

OUR NEW PAVING COSTS MONEY

As the commissioners of Parmer County we feel that the citizens we serve should know what the Commissioners Court is up against. It has to do with the construction of more farmto-market roads in Parmer County.

In the last few years we have been receiving about an average of 16 miles of farm-tomarket roads each year, the cost to the county being acquiring the right-of-way. In the past we have had funds available to accept the roads which were given to us in the state program.

As the cost of obtaining these easements has increased, the right-of-way fund has been depleted. In fact, money has had to be borrowed for this fund.

If we are to continue to accept farm-to-market roads for Parmer County, there will have to be more money available for the purpose of acquiring these rights-of-way. Too, the highway department has plans to build four-lane highways on 70-84, and 60. The acquisition of farm-to-market roads is foremost on our minds, but the four-lane highways can be acquired in future years if there are necessary funds.

There are three ways which the Commissioners Court can secure these funds:

- 1. A bond issue
- 2. Raise in the property valuations
- 3. A 30-cent increase in the tax rate.

In regard to No. 2, we do not feel that raising the property valuation would be a good business practice. We are getting enough money in all other funds to carry on our county government and to raise the valuation would put excess money in these other funds.

The Commissioners Court has the authority to carry out this plan, but if it were done, each time the county received 95 cents it would have to send the state 65 cents.

We believe that No. 3 would be the most feasible plan. This plan would increase our tax rate from 95 cents on each one hundred dollar valuation to \$1.25. This extra 30 cents would go into the right-of-way fund.

At present, the right-of-way fund receives 10 cents of this 95 cents, which produces approximately \$9,000 per year in taxes. The 30 cents extra added to the 10 cents would yield approximately \$36,000 per year, which we think would be sufficient to obtain all the Farmto-Market roads that are offered over a period of a few years.

To put this plan into effect, it would have to be left up to the voters of Parmer County. As your commissioners, we feel that a matter as important as this should be brought to your attention.
