
Hey Kids -- Santa Claus Comes Wednesday!



While it's a pretty good idea to try to stay impartial when speaking of one's advertisers, we can't help but notice that Ford is pushing Chevrolet pretty hard in the race for the leading manufacturer of new cars.

Chevrolet has what is described as a "slim" lead with 1,444,000 cars so far this year, as compared to Ford's 1,180,000. On paper, this looks like a small difference, all right, but when we try to imagine 264,000 cars in a line, we would say that this difference is really quite impressive.

The real close-up is in current production. Two weeks ago, GM Curned out 32,900 Chevvies, and Ford ground out 32,746 units. That's what we call a neck-and-neck performance

Buick, oddly enough, is still one of the "big three" with 470,000 cars this year. Plymouth has slipped to fourth with 390,000. Major re-styling is giving Plymouth a shot in the arm, though, and the figures bear watching.

No wonder people won't save their money any more. It's getting to be worth less every day. The Canadian dollar is now worth five cents more than our own.


We have learned to stick our head around the corner before eventuring in either direction as the best preventative action.

Pre-Nov. 1 Ginnings Over 17,000 in Parmer

Ginning tabulations for cotton ginned prior to November 1 in Parmer County indicate that the 13 gins of the area turned out 17,-489 bales. These figures are from the Department of Commerce, and were released last week.

Ginnings at a similar point in the harvest show that Castro County had 19,103 bales ginned, and Bailey County had ginned 27,890. These are early figures, and do not come close to indicating the size of the 1956 crop.

In Parmer County, 50,000 bales of cotton are expected from a 41,-000-acre cotton allotment.

Parmer County Drills 17 Wells in October

Irrigation well completions in Parmer County in October totaled 17, according to figures from the Lubbock office of the High, Plains Underground Water District.

Permits issued during the same period also totaled 17 in number. Floyd and Hockley Counties tied for the highest number of wells put down during the month. Both had 25. Bailey County had 11, Castro 16, and Deaf Smith 18.




