Prime International In Progress Report

Prime, International, was host on Wednesday to an "open house" at which Friona's civic leaders were shown through the new plant and given an idea as to the plant's operations, as well as how things are progressing with Prime, and its parent operation, Millard Warehouse.

The company was host also to a luncheon, served at the Friona Community Center.

On hand for the affair were Prime company officials, Moe Handleman, Jim Nesber and Jon Lewallen; Millard officials Tim Jackes, Larry Larsen and Ken Teichmier. A pair of bankers from Omaha, Nebraska, Steve Bodner and Dave Parker, also visited.

Prime spokesmen pointed out that Friona was selected for the plant due to (1) availability of fresh liver supply; (2) Millard Warehouse facilities; (3) access and shipping efficiencies to the Southeast, Southwest and Pacific; and (4) availability of good labor.

Positive influences on Friona include the fact that Prime currently employs 40 people (Millard adds 25 employees to that figure). Prime expects to double the plant's production capacity

within the next six months, and to employ 60 to 80 people, or about double its present payroll.

The payroll for the plant will be run through Friona State Bank, officials say. The increased production should also be a boost for the local real estate market.

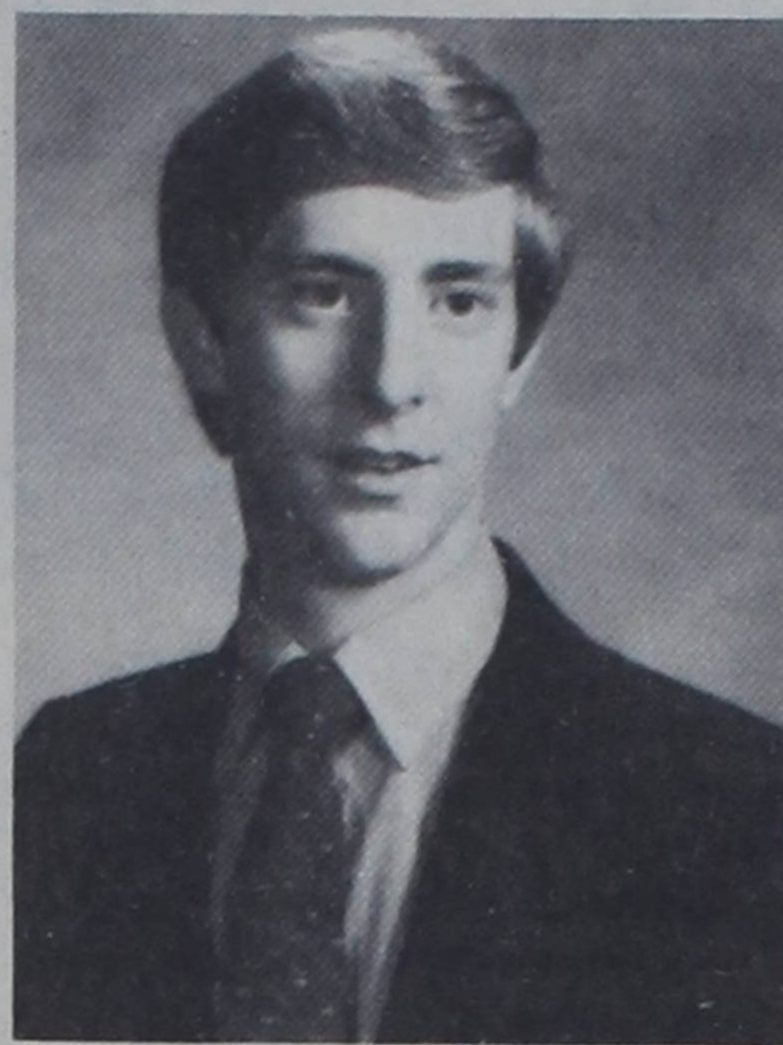
"The future for Prime International will see continued growth, and as Prime grows, so should Friona. We are also constantly researching new, innovative ways to package liver and other variety meats and will continue to do so," said Handleman.

Prime was founded in 1977 as Prime Meat Processors. It is one of the industry's leading liver processors, in addition to producing other assorted variety meats.

Prime, International services the retail and food-service markets both nationally and internationally.

They are industry pioneers in the packaging of frozen sliced liver, including individually vacuum sealed slices.

Prime operates three processing facilities, two in Omaha, and the new Friona plant.

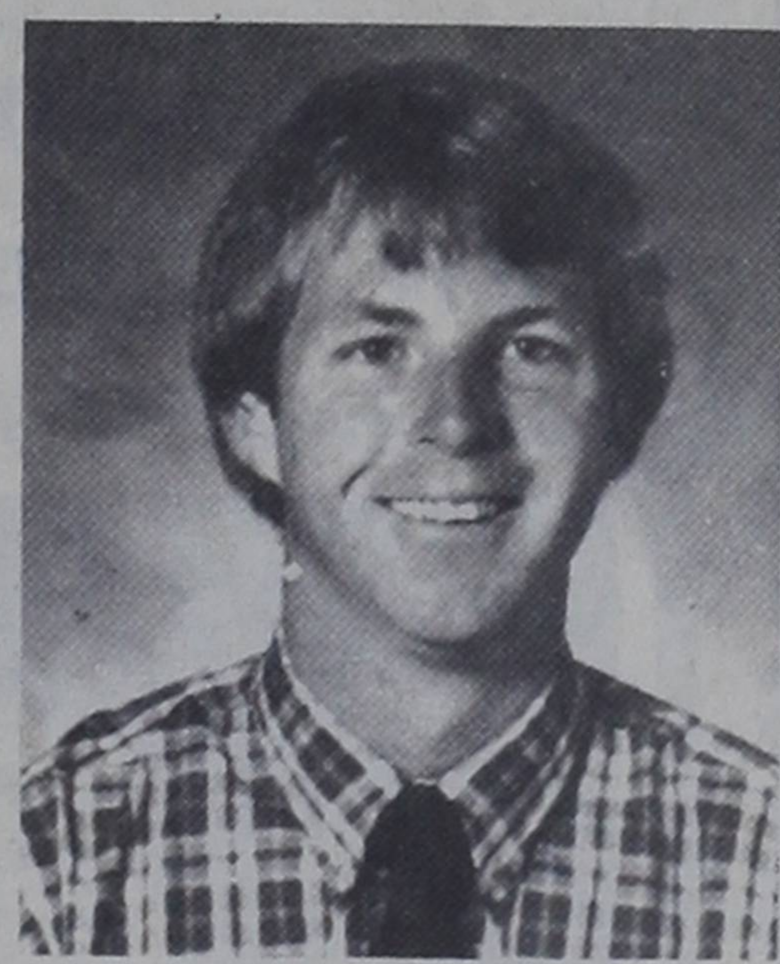
His seventh grade teams finished first in 1983 with a 17-7 mark; and third the previous year with an 11-12 record.

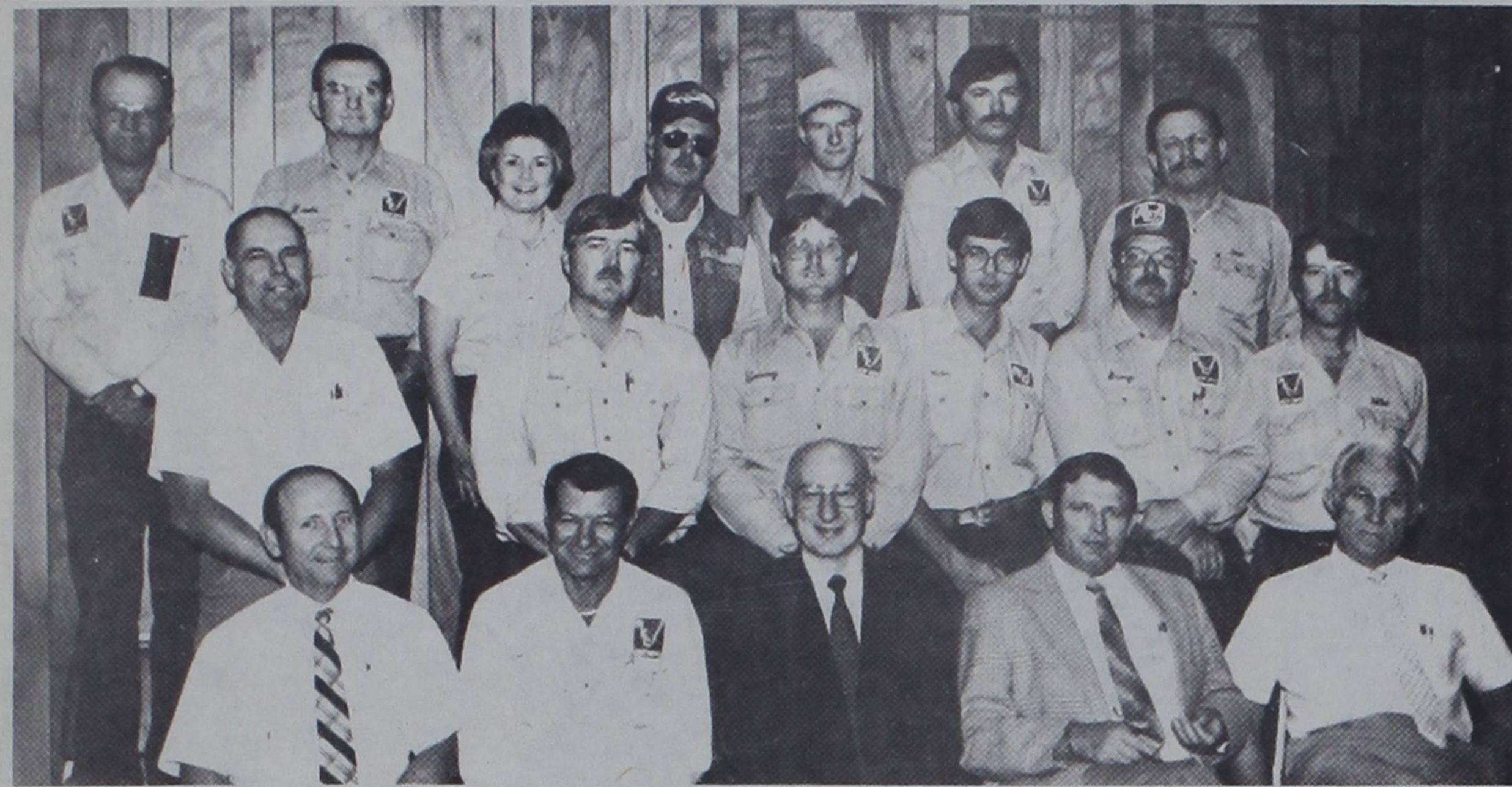
Miss Wyly was a passenger in the car in which her step-sister, Beth Norsworthy, was killed on Wednesday, May 1.

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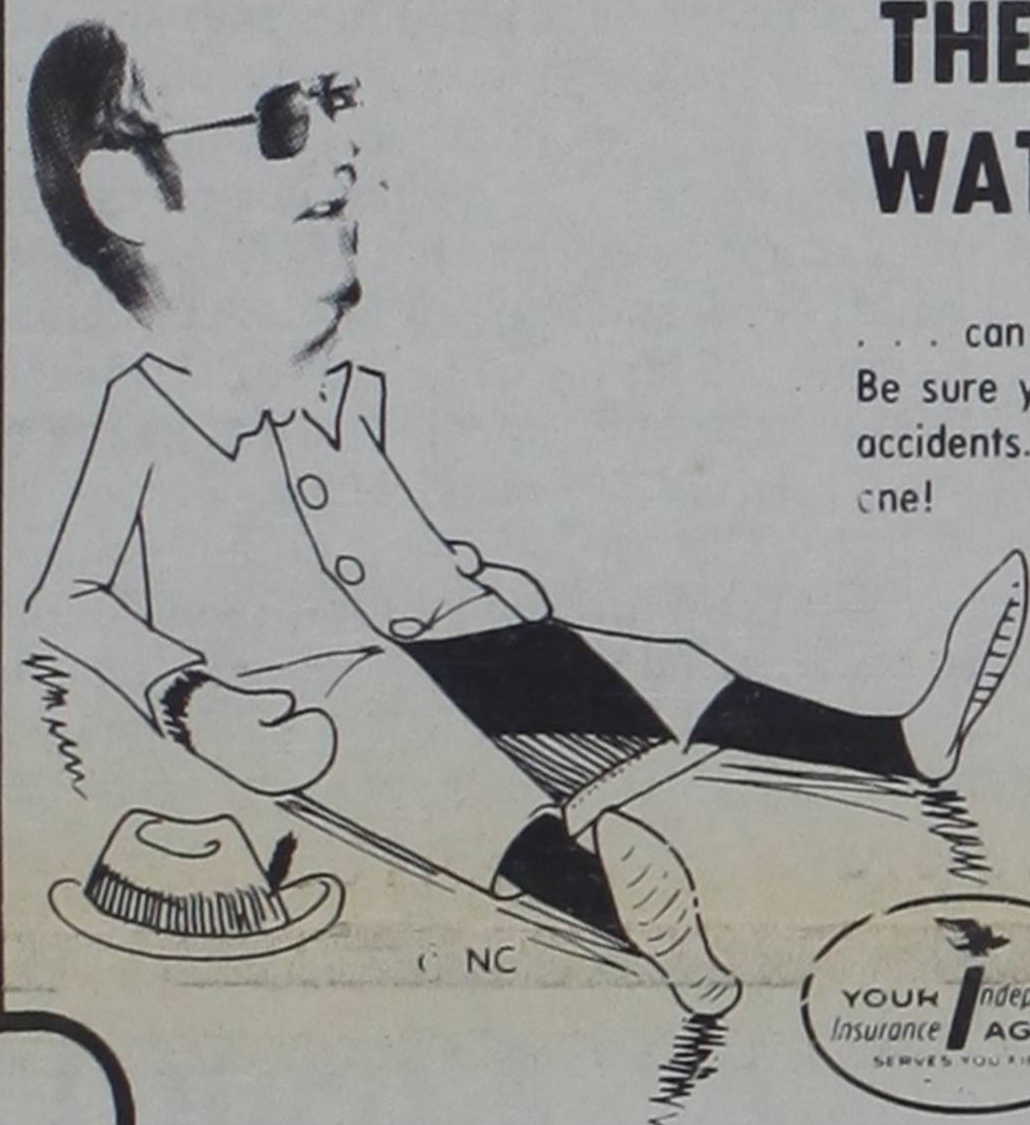

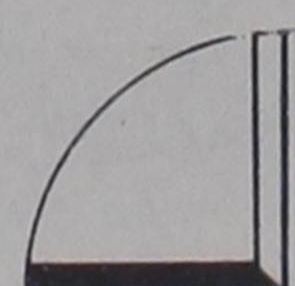

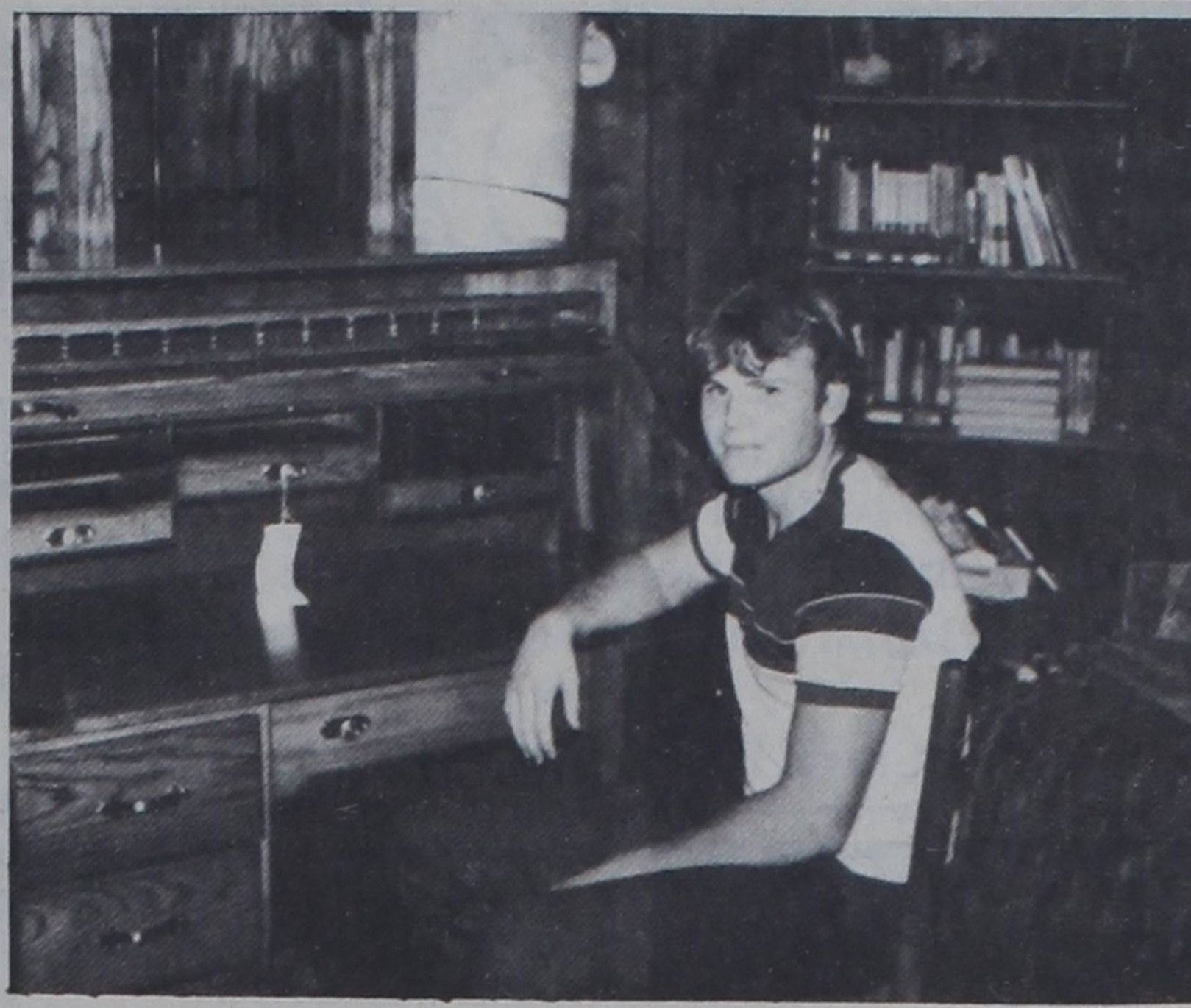
Her other school activities

FHS Tracksters Set New Marks

In spite of establishing two new school records, Friona High School athletes failed to qualify for state meet events, in the regional track and field competition last weekend at Odessa.

In the girls' division, Lacy Osborn lowered her own school record in the 800-meter run, with a 2:22.16 clocking. That was the good news. The bad news was that finishing ahead of Miss Osborn in her race was Carmen Stroud of Decatur, at 2:18.66 and Clara Luker of Vernon, at 2:20.49. Lacy was second most of the race, but was edged by the Vernon girl for second place.

The girls' mile relay team, composed of Mika Maddox, Susan Bailey, Ronda Ratcliff and Miss

Osborn, did not make the finals, although posting their best time of the season, 4:17.

In the boys' division, John Aguirre also ran his career best time in the 400-meter dash--48.88. However, this new school record failed to qualify Aguirre for state, as he was third to Brian Johnson of Comanche and Kevin Whiteside of Vernon.

Ben Neelley placed fifth in the 110-meter hurdles race, posting a time of 15.14. Neelley had run a 14.8 in the preliminaries. However, in the finals he was bumped by a runner in the adjacent lane, and almost knocked down. Coach Steve Williams said this cost him valuable time in the race.

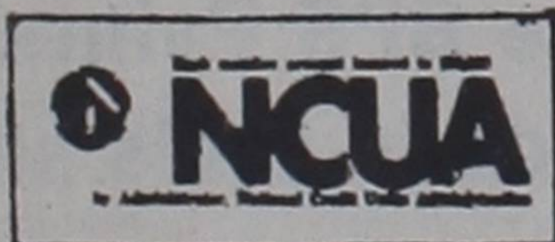

Baker Duggins is retiring after the current school year, and will conclude a 34-year career in the public school which included 13 as a highly-successful girls basketball coach, and 21 years as a high school counselor.

As a coach, he guided a team (the 1964 Squaws) to Friona's only team state championship.

But there have also been rewards in his counseling work.

"Picking up the dropouts that no one else was interested in, and getting them back in the system--that 'turns me on' just about as much as a championship season," Duggins says.

Duggins, who had received his BA degree from Panhandle State (Oklahoma) College, coached a year in Beaver, Oklahoma and three years at Stratford before coming to Friona.

He recalls that former Friona superintendent of schools Dillie Kelley hired him as a junior high principal and basketball coach. "He convinced me, though, that I should get into counseling. I never have regretted the decision."

In a move that surprised a lot of folks, he "hung up his spikes" as a basketball coach immediately following his top year in 1964, when his girls posted a perfect 33-0 season record, and took the position as the high school's full-time counselor.

"I derived satisfaction both from coaching and counseling but the tough work definitely was in the counseling," Duggins says.

Some of the other things Duggins holds dear is the fact that he taught over 1,000 local kids how to swim, in summer swimming lessons at the Friona pool.

He also was a charter member of the board of directors for the Central Plains Mental Health-Mental Retardation Center in Plainview, serving on the board for 15 years.

Duggins says he plans to take three to six months off, to decide on a new career, probably in some area of counseling, either in the private sector or possibly in juvenile probationary work.

He has recently been licensed by the Texas State Board of Examiners to do private counseling. He had worked with former County Judge Paul Fortenberry as the county's unofficial probation officer, a job he found tremendously rewarding.

Duggins also established the Friona Opportunity Plan, a system whereby "average" students, not qualified for a scholarship, could attend college.

"I came here to work with kids and to serve kids. As far as I know, I never played a game of politics, and I don't intend to start now," Duggins says.

Duggins undoubtedly has contributed more, as he says, by working with the potential dropouts, but he will always be remembered for his competitive spirit that infected the youngsters on his teams, culminating in the state basketball championship.

And when his girls--the Squaws, won the state title, they did it in fine fashion, winning every game they played in 1963-64 enroute to an unblemished 33-0 season record.

In nine years of coaching the Squaws, Duggins' teams compiled an overall record of 218 wins against only 41 losses--an eye-popping winning percentage of 84.1 per cent.

After a rebuilding year in his first year at Friona (1955-56), when the team had a 14-10 mark, the Squaws under Duggins' tutelage were off and running on a fantastic eight-year winning streak.

In 1956-57, 1957-58 and 1958-59, the Squaws won the district title each year. In 1957-58, the team won 26 and lost only twice. The following year, their mark was 27-3, but the team lost out in the regional playoffs each year.

Finally, in 1959-60, Duggins took his first team to the state meet.

With such players as Jacquelyn Magness, Tommy Lewellen, Charlotte Bock, Lawana Houlette, Mary Ann Boggess, Gloria Patterson, Pam Roden, Jimette McLean, Judy Bock, Sue Baxter, Janice Wright, Levada Hand, Gwen Green, Linda Castleberry and Betty Drake, the Squaws battled down to the state finals before dropping a 60-54 decision to Buna.

After two years of losing out to always tough Tulia in their district title race, despite the fact that Friona compiled a two-year mark of 50-9, the Squaws put together another title drive in 1962-63.

With Tulia shifted into another district, it came down to a regional clash between the two old rivals in

1963. The Squaws won an 82-80 sudden-death overtime battle, in one of the most exciting ball game local fans have ever seen.

But once again the team was denied the state crown when sophomore standout Teto Jennings came up with an ankle injury just prior to the state semi-final game. Friona finished third in the state tournament with a record of 26-8.

In 1963-64, the team put together a string of wins that was never snapped. They breezed through tournaments at West Texas State University, Tulia and Farwell, and then compiled a perfect 8-0 mark in district play.

The Squaws met Post in a bi-district game at Plainview for the second year in a row. In 1963, Friona had scored a narrow 55-53 win over the Antelopes, to advance to the regional tournament.

When Friona took a 73-40 win, fans began to think "This could be the year." And, the way things turned out, it was.

Friona captured the regional crown without too much trouble, beating Spearman, 65-53 and Granbury, 48-36.

At that time, girls' sports had not been expanded to include playoff divisions for the larger schools (now 4A and 5A). Friona competed in class AA, which also took in all of the large schools who competed in girls basketball.

At the state tournament, as things turned out, Friona met two schools of class AAA size (which would now be 4A). The Squaws were not overwhelmed. They beat Mineral Wells, 63-49 in the state semi-finals.

Then, with high scoring Teto Jennings fouled out before the fourth quarter started, it took a super defensive effort, and a great performance by Charlotte Nettles to preserve the win and Friona's only state title, 50-45 over Clear Creek of League City.

Other members of the championship team were Glenda McClellan, Merylene Massie, Wessie Hand, Shirley Phipps, Lois Moyer, Sheryl Long, Carolyn Herring, Linda Davis, Rose Ann Greeson, Janet Rushing, Sharon Dean and Carol Struve.

In Duggins' nine years as coach at Friona, his teams won the district title six times. (Under present rules, they would have been in the playoffs eight out of the nine years.) The Squaws won bi-district four times for Duggins, the regional title three times, and finally a state championship.

In playoff games only, from 1957-64, Duggins' Squaw teams had an overall record of 15 wins and five losses. This becomes even more impressive when you consider that the further you go in the playoffs, the competition increases accordingly.

The breakdown of the playoff record is 4-2 in bi-district games; 7-1 in regional tournament games; and 4-2 in state tournament games.

Six members of Squaw teams coached by Duggins were named to all-state teams. They were Jacquelyn Magness and Lawana Houlette in 1960; Janet Buckley and Kay Burleson in 1963; Glenda McClellan and Charlotte Nettles in 1964.

Memorial Day First Big Holiday

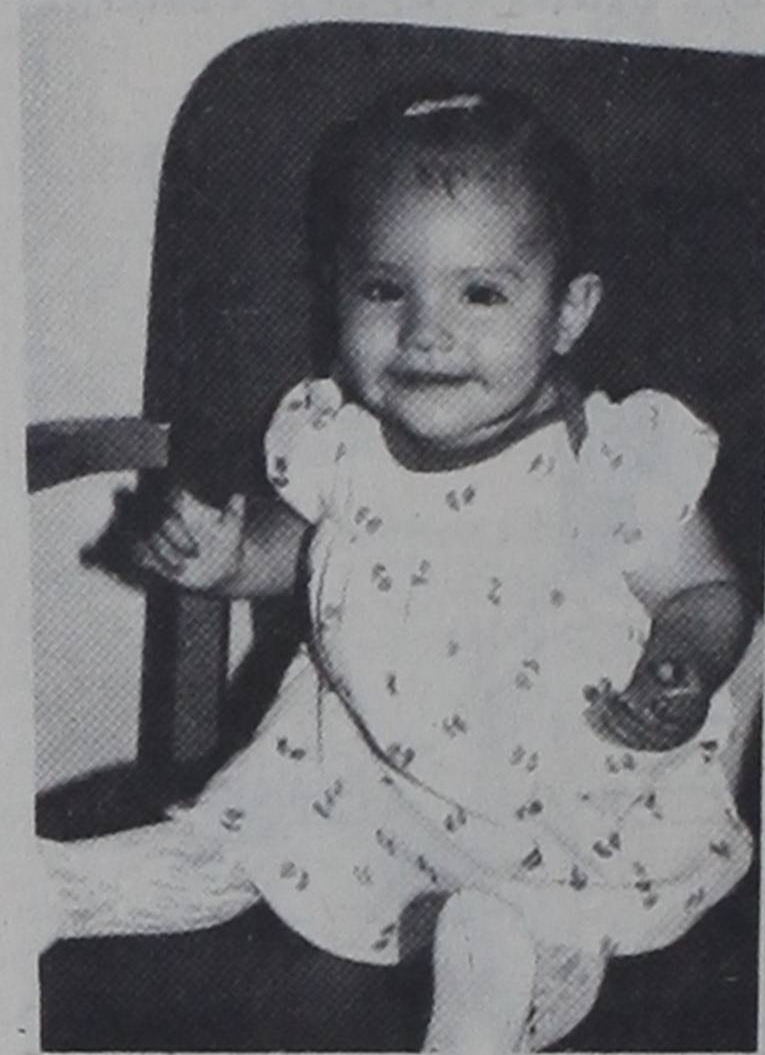
Memorial Day holiday is the first holiday of the year where traffic using the highways of Texas will increase considerably.

Electrical Safety

Month Is Observed

May is National Electrical Safety Awareness Month and Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) is reminding the public about the dangers of carelessness around electricity.

"With folks starting to work outside more in the warmer weather, it's especially important for them to remember to stay clear of power lines and electrical facilities," said Hermilo Martinez, SPS safety manager.

Nationwide, most electrical accidents involving the public occur because of carelessness, Martinez said.

"Because people are so used to overhead lines, sometimes they don't notice them or they forget how much power is in them," he said.

People working around the house--painting, trimming trees or doing other jobs--must remember to keep themselves and their tools and equipment away from power lines," Martinez said.

"The slightest touch could be enough to seriously injure or kill," he said.

Electricity always seeks the shortest path to the ground. It travels easily through "conductors." Metal, water, trees and the human body are excellent conductors of electricity, Martinez explained.

Handymen and professional painters should make sure ladders don't place them high enough that they could contact a power line. Aluminum ladders, which are good conductors, should themselves be kept away from lines, Martinez said.

Outdoor TV, radio and CB antennas pose another hazard. They're often unwieldy and tall enough to touch overhead lines. Installation of outdoor antennas should be left to professionals," Martinez advised.

In rural areas, irrigation pipe should be handled with care. "Lightweight irrigation pipe is an excellent conductor of electricity," Martinez said. "Many sections are tall enough when lifted to hit overhead lines. Farmers need to be extremely careful when moving pipe. Rabbit hunters who lift irrigation pipe to chase out rabbits need to be just as careful."

SPS linemen who work with power lines are well trained and have a variety of special clothing and equipment to protect themselves. "And still they always respect the power in those lines," he said.

Children, especially, need to be taught to respect the power of electricity. "They need to know the dangers of playing near a substation, climbing trees that have power lines through them, and flying kites near overhead lines," Martinez said.

Storms can cause potentially dangerous situations by knocking down power lines. "If you see a line from a utility pole hanging down or on the ground, stay away from it," Martinez said. "Assume it's a live wire. Call SPS or the police or fire department immediately."

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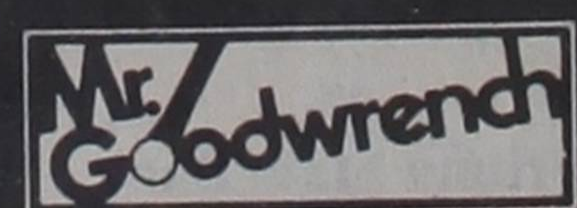

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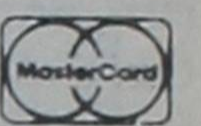
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Sharon Grundy, Donnie Adcox Exchange Vows In Oklahoma
