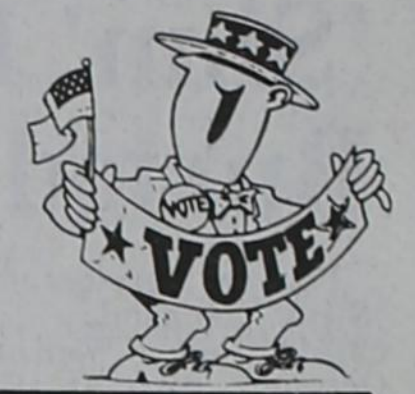

HOSTS LOCKNEY TONIGHT

FHS Gets Second Shot At Dist. Lead

There is good news and bad news about Friona's hopes to yet win their district football title.

The good part is that Floydada, who downed the Chieftains in their district opener three weeks ago, was derailed last Friday by Lockney.

The bad news is that Lockney, the Whirlwinds' old county rival, is the team Friona hosts tonight in the team's home finale. Parents night will be observed prior to the 7:30 p.m. kickoff.

Lockney rolls into Friona with a 3-0 record in district and 7-1 for the season. The Longhorns are led by sensational soph Mark Ford, one of the area's top rushers and scorers.

"He's not super fast. He's just a hard runner, like our

Nathan Haile. But Ford isn't quite as quick as Nathan," says Chieftain Coach Bob Ferguson.

The Longhorns have relied on Ford for the biggest part of their offense.

And Lockney's passing attack is practically non-existent. Coming into Friday's game, the Longhorns had thrown only four passes in their last four games--and completed only one.

"They will be bigger than us," Coach Ferguson says. One look at the Lockney roster proves that Ferguson isn't fibbing.

The Longhorns boast eight players over 200 pounds, led by 6-8 giant Landon Schumacher, who weighs in at 315 pounds at his tackle position.

Schumacher has made a living of pancaking and swatting away linemen with methodical precision. The Longhorns would have had above-average size even without their man-mountain tackle.

The Longhorns have 12 returning lettermen and all of their starters from a year ago, when Lockney had a bunch of problems, finishing fifth in district play at 2-4.

The Chieftains will be at near peak strength. Junior runningback/safety Jason Gutierrez sprained an ankle against Hale Center, and has stayed off the foot most of the week. But Gutierrez, the team's return leader, will probably play.

"We've had some good workouts this week," Ferguson said. "We stayed extra long on Tuesday, as we felt the weather might interfere later in the week."

Ferguson praised Cody Grimsley for his good defensive game against Hale Center. Grimsley had a pair of QB sacks. Rudy Gonzalez joined Gutierrez with an intercepted pass.

Voters Will Trek To Polls Tuesday

Tuesday is Election Day and although there are plenty of statewide races, there are no Parmer County contests.

Without opposition on the ballot are incumbents Gordon Green, Demo., 287th District Court Judge; Bonnie Clayton-Heald, Demo., County Judge; Sandra Warren, Republican, District Clerk; Colleen Stover, (Rep) County Clerk.

With the retirement of Anne Norton, county treasurer, the new treasurer will be Altha Herington, a Republican.

And with the retirement of Lazbuddie area county commissioner Raymond McGehee, his replacement will be Elvis Powell.

Valton Howard is unopposed as JP for the Friona area.

State races on the ballot are as follows: U.S. Senator - John Cornyn, GOP, vs. Ron Kirk, Democrat.

U.S. Representative - Larry Combest, GOP, vs. Larry Johnson, Libertarian.

Governor - Rick Perry, GOP,

vs. Tony Sanchez, Democrat. Lt. Governor - David Dewhurst, GOP, vs. John Sharp, Democrat.

Attorney General - Greg Abbott, Rep. vs. Kirk Watson, Democrat. State Comptroller, Carole Rylander, GOP, vs. Marty Akins, Democrat.

Teel Bivins, a Republican, the state senator representing Parmer County, is unopposed for re-election.

Parmer County has been represented in the state House of Representatives by Pete Laney for a number of years, but due to redistricting, the county is in the district represented by Warren Chisum, a Republican. He is unopposed for re-election.

IN EARLY OCTOBER, I was chastizing today's "millionaire baseball players," whom, I charged, were ruining the sport.

Guess what? A team that hasn't a single millionaire; in fact not even close, has just won the World Series!

How sad that longtime owner, the late Gene Autry, didn't live to see his beloved Angels finally win a World Series. In fact, they won in their first-ever appearance in baseball's Big Show, playing in what was the first all-wildcard series.

Autry, the singing cowboy of Saturday movie fame, was awarded a franchise, and his California Angels debuted in 1961, which was also the year the Texas Rangers had their start-up in Arlington, as their owners bought the former Washington Senators and moved the team to Texas.

The Angels quickly became the sentimental favorite in the '02 World Series. With the possible exception of the Minnesota Twins, the Angels may have had the lowest average salaries in the majors in the season just ended.

It may have helped save Major League Baseball from extinction in the fact that the Angels and Twins advanced to the league championship series, after the Angels eliminated the N.Y. Yankees.

While it was the California team's first-ever World Series, their opponent, San Francisco's Giants, had only been there one other time, in 1989. The Giants started out in New York. Their last World Series title was in 1954, led by the young Willie Mays, and coached by Leo Durocher.

Ye Editor, with friends Clinton Dillard, Wayne Bristow and Joe Coffey, followed the Giants that year. The team made an amazing comeback from about 20 games behind Brooklyn's Dodgers, to win the pennant after a one-game playoff. That's when I became a baseball fan. We couldn't see many games on TV at that time, but listened to the radio broadcasts!

Rounding out the Angels' 'rags to riches' season is the fact that John Lackey, 24, became the first rookie to gain a seventh-game series win in 93 years this past Sunday!

Lackey was born and raised in Abilene, Texas, where he pitched high school baseball. He wasn't even on the Angels' roster until June of this year, having started the season with the Anaheim team's AAA farm club, Salt Lake City.

Having bounced from one minor league team to another in recent years, Lackey had worked in the off-season at such jobs as a pest exterminator. His wife was working as a waitress to help the pair make ends meet.

Since his future in baseball was in doubt, the Lackeys had stored their furniture in Albuquerque, N.M., planning to get it after the season, when they'd know for sure where they would be headed. Lackey's World Series bonus may be more than he earned the rest of the 2002 season!

Last Sunday evening, the Angels' manager hoped Lackey would give the team five strong innings. The game was supposed to belong to Ramon Ortiz, but he developed tendonitis in his right wrist. Lackey, who had pitched the previous Wednesday, was moved up a notch due to the injury.

Lackey retired the first four batters he faced, including Barry Bonds. In fact, he was one of the few Angel pitchers to challenge Bonds, and got him out twice and gave up only a single to the Giants' home run king, who set homer records in spite of being walked several times during the series.

The World Series hero is bigger than he might have looked on TV, at 6-6 and 205 pounds. He had a 9-4 record for the Angels, pitching 18 games with a 3.66 earned-run average. He struck out 69 and walked only 35. He may have reminded longtime Angel fans of another Texan--Nolan Ryan, who pitched four no-hitters for Mr. Autry's team, but never got to pitch in a World Series for the Angels.

Retired City Mgr., Jake Outland Dies

Retired Friona City Manager Arley L. "Jake" Outland, 87, died Wednesday, October 30, at Parmer County Community Hospital.

A memorial service is planned at a later date.

Outland came to Friona where he became city manager on October 15, 1961. He served in that capacity until his retirement in January of 1982.

He served as Friona City Manager during the city's largest growth period, including the development of Western Addition, Welch Acres, and Lakeside Addition.

Outland was born May 27, 1915, in Wewoka, Oklahoma. He married Lorene Kersey June 18, 1939 in Wewoka. She died December 14, 1997.

He served in the U.S. Army during World War II. He attained the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, serving in the Pacific Theatre. Following the war, Outland was stationed in Japan where he helped oversee the rebuilding of that country, heavily damaged by the atomic bomb.

Outland was a member of the Friona Masonic Lodge #1332, being past Worshipful Master; the Khiva Shrine of Amarillo and Scottish Rite in El Paso.

He also had been a 41-year member of the Friona Evening Lions, serving as district cabinet secretary on two occasions. He was named Friona's Man of the Year in 1969.

He was a member of the Friona United Methodist Church.

Besides his wife, Outland was preceded in death by a

brother, Hank Outland, Sr., September 21, 1985.

Survivors include daughters Lorna Lydem of Broken Arrow, Oklahoma and Linda Mannix of Durango, Colorado; a son, Robert Outland of Denver, Colorado, and a sister, Mary Wells of Friona.

Also surviving are six grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Hudson died Saturday, October 26, at Parmer County Community Hospital.

He was born May 22, 1925, at Willow, Oklahoma. He married Melba Martin March 13, 1947. She passed away February 25, 1989. He then married Marquitta Wall August 1, 1992, in Clovis, N.M.

Hudson moved to Friona from Hereford in 1971. He had been a working Cowboy in this area for a number of years. He served in the U.S. Navy during World War II.

He was a member of Calvary Baptist Church, Friona.

Survivors include his wife Marquitta of the home; four sons, Frank and Alice Hudson of Hereford; Randy and

75 Yrs Ago-Oct. 28, 1927

County Treasurer, Mrs. Minnie O. Aldridge, reports that Parmer County has recently recovered \$25,000 of the funds lost by the county through the failure of a Farwell bank during the year 1921. Of this amount, \$18,531 has already been returned to the county by the state. This amount has been divided among the various county and school funds in proportion to the amount lost by each. Friona-\$514.00, Bovina \$763.92, Farwell-\$798.66, District No. 15-\$202.62, and Common Schools \$351.83.

70 Yrs Ago-Nov. 4 1932

There is a proposed amendment to the state constitution to be voted on next Tuesday making it constitutional for the state legislature, if it chooses to do so, to elect to hold a Texas Centennial honoring the pioneer days of Texas's early history.

It is apparent that several more days of fair weather will be necessary for all the farmers living in the south and southeast parts of the county to get all their crops safely harvested.

60 Yrs Ago-Oct. 30, 1942

A new outlet for producers of soy beans in this district will soon be available, with the announcement today that The West Texas Cottonoil Co. of Littlefield has entered into a contract with the Commodity Credit Corporation for the processing of this important commodity.

50 Yrs Ago-Oct. 30, 1952

In a down-to-earth address covering topics ranging from "How to Beat the Depression" to "How to Raise Our Children" Dr. James P. Cornette, president of West Texas State College at Canyon, talked before over a hundred members of the Parmer County Farm Bureau Monday night at Bovina. The occasion was the annual meeting of that body.

Local FHA members are preparing for observance November 2-8 of Future Homemakers of America Week, nationally designated and also locally proclaimed by Mayor Allen.

45 Yrs Ago-Oct. 31, 1957

"Our epidemic of influenza is on the wane," reports Dr. Paul Spring, county health officer. With the coming of several days of fair weather, the heavy incidence of flu is decreasing, with the exception of the Lazbuddie Community, where the illness just struck and started to spread early this week.

Reeve Chevrolet is observing an open house, in the showing of the 1958 Chevrolet models. Glenn Reeve, Sr., owner, announces that coffee and doughnuts will be served during the day today, and he invites friends, customers and other persons to come by and get acquainted with the new car.

40 Yrs Ago-Nov. 1, 1962

Friona's United Fund Campaign for 1962 set its budget and kickoff date in a meeting this week. A goal of \$6,930 was established by

the committee, which met Monday evening at the Community Room of Friona State Bank.

A national marketing quota of 14,367,000 bales (standard bales of 500 pounds gross weight) and a national acreage allotment of 16 million acres have been announced for the 1963 crop of upland cotton by the United States Department of Agriculture.

35 Yrs Ago-Nov. 2, 1967

Hi-Plains Feed Yards, Inc., one of the newest and most modern custom cattle feeding operations in the Southwest, will hold an open house on Sunday between the hours of 3 and 5 p.m. The new addition to the cattle industry will pump millions of dollars into the Friona area's economy each year.

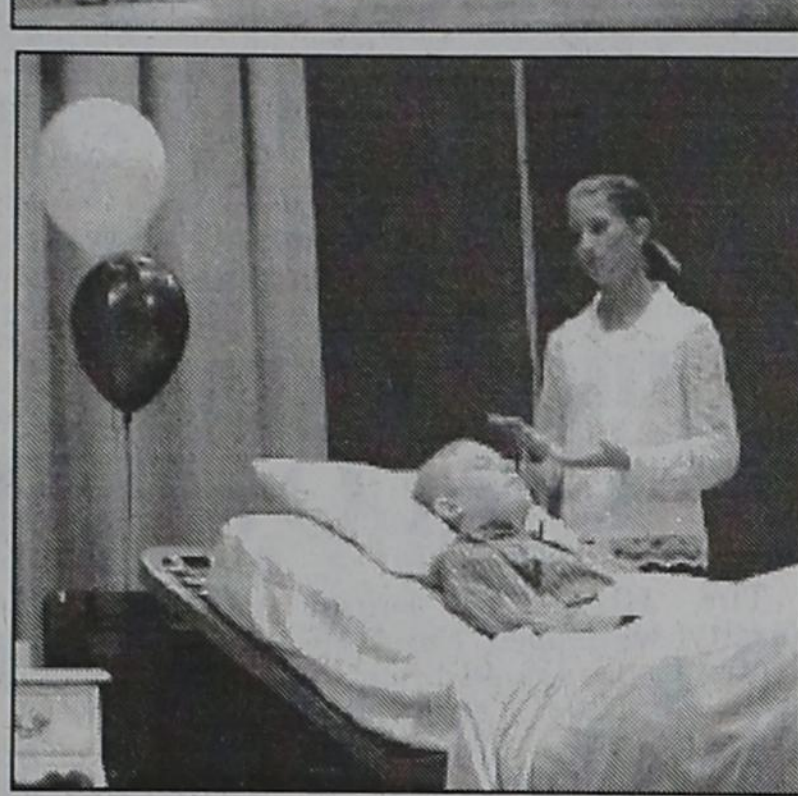
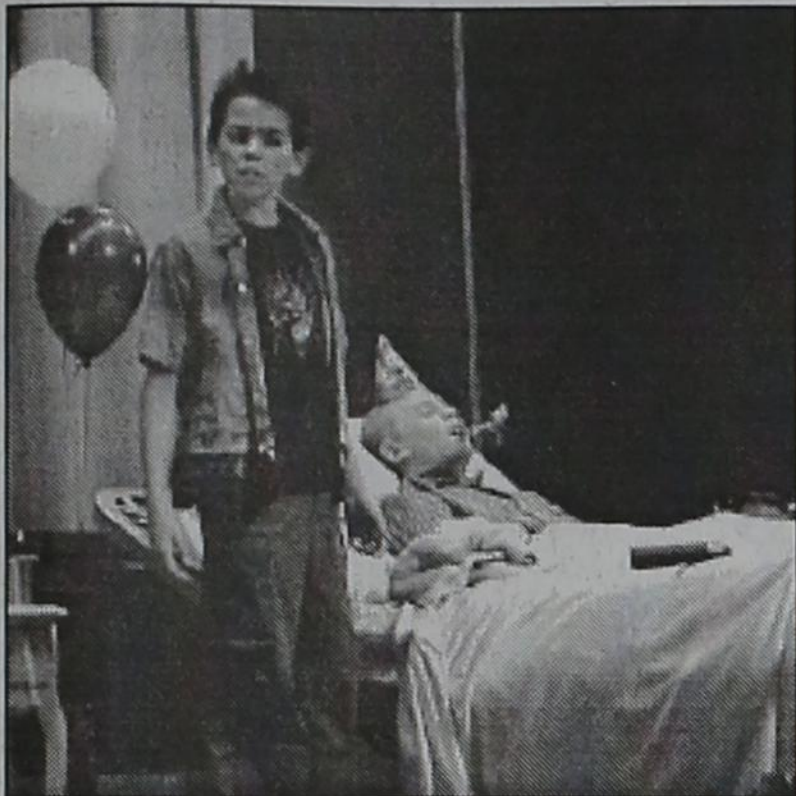
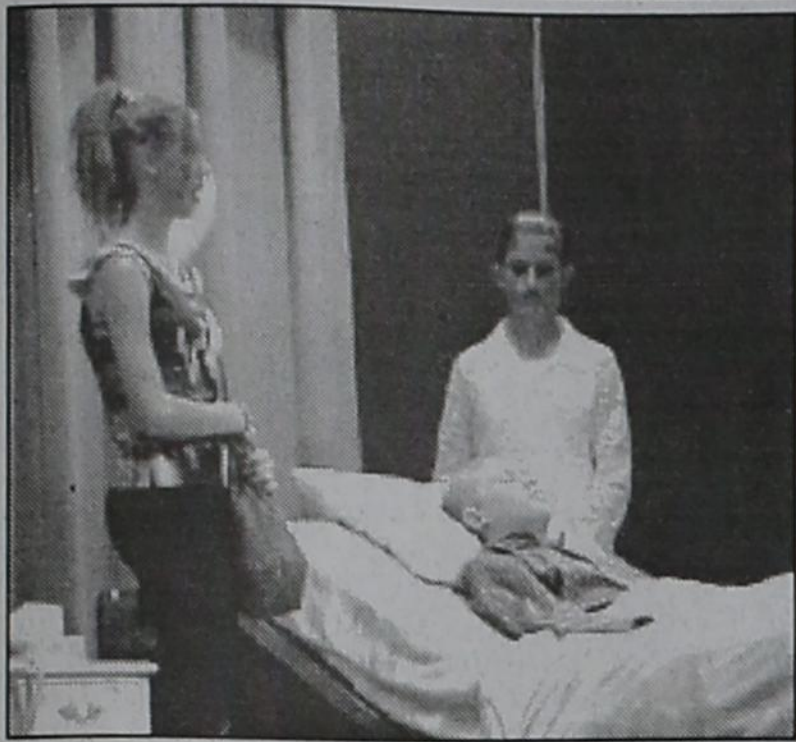
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Jr. High Play To Compete In Olton Nov. 2

County Angus Breeder Recognized In Report

Tim & Lea Lust, of Lazbuddie, Texas, own one bull listed in the 2002 Fall Sire Evaluation Report published by the American Angus Association headquartered in St. Joseph, Missouri. Issued in both the spring and fall, the new report features the latest performance information available on 6,362 sires. The report is accessible at www.angus.org.

This report provides both Angus breeders and commercial cattle producers using Angus genetics with accurate, predictable selection tools for improving their herd," says Bill Bowman, American Angus Association director of performance programs. Expected Progeny Differences (EPDs) are generated from the performance database of the American Angus Association,

which includes information submitted by more than 7,500 Angus breeders this past year through the Angus Herd Improvement Records (AHIR) program.

EPDs are available for 17 traits including birth weight, weaning weight, milk, yearling weight and height, mature daughter weight and height, and scrotal circumference. Carcass progeny measures generate EPDs on carcass weight, marbling, rib eye area, external fat thickness and percent retail product. Ultrasound body composition data also generates end product predictors for rib eye area, intramuscular fat percentage, fat thickness and percent retail product. The semi-annual analysis for the sire evaluation report is conducted at Iowa State University.

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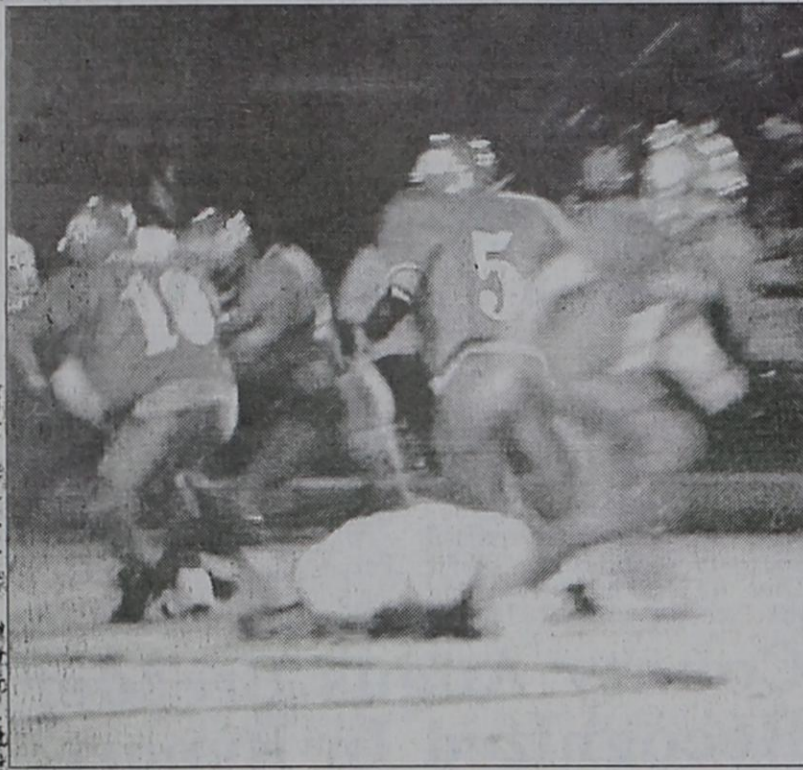
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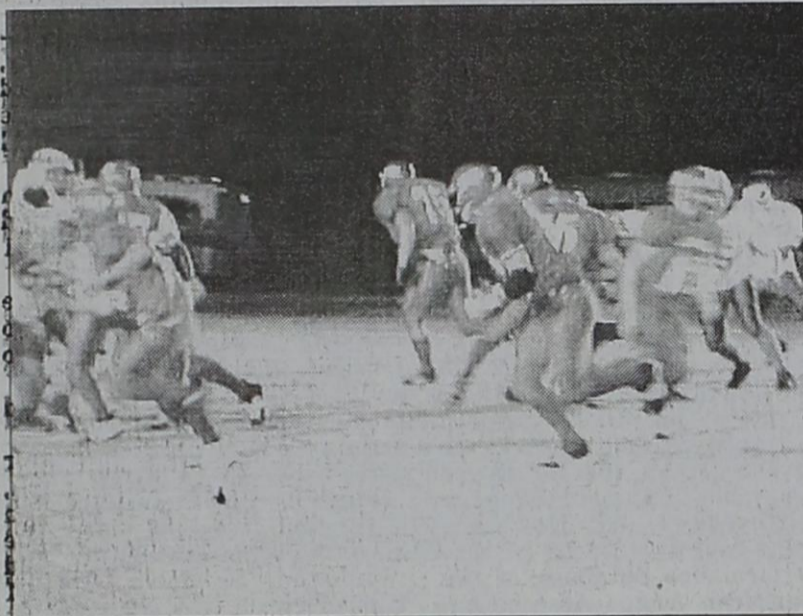

Chieftain Offense Overpowers Owls

In what turned out to be their best offensive showing of the season, the Chieftain offense churned out their most yardage of the season in beating Hale Center here last Friday, 34-21.

The Chieftains rolled to 353 yards by land and 85 by air, a grand total of 438 yards, as the team avenged a loss at Hale Center a year ago, which dashed their district title hopes.

"Our offense looked a LOT better. If we can continue improving on that, and the defense also improves, we'll be all right," said Coach Bob Ferguson.

But for the second time in a row, the Chieftains allowed their opponents to have the early lead.

Winning the toss and deferring backfired on Friona, when the Owls' speedster, Willie Joe Johnson, carried four times out of five and got in the open on a 25-yard pass play for a touchdown with only 2:12 elapsed in the opening period. The kick gave the visitors a 7-0 lead.

Jason Gutierrez gave Friona great field position, returning the kickoff to the Friona 44. The Chieftains drove to the Hale Center 33, where Nathan Haile was stopped about a foot short of the first down marker.

Friona sacked Owl QB Danny Ortiz twice, by Cody Grimsley and Eduardo Godoy, to force a punt. The Chieftains put the ball in play at their 36.

Chiefs' QB Brock Field hooked up with Adam Bandy for 28 yards to the Hale Center 32 on his first pass attempt. Bandy then gave Friona a first down at the 20.

A "motion" penalty slowed the drive, but Field gained it back with a six-yard run. He then passed eight yards to Gutierrez, who made a nice catch for a first and goal at the Hale Center six. On the next play, Field rolled out, saw Nathan Haile open in the end zone, and fired a perfect strike for a TD. Brian Wiseman's kick was true, and the score was tied, 7-7.

Friona's score had come with one second left in the opening period.

The Chiefs again held the Owls to minus yards on three plays and forced a punt. Johnson boomed a kick that went 60 yards to the Friona 22.

Field ran 11 yards on a keeper. His "second effort" got Friona a first down. On fourth and two from the Hale Center 48, Bandy picked his way six yards to keep the drive alive.

Haile gained 18 yards on three carries as the drive reached the Owls' 28. Two plays later, Field found Bandy over the middle on a pass play, and the senior, playing only his third game of the season, outran his defenders to the end zone on a 28-yard scoring play. Wiseman's kick gave Friona the lead at 14-7.

A roughing the kicker penalty on Friona gave the Owls a first down, but on their first play Rudy Gonzalez intercepted a pass to hand the ball back to the Chieftains.

On Friona's first play, Haile crashed through the line, found himself in the secondary and outran all defenders for a 42-yard touchdown run. A high snap caused the kick to fail, but Friona had hiked its lead to 20-7 with 1:47 left in the half.

Putting the ball in play at their 36, the Owls showed they can be a big play team.

QB Ortiz ran 14 yards on a keeper play, then passed for 15 as the Owls reached the Friona 35. Two plays later, Johnson took the ball, turned the corner and raced 24 yards for his second touchdown. The kick made it a 20-14 game, and that was the halftime score.

In the third quarter, Hale Center drove from their 32 to the Friona 21, making three first downs along the way.

But defensive safety Jason Gutierrez picked off a pass in

the Friona end zone and ran it 35 yards to the Friona 30 to end the scoring threat.

Gutierrez' INT and nice run fired up the Chiefs' offense. Bandy ran 12 yards, Haile bolted for 21, Bandy added 13, Gutierrez 9, as the Chiefs reached the Owls' 31.

That's when Bandy got loose on a 31-yard touchdown run, zig-zagging his way into the Hale Center end zone. Haile took a pitchout and raced into the end zone for a two-pointer, and Friona had hiked its lead to 28-14.

Friona forced the Owls to punt, and had the ball at their 14 after another monster punt from Johnson.

On third down, a Field-to-Haile pitchout went awry, and Hale Center recovered at the Chieftain 15, on the second play of the final quarter.

Three plays later, Johnson ran it in from the nine, and Ortiz' kick made it a 28-21 game with 9:54 left to play.

The Chieftains made another quick drive. Sergio Saenz returned the kickoff to the Friona 43 for starters.

Field's 21-yard run moved the ball to the Owls' 25.

Haile got the ball four straight times, gaining ten, six and five, the final run being for a touchdown. The kick failed, but Friona had an insurance TD and a 34-21 lead with 6:51 remaining.

A potential Owl drive was halted when Gutierrez recovered a fumble at the Chieftain 26.

Haile gave Friona a first down, and was replaced in the backfield by Saenz. The sophomore carried the ball six times out of seven plays, making another first down and eating up 4:13 of clock time.

October Ends Wettest Month

A total of 3.37 inches of moisture fell in Friona during October, making it the wettest month of 2002. A total of 7.18 inches have been received since August 1.

The area had its first freeze on October 30, when the temp fell to 30 degrees.

Neill's INT. Run Is Corrected For Record

The Friona Star would like to apologize to senior running back/linebacker Corbin Neill for having listed his pass interception return against Olton in error.

After re-checking the game video, we found that Neill's run should have been 61 yards, not 35 as we first reported.

While we were at it, we checked our records on interception returns, and Neill's run is tenth on the list (for yardage) for as far back as 1980, and possibly since 1964.

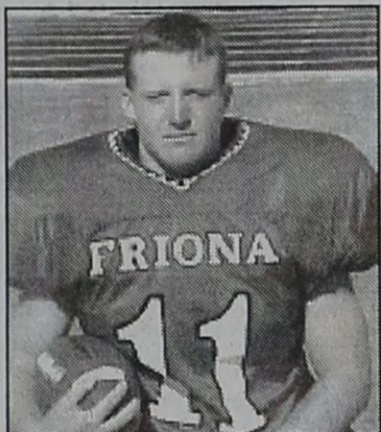
Two other members of the current Chieftain team, Nathan Haile and Adam Bandy are also on the list, both having interception returns of 68 yards.

The unusual thing about Bandy's and Haile's returns are that they happened in consecutive games in 2001. We checked game statistics in every game since 1980, which amounts to 257 Friona games.

So--having three members of the current team in the "top ten" is somewhat unusual. In fact, more than unusual. Haile and Joseph Bandy are on the list twice.

Following are the runs we ranked. Exact yardage, or even interceptions aren't available for a number of years prior to 1962, and Int. yardage isn't given on several games since '62.

Former Chieftain Nelson Jackson holds not only the all-time Friona record, but the state record, for his 109 yard run with an INT in 1980 against Olton. This is also a record which cannot be broken--it's as far as a player can officially run.

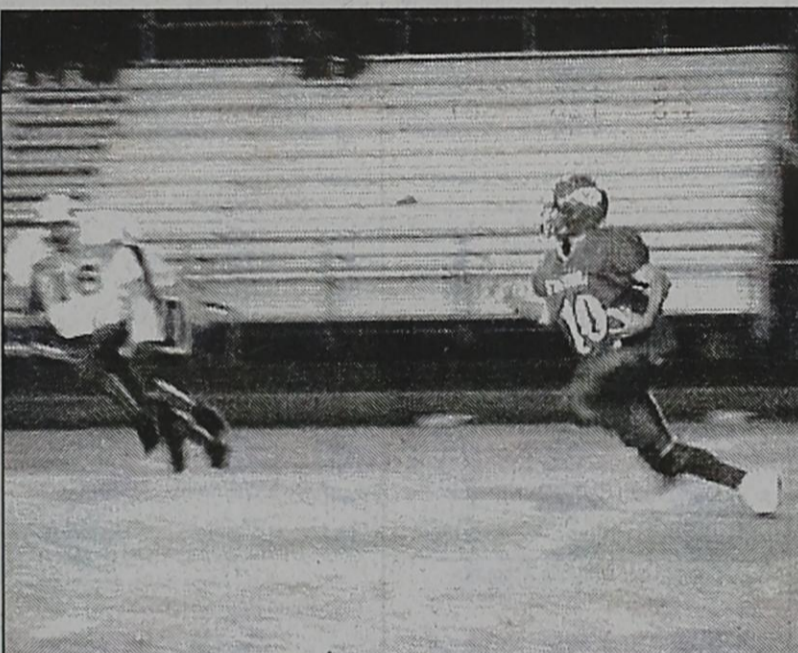
The 5-2A district cross country meet was held at Mac Simmons Field in Lubbock.

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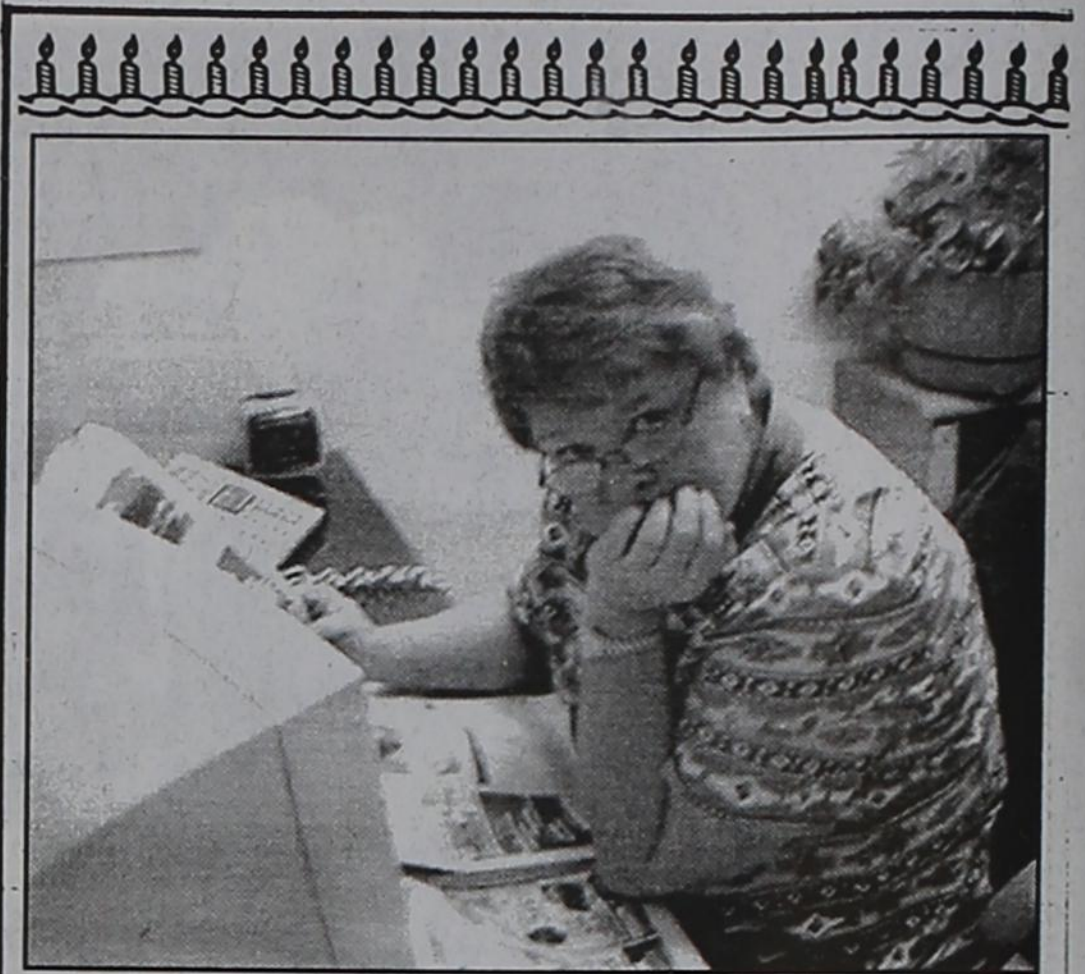

It also warns to stay awake and keep your clothes with you "so that he may not go naked and be shamefully exposed." Which, if the world is going to end and you are


going with it, I'm not sure how important clothes would be at that particular moment.

Life today seems to be just one big trick or treat. Scary isn't it.



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



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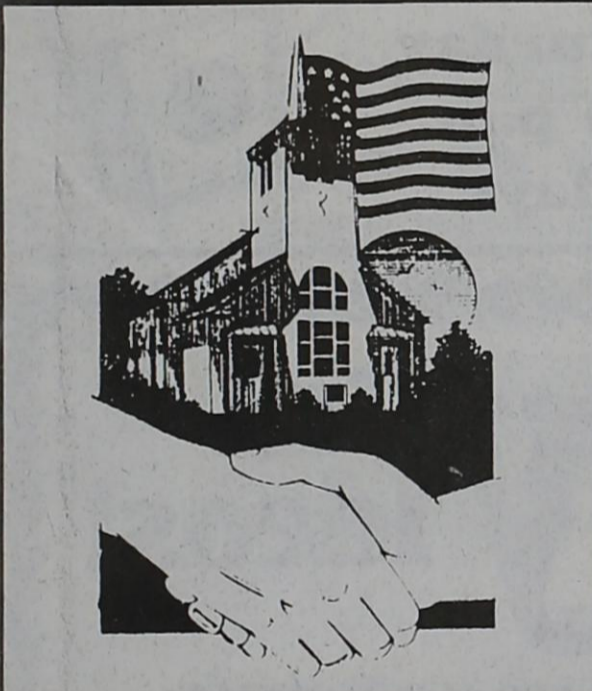

Clinics Are Set For Nov.

Immunization clinics offering vaccines protecting against several childhood diseases are scheduled for November throughout several Panhandle communities.

Protection will be against polio, diphtheria, lock-jaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B) and varicella (chicken pox).

All flu clinics are for high-risk individuals only, including people who are 65 years old or older, people with chronic illnesses, or people living with someone with a chronic illness. Costs are \$10 for flu vaccine and \$15 for pneumonia vaccine, for those without Medicare.

The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability of the individual or family to pay, however, no one will be turned away if not able to pay.

The vaccinations will be administered at 616 Euclid in Friona, Friday, November 15, from 9:30-11:30 a.m. and 1-3:45 p.m.

Vaccinations will also be available at the Bovina EMS Building, Monday, November 4, from 10-11:45 a.m. and 1-3 p.m.

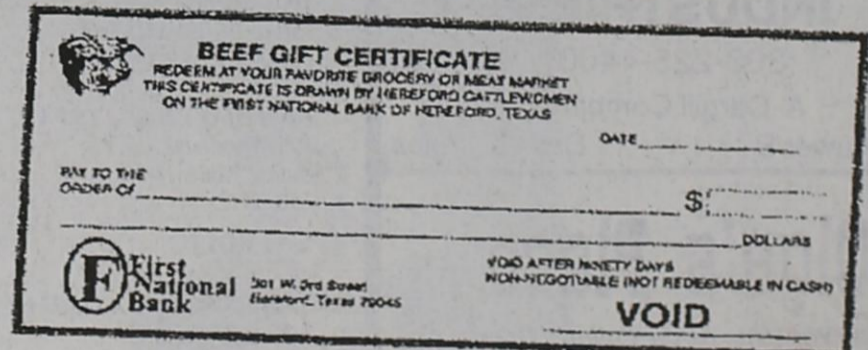

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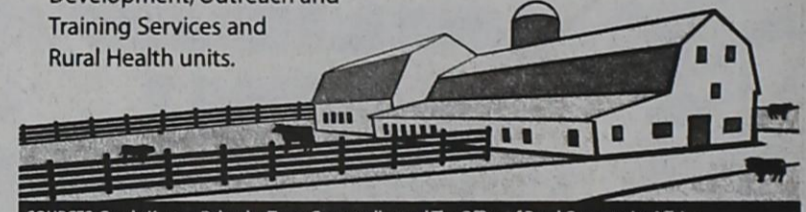

ORCA is composed of the Community Development, Outreach and Training Services and Rural Health units.

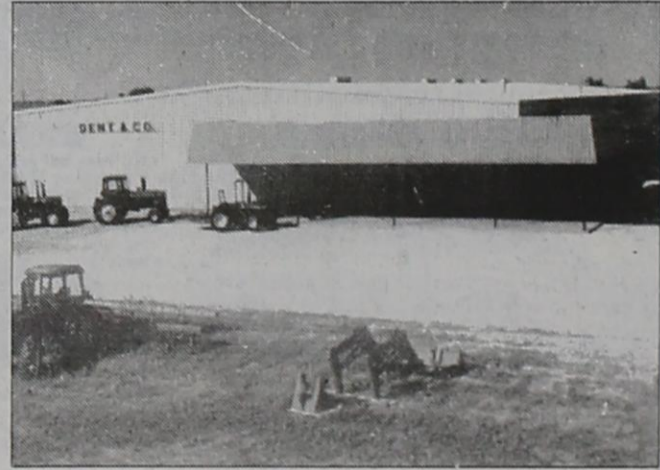

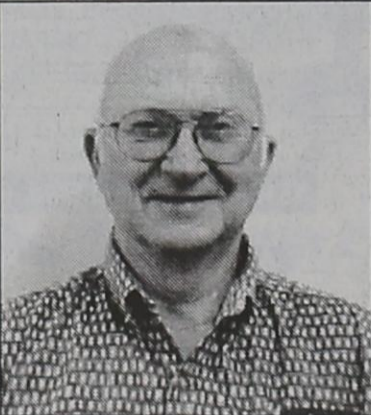

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TCFA Chairman Challenges Cattle Feeders To Look Ahead

Cattle feeders can look at their present market situation as a journey, Paul Engler said. And with any journey, it's good to look back at where you've been, where you are now and where you want to go.

Engler, 2002 chairman of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association (TCFA), described the TCFA Convention as part of the journey. "Why did you come?" he asked the more than 600 cattle feeders in attendance. He answered by saying that events like the TCFA Convention are important milestones in cattlemen's journey because the speakers can help them look at their industry through a new set of lenses.

"I believe that all of us have probably lost a little sleep over the market," Engler said, "but if you really want to have one of those nightmares where you woke up in a cold sweat, you dreamed about an act of bio-terrorism and the catastrophic results of such an attack."

The topic of "who's the beef industry" has been on many peoples' minds recently, Engler said, and the TCFA Convention addressed that. "Folks have said over the course of the year that they're not in the beef business, they're in the cattle business." And that's true, to an extent, he said. "But we all have to ask ourselves the question, 'who will buy our cattle if consumers don't buy our beef?' Without consumer demand, we don't have a market at all, and we must never forget that."

However, much of the focus this year has been on cattlemen's market journey. Engler reminded cattle feeders of the early days, when cattle were sold in terminal markets and a commission man stood

between the seller and the packer buyer.

"Then one day, a cattle buyer told himself that this system was ridiculous with all its added costs and asked himself, 'why don't I go to the country and trade directly with the feeders?' This he did and direct buying got started. Incidentally, he was black-baled by the Omaha market."

This direct-buying, average-cash-method of trading fed cattle has been dominant for right at 40 years, Engler said. "I maintain that the only reason this method has lasted this long is because it has served the packer very well. If it didn't, it would have been gone long ago." Recently, a mile marker in cattle feeders' journey has been grid marketing and group selling. "It is estimated that 62% of our fed cattle are now marketed on a grid and the number continues to grow."

The question of where the beef industry is going next on its journey has generated plenty of thoughts, discussion and new ideas, he told cattle feeders, and the TCFA board and committees have considered a lot of ideas on how to fix the current market situation. "But the TCFA board and committees are trying to make decisions based on fact, not emotion or dogma." He complimented TCFA's volunteer leaders for their efforts and their willingness to make tough decisions.

Among the ideas to fix the cattle market is more government regulations. "We need only to look at Mandatory Price Reporting to see the futility of further inviting the government into the management of our business," Engler told cattle feeders. And that's not the only example of what can

happen when the government gets involved in the cattle business.

"Remember the Dairy Herd Buyout in April of 1986? That was a devastating event for our market. Then there was the retail price freeze of 1973 that precipitated the first major market wreck that we experienced in cattle feeding."

As cattle feeders are trying to map their course, it's important to look at the market factors that worked to put some major potholes in the road the past year or two. "Corn was cheap for much of the year, futures were maintaining premiums to cash for much of the time and the cost of replacement cattle remained high. We responded by feeding cattle longer and putting off marketings as long as possible for lack of kill slots and cheap feed. And we all know the result—record heavy live weights, record heavy carcass weights and record tonnage."

Then several other major events worked against cattle feeders. "The false FMD rumor that caused futures to begin trending lower and at nearly the same time, the Russians stopped importing poultry, which resulted in an oversupply of meat in the domestic market and gave retailers tremendous leverage. These events came on the heels of September 11 and BSE in Japan."

The realities in the marketplace have been difficult to face, but they have certainly been real, he said. "How do we fix this market? I wish I could stand here and give you the answer, but I can't. That's because no single solution exists to fix our problems."

Is group marketing the answer? Grid marketing? "I don't know. But I do know

this: we will survive, our industry will survive and TCFA will survive. We will continue to look at new ways of producing and marketing cattle. We will continue to move forward and make decisions in a manner that ensures we make the best possible decisions not just for today, but for a whole lot of tomorrows."

Cattle feeders are at the point in their journey where they can see the bend in the road, but can't see what's around the curve. "However, if left to our own devices unburdened by excessive government involvement, we'll figure out reasonable, workable solutions. TCFA and the people who make TCFA what it is have been doing exactly that for 35 years. And we're all better because of it."

Does Annuity Payout From 401(k) Makes Sense For You?

If you have a 401(k) plan where you work, you'll have an important decision to make upon your retirement. Specifically, how should you take your 401(k) money? You'll want to make the right choice--because it can make a big difference in your life. Let's consider the distribution options available to you.

You can take the money as a lump sum--Many plans require participants to take their 401(k) in a lump sum distribution--and many people choose lump sums, even when they have a choice. If you need a large sum of money immediately upon retirement, taking a lump sum may be right for you. However, your plan will immediately withhold 20 per cent for taxes, and you may have to pay more later.

You can leave the money in your plan--Not all 401(k) plans offer this option. But if it's available, it may be a good choice for you if you like the investment options in your 401(k) and if the plan allows you to withdraw funds as often as you need after you retire. You will have to start making withdrawals by age 70-1/2.

You can move your money into an IRA--If you move your 401(k) into a "Rollover IRA," your money will continue to grow on a tax-deferred basis, and you will avoid the 20 per cent federal withholding. You can withdraw money as you need it, subject to IRA minimum distribution rules, and you'll pay income tax only on the amount you withdraw. (Withdrawals before age 59-1/2 may be subject to a 10 per cent early withdrawal penalty.) Plus, you can fund your IRA with virtually any type of investment--stocks, bonds, government securities, etc.

Your final distribution option is to convert your 401(k) into a lifetime annuity, purchased from a private insurance company. Not all plans offer this choice, but if they do, it is an option worth considering for one reason alone: It offers you an income stream you can't outlive. Every month, for the rest of your life, you will receive a check for the same amount of money--even if the cumulative payments exceed the amount you paid into your 401(k).

Furthermore, you can extend your annuity over the course of two lifetimes. Thus, when you die, your spouse will start receiving the monthly payments. As is the case with IRA withdrawals, your annuity payments are subject to ordinary income tax.

Clearly, a lifetime source of income may be of great value to you--especially when you consider that you could easily spend two or three decades in retirement. At the same time, you'll need to take into account two possible drawbacks to taking your 401(k) distribution as an annuity. First, your payments will not be indexed for inflation, so, over time, you will lose purchasing power. And second, there's no death benefit to this annuity--when you and your spouse pass on, the payments stop.

Ultimately, you'll have to look at your overall financial picture before you decide if taking your 401(k) distribution as an annuity is a good idea for you. If, after reviewing your situation, you identify a need for a regular source of income, the annuity may be a possibility. But if you know that you'll have enough money coming in from a variety of sources, and you want to maximize the assets you leave to your beneficiaries, you might want to consider other distribution options.

It's your choice--so make it a good one.

Sports Challenge Our Eyes

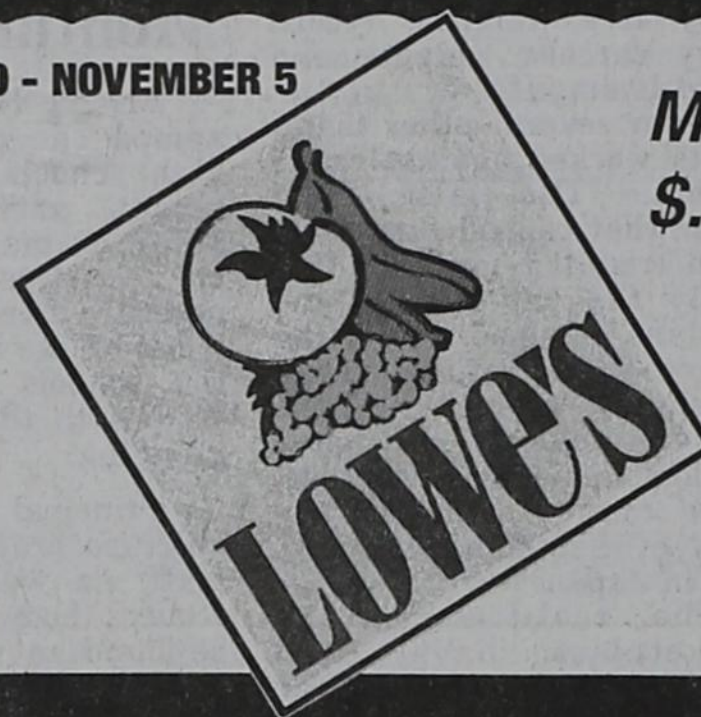
Different sports require different vision skills. Bicycle riders must keep their head and eyes straight ahead. They also need to read street signs and maps at a glance and watch what is occurring through peripheral vision. Baseball players require clear vision, image size, accuracy and precise perception to observe the direction of the ball. In basketball, the bright on-court lighting, constant movement and need to correctly determine distances demand visual stability under continually changing circumstances, keen peripheral vision and depth perception and the ability to frequently alter focus. Golfers must have strong eye-hand coordination and the ability to focus on a small object at short and long distances. Cold, strong winds and snow glare coupled with the capacity to see well in fast-moving terrain place specific demands on skiers' eyes. Tennis requires unique challenges such as keeping track of a constantly moving target and prolonged visual concentration.



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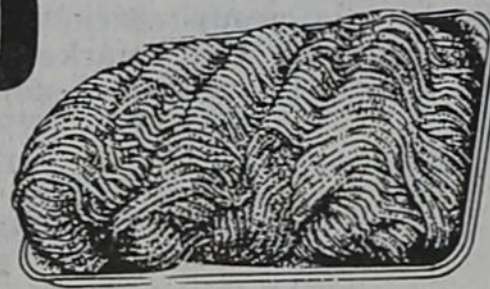
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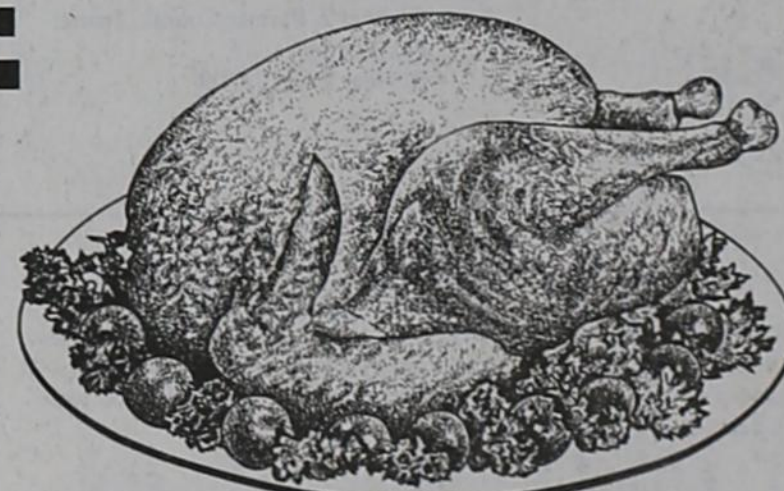

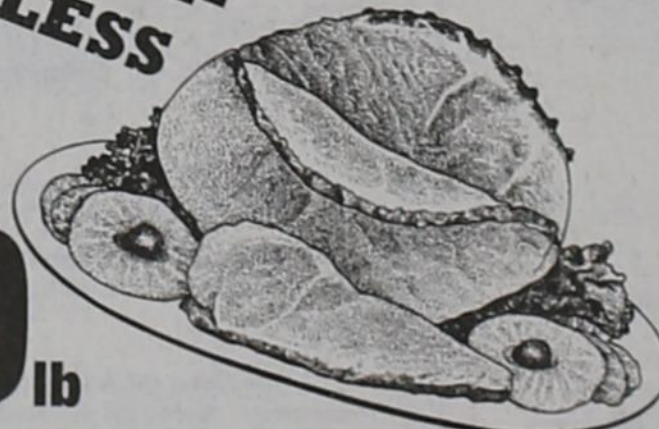
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
