Local Candidates Give Statements

THE ANNOUNCEMENT last week by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation that right-of-way money is to be made available for the eventual widening of Highway 60 through Parmer County is almost anti-climactic for some of us who have been pushing for the four-lane project for over two decades.

The first year that ye editor lived in Parmer County, it seemed like every other emergency that we checked out involved a fatal or otherwise bad automobile wreck on Highway 60.

The highway immediately became one of our pet projects, and we have written any number of editorials, commented in our columns, and had countless news articles dealing with the situation as pertained to the highway.

Most of the news stories seemed to contain reasons or explanations as to why the highway did not at the certain time qualify for state assistance, and we'd just have to wait for the next fiscal year, or something to that effect.

At one time, the State Highway people backed off the project completely because they had been given the indication that Highway 60 might be included in an interstate program. There was a movement to get a four-lane divided highway from Amarillo to Las Cruces, N.M.

About all this accomplished was to place the situation on "hold" for an eight or ten-year period, when absolutely nothing at all was done.

At one time (when I was younger and perhaps a "crusading editor") I had said to myself that I was going to have something in the paper, either an editorial or a news article, concerning Highway 60, until the Highway Department would "have to do something."

I am sure that Rhea Bradley, highway resident engineer who lives in Littlefield, will recall that for years when I talked to him about highway matters, I eventually asked "Is there anything new about Highway 60?" (And there most likely wasn't.)

At any rate, we had about decided that it was a lost cause, and that if it ever got to the point that all highways had to be four-lane divided facilities, perhaps our highway would at last get its just due.

But late last year, a group of local leaders, armed with the news of a new local industry (which would increase the already heavy load of truck traffic on the highway), began a push, and met with the Highway Commission. A.L. Black served as spokesman for the local delegation.

At the time, the commission gave no promises, but left it as "we'll see what we can do..." virtually the same thing we had heard for the past 20 years.

But lo and behold, the announcement of March 20, 1985, indicating the project at last has been noticed.

State representative Pete Laney has been credited with a big assist in getting the project "off center." For whatever the reason, we applaud those who had anything to do with re-opening the road project.

Some day we may actually see the four-lane divided highway become a reality.

Voting Date Is Slated
Tuesday, April 2 is last day for voting absentee in the city and school races. The election will be Saturday, April 6 at the Friona fire station.

Candidates for the Friona City Council and the Friona School Board were featured in a "Meet the Candidate" program sponsored by the Friona Chamber of Commerce on Monday night at the Friona High School Cafeteria.

Each of the candidates were given an opportunity to introduce themselves, and make comments as to their reasons for seeking office, and whatever information they cared to give about themselves. Bob Welch, Chamber president, served as moderator.

Comments from the candidates were as follows:

CITY COUNCIL CANDIDATES

Bill Stephens--"After living in a

community for 30 years, where it has afforded a person a living and a place to raise his children, you feel obligated to donate back to the community. I have some time to contribute, and would be happy to do so. I consider myself a conservative. I know one problem the City Council may face could be replacing the revenue sharing funds, if these funds are terminated by the federal government."

Mike Hanes--"I have lived in Friona since September of 1980. I have no outstanding qualifications for the city council other than (the experience of) managing a business. I have tried to be involved in community activities,

and would be happy to serve if elected."

Cindy Smiley Butman: "My main reason for running is that I want to see Friona continue to prosper. I have lived in Friona all my life, and I am concerned for the future of the city and for the quality of life. I have some background in financial matters, from the standpoint of having a household budget."

Donald Wilson--"I have no animosity against any person or company--Friona Wheat Growers for one. If elected, I would serve with an open mind."

Doris Sears--"I have lived in Friona for 17 years. I work at Friona State Bank. I was asked if I would consider being a candidate, and decided it would be a challenge. I love Friona. Friona has been good to me. I know there is a lot I would have to learn, but would be willing to try, and would love to serve."

Joe Tongate--"I am going to ask each of you to give me some money and let me spend it the way I want to. That's what every candidate for office does, in effect. Look at all of the candidates, and ask yourself, 'Which of these seven can do the best job of managing my money?'"

Jim Zorns--"I came to Friona in February of 1976. I was born and raised south of Lubbock. I spent six years in the Air Force, flying bombing missions in Japan. I am a graduate of Texas Tech. I have taught school and farmed. I have been associated with farming all of my adult life. I was associated with Gulf Oil Company, and my duties included preparing budgets and operating within those budgets. I would like to serve on the city council."

SCHOOL BOARD CANDIDATES

Danny Murphee--"I was raised in Friona, and have lived here all my life, except for a few years. I graduated from FHS in 1965, and from Wayland in 1969. I coached and taught school at Floydada, and was on the staff at Wayland for two years. I have my master's degree in education. Our education system is very important. It is our largest industry locally. I have been associated with education all of my life, as a student or a teacher, and would have a handle on things. The legislature has taken away some of our local control, and we need to work to get it back."

Kathryn Goddard--"We live in an exciting time for education. There is probably more emphasis on educating our young people now than at any other time. Ours is a rapidly-changing world, and one of the greatest gifts for our children would be a good education. I feel I have the background to serve--I have been on the school board three years and have educated myself for the job. I was reared in Gruver and graduated from SMU. I was with Texas Tech, and while in Lubbock started a school for children with learning disabilities. I taught in the school for five years. I helped start Camp New Dawn and have served as a director there since 1972."

Jerry Cass--"I have lived here all my life. I am a graduate of Friona High School and Texas Tech. After graduating from Tech I worked with IBM as a sales representative for four years before returning here to farm and raise cattle. I am running for three reasons: (1) I was asked to run; (2) I am very proud of our school and (3) It would be an honor to serve, and would be a learning experience."

Jim Atwell--"I am interested in our children having a good education. I am also interested in finding out what makes things tick...about why we can do 'this,' and why we can't do 'that.' I'm interested in ways of improving things. I am interested in being a public servant."

FHS Wins District In UIL Competition

Friona High School emerged as Literary Champions of District 3-AAA after the District Meet last Saturday, March 23, at Floydada.

In the process, FHS students qualified for the regional literary meet in 17 events. They won eight first-place medals, four second places, and four thirds. In most events, those placing third or higher qualify for the regional meet.

After Saturday's round, Friona led the pack of district schools in total points with 185 points, to just 90 points for second-place Littlefield. One event remains in the competition, the one-act play, this Saturday. But with a 95-point lead, Friona has the title nailed down.

Winning first-place medals were Brent Hinkle and Bill Caudill in standard debate; David Small in Lincoln-Douglas debate; Sheila Gresham in poetry interpretation; Traci Zoth in newswriting; Tawney Thompson in feature writing; David Small in editorial writing; Corrie Lundy in typing and Roy Flores in science.

Winning second-place medals were Trey Collier in informative speaking; David Small in persuasive speaking; Chuck Ellis in prose reading and Kelly Wied in ready writing.

Taking third-place medals, and also qualifying for regional, were Brent Hinkle in informative speaking; Bill Caudill in persuasive speaking; Michael Griffin in poetry reading and Milli Dixon in shorthand.

Placing as alternates to the regional meet were Amy Blankenship in prose reading and Tammy Chapman in informative speaking.

Bill Caudill also placed fifth in editorial writing, and Leslee Upton placed fifth in poetry interpretation.

Tracy Talley and Marc Hamil placed fifth in regular debate; Mitchell Gibson placed fifth in persuasive speaking, and Stormi Upton placed fifth in prose reading.

Jana Renner placed sixth in headline writing; Wendy Hinkle was sixth in number sense.

An item which is a main goal for the association is paving the roads at the cemetery. The city is hoping to accomplish this goal sometime during the coming summer.

Miller pointed out that the Cemetery Association will hold its annual meeting on April 15 at 4 p.m. at the City Hall. Letters have recently been mailed to members, who have been asked to vote for two members for the association's

board of directors. Up for re-election are John Fred White and John Baxter. Also listed are candidates Larry Martin, Ronald D. Smiley and Glenn Evan Reeve.

Other current officers of the association are John F. White, vice president; Geneva Williams, secretary-treasurer; and Juanita Reed, assistant secretary-treasurer.

"The purpose of the Friona Cemetery Association is to assist the City of Friona in the care, maintenance, upkeep and beautification of the cemetery. The city owns the cemetery and is responsible for all records. Through your donations and membership dues, the Association is able to help improve the appearance of the cemetery, and to make suggestions for improvements," Miller said. Annual dues are \$10 per member.

Layce Osborn Sets Record In 800 Race

Paced by a school record performance by Layce Osborn in the 800-meter run, the Friona Squaws' track and field team placed third overall at the Abernathy Invitational meet last Saturday. There were 16 teams entered in the meet.

Miss Osborn toured the two-lap race in the time of 2:26.7. This broke her own school record of 2:28.4, set in the regional finals at Odessa last spring, by almost two full seconds.

The excellent time turned in by the FHS student is the best in both the Panhandle and South Plains area, according to track "honor rolls" compiled by the Amarillo and Lubbock newspapers.

Otherwise, the Squaws' 800-meter relay team (Mika Maddox, Susan Bailey, Ronda Ratcliff and

Kelly Wied) placed second with a time of 1:53.0, their best time of the season.

The 1600-meter team (Misses Maddox, Bailey, Ratcliff and Osborn), also clipped time off their best mark, running the race in 4:24, to place second.

In the field events, Kerry Cain placed third in the discus, qualifying her best mark of the season, 104 feet, one inch. Miss Cain also placed third in the shot put at 31-4.

Ronda Ratcliff placed third in the high jump, clearing four feet, eight inches.

The Squaws tallied 60 points, placing behind Tulia and host Abernathy.

The team is entered in the Amarillo Girls Relays this Friday and Saturday.

Jr. Girls Place High In Meets

The junior high Maidens' track and field teams have been turning in some good performances in meets this spring.

At Muleshoe March 13-14, the eighth graders placed second overall, and the seventh graders placed third overall.
