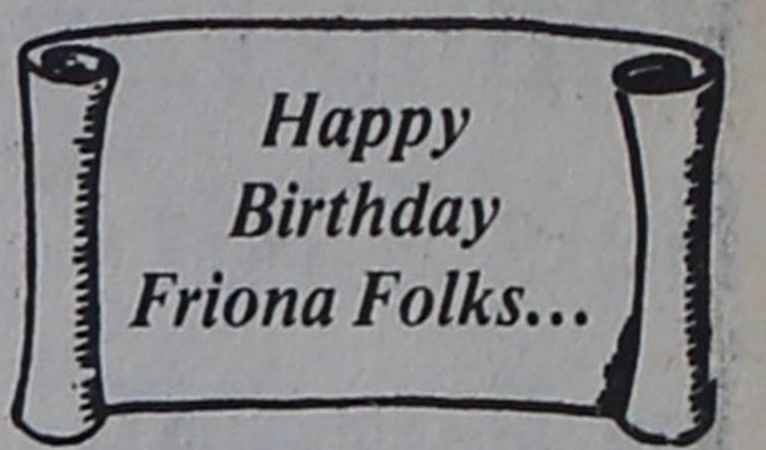

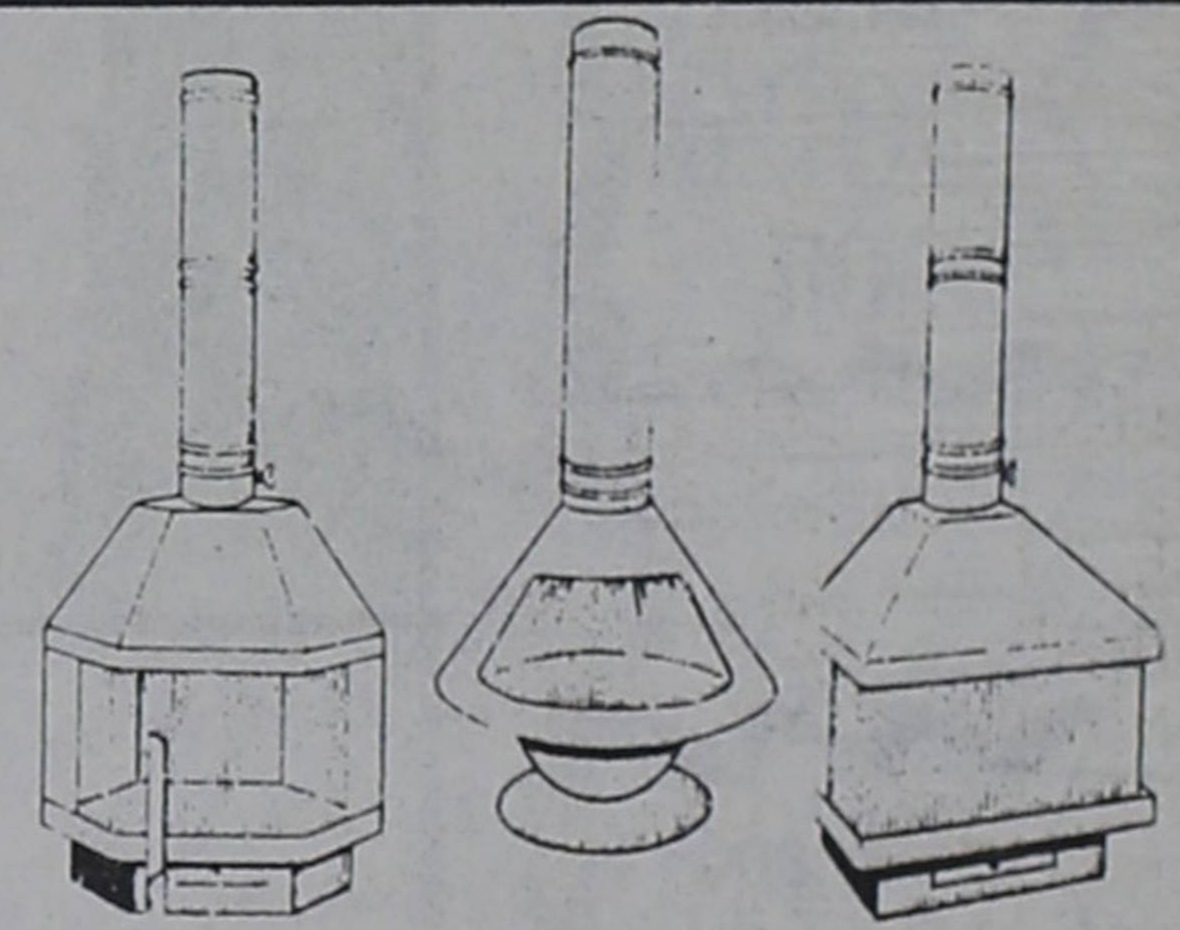
