'Xmas Project' Is Underway

Signup period for the 1988 Project Christmas Card is now underway, and continues through December 20, it has been announced by Modern Study Club.

Project Christmas Card is being sponsored by the club, in conjunction with the Friona Star for the 33rd consecutive Christmas season.

Proceeds from the project will go to benefit Parmer County Community Hospital. Since its inception, Project Christmas Card has raised over \$78,500 for new hospital equipment. This is in addition to approximately \$9,250 in advertising space which has been donated to the project by the Friona Star.

Hospital administrator Elda Hart says that the one thing that the hospital could use is an EKG machine which operates independently of the telephone lines, which would enable the hospital to transmit heart reports in bad weather, which sometimes affects the telephone lines.

Such a machine is costly, however, and is expected to cost at least \$10,000. Last year's drive raised \$4,536, which went toward the purchase of a blood analyzer.

The EKG machine can be set up by a patient's bed. Ms. Hart calls the machine "a really nice piece of equipment, one that would be nice for the hospital to have."

Donations to Project Christmas Card may be made at Friona State Bank, as well as at a number of businesses in town.

'Stocking Fund' Established Here

With the help of the Empty Stocking Fund, sponsored by the Amarillo Globe News, local residents of Prairie Acres and Parmer County Child Welfare Board, foster children and other needy children in the Parmer County area are again this year being given extra funds for Christmas.

The Empty Stocking Fund was established to provide holiday-related assistance to Amarillo area residents at the Christmas season for those who otherwise would not have a meaningful observance.

The fund provides an opportunity for sharing at the Christmas season, so that those who have been blessed with an abundance of material possessions can provide assistance for those less fortunate.

Prairie Acres will shop for eight needy residents for Christmas with the help of this fund. The Parmer County Child Welfare Board workers and volunteers will take the foster children from Parmer County shopping on a night before Christmas to outfit each child with appropriate clothing needs and if enough money is left, for a Christmas "surprise."

The Empty Stocking Fund designates the amounts of money that can be spent on each of these children and residents. The Parmer County Child Welfare Board workers and volunteers will also be shopping for three families with needy children who are in need of school clothing, coats, shoes, and a Christmas "surprise." This will help 26 children this year.

In the past these workers and volunteers have been able to obtain help with their shopping with one store offering discounts and assistance with all of the children taken shopping on this special night. Last year, the store manager sent all the children to Santa Claus' house for pictures while the purchases were being totaled. The store manager paid for these pictures out of their own pocket.

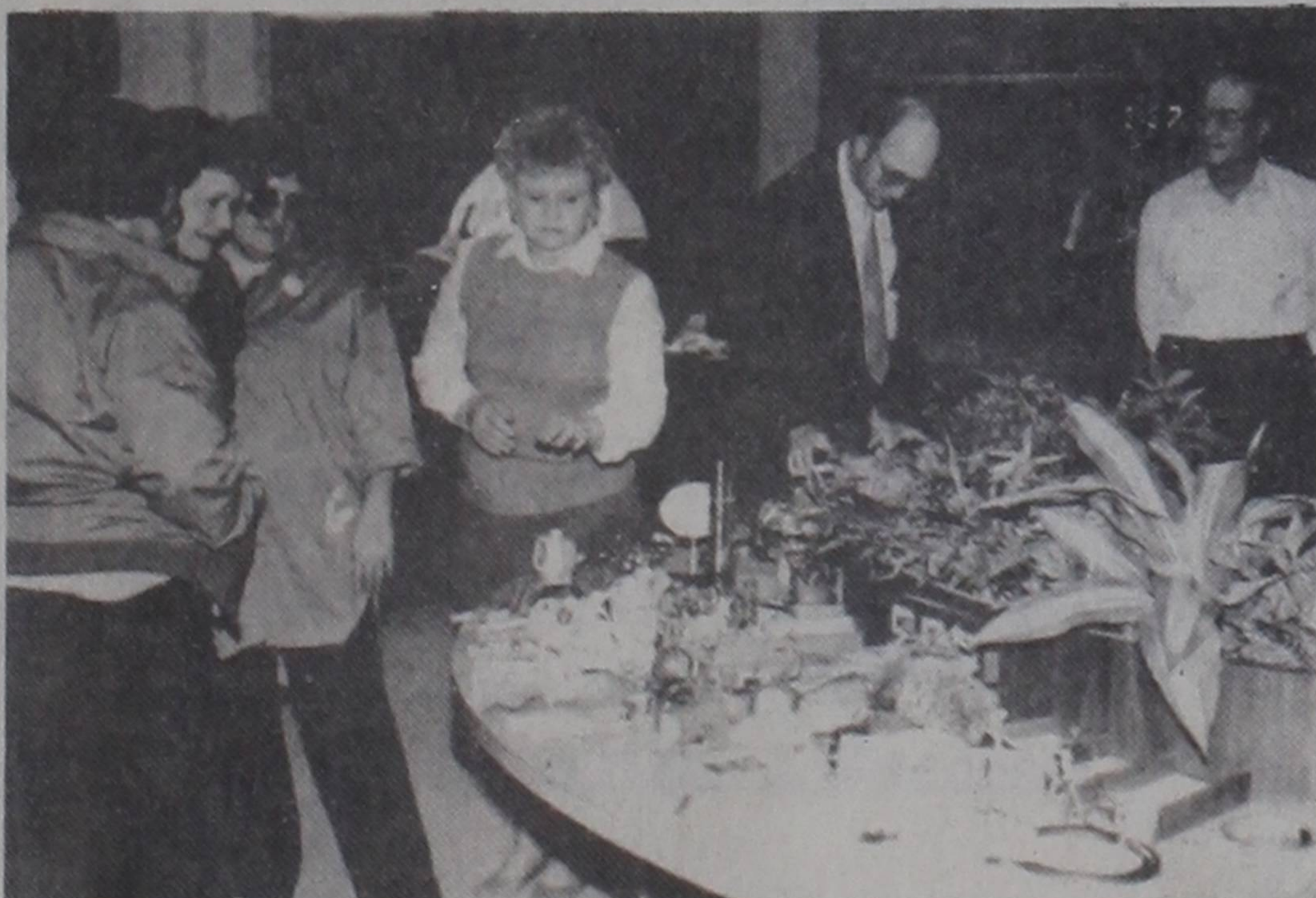

GTE Announces 'Phone Rate Hike

In accordance with recent Federal Communication Commission action, all single line business and residential telephone customers across the nation, including those served by GTE Southwest, will be subject to an increase in their interstate Subscriber Line Charge from the current \$2.60 per month to a \$3.20 per month.

This 60 cent increase in the interstate subscriber line charge is effective Dec. 1 and is the third phase of a federally mandated process that is intended to gradually eliminate the practice of charging customers more for long-distance service in order to keep local rates artificially low.

Business customers with more than one line have been paying \$6 interstate subscriber line charge since May 1984. This interstate subscriber line charge for business customers will not change.

Under the Federal Communications Commission plan for implementation of the interstate subscriber line charges, the total

revenues of the local telephone companies will not increase since the FCC in turn will reduce by an equivalent amount charges to long-distance carriers for use of local facilities and equipment. It is the intent of the FCC that this decrease in long-distance carriers' expense will be passed through to consumers in the form of reduced interstate long-distance rates.

GTE officials said the interstate subscriber line charges are designed to shift from long-distance users to local customers, a larger portion of the actual costs of providing the line from their residence or business to the telephone switching equipment.

Depending on the amount of interstate long-distance calling, the reductions for interstate rates could offset the \$3.20 interstate fee for many customers, especially high volume users.

The \$3.20 interstate subscriber line charge applies to all residential and single line business customers of all exchange telephone companies providing local exchange service.

Kassahn Pleads Guilty To Charge

The Lubbock Avalanche-Journal reported last week that Lubbock cattleman Jim S. Kassahn pleaded guilty Monday in U.S. District Court to defrauding Hale County State Bank in Plainview by using the same securities as collateral for a loan at the Plainview bank for another loan at a Dallas bank in the summer of 1987.

Kassahn had not been charged prior to the guilty plea, and he waived the right to have the case presented to a grand jury. Senior U.S. District Judge Halbert O. Woodward found Kassahn guilty of the crime, but the sentencing will not take place until a presentence report is completed.

The Lubbock newspaper said that according to information filed by the U.S. Attorney's Office, the defendant secured a \$1,875,000 loan to Fiveway Cattle Co. at Hale County State Bank on June 1, 1987, with 6,266 shares of American State Financial Corp. stock. However, he took the stock back on July 30, 1987, stating that he would be selling the stock and applying the proceeds to the loan.

The newspaper said that the bank returned the stock to him on the express agreement that it would be sold and applied to the loan, but Kassahn contacted a representative of MBank in Dallas the next day to inquire about a loan. He told the bank officer there that he needed a loan to make an estimated tax payment, according to court documents.

The Avalanche-Journal story

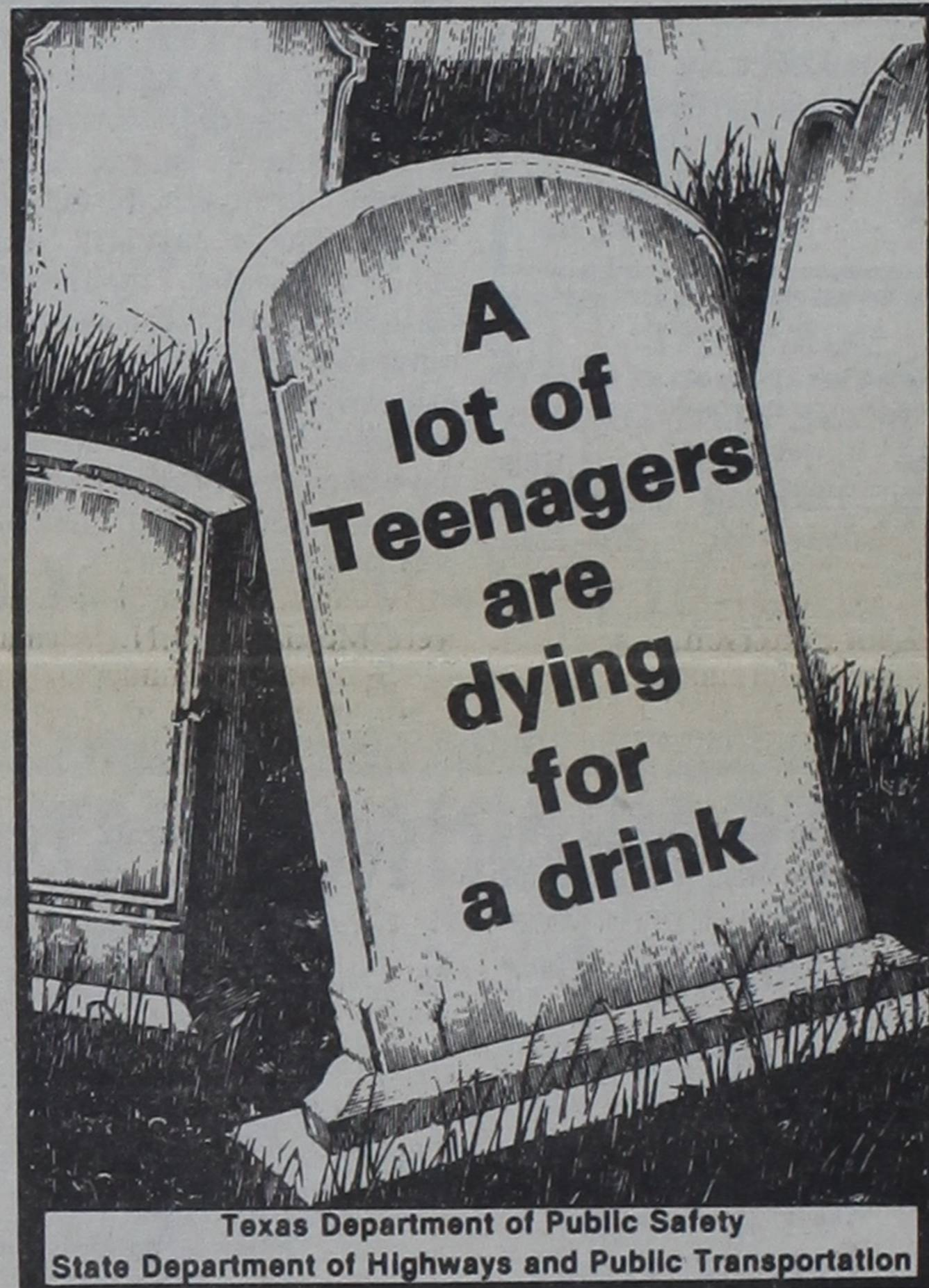
said the federal judge spoke briefly about the plea bargain arrangement between Kassahn and the U.S. Attorney's Office. The defendant agreed to plead guilty to one count and to furnish truthful information about other violations of the law. In return, he will not be prosecuted for any activities in connection with his cattle feeding operations under various business names, according to Woodward.

The defendant has been the subject of several lawsuits. Within the last month, Kassahn and his wife, Paula, filed a lawsuit in state district court in Parmer County against First National Bank of Amarillo alleging wrongful foreclosure, the Lubbock newspaper said. Also, a suit was filed on June 3, in Lubbock's 237th District Court against Kassahn and other directors of the failed First State Bank of Bovina by seven plaintiffs who alleged deceptive trade practices and negligence.

Versatile Pheasant Enjoyed Here, Abroad

(AUSTIN)—Pheasant is a versatile bird, enjoyed in many countries for its wild chicken flavor. Europeans, especially, have a nice touch with this feathered friend, enhancing it in dishes descended from peasant and royal cuisines. England's Henry VIII, no slouch when it came to eating, raised quantities of pheasants for his table.

In the British Isles and on the Continent, pheasants are simmered long hours for soups, stews and hearty game pies. They're cooked with sauerkraut and salt pork, and they're dampened with cream and placed in the oven over a bed of apples. The youngest, tenderest birds are sometimes boned, sliced into cutlets, sautéed and simmered in a buttery cream sauce.

Pheasants hold a brief reign in Texas during November and December, when they become legal to hunt.

Texas pheasant lovers often prepare birds as simply as possible, roasting them with a layer of extra fat to prevent dryness. To draw out more creativity, the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) and the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce recently sponsored the first Pheasant Cook-Off at the Amarillo Civic Center. The cook-off promoted Texas food products and a TDA program that puts Texas landowners in touch with hunters looking for land leases.

Winners were chosen from 15 finalists. Each was distinctively Texan. Wanda Wagner, Spearman, took first place with boned, cubed pheasant breasts marinated and grilled with fresh Texas vegetables. Mike Prasek, an El Campo businessman, was second with marinated, grilled pheasant halves served with a sop of margarine, fresh lemon, vinegar, onion and mustard. Third place went to Naomi Harney, 251st District Court judge, Amarillo, who roasted a whole bird in barbecue sauce and muscadine wine.

Though some pheasants weigh more than three pounds, young ones will be around two or two-and-a-half pounds dressed and will have a slightly pliable breastbone. Young birds can be broiled or baked. Older ones should be braised or stewed.

Pheasants can be kept six months to a year when properly frozen. To prepare them for the freezer, make sure each bird is cleaned and cooled completely. Wrap birds individually in moisture-proof, vapor-proof freezer paper. Place a bird in the center of a sheet of paper and bring two sides of the sheet together evenly at the top. Turn the paper down in half-inch folds until the paper holds snugly against the pheasant. Place the fold flat, make a double fold in each end, and fold these ends under the package to make a tighter wrap. Seal the package with

freezer tape and label with date. Freeze immediately at 0 degrees F.

For a real taste of Texas pheasant, try these winning recipes from the Pheasant Cook-Off.

PHEASANT K-BOBS WITH RICE

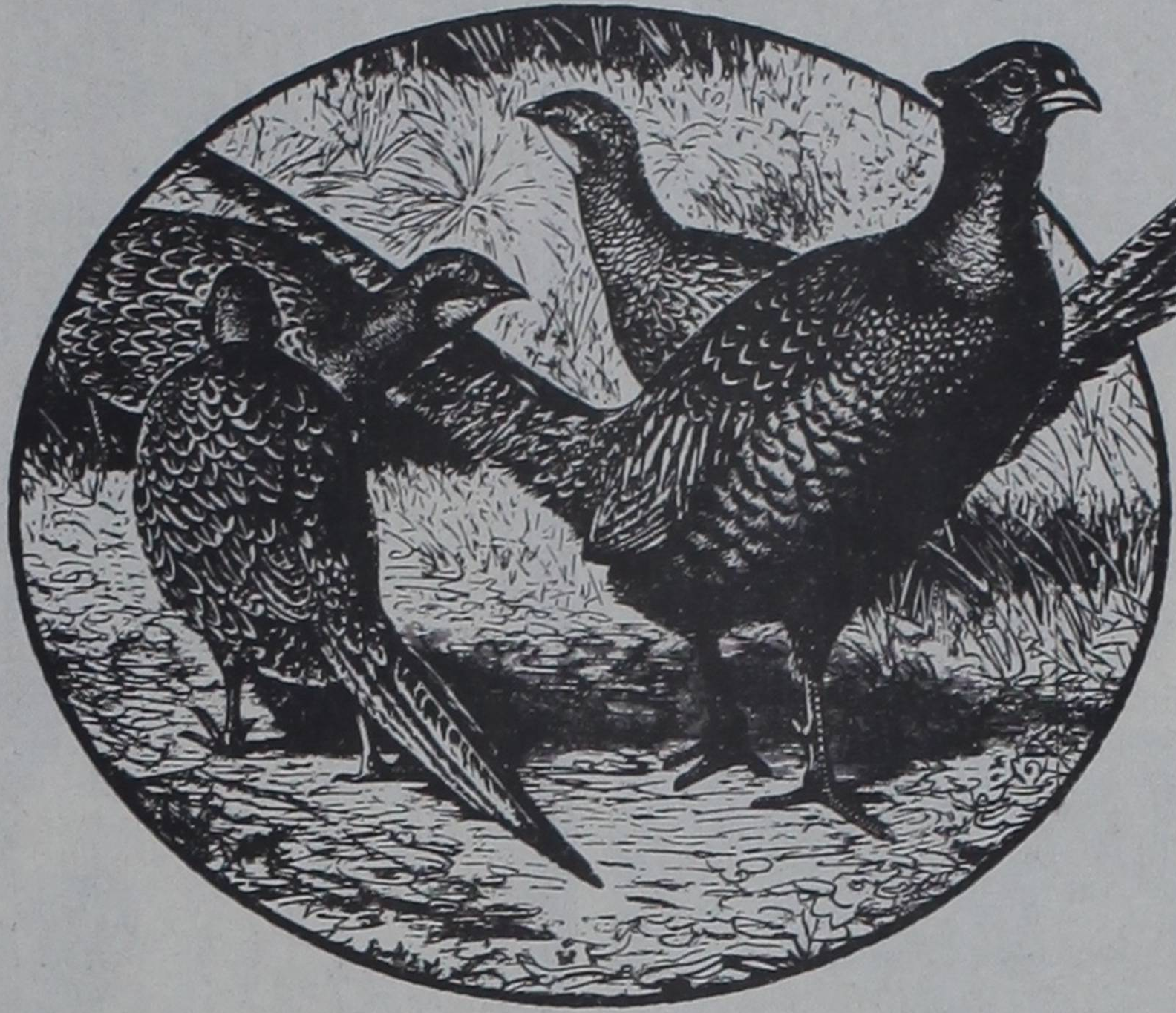
- 2 boned pheasant breasts
- 1/4 C. soy sauce
- 1/4 C. water
- 2 T. dry white wine
- 2 T. corn oil
- 1 T. minced onion
- 1/8 tsp. minced garlic
- 1 tsp. sugar
- 1/4 tsp. ground ginger
- Bell pepper strips
- Sliced yellow squash
- Cherry tomatoes
- Yellow onion chunks
- 1 C. long-grain rice
- 2 T. minced celery
- 2 T. butter
- 2 C. hot water
- 3 crushed chicken bouillon cubes

Cut pheasant into 1-inch cubes. Mix next 8 ingredients in medium bowl. Add pheasant and stir to coat well. Marinate at least 1 hour. Prepare vegetables for skewers. Saute rice, celery and minced onion in butter until rice is clear. Add 2 cups hot water and chicken bouillon cubes. Cover and cook over low heat 15 minutes. Remove from heat and let stand 10 minutes. Thread pheasant and vegetables on skewers. Place over hot coals and a sprinkling of mesquite chips that have been soaked in water. Turn skewers after 10-15 minutes. Total cooking time on grill is 20-25 minutes. Serve over platter of rice. Makes 4 servings.

JUDGE HARNEY'S BAKED PHEASANT

- 1 pheasant
- 1/3 C. smoked barbecue sauce
- 3 T. melted margarine
- Fajita seasoning
- 1 C. Muscadine wine

Combine barbecue sauce and margarine; brush inside and outside of pheasant. Sprinkle lightly with fajita seasoning inside and outside of pheasant. Truss pheasant. Place breast side up in covered baking pan. Pour wine in baking pan. Bake at 350 degrees F. for 1 1/2 hours. Makes 2 servings.



BAR B-Q PHEASANT

- 6 C. water, divided
- 1/2 C. soy sauce
- 1/4 C. soybean oil
- 1 T. lemon juice
- 1 T. parsley flakes
- 1 T. crushed basil
- 1 tsp. thyme
- 1 tsp. crushed bay leaves
- 1 tsp. paprika
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. black pepper
- 2 1/2 lb. pheasant
- 1 C. margarine

Place 1 cup water, soy sauce, oil, lemon juice, parsley, basil, thyme, bay leaves, paprika, salt and pepper in saucepan. Bring to boil, reduce heat and simmer about 5 minutes to blend flavors. Remove from heat and cool. Split pheasant in half and marinate in cooled mixture 2-4 hours. Meanwhile, combine margarine, onion, lemon and mustard in saucepan. Cook over medium heat approximately 10 minutes or until onion is soft. Add remaining water. Drain pheasant, sprinkle with salt and pepper to taste. Cook approximately 1 1/2 hours over grill, turning occasionally and basting with sop. Makes 4 servings.

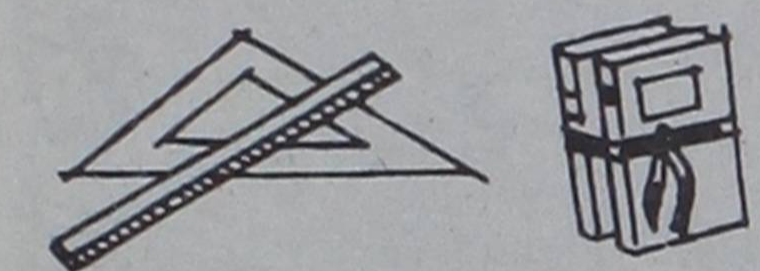

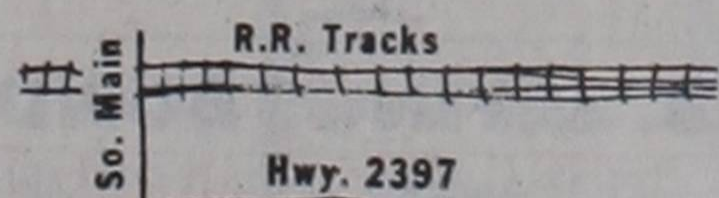
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County Officials To Retire

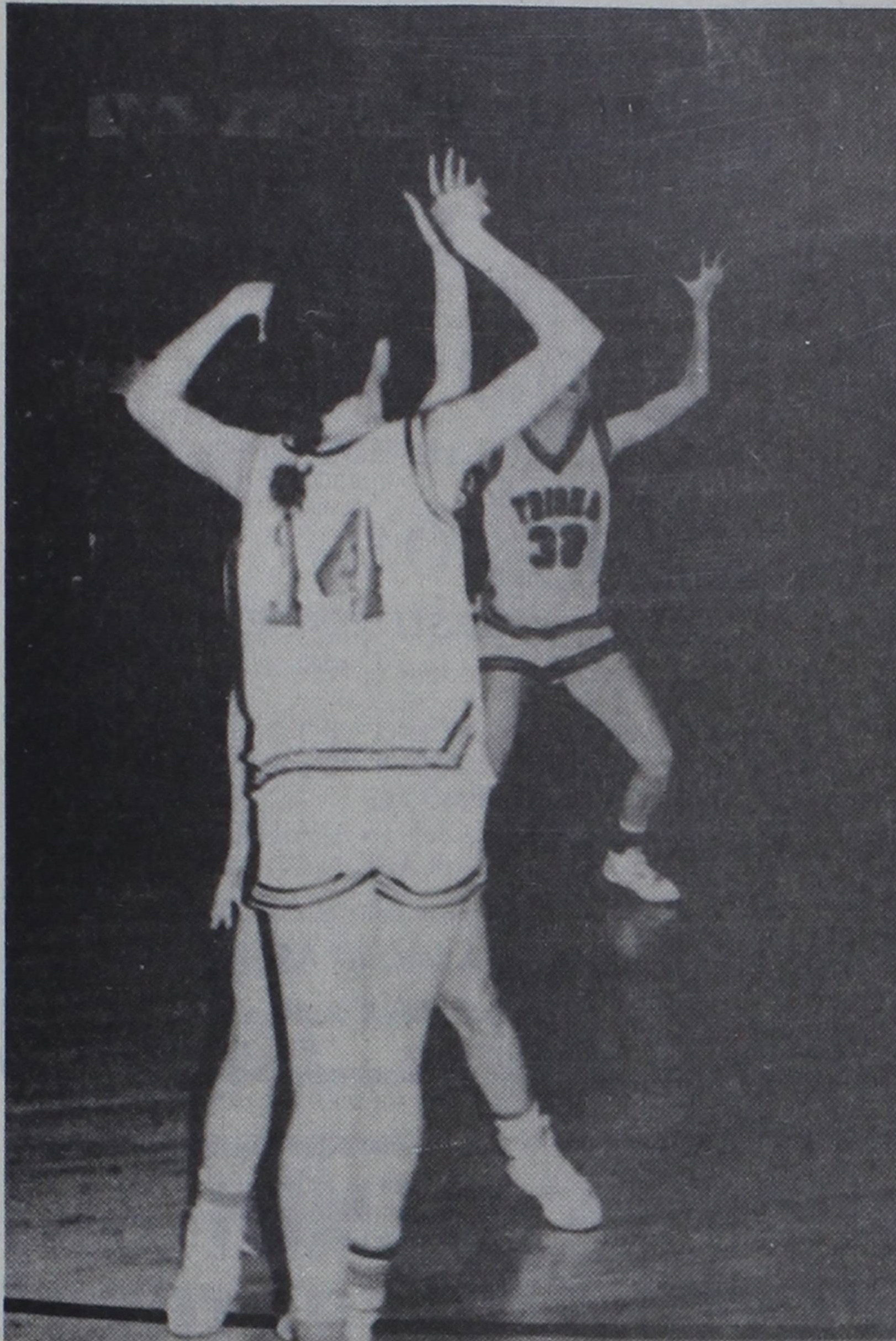

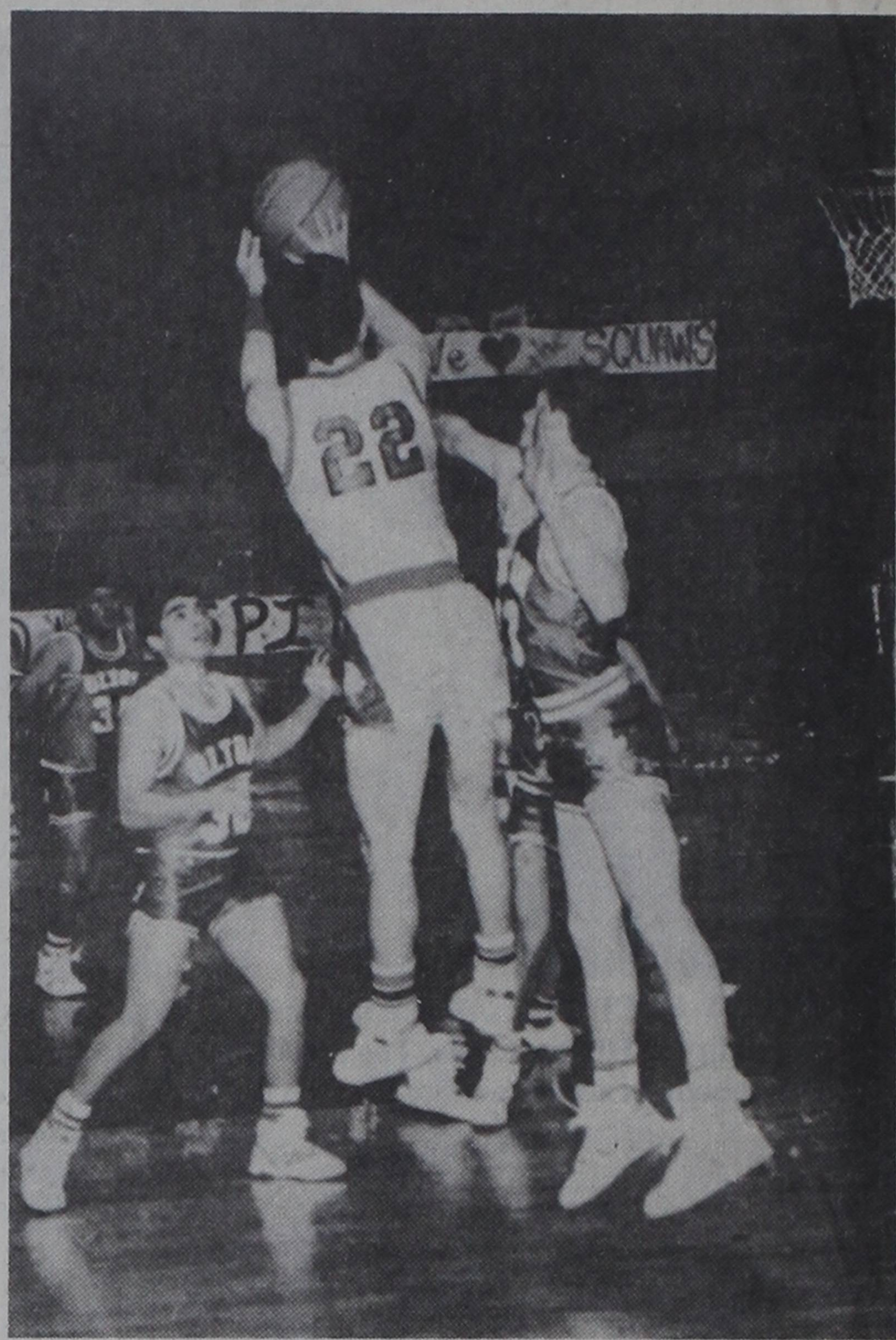

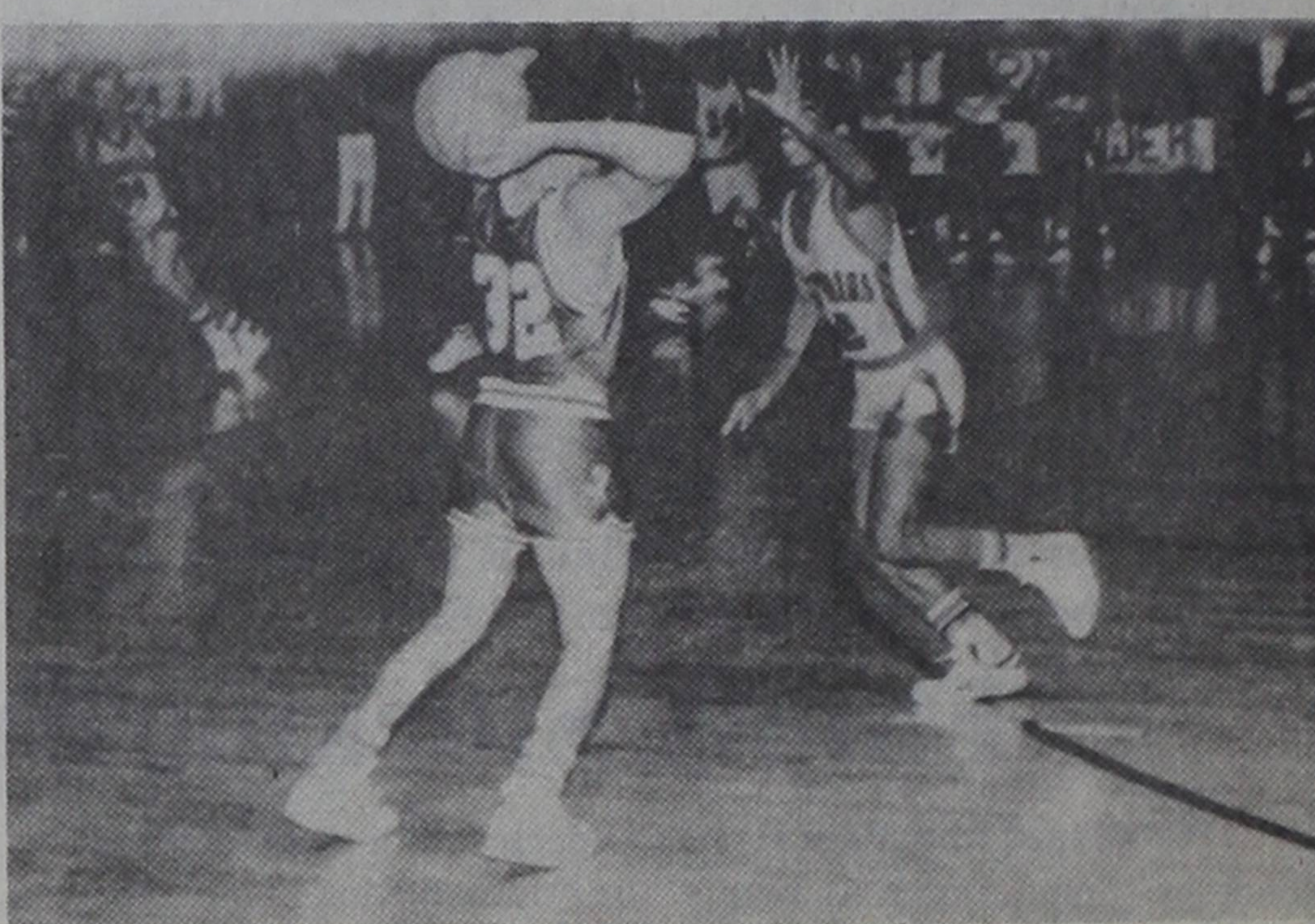

Ilene Osborn is at home recovering from her recent knee replacement surgery.

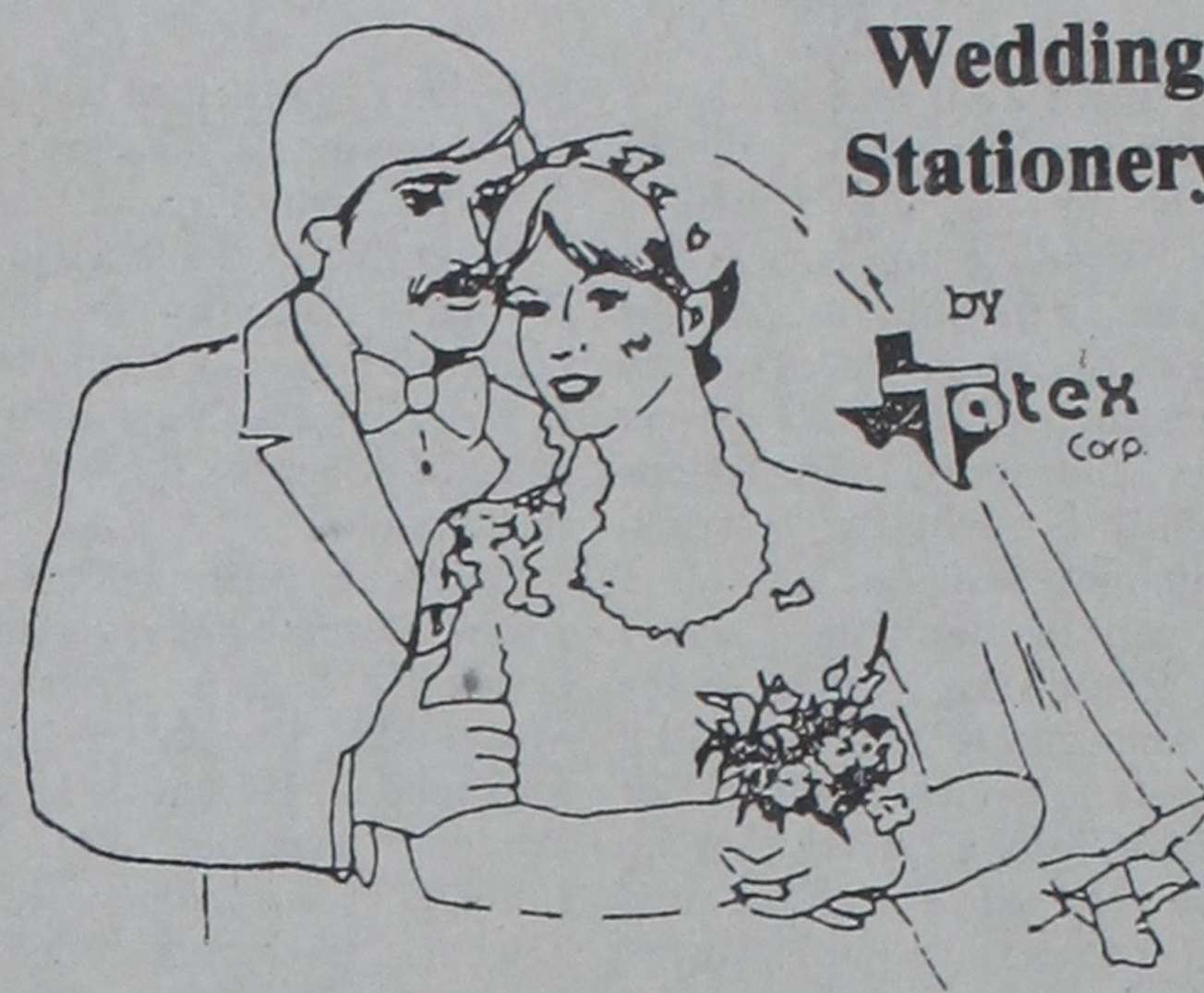
