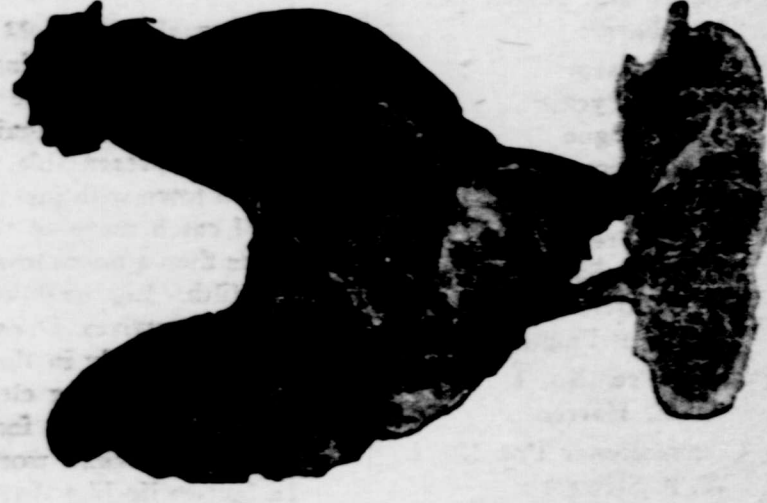

### WHY CRIME IS EXPENSIVE

The following is quoted from a speech made at a club meeting by T. K. Irwin, member of the Legislature from Dallas county:

"Crime costs the taxpayers of the United States \$2,000,000 a day," he said.

"Crime in Texas costs the people \$260,000 a day, or \$41,000 an hour, or \$135 a second, every day in the year. It costs \$2,620 to convict a man or

woman in this State and \$1,592 to keep him in the penitentiary for an average term of four years.

"On the other hand, the State spends but \$14 a year on the education of each child. Crime costs the state as much annually as it does to run the elementary schools of the State and a great deal more than it costs to run the institutions of higher learning.

"For every dollar spent for grocer-

ies in the State \$20 is spent for crime. For every dollar spent for ministers' salaries in the State \$140 is spent for crime. For every dollar spent for Bibles in the State \$5,000 is spent for crime. Crime in Texas costs more than all of the interest paid on bank deposits in the State.

"These figures are impressive, they are almost unthinkable, but they are true."

Farm and Ranch charges that the dilly-dally methods of our courts; the latitude allowed our attorneys in introducing testimony not germane to the case; the practice of permitting attorneys to make exhibits calculated to win the sympathy of the jurors; the ease with which continuances may be secured; easy bail; reversals on technicalities; laws which protect criminals without protecting the people—all these things are factors in the increase of crime noted by Mr. Irwin.

When our court procedure and our methods of practice of law are modernized; when perjury becomes a crime; when lawyers are disbarred for schooling witnesses; when juries are relieved of the responsibility of assessing punishment and that responsibility is placed with the court where it belongs; when our judges are authorized to hold attorneys to the simple duty of presenting the

facts in the case; when lawyers, as officers of the court, consider their oath to uphold the law more binding than the desire of a criminal for freedom; when crooked lawyers are disbarred and the legal profession is dominated by men having a high sense of right and justice, then the dockets of our courts will cease to be congested and the criminal will know that punishment will come with speed and be as certain as death or taxes.

The way to reduce the cost of crime is to have less crime, but we will not have less crime under the present loose methods of our courts. When there is only one chance in twenty of final punishment for crime, there are always plenty to take a chance.—Farm and Ranch.

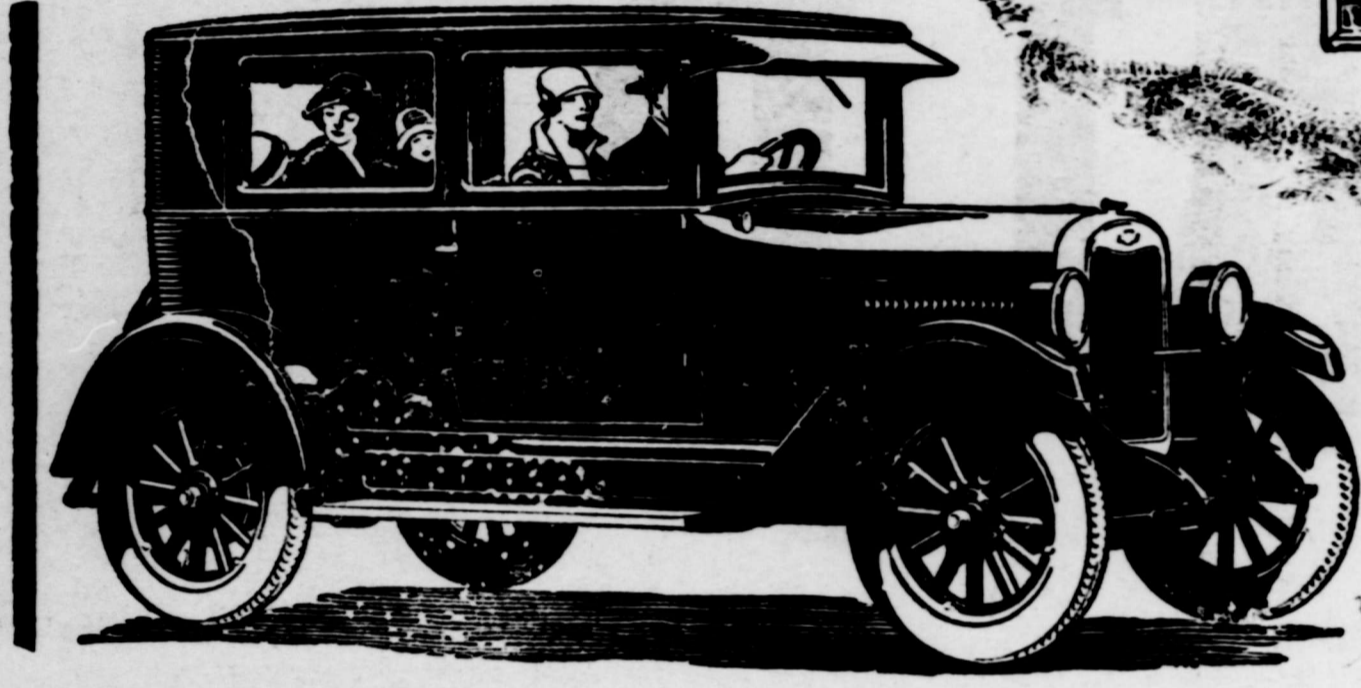

**INSPECTOR SPEAKS COMPLIMENTARY OF OUR SCHOOL**

The following is a brief statement of what Miss Margaret Gotham, State School Inspector had to say about the Brownfield High School, and only goes to show what hard work under adverse conditions our faculty has done the past years in trying to affiliate our schools.

We sometimes worry and become impatient when in reality part of the blame for non-affiliation probably lays with ourselves more than with the faculty. We should exercise some patience and offer every encouragement possible, for it looks like the long hoped for affiliation is near at hand. The state follows:

The student body is "the most courteous and orderly that she has visited."

"Everything is in fine shape for affiliation."

There were no adverse criticisms made. "In the number of years she has been connected with the department of education at Austin she has found very few schools in such good condition" that she could say to them "I find no fault with your work," Brownfield being one of that few. She was highly pleased with the spirit in the community.

Five of the school board; a committee of the Ladies' clubs; and the Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce met her at the school building. A hurried inspection of the grade building was made and she very pleasantly commented on the improvements made there over the conditions given in the last report.

Her final word was that everything was in "tip top shape for the school to be affiliated this coming summer when the papers that will be sent in at the close of school get to Austin and are graded. The papers will be sent to Austin after school closes May, 21, and the result will come back to Brownfield school August 1st.

DECLARED INVALID**

The supporters of the bond issue which was recently voted were very much disappointed to learn that an error had been made in the proceedings which rendered the bonds invalid. It seemed to serve to arouse their fighting spirit, however, and the indications are that they will do some hard fighting for the bonds this time. They feel that Tahoka must take this forward step. **SOIL CONSERVATION**

It is remarkable how rapidly land wears out when it is cropped year after year to wheat or cotton or to any other soil robbing crop. Farmers migrate to a new agricultural section. The soil is black and gives every indication of being able to hold its productivity in spite of the worst sort of cropping abuse. "This land will never wear out," says the newcomers, and they set to work to put it to the test.

Some fifty years ago the farmers of the southeast began to settle up the black lands of Texas. There they found a soil enriched and made black by the accumulation of years on years of decayed organic matter. But it has taken only a comparatively short span of cropping abuse to bring this land of exceptional virgin fertility to its knees in an abject plea for organic matter and plant food. Now the grass lands of West Texas are being brought under the plow. Its farmers have not learned the lesson taught by the experience of Central Texas, because already they are talking about the dire necessity for cheap labor in order that they may grow more and more cotton. How long will it be before West Texas has an acute soil fertility problem of its own? Not long, at the best, unless there is a change in farming methods—Eugene Butler, in The Progressive Farmer.

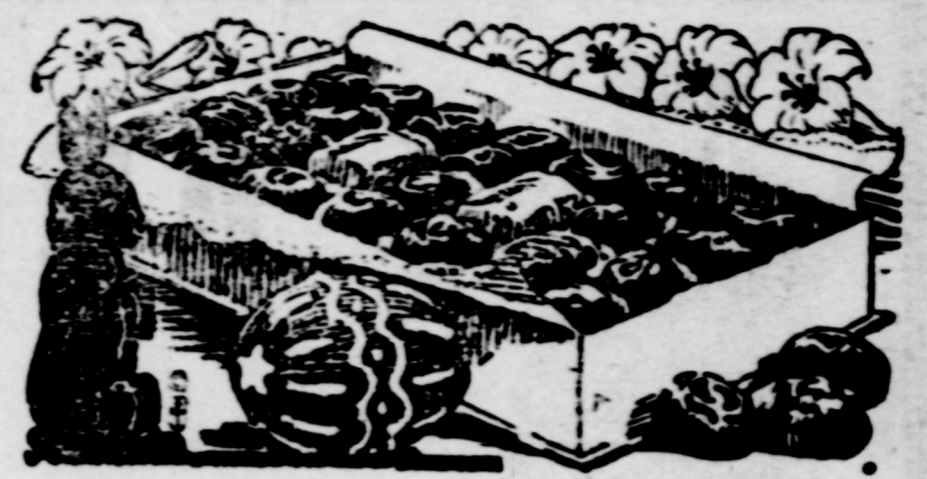
O. H. Garner, splendid old farmer of the Union community, was in last Saturday afternoon and paid the Herald a short call, and renewed for one more year.

At the outset, I wish to correct the statement of the Herald, on front page, bottom of column one, that B. H. Collins, accused slayer of Frank Howard, was a resident of the Meadow community, for he was not. He was a citizen of the Ropes community and I am sure that live town would resent being included with Meadow. Occurencies of this kind might hap-

pen anywhere but we wish only to carry our own shortcomings. So far in her history, Meadow has been singularly free from serious difficulties, may she continue the even tenor of her way.

Mr. Moore, living east of town, killed a dog early last week believed to have rabbies. It was having spasms and biting everything in reach. He buried the animal for a couple of days and then decided to send the head away to Austin for examination

and a telegram just received says the head was too badly decomposed for purposes of examination.

De Leon, Texas, March 23.—Four De Leon residents, including the widow and seven year old son of a man who died last week at Marlin, were undergoing pasteur treatment Monday following a report from Marlin that the man's death was due to rabies.

Those taking treatment are the widow and son of Rushing Smith, Dr. Edward Blackwell, Gorman, and C. H. Sharp, funeral director.

Smith died in agony last Tuesday. His body was brought back to De Leon and interred in a massive steel vault. Following his burrial a question arose as to the cause of his death. Neighbors dug up the vault and the seal was cut with an acetylene torch. Dr. Blackwell, in performing the autopsy, cut himself on the arm.

Mrs. Smith, accompanied by her son, were driven overland to Austin, taking with them Smith's brain, ex-

amination of which showed death from rabies. The widow and son immediately entered the Pasteur Institute, while Dr. Blackwell and the undertaker are taking the treatment at home.—Stephenville Tribune.

### BROWNFIELD MUCH INTERESTED IN SHEPPARD BILL.

Citizens of Brownfield and vicinity are now much interested in the Sheppard potash bill that has been favorably reported out of the committee and which now seems in a fair way to become a law. Senator Morris Sheppard, of Texas, is himself of the opinion that it is only a matter of time now until the bill will be passed and the exploitations and explorings will be started.

There are several counties in West Texas that are vitally interested in this bill for the reason that within their borders there are potash lakes more or less valuable. It is a well known fact that a few miles east of Brownfield there is located several lakes, rich in potash magnesium and other valuable minerals.

Tests of these lakes have already been made, their content analyzed and known to be of high commercial value. These tests also show that they may be developed quite profitably in a commercial way and it is understood that more than one large chemical corporation is ready to come and begin such development when the time is ripe.

The Sheppard bill provides for a five-year program of \$500,000 for the geological survey and \$50,000 annually for the Bureau of Soils, Department of Agriculture, the latter to carry on research work in other directions for the recovery of potash. The total amount asked for is \$2,750,000.

The bill passed the Senate two years ago, but failed to reach a vote in the House. The bureau of the Budget has reported adversely on the legislation as it did at the previous time, holding that the expenditure was not in harmony with the administration's fiscal policy. The Senate was so impressed with the possibilities of the country relieving itself of the Franco-German potash monopoly that it passed the bill in the face of the budget's attitude. The committee report will show a favorable opinion on the part of the Department of Commerce toward the bill. Its representatives told a House committee that development of the resources here would break the foreign monopoly, the statement being based on a world-wide potash survey recently completed by the departments chemical bureau. The Department is known to feel that passage of the Sheppard bill would be an effort in the right direction.

The American Mining Congress is to hold its annual session in Memphis soon, and it is indicated will adopt resolutions urging the passage of the bill. It is possible the Congress will name a Committee to visit Washington to impress on the President the necessity of the Government taking steps to free the country from monopoly in this material.

J. J. Turner informed us recently that he had a letter from his son Frank, of Snyder, Oklahoma, who informed him that while his letters were appreciated, they were generally old, as he got most of the information he wanted out of the Herald. He also stated that he got first on the Herald generally, as he generally went to the postoffice, but that when he carried it to the house, friend wife took charge of the paper.

### BANKER BACKS CONVICTIONS

A lawyer in New York City wrote to his brother who is head of a New York State country bank, in regard to the use of Government printed envelopes by the bank. He said:

"Doubtless they are cheaper, but in these days when the various classes of industry and business realize the necessity of fighting against the further encroachment of the Government and State into business, it is rather inconsistent for a bank, or any other business, to encourage government competition with its own citizens. So far as the envelopes are concerned the government is in the business tax free; and if it can manufacture, sell and distribute envelopes in competition with private enterprise, which must pay the taxes to maintain government, there is no good reason why it should not invade other fields of business. Each industrial function taken over in the name of the government adds an increased tax burden on the private citizen and property owner. I think that when the present supply of government envelopes is exhausted, we should purchase our envelopes from a private printer who pays taxes to maintain our government, even if it makes us lick our

own stamps and causes us to pay a little more for the printing. Think it over."

It is not necessary to lick the stamps, as any home printer can furnish stamped envelopes printed under.—McLean News.
