Board Okays Request

ELECTION YEAR POLITICS is a term that you'd rather not hear, but has become a fact of life for the 20th century.

It is a shame to realize that if there happened to be some type of needed legislation, or perhaps a major presidential decision, the issue might be clouded, or indeed its very life affected by the fact that it was a presidential election year.

For example, the congress has been very hesitant to give President Reagan additional defense money for use in virtually any area, since the amount of the defense budget is one of the major campaign issues by the Democrats.

If congress appropriates exactly what the president asks for in a given area, then the Democrats in congress feel that they could be blamed for helping the administration in power, or making the incumbent president look good--when deep down their goal is to try to do everything they can to defeat this president in November.

Even the current peace talks between El Salvador president Jose Napoleon Duarte and the rebel leaders has come under the attack of political leaders.

The United States' involvement in El Salvador, which President Reagan has championed, and which is costing the nation (according to one estimate) in the neighborhood of a million dollars per day, has been questioned by many, who feel we should not send money, men, or help to Central America.

Yet, on the very eve of the peace talks, the Mondale political camps were charging that the talks were being arranged by President Reagan, in order to attempt to secure his election bid.

Must a president completely turn away from international events, during an election year, for fear that anything he does will be interpreted as strictly a political move?

What if the president's Kremlin "hotline" telephone rings this week? Should he be obligated to tell the caller "I'm sorry, but I can't talk to you today--you'll have to call back after November 6."??

Politics have become so partisan, so nasty, that members of congress are practically threatened not to look at pending legislation as to the merits of the bill, but as to whether or not it is in the best interests of their party.

You will recall that Representative Phil Gramm, as a Democrat in 1981, co-authored President Reagan's budget, and championed a bi-partisan group of congressmen who helped put over some of the president's programs.

On the surface, you'd appreciate what Gramm had done, and think that he would be considered a real statesman, right? This might be the general feeling of the public, but

The Friona School board heard a request from representatives of the 1984-85 junior class, requesting permission to allow the junior-senior banquet for 1984-85 to be held at the Hereford Country Club.

After discussion on the request, the board approved the request, and will allow the banquet to be held there on a trial basis.

The tax collection report showed 96 per cent of the 1983 tax roll is collected. Collections have started on the 1984 roll.

The board approved revisions in the student discipline policy, making the necessary changes brought about by the passage of House Bill 72. The changes primarily provide for continuing education opportunities to be given for students re-assigned to alternative educational settings by the principal.

The board approved a motion to advertise for bids for re-surfacing the two west tennis courts with omnicoat or an equivalent surface.

A report by the Self-Study committee was reviewed and approved by the board. The committee's recommendation is that the next five-year plan place a major emphasis on mathematics instruction improvement, with the emphasis on reading instruction to be continued.

The board was presented a brief overview of the Learner Based Accountability system now being implemented in the school district. This system of establishing goals and objectives to be taught at early grade level will provide a scope and sequence for the school district.

It was reported that the tutorial program at all grades is being started the week of October 15.

Voting Underway

Absentee voting began Wednesday, October 17 at the County Clerk's office in Farwell, and continues through Friday, November 2.

Special absentee voting booths have been arranged for Friona, for the benefit of voters in that area.

Clerk's representatives will be at the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union on October 18, 25, 26 and November 1, during the Credit Union's regular hours, 9 a.m.-4 p.m.

Any registered voter may vote absentee if they think they might be out of the county for any reason on election day Tuesday, November 6.

A large turnout of voters is expected for the general election. County officials said there was a flurry of activity just prior to the deadline for registering, for those not holding valid registration forms.

Two Frosts Nip Friona Area

The Friona area received a couple of heavy frosts this week, but still had not received a freeze, according to official weather recorder Rodney Dunnam.

Friday morning's low temperature was 33 degrees, lowest of the season, and one degree lower than was recorded on Wednesday, October 17. Residents awoke both mornings to find a heavy coating of frost on car windshields.

Harvest activities were once again interrupted by a nice rain in the area. Friona measured .85 inch of rain on Monday.

Hurting the corn harvest worse than the moisture has been several days of high wind, which has caused the remaining corn to lodge considerably. One farmer who was cutting on Thursday said that approximately 30 per cent of that field's corn was down, and he had

heard of another farmer whose field was just almost laid flat.

As the corn stalks dry out, the high winds such as the area had on Wednesday and Thursday cause even more lodging. One estimate said two-thirds of the area's corn had been harvested.

Meanwhile, harvest is underway on the area's sugar beet crop. The beets are said to be making good yields, with good sugar content.

The cotton crop is needing a good stretch of warm, dry weather, for the crop to mature. Ginners indicated that the frosts of this week probably were beneficial to most of the crop.

"It came a light freeze out north of town the other (Wednesday) morning," said D.L. Carmichael.

Cotton which did not suffer 2,4-D damage should make a good yield this fall, if the weather will cooperate the rest of the way.

Hiring CHDA Tops Meeting

Employing of a new County Home Extension Agent was a main item of business for the Parmer County Commissioners at their regular meeting on October 5.

Mrs. Janette Pierce was interviewed by the commissioners and answered questions. Following the discussion, Mrs. Pierce was hired, effective November 1, 1984.

Laura Jacobs Wallace had resigned her position effective October 31, due to the fact that she has recently married, and will be moving from the county.

Dr. Catherine Crawford of the Texas A&M Extension Service, met with the court and introduced Mrs. Pierce.

A motion was approved to pay Judge Gordon Green of Muleshoe \$50 for travel expenses for the month of September.

The treasurer's quarterly report was accepted unanimously, with the stipulation that it be published in the county's three newspapers.

Payment of a bill from Spring, Spring, Alexander & Assoc., acting as coroners in a death ruling, was approved.

A motion was approved to pay foster children's bills in the amount of \$1,186. This amount will be reimbursed the county from the state.

Dues for Parmer County to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission, in the amount of \$717.47, were approved for payment.

The court also approved the expenditure of \$500 as the county's share in a lawsuit against the Texas

Commission on Jail Standards, which has been brought by the Texas Association of Counties.

The county agricultural agent met with the court to discuss trading for a new pickup, which is a budgeted item. Motion was passed to seek bids for a new vehicle. Such bids are to be opened October 22.

Special absentee voting dates were approved for Friona, relative to the presidential election, on October 18, 25 and 26, and November 1.

Discussion was held relative to the request from the Farwell Hospital Board, which was interested in buying lots from the county. The commissioners decided to turn down the request.

Motion was passed to advertise for a motor grader for use in Precinct 2. Bids are to be opened on October 22.

Soil work was approved on the farms of Kenneth McLellan and Joe Fowler, to be performed when county machinery is not in demand otherwise, such expense to be reimbursed to the county.

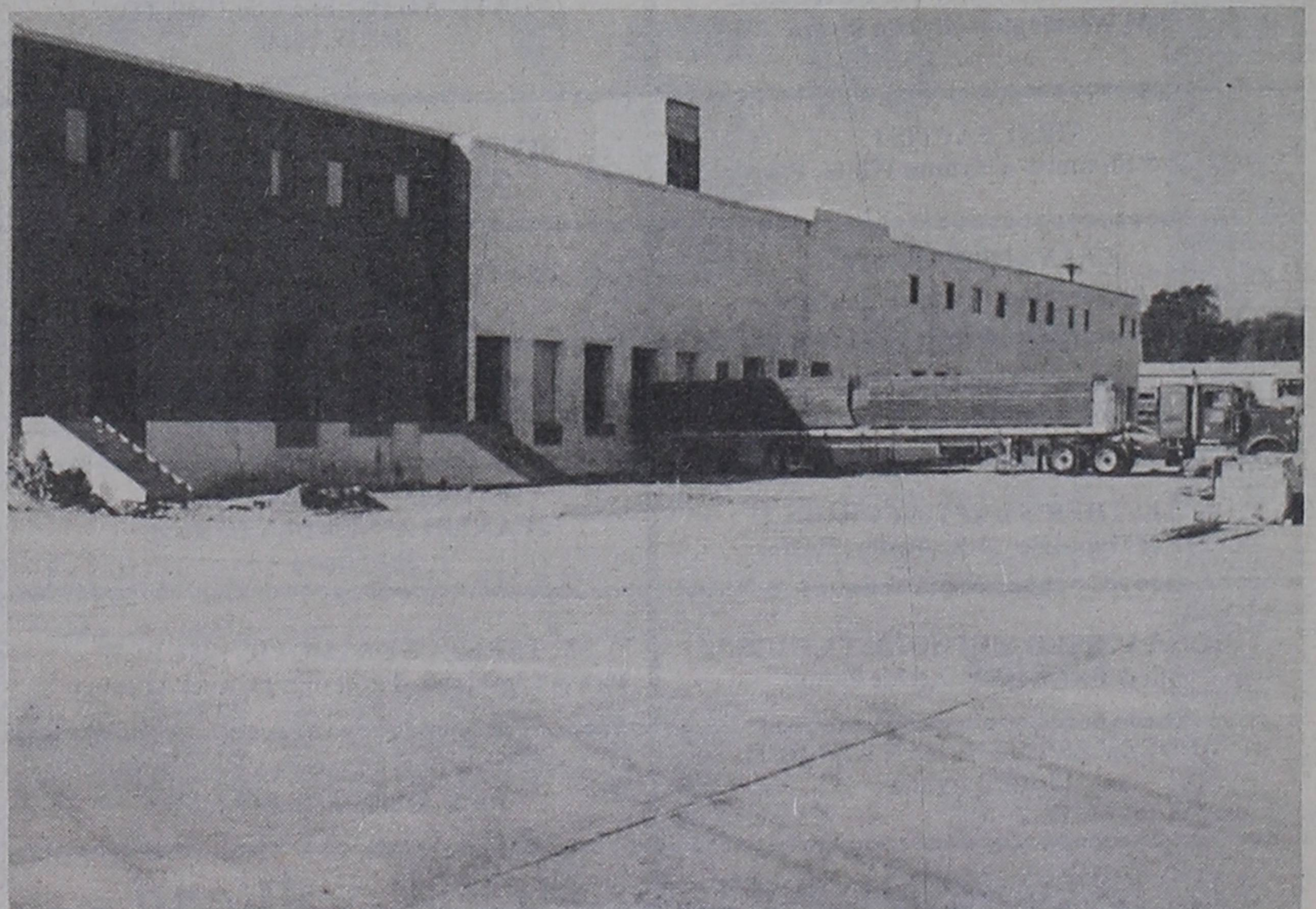
Church Series Is Televised

55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 8, 1929

Work on new buildings is progressing nicely this week, thanks to the good weather which has visited the area. O.G. Turner has the walls of his new building on the east side of town up, and the framework on the new Baptist Church has been erected.

Friona grain prices are as good as at any other Panhandle point, it was shown in an investigation on Monday. A false rumor had it that Bovina dealers were paying 15 cents per hundredweight more than local elevators, but the truth of the matter is that local prices were 98 cents on Monday, and had never been as low as the 80 cents, which was rumored.

50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 9, 1934

The members of the Friona PTA held their annual Halloween Carnival at the high school building last Friday night, October 26.

The king and queen were crowned with the usual ceremony. The king was George Taylor of the senior class, and the queen was Lois Presley of the junior class.

45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 3, 1939

The people of Friona were horrified this week when they learned of the death of R.H. (Reube) Kinsley, who had been terribly burned Wednesday morning in the west part of town. The burning occurred about 10 o'clock when a can of blasting powder exploded in the little workshop where Mr. Kinsley was working. Kinsley had workmen engaged in building a new garage at his home, and the can of powder had been used the day before in blowing a stump from the ground where the foundation was being built.

35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 4, 1949

Three people were killed and three others critically injured in a head-on collision of a truck and car three miles east of Friona on Highway 60 Thursday morning. Dead are Frank Phillips, 53, of Farwell, Mrs. Loretta Essie Stone, 25, and her infant son, Billy,

both of Hereford.

30 YEARS AGO--NOV. 5, 1954

Continued ideal harvest conditions, coupled with the record yields of Parmer maize fields this week, have taxed elevator and shipping facilities to the greatest extent since the early 1930s. Most elevators have experienced temporary shutdowns since the middle of last week, awaiting cars for shipment.

Oscar Hellman, local agent for the Santa Fe, states that some 1100 cars of grain have been shipped this year.

25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 5, 1959

Friona's building boom is still going on. Based on figures from the City Hall, which are complete through October 3, building permits in Friona since January 1 have come to a total of \$506,950.

The total compares with a total of only \$486,895 in building permits issued for the entire year of 1958.

20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 5, 1964

Friona Methodist Church will observe its 50th anniversary as a church Sunday with special services at 11 a.m. and 2-5 p.m. Rev. Lester L. Hill, former pastor of the church, will deliver the Sunday morning sermon.

15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 6, 1969

Deposits at Friona State Bank set a record for the third quarter "call" date on October 21, when total deposits stood at \$8,096,357.75. This was an increase of \$2,835,984.29 over the statement of approximately a year earlier (October 30, 1968), or 31.6 per cent.

10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 3, 1974

Funeral services for Carl C. Maurer, pioneer Friona resident, were conducted Wednesday morning at the Union Congregational Church.

A 25-year-old man who had lived in Friona only about two months was killed early Friday when he apparently was struck by a freight train near the South Main

Street crossing.

A wide assortment of weather--mostly disagreeable--assaulted the Friona area last weekend and the first part of the week, again calling a halt to the corn and maize harvest.

5 YEARS AGO--OCT. 28, 1979

Destruction of public property continued to be a problem in Friona this past weekend, when Panhandle Concrete Co. sustained considerable damage to its equipment. At least \$3,000 in damage was estimated.

Sugar beet and cotton harvest began in Friona this past week. The warm weather of the past month has helped the cotton crop considerably.

CHIEFS FOIL FLOYDADA, 35-7

Moyer, Aguirre Pace Friona Win

When Floydada school officials were lining up their homecoming game, someone must have recalled that the Whirlwinds had won six of the eight games played against Friona, including the last four in a row.

Whether that was the case or not, the Chieftains, who may have learned the previous week that homecoming events can be distracting, played a good, solid game in defeating Floydada, 35-7.

The win kept Friona unbeaten in district play with a 2-0 mark.

The Chieftains used a great one-two punch of Brad Moyer and John Aguirre against the 'Winds. This, added to the passing of Rick Barnett, and an outstanding defensive performance, was too much for Floydada.

Moyer, starting his second game in place of the injured Alfredo Mata, scored three touchdowns, and Aguirre scored two. The backfield duo combined for 227 yards rushing in the win.

The Chieftains bolted to a pair of quick touchdowns in the opening period, taking a 14-0 lead and were never headed.

Lonnie Phillips intercepted Floydada's first pass attempt, giving Friona great field position early in the game. The team drove 35 yards in seven plays. The big play was a 20-yard run by Moyer to the Whirlwind two. Three plays later, he carried in for the score, and Sam Montoya's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead with 6:16 left in the opening period.

Montoya was a perfect five-for-five in the kicking department, aided by a re-kick on his only miss, and the steady sophomore barely missed on a 44-yard field goal late in the first half.

The Whirlwinds must have felt snake-bit when Aguirre intercepted another pass, on just the fourth play following the kickoff.

The ball took a couple of crazy hops during the next few minutes. Barnett and Aguirre hooked up on a 29-yard pass and run gain for Friona, but Aguirre fumbled in his efforts to get into the end zone. However, two plays later, the

Whirlwinds fumbled the ball-back to Friona.

The Chiefs had the ball first and goal at the six, but a holding penalty set the team back to 16. This didn't phase Aguirre, who made the distance on a cross-buck run. The kick gave Friona its 14-0 lead with 1:37 left in the quarter.

Floydada kept it close, with a good kickoff return to the Friona 48, and then a scoring pass on first down. The Whirlwinds got a break when Phillips, the pass defender, fell down and this allowed the receiver to be wide open. This brought the score to 14-7. There was still 1:19 on the first quarter clock.

Early in the second quarter, Floydada threatened to tie the game, helped by a 15-yard penalty against the Chiefs and a 21-yard pass completion. However, after the 'Winds had a first and goal at the Friona six, the Chieftain defense dug in and took over the ball at their own eight four plays later.

Daniel Gowens, starting his second game after being re-activated from an early injury, blitzed the quarterback on third down, for a big defensive play in the series.

Lonnie Phillips got his second pass interception, and the team's third, to set up the drive for Friona's third touchdown. Barnett hit Brent Gatlin on a 19-yard pass play, and a 15-yard penalty for a face mask violation made the play worth 34 yards.

Two plays later, Aguirre raced 31 yards for his second TD of the night, and the kick made it 21-7, with 1:45 left in the half.

The Chiefs got the ball back on Floydada's fifth turnover of the first half, at the Whirlwind 25, to have yet another shot at a score. But Montoya's kick from 44 yards out fell wide to the left as the first half ended.

The third quarter was scoreless, although Friona had a touchdown called back for a holding penalty, and Barnett was intercepted after the penalty, to spoil the drive.

However, the team got the ball at their own 20 after a Floydada punt, and set out on an 80-yard TD drive. Friona got its yardage in big chunks. Aguirre ran 28 yards on a big third down play, and Moyer followed with a 26-yard burst up the middle on the next play.

Moyer got the touchdown with exactly six minutes left in the game, and Montoya's second kick was good after Floydada was flagged on the missed first try, for a 28-7 score.

Reserves began taking over, and played most of the rest of the game.

However, when the team faced a fourth and four from the Whirlwind 24, Barnett hit Ben Neelley (starting again after missing two games with an injury) for 14 yards, and Moyer scored his third TD from five yards out. He went over the goal-line untouched, and Montoya's kick made the score 35-7 with 1:59 left to play.

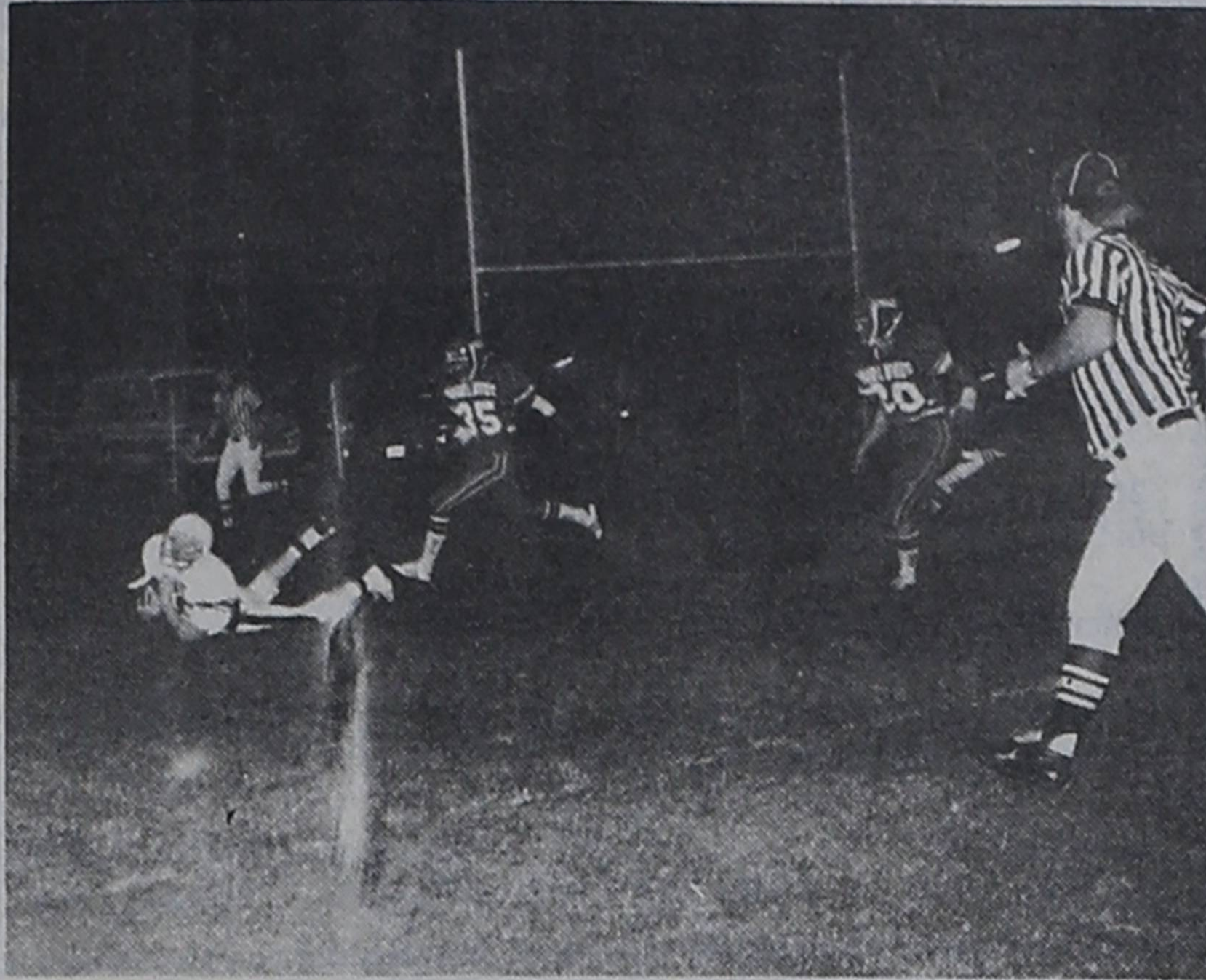
Friona's defense played a super game, yielding just seven first downs and only 49 yards rushing.

8th Grade Falls, 20-6

The eighth grade Braves dropped a 20-6 decision at Floydada last Thursday.

Joe Paiz scored Friona's touchdown and gained 21 yards on seven carries. Cody Burney added 70 yards on 23 tries and Jerry Lafuente had 39 yards on eight attempts.

Burney was cited as the top offensive player; and Burney and Ben Osborn were defensive standouts, according to Coach Kenny Austin.

The Whirlwinds did manage 92 yards passing, but over half that--48 yards--came on the play on which Phillips fell down, and the big pass went for the home team's only score.

Friona had to overcome a bundle of penalty flags in the early stages of the game. The team had 61 yards in penalties in the first half, which made it more difficult to sustain a drive.

"I thought we had an outstanding game, both

offensively and defensively. We had their man covered on the long pass, but fell down. After that, we pretty well controlled the game," said a satisfied Coach Tommy Moss.

Moss praised the work of the team's two offensive guards, Matt Osborn and Toby Smith, on a super job, all season long. He pointed out that Osborn is the pulling guard on most of the "sweep" runs, and he always gets his man.

JV Romps To Floydada Win

The Friona junior varsity Chieftains romped to a 42-20 win over the Floydada JV in a game at Chieftain Field last Thursday night.

Jimmy Williams, who has one varsity TD to his credit this year (against Bovina), scored three touchdowns, Peter Malouf, back in action after being out a couple of weeks, scored twice in the big Friona win.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Chiefs got on the board with a 14-yard run by Williams. A running try for points failed. Floydada then scored to temporarily tie the score, but Williams replied with runs of 42 and 47 yards for two more scores. Patches Fleming passed to Rod Britting for two points after Williams' third TD, and Friona had a 20-6 halftime lead.

Malouf scored from a yard out to open the third quarter, and ran the PATs, for a 28-6 edge, and after Floydada scored again to trail 28-13, Fleming and Britting hooked up on a 54-yard pass and run play for a TD, for a 34-13 score.

Floydada scored on a pass, and

Malouf crashed in from a yard out and Fleming added a two-point bootleg run, for the final margin.

Friona led in first downs, 17-8, the exact count the varsity had the following night. The JV Chiefs racked up 371 total yards, and is now 3-2 for the season and 2-0 in district play.

Williams gained 229 yards on 20 carries, a nifty 11.5 yards per carry, and Charles Walker added 67 yards on 16 tries, or 4.2 per carry.

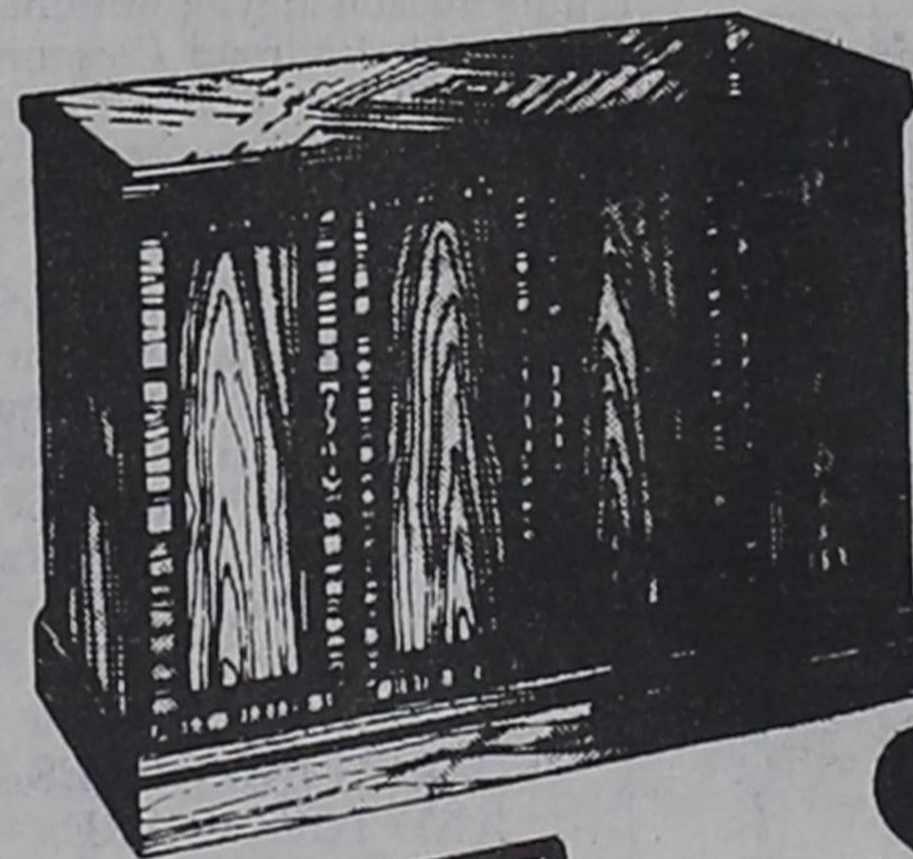

SALVATION ARMY

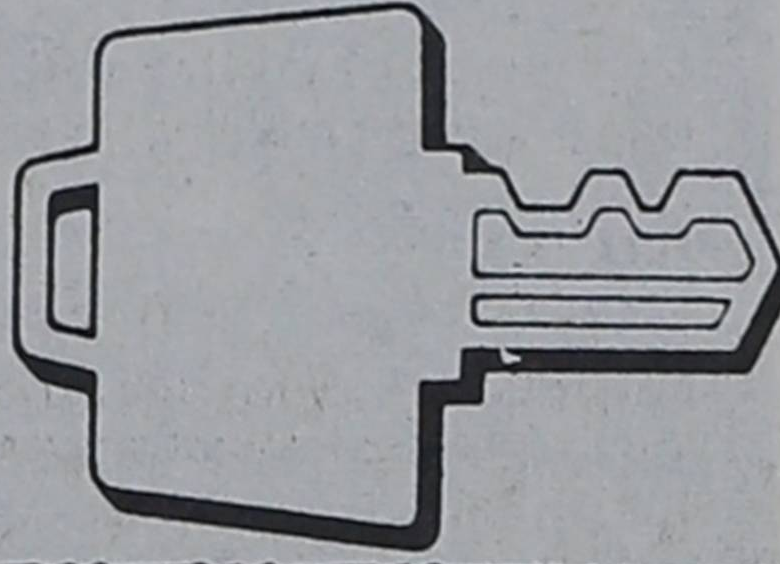

School Emphasizes New Rules

The Friona school system sent letters home with students' first six weeks' report cards last week, pointing out the changes in both the Texas Education Code and the local school policy.

Beginning this year, students must make a grade of 70 or above in order to be considered passing.

The letter quoted Section 21.721 of the Texas Education Code as passed by the special called session of the Texas Legislature last summer, which states:

A. A district may not grant social promotions. Students may be promoted only on the basis of academic achievement.

B. A student who has not maintained a grade average for a school year equivalent to at least a 70 on a scale of 100 may not be advanced from one grade level to the next.

C. A student who has not maintained a grade average for a school year equivalent to at least 70 on a scale of 100 may not be given credit for the course.

D. The State Board of Education shall adopt rules prescribing alternatives to social promoting students who are consistently unable to be promoted. Such rules have not yet been adopted by the State Board.

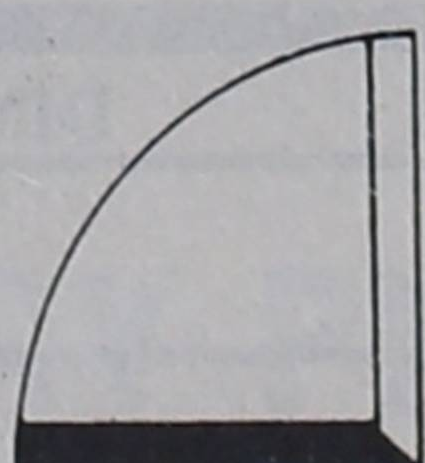
Why can't animal shelters keep indefinitely the animals that do not get adopted?

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Woman's Club Logs 75 Years Of Service To Community

Early in the twentieth century, people began to move to the Friona area from Iowa, Indiana, Ohio and other farming states to the east. When the XIT Ranch was divided into smaller plots and sold to farmers, many families moved here from places where there were many more educational and cultural advantages.

In addition to providing homes, food, clothing and other necessities for their families, many of the men were interested in educational opportunities as well. This fact is evidenced by the many small one or two room schools which were established in the area. It wasn't unusual for less than one dozen men to get together to make plans for a community school.

Many times these plans called for the erection of suitable buildings, which was done by the men of the community. At this time church buildings were almost non-existent, so many times the school buildings were used for church services and other community meetings.

Of course, these projects required the cooperation of entire families and the women did much of the work raising funds, supervising programs and supporting their husbands in their efforts to make needed improvements in the different communities.

Some of these women were educated and had grown accustomed to many more cultural

events than were available to them after their move from an older civilization to the untamed prairies of the Texas Panhandle.

When some of these women met at school and other community functions, they began to discuss the need for a study club.

The front porch of the local drug store was the scene of the organizational meeting of Friona Woman's Club. Mrs. Rorabaugh, wife of the druggist, was the hostess. Charter members were civic minded women who had a fervent desire to improve the community. At the time civic clubs, sororities, fraternities, lodges and social clubs were unheard of in the area.

During the initial meeting, Mrs. J.H. Todd, who had just moved here from Mansfield, Ohio, was elected president, and Mrs. J.H. Letton was appointed chairman of the program committee.

Several decisions, which were made on that day, have become traditions in the club and are still part of its make up. The name was chosen that day. Also the motto, "In small things liberty; in large things unity; in all things charity;" colors green and yellow and flower, a yellow rose, are still being used.

Regular meetings were scheduled for the second and fourth Wednesday afternoons and have been observed continually since except for one year. During World War I, the club disbanded

for one year so that members could make a concentrated effort to assist with Red Cross work.

The late Pearl Kinsley was an active member of the club more than fifty years and was an officer when the club was accepted for state federation in 1922. In 1958, Mrs. Kinsley wrote a history of the club. The following paragraphs were copied from this history:

"The federation meant many things, among them was the fact that the efforts of the members, to have a worthwhile club, was noted and appreciated by the federation board.

"Federation made only a few changes in the local club. One was that officers since that time have been elected for two year terms instead of one."

During the first few years of its existence club members were constantly busy with projects to improve and beautify their town. Trees were planted in the park, a well was drilled and windmill with a supply tank was erected in City Park.

Since most of the early day club members were not financially affluent, it was necessary for them to sponsor a variety of projects to finance their projects. Some of their money making projects included selling food at farm sales, sponsoring flower and baby shows

Frosh Are 3-1-1 On Win, Loss

The Friona Freshman football team downed the Morton Junior Varsity, 22-14 in a game at Morton October 4, but with eight players on the failing list, dropped their first game of the season, 22-6 to Floydada last Thursday.

"We played a poor game against Floydada. This was this group's first loss in about 12 games," said Coach Steve Williams.

In the Morton game, quarterback Daniel Echols scored on runs of 35 and five yards in the first and second quarters, each time giving Friona a lead. But Morton came back both times to score and tie the game. Halftime score was 14-all.

But Friona got the tie-breaker on an 81-yard run by Glen Trimmell. Friona had two-point conversions after their first and third scores, on passes from Echols to Rusty Rainey.

Williams credited the defensive play of Rainey, who plays middle linebacker; tackle Richard Sammaron; and defensive end John Cass. Reese Hand, offensive center, played a good game, he said.

Trimmell rushed 12 times for 161 yards, 13.4 yards per try; Echols gained 86 yards on seven carries, 12.3 yards per try, and Lance Gatlin added 63 yards on 13 tries, 4.8 a trip.

Against Floydada, Friona's only score came on a five-yard TD pass from Echols to Rainey. That left the team trailing, 8-6, but Friona couldn't get another scoring drive going.

The two games left the freshmen with a 3-1-1 season record.

During the late twenties, club members began to look forward to the time when they could have a club house and to make plans in that direction. In spite of the fact that money wasn't easy to accumulate, club members started a building fund and were able to add money to it each year.

In 1931, Friona Woman's Club assisted younger women in organizing the Friona Junior Study Club, which was the forerunner of Modern Study Club.

A few years later, the two clubs obtained a loan from the bank and had a rock building constructed on lots at the corner of Ninth and Pierce Streets. This plot of ground had been donated to Friona Woman's Club a few years earlier by the late Margaret Henchel, who was an honorary member of the club at the time.

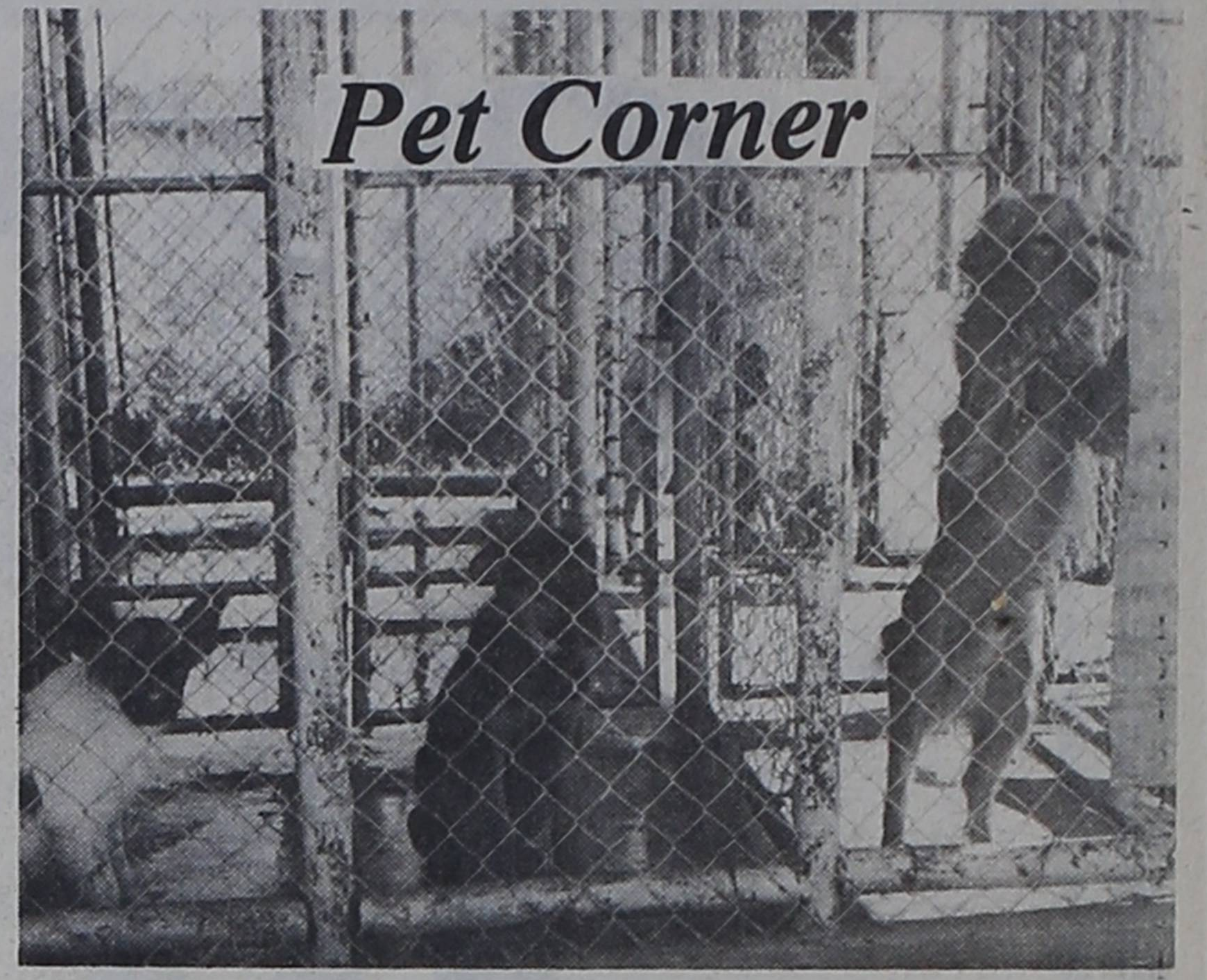
Rock for the building was hauled from the San Jon, New Mexico area and much of the labor for construction was done by volunteers. The original building cost about \$4,000.

Federated Club House has been available for groups and individuals needing space for weddings, receptions, family reunions, and other festivities for many years. It has also served as a regular meeting place for Friona Woman's Club, Modern Study Club, Progressive Study Club, New Horizons Study Club and the Evening Lions Club. (After being active for some time Progressive Study Club and New Horizons Study Club--both federated clubs--are no longer in existence.)

There hasn't been a major community project since the club was organized that it didn't have a part in. Its members have assisted with projects at Parmer County Community Hospital, Prairie Acres Nursing Home, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Friona Public Library and many other phases of community life.

Mata's return would put the Chieftains at close to full strength,

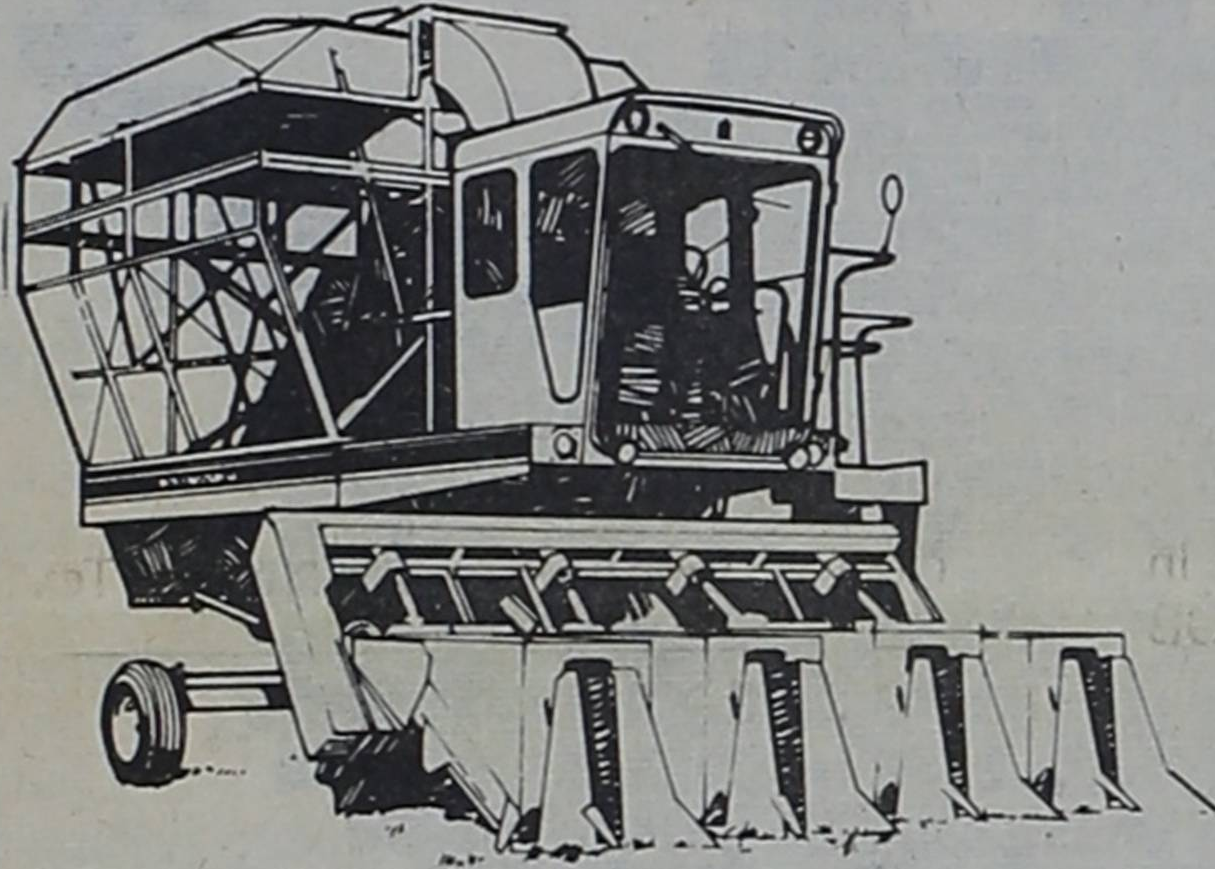
practically for the first time this season, depending on how the team fared against Idalou.

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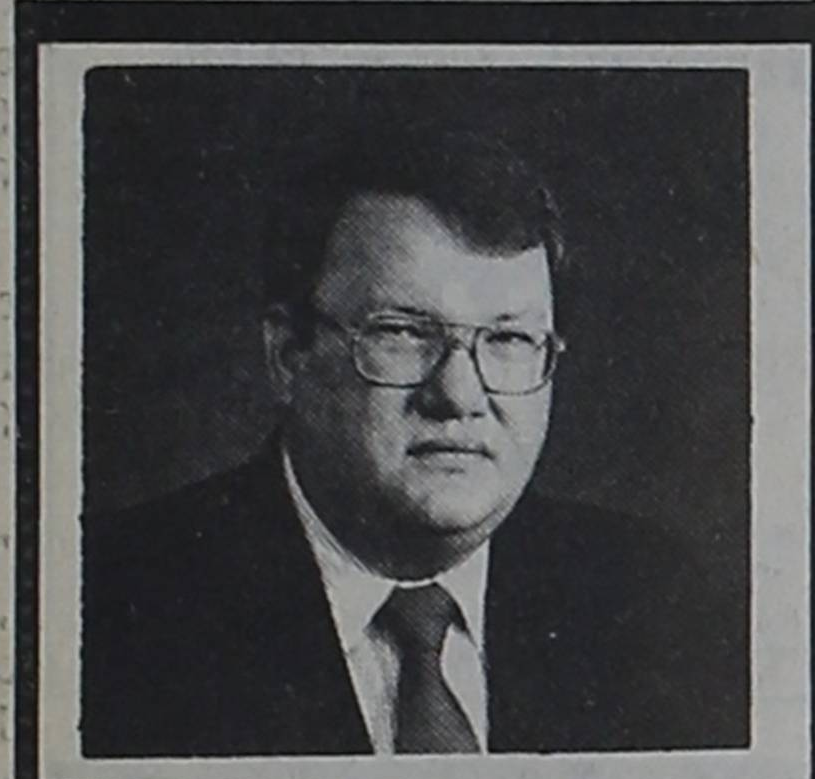
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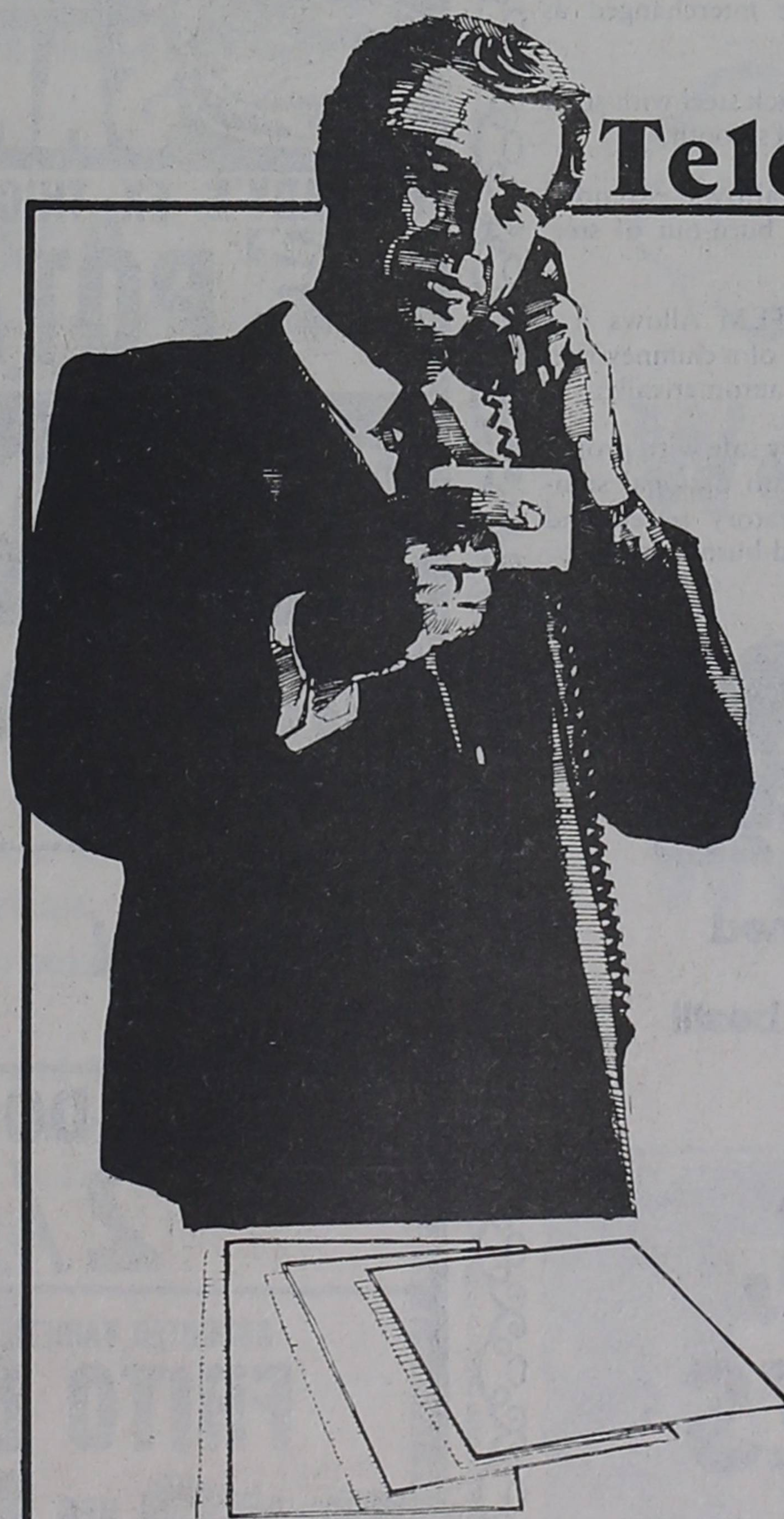
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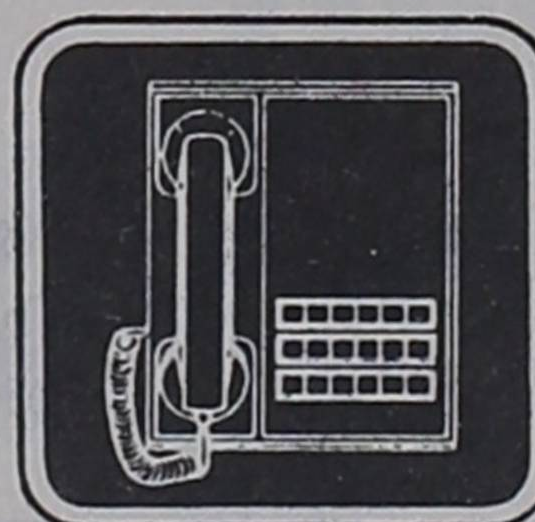

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ASPIRIN FOR CATARACTS?

Recent research has shown a dramatic reduction in the formation of cataracts in individuals who use large doses of aspirin and a delay in cataract formation in individuals who use moderate uses of aspirin. Glycosylation of lens protein is what causes the lens to become cloudy as we grow older. Aspirin blocks the glycosylation of lens protein and as a result prevents or at least retards the formation of cataracts. The study, as reported in the June 14, 1983 *Journal of Medicine*, further demonstrates the retardant effect aspirin has on diabetic cataracts is due to the inhibition of aldose reductase in the lens tissues.

The bad news is that relatively large doses, at least four a day, of aspirin are needed to retard the development of cataracts. At this dosage, the toxicity of aspirin appears too great to permit widespread use in the prevention of cataracts. Aspirin is contraindicated in those individuals who are allergic to aspirin or those individuals with stomach ulcers, etc. It is IMPERATIVE that you consult your family physician or your ophthalmologist (eye surgeon) before you take large doses of aspirin. This mode of treatment has not been recommended for widespread use at this time and the supervision of a physician is absolutely necessary.

The good news is that research may find other nonsteroidal, anti-inflammatory drugs or modifications of aspirin that can penetrate the lens of the eye (where cataracts form) better than aspirin and still achieve the desired results without the undesirable side effects. Again, it is premature to recommend widespread use of aspirin for the prevention of cataracts, but the research looks promising. Always consult your family doctor before using large doses of aspirin.

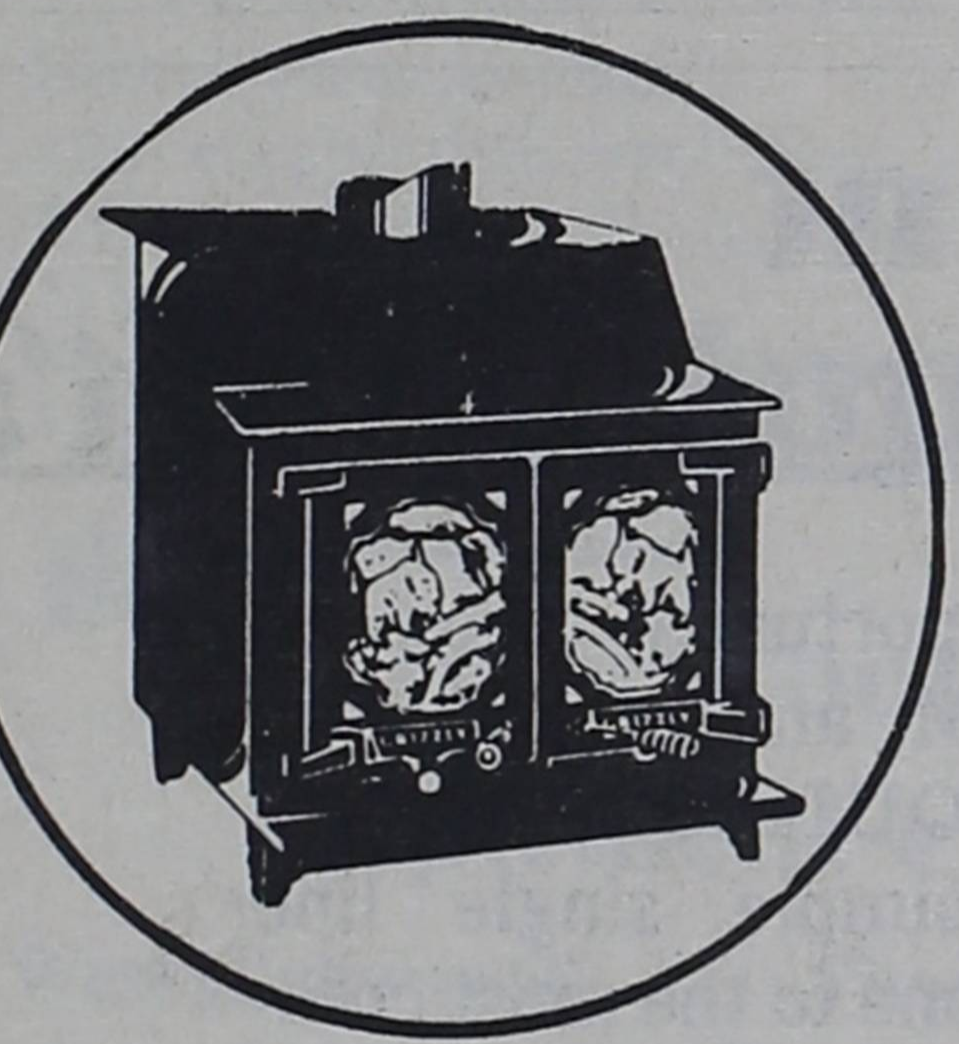
