## Plant Construction Is "On Schedule"

In spite of experiencing its first major weather caused delay, construction on Friona's Millard Warehouse facility continues to be on schedule, according to company officials.

John McDaniel, who has been in charge of the project, said this week that although the recent rains caused workers to lose about ten working days, the project is "pretty well on schedule."

Workmen at the plant site this week were busy pouring footings for the plant's dock area. They were also pouring the floor on one of the building's larger rooms.

The company's refrigeration specialists were expected to be in Friona on Monday, August 20 with the refrigeration equipment, which is to be installed.

Millard will operate a cold storage facility with approximately 70,000 square feet or 1,680,000 cubic feet of space when their new facility is completed.

The Millard Corporation buys the refrigeration equipment and does its own installation.

"The refrigeration motors are all here, except for one 175-horsepower motor, which had to be reordered," McDaniel said.

Wayne Quinn is construction foreman on the Friona project, and McDaniel praised the work of Quinn and his crew.

"It's amazing, the progress being made by Quinn and his construction crew this spring and summer," McDaniel said.

A 12-man crew has been responsible for the bulk of the construction work on the new plant, not counting workers from companies hired for specialty work.

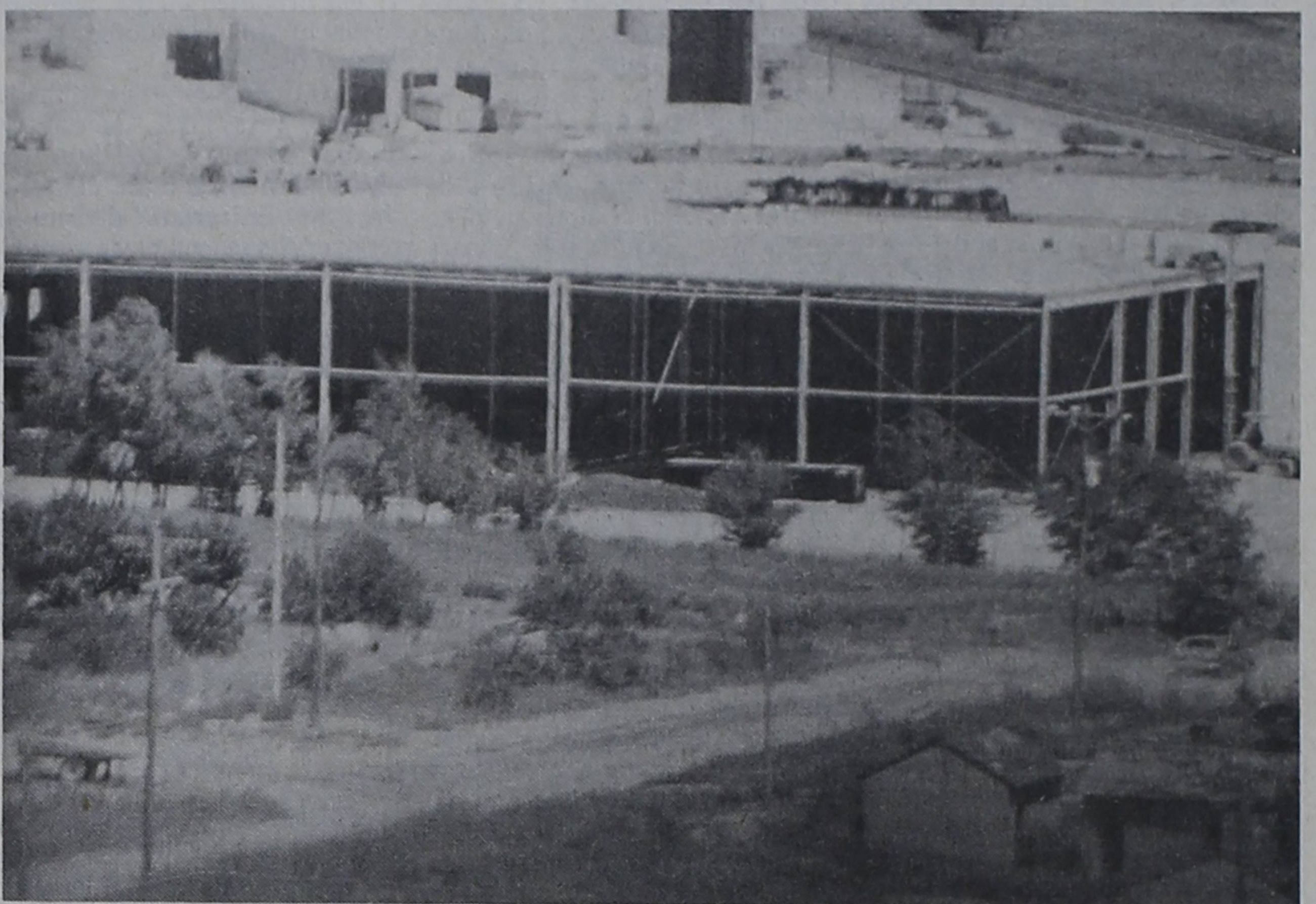
McDaniel said the construction workers will be given an opportunity to continue as Millard employees when the plant opens.

In addition, the Millard spokesman said he had received a number of job applications, especially from women, for the processing jobs the new plant will offer.

Officials are hoping to open the Friona facility in October.

The warehouse is expected to employ over 100 workers during "Phase One" of its operation. Other phases of the plant are expected to follow.

In addition, Prime International will be leasing space in the Millard plant and will be a separate employer.

## Jarboe Releases School Schedules

The schedule for the beginning of school was announced this week by Tom Jarboe, Friona Superintendent of Schools.

Teachers will report on Wednesday, August 22, at 8:30 a.m. to the Friona High School Cafeteria. They will have in-service days Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, August 22, 23 and 24.

High School students will register on Friday, August 24, with juniors and seniors reporting to the High School Auditorium at 9 a.m. and grades nine and ten reporting at 10:30 a.m.

The first day of school will be Monday, August 27, with buses running their regular routes. There will be new school hours this year and the buses will be running about 25 minutes earlier than last year. The new hours will be 8:20 a.m. to 3:45 p.m.

"It will be helpful for students to arrive at school at 8:05 a.m., but they don't need to arrive before that time, as it causes a problem," Jarboe said.

Kindergarten students and first

grades are asked to report to the Primary Building. Grades two and three report to the Grade School building through the west doors on Cleveland Street. Grades four and five should report to the south wing of the Grade School building. Assistance will be provided to help students get to their proper rooms.

Grades six, seven, and eight will need to report to the Junior High building.

High School students, having registered the previous Friday, will report to their regular classes.

All new students to the Friona system, or kindergarten students that did not pre-register, are urged to report to their respective principals immediately, Jarboe reported.

Kindergarten and new first grade students will need to bring birth certificates or acceptable birth records. Also new students should bring report cards or information from their prior school and immunization records, when they register.

Parents of kindergarten students are also reminded that their child must be picked up from school at 12 noon for the first week. Letters will be mailed to the parents of kindergarten students who pre-registered, before August 27, with more complete details.

Lunch prices will be the same as last year: K through fifth grade, \$1.10 per meal; six through eight: \$1.15; high school, \$1.25 per meal. Breakfast prices are 50 cents for all students. Applications for free or reduced lunches will be made available during the first week of school.

There are many new guidelines and requirements under the new laws for public schools. School officials will be making an all-out effort to release this information to the students and parents during the first month of school.

## Corp. Approves Revenue Bonds

The Parmer County Industrial Development Corporation met on Monday, August 13 and gave the final approval to three million dollars of industrial revenue bonds to be used to finance the Millard Warehouse in Friona. The bonds will save the company approximately two and one-half million dollars in interest over a course of fifteen years.

B.K. Buske, president, and Steve Sherrill of Bovina, secretary of the corporation, met with Chuck Addya and John McDaniel

to give final approval to the bonds after their hearing August 5, and the Parmer County Commissioners Court ratified the corporation's decision.

The Parmer County Industrial Development Corporation, formed one year ago, welcomes all sources of commercial and industrial bond applications. The applications are available to prospective firms valuing one-half million dollars and up. Millard is the first account for the firm.

**50 YEARS AGO--AUG. 17, 1934**

Information from the president of the local board of school trustees, states that the Friona schools will open for the term on Monday, August 3, that being two weeks from the coming Monday. A complete faculty of teachers has been secured, which includes practically all who were here last year, with at least one additional teacher, the instructor of vocational agriculture. The fleet of eight new school buses has already arrived and the long garage or shed for their protection has been erected on the newly acquired school property.

**45 YEARS AGO--AUG. 18, 1939**

This territory and much of the surrounding counties was visited Sunday night by a good and much needed rain, which gave a fall of from three-fourths of an inch to an estimated inch and a half, as reported from the various sections of the territory from a few miles north and west, to the southern limits of the county.

**40 YEARS AGO--AUG. 11, 1944**

The Republican County Convention which met in Friona, Saturday, July 29, was called to order by Temporary Chairman F.W. Reeve, and by unanimous vote the temporary organization

Gubernatorial candidate Ralph Yarborough made a brief stop Tuesday evening at the Friona airport, being met by a local delegation and one from Hereford. Though scheduled to speak at Hereford, Yarborough was forced by delay in plane flights to omit the Hereford visit.

**25 YEARS AGO--AUG. 13, 1959**

A.T. Eiland, 81, of Olton Route, Plainview, was reported to be improving at Parmer County Community Hospital, Tuesday, following a collision Thursday about noon at the Hub corner. Eiland was driving a 1955 Oldsmobile toward Dimmitt when his auto was struck by a 1953 Mack diesel truck loaded with potatoes which was going south toward Muleshoe as the vehicles met in the Hub intersection. The truck, which was driven by J.I. Reames of Amarillo had loaded with potatoes in Hereford and was headed to Midland.

Friona Industries had net earnings of \$3.6 million, or \$1.57 per share, on sales of \$274 million for its fiscal year ended June 30, 1984.

This compared with net earnings of \$3.7 million, or \$1.71 per share, on sales of \$240 million in the prior fiscal year.

"Meat Processing and Distribution, Custom Feeding, Commercial Feeds and Grain operations all achieved very good increases in operating profit margins and higher sales volume," said Ron Davenport, chairman, president and chief executive officer.

"Company-owned Cattle incurred an operating loss of \$309,000 for the year because of decreased profit margins, and operating profits from the Animal Health Supplies segment were below those of the previous year," he added.

During the fourth quarter, the Company reported net earnings of \$749,000 or 34 cents per share, on sales of \$62 million, compared

with net earnings of \$1 million, or 45 cents per share, on sales of \$58 million in the same quarter of fiscal 1983.

"The fourth quarter followed the trend of the first three quarters with gains in all business segments with the exception of Company-owned Cattle and Animal Health Supplies," explained Davenport.

Meat Processing and Distribution showed considerable strength with sales of 68.3 million pounds of hamburger meat, 13 per cent higher than in fiscal 1983. The number of Wendy's Old Fashioned Hamburger Restaurants served with ground beef, produce and other items increased by 113 units, totaling 903 at year end.

Feedyard occupancy was 20 per cent higher for the year, which contributed to greater profitability from Custom Feeding, Commercial Feeds and Grain operations.

## COMBEST COMMENTS

### Six Point Plan for Fair and Effective Farm Policy

#### Part 1

In my last column I talked about the regional meeting held by Agriculture Secretary Block to listen to farm representatives' views before writing the 1985 farm bill. I was invited to speak at the meeting and used the opportunity to tell the Secretary what I'd heard in my travels throughout the 19th district. I organized my message into six specific proposals for future farm programs. I'll discuss the first three in this column and the remaining points next time.

First, State and County ASC Committees must have more discretion and authority. National programs must be able to respond to local conditions. In the South Plains area, recent weather and a severe cost/price squeeze have created a situation in which only a flexible, responsive program can be administered fairly.

Second, farm bill sign-up should be extended until at least April 16th. This year the sign-up deadline was March 16th and the ACR program was binding. This does not allow farmers enough time to effectively consider price prospects, financing, weather and other factors. In contrast, the deadline in 1982 was April 16th and sign-up was non-binding. This allows farmers the opportunity to make the most intelligent decision and encourages greater participation in farm programs. The deadline for sign-up should be no earlier than April 16th.

And third, individual farm yield calculations must reflect true production capability. In recent years, weather has significantly reduced yields in the South Plains area. It is essential that these farms' individual yields are not calculated so low

that their payment yield becomes out of proportion to their ability to produce. Some adjustments in the system have helped; however, the present mechanism does not provide a realistic picture of the individual farm. A more responsible method of calculation would lead to a stronger agricultural economy for the farmers and residents of the South Plains.

These three proposals ask for nothing more, or less, from Washington than a farm bill that is fair and effective for all farmers. If this is accomplished, more West Texas' producers will participate in the program and the nation's farmers and farm economy will benefit.

I want to hear your comments on these and other proposals for fair and effective farm policy. Write to me at 1606 Avenue X, Lubbock, 79401. We must make certain that the voice of West Texas is heard when Washington writes farm legislation for 1985.
