OF COURSE HAYNES KNOWS

Editor Jack Stricklin of the Brownfield Herald, stated in last week's issue of his periodical that in future he would not accept ads from out of the county merchants, owing to the fact that the merchants of his little town were supporting the Herald through thick and thin. The News will continue to accept ads from anywhere in the United States where we are practically assured of receiving the coin for same. Not knocking our little town in the least, we don't hesitate to say that if we depended altogether on the advertising patronage given us right here in Tahoka, the News would have long since been dead to the world. By accepting foreign advertising we manage to keep on the right side of the ledger, and that is the game now-a-days. We preach the trade at home slogan, however, and people are not forced to patronize those who advertise in this paper residing outside the county. The Herald has the wrong idea, and Stricklin will sooner or later see his mistake, for the fellow who has been sending out of town for his job work will continue to do so if he thinks he can save a dime, and your business will stand about the same, no more or no less. The Herald has a good sprinkling of advertising, but there is always room for more, and never yet have we seen a county newspaperman become so rich that he will turn down good reliable cash in hand advertising, no matter from whence it came—Tahoka News.

Editor Haynes of the Tahoka News is a fine, pleasant fellow, and a good editor, but he has a habit of misquoting that is almost disgusting. The fact of the matter is, and the article he tried to quote will prove it, that we made two exceptions in that article. 1st. Out-of-county advertising that conflicted with any like business in Brownfield, or other Terry County firms that are advertising in these columns, and of course applies to no manufacturers that are advertising any trade marked goods, cigars, etc., tobaccos, etc., either with or without a local firm's name attached. 2nd. As long as we got the present support from local merchants, Bro. Haynes says he is going to take any of it, neighboring towns, Monkey-Bowback, or what not. Well, that is the News' business, not ours. But we

believe if we were Haynes, we would do the same thing, for the same week he offered his criticism, the News carried 203 inches of home display advertising, against 439 inches carried by the Herald. Haynes was also dead wrong about us accepting the first ad that comes along, for we turned an eighty inch ad down the week we printed the article referred to. Yes, we set a sprinkling of advertising and are proud of it, but a sprinkling is better than a mist, a mere trace. We'll have to admit there is one or two firms in Brownfield that use mail order stationery, but the local ones keep the job presses going six days in the week, and we don't miss the other kind. Haynes is wrong on another point, when he says one position will not make a dollar's difference either way. The next week after the announcement we got two nice ads to run regularly, isn't that better than those semi-periodical ads that come in from out-of-town firms that takes hours of hard work to get in shape, always come a day late and they ache like six hundred if you can't read their scratching, and happen to get "peasants" at so much per yard instead of "percales"? It is nice to stay on the right side of the ledger, Haynes, but we'll try to get by.

COURT HOUSE IMPROVEMENTS

The County Dads have been making some very much needed improvements in and around the Terry County Capitol building, here of late.

WHERE IS THE OFFICIAL CONFEDERATE SEAL?

Washington, April 14.—The whereabouts of the official seal of the Confederacy, an unsolved mystery for more than half a century, probably will forever remain unknown. James Jones, aged negro employe in the Senate office building, said to be the only person with knowledge of where the seal was buried, died today without disclosing the secret. Jones was a servant of Jefferson Davis, president of the Confederacy, when Davis was captured. As the story goes, Jones hurried the seal before the Federal authorities could obtain possession of the Confederate leader's effects, and never revealed the spot.

SANTA FE CHANGES TIME ON MAY 1ST.

Amarillo, Texas, April 18th.—The Santa Fe railroad announces that a new time card will be effective May 1st for the entire system. The new time card will be ready for publication in a few days.
An important change is the return to central standard time on the Slaton and Plains divisions. During Federal control of the railroads the dividing point between central and mountain time zones was changed from Clovis, N. M. to Waynoka, Okla. This change was unsatisfactory to the people of northwest Texas, and Congressman Marvin Jones secured the passage of a law to return northwest Texas to the central time zone. The enforcement of the law was placed with the Interstate Commerce Commission. But no order to change the time was issued by the Commission until recently. When the Santa Fe published a new time card for the Plains division March 27th, no order to change the time had been received. When the order was issued by the Commission, no date was fixed for the change of time. As the Santa Fe

had under consideration a new time card for the system to go into effect May 1st, when the order was received, it was decided not to issue a time card on the Plains and Slaton divisions for the couple of weeks intervening.
On May 1st, Clovis, N. M., again becomes the dividing point between central and mountain time zones. All trains on the Plains division from Wynoka to Clovis and on the Slaton division from Sweetwater to Clovis and Canyon will be operated on Central time after May 1st 1921.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Senate Joint Resolution No. 11.

Proposing an amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may grant pensions to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows, who have been citizens of Texas since prior to January 1st, 1910, providing that all soldiers, sailors and their widows eligible under the provisions hereof shall be placed on the rolls and participate in the pension fund created hereunder; levying a tax of seven (\$07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property in this State for the payment of such pension, providing that the Legislature may reduce the rate of pension for such purpose, fixing a time for the election to be held on such amendment, and making an appropriation to pay the expenses thereof.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as hereinafter to read as follows: "Section 51. The Legislature shall have no power to make any grant of public money to any individual, association of individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever, provided, however, the Legislature may grant aid to indigent or disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors, and to their widows, in indigent circumstances and who have been bona fide residents of this State since January 1, 1910, and who were married to such soldiers or sailors prior to January 1, 1910, and to indigent and disabled soldiers, sailors and their widows, who under special laws of the State of Texas during the war between the states served in organization for the protection of the frontier against Indian raiders, or Mexican raiders, and to indigent and disabled soldiers of the militia of the State of Texas who were in active service during the war between the states, and to the widows of such soldiers who are in indigent circumstances and who were married to such soldiers prior to January 1, 1910, provided that the widows of such soldiers shall be placed on the rolls and participate in the pension fund of the State under the existing laws or laws hereafter passed by the Legislature, and also to grant aid for the establishment and maintenance of a home for soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law, provided the Legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home. There is hereby levied in addition to the taxes heretofore provided by the Constitution of Texas a State ad valorem tax on property of seven (\$07) cents on the \$100.00 valuation of property for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for service in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations and militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate herein levied, and provided further that the provisions of this Section shall not be construed so as to prevent the grant of aid in cases of public calamity."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at an election to be held on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which all voters shall have printed or written on their ballots: "For amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows who have been a resident of this State since January 1, 1910," and "Against amendment to Section 51 of Article 3 of the Constitution, authorizing the Legislature to grant aid to Confederate soldiers, sailors and their widows."

Section 3. The Governor is hereby directed to issue the proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State, and the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general funds of this State not otherwise appropriated for expenses of publication and elections thereunder.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Senate Joint Resolution No. 4.

A Joint Resolution of the Legislature of the State of Texas amending sections of the Constitution of the State of Texas, as follows: Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4, relating to the compensation of executive officers; and Section 24, Article 3, relating to mileage and per diem of the members of the Legislature of said State.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. Sections 5 and 21 and 22 and 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended so as hereinafter to read as follows:

Section 5. He shall at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary not to exceed Eight Thousand (\$8,000) Dollars, and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture.

Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same, and all papers, notes and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture.

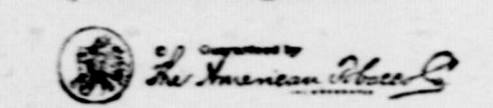
Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold his office for two years and his successor shall be elected on the first day of April, 1921, and shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to protect any private corporation from exercising any power, or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, toll, freight, or wharfage, not authorized by law.

He shall whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of all such charters, unless otherwise expressly provided by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor or other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary not to exceed Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Secretary of State shall not receive for his own salary, costs, or prerequisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section, or in his office, shall be paid, when received into the State Treasury.

Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, shall hold their offices for the term of two years, and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary not to exceed Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, and no more, and shall, within ten days after said election has been held, make due returns thereof to the Commissioners' Court of said County as is required by law for holding a general election.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"For School Tax"

"Against School Tax"

All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and County and who are resident property taxpayers in said districts, shall be entitled to vote at said election.

The Sheriff of this county shall give notice of said election by posting three notices at three public places in said district for three weeks before said election and by publication in some newspaper published in said county that has been published for more than one year last past.

E. corner of this tract of land; thence north to the place of beginning, and containing about 1 acre of land.

That on the day and year last aforesaid, defendant unlawfully entered upon said premises and ejected the plaintiff therefrom, and unlawfully withheld from him the possession thereof, to his damage, Two Hundred Dollars.

That the reasonable annual rental value of said land and premises is the sum of Twenty Dollars.

Wherefore plaintiff prays judgment of the Court, that defendant be cited to appear and answer this petition, and that the plaintiff have judgment for the title and possession, and that writ of restitution issue, and for his rents, damages and cost of suit, and for such other further relief in law and in equity, special and general that he may, be justly entitled to, etc.

Herein fail not, but have before said Court, at its aforesaid next regular term, this writ with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

County Judge's Order of Election

The State of Texas, County of Terry:—Whereas, on the 2nd day of April, 1921, a petition was presented to me for an election in Common School District No. 16 of this County on the question of authorizing a tax of and at the rate of (a) One Dollar on the \$100.00 valuation of taxable property in said district for the purpose of supplementing the State School Fund appropriated to said district, said petition bearing the requisite number of signatures of property taxpayers voters of said district, and being in every respect in conformity with law.

Now, therefore, I, D. J. CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

Senate Joint Resolution No. 1.

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and permitting either the husband or the wife to pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting.

Be it resolved by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended as hereinafter to read as follows:

Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in the State one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which the person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided, that electors living in any unorganized county in the State in which such county is attached for judicial purposes; and providing further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she, as the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oath that such tax receipt has been lost. Such affidavit shall be made in writing and left with the judge of the election. The husband may pay the poll tax of his wife and receive the receipt therefor. In like manner the wife may pay the poll tax of her husband and receive the receipt therefor. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in July, 1921, at which all the voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For amendment to Section 2 of Article 6 of the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that only native born or naturalized citizens of the United States shall be qualified electors in this State, and providing that either the husband or the wife may pay the poll tax of the other and receive the receipt therefor, and permitting the Legislature to authorize absentee voting."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution, and existing laws of the State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000) Dollars, or so much hereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas to pay the expenses of such publication and election.
