n soil directly affects the waterholding capacity of the soil. The small fragments of organic matter have the ability to hold up to ten times as much water as a soil particle the same size. Therefore any increase in organic matter content will increase the amount of water a soil can store. This is extremely valuable to the dryland farmer who depends on water stored in the fall and winter to produce the next crop and to the irrigation farmer who pre-irrigates. Crop production depends upon the water stored in the soil.

This resistance is due to the fact that several of the smaller particles are stuck together creating a larger aggregate which is not easily moved.

Another important function of organic matter, is the increase n bacterial activity. An abundant supply of microscopic bacteria is necessary for plants to be able to use the nitrogen plant foods. The bacteria use decaying organic matter for food to supply the energy required to change the nitrogen to a form that plants can use.

Bacteria are also helpful in the plant utilization of phosphates by storing the phosphorous in their bodies to be released all during the growing season. The number of bacteria in the soil is amazing. One gram of soil contains from 100,000 34 cup canned pineapple juice to several billion. 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
