A PROVISION of House Bill 72, the public school reform bill, that has coaches and educators upset is the "no pass, no play" rule which bars extra-curricular activities for students failing just one class.

The rule keeps such students from participating in extra-curricular events for a six-week period. Many school officials feel that the six-week ineligibility is a high price for the students to pay.

Although virtually everyone agrees that students need to be passing their school work in order to participate in athletics and other extra-curricular events, the fact is that such activities have long served as a main drawing card for a number of students, and as a reason for staying in school for countless students.

Fort Worth Southwest High School's boys basketball team had a 30-0 record, and were headed to the state basketball tournament when report cards came out recently. As a result of the report period, three players were lost by the team, and they lost their state semi-final game to a Houston team, along with their hopes for a state title.

Dallas Roosevelt High School has reportedly lost one-third of its track team which was the state champions of their division a year ago. Report cards with at least one failing grade have silenced half the voices in the Grand Prairie choir.

Extra-curricular activities, especially sports, provide the main source of entertainment in hundreds of towns in West Texas.

At Crane High School, the principal said the new rule had practically decimated the school's athletic programs.

In addition, a student who had a good shot at going to state UIL competition in choir and one-act play, was ruled ineligible by a failing grade.

At Friona, it is reported that 22 members of the high school band are ineligible due to the new rule, and as a result will not be able to compete in the UIL's spring concert competition.

If you think it's a tough job to replace members of a relay team, how about replacing key members of a band, who play a variety of musical instruments?

Steps Taken On Highway

The State Highway Commission announced Wednesday a step forward in the process of widening U.S. Highway 60 in Parmer and Castro counties.

Meeting in Austin, the three-member commission authorized the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation (SDHPT) to begin right of way acquisition along the highway.

It is the first step by the commission toward making U.S. 60 a four-lane divided highway in both counties.

Currently, the road is two lanes through Parmer and Castro counties.

"What this means is that we can check our right of way maps and start the appraisal process," said Gary Bernethy, District Administrative Engineer with the SDHPT in Lubbock.

"We still need the authorization to begin work on the actual plan for the project, but we hope to get that okay sometime next year," Bernethy continued.

The state will pay 90 per cent of the right of way cost on the project. The other ten per cent will come from the individual counties.

Area Receives 2.5-Inch Rain

The spring season was ushered into the Friona area this week by one of the nicest, and most general, rains the area has received in many a day.

The slow, mountain-shower type rain fell for the better parts of Tuesday and Wednesday, including most of the night on Tuesday.

Official total measured by Rodney Dunnam, Friona weather recorder, was 2.48 inches. Of that total, 1.66 had fallen in the 24 hours up to 7 a.m. on Wednesday, with another .82 inch measured during the day Wednesday (up to 7 a.m. Thursday).

Reports from the outlying area indicated that the area's farmers fared about the same as did the yards and gardens around the official city gauge.

A check with farmers showed that the rain stretched from as far as the Bootleg area, through Rhea, which received a nice rain, southeastward through the Hub area, which likewise experienced a good total.

Attempts on Thursday to contact several farmers proved fruitless, due to the fact that (1) the telephone lines, having experienced wetness, were on the blink in some areas, and (2) some farmers, having their farmland wet to the limits, may have opted to go on their own personal "spring break."

The moisture should be ultra-beneficial to the area farmland, coming when the winter wheat crop was really needing a boost. Observers expect the wheat to really take off.

The rain should also provide a generous amount of pre-plant moisture for the row crops, when their planting time arrives.

"It's a million-dollar rain. It'll put us in good shape for planting corn and cotton," was the reaction by one area agriculture industry spokesman Thursday.

Muddy conditions may slow the planting of the area's sugar beets, potatoes, onions and other vegetables. However, the benefits from the moisture should more than offset any delays experienced.

One observer remarked on Wednesday that had the temperature (which hovered in the low 40s for a 36-hour period), been just a few degrees lower during the wet spell, the area could have experienced one of the worst blizzards in its history. What a difference a few degrees make!

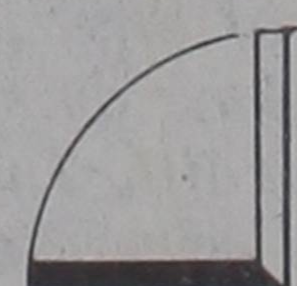

Hale died Sunday, March 10, in Paris, France, of an apparent heart attack while on a European tour with a group of friends.

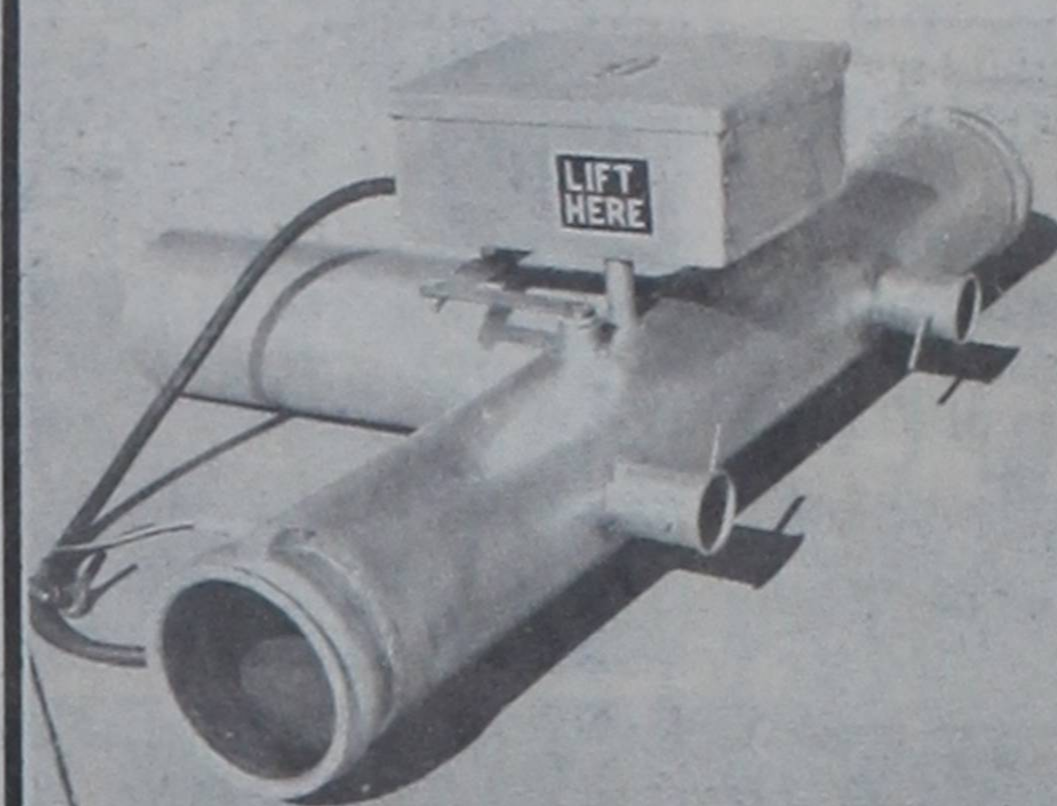

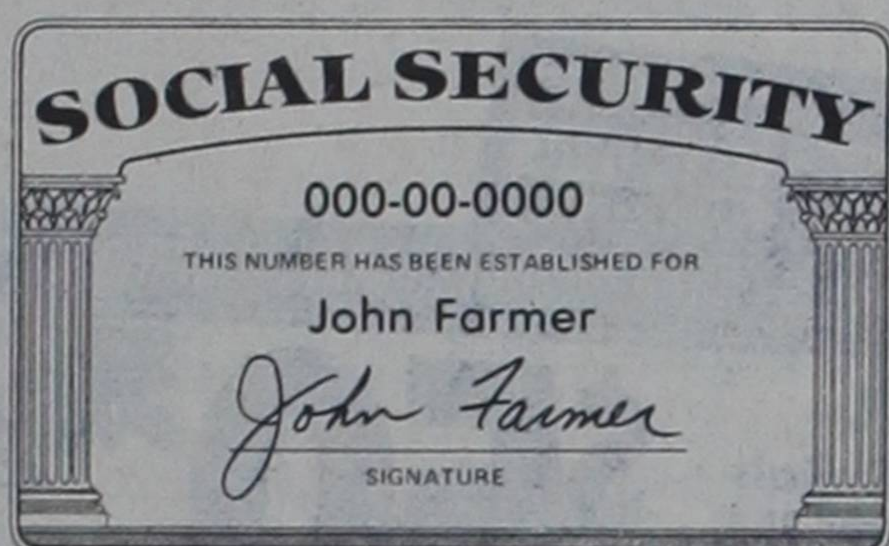

JAMAICAN RUM
Most Caribbean islands have their own traditional rum style. Each rum label must specify the island on which it was made. 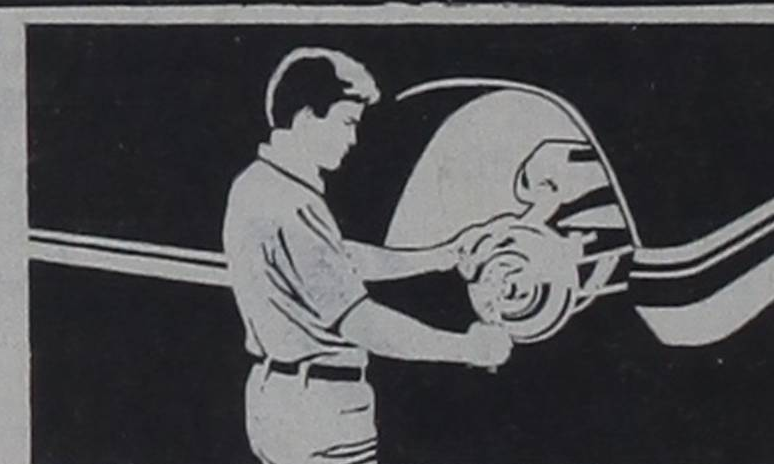

Perot seems to think that unless a kid is a 95-average student who does nothing but keep his head in his school books, he doesn't belong in school.

The facts are that hundreds of thousands of students, down through the years, have been kept in school due to their interest in extra-curricular activities in general, and athletics in particular.

School officials across the state are reporting that such students are already dropping out of school.

In our humble opinion, a little education, or at least exposure to the educational process, is much better than none at all, which will be the end result for thousands of youngsters, under the new UIL setup.

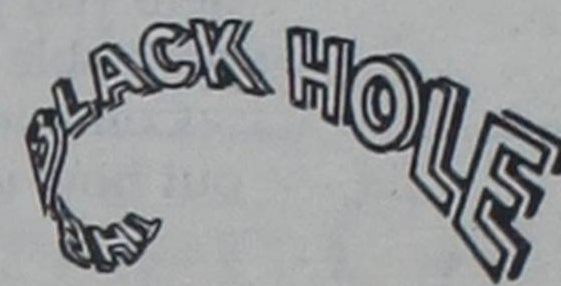
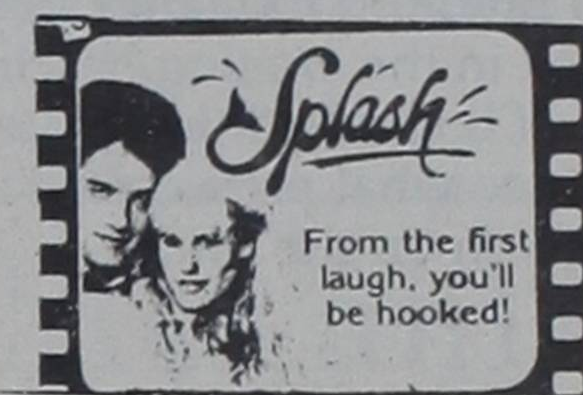
