Friona launches community fund through Amarillo Area Foundation

The Amarillo Area Foundation is pleased to announce the Friona community has met their \$100,000 fundraising goal to establish the Friona, Texas Community Designated Fund. This \$100,000 will be matched by the Amarillo Area Foundation - Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation.

To celebrate the Amarillo Area Foundation's 50th anniversary in 2007, panhandle communities were challenged to raise \$50,000 locally and the amount would be matched by a grant from the Amarillo Area Foundation. The combined monies would then be used to create Donor Advised Designated

Community Funds through the Amarillo Area Foundation to benefit programs that meet needs in the respective communities.

Response to the Community Fund program has been extraordinary. In light of unprecedented fundraising efforts by communities throughout the panhandle, the Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation agreed to match an additional \$50,000 of community fund contributions made by December 31, 2007. This brought the total match potential to \$100,000 for communities such as Friona that met their fundraising goal by the end of 2007.

The Friona, Texas Community Designated Fund will function much like a mini foundation for the community. An advisory committee has been established to assess needs and to make recommendations to the Amarillo Area Foundation Board of Directors for disbursement of funds. These funds also provide the seed money for the community to build a legacy for the future through growth of the principle.

The Amarillo Area Foundation views the Community Funds program as a way to bring community leaders together to address the most critical areas in need of funding.

The Foundations sees this as a way to leverage additional dollars and to increase impactful grantmaking. As of December 31, 2007, 23 funds have been established by Panhandle communities. The community fundraising efforts combined with the Foundation match bring the total in community funds to \$4.5 million.

The Friona, Texas Community Designated Fund will accept contributions at all times with donations made to the Amarillo Area Foundation and restricted for your community fund. All donations are tax deductible according to the limits of the law.

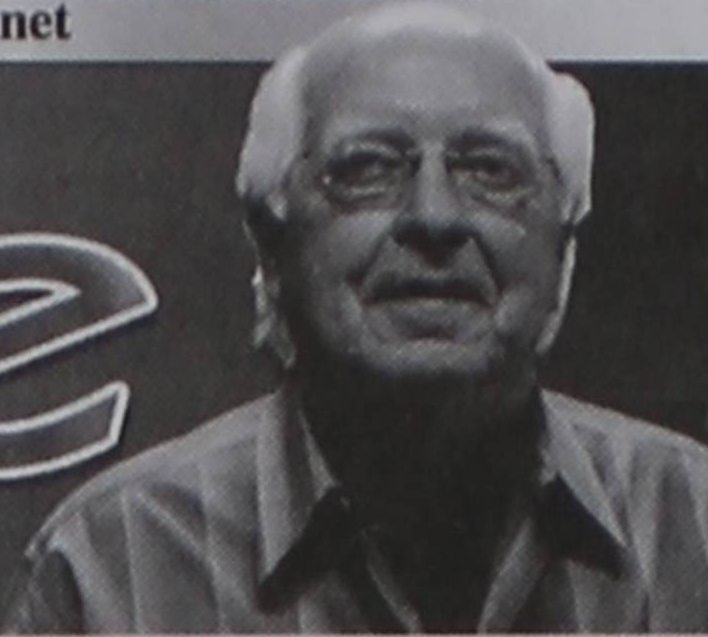

Chili with celery and butter beans?

Everybody has their own idea about good chili. I don't think real chili has beans in it but some folks say beans are okay. During my Dallas days we had an annual chili cookoff to benefit the Leukemia Society. They were a lot of fun and turned out some mighty fine chili.

Sometimes people are liberal in applying the name "chili" to certain recipes. This is one of those. It is called Touchdown Italian Chili, furnished via email by the Family Features Syndicate. They send us weekly food suggestions and recipes. Whoever designed this chili recipe has probably never worn a pair of boots or had a bowl of real chili.

Thought I would share it with you because it is a weird combination of ingredients neatly disguised as real chili. To me it is more like Italian stew.

Touchdown Italian Chili

Servings 12
Prep 35 minutes - Cook 20 minutes

- 1 pkg (19.76 ozs) Johnsonville Italian sausage links
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 3 celery ribs, cut into 1/2 inch pieces
- 1 ea. lg sweet red, yellow, & green pepper, cut into 1-inch strips
- 1 tbsp minced garlic
- 3 tbsp olive oil
- 3 cans (14 1/2 ozs ea) Italian recipe stewed tomatoes
- 1 can (16 oz) dark red kidney beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 can (15 oz) butter beans, rinsed and drained
- 1 can (6 oz) tomato paste
- 3/4 cup sliced black olives
- 1/4 cup cream sherry (optional)
- 1 tbsp chopped fresh basil
- 1 1/2 tsp baking cocoa
- 1/2 to 1 tsp pepper

Grill Italian sausage according to package instructions; cut into half moon slices and set aside. In soup kettle, saute onion, celery, sweet peppers and garlic in oil until tender. Add sausage and remaining ingredients; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 20 minutes or until flavors are blended. Sprinkle chili with grated or Parmesan cheese.

While visiting with the Parkers, Jan told Carol and I that while she was in college, she trained in a number of subjects. "I thought we'd probably be moving around quite a lot, and I needed to be prepared in as many fields as possible," she said.

Well, the Parkers didn't "move around much", but Jan added that it seemed like she was often called on by her husband to take whatever position he was having trouble filling. "So, my preparation to teach in many fields paid off, after all," she stated.

We hate to lose the Parkers. They have made a positive impact on our community. Good luck and Godspeed as you begin your well-deserved retirement!

New name for Texas Co-op Extension

You can still call it the County Extension office but the Texas Cooperative Extension offices across the state now have a new name: Texas AgriLife Extension Service. The Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations have been renamed Texas AgriLife Research.

The research arm of the Texas A&M conducts more than \$150 million in agriculture and life sciences research in areas like improving food and fiber production and enhancing human and animal health.

The Texas AgriLife Extension offices serve all 254

Texas counties providing non-biased, research based education programs and services in agriculture and natural resources, 4-H and youth development, family and consumer sciences, and community economic development.

"We are making these changes to better communicate the life-sustaining and life-changing impacts that both AgriLife Research and AgriLife Extension deliver to the people of Texas and beyond," said Dr. Mark Hussey, director of AgriLife Research. Both agencies remain members of the Texas A&M University system.

"This is more than a name change, or even a new logo design," said Dr. Ed Smith, director of AgriLife Extension. "These new brands will impact not only our marketing materials and signage but also the way we position and prioritize our programs and work with our federal, state, and county partners to serve the state of Texas. It is vitally important to tell our story and that people connect our agencies to the tremendous impacts they have on the state."

AgriLife Research, established in 1887, employs 425 scientists on the campus of

A&M University and at 13 centers across the state. They have developed many innovative advances including the 1015 onion and TAM mild jalapeno pepper.

AgriLife Extension, established in 1915, provides Texans with continuing education programs and services. More than 900 professional educators team with some 90,000 volunteers to serve families, youth, communities, and businesses throughout the state. About 600,000 children participate in Extension's 4-H and youth development programs.

Comptroller sends sales tax

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs announced that the state collected \$1.83 billion in sales tax revenue in December, up 9.1 percent compared to December 2006.

"Since the state's 2008 fiscal year began last September, sales tax collections are up 7.3 percent compared to the same point in fiscal 2007," Combs said. "While increases have moderated compared to those of the past two years, solid sales tax growth continues."

December state sales tax collections and January allocations to local governments represent sales that occurred in November.

Parmer County's January 2008 payment totaled \$32,535.87, broken down as Bovina \$5,756.02; Farwell \$5,749.32; and Friona \$21,030.53. In January 2007, the tax payment total was \$38,113.73.

Comparing tax receipts from the same period last year, payments were down -14.63%, broken down as Bovina down -5.52%; Farwell down -27.72; and Friona down -12.61%.

For the year, Parmer County cities have received a total of \$32,535.87 as compared to \$38,113.73 for the same period last year, a -14.63% change.

The comptroller's next sales tax allocation will be made on Friday, February 8, 2008.

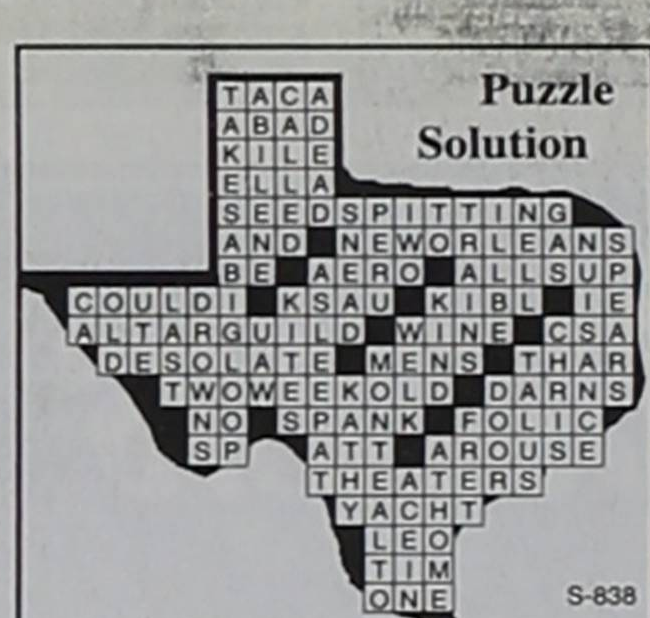

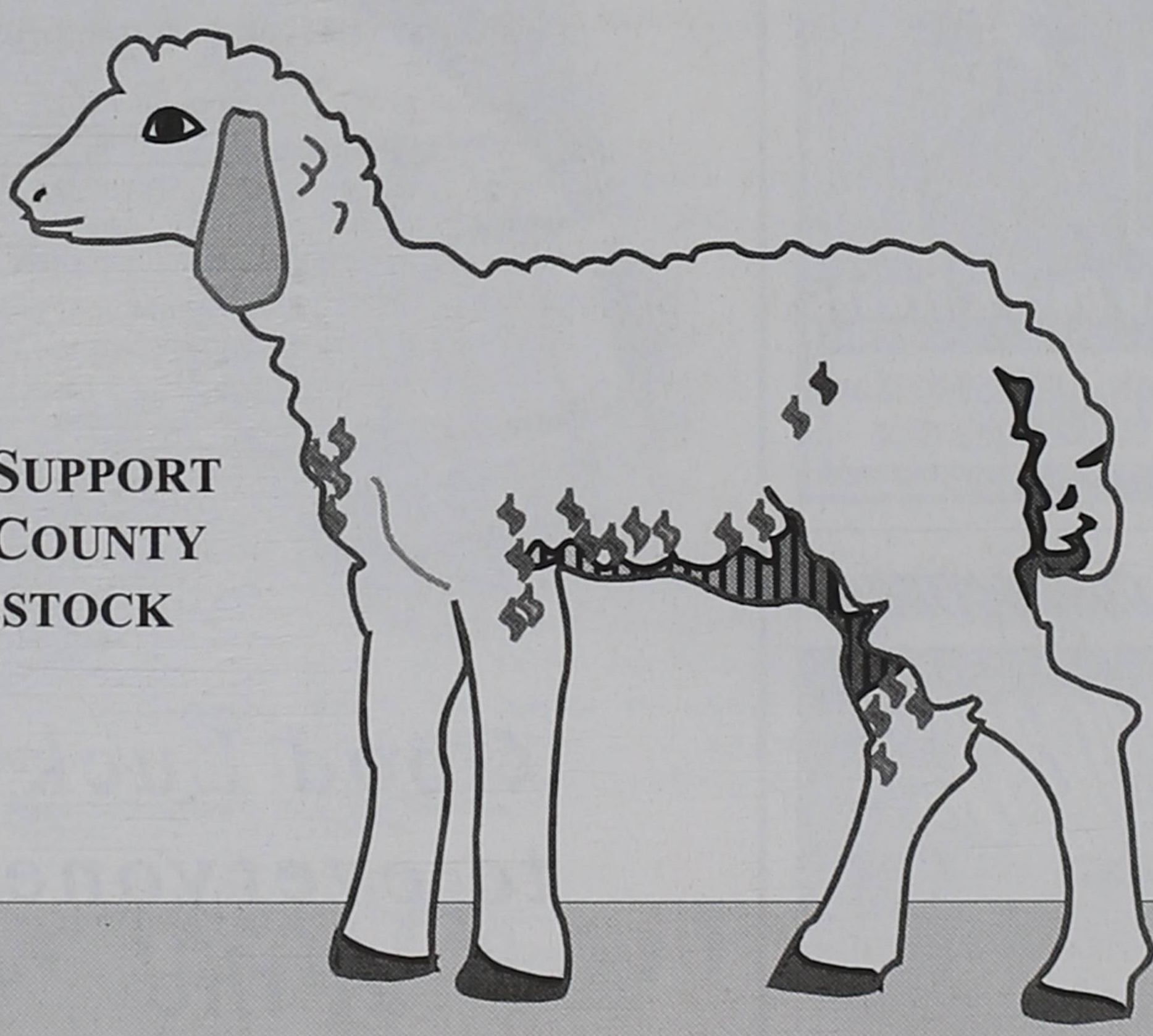

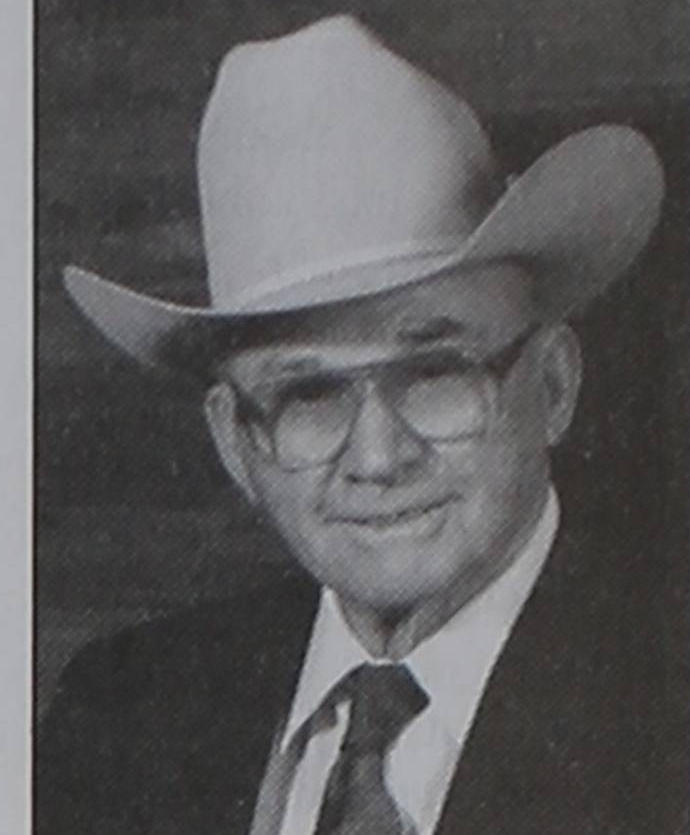

Scholarship applications available from WTRTC

West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative marks its 11th year of assisting the education of deserving applicants when it awards scholarships funded through unclaimed capital credit checks once again in 2008.

Application forms for these academic scholarships to be awarded by the Cooperative will be available at the WTRTC business office beginning January 14, and will remain available through the April 4 application deadline.

Those applying must be high school seniors who will graduate in the spring of 2008, have completed high school, or have received their GED.

High school seniors who will be graduating in May, college students or college-minded individuals whose parents or guardians are

WTRTC members, or who are WTRTC members themselves, are eligible to apply for the scholarships to be awarded this spring.

Applicants, their parents, or guardians must be WTRTC members and have residences served by WTRTC telephone prefixes. These include the Tharp exchange-225; the Dawn exchange-258; the Frio exchange-276; the Hub exchange-265; the Westway exchange-289; the Parmer exchange-295; the Summerfield exchange-357; the Milo Center exchange-578; and the Oklahoma Lane exchange-825.

Bovina and Friona customers of WT Services, Inc. who do not receive phone service from one of the above listed WTRTC exchanges are not eligible.

Schools in Hereford, Friona, Farwell, Lazbuddie, Dimmitt, Adrian, and Vega could all have students eligible to apply.

The Cooperative will be sup-

plying application forms to counselor's offices at Hereford, Adrian, Bovina, Dimmitt, Friona, Farwell, Lazbuddie, and Vega.

Students in the Hereford school district, and post-high school applicants can pick up application forms at the WTRTC business office two miles south of Hereford on Highway 385.

Forms may also be picked up at the Hereford office by applicants from any of the above listed school districts.

Each application should be accompanied by two letters of recommendation.

If the applicant is a graduating senior this spring, one letter of recommendation should be from a teacher, principal, or counselor from the high school that the student is attending or recently attended.

If the applicant has been out of high school for a number of years, or is currently enrolled in a college or trade school, a letter

from a college or vocational instructor is acceptable.

Full rules of the program are provided with application forms.

Scholarships awarded by West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative may be used at any state or church-sponsored college or university. They may also be used at any accredited vocational or technical school.

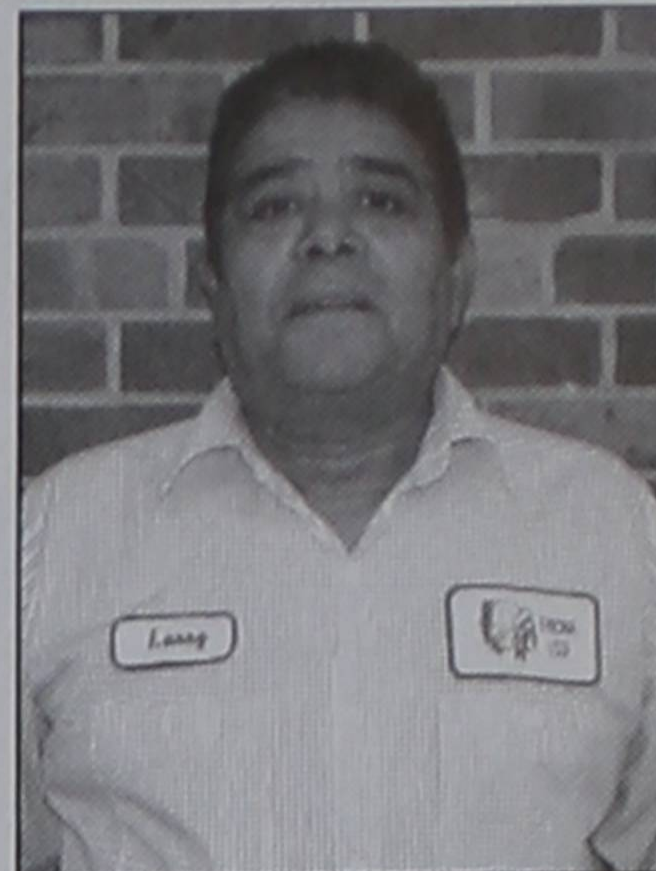
in dairy production in the STATE of TEXAS! Don't think that our local businessmen didn't see that coming.

We want to say congratulations to Ryan and Mr. Gonzales for being the December Student and Staff Member of the Month.

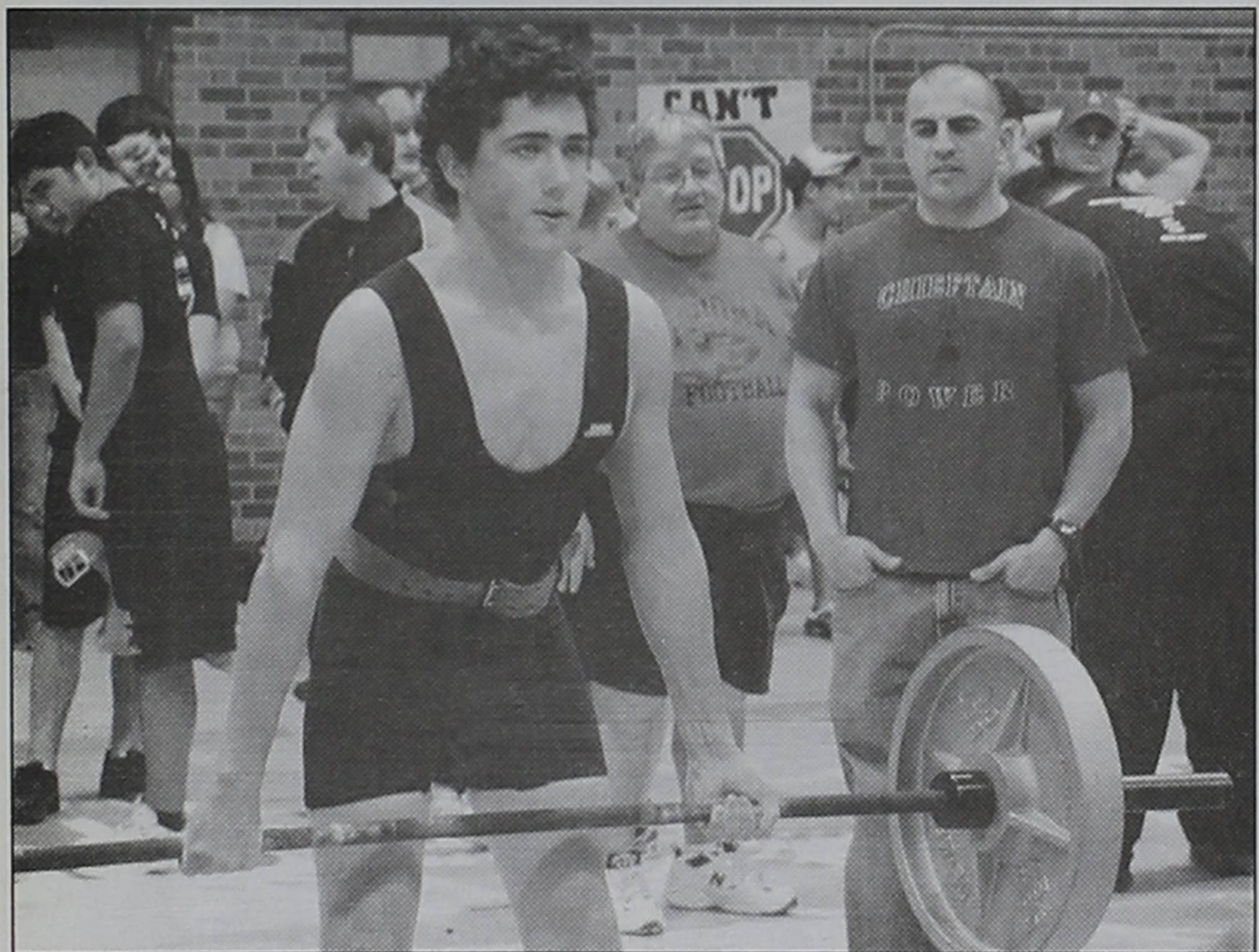
