

### SOME OLD AND INTERESTING POSTOFFICE DATA FOUND

One day this week the editor happened to be at the post office when The rules governing the use of the data concerning the Brownfield post

> We found the office was officially opened for business as a fourth class office on the 4th day of April, 1905, with Homer H. Cotton as the postmaster. On the day it opened our present tax-assessor, J. C. Green purchased the first money order for (4c going to Clark and Courts at Galveston. Looking through the month's business we found, according to Postmaster Bohannan, was that the first months business was less than the daily average today.

Coming on down the line three years, when the writer landed here, . and the post office was in charge of J. L. Randal, we recognized all the box-holders of that date, many of which had passed from our memory until we beheld their names, yet many of them are paying their quarterly box rent until this day. We also found that box rent has not advanced with other things in general, but are omewhat lower now.

In running over the money orders we found that many orders went out in those days to the mail order houses just like they are going today, but it was not until the saloons were voted out about 1908 that any of the orders were noticed to be given in favor of liquor houses. All at once, however, bey appeared with extreme regularity for a few years, we presume until the liquor houses got to where they would take checks. The writer asknowledges he did not investigate very closely or he might have found ome of his own tracks.

It is ided into three appartments, each fitted up for its own particular needs, and Mr. Anthony is not only thereby prepared to care for his fresh meat needs, but also country produce and perishable vegetables and fruits.

The refrigeration is done electrically, and the total is of three ton capacity, insolated with three inches of of cork and tar, and at the time the write of er visited the place, the ceiling and pipes were covered in frost.







### Early Adding Machines

That the ancient Inca civilization in Peru possessed an adding and calculating machine has been revealed in the recent discovery by excavators of knotted cord, or "quipi," in the ruins of a prehistoric tomb. The cord is sixteen yards long and contains 100 knots. Divided into ten unequal sec tions these knots represent the odd numbers from one to nineteen. The sections are of different colors, including red, brown, yellow, blue and green, and are separated by silver beads, which represent the even numbers from two to twenty. By using this simple way of counting, based on the decimal system, rapid calculations can be made.-Montreal Star.

"The son of a tanner, John H. Puelicher, was elected to this eminence in 1922. Circumstances ended his public schooling in the seventh year and he went to work in a carpet store in Milwaukee. He passed under the care of an uncle, head of a small country bank in Platte City. a town of a few hundred inhabitants. growing up on a farm and receiving his early education in a rural school He later entered Bethany College. West Virginia, but at the end of his junior year he had to quit college and go to work in the bank."

His subsequent career was one of steady progress, first to higher positions among small country banks, then to larger city banks in Texas. where he rose to the top. In 1914 he was chosen first governor of the Dallas Federal Reserve Bank and served through the opening period of the establishment of that institution. He resigned to become president of a bank in Birmingham, Alabama, which has grown under his administration to be one of the largest and most successful institutions in the South.

### Telephone's 50th Birthday Celebrated March 10th



March 10th, 1926, marks the fiftleth anniversary of an important event.

On March 10th, 1876, in a small garret workshop in Boston, Alexander Graham Bell uttered the first words ever transmitted over telephone wires. Using a small crude transmitter and a wire but a few yards in length, he said, "Mr. Watson, come here, I want you." His assistant, Thomas A. ### Caves in Britain Well Worth Tourist's Visit

Little as some might suspect it, there are some famous caves in Great Britain, and still more that deserve to be famous. The country is rich not only in the number, but also in the variety of type of the caverns which it contains. Best known among these caves are the Peak cavern, at Castleton, in Derbyshire and the Cheddar caves, in Somerset. The Peak cavern has been known since the earliest ages. No one could help seeing it, for it yawns huge and black in the cliff-like side of that hill on whose dizzy crags Peveril of the Peak had his castle, says the Wide World Maga-

An ice-cold stream issues from its limestone recesses, and subterranean lakes stretch far into the hillside. This vast cavern has been explored for 2,250 feet.

The Cheddar caves do not advertise in so spectacular a fashion, although the Cheddar gorge is one of the most striking pieces of scenery in Great Britain. The first series of caves was accidentally discovered in 1837, through a man at work in his garden failing into the hillside. The second series remained unknown until 1893. These limestone caves form a series of beautiful and lofty halls, hung with stalactites from the roof, and with beautifully colored stalagmites rising from the floor to meet them.







### **BROWNFIELD MUCH INTER-**ESTED IN SHEPPARD BILL.

Citizens of Brownfield and vicinity are now much interesteed in the Sheppard potash bill that has been favorably reported out of 'the committee and which now seems in a fair way to become a law. Senator Morris Sheppard, of Texas, is himself of the opinion that it is only a matter of time now until the bill will be passed and the exploitations and explorings will be started.

Texas that are vitally interested in this bill for the reason that within their borders there are potash lakes more or less valuable. It is a wel! known fact that a few miles east of Brownfield there is located several lakes, rich in potash magnesium and other valuable minerals.

Tests of these lakes have already been made, their content analyzed and known to be of high commercial value. These tests also show that they may be developed quite profitably in a commercial way and it is understood that more than one large chemical corporation is ready to come and begin such development when the time is ripe.

The Sheppard bill provides for five-year program of \$500,000 for the geological survey and \$50.000 annually for the Bureau of Soils, Departmen of Agriculture, the latter to carry or research work in other directions for the recovery of potash. The total amount asked for is \$2,750,000.

The bill passed the Senate tw years ago, but failed to reach a vote in the House. The bureau of the Budget has reported adversely on the legislation as it did at the previous time, holding that the expenditure was not in harmony with the administration's fiscal policy. The Senate was so impressed with the possibilities of the country relieving itself of the Franco-German potash monoply that it passed the bill in the face of the budget's attitude. The committee report will show a favorable opinion on the part of the Department of Commerce toward the bill. Its representatives told a House committee that development of the resources here would break the foreign monopoly, the statement being based on a world-wide potash survey recently completed by the departments chemical bureau. The Department is known to feel that passage of the Sheppard bill would be an effort in the right

direction. The American Mining Congress is to hold its annual session in Memphis soon, and it is indicated will adopt resolutions urging the passage of the bill. It is possible the Congress will name a Committee to visit Washington to impress on the President the necessity of the Government taking steps to free the country from monopoly in this material.

### BANKER BACKS CONVICTIONS own stamps and caus

A lawyer in New York City wrote to his brother who is head of a New York State country bank, in regard to the use of Government printed envelopes by the bank. He said:

"Doubtless they are cheaper, but in these days when the various classes of industry and business realize the necessity of fighting against the further encriachment of the Government and State into business, it is rather inconsistent for a bank, or any other business, to encourage government competition with its own citizens. So far as the envelopes are concerned the government is in the business tax free; and if it can manufacture, sell and distribute envelopes in competition with private enterprise, which nust pay the taxes to maintain government, there is no good reason why it should not invade other fields of business. Each industrial function taken over in the name of the government adds an increased tax burden on the private chizen and property owner. I think that when the present supply of government envelops is exhausted, we should purchase our envelopes from a private printer who pays taxes to maintain our government, even it it makes us lick our
