County Settles In Drug Action

Parmer County Judge Bonnie Heald said that Parmer County has joined the settlement of the Panhandle Drug Task Force involvement in the 1998 Tulia drug bust.

As was the case with most other counties that were members of the Drug Task Force at the time, Parmer County has agreed to a \$50,000 payment into a Washington D. C. trust fund set up by mediators in the suit.

The county will pay only \$5,000 from county funds. At the time of the Tulia drug stings, Parmer County was insured by a company in Phoenix, Arizona. The county insurance now is through the Texas Association of Counties.

The former insurance carrier will pay the \$45,000. The county portion is the deductible that was in effect at the time. Parmer County was a member of the Drug Task Force but was not an active participant in the Tulia operation.

Stovalls Cope With Invasion Aftermath

A convict on the run invades your home and holds you hostage. Fortunately he lets you go. During the next 12 hours, the convict tears up the inside of your home, law enforcement douses the place with tear gas, the convict breaks windows and does more damage, then is shot as he exits your bathroom window, leaving a pool of blood on the bricks and ground outside.

With the crisis ended, the investi-

gation wraps and everybody leaves. So who is responsible for cleaning up the damage and the mess? The answers might surprise you.

The aftermath of the March 21 hostage crisis in Friona at the residence of Rev. Mark Stovall on West 9th Place is very much evident today. Mark, Debbie and daughter Hannah are living temporarily in a nearby residence whose owner is in Prairie Acres Nursing Home.

Their home, the First Baptist parsonage, is a shell. Because of the saturation of the tear gas and the damage inflicted by both the convict, Robby Vaughn, and law enforcement, the house is undergoing major renovation. The total tab? A broad estimate places the cost somewhere between \$100,000 and \$150,000.

None of the law enforcement agencies involved are liable. The De-

partment of Public Safety (DPS) and Parmer County are not liable, according to District Attorney Johnny Actkinson. The Stovalls have received assistance from the State of Texas victims fund but the agency does not reimburse for property damage.

Local veterinarian Dr. Dale Schueler, a First Baptist member, cleaned up the blood left outside the bathroom window. Church members are helping by tearing out sheetrock and other necessary labor to restore the home to living condition.

First Baptist Church of Friona pays about \$20,000 per year in insurance premiums to insure the church grounds and the parsonage. The insurance is through Church Mutual of Wisconsin. The Stovalls carried renters insurance through Allstate Insurance. For now, Church Mutual is balking on paying damages. Their policies have a clause that says they are not required to pay damages due to government action or seizure. Negotiations were ongoing at the time of this writing.

All of the Stovall personal possessions from the home, including clothing, sheets, towels, blankets, dishes, and furniture are in Amarillo at the Blackmon-Mooring facility being cleaned and sanitized to try and remove the tear gas effects. The cost: about \$35,000. Allstate is also paying for the Stovalls to rent the temporary residence.

Initial estimates from insurance adjustors to repair damages to the home were approximately \$79,000 for rebuilding, \$11,000 for the damages done by Vaughn, and \$13,000 for

remediation. Total: about \$103,000. Money for the damage done by Vaughn has been paid, according to Rev. Stovall.

The home has been stripped of all sheetrock, insulation, carpet, cabinets, sinks, toilets, and appliances. The air conditioning ducts will be replaced. New windows have been ordered. Mark Stovall's son works for a building supply company in Houston and managed to order the windows at cost. The church hopes to keep material and labor costs to around \$50,000 in case Church Mutual denies their claim.

At some point all the exposed studs and concrete will be sprayed with a sealant, to prevent any after effects from the tear gas chemicals, before new sheetrock and carpet are installed. Remediation, i.e. cleansing the interior of any chemicals, will take about a week. Fans and blowers will be used and the house will be sealed during the process.

Rev. Stovall says all the rebuilding steps are falling into place. Sheetrock workers are scheduled after the remediation process. Cabinets and carpet will be next. Their personal belongings will be fetched home by Blackmon-Mooring and if any tear gas lingers in the cushions of the furniture, or in their bedding, it will be replaced too.

The perpetrator is deceased: law enforcement has returned to their routines: onlookers are gone: life for most has returned to normal. But what began as a quiet Saturday evening working on puzzles at the kitchen table is a continuing ordeal for the Stovall family and their fellow church family.

Leal's Restaurant Popular Mexican Food Eatery Open In Amarillo

Parmer County's most popular Mexican food restaurant is not in Parmer County. There is one in Bailey County. If you are headed to Clovis, there is one there on Mabry Drive. Another is in Plainview and now there is one in Amarillo.

On any given night, especially during football or basketball season, you are likely to find some of your friends and local fans consuming copious quantities of chips, salsa, and enchilada specials at one of the Leal's Mexican Food locations.

The flagship restaurant most familiar to area residents is in Muleshoe. This past weekend we stopped in at the new Leal's in Amarillo. It is located at I-40 and Georgia, next door to Macaroni Joe's, in the former Gardski's location.

A good crowd flowed in and out during the Saturday lunch hour. Victor Leal said they had been open four weeks and had not advertised the restaurant yet except for a couple of billboards.

The multi-level interior will not remind regular patrons of the Muleshoe location. Except for the familiar menu items, the consistent food quality, and the speedy friendly service, the similarity ends there. The Leals designed and decorated the interior and it is very classy yet still carries the Leal's ambiance.

Employees are outfitted in black uniforms, the napkins and tableware are also black, adding to the rich dark woods used throughout,

highlighted with white columns. There is a long bar area at the back of the upper level but Victor said he didn't want the place to be known as a bar.

The former Muleshoe mayor and his family moved to Amarillo several months ago to launch the Amarillo Leal's. They found a home near Lake Tanglewood and are excited about the new cafe and the opportunities in Amarillo. Before leaving Muleshoe, the popular restaurateur was considered as a top candidate for the state legislature. That option may still be on the table.

"Yes, I have thought about getting back into politics," he said. "I enjoyed my terms as Mayor of Muleshoe and it could be down the road I might consider a run at state politics."

For now, he invites all his loyal Panhandle customers to stop in at the new Amarillo Leal's whenever they are in town. "Tell them we look forward to seeing them here at Leal's," he said. No doubt there will be plenty of familiar faces stopping by.

FMNV's: The Real Skinny

A couple of Sundays ago, the Friona Class of 2004 held a steak dinner in the junior high cafeteria. There were no FMNV's there unless you count the homemade desserts.

Foods designated as FMNV's are the State of Texas' answer to WMD's. Our Department of Agriculture has undertaken the massive task of keeping you and all your descendants skinny by banning Foods of Minimum Nutritional Value (FMNV) in all school cafeterias.

I found a certain irony in the fact that about 800 people came to the junior high cafeteria and consumed a steak, baked potato laden with butter and sour cream, cafeteria rolls soaked in butter, and calorie laden homemade pies and cakes. Texas Ag Commissioner Susana Combs would surely have had a convulsion.

Combs and state health commissioner Eduardo Sanchez presented what they called shocking news to the Joint Interim Committee on Nutrition and Health in Public Schools. She said, "The number of overweight Texans will roughly double by the year 2040." She continued, "The number of obese Texans will nearly triple from 3.9 million today to 9.6 million people in 2040 and if recent trends continue our costs would quadruple from \$10 billion today to as much as \$40 billion a generation from now. We flat cannot afford this." There is no scientific or probability data to substantiate the claim but that does not matter to the we-know-what-is-best nitwits.

So they issued some new guidelines that go into effect August 1 and apply to all schools that participate in federal child nutrition programs. And to make it even easier on everyone, the rules differ

for elementary, junior high, and high school.

Soft drinks are banned from elementary schools. Standards are set for fat grams per serving. Also banned are water ices (popsicles) except those with fruit juices, chewing gum, and hard candy, jellies and gums, marshmallow, mints, licorice, and candy coated popcorn.

Also eliminated are deep-fat fried foods. Cafeterias will not be allowed to have frying utensils in the kitchen by 2006. Here are some highlights of the Texas Public School Nutrition Policy:

In elementary, no MNV's allowed, no candy ever, no competitive foods sold, French fries may not exceed 3 ounces per serving, may only be served once a week and students may only purchase one serving at a time.

In junior high, no MNV's or candy until after the last lunch period, no competitive foods during lunch time, French fries may not exceed 3 ounces per serving, may only be served 3 times a week, and students can only buy one serving (unless they get a friend to buy one for them but I'm sure they will never think of that.)

In high school no MNV's during lunch where reimbursable meals are served, no competitive foods sold, no sales of sugared, carbonated beverages in containers larger

than 12 ounces, and the same French fry rules as above apply in high school.

For all grade levels, no deep fat frying, restrict portion size on chips, certain snacks, milk and fruit drinks, limits on fats and sugar per serving, fruits and vegetables offered daily, must offer 2 percent, 1 percent or skim milk where milk is served, by 2007-08 reduce the purchase of any products with trans fats, and by 2006-07 all fruit and vegetable juices must be 100 percent real fruit and vegetable juices.

So in all of their research and wisdom and concern, they will let a little bitty first grader eat the same amount of French fries as a great big high school senior. Makes perfect sense to me. Especially since I see high school students every day streaming over to Sonic, Allsup's and The Burrito Box during lunch period. They do walk there from the high school which is good exercise to shake down that Tallsup special.

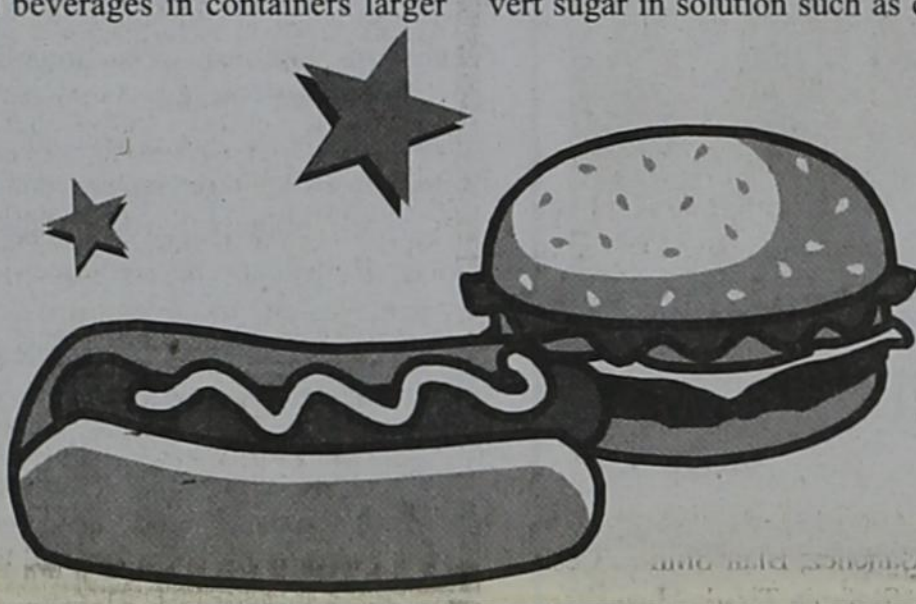
I forgot to mention that fondants are also restricted in school lunch rooms. Not fondue, fondant. In Commissioner Combs 15-page nutrition policy guideline release, fondant is described as a product consisting of microscopic-sized sugar crystals that are separated by a thin film of sugar and/or invert sugar in solution such as candy

corn or soft mints. Yeah, well I won't be having any of those, at least that I know of.

Combs and her minions instituted these impossible, unnecessary, and expensive guidelines without input from superintendents around the state. In a letter dated February 27, 2004, to Susan Combs, the Texas Association of School Administrators asked for more time and opportunity for input into the solutions presented. Friona ISD superintendent Jim Parker wrote a note on my copy of the TASA letter: "Ron, Commissioner Combs' heart is probably on the right track but the overall complexity of such mandates and the impact will be far reaching."

Next week I will look at the school food imbroglia from the school's perspective. And end with this: it is not the duty of public schools and public school teachers and staff to keep your kids skinny. In fact, if you do not like this food program you are allowed to send your kid a lunch every day and put whatever you want in it. They just can't share it with a classmate.

No word yet from Commissioner Combs on the penalty for bootlegging French Fries.

Seliger Set To Address School Funding

As you may know, Governor Rick Perry recently directed the Texas Legislature to convene in a special session, to address the inadequacies of our current system of public school finance. As your new state senator, this special session represents my first opportunity to influence legislation on your behalf.

You are probably very familiar with the goals of this reform effort—substantially reducing school property taxes, eliminating the so-called "Robin Hood" system, and creating a better funding system to preserve educational excellence and teacher benefits.

Gov. Perry recently weighed in with his own plans for rethinking our school funding systems. His plans include dividing the state's property tax base into "residential" property (taxed by local communities) and "business" property (taxed by a proposed statewide school tax).

The Governor's plan also seeks to raise additional state revenue from what might be called "sin taxes". Those who participate in these voluntary activities—smoking, playing the lottery, gambling, frequenting adult entertainment clubs—would pay additional surcharges to the state for the benefit of our public schools.

Another mechanism included in the governor's proposal includes ending loopholes in the state's franchise tax, which permit Texas businesses to restructure as "out-of-state" limited partnership to virtually eliminate their franchise tax obligations. This tax-avoidance scheme has led to a loss of more than \$700 million in state revenue over the last three years.

Gov. Perry contends that this taxing structure will lead to a cut in residential school property taxes (initially \$0.25 per \$100 of valuation), as well as gradual declines in both residential and business property rates over time.

The governor's plan faces significant hurdles for passage. In the first place dividing commercial and residential property into two classifications has historically been unpopular with the state's business community. Additionally, many local officials are very wary of Gov. Perry's suggestion to go beyond school finance reform and to also create local government "revenue caps". As a former mayor, I share this concern, too.

Gov. Perry's proposal and this special session is our opportunity to do something great for our schools and for our taxpayers. As your brand-new state senator, I am

approaching this special session with a great deal of enthusiasm and some inexperience. I am anxious to get involved in the detail and nuance of the current system, searching for statewide solution while mindful of the impact on West Texas. It won't be easy, but I am convinced that there is a solution out there.

As a candidate for the Texas Senate, I outlined a five-point agenda for tax and education reform that will serve as my cornerstone for any plan before the Senate. This checklist requires that any plan receiving my support must accomplish the following objectives:

It must protect local community control, significantly reduce business and homeowner school property taxes, generate sufficient revenue to being educational excellence to our schools and fairly pay our teachers; protect agricultural property tax exemptions and ensure that homeowners and property-intensive businesses do not pay more than under the current system, and receive the support of Texans in a statewide referendum.

With these basic principles in mind, my staff and I are ready to listen to you. I hope you will take an opportunity to contact my office and share with me your concerns about the current system, and any suggestions you might have for improving it. I have initiated conversations with all sixty school superintendents in Senate District 31, as well as many local business leaders and elected officials. I want to serve as your voice on the Senate floor, and any guidance or wisdom you can offer will be deeply appreciated.

In the coming weeks, it is my goal to write a series of editorials discussing the various plans for school finance reform, as well as the progress being made by the legislature on this topic. I hope that I am able to provide you constructive feedback on what the legislature is doing. And what I am doing to represent you. I look forward to hearing from you on this issue, as well as any other subject that is on your mind. My State Senate office in Austin can be contacted at 512-463-0131.

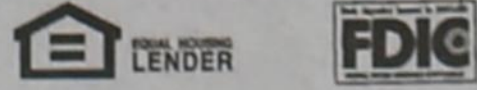

WT Searches For Centennial Author

Teachers are famous for assigning writing exercises, but Dr. Russell C. Long, West Texas A&M University president and former English professor, has come up with the granddaddy of all homework assignments—researching and writ-

ing the Centennial History of West Texas A&M University.

The finished product, a book of 300-450 pages, richly illustrated and well documented, will be released in fall 2010 for the University's centennial celebration.

"West Texas A&M University has a very rich and colorful history, and it needs to be recorded for the generations to come, Long said. "A centennial is a milestone and presents the perfect opportunity for such an endeavor."

University officials are conducting a competitive search for the centennial scholar/author. Anyone interested should send a letter of introduction, vita, sample of published work and compensation requirements by October 15 to: Centennial Book Committee, Alumni Association, WTAMU Box 60753, Canyon, TX 79016.

Finalists will be notified by January 2005 and will be asked to submit a prospectus. The final selection will be made in fall 2005.

A manuscript ready for publication is due in Dr. Long's office by January 2009.

WTAMU Inducts Local Student

West Texas A&M University's Chapter of Alpha Chi National Honor Society inducted 114 students during a ceremony Sunday, March 28.

Jodie Coker, of Friona, a Junior Pre-Physical Therapy major, was among the students inducted.

Atmos Energy Rate Increase

Friona and Bovina residents will see a 2.93% increase in their gas bills from Atmos Energy effective May 1. Both city councils have approved the increase which is less than Atmos requested. For the average residential customer the increase will be \$1.23 per month.

A steering committee composed of 66 cities negotiated with Atmos and were successful in setting the increase to 41.6% of Atmos' original request. Lubbock and Amarillo agreed to a level of 54% of the original request.

YOUR EYES

I SEE YELLOW SPOTS ON MY EYES

Individuals who spend a great deal of time in the sun, as well as wind and dust, often get a yellow spot on the whites of their eyes. The chances of having this condition also increase with age. These yellow spots are caused by a fatty deposit called a pinguecula. Although harmless, a pinguecula can become irritated, red and sore. Occasionally the yellow deposit can grow over the colored part of the eye into the cornea or the clear window-glass covering. Most pingueculae grow slowly and almost never cause significant damage, but surgery may be needed if the condition does worsen. If your pinguecula becomes irritated and sore, use a lubricating eye drop. If the soreness does not go away, or if the yellow spot begins to grow into your cornea, see your eye doctor right away.

Protecting the eyes from sunlight, dust, and other environmental irritants is the best way to prevent this condition. You can help shield your eyes and decrease irritation by wearing good-quality, wraparound sunglasses and a hat with a brim. Patients should speak to their eye-care professionals about protective coatings on sunglasses or regular spectacles to eliminate UV rays.

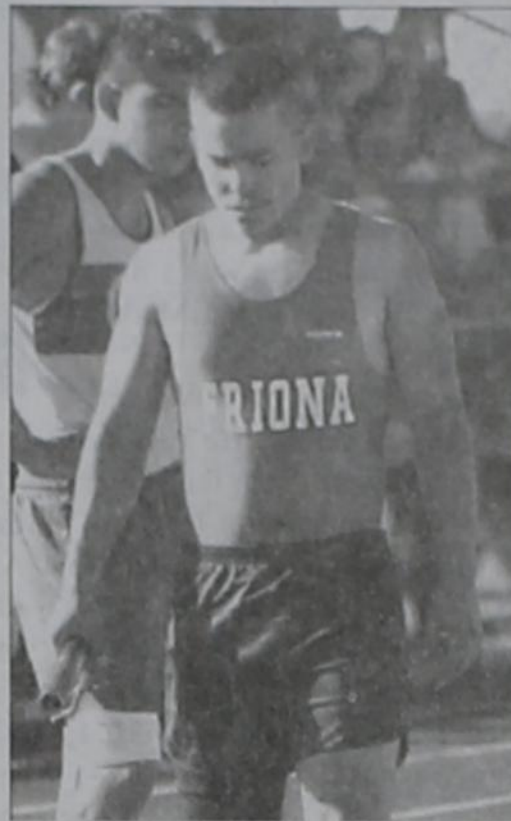

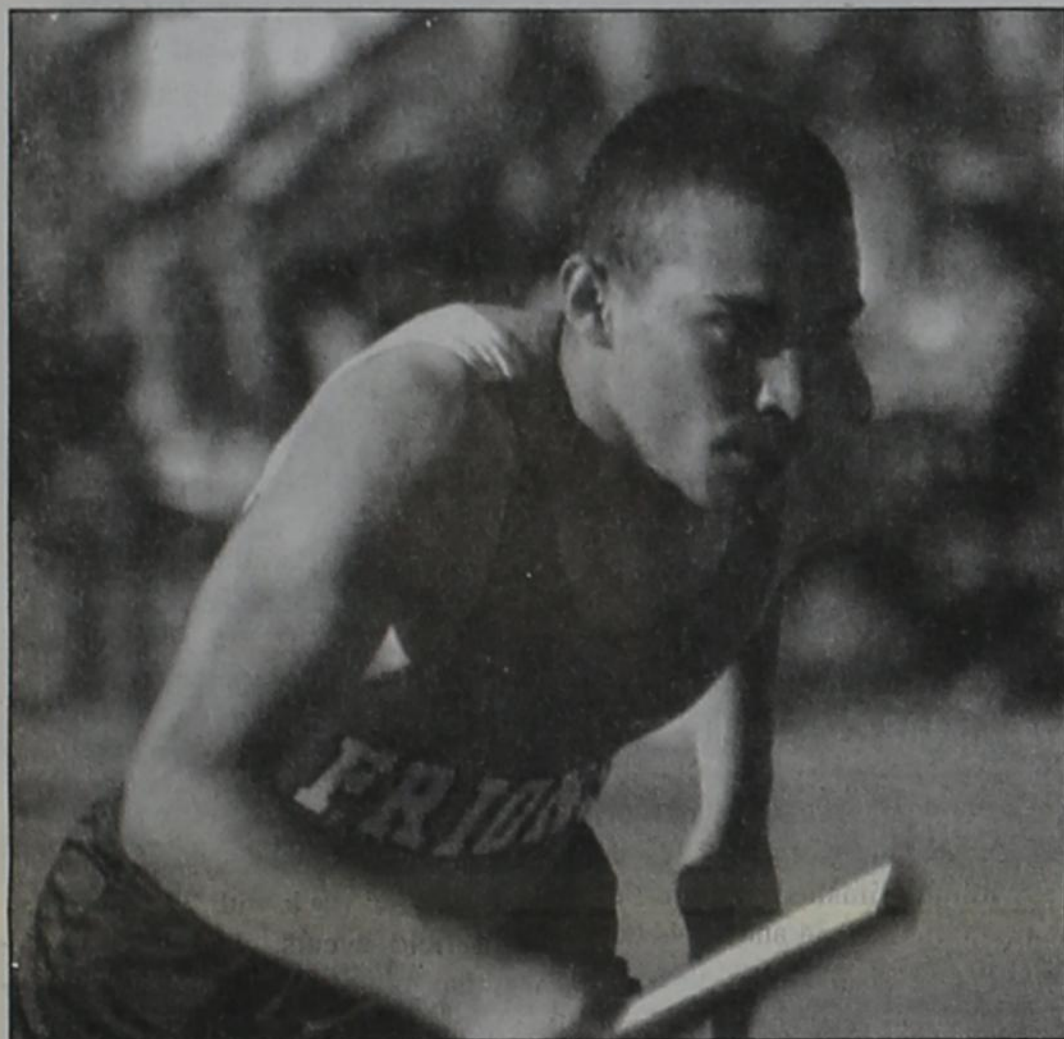

Dolph Smith Moten

Graveside services for Dolph Smith Moten, 69, were held Saturday, April 17, 2004 at Smith Cemetery in Oakalla, Texas with Bro. Stephen Schmidt, pastor of Grace United Methodist, officiating. Arrangements were under the direction of Sheppard Funeral Home.

He died on Wednesday, April 14, 2004.

Dolph was born June 6, 1934 in Oakalla, the first-born son of Homer and Lois Moten. He grew up on Rocky Creek, hunting, fishing, and playing ball. He graduated from high school in Lampasas and went to Texas A&M College, taking a degree in agricultural journalism in 1955.

Barely 21 and equipped with little more than an Aggie education and a lot of ambition, he struck out for the High Plains. He worked on newspapers for a year or two before settling in a little cow town near the New Mexico border.

There, he started a weekly newspaper that he dubbed the Bovina Blade. The Blade became the driving focus for a small group of farmers and merchants to build a community—growing schools and paved roads, Little League baseball and Bull Town Days, which drew 3,000 people from surrounding communities each summer. Each week, the young editor and publisher wrote a page-one column called Whittlin', in which he opined on politics, agriculture, sports, and the hardscrabble nature of life in West Texas.

While leading this community, he also found time to marry Sue Hoffer, with whom he had two children, Mat and Beth.

In the early 1970s, he sold the Blade and moved with his family back to Central Texas. Here, he started a new phase of his life as a homebuilder and rancher. He learned his business from his partners and associates, riding the boom and bust of the Texas Real Estate market for three decades. Customers and subcontractors know that Dolph was always figuring out how to make the deal work. He was thinking out of the box long before business analysts invented the term.

His second wife, Neva, helped him through good times and hard times. Dolph was a people person. He learned early that folks would read the newspaper if they thought their names might be in it. Bovinans soon learned that they couldn't afford to miss the Blade, as the names of their friends and neighbors and their children were sure to be in that week's issue.

Later, he never thought of himself as a building contractor, but as a homebuilder, helping to provide shelter to his new neighbors, one people pleasing home at a time.

Just before he left home for West Texas, his Grandmother told him that it was all right if he wanted to try this newspaper business for a while, but they would all feel easier if he had a few cows. All his life, whatever else he did, Dolph was a rancher.

His soul resides in this land and with the cattle that graze it. He was an entrepreneur, a journalist, a cowboy, a risk-taker, a deal-maker, a domino-player, an auctioneer, and a wit. Most of all, he was a man of the people.

Survivors include his wife, Neva, of Copperas Cove, Texas; his mother, Lois Moten of Oakalla, Texas; one son, Matthew Moten and wife Margaret of West Point, New York; one daughter, Beth Moten Reuther and husband Alan

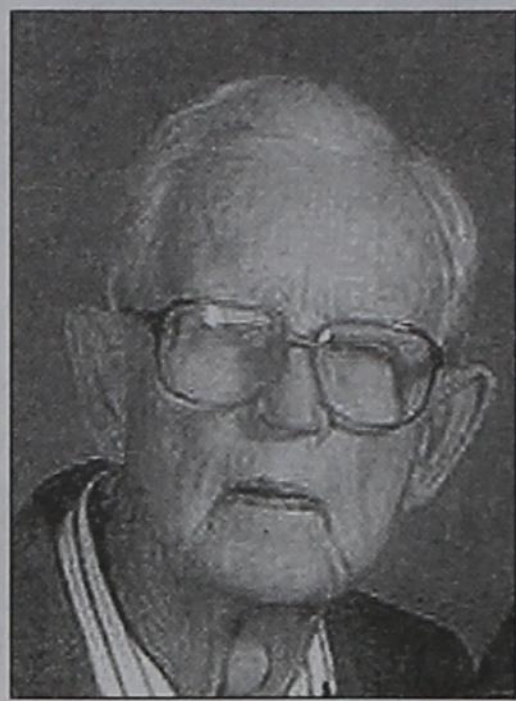

Parmer Co. Receives April Sales Tax

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Strayhorn sent April sales tax allocations of \$199.1 million to Texas cities, up 11.2 percent compared to April 2003. Calendar year-to-date, city sales tax allocations are running 8.7 percent higher than last year. Texas counties received sales tax payments of \$16.7 million, up 7.3 percent compared to one year ago. Calendar year-to-date, county sales tax allocations are 6.7 percent higher than last year.

Parmer County's April 2004 payment totaled \$27,580 broken down as Bovina \$4,004; Farwell \$4,287; and Friona \$19,289. In April 2003, the tax payment total was \$19,017.

Comparing April 2003 to April 2004 tax receipts, Bovina is down -1.47%, Farwell is up 4.32%, and Friona is up 77.87%, accounting for the overall increase in monthly tax revenue of 45.02%.

For the year 2004, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$130,738 compared to \$107,667 for the same period last year. For the year, Bovina tax revenue is down -7.44%, Farwell is up 12.12%, and Friona is up 33.16%, for an overall increase of 21.42% for the county.

NCC Seeking 2004-05 Cotton Leadership Class Applicants

Neugebauer Leads Fund-Raising

Congressman Randy Neugebauer maintained a strong fund-raising lead in his re-election bid for the 19th District Congressional race, according to the recent reports filed with the Federal Election Commission.

Taxing Texans

Fifty billion dollars... That's how much Americans will see through higher refunds and lower payments this tax season. Those savings are a direct result of last year's sweeping tax relief, which is putting more money back into the pockets of hard working Americans, creating new jobs and growing the U.S. economy.

A Strengthening Economy

The last few years have been rife with the ingredients of an economic disaster, but despite a recession, terrorist attacks at home and abroad, corporate scandals and war, our economy is getting stronger. Inflation, interest and mortgage rates are new historic lows and homeownership is at the highest level ever. Stock market wealth has increased by more than \$4 trillion in the last year, and unemployment has dropped to 5.6 percent recently—below the average rate of the 1970s, 1980s and 1990s.

Making the Tax Relief Permanent

These numbers are good and they are getting better. But the positive news could be short lived unless Congress acts to make the tax relief permanent. Unfortunately, when we passed the Jobs and Growth Act in 2003 we were forced to put sunset on the tax cuts and many of them will begin to fade away at the end of this year. After December 31, 2004, the expansion of the 10 percent bracket and alternative minimum tax relief will disappear. Even more frustrating is the fact that the marriage penalty—one of the most egregious elements

of our tax code—is coming back, unless we act again.

The Marriage Penalty

One of my highest priorities in the U.S. Senate has been to relieve American taxpayers of the punitive marriage penalty. Last year we raised the standard deduction and enlarged the 15-percent tax bracket for married joint filers to twice that of single filers. This provision will save 34 million married couples an average of almost \$600 on this year's tax bills. But, in 2005, marriage will again be a taxable event for millions of Americans. Without relief, 48 percent of married couples will again pay more in taxes. While I continue my efforts to make marriage penalty relief permanent, I have introduced legislation to extend last year's victory for married couples for one year, through 2005. We must make sure we do not backtrack on this important reform.

Fairness for Texans

As we look at making the tax relief permanent, we must also strive to ensure basic fairness for all Americans. Unfortunately, for the

last two decades Texans have been singled out by the federal government. In 1986, a landmark tax reform law eliminated the deduction for state and local sales tax, but not the deduction for income tax. As a result, taxpayers from states like Texas, who pay sales tax but no income tax, have been penalized. The philosophy behind these deductions is simple and straightforward: people should not have to pay taxes on their taxes. The money given to one level of government should not be taxed by another level. I have introduced legislation to address this inequity and am hopeful my colleagues will agree that Texans—and residents from the other six states with no income tax—are not treated unfairly.

These are just a couple of the ways I am working in Washington, D.C. to restore equity to our tax codes. Hard working Texans deserve to keep more of their own money. Last year proved you know how best to spend your dollars and that tax relief creates jobs, and strengthens our economy.
