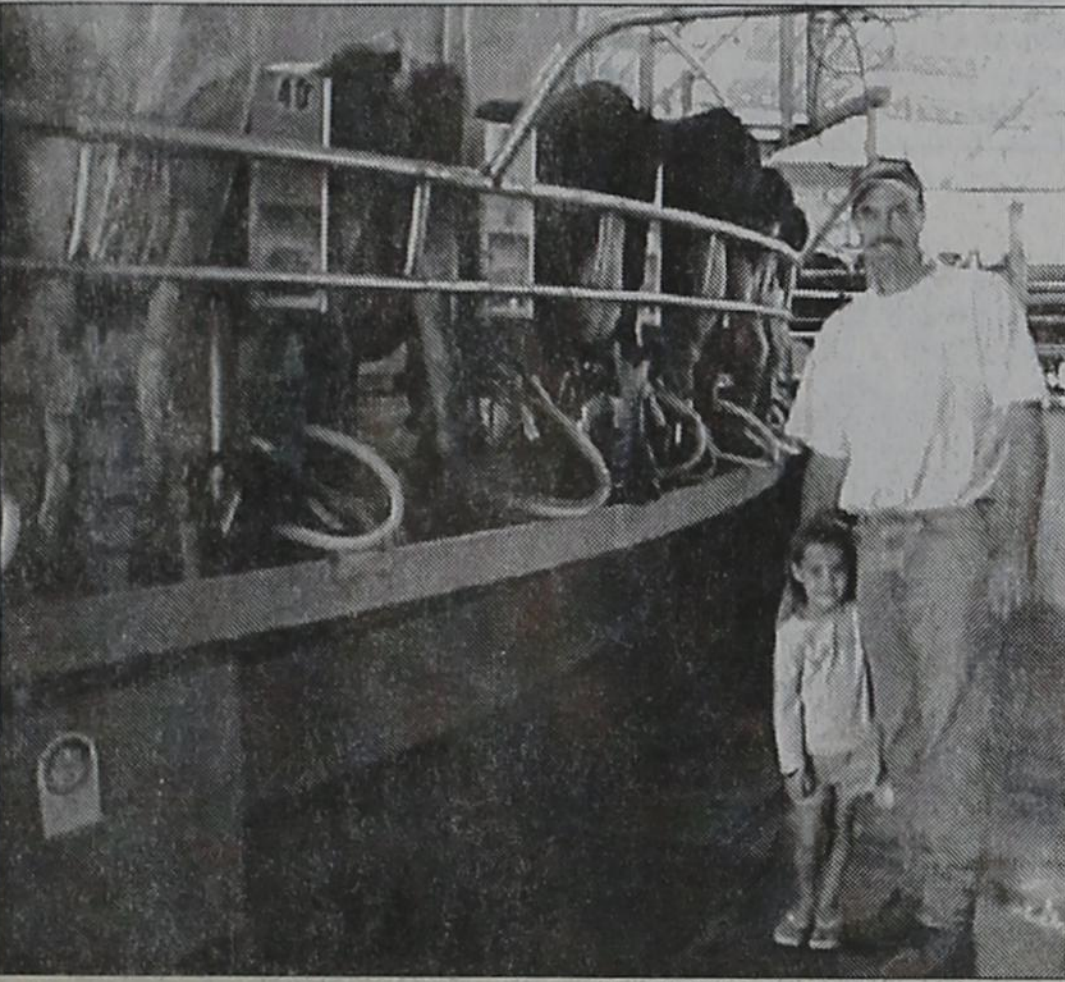

## Harvest, New Dairy Progress

Corn harvest has been underway for the past two or three weeks. Although growers had to irrigate more during the growing season, the crop's yield has been favorable.

The corn being cut in the above photo was in the Hub area.

High Plains Dairy, located six miles east of the Hub intersection, is making progress.

The first modern dairy for the county is currently milking around 2200 cows daily. Their new-style carousel milker is handling 300 cows per hour, and is capable of milking 400 cows an hour.

## Six Candidates For Homecoming Queen

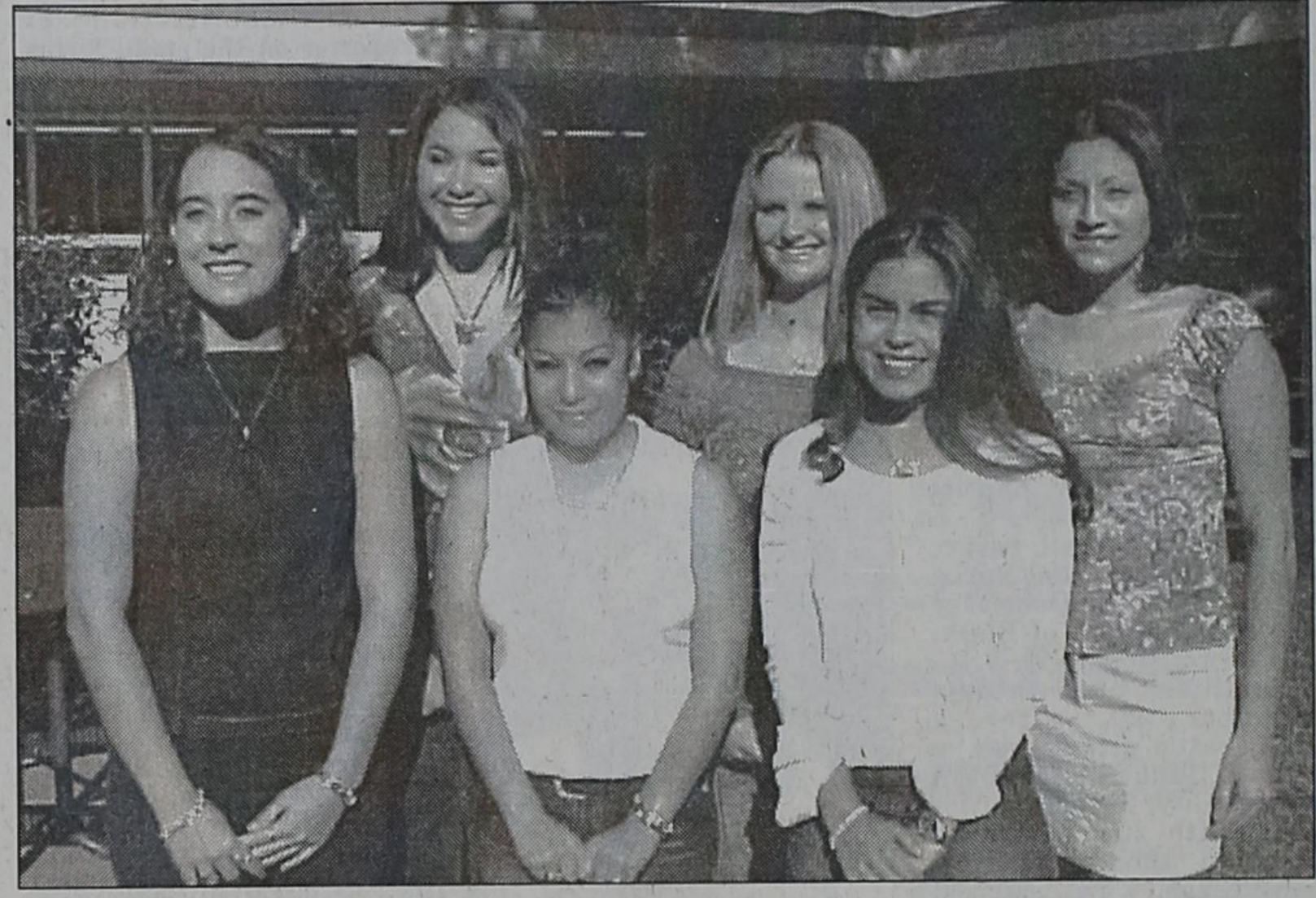
It will be homecoming night tonight at Chieftain Field as the Chiefs battle the Dalhart Golden Wolves. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander sent sales tax rebates to Texas cities for September.

Parmer County received a total of \$31,961, divided as Bovina \$2,345; Farwell \$4,236; and Friona \$25,379.

In 2002, Bovina has received \$20,869; Farwell \$38,223; and Friona \$181,729, for a total of \$240,822, compared to \$258,198 received during the same period in 2001.

## Deputy Nets Cash For County In Traffic Stop

Thursday, September 19, around midnight, Parmer County Deputy Andy Stormes stopped a pickup pulling a trailer in Bovina when the trailer had a defective trailer light.

Acting on a suspicion, Stormes asked for, and was given, permission to search the vehicle. During the search, the deputy found packets containing cash.

When questioned, the driver said the money was not his and he did not know who it belonged to. This is a typical scenario in the transportation of drug money.

Stormes confiscated the money, \$119,821, and the driver was allowed to go. He was assisted during the search by Deputy Steve Bartley and the county drug dog, Arno.

Officials have deposited the money in a Parmer County bank. It is retained for 60 days during which time the owners can claim it. If not claimed it is given to the Parmer County District Attorney's office, who retains 30% and 70% is given to the Sheriff's Department.

Deputies Stormes and Bartley have recently attended a 3-day school in Lubbock

to teach law enforcement officers how to check suspicious vehicles for drugs or drug money.

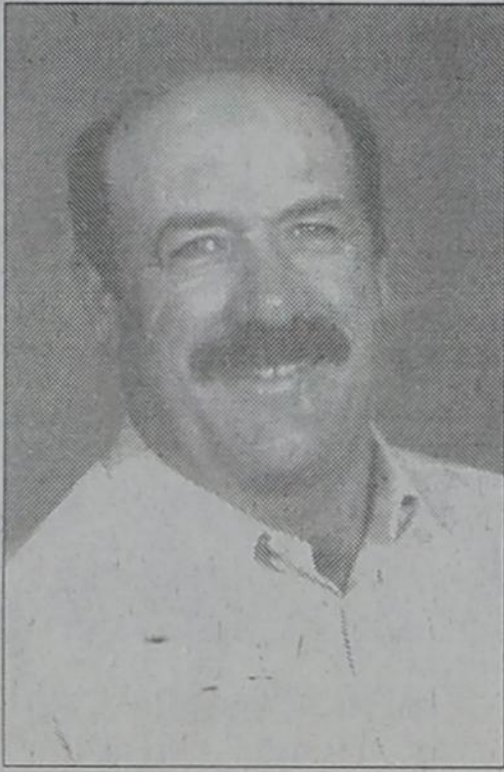
Hamilton graduated from Friona High School in 1968. He played on the football team under coach Don Light, where his teammates included Donny Carthel and Tony Perea.

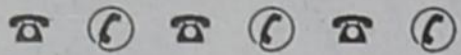

# Friona Flashbacks

...from the files of The Friona Star

### 70 Yrs Ago-Sept. 30, 1932

T.J. Crawford has been designated by Wilbur C. Hawk, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, to serve as Governor R.S. Sterling's representative in the preparation and submission of Parmer County's application for funds out of the \$300,000,000 provided by the Federal Emergency Relief and Construction Act of 1932.

The district school tax assessor-collector has been instructed by the board of trustees that another cut of ten per cent in the valuation of property within the district has been made, which will make quite an appreciable reduction in the current taxes.

### 60 Yrs Ago-Oct 2, 1942

Full mobilization of manpower on the small farms of Parmer County for increased food production is needed to win the war, Earl L. Fine, rural rehabilitation supervisor for the Farm Security Administration, believes, "Unless our small farm operators can produce greater quantities of food," said Mr. Fine, "our country will be compelled to ration almost all foods and there is no assurance that we can maintain nutrition needs of our civilians."

Looking ahead to agricultural wartime production for 1943, the Texas USDA War Board already is conducting a survey on transportation facilities for farm labor.

### 55 Yrs Ago-Sept. 27, 1947

Mary Joyce Renner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R.J. Renner, Sr., was crowned Football Queen in half-time ceremonies last Friday night. Mary Joyce is a sophomore student at Friona High School this year.

### 50 Yrs Ago-Sept. 25, 1952

A county wide meeting of Parmer County farmers has been announced for next Monday night at the Bovina School Auditorium. This meeting, called by county committeemen Parr, Euler and Caldwell, is intended to learn from farmers what regulations, if any are desired for issuance of permits for drilling of irrigation wells. Permits will be required beginning February 1, 1953.

### 45 Yrs Ago-Sept. 26, 1957

Hurshel Harding, 28-year-old Farwell lawyer, was appointed Monday by the Parmer County commissioners court as county attorney. He fills the vacancy created by the resignation of Bill Sheeham of Friona, who is now district attorney.

The city commission Monday night decided on a less strict code of regulations for persons who peddle milk in the city, but an ordinance has not yet been written with their intentions, according to the city clerk, Roy Wilson. The commission has for several months been discussing passing an ordinance to regulate milk peddling, and one which was presented to them was unsuitable on the basis that local producers could not normally afford to purchase a mechanical bottling machine required by the state code.

### 40 Yrs Ago-Sept. 27, 1962

A group of Parmer County officials was treated to a special field trip to the Brady Creek Watershed project in Central Texas. The group, which included the County Commissioners Court, Soil Conservation District supervisors, Friona Star News Editor Bill Ellis, and other interested parties in the county, gathered in Plainview and flew to Brady for the special tour.

### 35 Yrs Ago-Sept. 28, 1967

The Board of Advisory Editors of "Outstanding Civic Leaders of America" announced recently that five Friona residents have been chosen for inclusion in the 1967 edition of the national publication. Those chosen are Mrs. Roy V. Miller, Steve Messenger, Dr. Loyd Shackelford, Mrs. V.J. Zeman and Andy Hurst.

### 30 Yrs Ago-Sept. 28, 1972

Twenty-five girls will seek

the Maize Queen title Thursday in a full day of competition which begins at 4 p.m. Reigning Maize Queen Kathy Horton, is away at college and will be unable to be present at the festivities. Dean Kelley, sports news editor for KFDD-TV (Channel 10) Amarillo will be emcee for the event.

### 25 Yrs Ago-Sept. 25, 1977

Rhea Bradley, Littlefield, resident engineer for the Department of Highways and Transportation, reports that the construction project on State Highway 214 has been officially completed and has been accepted by the state.

### 20 Yrs Ago-Sept. 26, 1982

The arrest of four young Friona men last Saturday has apparently cleared up recent burglaries, in which over \$3,000 worth of radio and electronic equipment was taken. The Friona Police Department found over \$3,000 in stolen merchandise in the attic at the home of one of the young men. Roger Fields was the

weekly winner in the Friona Star's football contest, correctly picking 16 games. The winning check was presented by Betty Chaney, representing Chaney Fertilizer.

Funeral services for Ralph T. Roden, 73, were held Tuesday, September 21, at United Methodist Church. Roden died at his home September 19. He was a pharmacist for fifty years and owned and operated Bi-Wize Drug.

### 15 Yrs Ago-Sept. 26, 1987

The weather in the Friona area has taken a turn for the better in recent days, with beautiful warm days which should facilitate the maturing of crops and allow farmers to get into their fields. Thursday's high temperature was 85 degrees, and more of the same was being expected for the weekend.

### 10 Yrs Ago-Sept. 26, 1992

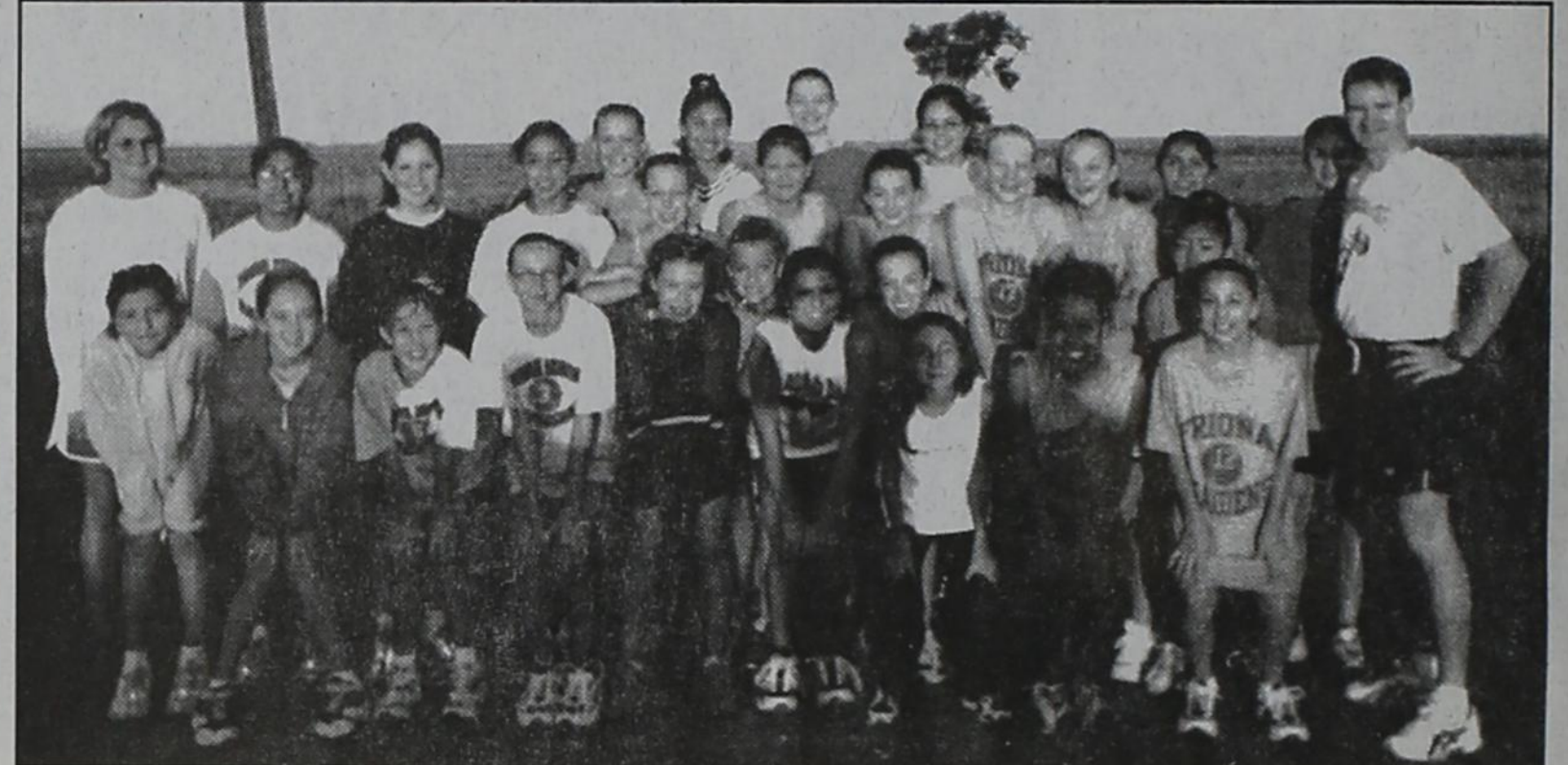
Lance Looper, a freshman at Friona High School, was the winner of the second week's Friona Star Football Contest.

We are met on a great battle field of that war. We come to dedicate a portion of it, as a final resting place for those who died here, that the nation might live. This we may, in all propriety do. But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate--we can not consecrate--we can not hallow, this ground--The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have hallowed it, far above our poor power to add or detract.

The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here; while it can never forget what they did here.

It is rather for us, the living, we here be dedicated to the great task remaining before us--that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they here, gave the last full measure of devotion--that we here highly resolve these dead shall not have died in vain; that the nation shall have a new birth of freedom, and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from this earth.

These few words, 238 of them, have lived through history and taught to countless students.

No doubt President Abraham Lincoln made many inspiring speeches during his lifetime. But none so enduring as the Gettysburg Address, delivered on November 19, 1863.

John Nicolay, one of Lincoln's two private secretaries, said that Lincoln wrote the first part of the speech on Executive Mansion stationery. The second page was written in pencil on lined paper.

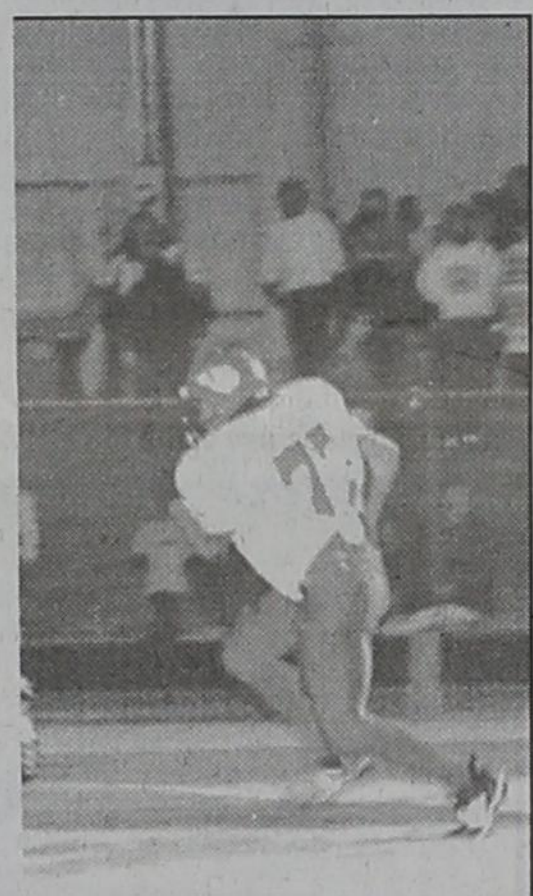
"We had to overcome some adversity, which included some unusual calls. That 'inadvertent whistle' turned out to be a 14-point swing.

# Chiefs Win Shootout With Mules, 39-28

The Chieftains survived some "unusual" calls by the officials, which helped to fire up Muleshoe, to post a 39-28 win in the latest chapter of the annual Parmer-Bailey County rivalry, before a capacity crowd at Muleshoe's homecoming last Friday in Muleshoe.

The Chieftains outscored the Mules 27-8 during a 15:26 period of clock time which ran from midway through the second quarter through the last play of the third, and should have been letting some reserves see action.

But due to at least one puzzling call which amounted to about a 50-yard penalty against Friona, the Mules grabbed a quick touchdown plus a little momentum, to get back in the game.

The Chieftains staked the Mules to a gift on the third play of the game when a Brock Field-Nathan Haile pitchout went awry, Muleshoe recovering on their own 49.

Fifty-one yards and ten plays later, Muleshoe took the lead when QB Daniel Sheets hit Daniel Campola, who made a tight-rope catch in the end zone on a fourth down play. The Mules led, 6-0, with 5:05 left in the first quarter.

Friona ran three plays and gained only a yard, and had to punt. However, the Mules' star running back, A.J. Flores, muffed the punt, and Andy Carthel recovered for Friona at the Muleshoe 12.

Nathan Haile wasted no time, taking a pitchout around left end to score the touchdown. Haile hit the pylon at the goal-line. Brian Wiseman's kick was a shade right, but Friona had tied the score with 3:59 still to play in the first.

The Friona defense forced a punt and took over on the Mules' 46 after Sergio Saenz returned the punt 21 yards.

Field hit Corbin Neill for 12 yards, and Haile blasted for 18 yards, on second and third effort to the Muleshoe 20. However, two plays later, Muleshoe's Flores intercepted, and Field had to make the tackle to save a long TD run.

The Mules drove to Friona's 30, but a fourth down pass was dropped and Friona took over.

Friona then drove 70 yards in 12 plays to get back on the scoreboard.

Wiseman came on to kick a 21-yard field goal, but Muleshoe was flagged for roughing the kicker, and Friona elected to take the ball at the Mules' four.

Three plays gained just a yard, and on a gutsy fourth-down call, Haile ripped his way three yards into the end zone. Wiseman added the point for a 13-6 Friona lead with 3:30 left in the half.

There was still time for two more touchdowns.

On a third and ten play, Sheets found Campola over the middle all alone, and he outran the Chieftain defenders on a 71-yard pass and run play. Mule QB Sheets then ran it in for two points, and Muleshoe had taken a 14-13 lead with 2:24 left before halftime.

Field hit Gutierrez for a first down to the Muleshoe 41, and on the next play he kept the ball on the option play, and went around end

for 19 yards to the Muleshoe 22.

A "motion" penalty set Friona back to the 25. But Field lofted the ball and Carthel made an over-the-shoulder catch, racing into the end zone. Wiseman's kick was good, and Friona had taken a 20-14 lead, using only 1:40 of clock time. That turned out to be the halftime score.

Dustin Thompson's good defensive play to start the third quarter forced a Muleshoe punt, and Gutierrez' return gave Friona the ball at their own 45.

Haile and Field gained eight and seven, and Field hit Neill for 14 yards and a first down at the Muleshoe 16. A couple of minutes later, Field to Gutierrez worked for a first down, and Haile bulled in from three yards out for his third touchdown. The score became 26-14 with 3:55 left in the third.

A high, short kickoff was mis-handled by Muleshoe, and Friona recovered the ball at the Mules' 34.

Field gained 13 on a rollout, Haile added 11 yards up the middle, and then Field lobbed a 13-yard pass to Haile, as Friona reached the Muleshoe 15.

With ends split wide on both sides, Field surprised the MHS defense somewhat by handing the ball to Haile, who got a couple of blocks at the line of scrimmage, and raced into the end zone virtually untouched on the final play of the quarter.

Wiseman's kick made it a 33-14 game. Friona had limited Muleshoe to only three offensive plays in the third quarter!

The "strangest" play happened on Muleshoe's next possession. A snap went past the Mule QB who was in "shotgun" formation, back to the Muleshoe 16-yard line. The referee brought the ball back to the original line of scrimmage and gave the Mules the play over.

"Inadvertent whistle" was the call. Friona was flagged for a double personal foul while discussing the official's ancestry, and the entire episode amounted to a 50-yard penalty against Friona.

It was easier for the Mules to score when they were given a first and goal from the Friona eight. Flores did the honors, and when Friona tipped the PAT pass into a receiver's hands, the score became Friona 33, Muleshoe 22.

Friona drove to the Mules' 38, facing fourth down. Field made a great punt, which bounced out at the MHS four-yard-line.

Four plays later, Friona tackled QB Sheets in the end zone. "No safety," said the official, who placed the ball at the Muleshoe one.

This time, the bad break backfired, when defender Isaac Arzola batted a pass, then caught it and ambled into the end zone for the lineman's dream--a touchdown. That ran Friona's lead to 39-22 with 4:06 left to play.

Say for the Mules, they didn't quit. Sheets herded Muleshoe 75 yards in just five plays, getting the TD himself on a rollout, after completing passes of 28 and 36 yards to Campola, for the final margin of 39-28.

The win by Friona broke their personal two-year losing streak to their rivals, and hiked their lead in the series to 27 wins to 24 for Muleshoe and one tie.

Haile tied his personal record with four touchdowns in a game. He would have had five TDs, but a 43-yard run was called back by a clipping penalty in the third quarter.

The 67 points is a new record for the series, edging last year's 66. Friona's 39 points are third highest in a game at Muleshoe. Friona scored 49 in 1985 (49-0) and 41 in 1995 (41-6).

Thanks for the tenacity that allows one to know life must go on, even in the face of adversity, loss and hard times.

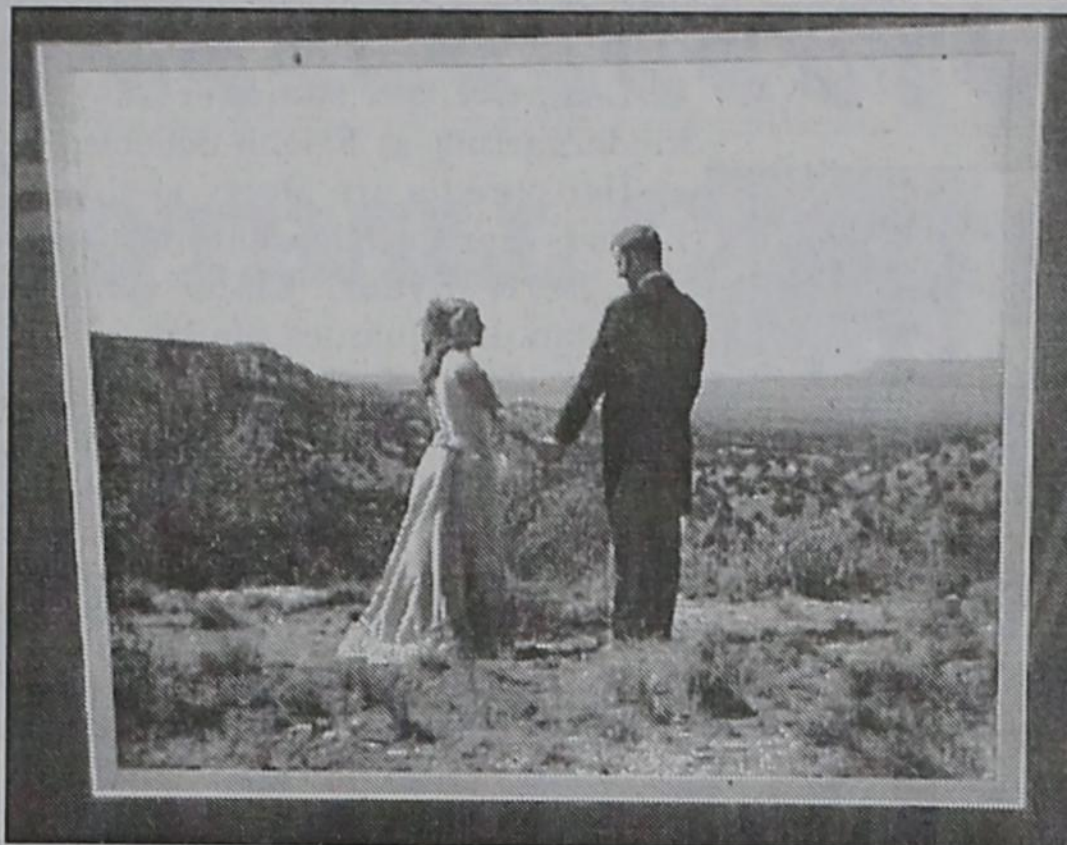
Thanks for teaching us tomorrow is a new day, and not to live in the past or rely on the current good times to carry us through.

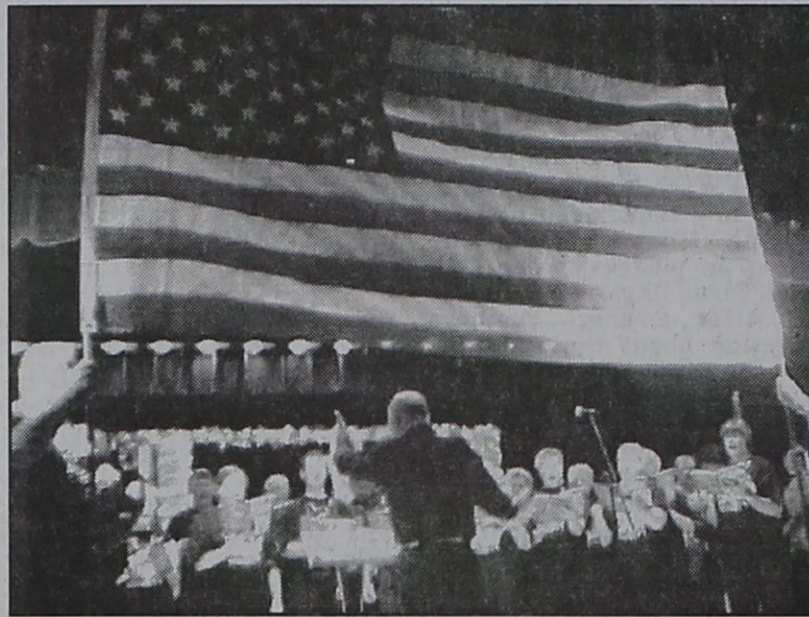
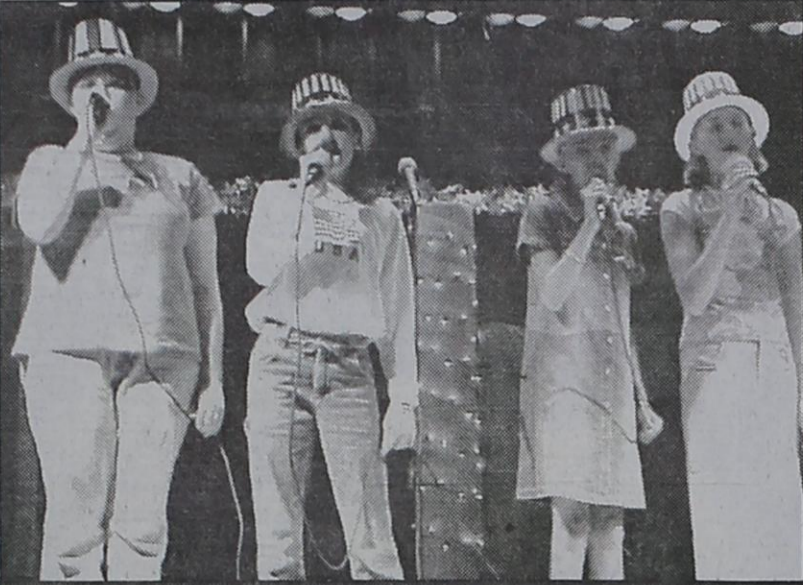

## Estrogen Replacement May Reduce Cataracts

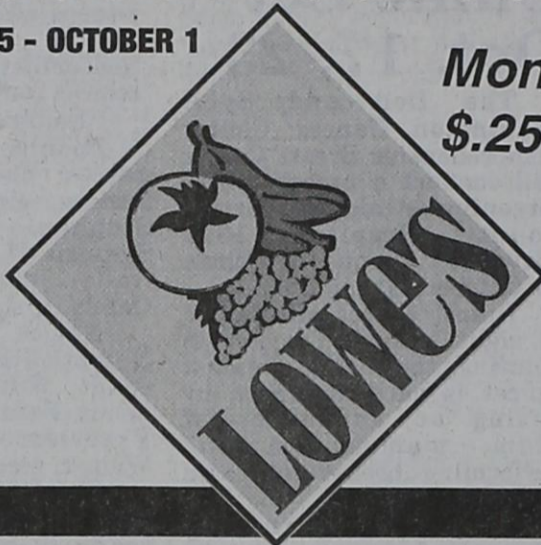
According to the Archives of Internal Medicine, postmenopausal estrogen replacement therapy is associated with reduced risk of cataracts. This eye condition is so common in older people that nearly one and a half million cataract surgeries are performed in the U.S. each year. In a study involving 529 women age 66 to 93, participants received examinations for lens opacities (cataracts). Of these, 395 had a cloudy lens or had already had their lens removed. Estrogen use was reported by 191 women—the longer they used it, the less their risk of lens opacity. Women who had taken estrogen for at least 10 years had a 60 per cent reduction in the risk of cataracts compared with nonusers.
