Is there a steady, though gradual, breaking down of the moral responsibilities attached to credit buying? We have noticed articles in magazines of economics that dispute this theory, but our neighboring businessmen say it is true that people have less care to keep their word today.

"His name is solid sterling," or "his word is as good as gold," are slogans that we don't hear very often today. There doesn't seem to be too much pride attached any more to the virtues of honesty and straight-forwardness.

Maybe there just aren't going to be anymore George Washingtons or Abraham Lincolns.

Still mentioned up and down the street in Friona is the community's need for light industry or for some type of regionally-activated business that would provide a payroll for the town.

Attracting industry is about the toughest thing a town can get into, or at least so say folks who are supposed to know. Competition among towns, both large and small, is very keen—and it's also very expensive.

Our observation still is to keep a finger on the pulse of some other towns on the Plains who are going out and playing this game of catch the industry.

Littlefield really has gone into this field in a big way, and they may be able to land something really worthwhile. Until they do, however, it seems to us that we could be spending our money a lot more wisely on something else.

This is not to suggest that we close our minds to the subject in the meantime.

We simply do not favor budgeting a large amount of money for this purpose at the present.

Friona Faculty To Number 45 When Complete this Year

Friona Schools will have a 45-teacher system this year, announces Dillie Kelley, superintendent. However, on Monday of this week, there still were some "ifs" in that statement.

An instructor for high school English and one for high school math still need to be hired before the faculty will be complete and ready to start school in a couple of weeks.

With enrollment climbing from 878 to an estimated 925 this year, the Friona system is adding three additional teachers to its staff, having had 42 last year.

Eleven teachers will be engaged in their profession in Friona for the first time this fall. Here are the new ones:

Mrs. Jewel Woodward, who comes to Friona from Happy. She is a graduate of West Texas, and has her Master's degree. She will teach the third section of the first grade.

Mrs. Susie Locke will teach the third section of the third grade.

She studied at East Texas State Teachers' College in Commerce, and also has her Master's. She formerly taught at Wilson, near Lubbock.

Mrs. Mari Watkins, a graduate of ETSTC also, comes here from Sherman. She will teach the fourth

3-County Will Add 200,000

Construction is expected to begin this week on a 200,000-bushel addition to Tri-County Elevator at Black, announces Pete Braxton, manager. Contractor for the addition is Johnson Construction Company of Salina, Kansas.

To be of concrete and steel construction, the addition will be behind the present office, and east of the older storage part of the elevator. It will be a drive-through type elevator with six tanks.

The design of the elevator is such, says Braxton, that it will be efficient in the handling of grain. "It's built primarily for grain handling—not storage," he says.

Completion is expected by November 22. It will increase the storage capacity of Tri-County to 800,000 bushels. The addition will cost \$130,000.

Services Pending For Mother Of Local Persons

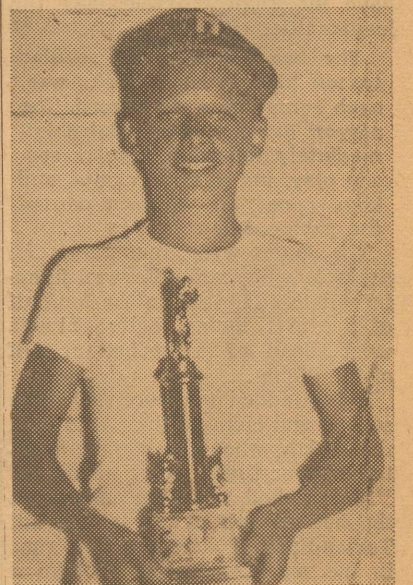

Huffman in Town--Drills Start Monday

Colie Huffman, hefty and good-natured new head football coach for the Friona Chiefs, arrived in town Monday.

Huffman immediately set at work making plans for the coming season, which is only a few short weeks away. He called his first session for Monday, August 27 at 7:30 in the morning.

Running, calisthenics, and other exercises designed to lift boys out of the summer slump and into shape are planned by the head mentor. Sessions will be held in both mornings and afternoons until school starts.

Huffman says he is expecting about 60 boys to be out for football this year. He hinted optimism by noting that Friona will have a larger-than-average return of let-termin this year, and material for building a team may not be quite so hard to find.

He made no rash predictions about the Chiefs' chances in the district this year, however, merely saying, "We hope to field a team."

The season for the Chiefs last year was a little short of glorious. They were pummeled by Springlake, a team which Huffman coached in 1955, by a score of 39 to 6.

The Wolverines, incidentally, had a 9-2 record for the season and won district.

Huffman is a coach of the T formation. This is considered to be advantageous in the case of the Chiefs, since all of the players are familiar with this type offense.

Asked whether he put emphasis on a strong running game, or perhaps passing, or perhaps a razzle-dazzle offense, the coach just grinned and said, "Let's say that we are going to put emphasis on winning."

He did add, however, that a knowledge of the football fundamentals of blocking and tackling is essential to a successful team, and that he would first concentrate on these foundations.

In regard to what teams the new coach expects to be strong in District 2-A this year, Huffman cited

Sudan, Springlake, and Farwell as being probably the clubs that Friona can expect the most trouble from.

Farm-to-Market Road Completed, Highway Ready to "Shoot"

Completion of the long-sought-for paved road north of town finally became a realization last week, as construction crews moved equipment away from the project after the final topping.

The road, which goes north and then jogs west and then back north, serves what is often referred to as the Bootleg community, and gives Friona and its trade territory a tie-in with the Harrison Highway west of Hereford.

In Friona this week, workers report that they expect to be able to seal coat the Highway 60 widening project this week. The highway base has been built up and packed hard for sometime.

Rains and shortages of materials have delayed completion of the project, but the lane dividers were finished over the weekend, and winding up of the rest of the work was expected this week.

The project will give Friona Parmer County's first modern four-lane, divided, through route on a heavily traveled highway.

Trades Day Drawings To Begin Saturday

The first drawing for Friona's revived trades day effort will be Saturday at 3:30 in the city park, announces Joe Ferrell, who is chairman of the retail merchants committee of the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

Sixty-eight local businesses are backing the trade incentive program, and a pot of \$500 will be the lure for what boosters hope will be big crowds Saturday.

YER OUT—ALL THREE OF YA!

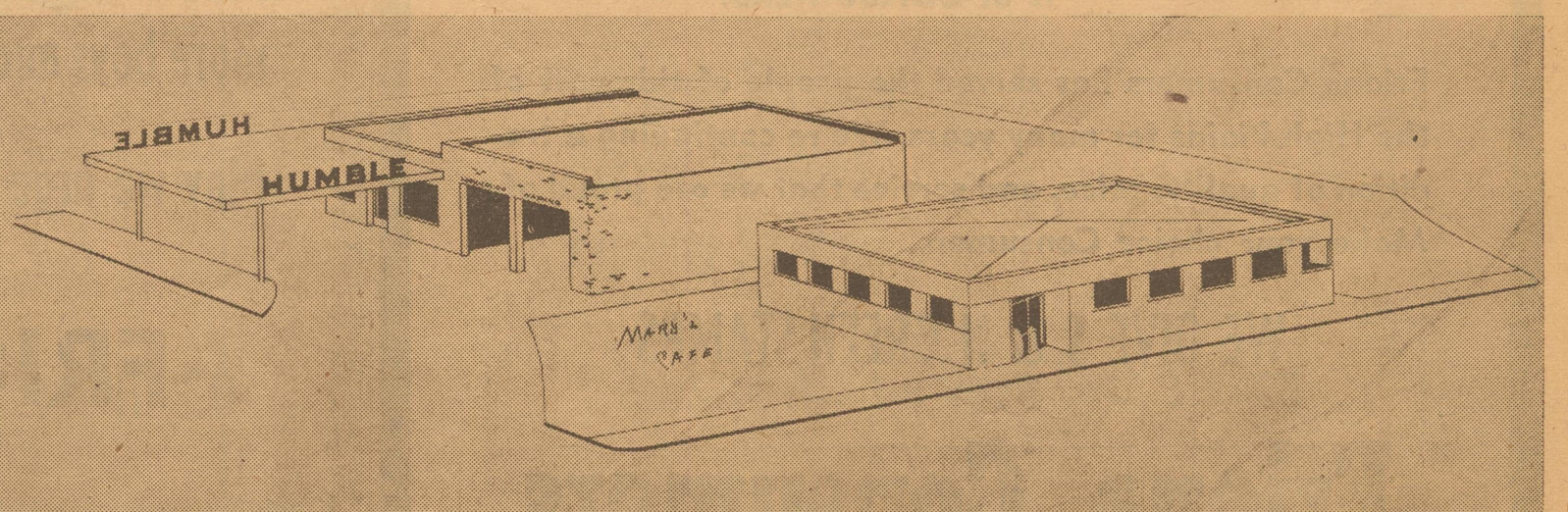

"Climbing Okra" Growing in Friona

Late last summer Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Nazworth of Friona spent several weeks visiting friends and relatives in central Louisiana. While on the trip someone gave them a large pod of okra.

The pod looked more like a cross between a squash and a gourd and the seed resembled watermelon seed. The Nazworths were curious to see what the plant would

do in West Texas. Several seeds were planted in early spring and plants came up. The leaves on the plants looked like cucumber leaves and the plant showed a tendency to climb. Nazworth erected a trellis for the plants to climb on and before very long the trellis was almost covered.

Pretty soon after the blooms began to appear, small pods began to develop and very quickly grew to a size suitable for cooking. The pods are good for cooking whole with other vegetables or for frying.

The taste of the climbing okra is very much like that of regular okra and seems to be doing quite well in its present location.

Another Easy One For Commissioners

City commissioners, accustomed to juggling big figures and making weighty decisions, had another breather Monday night at their regular meeting, and because their schedule has slowed down, decided to go back to monthly meetings except for special matters that may come up.

The city dads began their meeting with a pow-wow with school officials over interpretation of tax laws. There hasn't been any trouble between the school and the city—the two taxing bodies were seeking interpretation of the laws governing their activities. Commissioners okayed a suggestion that Herman Helton, Friona night watchman, be furnished a telephone in his home, and for a time, they talked about the old sewer tie-on problem. There still are instances in the city where property owners have not hooked up to the system.

More headaches have popped up at the city-maintained cemetery, Clerk Roy Wilson reported. The latest difficulty has been with discoloration of stones apparently as a result of chemicals in the irrigation well just installed to water the project.

Wilson says that the city is having an analysis run on the water to determine what property with-

in it is giving the trouble, and what may possibly be done to eliminate the difficulty.

In the meantime, the commission endorsed a decision of the clerk to suspend watering in the cemetery until the trouble has been cleared up.

Also, it was brought out that some individuals still desire to care for the graves of their relatives, and would prefer that a small water system be available for their use.

Clerk Wilson was instructed to check on prices of overhead tanks, and the possibility of setting up a small system for use in the older part of the cemetery was discussed.

The commission voted to pay Weldon Dickson \$200 for drawing the plans and specifications of the new city hall.

Drainage problems on East 11th Street were discussed, and the commissioners agreed to try to work out something with the Highway Department to insure better facilities for that part of town.

Some areas were put under water with the Saturday night rain—even though it wasn't very large, East 11th Street is part of the Highway 60 project now being done by the state.

Proposed Constitutional Amendments

To be voted on at an election to be held on NOVEMBER 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22 proposing an amendment to Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to provide that an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local option required for special or local laws.

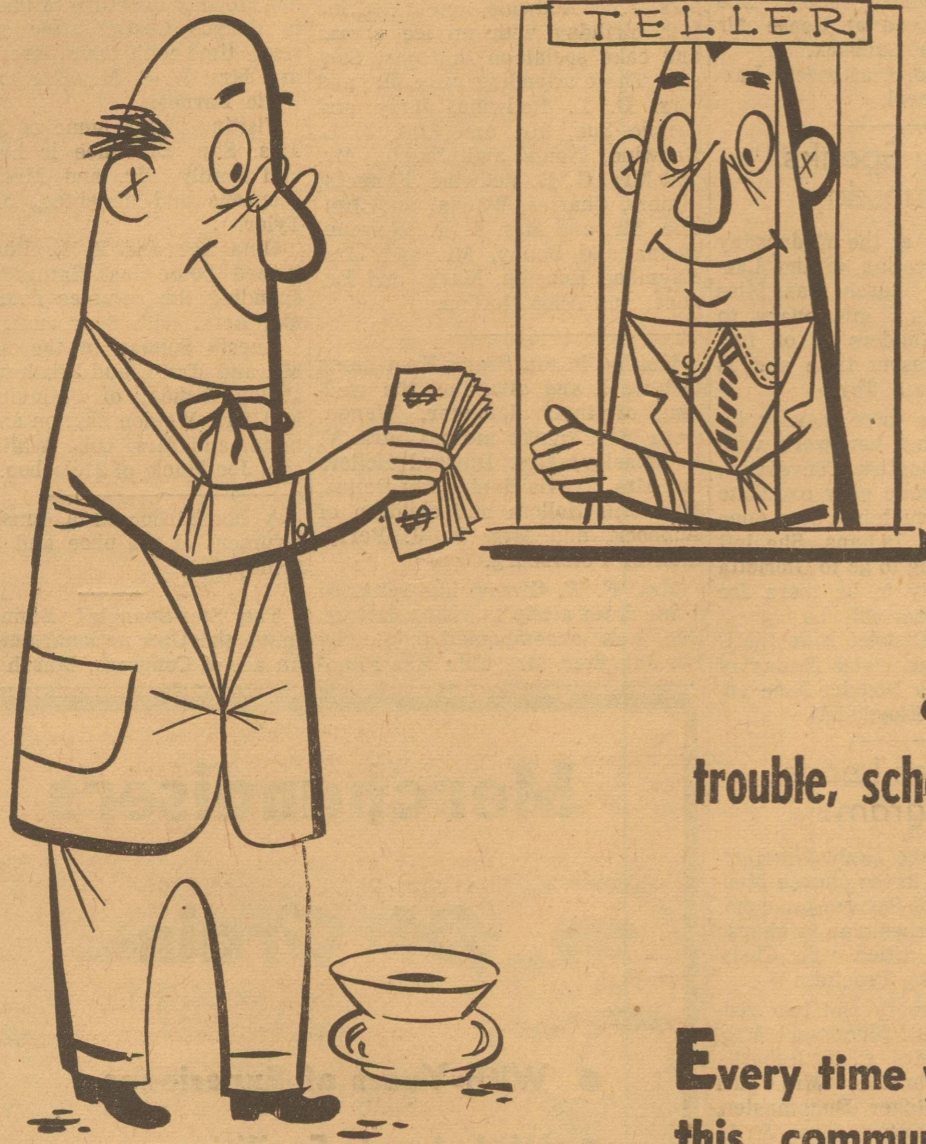
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize needed changes in an amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto, providing for the necessary election, term of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 2 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board from five to seven members, and the amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board (\$200,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15-a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 61-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses of which they are not guilty.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 proposing an amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, so as to change the membership of the Veterans' Land Board from five to seven members, and the amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board (\$200,000,000); providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

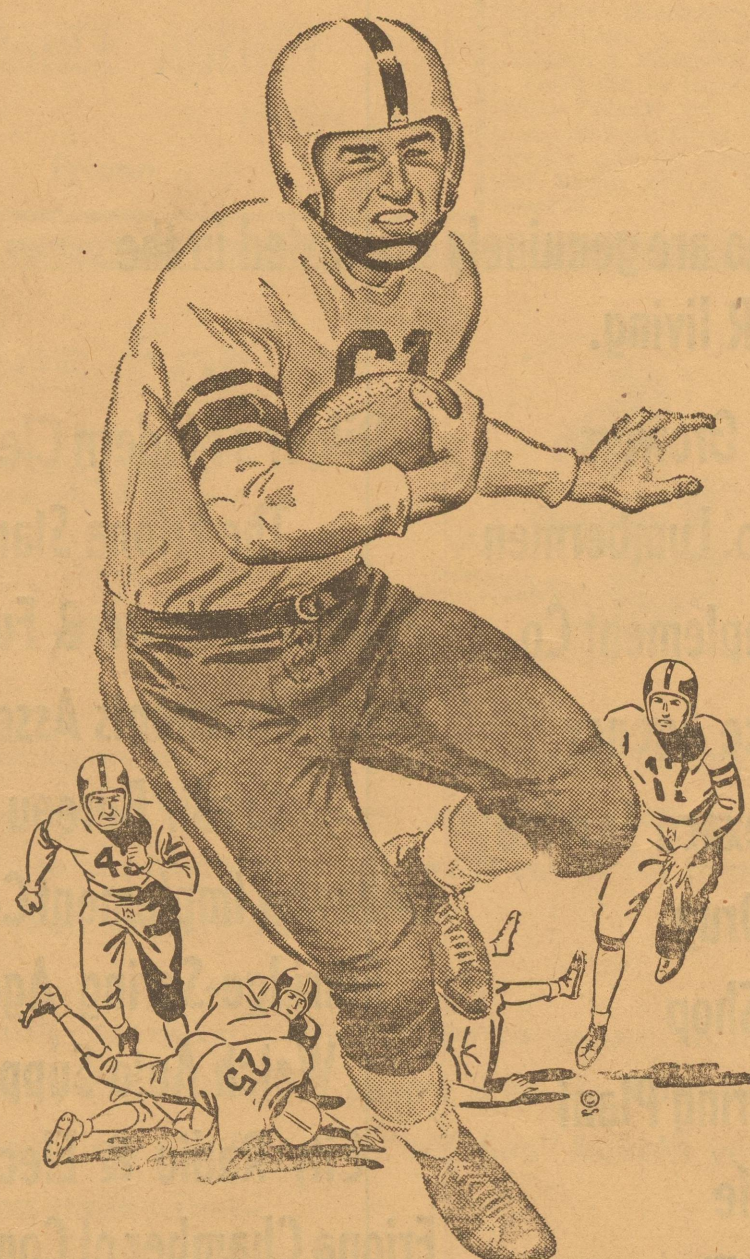
