### THE STAR'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

### **About Those Peddlers**

One of the greatest nuisances which confronts small, prosperous-looking friendly community such as Friona is the door-to-door transient peddler. The peddlers were at it again in Friona Monday night, much to the consternation of our citizens.

With a corps of slick-tongued salesmen, some of whom were "crippled," and all of whom use questionable but usually legal sales tactics, the group canvassed the town in search of a few fast bucks. As always, they got some, too.

Friona's police officers and city officials were harried with many, many calls from irate citizens, who wanted the shysters run out of town. This attitude is certainly understandable-however, so far as legal means are concerned, the city was left with no recourse.

These professional magazine jockeys know their business. There isn't any stuttering around. They also know their "rights" when it comes to the legality of their actions, although the morality of them is always subject to suspicion.

Under the U.S. Constitution, transient peddling is classed as interstate commerce and subtherefore, to control by the ICC. And what the ICC has dominion over, no city interferes with.

What can be done?

The first thing that is needed to control these operators, The Star feels, is to make their forays practically fruitless. If the citizenry would but resolve not to be fast-talked into taking these subscriptions, the end of such activity would soon be at hand. Complete control by this means is unattainable, but the willpower and firmness to say "No" and mean it could certainly be improved upon.

At least, if you do buy a subscription, don't play "chicken" to the detriment and confusion of your neighbors. If you give a peddler a check just to get rid of him, and then after he is gone, call the bank and stop payment on the instrument, you are not only showing your lack of courage to turn the salesman down yourself, but you are likely to leave one of your friends holding the bag.

Slick salesmen don't like to do business with banks. Instead, they will usually take your check and beat it straight to some unsuspecting local

There also are "spots" in the county where the decline is spent in 1956. figured to be from 20 to 40 feet in those 18 years.

The largest of these four spots is shown to be in a northwestsouthwest direction with Friona at about the center of the decline. This spot is about 20 miles long from five to eight miles wide.

However, compared with other counties which have resources and development anywhere near as great as ours, Parmer County is in a very favorable light. Hale County indicates the greatest depletion of resources. Declines there

range from 0 to 80 feet, with most of the heavily irrigated area drop-ping about 50 feet. There are no

such areas in Parmer County.

Greatest decline on the Plains is in a small area west of Lockney in Floyd County. There, hydrologists have measured a decline of ists have measured a decline of over 80 feet in the 18 years!


