attempts, for 249 yards through the air. All three of Burney's figures are school records: attempts, completions and total
passing yards, at least in the stat passing yards, at least in the stat
record book tabulated the past 30 years by team scribe Bill Ellis. Most previous passing yards
were gained by Friona in a game at Springlake-Earth in 1973, 224.

past 30 years that an FHS football team topped 200 yards in passing. Junior flanker Brian Herring was the beneficiary of nine of Burney's passes, and
