THE GENERAL ELECTION

Every box in the county gave 2 clear and usual Democratic majority, and all gave Mrs. Ferguson a majority except the Union, which gave Dr. ! Butte a vote of 35 to Ferguson's 24.

After and following the vote on the Presidential Electors, the first named of State and District officers will be the Democrat, and the second the Republican. There was between 1,069 and 1,070 votes cast lacking about 600 of being the number cast in the primary election.






