

50¢ **TEN PAGES** Cleanup Work Continues By Santa Fe R.R.

Santa Fe Railway trains were back on schedule early Wednesday morning, July 17, approximately two and onehalf days after 15 cars, loaded with 30-35 semi-tractor trailers, derailed just east of Bovina around 2 p.m. Sunday, July 14. Until the tracks could be cleared of debris, all trains were being re-routed through Lubbock. Clean-up of the area was halted last week when a train at Higgins derailed and the crews were pulled from the Bovina site and taken to Oklahoma to restore train service there. Clean-up resumed sometime Monday when part of the crew returned and the rest of the crew returned on Tuesday. Clean-up of the area is being conducted by Messer Enterprises of Hereford, who have hired a number of people to help go through the wreckage and salvage anything possible. Messer has also purchased all damaged equipment and contents of the trailers, to be sold to individuals at a later date.



For Special Election

Absentee voting is underway at the Superintendent's office, 909 E. 11th Street in Friona, for the special election allowing taxpayers to vote on tax exempions for the County Education Parmer District.

In addition to the constitutional amendment election, voters in the county will vote on three tax exempsions which have been drawn up by the newly-formed County Education District.

The County Education District was created from recently passed legislation concerning the school Date financing in Texas. Under the new laws, Friona, Bovina, Farwell and Lazbuddie school districts will be lumped together into one taxing unit that will have to adopt a common school tax rate. Everyone used to be a resident

What that can mean for feedlots is a savings in production costs when they feed the cheaper grain and that's usually grain sorghum.

"Any price differential between grain sorghum and corn would be reflected in lower cost of grain for the lower priced grain," said Richardson.

The project, funded by the Texas Grain Sorghum Board, compared steam-flaked sorghum and steam-flaked corn in diets with and without added fat.

One hundred and twelve crossbred steers were divided randomly into four treatment groups. Each group was fed a diet consisting of 88 per cent concentrate and 13 per cent crude protein. Diets consisted of grain sorghum without fat, sorghum with fat, corn without fat and corn with fat. Compositions of the rations are given in Table 1.





been working with Coach Jim Reid, the only basketball coach to win four state championships at three different schools, on a book about basketball (that's right, basketball). In doing research I stumbled across some notes written by former head football coach at Duke University, Red Wilson, regarding his career. His writing makes wonderful Teenager's inspirational reading.

Coach Wilson wrote that early in his career he learned that all the greatest football teams won because of one thing--attitude. Coach Wilson took what he had learned from reading and applied it to his football coaching position.

During the beginning of the first Columbia Chuseason as a high school coach he asked each player to write on a card what he wanted to achieve in football. Next, they listed the ingredients necessary to gain a winning outcome. To win each game meant they had to be better Home. than each team they faced. They had to be in better physical

condition, better coached, and they had to learn every assignment perfectly. Finally, and most important, they had to believe they were better than any other team and believe they were going to win.

It took three seasons to win a state championship. Many players quit the squad--not because of the hard physical work but because they would not allow themselves to accept the positive mental attitude each individual had to assume to succeed in his undertaking. Work, think, believe became the strongest words in the team's vocabulary. They accomplished winning a state championship because they decided three years before to become "something."

AUSTIN-Some low-income Texans may be eligible for help in paying cooling bills this summer through the Home Energy Assistance Program, according to the Texas Department of Human Services. The one-time payment is available to many low-income households. Applications for energy assistance were mailed to households that received food stamps, Aid to Families with Dependent Children, or Supplemental Security Income in May. Other low-income individuals may request an application by calling the toll-free number 1-800-252-8060 during the enrollment period of July 1 through July 31.

Eligibility is limited by gross income and resources. Aid is available for a oneperson household having less than \$628.49 gross income per month. The gross income limits are \$842.49 for households of two persons, \$1,056.49 for

three, \$1,270.49 for four, \$1,484.49 for five, and \$1,698.49 for six.

Households are eligible if the cost for cooling is included in the rent payment or if the household pays a portion of its home energy costs.

Energy assistance checks are sent directly to the people who are eligible for assistance. However, the checks are made payable to the energy provider.

People receiving one of these energy assistance checks should mail it or take it in person to the energy provider business office with their regular energy bill. The check can be cashed only by the energy provider. If the HEAP check is more than the energy bill, the additional amount will be credited to the person's account for the next month's bill. If the energy bill is higher than the check, the person is responsible for paying the difference.
