Gramm To Speak In Hereford

Republican candidate for the U.S. Senate, Phil Gramm, will be in Hereford to meet with supporters and members of the general public on Friday, October 12.

Gramm will be at the Hereford Community Center on Park Avenue, at 3:15 p.m.

Anyone interested in hearing the senatorial candidate is urged to attend, according to a spokesman for Gramm's campaign.

The longtime contest entrant moved up from third place in the previous week's contest to claim the top honors this week.

Clark was one of five contestants to correctly pick 19 games in the weekly event.

He had a hammerlock on first place by virtue of the fact that he practically hit the Friona-Muleshoe score right on the nose. Clark picked the Chiefs to win, 21-19, missing the actual score by just a point (Muleshoe scored 20 points). Clark receives \$10.00 for his efforts.

Laura Field of Dalhart and Archie Echols tied for third place, missing the Friona-Muleshoe score by five points. She picked the

Chiefs, 24-18, and received \$2.50 for her share of third place.

Echols picked the Chiefs, 23-17, missing the actual score by five points and having to share third place with Ms. Field.

Another member of the Field family, Mike, was the fifth contestant to pick 19 games, but his tie-breaker score prediction was 17 points away from the actual score. He picked Friona 14, Muleshoe 7.

Clark and Spring even missed the same five games: Dimmitt-Morton, Sunray-River Road, Houston-Louisville, Nebraska-Syracuse, and L.A. Raiders-Denver.

Echols missed Morton-Dimmitt, Tech-Baylor, Houston-Louisville, Nebraska-Syracuse and Raiders-Denver. Ms. Field missed Morton-Dimmitt, Houston-Louisville, Nebraska-Syracuse, Green Bay-Tampa Bay and Raiders-Denver.

Fifteen contestants correctly picked 18 games. They were Dana Jameson, Kevin Beavers, Craig Trimm, Zane Polson, Danny Murphree, Ricky White, Dale Milner, Todd Widler, Jackie Morgan, Jo Blackwell, Tommy Moss, Mike Maynard, Alan Monroe, Roger Fields and Ronnie Melton.

Another 20 contestants correctly picked 17 games; 26 more had scores of 16; and another 26 had 15 games right.

After four weeks, Dale Milner leads the standings in the race for grand prize, with 72 points, an even 75 per cent correct. Mike Field of Dalhart is in second place at 71; James Clark and Danny Murphree are tied for third at 69.

Next are Jack Clark, Bruce Patterson, Ricky White and Todd Widler at 68; Bobby Wied at 67; Jo Blackwell, Patti Field, Patches Fleming, David Gowens, Donita Martin, Tommy Moss, Hank Outland and Kent Patterson at 66.

Contestants are shooting for the grand prize of \$100, which will be awarded at the close of the 13-week contest.

ETHRIDGE-SPRING

Reception Set On 50th Anniv.

Ethridge-Spring Insurance Agency, which is observing its 50th year in business in Friona, will mark the occasion with an open house and reception at the company office, 603 Main Street, on Friday, October 12, between the hours of 3 and 6 p.m.

The officials and employees of the agency invite all of their friends and customers in the area to drop by their office next Friday and help them celebrate the anniversary. Refreshments will be served.

The beginning of Ethridge-Spring Agency, Inc. dates back to April, 1934 when Dan Ethridge opened the Dan Ethridge Agency at the corner of Sixth and Main in Friona, after purchasing "Uncle John" White's insurance agency. In the fall of the same year the office was moved to the Charles Lunsford Chevrolet Agency. Then in 1936 another move was made to the T.J. Crawford building on Main Street.

On March 1, 1939 Dan sold the business to Frank A. Spring as he decided to go to work for an insurance company. It was then known as the Frank A. Spring Agency. Dan was drafted into the armed service in 1943, and upon returning from the service in 1946, Friona really looked good to him and his wife, Eufaula. He decided to become a partner with Frank A. Spring, and the name of the business was changed to Ethridge-Spring Agency.

W.M. (Bill) Stewart moved to Friona from Texarkana, Arkansas in 1948 and soon joined the agency as a partner. In 1958 Stewart was presented an award by Cravens, Dargan & Company in Houston, Texas for the agency's outstanding service to farmers in the Friona area.

The area and business continued to grow, and in 1959 Flake Barber moved to Friona from Amarillo, and joined the agency as a partner.

In 1968, Barber decided to leave the insurance business, and sold his interest to Wendell Gresham of Amarillo. Wendell and his family moved to Friona and he became actively engaged in the operation of the business. At the same time, Lois Norwood, long-time office manager, also joined the agency as a partner. Within the next few years, Frank A. Spring sold his interest in the business to Lois Norwood and Wendell Gresham.

The agency was incorporated in 1972, and "Inc." was added to the name.

Agreement Made On Maintenance

Maintenance of the tennis courts located at the high school was an item of business discussed by the Friona School Board at its recent meeting.

Under the previous agreement, the maintenance of the courts was to be shared jointly by the city and school. Under the new agreement, the school is to assume responsibility for maintaining the courts, and the city will maintain the lighting of the courts.

The board is at the present time exploring methods of repairing or resurfacing the west courts, to restore them to playing condition.

In other business, the board voted to discontinue the TB testing of first grade students. Seventh grade students will continue to be given the test.

It was reported that as of August 31, 96 per cent of the 1983 tax roll had been collected.

It was agreed that 22 per cent of the 1984 taxes be set aside into the Interest and Sinking Fund.

Stewart retired to "enjoy life" and sold his interest in the agency to Charles H. Caudill who had recently moved to Friona from Tustin, California.

On August 1, 1978 Dan Ethridge, founder of the agency, decided to retire after 43 years as an independent insurance agent. He was given a citation by Bill Clayton, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, naming him as "Mr. Insurance of the Texas Panhandle."

Present owners of Ethridge-Spring Agency, Inc. are Lois Norwood, Wendell Gresham, and Charles H. Caudill who continue to strive to operate the business in the same tradition established by the founder and previous partners of the agency.

The offices of Ethridge-Spring Agency, Inc. remain at the same location at 603 Main but have undergone two extensive remodeling and expansion projects, first in 1956, and again in 1974.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 4, 1929
Judge I.R. Kelso, of St. Louis, president of the Texas Utilities Company, and J.B. Scott of Plainview, general manager of the company, were business visitors here one day last week. The chief object of the visit was that they might inform the people of Friona who are patrons of the company that another rate cut had been made to users of light for domestic purposes.

A deal was consummated here the latter part of last week whereby W.F. Bays of Vaughn, New Mexico, becomes the proprietor of the Friona Motor Company and the Farwell Motor Company, having purchased the entire interest of J.H. Elder in these two promising business concerns.

50 YEARS AGO--OCT. 5, 1934

The city's new well has been completed at a depth of 192 feet with 55 feet of water in it and the new pump has been received and installed. The well has been tested out and found to throw a stream of clear water, from an apparently unfailing supply.

The West Texas Gas Company, which serves Friona with natural gas for fuel, has arranged a new schedule which is estimated to be quite a savings for its patrons over the rate that has been in effect here and still is for that matter, since the acceptance of the new rate is optional with the patron.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 6, 1939

The Star is authorized to announce that the people of the local Methodist Church will hold their first worship services in their new church on Sunday, October 8.

40 YEARS AGO--OCT. 6, 1944

G.E. and Nelson Welch, who are arranging to open an auto supply store here sometime about the first of November were in town Monday morning, when G.E. was seeking a suitable residence for he and Mrs. Welch to live in while fitting out the store building.

Nelson Welch, the junior member of this firm, is a Friona boy and well known by all our people. The other member is an uncle of Nelson's. They have secured the O.G. Turner building on Main Street and remodeled the building for their business.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 7, 1954

Parmer County gins have all been placed in operation this week in plenty of time to serve the current harvest. Two new gins in the central section of the county, the L&H Gin, just west of Friona, operated by John Davis, and the Tri-County Gin at Summerfield, operated by S.W. Patterson. Both these gins are owned by Floyd Linsey and Fred Huls.

Parmer County Farm Bureau's sixth annual convention will be held at the Friona High School Auditorium, beginning Saturday morning at 10, according to A.J. Ellison, president.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 8, 1959

Lee Thompson, veteran Parmer County politician who is now serving as county tax assessor-collector, has officially announced his candidacy to succeed himself, subject to action of the Democratic primary in May of next year. Thompson has served eight years as county judge and six years as county commissioner.

Hollis Horton, Jr. nosed out Thelma Watkins for top honors in this week's Cotton Bowl Football Contest by guessing the closer in the tie-breaking Friona vs. Sunray football game.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 8, 1964

Contract for the \$1.25 million school construction program was awarded at a special meeting of the Friona Independent School Board last Saturday morning. General contractor for the job will be the firm of Knox, Gailey and Meador of Lubbock, on a bid of \$839,927. Hodges Electric Company of Plainview was awarded the electrical contract on a bid of

\$87,564. C.A. Gray Plumbing of Midland was given the plumbing contract on a bid of \$141,245.

The Friona City Council this week passed a resolution placing the city's population at 3,149 as of October 1, 1964, and at the same time requested the State Highway Department to change the figure on the city limit signs.

Dear Editor:

The fact that the Texas Dept. of Public Safety sends all holders of a drivers license a notice just prior to the expiration date, is very much appreciated by most people. This is done as an accommodation and a courtesy to the citizens of Texas and is a voluntary action. This is not mandated by law and since your license expires in two or four years, you tend to forget which year it is. That makes this reminder a very valuable courtesy.

Recently, it was pointed out to me that my drivers license had expired, and of a necessity, I had to visit the Dept. of Public Safety for a renewal. I never remembered getting the reminder. At this visit I learned that a lot of people are having the same problem. Even an 81 year old woman had the problem. It is not always easy to get another license, once yours has expired.

It turns out that the problem is, that the P.O. Dept. has returned the notice to the sender because of a minor address deficiency even though second class mail and junk with similar deficiencies find their way into your easily reached mail box.

Just why the P.O. Dept. chooses to return otherwise deliverable first class mail, only they know.

I have never really believed in robots. But robots could be programmed to reject all improperly addressed mail, thus eliminating 90 per cent of the junk. Look at the savings this would bring. Robots would not complain about working conditions or be threatening the unlawful action of a strike.

And who knows, someone might someday be able to program a robot to exercise some semblance of accommodation.

Why would any adult want to set aside a few hours from her busy week, especially now that so many women work, to meet with a room full of noisy, giggly and sometimes "wound up" girls? As one leader put it, "When I see a shy child make a special friend and begin to blossom or even my own daughter makes a new discovery, or feel my troop finally congeal as a caring unit, then I know the sheer joy of being a Girl Scout."

Girl Scouts in Friona have a long heritage. Just think of some of your own leaders and those before you, we dare not mention any names for fear of missing one that was important to you, but you know who they are and so do I. For those of you who don't, call a Girl Scout.

Where does the United Way fit in all of this: The money set aside for Girl Scouts goes to our council office in Lubbock. The money designated for Girl Scouts-Local, or Brownie Scouts, is kept in Friona to be used however needed: to pay our monthly bills, to buy supplies, for upkeep on the Scout House, etc. We are fortunate to live in a town

Great Comeback Edges Muleshoe

Fans attending last Friday's Friona-Muleshoe game at Chieftain Field were treated to one of the most exciting games locally since...the last time the two teams played. Difference in this one was the winning team, which this year was Friona, 21-20.

The win was somewhat "expensive" for the Chieftains, who lost tailback Alfredo Mata late in the game. Mata will miss the team's next two games due to a shoulder injury.

However, Mata wasn't lost until he had scored three touchdowns, rushed for 182 yards, and assisted in one of the biggest comebacks ever seen on the local gridiron.

Although they had completely dominated the Mules on the line of scrimmage, the Chieftains found themselves trailing the visitors, 20-7, 14 seconds into the third quarter.

And, although the Chieftains and their fans knew they were the better team, it remained to be seen if they could atone for mistakes which allowed the Mules to score their points. Luckily for the Chiefs, they did just enough to make up for the boo-boos.

Friona had taken the lead in the

first quarter, with a picture-perfect 72-yard touchdown drive after taking the opening kickoff.

Mata was the main cog in the drive, gaining 54 of the yards single-handedly. A big, third-down pass from Ricky Barnett to John Aguirre on the first series of plays kept the drive going.

Mata raced 31 yards up the left sidelines for the score, and Sam Montoya's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead after just 3:24 of clock time.

The Chieftain defense was tested early, after Friona lost the ball due to rainy conditions, at their own 45. Muleshoe drove to the Friona 13, but Toby Smith sacked Mule quarterback Todd Jones for a nine-yard loss, and the next play Friona took over at their 22.

However, the Chiefs continued their hospitality, giving the ball back three plays later on a second fumble, at the 35.

This time, the Mules took advantage, although it took ten plays, helped by a 15-yard personal foul penalty against the Chiefs on a third down when they appeared to have stopped the Mule drive.

Fullback Lester Burke scored the TD from the one, but Ray Vinson's kick was just wide,

allowing Friona to maintain its lead at 7-6. The score came with 3:23 left in the first half.

It looked like the 7-6 score would hold up until halftime, when Friona went to punt with about 30 seconds to play. However, the ball was centered high over Barnett's head, and when Barnett tried to run the ball out of danger, he was tackled at the Friona three.

Jones scored the touchdown on a bootleg play on second down, and Vinson's kick stunned the Chieftains with a 13-7 lead.

The Chiefs were no doubt assured at halftime that they were doing fine, as they led in first downs, 7-6, and in yardage, 124-53 (and it would have been 157-53 except for the 33-yard loss on the bad snap).

However, on the second half kickoff, Muleshoe's speedy Mark Moton raced up the middle, 85 yards for a touchdown, and the Chiefs had to feel a little snake-bit at this point.

But the team didn't waste time feeling sorry for themselves. John Aguirre raced 24 yards two plays after the kickoff, to the Mules' 35-yard line, and Mata got loose

around end for 31 yards to the visitors' four.

On the third down play, Mata crashed over for the TD, but once again a bad snap entered the game, foiling the point-after. However, Friona was back in the game at 20-13. The Chiefs had scored in just 2:26 of clock time after the Mules' kickoff return.

The defense did its job, even after a 50-yard pass rocked Friona momentarily, and Friona got the ball back on its own 20.

With the ball at the Muleshoe 48, Mata took the pitchout, and looked for teammate Leroy Mercado streaking downfield. Mata lofted the ball. Mercado tipped it, then controlled it as he fell—a stunning 44-yard pass completion to the Muleshoe four.

Mata took two tries to punch it over the goal-line, making the score Muleshoe 20, Friona 19.

Without hesitation the team lined up for a two-point try. Barnett lofted the ball to Mercado, wide open in the left side of the end zone, and Friona had completed its comeback and regained the lead, 21-20 with 1:58 left in the third quarter.

Friona finally benefitted from

a timely penalty, as the Mules were flagged for a face mask violation against Mata, moving the ball to near midfield, after Friona held the Mules on their possession.

Friona then faced a fourth down and a half-yard to go from the Muleshoe 43. Mata made the vital yardage to keep the drive going.

However, four plays later, with Friona facing fourth and one from the Muleshoe 30, Mata was stopped for once, and Muleshoe took over.

The Mules could gain just seven yards in three plays, but a stellar 59-yard punt backed the Chieftains into a hole at their own eight yard line.

Mata responded with an 11-yard burst on first down, out to the 19, and two plays later, the consistent runner gained 13 more yards to move the ball out of the shadow of his own goal-post, to the 31-yard line.

But on the third down play, Alfredo was stopped for only two yards, and Friona was forced to punt.

Jones passed 28 yards to Moton, as Muleshoe moved the ball to the Friona 37 with just over four minutes left in the game.

But one of the biggest plays of the game occurred at this point. The Mules tried to pass, but Friona defenders Tony Day and Jose Sammarron rocked the Mule quarterback, the ball squirted free and Brad Moyer pounced on it at the Friona 36.

On Friona's next possession, Mata was dragged down by a Muleshoe tackler, and it was this play that caused his partial shoulder separation, with about two minutes left in the game. Coaches attended to him on the sideline while Muleshoe tried desperately to get the ball back.

Muleshoe was to get the ball once more, at their own 15, but this time on fourth down Mercado came up with a defensive play, intercepting a pass to wrap up the ball game.

"I thought the entire team played super," said Coach Tommy Moss. He underlined the defensive play of Brent Gatlin, Tony Day

and Rodney Allen, but added that it was hard to single out individuals, because there were so many outstanding plays, and consistent playing by the defensive unit.

Moss, like many Chieftain fans, felt the win partially made up for last year's 13-7 loss to the Mules, when it appeared Friona had won the game with a last-period touchdown which was called back.

In spite of letting Moton loose for his kickoff return the Chieftain defense limited the Mule runner to only 37 net yards from scrimmage, his lowest of the season.

"A yearly fee is to be set and we hope to get sponsors later for a county tournament with other ladies' shooting clubs," the spokesman said.

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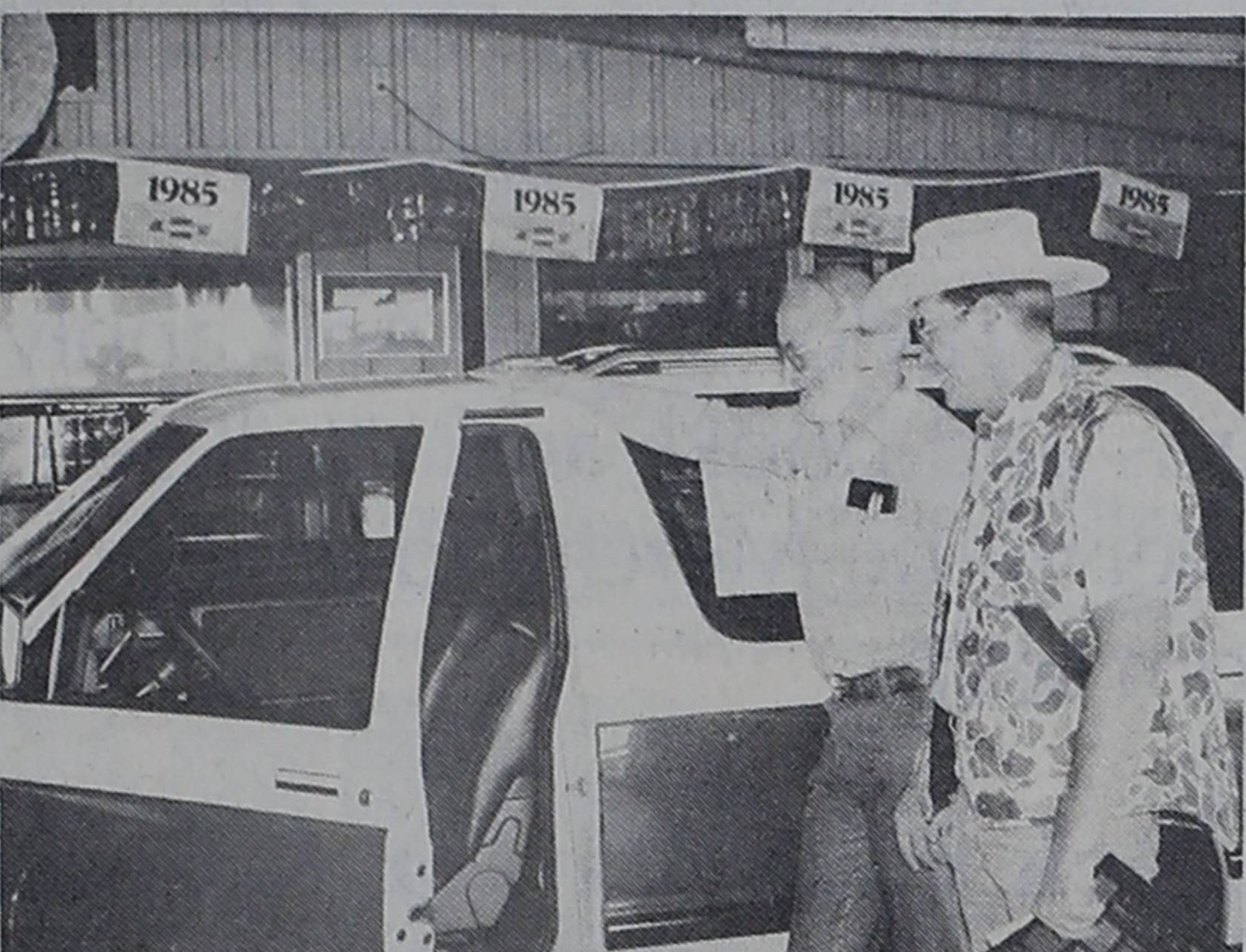

Court Extends Fund Certificates

Re-investing of certificates of deposits was the main item of business at the regular session of the Parmer County Commissioner's Court September 24.

Commissioner Archie Tarter acted as chairman of the court in the absence of Judge Roberts due to illness and Commissioner Anthony, who was out of town. A \$200,000 certificate of deposit from the county's General Fund, maturing September 28, was renewed, as was a CD for \$235,000 from the Farm-to-Market fund, and a \$100,000 certificate from the Right-of-Way fund. The new certificates will mature October 31, 1984.

Approval was granted to pay the county's dues in the National Association of Counties in the amount of \$265.00, as well as a subscription to the Revenue Sharing Bulletin, at \$48.00.

Troy Christian and Bert Williams, representing the Farwell Hospital Board, met with the court. They explained the need of additional space at the Farwell Clinic, and asked about the availability of the lots north of the courthouse. After looking over the lots, the matter was tabled until the October 5 meeting.

Justice of the Peace Albert Smith met with the court to request a \$100 a month expense account due to his work load. After a discussion of his work and the fact that none of the other employees were receiving any type of raise, a

motion was passed to deny the request.

A motion was passed to ratify soil work on nine county locations by county machinery when it is not otherwise in demand. Cost of such work is reimbursed the county.

At 5 p.m., a budget hearing was held. Bernie Gowens of Brown, Graham & Co. presented the 1985 budget to the court. No citizens appeared at the hearing. A motion was passed to adopt the budget for 1985 as presented.

CATARACTS--Types of Cataract Surgery

Surgical removal of cataracts was being performed by Hindu physicians at least 2500 years ago. They used a technique called "couching." The cornea was punctured with a small instrument and the cataract was pushed backward into the vitreous part of the eye. By moving the cataract out of the way, light was allowed to pass through the pupil to the retina. This was the standard procedure throughout the civilized world until the eighteenth century. Although "couching" was often better than no surgery at all, it was responsible for a very high incidence of eyes destroyed by infection.

In 1748, a bold French surgeon named Jacques Daviel, revolutionized cataract surgery by devising a technique for extracting most of the cataract. This revolutionary technique greatly increased the success rate of cataract surgery. With minor modifications, that technique remained the most popular until about 30 years ago when intracapsular cataract extraction became popular. London surgeon, Samuel Sharp, introduced the improved intracapsular method. American eye surgeons have continued to improve the various techniques of cataract extraction. Cryoextraction is a method of removing cataracts by freezing the tip of a cryopencil to the cataract, much like your tongue sticks to a cold pump handle, and then plucking it out of the eye. Using the aspiration-irrigation method of cataract removal, the surgeon uses a sharp probe to break off small pieces of the cataract while at the same time using another hollow probe to aspirate (vacuum) the pieces out of the eye. Phacoemulsification uses a single probe to break up the cataract with ultrasonic sound vibration and to aspirate them out of the eye. Lasers are NOT used to remove "primary" cataracts, but they are being used to burn holes in "secondary" cataracts.

Because the general health of the cataract patient and the type and location of the cataract are important factors which must be taken into consideration, it is best to let the eye surgeon decide which technique should be used to remove the cataract. Cataract surgery has become so advanced that the patient rarely stays in the hospital more than one night. A few eye surgeons have even begun performing the surgery in their office and require NO hospitalization at all.

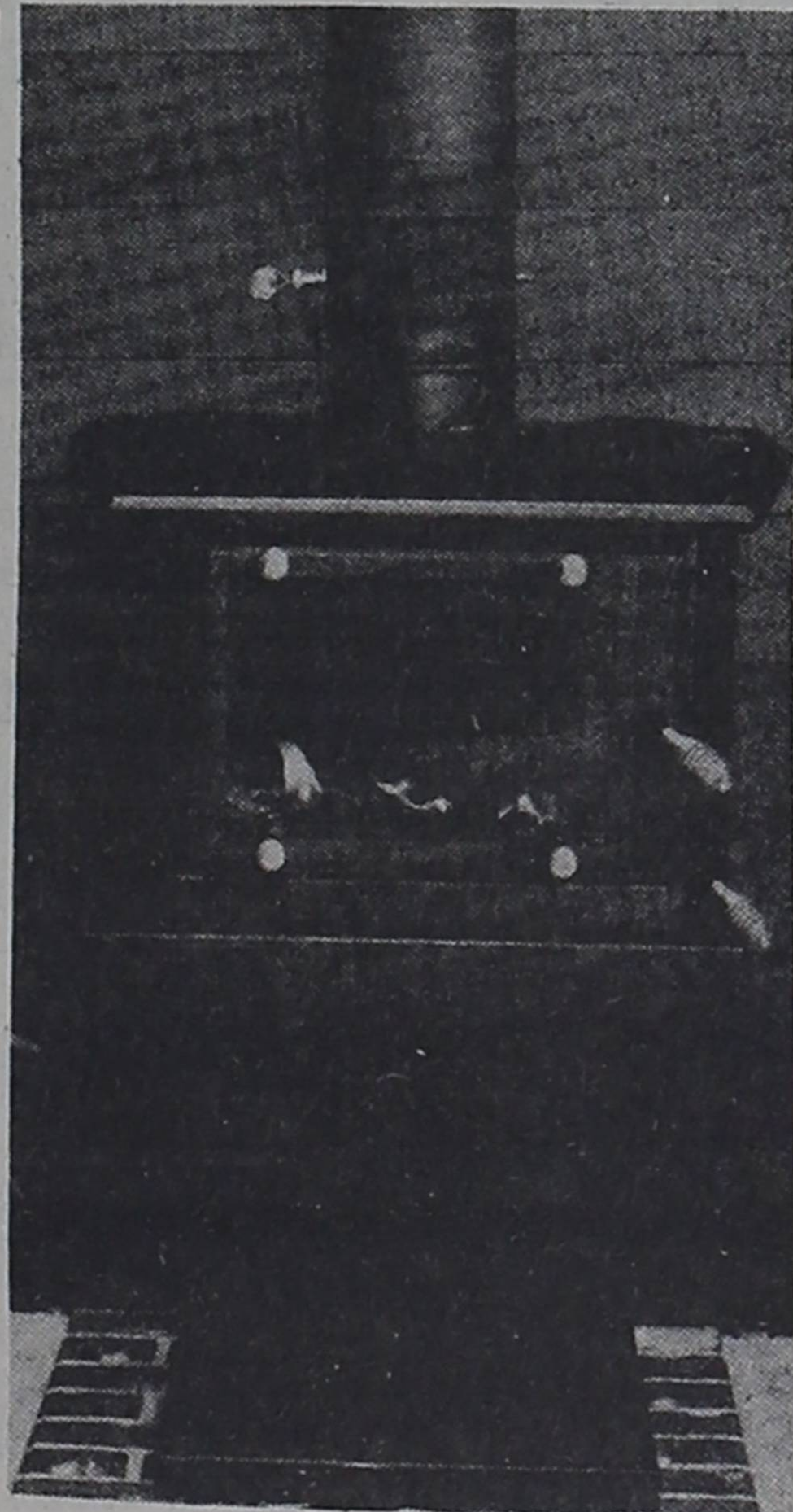

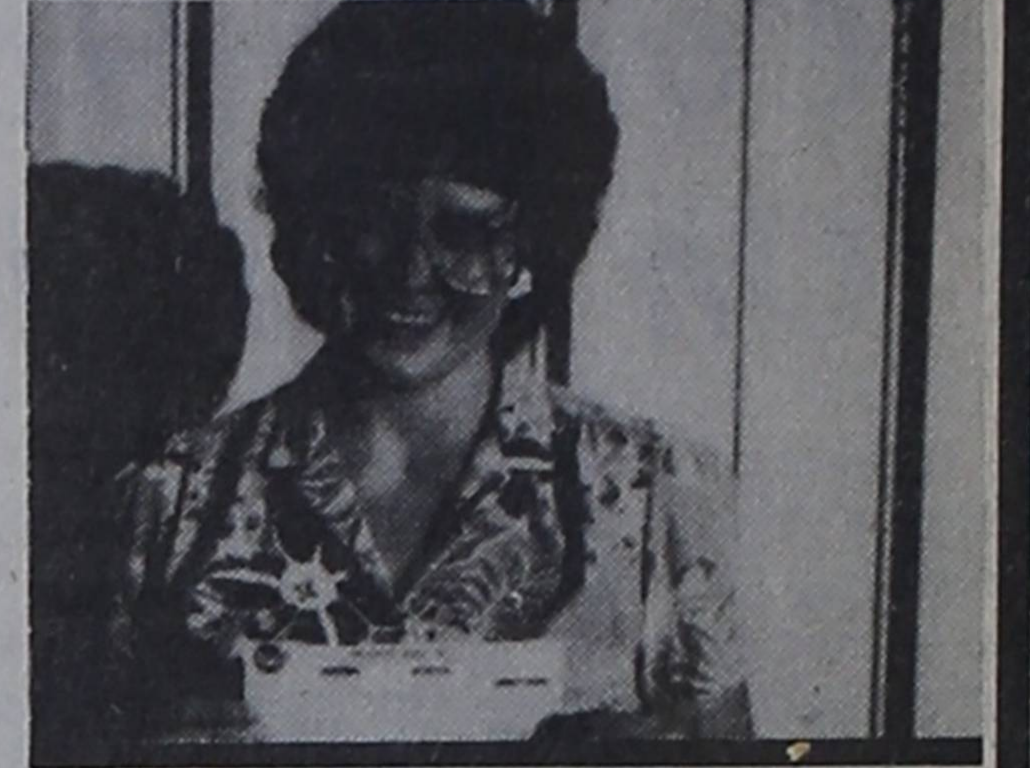
