The question was raised this week at a meeting of the directors of the Friona Chamber of Commerce as to whether Friona is again ready to try to have a fulltime C of C manager.

Several years ago this progressive community more or less "experimented" in the field with the hiring of a full-time, professionally-trained man to operate the Chamber. It is not our purpose here to evaluate this experience, but time does show that the community decided that perhaps it wasn't quite "ready." Failure to retain a manager is evidence of this be-

In the intervening years, however, a lot of water has gone under the bridge, as the saying goes. Friona has about doubled in population. More and more, citizens feel the need for a well-rounded program to "sell" this city to others and induce them to locate here.

Competition from other towns on the Plains is keen. Friona may be "The Brightest Spot on the Golden Spread" but there are other towns making similar claims. Often, Friona's story does not
