JUDGE PORTER ROBERTS gave us a news release this week, which hits on a problem that has been plaguing our state for at least the past ten years.

The state government has been passing more and more costs on to local entities in recent years. First it was our cities and school districts who were affected, and now the county government is feeling the pinch of this shifting of tax burdens.

Governors White, Clements and Briscoe have all made a lot of headlines by promising voters there would be "no new taxes" on the state level.

What this really meant was that while the state would not raise certain taxes, or come up with new ones, at the same time, the state government cut back on funds it previously returned to local governments, such as schools and counties.

In order to keep all of their programs operating, the local governments have been obliged to raise their taxes, to compensate for the loss of funds.

Or, as the news release from the county judge says: "The federal government is passing costs on to the state, the state is passing costs on to the counties, and they are both telling everyone that they aren't raising taxes. They're not. Local government has to do it for them."

Making matters worse from the county's standpoint is the fact that the state is attempting to impose some new requirements on the county, without providing the funds for the programs. The commissioners are urging passage of legislation (HB 2324) which would require the state to provide funds for such services mandated by the state.

Judge Roberts is urging all voters and taxpayers to contact their elected state representative, J.E. (Pete) Laney and state senator, Bill Sarpalius, and let them know your feelings in the matter of taxes.

One of the revenue sources for cities and counties during the past decade has been the "revenue sharing" program. The Federal government established the program, to (rightly) return a portion of the tax money to the local governments whose citizens send in taxes every year on the federal level.

These federal payments have been getting smaller for some government entities, and the Reagan administration proposes to eliminate revenue sharing entirely by October of 1986.

This will put these local government bodies in the position of having to come up with a method of replacing the money. Having had the money for ten years or so, most governments had become very accustomed to the revenue sharing amounts, if not downright dependent upon it for certain programs.

Most everyone is aware that Public School Bill 72, which has caused our schools to have to reorganize in many areas, was passed during a special summer session of the legislature.

Rumors are beginning to surface that Governor White may call another special session for the coming summer, and the legislators may use this one, when many of their constituents are vacationing and not paying as close attention as usual, for some other type of controversial legislation, such as a state income tax.

Texas is one of the few large states that does not have a state income tax, but at the same time our state residents are not tax exempt.

It would behoove each of our readers and taxpayers to pay closer attention to what their legislators are doing, both in Austin and in Washington, and stay in touch with them on important matters.

Area Gets 1" Rain Sunday

The area received a nice rain Sunday, April 26, with exactly an inch--anyway, .99--measured at Friona's official gauge.

The rain was welcomed by wheat and row-crop farmers, many of whom were in the process of irrigating. The rainfall will be a big boost to the area's wheat crop, which was needing a helping hand.

The moisture could also be enough pre-plant moisture for the area's cotton and maize crops.

All of the area had basically as much rain as was measured in Friona. Jim Dixon said he received 2/3 of an inch at Rhea. The areas around Black and Hub reported at least an inch, with 1.5 inches the measurement around Bovina.

In Friona, the bulk of the inch fell within a one-hour period around mid-day, and streets and highways were flooded. At one point, the middle "turning lane" was the only lane of traffic not covered by water on Highway 60 through town.

The rainfall left the total measured for the month of April at 1.37 inches.

New Officers Are Named By Local School Board

Re-organization of the board, plus mostly routine matters were on the agenda at the April meeting of the Friona School District's board of trustees. The meeting was held late because of the school's Easter break.

Two new members were installed by the board, Jerry Cass and Danny Murphree, and Kathryn Goddard was re-installed for a three-year term. Mrs. Goddard was elected by the board as its president; Jerry Hinkle was named vice-president and Pat Fleming is secretary.

The board selected Hinkle to present the high school diplomas during the graduation exercises. Board member Dee Willard will present the diplomas at the eighth

grade ceremonies.

The tax collection report was given, indicating that for the 1984 tax roll, approximately 92 per cent of the taxes had been collected. This was very close to where collections stood at the same time a year ago, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

A resolution was approved by the board giving the Parmer County Tax Appraisal District the authority to contract with a law firm in the collection of delinquent taxes, and to file suit for the collection of such taxes.

Some parents met with the board, discussing their desire to organize a Parent-Teachers Association (PTA) for the school system. The board indicated it would be acceptable to such an organization, and the parents plan to secure additional information and meet back with the board at its May meeting. It is the group's desire to be organized in time for the 1985-86 school term.

TWO INJURED

Beth Norsworthy Killed In Wreck

A 16-year-old Friona youngster, Beth Ann Norsworthy, was killed Wednesday afternoon in a grinding two-vehicle collision two miles north of town at an unmarked intersection of two county roads.

The 1978 Chevrolet Impala driven by Miss Norsworthy was hit broadside by a 1982 Chevrolet pickup driven by Richard Lynn Herring, 21, also of Friona.

Robin Wyly, 17, a step-sister of the deceased youngster, was seriously hurt in the accident, as was Herring, who was thrown out

of the windshield of his pickup, and was pinned beneath the car as both vehicles came to rest off the roadway and in the adjacent field.

Misses Norsworthy and Wyly were enroute to their home, which is located about a quarter of a mile east of the accident scene. They were headed east. Herring was travelling south. His pickup hit the automobile right in the driver's door.

Both vehicles were total losses. The accident happened at about 5:30 p.m.

Investigating patrolman, DPS

Trooper Craig Hunt, said it appeared that Miss Norsworthy may never have seen the Herring vehicle approaching. Herring's skid marks were measured by the patrolmen at 174 feet.

No citation had been issued as of Thursday noon, although Trooper Hunt said that the pickup was due to yield, since the car was on the pickup driver's right.

Miss Norsworthy was dead on arrival at Parmer County Community Hospital. Members of the Friona Emergency Medical Service responded to the accident scene.

Miss Wyly and Herring were taken by separate ambulances to hospitals in Amarillo. Miss Wyly was taken to Northwest Texas Hospital, and Herring to St. Anthony's Hospital.

Reports indicated Miss Wyly sustained a laceration to her forehead and possible other injuries. Her condition was reported as "stable" on Friday.

Herring's condition was listed as "satisfactory" on Friday. He sustained possible broken bones and battery acid burns.

It was reported that Bob Wyly, father of the girls, was the first one to the accident scene. He had been working outside, heard the crash and/or saw the dust, and went to investigate.

Robin's mother, Emma Lu Wyly, was killed in a car accident two miles west of Friona June 25, 1969.

Troopers Frank Ellis III, Richard Diegelman and Bill Scott assisted with the investigation, along with members of the Friona Police Department.

Funeral services for Miss Norsworthy were conducted Friday afternoon (see obituary write-up elsewhere).

The late Friday night storm, which spawned tornadoes over a wide section of the Texas Panhandle, caused thousands of dollars of damage in the Lazbuddie area alone, in addition to the loss of life. The Morris home, which is located about 2.5 miles east of Lazbuddie on Farm Road 145, was completely destroyed by the funnel. Also destroyed was a small house immediately behind the Morris' brick home, in which Morris' mother lived, as well as barns, trucks and farm equipment. Morris and his daughter were treated for injuries at West Plains Memorial Hospital in Muleshoe. Mrs. Morris was dead on arrival at the hospital.

10 YEARS AGO--APRIL 20, 1975

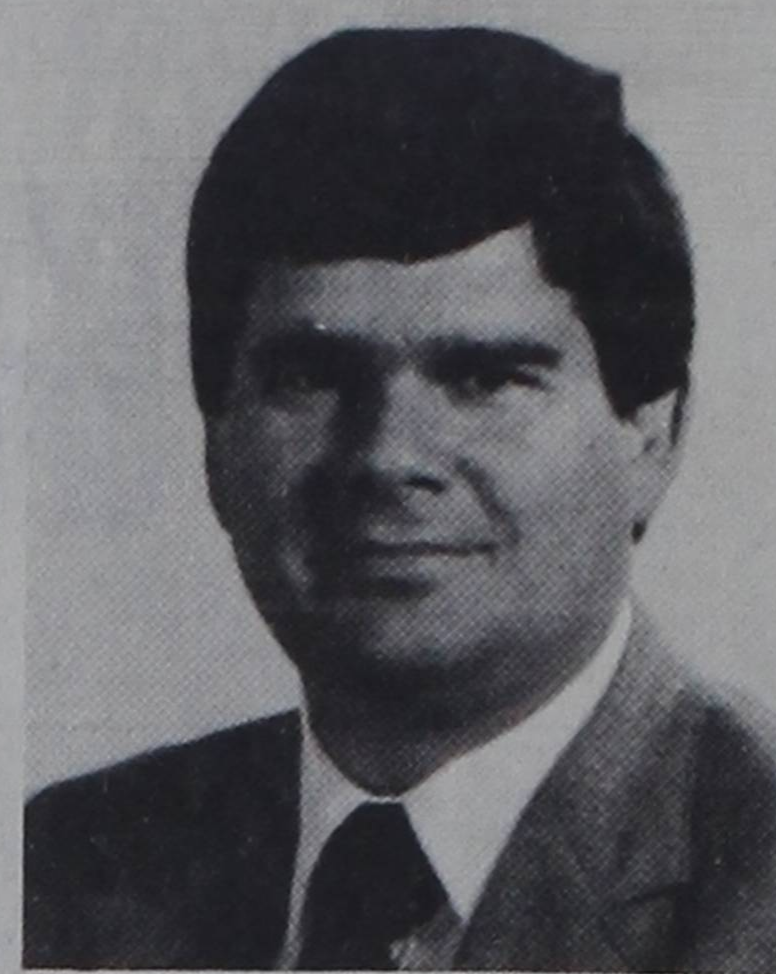
Producers Receive Payments

Corn and sorghum producers who participated in the 1984 acreage reduction programs received deficiency payments for these crops, according to Martin L. Chandler, Parmer County Executive Director. Checks totaling an estimated \$6,967,651.97 have been issued to 1889 farmers in Parmer County this month.

Deficiency payments are made when the national average price received by farmers during the first five months of the marketing year for a program crop falls below the government-established target price for that crop. Nationally, farmers received a weighted average market price of \$2.60 per bushel for corn, and \$2.30 per bushel for sorghum during the first five months of the marketing year.

Chandler said eligible farmers have received deficiency payments at a rate of 43 cents per bushel for corn, and 46 cents per bushel for sorghum. The payments are computed by multiplying the program yield for the farm by the acres planted for harvest times the payment rate.

Nationally, ASCS will disburse about \$1.7 billion in deficiency payments for 1984-crop corn and sorghum.

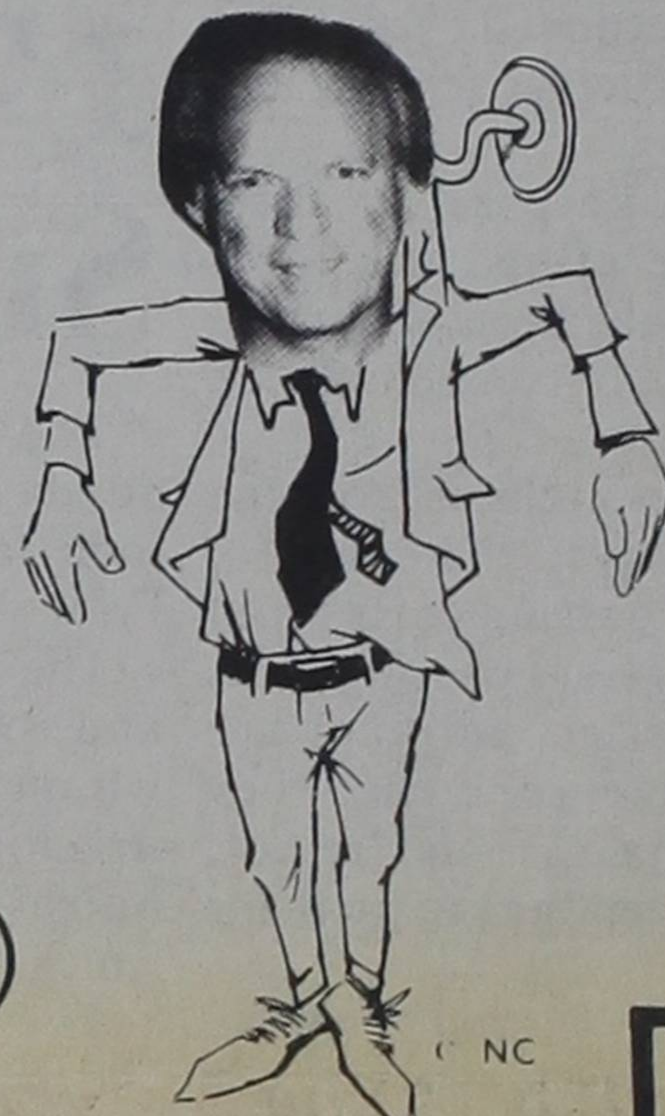

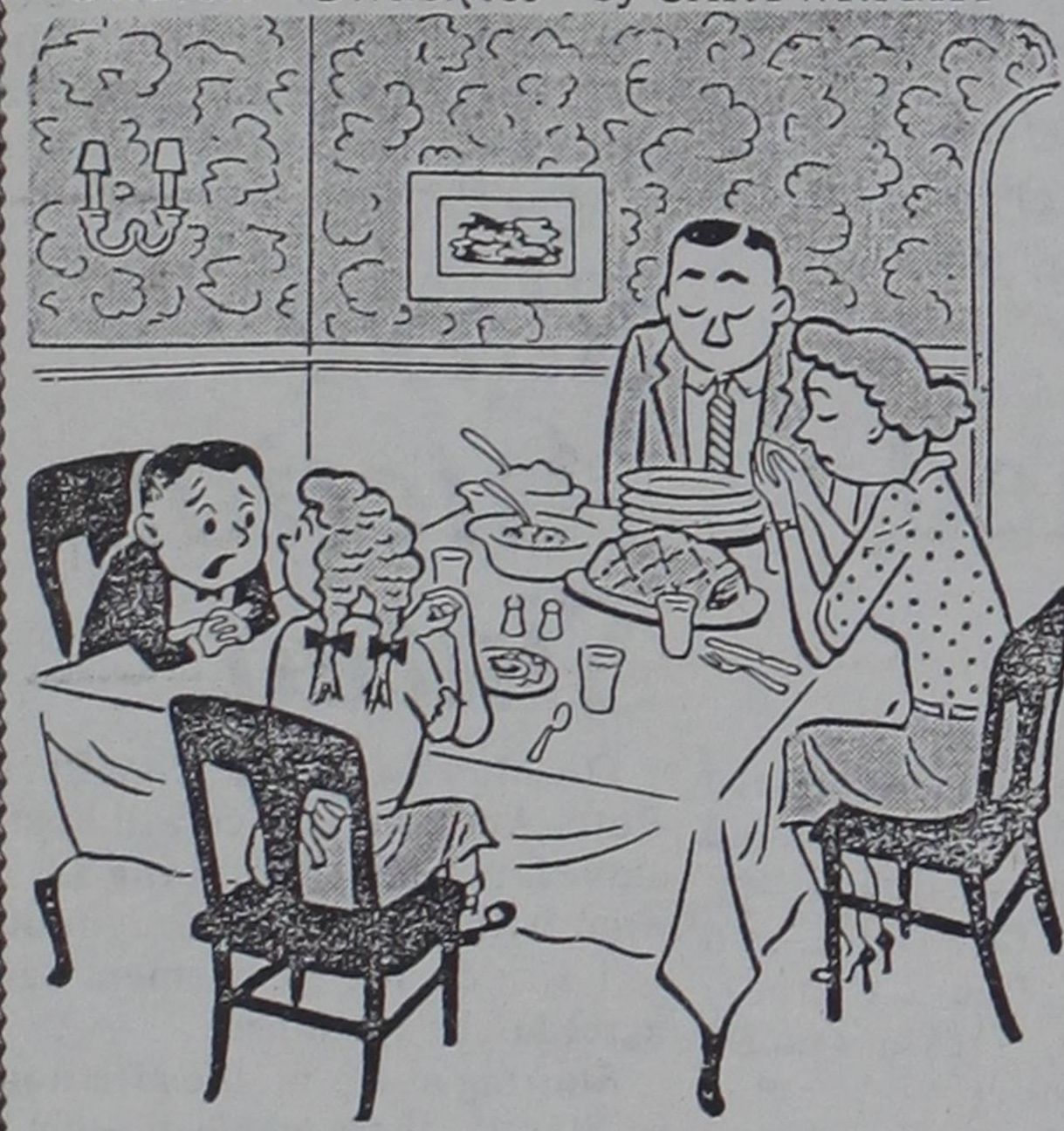

Born September 10, 1968 in Wichita Falls, Beth had been a resident of Friona for the past 11 years. She was a sophomore student at Friona High School, a member of FFA and the Friona High School Band. She was a member of the Tenth Street Church of Christ.

Miss Norsworthy was killed Wednesday, May 1 in a two-vehicle crash two miles north of Friona.

Survivors include her mother and step-father, Lydia and Bob Wylly of Friona; her father, Joe Norsworthy of Wichita Falls; her grandparents, Ethel Carthel of Hereford, J. Court In Favor Of HB 2324

Parmer County Commissioners voted at their last regular meeting to advertise for bids to lease the county's public school land in Gaines and Andrews County.

The court will seek bids on labors 2, 3, 4, 7, 12, 13 and 14, league 315 in Gaines and Andrews counties. The bids will be opened at the court's meeting May 13, at 11 a.m.

A resolution was passed in support of House Bill 2324, as follows: "Resolved that the Commissioners Court of Parmer County is wholeheartedly in favor of HB 2324, relating to the authority of a county to expand funds for new or increased county services mandated by the state providing the state provides sufficient funding for the county to fulfill the mandate."

A request from Friona State Bank asking for approval on the substitution of securities was approved unanimously.

A motion was passed authorizing the county to pay its 1985 dues to the Panhandle Judges and Commissioners Association in the amount of \$40.00.

Another motion was approved to pay a bill from Parmer County Community Hospital, in the amount of \$27.00.

A motion was approved to hire the accounting firm of Brown, Graham and Company to conduct the annual audit of the county's books.

Soil conservation work was approved for the farms of John Dixon, Harold Redwine, Tom Ware and Pat Ware, all in Precinct 2. Such work is performed by county machinery when not otherwise needed, and costs are paid by the individual farmer.

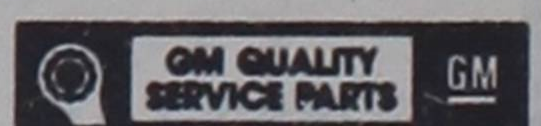

FARMERS ADVISED

New Pesticide Rule In Effect

The spring planting season is underway in various stages across the state, and that means weeds and bugs, and the pesticides we must have to fight them, won't be far behind. The Texas Department of Agriculture wants to remind all farmers and ranchers new pesticide standards designed to protect the health and safety of all Texans, especially rural Texans, went into effect January 21st, along with a 90 day moratorium on penalties against inadvertent violators.

The section on notifying neighbors before spraying a field immediately adjacent to their property applies to aerial applications only, and prior notification is required only when the neighbor requests it. In addition, persons with medical conditions which may be made worse by exposure to pesticides and who live within one quarter mile of the field to be sprayed by

an airplane can also request prior notification. Their request must be verified by a licensed physician, and certified by TDA. And certain institutions such as hospitals, nursing homes, schools when children are present, in patient clinics, licensed day care centers and farm labor camps, all within one quarter mile of the field to be sprayed by an airplane, can also qualify for prior notification.

Prior notification is to be given the day before the spraying and can be accomplished with a phone call, a post card, or a personal visit. Those farmers and ranchers with a number of neighbors requesting prior notification can use a flag to notify them.

In the rare case in which an emergency application is required, the application can still be made. However, notice must be given before the application and attempts to notify medically affected neighbors must be made at least one hour before the application.

The other section establishes re-entry intervals which define the amount of time which must lapse before a worker may render a treated field with normal work clothes. This section applies only when the farm worker is expected to have substantial body contact with the crop, but it does cover both aerial and ground applications.

The easiest thing to do is simply keep all farm workers out of the field until the re-entry interval has expired, in almost all cases between 24 and 48 hours, and all the requirements have been met.

If the workers must enter a "hot" field, re-entry signs with the universal symbol and the name and phone numbers of the farm operator must be posted. In addition, the farm workers must

wear the appropriate protective clothing, be told they cannot enter the field without appropriate protective clothing, be told when the re-entry interval expires, and be given a number of health related instructions.

This information can be given in person, in writing, or on warning signs posted beside the re-entry signs.

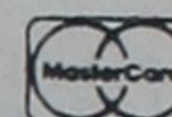

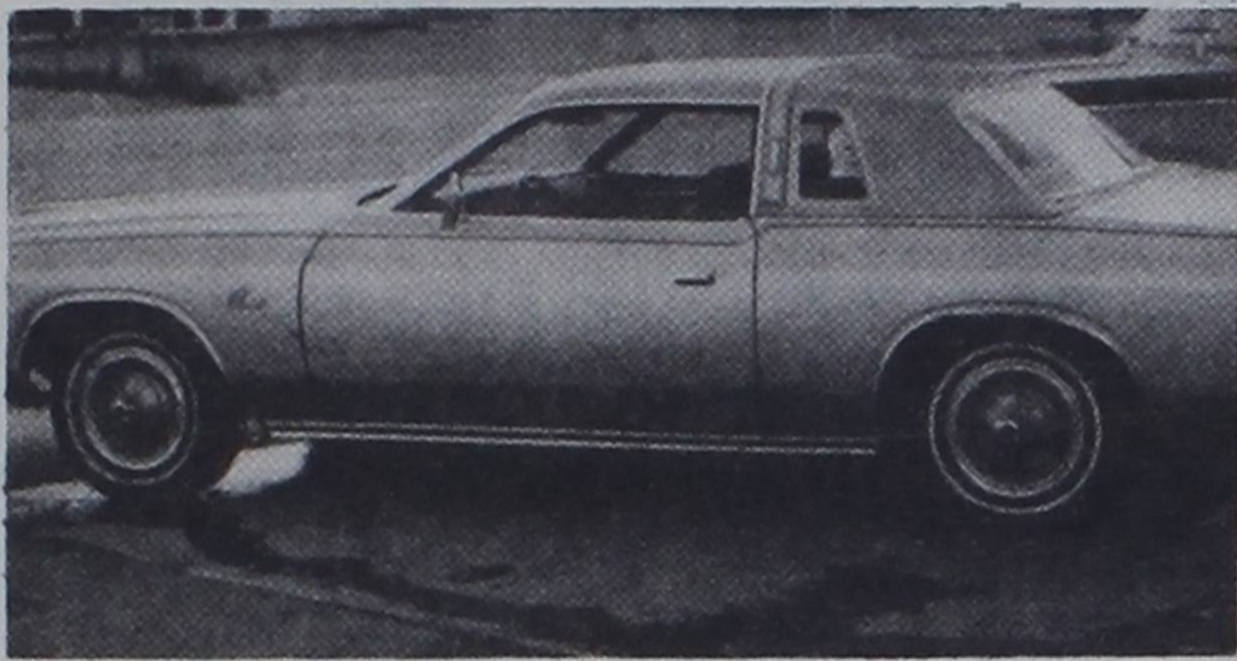

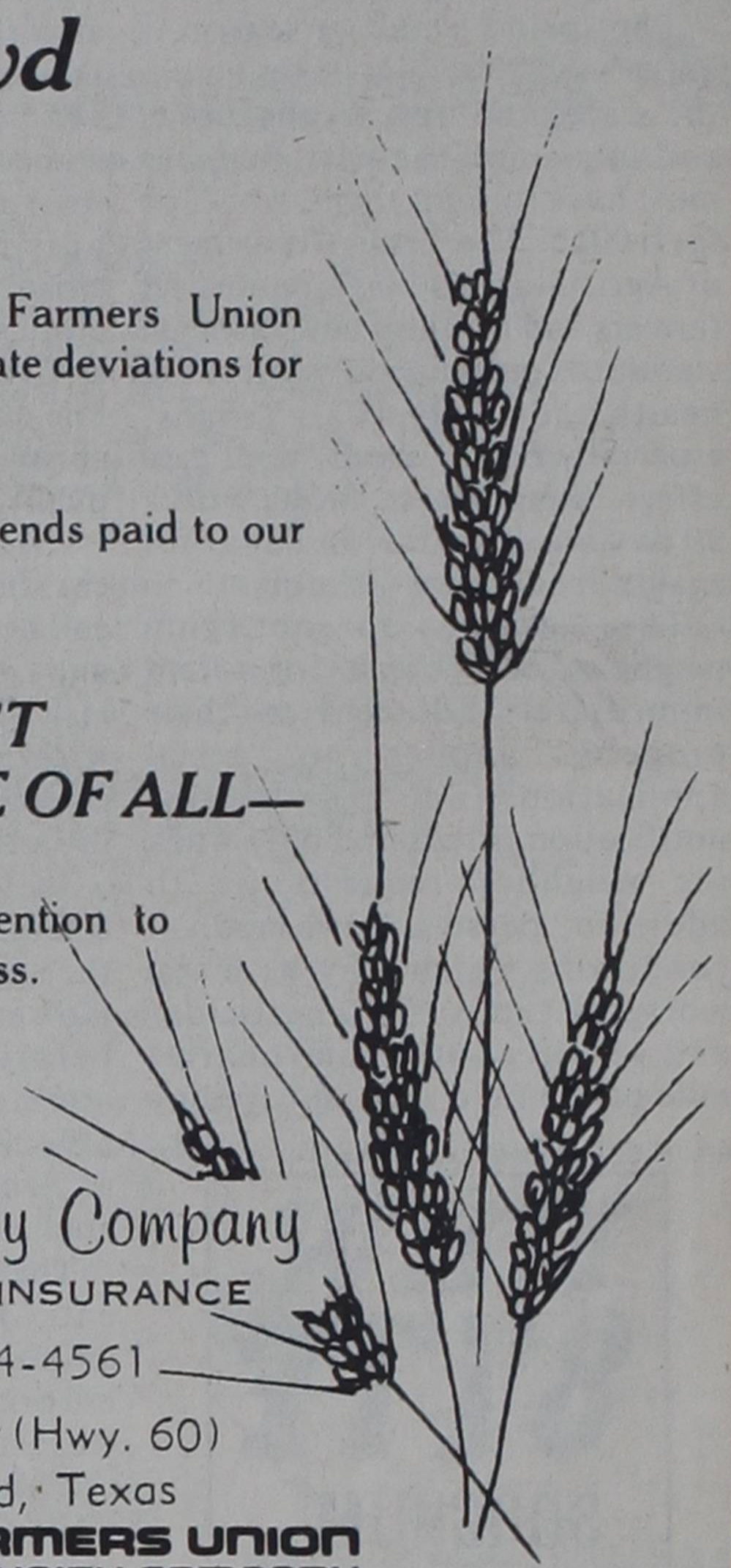

THE LABEL
 Wine labeling laws and special legislation concerning "appellations d'origine" came into being in the 1930's. Basically, a wine label generally shows the name of the wine, the geographical location where it was produced and the type. The label may carry a vintage date if the wine meets the appropriate regulations. This date indicates the year that the grapes were gathered, pressed, and the juice fermented into wine. A label may also carry a village, parish, commune, district or state name if the wine meets that country's specifications to qualify. The maker and bottler is also indicated as is the grape variety. There will often be a government guarantee that the wine is properly labeled and authentic.

Tips Given On Lightning Safety

When it comes to a brilliant display of lightning in Texas skies, "better safe than sorry," is a good motto.

Deaths from lightning may be rare, but it's shortsighted for anyone to ignore the simple precautions and slight inconvenience of safety measures, says Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service health education specialist Dr. Mary Ann Heussner.

She says the first rule of lightning safety is to get away quickly from any open space—a field, golf course, hill-top, beach or pool. Get away before the rain starts, since lethal bolts sometime strike during the muggy lull before a storm.

"If you're caught outside, the best kinds of shelter are buildings equipped with a lightning protection system, steel-framed buildings, and cars, buses or tractors with metal tops and closed windows," advises the specialist. "But don't trust a flimsy shelter on a golf course."

When you can't take cover, you can better your chances by taking refuge in a ravine, culvert or ditch—keeping away from pipes and staying alert for flash floods," Heussner says.

When none of this is practical, crouch as low as possible with no part of your body except knees and toes touching the ground. Also remember to avoid tall isolated objects, like a lone tree, staying twice as far away as the tree is high.

Just being indoors doesn't entirely protect you from lightning, Heussner points out.

Stay away from open doors and windows, fireplaces, radiators, stoves, metal pipes, sinks, bathtubs, shower stalls and plugged-in appliances. Electricity of lethal strength can enter a home not only by a direct strike, but also by a side flash from another object like a tree, and through pipe lines and wiring.

"Unfortunately, when someone is struck by lightning, bystanders often don't know what to do," remarks the specialist. "Others won't touch the victim for fear he is still electrically charged."

But a lightning victim can be safely touched, and often revived by mouth-to-mouth resuscitation," Heussner says.

Adults who work outdoors or enjoy outdoor sports may have a healthy respect for lightning, but children are often unaware of its

danger. The specialist recommends that parents review lightning safety precautions with their youngsters along with safe bicycling and swimming rules for the summer.

- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.

- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

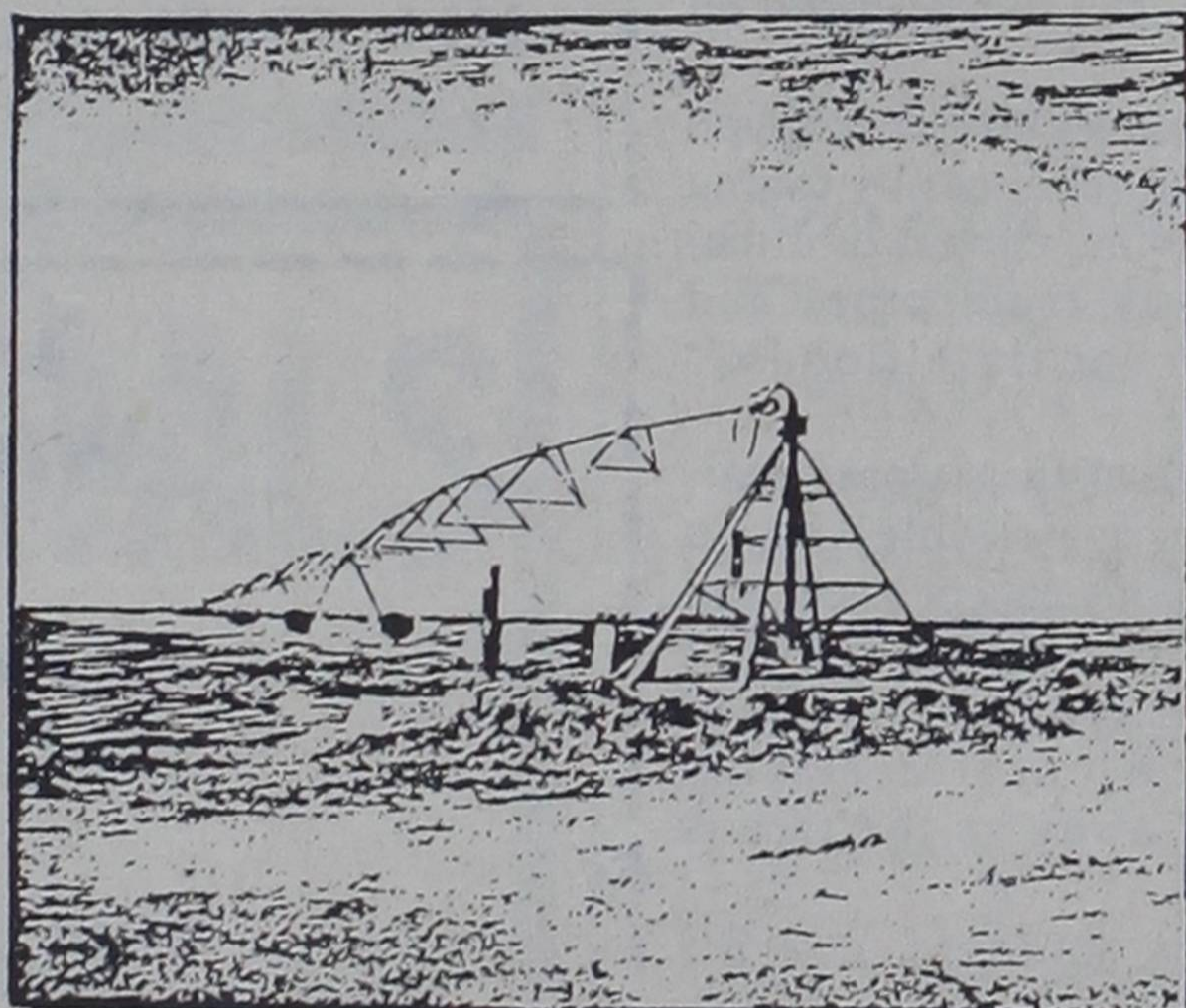
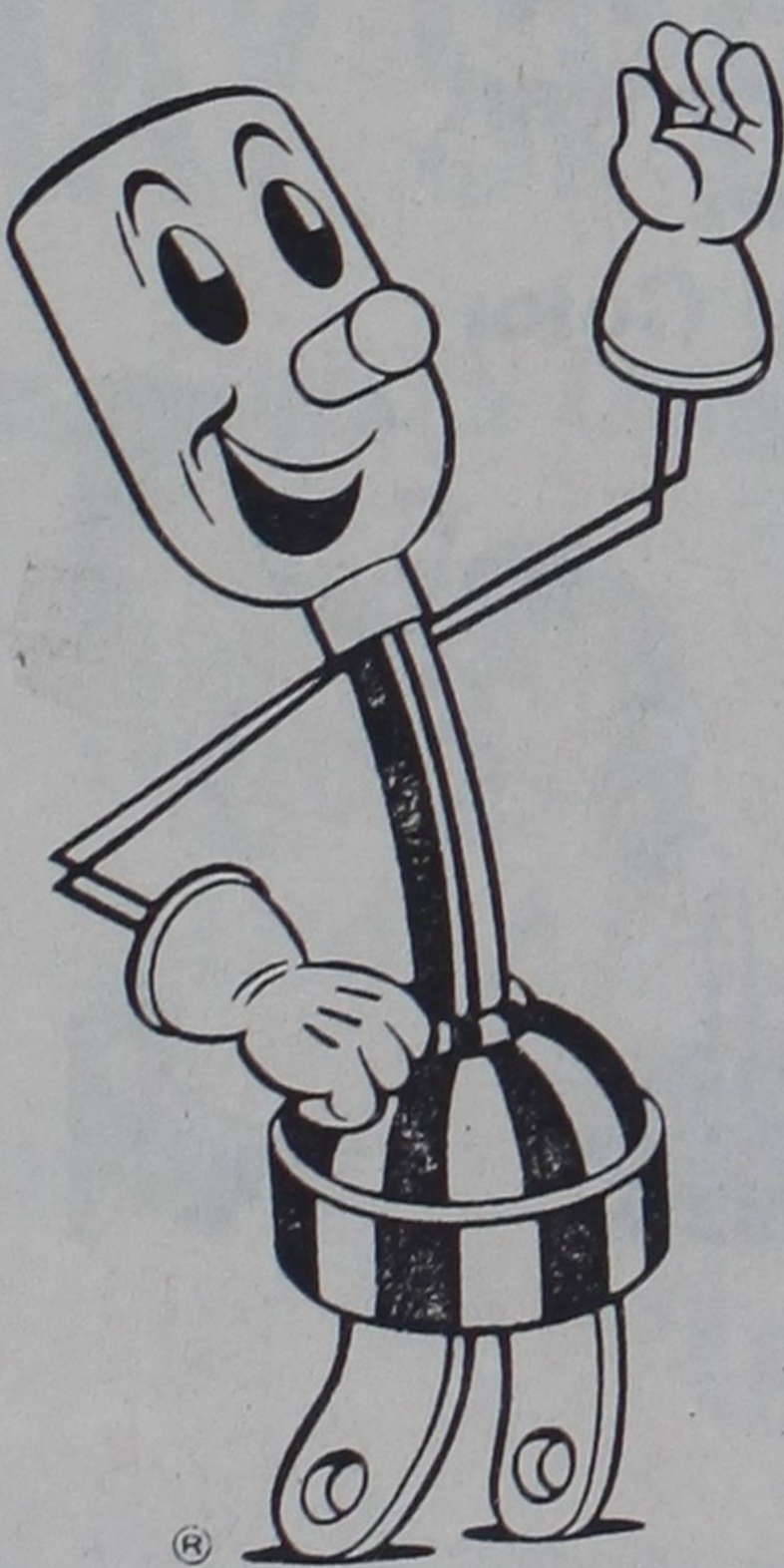

Charles D. Hough, Friona, has been recognized nationally by the American Angus Association for having two registered Angus cows included in the American Angus Association's 1985 Pathfinder Report.

The Pathfinder Program identifies superior Angus cows based upon recorded production traits that are economically important to the commercial cow-calf producer. These traits include regular calving, and heavy weaning weights, reports John Crouch, director of performance programs for the American Angus Association. All registered Angus cows that meet the strict Pathfinder standards are listed, along with their owners, in the Pathfinder Report which is published annually by the American Angus Association.

The 1985 Report lists 3,478 individual cows. It will be published in the May issue of the Angus Journal and extra copies are available from the American Angus Association. The largest number of Pathfinder cows from a single herd this year is 68, and several hundred breeders have a single cow that qualifies for the exclusive listing.

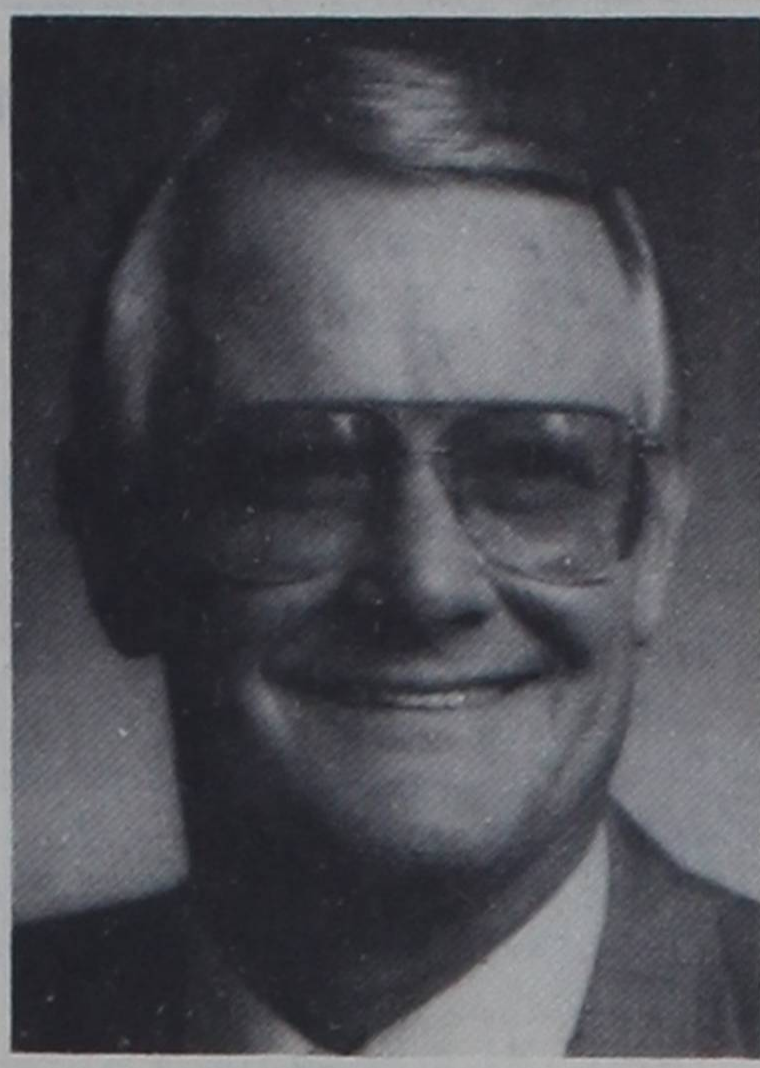

80 Per Cent Of Acres Signed Up Under ASC

When the 1985 farm program sign-up period ended April 1, Parmer County farmers had enrolled 375,221.6 acres, or 80 per cent of their eligible wheat, feed grains and cotton acres in the acreage reduction programs.

Martin L. Chandler said Parmer County producers enrolled 1152 farms in the programs and agreed to take out of production, at least 30 per cent of their wheat and upland cotton base acres, and 10 per cent of their feed grain. "This means that as much as 77,300 acres of cropland in Parmer County could be idled this year, depending on how many acres of program crops are planted by participants," Chandler said. The cropland taken out of production must be devoted to an acreage conservation reserve to protect it from wind and water erosion, he said.

Crop base acres enrolled in the 1985 farm programs include 176,332.2 acres of feed grains, 109,442.8 acres of wheat, and 89,446.6 acres of upland cotton.

Designed to control excess crop supplies and maintain a level of stocks in line with market demand, the acreage reduction programs offered incentives to farmers to reduce plantings. Program participants will be eligible for price support loans at National Rate of \$3.30 a bushel for wheat, \$2.55 for corn, \$2.08 for barley, \$1.31 for oats, \$2.42 for sorghum, and \$0.55 per pound for upland cotton. They are also eligible for target prices of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88

for sorghum, \$2.60 for barley, \$1.60 for oats, \$4.38 for wheat, and 81 cents per pound for upland cotton.

In addition to the above benefits, wheat and upland cotton participants will be eligible for land diversion payments. These payments compensate farmers for taking land out of production in addition to the acreage reduction requirement, the ASCS official said.

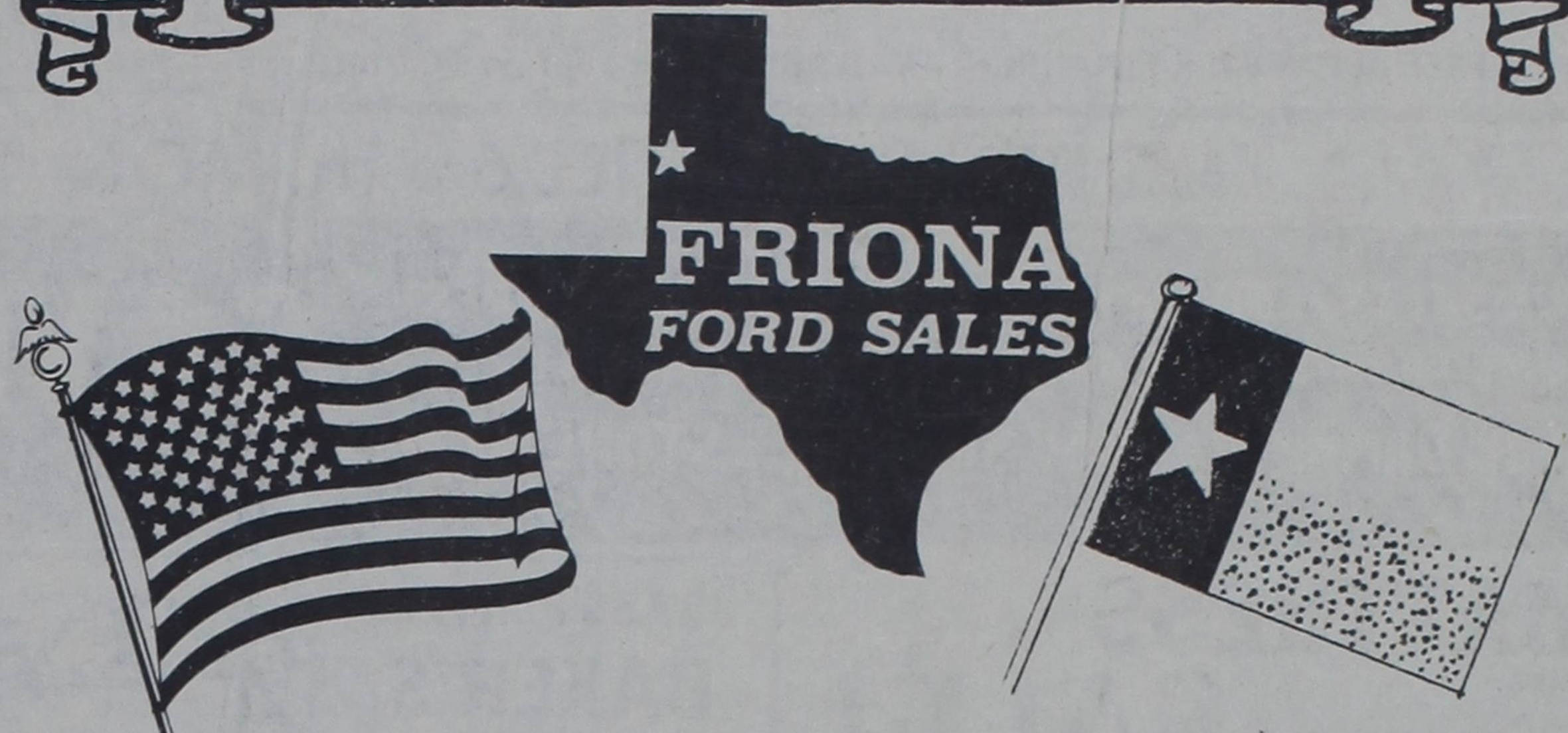
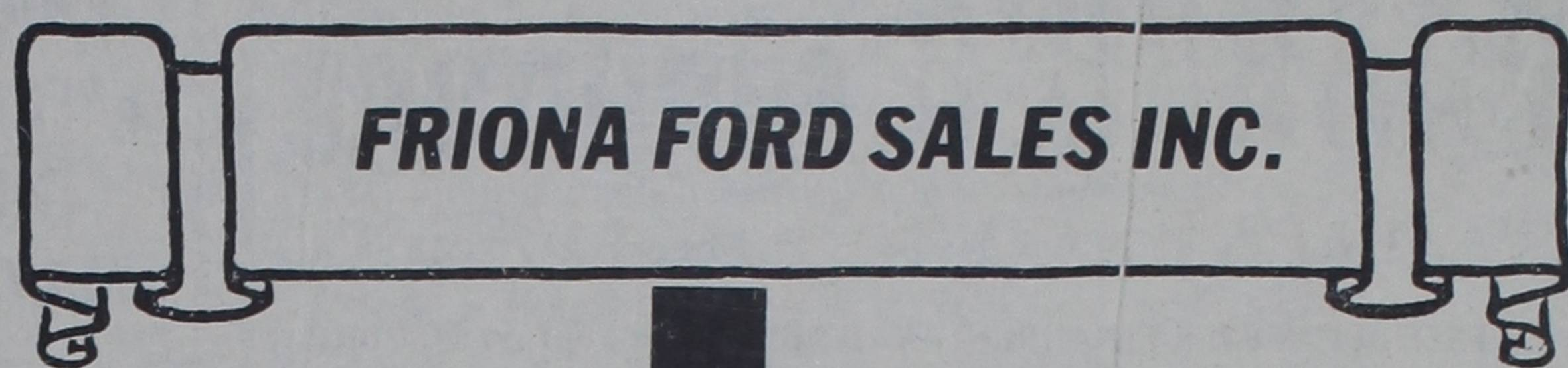
Jon Drake, student body president at West Texas State University, was named "Man Student of the Year" at the All University Honors Banquet April 25 in Canyon.

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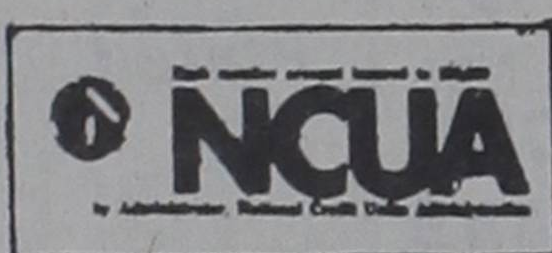
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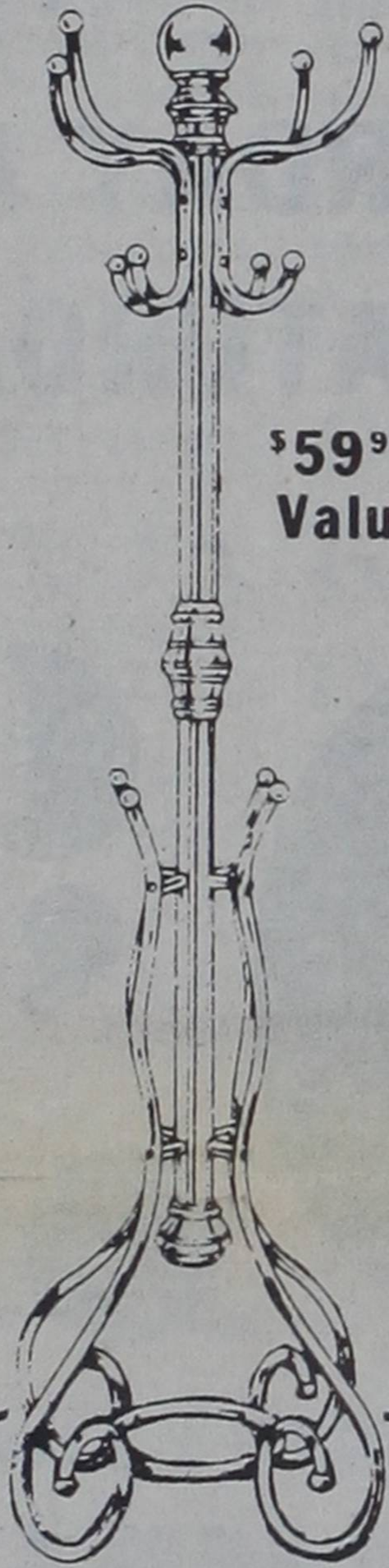


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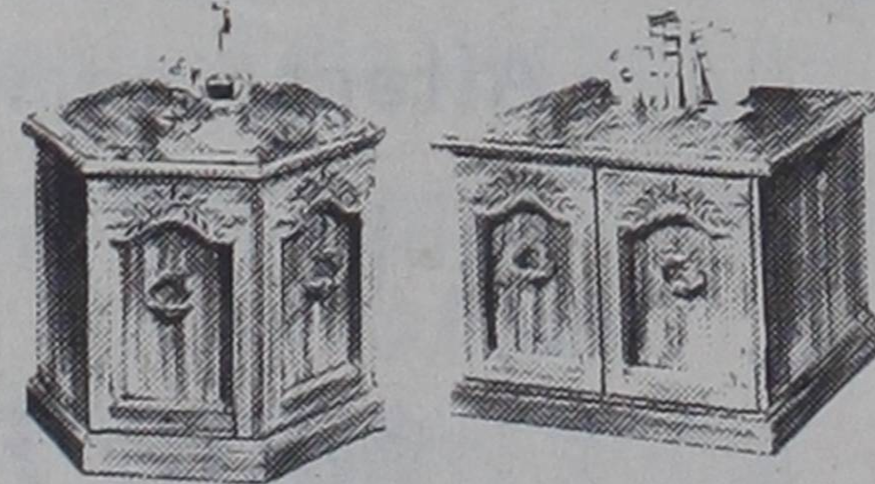


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
