## Plans Underway For Holiday Fete

Preparations are underway for Friona's annual Fourth of July celebration, according to Kathy Beard, manager of the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

All of the events are scheduled for Wednesday, July 4th, and will conclude with the 15th annual free fireworks display at the Reeve Lake area, beginning at dark.

Other events on the schedule include a "free splash" at the swimming pool, beginning at 10 a.m.

A mixed tennis tournament will be held at the Friona High School courts.

The Friona Noon Lions will hold their barbecue beef and sausage dinner at the Community Center, with serving slated to begin at 11:30 a.m.

Tickets for the dinner are on sale from club members. Those buying tickets in advance for the dinner will be eligible to win a 12-inch black and white television set. Winner will not need to be present at the dinner.

Also on the schedule are a gymnastics exhibition at the Community Center, beginning at 1:30 p.m.

Contests will get underway at the Center beginning at 2 p.m. with the sack race, horseshoe pitching contest and ping-pong tournament.

A potato race will be held starting at 2:30 p.m., followed by the World's Championship turtle race at 3 p.m., the softball throw at 3:30 p.m., a bicycle race beginning at 4 p.m. and water polo competition at 4:30 p.m.

Concession stands will be operated by various clubs during the day at the Community Center.

The annual fireworks display was financed for 1984 by a volleyball tournament sponsored earlier this year by the Friona 4-H Club, assisted by the Friona Star volleyball team.

Also, for the 15th consecutive year, the Friona Volunteer Fire Department members will be in charge of the display.

**THE SUMMER OF 1984** may go down as the one for the most unusual crossings of the country by those with crusades, or projects, or events to promote.

In May we had Jennifer Roy with her little donkey and covered wagon, making a cross-country walk, in our community. Mrs. Roy is attempting to raise money to build a facility to house Vietnam veterans on the West Coast.

Then on Thursday of this week, Fernand Tonneau came jogging through Friona, enroute to Los Angeles from New York. Tonneau plans to see the 1984 Olympics, and in the meantime is measuring the breadth of our country a step at a time.

A week earlier, Bob Wieland, who also has a Vietnam background, came through on Highway 60.

We have to admit that in over 20 years of meeting, visiting and photographing these "cross country addicts," that Wieland was the most unusual. He is making the pilgrimage despite the fact that he lost both legs in Vietnam.

When you see Wieland plodding along, with his arms having to also serve as his legs, you suddenly forget that you have any problems at all.

Wieland is crossing the country to call attention to world hunger. He has been on the road for 21 months already, and it may take him that much longer. And we hesitate to walk to the post office, in spite of having two good legs.

Probably the most heralded cross-country project, the Olympic torch relay, came through Parmer County last Sunday, June 17. The relay didn't come through our town, but came fairly close, coming up Highway 84 from Lubbock, through Farwell and Clovis.

As we understand it, this is only the second time for the Olympic torch relay to cross America. The custom was revived for the 1932 Olympics, the last time our country served as host nation. A similar relay and torch-lighting ceremony has been held for most of the Olympics since that time.

This year's relay will set a record, by covering almost 13,000 miles, touching nearly every state. The journey will take 82 days in all, and when the runners were crossing Parmer County on Sunday, the project was exactly at its half-way mark, in its 41st day.

The torch lighting takes place at Olympia, Greece at the altar of Zeus near the stadium where the ancient Olympic Games were held. A relay of Greek runners transport the torch to Athens.

From there, the torch makes its way to the host country, this year arriving in New York by jet on May 8, where it began its step-by-step trip to the West Coast.

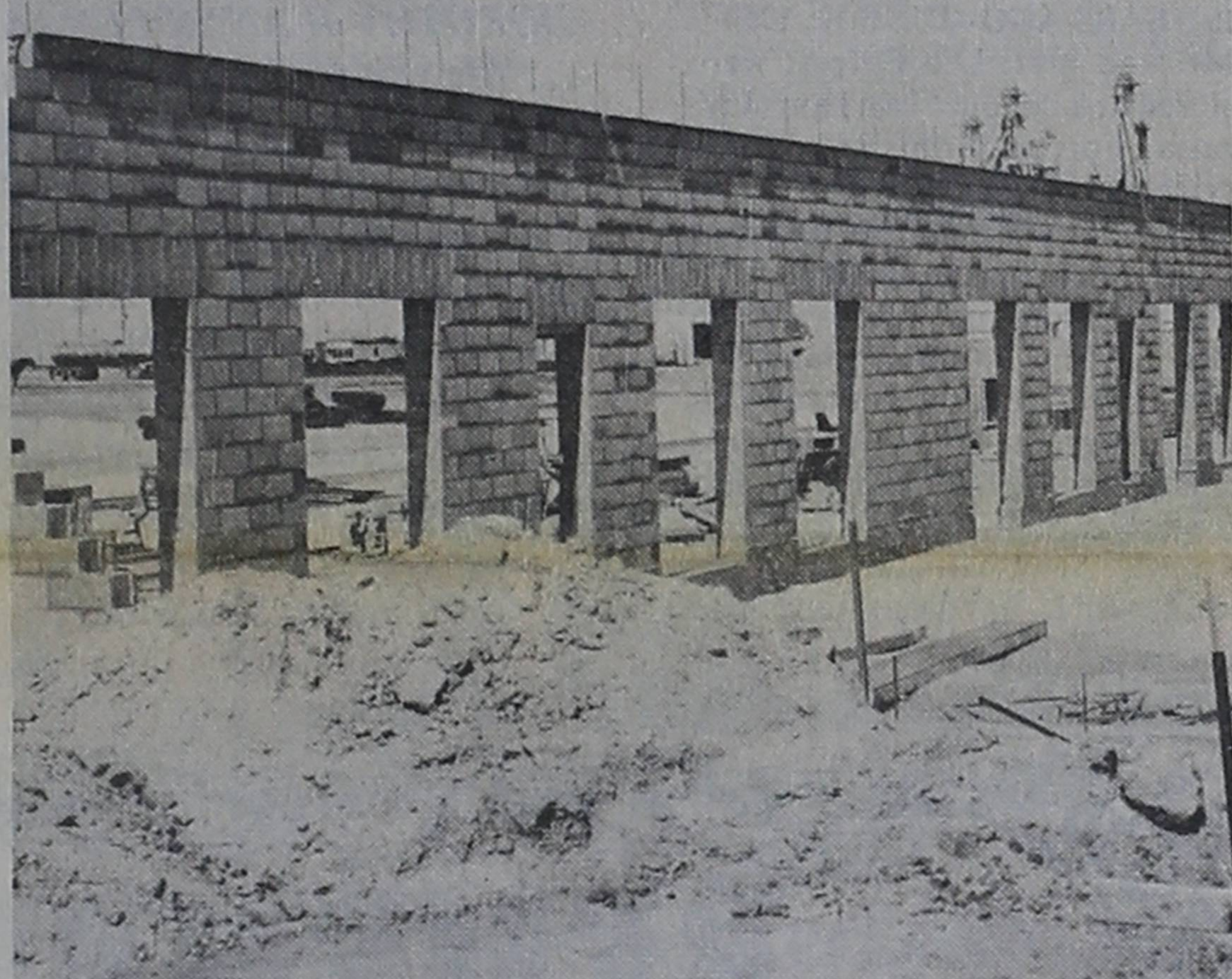
The first kilometer of the project was run by Bill Thorpe, Jr. and Gina Hemphill, grandchildren of two American Olympic heroes, Jim Thorpe and Jesse Owens.

Thousands of young Americans are getting the opportunity to carry the torch this year, in more than 1500 communities. Local sponsors are paying \$3,000 per kilometer for the right to allow young men and women to take part in the relay. Proceeds go to Boys Clubs and Girls Clubs of America.

Ye editor and young son Richard saw the torch as it prepared to enter the county on Sunday, and we were fortunate enough to see the changing of runners (they also light a new torch), which happens approximately every five miles. We also had a chance to visit one of the runners, Jim Sloan.

We'll be watching on July 28 when the last runner in the relay lights the flame at the Olympic site in Los Angeles. It will mark the culmination of a lot of steps to continue this proud tradition.

addicted to long-distance running, came to America April 10 for a visit with a cousin in Rhode Island, and to enter the Boston Marathon.

He did quite well in the marathon, placing 25th in the master's division (40 years old and older), with a time of two hours, 46 minutes for the 26-mile course. Overall, in the field of over 7,000 who started the world-famous marathon, Tonneau placed "about 900th."

The runner retired two years after a career in the Belgian army. His record in the marathon is 2:38.

As a younger runner, Tonneau competed in the 1500-meter run, as well as 5,000 and 10,000-meter events and cross-country races.

He holds the Belgian record for 100 kilometers for age 40 and over, at seven hours, 36 minutes. Last summer he competed in a 160-mile race from Athens to Sparta, Greece. Of the original field of 51 who started the event, Tonneau was one of the 15 finishers and ran it in 32 hours. "It was hot, and we had a hard, mountainous course. I don't expect to try that one again," he said.

## "Ideal" Rainfall Boosts Area's Crop Outlook

The old saying goes "A good rain would help this country more than anything."

That's what the area received during the past week, and as a result, the farm crops are off to one of their best starts in years.

The official measurement for the City of Friona was 2.18 inches of rain for the period between Saturday, June 16 and Wednesday, June 20.

The biggest measurement came during the 24-hour period ending at 7 a.m. Wednesday, when a total of .94 inches of rainfall was measured.

For the period ending Monday at 7 a.m., the measurement was .56 inches, and another .49 inch was logged for the 24-hour period ending at 7 a.m. Tuesday.

The week's total, added to the .64 inch which had been logged the previous week, brings the total moisture for the month of June to 2.82 inches, according to Rodney Dunnam, official weather recorder.

Agricultural observers felt that the week's rainfall fell "just right." Virtually all of the moisture logged during the past week fell slowly, allowing every bit to soak into the waiting topsoil.

Wheat farmers, many of whom were about ready to start harvesting their crops, have had to wait out the period with crossed fingers, but the immediate area escaped virtually without any hail during the several-day span of rainclouds. This in itself points to an unusual trait for local weather.

"All of the crops look real good," said Gary Brown, agricultural representative for Friona State Bank. "The cotton, corn and sugar beets are all off to a good start. We have a lot more acreage in crops this year than last year," Brown said.

Brown said the rain, although too late to be a big yield booster for the wheat crop, nevertheless should help certain fields, which were still green when the rain fell. "We may get some extra weeds in the wheat because of the rain, but the rain should benefit everyone. It saved a lot of natural gas," he said, referring to the irrigation of crops, which was underway when the rains came.

The rainfall will allow farmers who planned to plant late maize to go ahead and plant their crops, Brown said. Also, there should be some sunflowers go into the ground.

Up until the cool front invaded the area on Sunday, the rains had been spotted, and many

areas still had nothing or very little to show in the way of moisture.

For instance, the Bovina community received a nice rain on Friday evening and another on Saturday, which "played out" by the time it got to Friona.

The city of Clovis, which had received a five-inch flood-type rain in May, had an "instant replay" during the past week, and low-lying areas have been under water. The lake at the north end of Clovis' Main Street was across 21st Street, causing that street to be closed. The old football field east of their main street was several feet underwater.

But, by the time the middle of the week rolled around, most of the Friona area had finally received some moisture.

Here is a random sampling of the area's farmers, with an effort to pick areas on all sides of Friona:

Bob Welch, who lives seven miles northeast of Friona, has received two inches of rain in the past ten days. "We were beginning to feel completely left out, but it finally came," Welch said.

Sarah Dean, in the Rhea Community, said they had measured four inches of rain since the first of June, with about 1.5 inches of that total coming during the past week.

Joe Allen, at Shirley-Anderson Elevator at Rhea, said he had recorded 4.1 inches since June 13. There had been no hail at Rhea, but some was reported west of his location.

Danny Smith, who farms 15 miles northwest of Friona in the Bootleg Community, said he had received "at least three inches" of rain during the period.

Farmers in the Bovina community reported from 2.5 to five inches of rain for the recent period.

Carrol Cook, who farms four miles west of Hub, said he had received five inches since the rain first started. Most of it had been good, slow rain.

Lloyd Rector, who lives five miles south of Friona and three-quarters of a mile east, said they had received about three inches of rain. The road they had thought was gravel has turned into a "bottomless pit," but the rain fell real slow and was great.

Lee Dennis Jesko, 16 miles south of Friona in the Clay's Corner area, said he had received about three and one-half inches of rain during

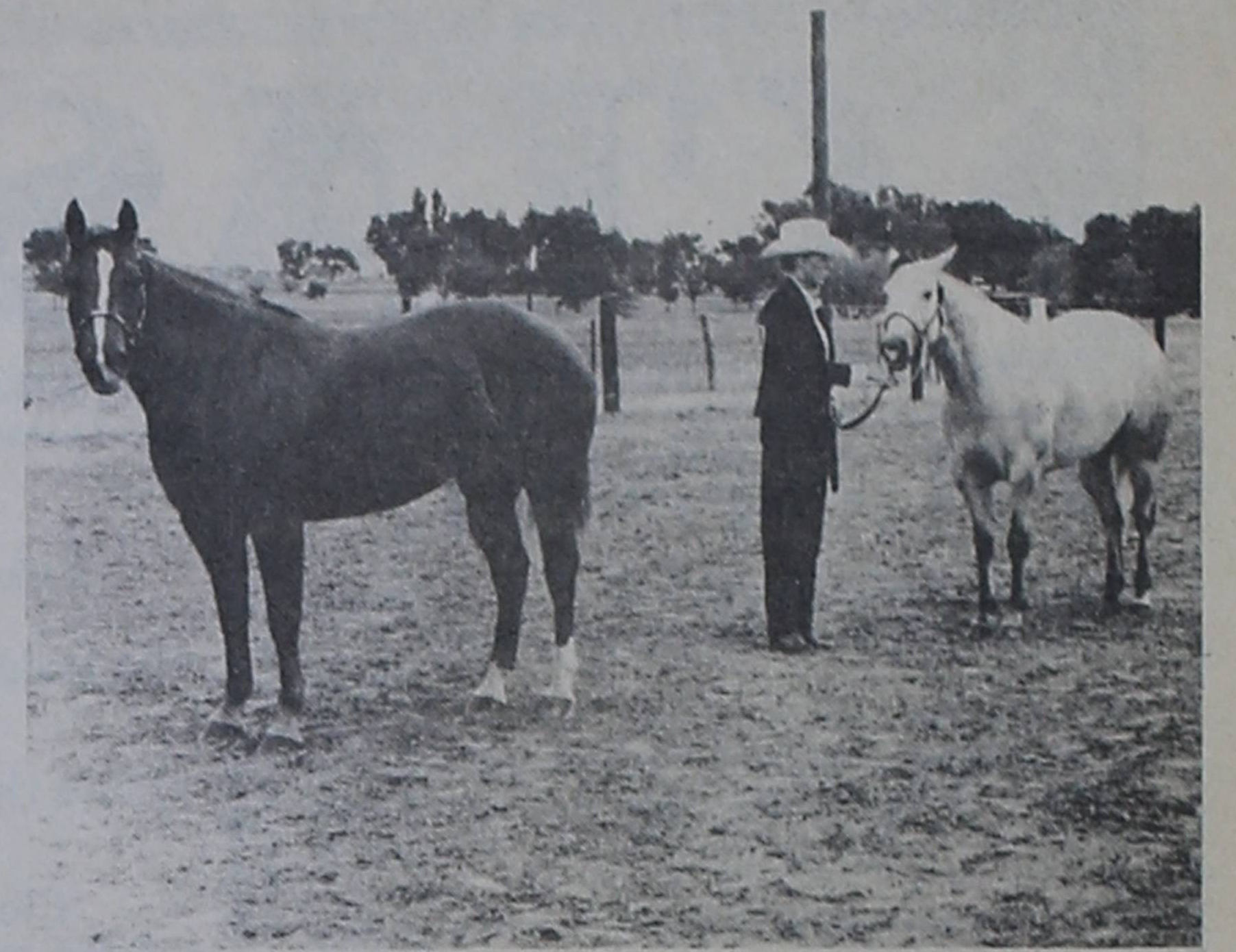

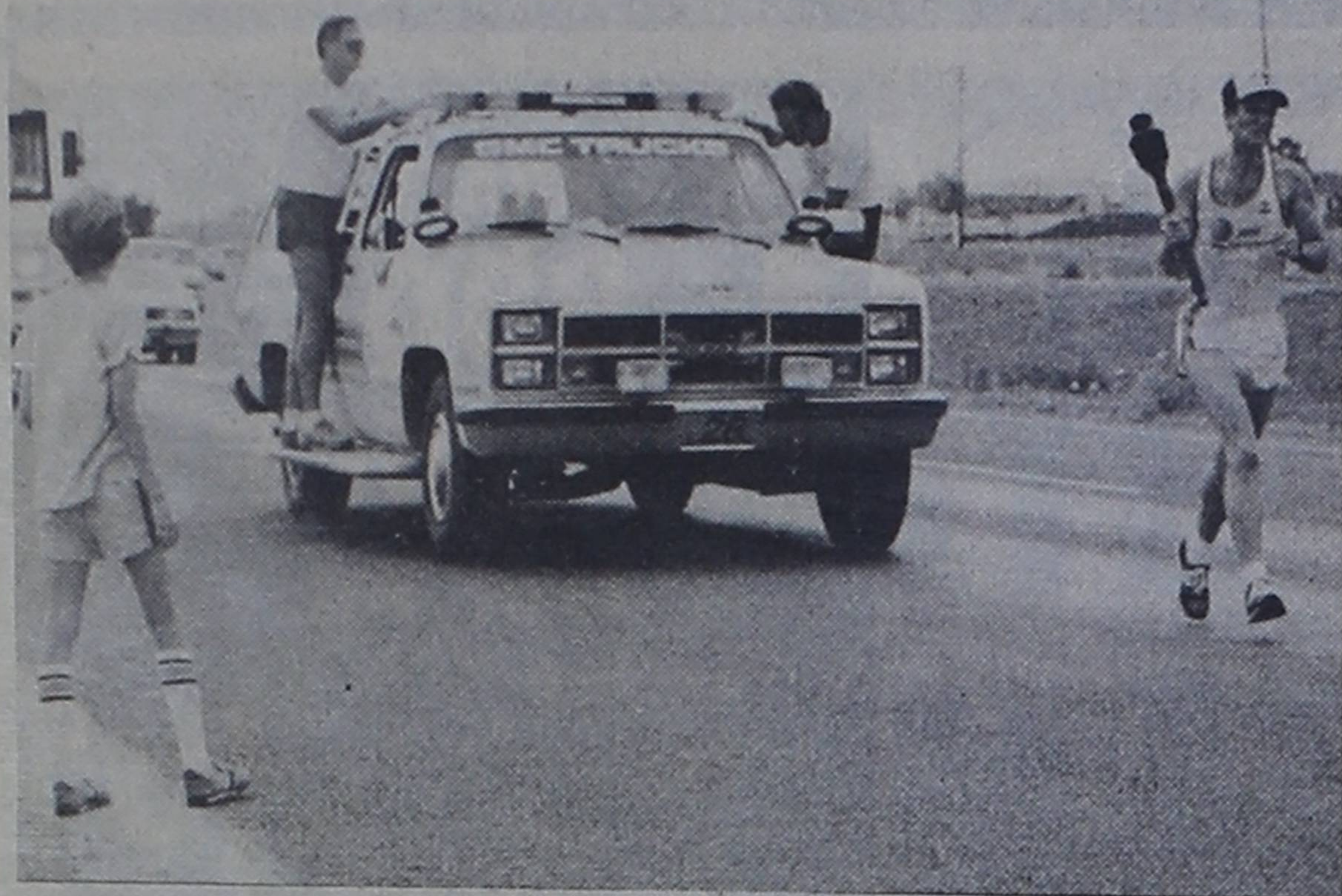

**FOOD AWARENESS** By Ann Crowley R.D., Ph.D.  
CHEER FOR CHERRIES  
I have recently received two inquiries about cherries jubilee. Both consumers were interested in the type of cherries that can be used for cherries jubilee.  
Answer: This beautiful dramatic flaming dessert makes a spectacular ending to a meal. Interestingly several types of cherries can be used.  
The most frequently used cherries are canned, pitted dark sweet cherries. I have also used fresh bright cherries and canned sweetened cherry pie filling. Following is a standard recipe for cherries jubilee.  
1-16 ounce can pitted dark sweet cherries  
1/4 cup sugar  
2 Tablespoons cornstarch  
1/4 cup brandy, kirsch or cherry brandy  
6 scoops vanilla ice cream  
Drain cherries, reserve liquid. Add cold water to liquid to make 1 cup. Combine sugar and cornstarch, add to liquid. Cook and stir until thickened. Add cherries. Place in warm chafing dish. Keep hot. Heat brandy in small saucepan. Pour brandy into ladle and ignite. Pour flaming brandy over cherries. Ladle flaming cherries over ice cream.

have given him a good reception, including taking him into their homes to spend the night. His only bad experiences have come in St. Louis, where a car driven by an 87-year-old man slammed him to the ground and caused some bruises but no broken bones, and the theft of his luggage at Columbus, Ohio, which contained his camera and his maps plotting his route.

The Nike Corp., which agreed to serve as a sponsor and furnishes Tonneau's shoes, socks and uniform, has replaced the luggage, and Tonneau was grateful for that.

He carries a small back-pack of about five pounds which contains bare necessities. His heavier luggage is shipped from point-to-point on a weekly basis, usually by U.P.S.

Tonneau became acquainted with America while attending a Nike Missile System school in El Paso in 1963-64. "I got to see a lot of the country at that time, particularly the west, and began to develop the idea of the run."

He said the Olympic year served as an inspiration. His proposed arrival date in Los Angeles is July 21. He may miss the opening ceremonies, but Tonneau plans to be there for the big event.

Tonneau was in Friona at noon Thursday. He had run from Amarillo to Hereford on Wednesday. He tries to cover 25-30 miles per day and sometimes (as evidenced), even more.

## Candidate Richards' Father Dies

Longtime West Texas newspaper publisher Afton E. Richards died Thursday morning in Lubbock Methodist Hospital's Coronary Care Unit. He was 70.

Richards, father of Don Richards, Democratic nominee for the 19th Congressional District, was editor-publisher of his hometown Ralls Banner. He also published the Lorenzo Leader, Aspermont News and Jayton Chronicle.

During his career Richards was involved with newspaper operations in Anton, Levelland, Meadow and Muleshoe. In 1982 he received an award from the Texas Press Association in recognition of his 50 years of service.

Richards was a minister in the Primitive Baptist Church and was pastor of churches in Lubbock and Crosbyton.

He married Mary Bass Sept. 12, 1934, in Crosbyton. She preceded him in death in 1969. He married Opal Sanders Dec. 12, 1969, in Corpus Christi.

He was born in Haskell county. He and his brothers began their newspaper careers as teen-agers, working for their father in Anton.

Services will be at 10 a.m. Saturday at the Primitive Baptist Church in Lubbock. Elders G.H. Crain of Arlington and George Johnson of Idalou will officiate.

Burial will be in the Anton Cemetery under direction of Carter-Adams Funeral Home.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Charles and Larry of Dallas and Don of Lubbock; a stepson, Ronald Sanders of Houston; a daughter, Mary Beth Sudduth of Conway, Ark.; a sister, Ima Dora Haile of Plainview; a brother, Edwin of Rockwall; eight grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

The family suggests memorials to the Afton Richards Scholarship Fund established at the Mass Communications Department at Texas Tech University.

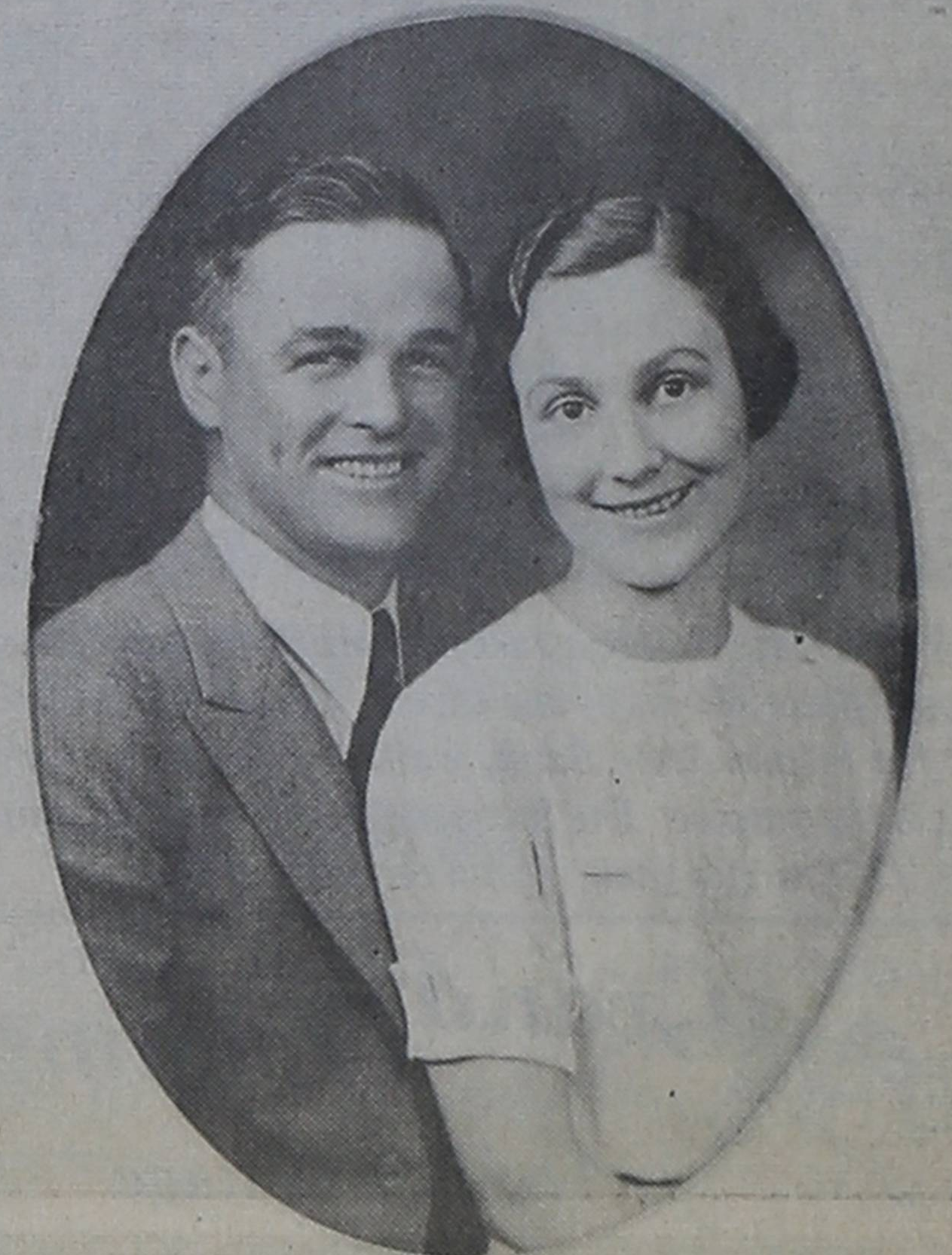

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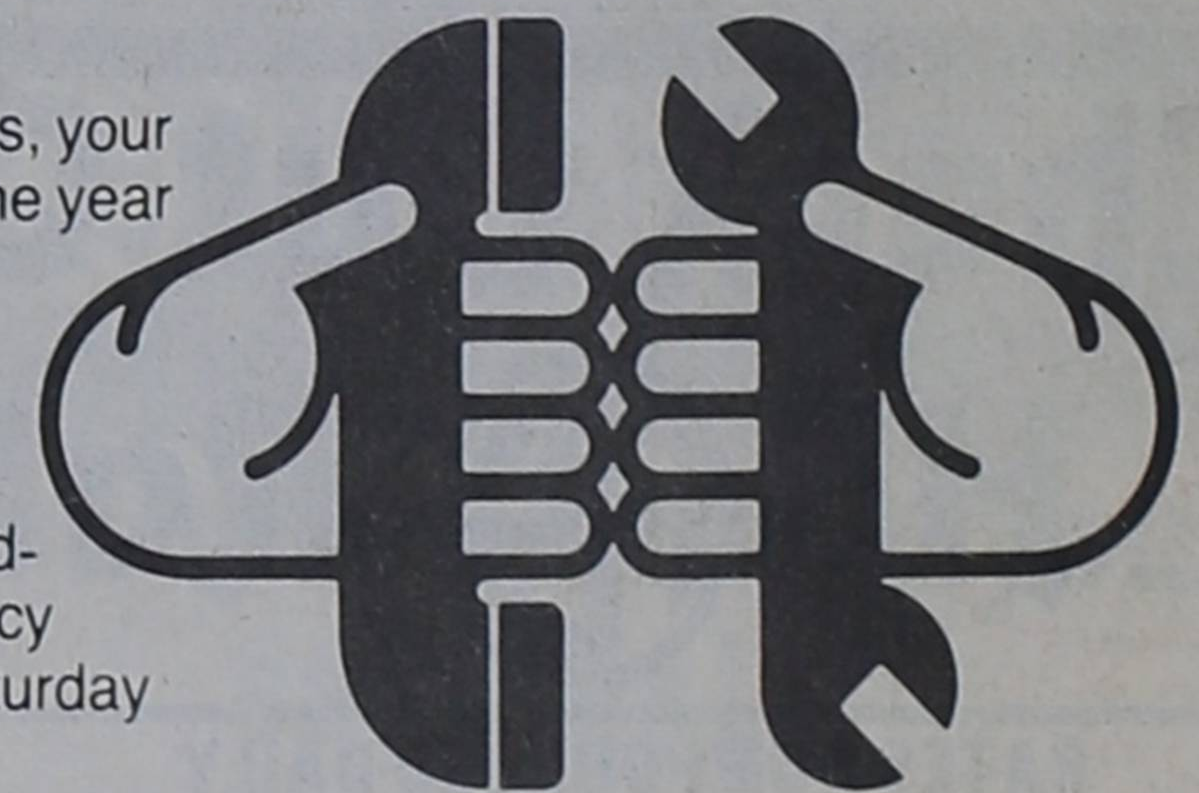

The Lazbuddie Young Homemakers will soon be holding a membership tea as part of their annual membership drive. Anyone interested in becoming a member is urged to contact any of the Lazbuddie Young Homemakers at this time.

The Lazbuddie Young Homemakers organization has been active for over two decades. This service organization seeks to strengthen the family and community and to provide assistance to community members in need.

Through the years, the Lazbuddie Young Homemakers have donated winter coats and eyeglasses to needy children, provided for the school playground equipment, a television and video recorder, elementary track meet ribbons and other needed items.

Area senior citizens are a special concern to the Lazbuddie Young Homemakers. Members visit, correspond with and give gifts to these special citizens.

Although the main purpose of the Young Homemakers organization is to strengthen and preserve the family, the Lazbuddie Young Homemakers organize and conduct many worthwhile projects which are designed to serve the community.
