


The terms for each of the elected trustees are for two years.

We believe that in previous ediit reasonably plain that we support adequate salaries for public school teachers and also the very best in physical facilities that can possibly be provided by the area from which taxes are drawn, tempered with common sense and judgement about financial realities. However, one "sacred cow"

that we're getting a little tired of seeing in various periodicals from time to time is the old saw, "Our teachers are underpaid." These words, issued as a flat statement, do not universally apply.

There is more in a job than salary, as anyone who has ever held one knows full well. There is the matter of hours spent at work, the intensity of the work done, the conditions under which services are performed, and an intangible thing usually referred to as "job security

Public school teachers, we believe, should have reason to be pleased with their positions when virtually any of these factors, in addition to salary, are considered.

With few exceptions, their hours are thort, their working conditions geon, and their work pleasant. There are exceptions, oh yes, but not a large number.

While a public school teacher is subject to criticism by the public, this occupational hazard is not limited to the teaching profession by any means. Anyone who deals with the public is in the same boat, and that includes newspaper editors, storekeepers, insurance salesmen, and so on ad ind litum.

The administration and school savings for large users. board, which constitute the teacher's "boss," seldom is as hard to please as a board of directors, a district foreman, or a silent partner.





THE STAR'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

It's Not What It Costs— It's What It's Worth

Representatives of Friona Growers and Shippers, this community's only industrial processing installation for locally produced farm products, have made a quiet appeal through the Friona Chamber of Commerce that the city review its large water user rates.

They have raised questions about municipally furnished water, and whether it is not more expensive than it should be. A comparison has been made with Hereford rates, which appear to be considerably lower (for large users) than those which apply locally.

The city commission has been encouraged to study the rates charged by Friona.

The Star, in contacting neighboring cities, found wide variation in what is charged large users. At Hereford, a rate of nine cents applies for water used in excess of 30,000 gallons monthly. That makes Friona's rate of 15 cents for more than 1,000,000 gallons seem rather stiff.

However, at Dimmitt the lowest rate for any user is 15 cents per 1,000 gallons on all purchases of 15,000 and over. Farwell's lowest rate is also 15 cents and this begins at the 5,000 gallon mark.

Muleshoe's lowest regular rate is 30 cents for 4.000 and over — which drops to 20 cents during the summer, but the Bailey County city gives an unusual treatment to schools, churches, and a dairy there. They are charged a flat rate of $1\frac{1}{2}$ cents per 1,000.

Tremendous differences from town to town make it appear, then, that every city ought to decide what its rates ought to be, without too much regard for what the neighbors are doing.

However, there is more to the current request than at first meets the eye. Whether desired or not, today and in the future Friona will be expected to meet competition from others if it seeks to improve the local economic situation with new industry. Friona can insist on selling its water at a price that it considers fair in relation to what it costs to produce it, and run the risk of having further industries pass this community by, or Friona can seek to accomodate newcomers with the most favorable climate that can be provided.

The local potato shed is here to stay. Whether Friona raises, lowers, or continues its present water rates likely won't be the deciding factor on this particular industry's future. It is quite possible that the cessions ranging up to ten years in length. owners could decide to drill their own well and furnish their own water, thereby relieving the city of the responsibility of providing large amounts of water during the rush of harvest season — a problem for Friona in particular.

Friona Growers and Shippers already have a sizeable payroll in season. They are pushing toward a carrot deal, in addition to potatoes, which would mean, according to their estimates, employment for between 300 and 400 persons up to four months out of the year. That's a payroll worth going after for a town of any size!

The city has already recognized the principle of incentive. This is shown in the summer water rates, which to large users are a paltry 5 cents per 1,000 gallons. This rate, which will take effect this month, is designed to encourage the growing of lawns, gardens, and greenery to help beautify the town. This makes good sense-if the rates can be offset at other times of the year, as they are.

In many small cities where local administration is almost desperate for payrolls, incentives to prospective industries include furnishing of plant sites, help in making surveys, help in signing up labor, help in financing the buildings, and even tax con-

THE HAPPY HOMEMAKER

It is almost fresh strawberry time again. There is nothing better than strawberry preserves and strawberry shortcake, but for a change, "Strawberry Meringue change, "Strawberry Bars," are very good. Bars," are very good. Beat together 3/4 cup shortening, and 2 egg yolks.

1/3 cup sugar, and 2 egg yolks. Add 1¹/₂ cups sifted flour and stir until thoroughly blended. Spread mixture in bottom of an ungreas-ed 13" x 9" baking dish, and bake 15 minutes. Remove from oven and spread evenly with 1 cup strawberry preserves.

Stiffly beat 2 egg whites, beat in ½ cup sugar gradually, fold in 1 cup finely chopped walnuts. Spread meringue carefully over preserves and bake 25 minutes. Cool, cut into bars, and decorate with additional preserves.


