

## It's The Little Things That Mean A Lot

While there are several towns around Friona that have coffee priced at 10 cents a cup, this item only costs a nickel in Friona. This may not mean much to non-coffee drinkers, and means less income for the Friona businesses but we think this shows something about Friona businesses which is a credit to the town.

We think this shows the desire of Friona merchants to give better service in encouraging people to trade in Friona, not for coffee especially, but other items as well.

Cafe owners would have a little more than a nickel a cup profit on coffee if prices were 10 cents a cup, but as it is now, a cup of good coffee is served and returns slightly less than a penny a cup profit, it is estimated.

A cup of good coffee, cafe owners say, is their way of attracting customers into the business, and possibly the customers will partake of other items on the menu. Again, if they did not offer a cup of good coffee to those who want coffee, the appeal of any meal which they offer would be discounted since coffee — good coffee — adds something to a meal which nothing else will replace.

If cafe owners so agreed and wanted to, the price of coffee could well be a dime anytime they wanted to sell it for that price. Most say they could sell as many cups of coffee at that price as they sell for a nickel.
