We picked up the flu or a bad cold or something in this unusual environment, and are almost too sick to get The Star out this week.

The cooperation of the paper's staff, and especially that of June, our society editor, is appreciated.

Had you ever realized that by driving just 300 miles south and east, you would find yourself in an area where the people refer to cotton as a curse word, just as we do wool here on the Plains?

In several store windows in San Angelo, we saw signs saying, "Wear Wool—It's Seven Ways Better." There were other slogans, too.

The other day we overheard a conversation among several worried parents indicating their concern for the "new, wild music" so many teen-agers are all agog over.

This rock-and-roll stuff may be wild, all right, but it's anything but new. Some people are just now discovering it, and its being made popular just as boogie-woogie was the rage (and the scandal) of the 40's.

Anyone with a reasonably complete record collection of say, about 10 years back, can pick out a few of the more "hip" numbers that will sound just like today's rock-and-roll waxings.

In those days, this kind of music was regarded as jazz, and only the title—not the sound—has been changed. It doesn't make us any difference what kind of music you prefer. But just remember that rock-and-roll is anything but "new."

Never missing a chance to capitalize on our journalistic blunders, the editor's wife, while perusing a copy of last week's Star, made the comment that she thought the salary to be paid Friona's new night watchman is too low.

We bit, of course, and asked her what gave her that idea. "Look at the hours he has to work," she said. "The story here says from 9 p. m. until 6 p. m."

J. W. "Uncle Bill" Callaway from up in Missouri has kindly written us another interesting letter on Friona's history. We want to print his remarks this week in the hope that we can continue to stir up interest in the coming 50th Anniversary Celebration.

Incidentally, Uncle Bill says he's just returned home from a 23-day stay in the hospital after major surgery. We hope that he's well enough recovered to be able to come down and participate in the big festivities next month. Here's his letter:

Early in 1906 George C. Wright and Company became interested in Texas Panhandle land. "Big Ed" Connell, former Texas ranger and XIT cowboy, took him out to inspect the Escarabado Division of the more than three million acre XIT ranch.

Wright bought it to resell to land-hungry prospectors from Missouri, Illinois, Indiana, Kansas, Iowa, and Oklahoma.

Wright hired J. S. McClearey of Montgomery City, Missouri, to survey, measure, and mark every square mile of the more than 176,000 acres in the Escarabado Division.

But Wright soon learned he couldn't unload his land-hungry crowd in a town of sales-hungry real estate agents like Hereford without losing many of them. As soon as possible, we ran lines up from the railroad at Friona on the south end of the track, and also east from the New Mexico line so a town could be started to care for his prospects.

By June, he had a hotel, office, and some smaller buildings ready and named his new town Kelso. It was 22 miles north and two miles west of Friona.

Friona was not then in existence. Just the Friona section foreman's

Welch-Shackelford to Start Shopping Center

Those stories you've been hearing from time to time about Friona going to have a shopping center are taking shape this week. In fact, the center itself is taking shape next to the intersection of Highway 60 and the farm-to-market road going north.

Dr. Loyd Shackelford, Friona dentist, and Nelson Welch, Friona farmer-businessman, have entered into a partnership called Friona Enterprises, Inc., which will spawn the community's first effort at an independent retail shopping district.

Under construction now—ground having been broken Monday—are a new and modern service station which has been leased by Humble Oil and Refining Company, and a restaurant building which has been leased by Mary Pilgrim and Hayden Cason, who now operate Mary's Cafe.

These two structures will be erected simultaneously by Raymond Fleming, Friona contractor, and he says that completion is expected within 90 days.

The next phases of the development will include a row of business buildings to set back behind a parking area alongside the highway. What types of business would be in these spaces has not been fully determined, say the promoters, but they feel confident that one new supermarket for Friona can be counted on.

"When we will go ahead with the other phases of our development depends in a large measure on what the needs of the community will be," says Dr. Shackelford. He added, however, that he and Welch have in mind completing all of the project sometime in 1957.

Financial concessions for the entire project have been obtained, and the partners say that the only foreseeable determinant of when the building phase will be completed are the needs of the community itself.

Over a year ago, an Amarillo contracting firm initiated a housing development in the northwest-

tern part of Friona, which, after several months of development, was sold to Carl McCaslin of Hereford.

This Lakeside addition, as it is known, lies to the north of the shopping center now under construction, and Welch and Dr. Shackelford are anticipating a population increase in that part of Friona.

The area for the center has been integrated with plans for the project which originated many months ago. The design and position of paved streets take into consideration the location of the buildings now going up or planned.

The center has been designed with a large amount of parking and "elbow room." Almost two city blocks are included in the property, the dimensions being 419 feet east and west, and 448 feet north and south.

Signing for the station will mark Humble's first entry into Parmer County. They only last year opening development in the northwest-

Indians Meet Bulls In Playoff Contest Sunday at Friona

After a hectic regular season which has seen Friona's Indians and Bovina's Bulls teetering from week to week over the league lead, the two teams wound up in a tie and will face one another in a "sudden death" playoff Sunday in Friona at 2:30, announces John Renner, Indian manager.

Sunday's game will not be for the purpose of determining the regular season champion, however. It will be the first contest in a hastily-summoned playoff series among the four top teams of the Central Plains League.

The winner of the Sunday game will be matched against the winner of the Nazareth-Umbarge game which also will be played that afternoon. The victor of the second round contest will be the pennant winner, says Renner.

Friona's hopes for what appeared to be a good chance to keep the regular season lead skidded last Sunday afternoon at Nazareth, where they were jumped on 14-16, giving them three losses this season.

Their only other two losses up until then had been to rival Bovina. The Castro County nine has shown surprising strength in recent weeks, tipping over Bovina twice, and finally Friona, to end the season in a flourish.

With three losses each, the Indians and Bulls wind up in a deadlock for first place in regular season play. The "first" would have been in title only, however, as the playoff among the four best in the circuit is accepted as demonstration of the pennant winner.

As vacations and the busy farm

season has bitten deeply at times into the team lineups, a check with the Indians and Bulls this week indicated that neither hopes to be able to take the field in the pink.

Pitcher Stan Barrett of Friona will be missing, as will Catcher Billy Richards of the Bulls. Also, Darrel Reed, scheduled to hurl for the Bulls Sunday, is reported nursing a bad blister on his pitching hand that may hold down his top form.

THE STAR'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Overlooked Resource

Frionans have learned to appreciate and how to brag on the resources of their community. Most any interested citizen of the community can cite statistics off the cuff on water, land, transportation, climate, the people, and other factors which go to make Friona a good town to live in.

However, there is one "natural" resource in Friona that is not being viewed in its proper perspective. In fact, it isn't even considered a resource in the usual sense. But we believe that we can show you where this factor truly has a bearing on Friona's future.

We are speaking of the babies born here. In a report filed last week, Justice of the Peace Walter Loveless noted that in July, 19 tiny lives had their beginning in our community.

What will become of those 19? No doubt, the figure includes several who were born to parents not residing in town, but likely the majority of children being born in Parmer County Community Hospital are from Friona proper.

As these lives mature, the community will have innumerable opportunities—in fact, a constant opportunity—to impress on young and pliable minds the good things and bad about living in Friona.

When the time comes that these boys and girls are ready to leave Friona to attend college elsewhere in preparation for life, will they be thinking of coming back to where they got their start? Or will they have no encouragement to do so?

If, by opening more opportunities, Friona could manage to attract young and eager men and women to return to this

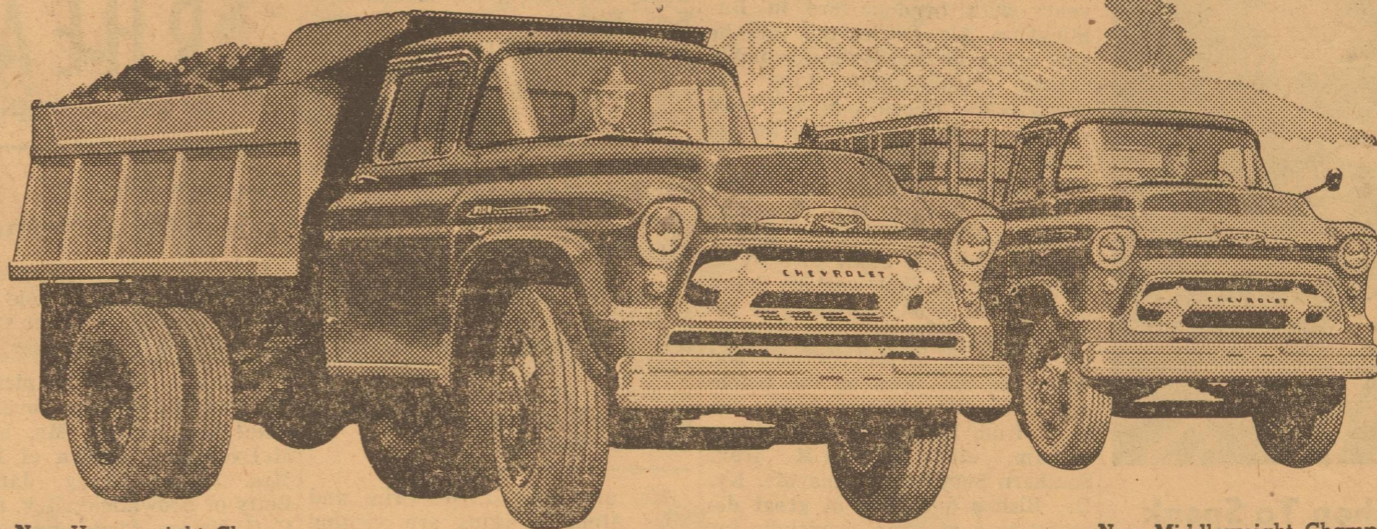

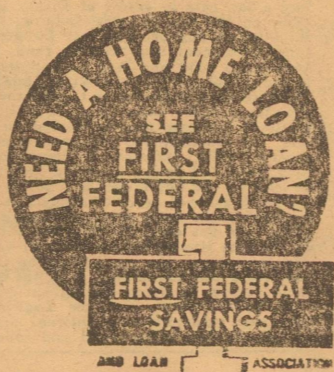

Proposed constitutional Amendments

To be voted on at an election to be held on

NOVEMBER 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 proposing an amendment to Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas for the purpose of providing that the qualified voters of the state may levy and collect a tax, not to exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and provide for the permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and other purposes, and to provide for the necessary provisions and form of ballot; and providing for the necessary provisions and form of ballot.

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and other purposes, and shall not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and other purposes, and shall not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year, and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this section shall not be amended until the next session of the Legislature following the session of 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT AUTHORIZING THE COMMISSIONERS COURT IN EACH COUNTY TO LEVY WHATEVER SUMS MAY BE NECESSARY FOR GENERAL FUND, PERMANENT IMPROVEMENT FUND, ROAD AND BRIDGE FUND AND OTHER PURPOSES, NOT TO EXCEED EIGHTY CENTS (80c) ON THE ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100) VALUATION IN ANY ONE (1) YEAR, AND SO LONG AS THE COURT DOES NOT IMPAIR ANY OUTSTANDING BONDS OR OTHER OBLIGATIONS."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize the creation of a fund to be known as the Teacher Retirement System of Texas; providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 43 of Article III of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto, providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, and publication.

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows: "Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall be lawful for the Legislature to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the State; provided that the amount contributed to the fund by each school district or other municipal corporation or district of this State, or in such other counties as are now or hereafter may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement plan shall not be eligible for any other State pension or retirement fund or direct aid from the State of Texas, and shall have the same pension or retirement fund, contributed by the State, is released to the State of Texas."

Section 2. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board; so that the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board shall be increased to Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows: "Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veterans' Land Board, which shall be composed of the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and two citizens of the State who shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate. The Governor shall biennially appoint one such member to serve for a term of four years, with the initial appointments to the Board under this section to be for terms of two and four years, respectively, and all subsequent appointments to be according to provisions of this section. The Commissioner of the General Land Office shall act as Chairman of the Board and shall be the administrator of the Veterans' Land Program under such terms and restrictions as may be now or hereafter provided by law. The compensation for said appointive members shall be as fixed by the Legislature, and each shall make bond in the amount of \$100,000.00, said bond to be known as the Veterans' Land Board may issue not to exceed Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veterans' Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas, in such form, denominations, and upon the terms as are now provided by law or as may hereafter be provided by law; provided, however, that said bonds shall bear a rate of interest not to exceed three percent (3%) per annum, and that the same shall be sold for not less than par value and accrued interest.

"In the sale of any such bonds, a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various Teacher Retirement Funds, the Permanent School Funds, and the Permanent University Fund; such bonds to be issued as provided in the opinion of the Veterans' Land Board.

"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State: (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation. Provided, however, the portion of the Veterans' Land Fund not immediately committed for the purchase of lands may be invested in short term United States bonds or obligations until such lands are needed for the purchase of lands. The interest accruing thereon shall become a part of the Veterans' Land Fund.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury by the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another section to be designated as Section 15-a, to read as follows: "Section 15-a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact any law necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind, and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and by the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon: "FOR THE AMENDMENT REQUIRING MEDICAL TESTIMONY FOR COMMITMENT OF PERSONS OF UNSOUND MIND, AND AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR TRIAL AND COMMITMENT OF SUCH PERSONS AND FOR WAIVER OF THE RIGHT OF TRIAL BY JURY BY A PERSON ALIQUOT, OR HIS NEXT OF KIN, AND HIS ATTORNEY AD LITEM."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section to be known as Section 51-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 51-c, which shall read as follows: "Section 51-c. The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has heretofore served a fine or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison, under the laws of this State for an offense for which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations and limitations as the Legislature may deem expedient."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all of the ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT GRANTING POWER TO THE LEGISLATURE TO GRANT AID AND COMPENSATION TO PERSONS WHO HAVE PAID FINES OR HAVE SERVED PRISON SENTENCES UNDER THE LAWS OF THIS STATE OF WHICH THEY WERE NOT GUILTY."

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Land Board. All monies received from the sale of land and for interest on deferred payments on land purchased with the proceeds of such additional bonds, shall be credited to the Veterans' Land Fund for use in purchasing additional lands to be sold to Texas veterans, as herein provided, in like manner as provided for the sale of lands purchased with the proceeds from the sales of the bonds provided for herein, for a period ending on January 1, 1965; provided, however, that such monies as may be necessary to pay interest on the additional bonds here provided for shall be set aside for that purpose after December 1, 1955, all monies received by the Veterans' Land Board from the sale of the lands and interest on payments, or so much thereof as may be necessary, shall be set aside for that purpose, and any such monies not so needed shall not later than the maturity date of the last maturing bond be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 49-B OF ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS TO CHANGE THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE VETERANS' LAND BOARD; INCREASING THE VETERANS' LAND FUND BY \$100,000,000; SAID FUND TO BE USED FOR THE PURPOSE OF PURCHASING LAND TO BE SOLD TO TEXAS VETERANS OF SERVICE IN THE ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA SUBSEQUENT TO 1945, SUCH FUNDS SHALL BE EXPENDED IN ACCORDANCE WITH INSTRUCTIONS AND REQUIREMENTS THAT MAY BE PROVIDED BY LAW; AND"

"AGAINST THE AMENDMENT TO SECTION 49-B OF ARTICLE III OF THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS TO CHANGE THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE VETERANS' LAND BOARD; INCREASING THE VETERANS' LAND FUND BY \$100,000,000; SAID FUND TO BE USED FOR THE PURPOSE OF PURCHASING LAND IN TEXAS TO BE SOLD TO TEXAS VETERANS OF SERVICE IN THE ARMED FORCES OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA SUBSEQUENT TO 1945. SUCH FUNDS SHALL BE EXPENDED IN ACCORDANCE WITH INSTRUCTIONS AND REQUIREMENTS THAT MAY BE PROVIDED BY LAW."

Section 3. Should the Legislature pass legislation with regard to this amendment prior to its adoption, it shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature. Section 4. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

home, and three or four boxcars where Mexican section hands lived. No other buildings were in sight in any direction.

The land on the northern part around Kelso and west and north from there sold so rapidly that Wright soon saw he needed a town at the south end at Frio. About July 15 we laid out the fractional section (lying north of the railroad and across the railway from the section foreman's home) into building lots, streets, and alleys.

It was called Frio and soon had a large garage to house and repair Wright's cars which were hard-driven when the land excursions were on twice each month.

He quickly had a hotel and livery stable, where a number of horse-drawn rigs were kept, to help take prospects out to look at the land. While the hotel was being built, there were 72 cots put in the second story of the garage, and two or three sleeping cars and a driver would be set out on the sidetrack to accommodate Wright's land buyers.

I was still in the employ of surveyors, and in October, 1906, we finished plotting Frio as we had first staked out a few streets, so buildings wouldn't be in the middle of the streets.

T. B. Wood was a carpenter-contractor, and when I wasn't busy surveying, he wanted me to work for him. I worked for him until

three days before Christmas when one of the men came to me and asked how much whisky I wanted to order, as he was sending an order for the rest of the men and he wanted to get mine, also.

When I asked him how much he had orders for, he said 21 men had ordered 23 gallons, so I told him I was going home for Christmas, and was on the way within 30 minutes.

I was at home here about 30 days when I met my surveyor's boss down town. He asked me when I could get ready to go back to Texas. I told him two hours, and I left for Texas that night for more surveying and carpentering at and near Frio!

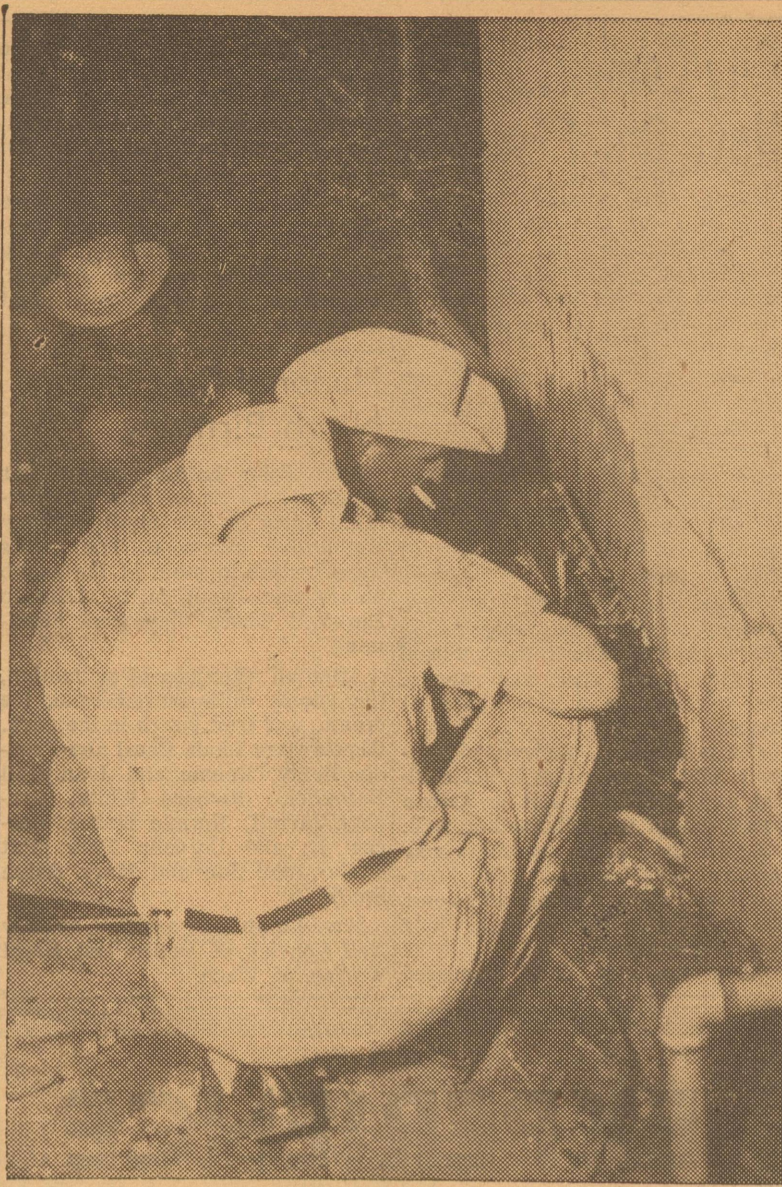
There were about 25 of us at Frio all the time then, and we felt the need for a post office nearer than Hereford. We petitioned for a post office named Frio but were denied, as there was one office in the state by that name, already.

R. D. Sedgwick, one of Wright's drivers and the best tenor singer I have ever heard, and popular with everyone, said, "Boss, this town is going to be a beauty some day, and should have a pretty name. Why not call her Friona. That sounds like a girl's name, and like a gal I could love."

So she was named Friona and we got our post office in 1907.

One of our surveying gang, B. J. Diamond, moved his family from here to Friona and his wife, Mrs. Annie Diamond, was, I think, Friona's first postmaster.

In the fall of 1907, I had my last

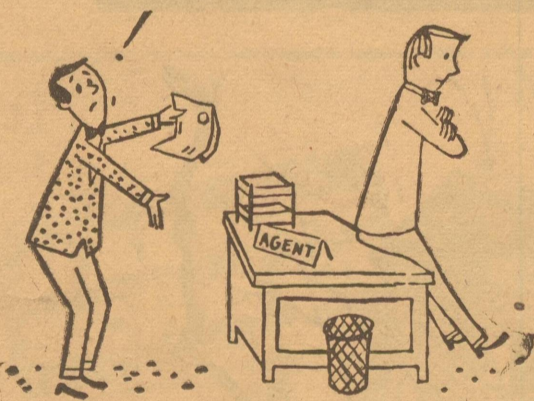
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
