Suicide Is Ruled Here

The death of a 24-year-old man found dead in his pickup Monday morning has been ruled suicide, following extensive investigation.

Friona Chief of Police Lloyd Niece said that Roberto Castaneda Villarreal was found dead by police officers after being tipped by businessmen Ed Bailey and W.A. Turner Monday morning when they opened for business in the 500 block of Main Street.

Villarreal was in the seat of his pickup in front of the old hotel building, with a gunshot wound to the head.

Niece said that Villarreal had been shot once with a 25-calibre bullet that went through his head and then shattered the window on the driver's side of the pickup.

It first had appeared that someone might have shot Villarreal through the pickup window, but investigating officers felt sure the suicide ruling was correct. Villarreal was found to have powder wounds. The bullet entered his head from the right side, and exited on the left side, according to an autopsy report.

An autopsy was performed by Dr. Ralph Erdman, Amarillo pathologist.

Niece said that Villarreal apparently had broke up with his girl friend. He reportedly had told friends and relatives earlier that if he lost his girl friend, he guessed he would "just kill himself."

The Friona Police Chief said that Villarreal had visited a brother and sister-in-law at the hotel after midnight on Sunday, leaving at about 1 a.m. He reportedly was "very intoxicated" at the time.

The brother and sister-in-law assumed that Villarreal had left to go home.

City Manager Says Water Supply Safe

City Manager Beelee Goodwin said this week that although the city is being required to notify water customers that a sampling of city water submitted to the State Department of Health showed a bacterial content, that the city's water supply is totally safe.

Goodwin said that the bacteria-laden sampling was contained in a sample drawn in September from an outdoor hydrant.

"The samples are taken on a monthly basis, from random locations. The employee who regularly takes the samples was gone, and a substitute drew the sample that month. Sometimes it's tricky, especially with outside faucets, to get a water sample without collecting bacteria along with it," the city manager said.

Since the bad sample was reported, the city has recently gone


back on two consecutive days and drawn samples from the same faucet, and both have tested out fine.

However, due to a state Department of Health requirement, all city water customers must now be notified by first class mail regarding the sample which contained bacteria.


Bank Open Late Wed.

Windstorm Causes Damage Locally

The Friona area was buffeted by an unusual late fall windstorm on Tuesday. Winds which gusted up to 70 miles per hour caused considerable damage in the area.

This area seemed to be the starting point for the system that spawned killer tornadoes beginning in Arkansas, Oklahoma and throughout the Midwest during the day.

The worst damage noted in Friona was to the Hub Storage facility on Highway 60, where the sheet steel roof of the storage facility on the west was uprooted

and laid upside down draped across the twin structure to the east.

Otherwise, there was damage reported to a trailer house located west of town near Herring Implement Co., and a large tree limb was blown down on North Walnut Street.

At Altus, Oklahoma on Tuesday, a cotton module at a gin caught fire and was blown into an adjacent residential district, causing 18 homes to be lost. Firemen battling the fire were hospitalized for smoke inhalation.

Tuesday night also brought the first heavy freeze to the area for the season, when temperatures dropped to a low of 21 degrees. The low was also established for Wednesday since the reading at 8 a.m. that day was 22 degrees.

The low temperature reading called an end to the growing season, since most plants had not been killed by earlier readings which barely dropped below the freezing point.

The killing freeze date of November 16 makes it two years in a row for a late freeze. The first freeze of 1987 was recorded on November 10.

The harvesting of the area's cotton crop, which had been delayed waiting for a general killing freeze, now is expected to gain momentum. Jerry Butman of Friona Farmers Co-op Gin said that up until the freeze the cotton that had been received was still somewhat green. "This should get it ready," he said.

Maize harvest in the area likewise should be quickened by the freeze.



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

Pruitt was killed last Friday afternoon in a one-vehicle accident about 4 p.m. on the State Line Road north of Farwell.



Carl and Holly Mohr of Bryan became parents of a baby boy, William Douglas on November 3. The baby was born in St. Mary's Hospital in Bryan.


The newborn weighed seven pounds, and measured twenty-one inches long. He has a sister, Holley Lynn, who is three years old.





She is a 1988 graduate of Friona High School.

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
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
