IN RECENT WEEKS, someone started a movement to prohibit pre-game prayers over the public address systems prior to high school and/or college football games.

Lance Lahnert, sports columnist for the Amarillo Daily News, had some comments on this subject recently, and rather than re-hash, we thought we'd just quote the Amarillo writer's comments verbatim:

"Prohibiting prayer over the public address system before a football game is 'way overblown."

"Most prayers before a game ask for the safety of the players on the field and the safety for those driving home after the game."

"Real heavy theological stuff, eh?"

"One of the more touching experiences I've seen at a high school football game occurred in Friona a couple of years ago. I don't even know who was praying. But after the safety bit, they said something like, "...and God, help the rescue mission in Midland for little Jessica."

"Well, along about the second quarter, the game announcer bellowed out: 'Jessica is safe. She has been rescued.'"

"What followed was wild applause from the stands."

Why can't those who prefer atheism just keep their desires to themselves, and not be continually interrupting, or attempting to interrupt, our traditions, so that their personal "feelings" won't be hurt.

In some ways, this is comparable to the way our legal system has been bent completely out of shape in recent years by those wanting to protect the rights of the criminals.

The pendulum in this situation has swung so far that it begins to seem as though the criminals have all the rights, and that the ones who are victims of crimes have no rights at all.

Every so often, we'd like to see those in charge "Just say no."

When a plea such as this recent one regarding pre-game prayer is made, officials should stick by their guns and say something to the effect of: "This is what we have done, and plan to continue to do. If you don't like it, or are offended, then we are sorry, but we're not forcing you to attend these public functions."

THE FRIONA school board had what Superintendent Hal Ratcliff described as a "wild meeting" on Monday night of this week.

Later, they went back to the board room and resumed their meeting, when the power went off and there were no lights.

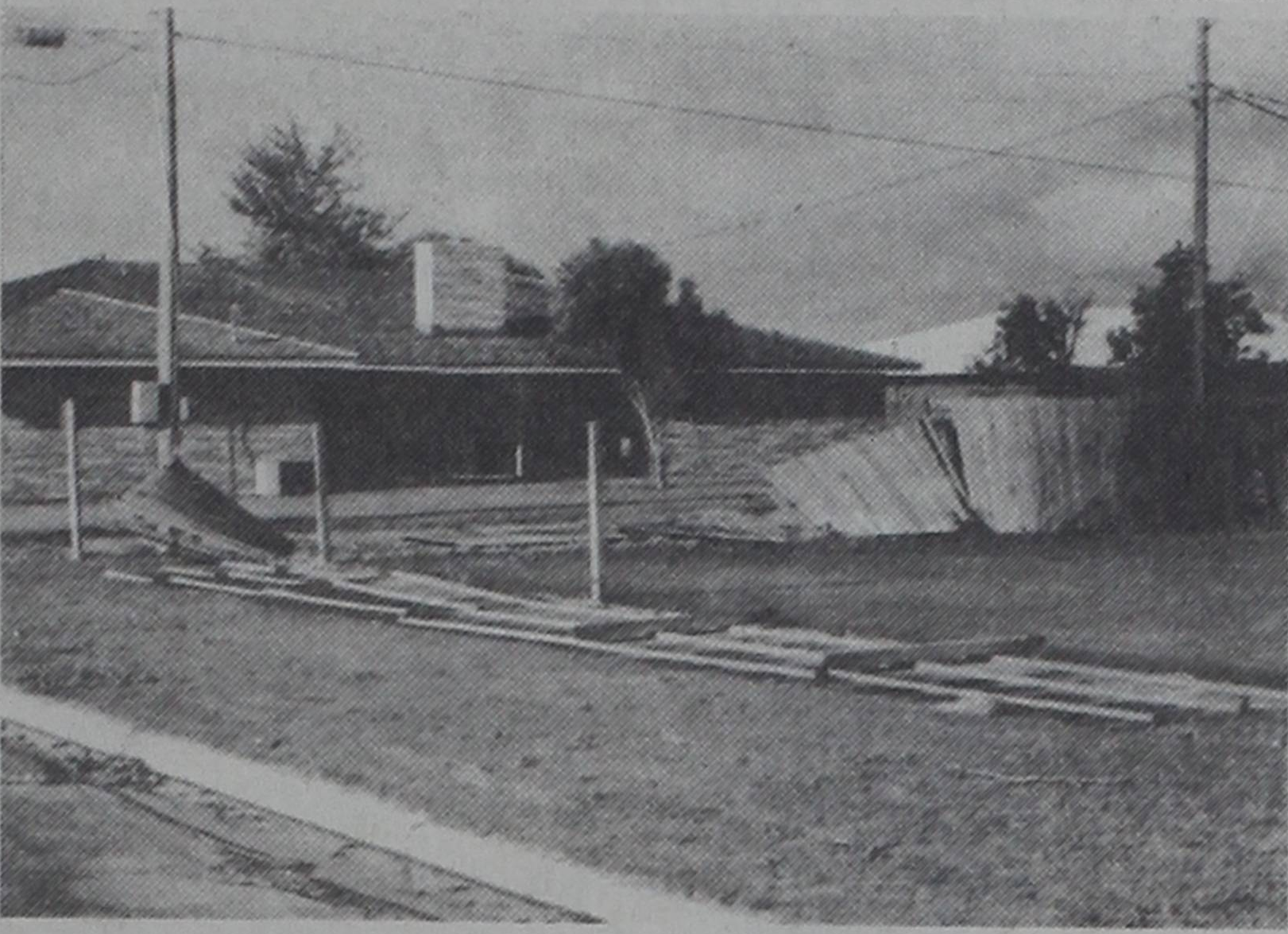
To top things off, board member Terry Wilkerson was called from the meeting after a section of the roof blew off the Excel plant.

Graduation Tickets To Be Required

The Friona School Board authorized the administration to develop a ticket plan for both the junior high and high school graduation exercises for the 1989-90 school year.

"I'm sure that the way we have been operating, we have been violating the fire codes," said Superintendent of Schools Hal Ratcliff.

Ratcliff said that the situation would be studied, and that the present plans are to devise a formula for allotting each graduate, both eighth grade and seniors, a certain number of tickets, based on the size of the class and the auditorium's seating capacity.

"A number of schools have gone to this system, and it seems to be working. This way, if a student needs more tickets for relatives and friends, they have to ask around to their friends and find the extra tickets they need," Ratcliff said.

In other business, counselors Jackie Morgan, Sheryl Salyer and Tonya Gober reported on the results of the TEAMS and CAT tests administered by the school district in 1988-89. The test results indicated that Friona students were above the state average at every grade level on the TEAMS tests.

Superintendent Ratcliff reported to the board on the resignations received from the following teachers: Peggy Hamil, high school; Teresa Parks, high school; Mary Pryor and Robert Brandon, junior high school, and Margaret Duggins, elementary school.

At the same time, the board approved the hiring of the following teachers for the 1989-90 school year: Tara Wales, high school Spanish and E.S.L.; Sandra Houston, elementary school; Russell Schaub, junior high math; Kent Smith, science and assistant coach and Brenda Smith, h. s. science.

High Winds Damage Trees, Fences Here

The Friona area was buffeted by winds that were measured at 90 miles per hour on Monday evening.

The high winds blew down yard fences all over town, and also damaged or completely demolished trees of all sizes.

But the brunt of the windstorm was felt at the Excel Corp. three miles west of the city, where a section of the roof was blown off.

Excel officials said that a fourth of the roof on the fabrication (new portion) of the plant was blown off.

Lesser damage was noted around town. For all of the blowing, the rainfall measurement was just .61 inch of moisture. The same evening, Hereford reported 1.15 inches, and Amarillo had over two inches of rain.

Helen Potts reported that the wind blew down a large evergreen tree, estimated to have been 36 feet tall. The tree was planted about 27 years ago when she and Cordie moved into their present home.

Mrs. Potts said that they received "a little over an inch" of rainfall in the Rhea community. "I've lived here 76 years, and I can't remember the wind blowing like it did Monday night," Mrs. Potts said.

During Monday evening's storm, it was reported that Glen Herring went to check on his

airplanes, which were anchored at his spraying business just west of the city. Herring said that an instrument recorded gusts of wind up to 90 miles per hour during the storm.

The windstorm uprooted a large willow tree in the front yard of Wesley Foster at 403 West 14th Street.

An evergreen tree that measured over 30 feet tall was also uprooted at the home of Dr. Paul Spring, 910 Summit. The tree fell over against the Spring's home.

Another evergreen tree was a casualty at the Roy Clements residence, 904 West Fifth Street, where a large, old tree was toppled.

So many fences sustained damage by local residents, that suffice it so say that if your fence escaped damage, then you should consider yourself among the lucky ones.

Fire Chief Jim Taylor said that the report of a funnel spotted Monday evening came from the public. "We had spotters out in the area north of town, and saw no funnel, but that's not to say that there was none. From some of the damage I saw, a funnel might have been involved," he said.

Taylor said that with the TV warning system back in operation, the TV announcement would continue to be the local

department's main method of warning about severe weather.

"Some people had unplugged their television sets when the lightning started, and they missed the announcements. Next time we will use both the TV and also sound the siren. However, the way the wind was blowing Monday night, only a few houses would have been able to have heard the siren," Taylor said.

Friona Fire Department issued a "take cover" warning just after 8:45 p.m. Monday, when a cloud just north of town was believed to have contained a funnel.

The "all clear" signal was issued about an hour later.

Making matters worse for many residents was the fact that their power went off at around 9:30 p.m. Many were not able to hear the "all clear" signal.

The power remained off until about 2:30 a.m. Tuesday morning.

Highway 60 Project Said 'On Schedule'

The upgrading of U.S. Highway 60 to a four-lane facility through Parmer County continues to make progress.

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation expects to award a contract for construction of the first phase of the road in February or March of 1990. Actual construction would begin within 30 days of the awarding of contracts.

The first portion to be constructed will be that from Friona to the Deaf Smith County line, a distance of about 17 miles.

The second stage of construction will be from Friona to Bovina, and the third stage will be from Bovina to Farwell.

Highway department officials hope to award contracts for the second and third stages of the road improvement in succeeding years: stage two in 1991 and stage three in 1992.

"Currently, about 60 per cent of the right-of-way has been acquired on the portion from Friona to Deaf Smith County, and negotiations are continuing on the remainder of the right-of-way, utility adjustments are being made, and plans are being prepared for the construction of the project," says District Highway Engineer Mel Pope of Lubbock.

Rhea Bradley of Littlefield, resident engineer for the Department of Highways and Transportation, said that the major difficulty he sees, and the only possibility that the contract dates might not be met is the fact that there are several tracts of right-of-way on which condemnation proceedings are having to be filed. Also, he mentioned the timing on utility adjustments needed along the right-of-way.

Included in the Highway Department's plans for the road between Friona and Deaf Smith County is a frontage or service road for the elevators at Black. The present highway will be left as a service road, with the new four lanes being swung to the north.

"This should eliminate the problems we have with the wind currents, as well as the icing problem in the shadow of the elevators," Bradley said.

Funding for the project is no

problem at the present time, the highway officials say.

Residents of the area have been needing, and waiting for, this highway improvement for a long time, and depending on how quickly the paper work can be completed along the right-of-way, the project should be ready to start by next spring.

"It's not so much the fact that Highway 60 in the Friona area has a high traffic count, as it is the type of traffic that it carries," Bradley said, referring to the extremely high percentage of trucks, which service the area's feedlots, packing plant and other related industries.

Bradley said that in drawing the plans for the road construction, he was about "on schedule," as

compared to the right-of-way acquisition. "I'm about 60 per cent through," he said.

The highway engineer said that it was planned to construct two new lanes to the north of the existing highway. Then, when the new lanes are completed, the traffic will switch to the new portion while the old lanes are torn up and re-constructed.

"So, the highway will continue to be two lanes for the duration of the construction, but we hope to make it as easy as possible for motorists during the construction period," the spokesman said.

Also, the highway department's plans are to keep the present route of the road through Friona, making more of a division. Bradley said this should not present too much of a problem.

Another potential problem is just to the west of town where traffic exits and enters the Excel Packing Plant. "But that's my problem for next year," the highway spokesman said.

50 YEARS AGO--JUNE 16, 1939

A radio program contest for 4-H Club boys in Parmer County has been announced by County Agent Jason O. Gordon, with broadcasts to be given each Wednesday at 8 o'clock over KICA, Clovis, as a means toward encouraging club members to deliver talks on agricultural subjects, and to explain to the citizenry the true meaning of 4-H Club work.

On June 2, a letter was sent by the county committee to all wheat farmers in the county who had seeded barley in either seeded wheat or volunteer wheat in order to be within the acreage allotment.

45 YEARS AGO--JUNE 16, 1944

Work has begun on the erection of a large building on the lots just north of the Santa Fe Grain Company office and warehouse, to be used by the Santa Fe Machinery Company, local Case implement dealers. The building is a frame structure, 32x60 feet, and the frame work is up and under roof.

For the first time in three years the Frio Draw filled and overflowed its banks Sunday afternoon, as a result of the heavy rains that fell over in New Mexico Friday evening and night.

35 YEARS AGO--JUNE 10, 1954

Lumber was being unloaded Tuesday at Black for construction of additional storage bins at the Black Grain Company. Chalmers and Borden, Kansas construction firm, has contracted to build storage for 260,000 bushels on the east of the present bins. The elevator now has storage facilities for 460,000 bushels.

Fire and smoke damage estimated at about \$1,000 was the net result of a fire early Sunday night at the Jim Rule residence in the west part of Friona. Fire Chief Charlie Bainum said that the fire was believed to have originated from a floor furnace.

City Gets Rebate On Sales Tax

The City of Friona recently received a check for \$12,403.59 from the state comptroller of accounts, representing sales tax collected during the month of March by business firms, and during the first quarter by quarterly filers.

This compared to a check for \$13,613.67 that the city had received at the corresponding time in 1988. However, the city's total receipts for the year, \$47,743.66, still show a 17.7 per cent increase over the total of \$40,550.19 it had received at the same point in time in 1988.

For the calendar year, the three municipal governments in Parmer County had received \$77,887.72 in sales tax rebates as of May. This was an increase of 20.89 per cent over the total of \$64,428.27 they had received in 1988, speaking for a nice upturn for the local economy.

"We have watched sales tax rebates across the state grow by more than 11 per cent overall this year. More money is being pumped into our economy, which is great for the state and for local governments," said State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

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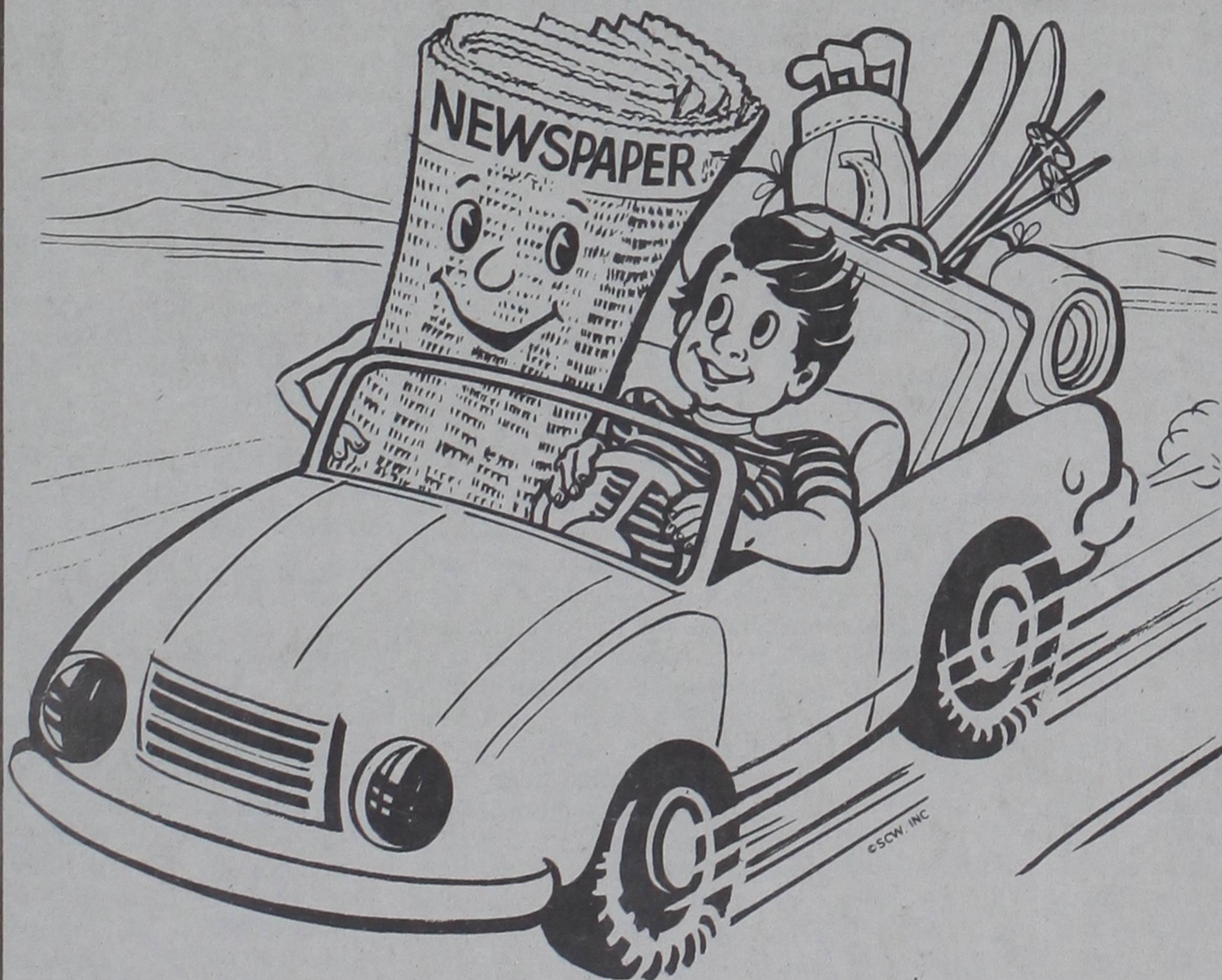

Scholarship Money Is Made Available

Every year, millions of dollars are awarded to students planning to further their educations. Foundations across the U.S. and around the world supply many students with the money they need to attend their respective colleges and universities.

However, as remarkable as it may seem, thousands of these dollars go unclaimed. Students and their parents do not know about many of these scholarships, grants, and low-interest loans; therefore, they never apply for them, and thus, the money "sits still."

Many people ask, "How do we find out about these scholarships?" Several organizations have supplied an answer through the use of modern technology.

The qualifications, application processes, deadlines for application, and amounts for each type of financial assistance are stored in computers.

A student need only submit a completed questionnaire and a small fee to the organization, and the student's information is then transferred to the computer.

A report is compiled which provides an address and description of every scholarship on file for which the student might qualify. The report is mailed to the student, and he or she begins the application process for a number of financial assistance programs.

Some organizations provide services in addition to the financial aid research. These include work-study programs, strategies and budget planning for college costs, and check lists for college application and acceptance.

Young people should not wait until their final year in high school to pursue these steps for financial aid. Many of the deadlines are set for early fall, so students need to start applying as soon as possible.

Scholarships are not limited to high school seniors. Several scholarships can be applied for during the freshman, sophomore and junior years of high school, but the money cannot be used until

the student begins his or her college career.

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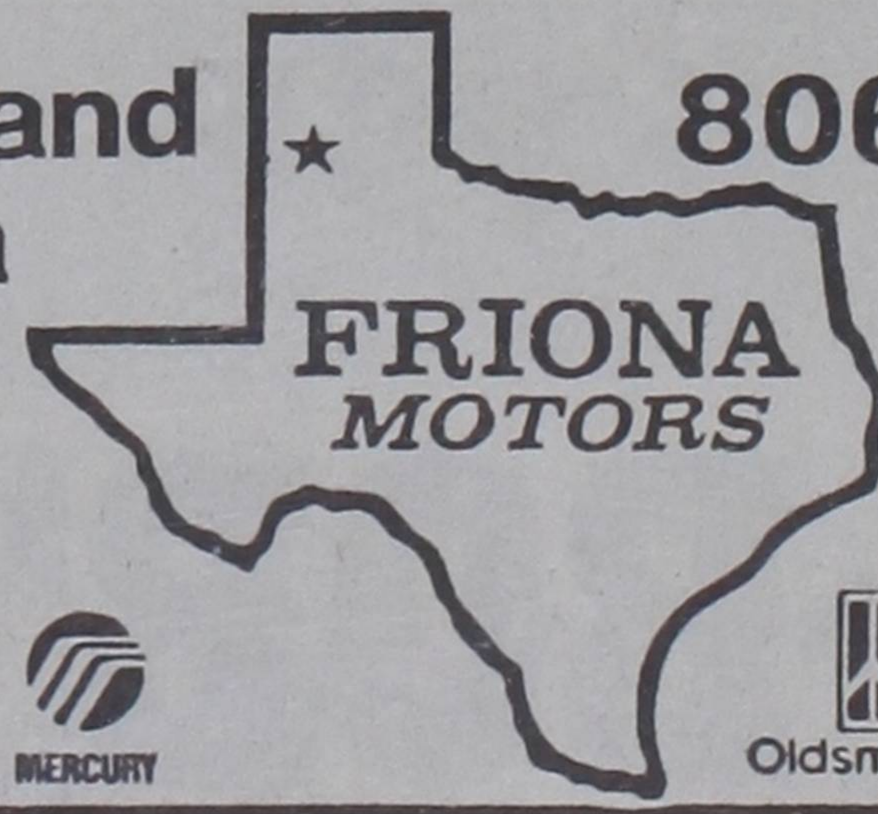
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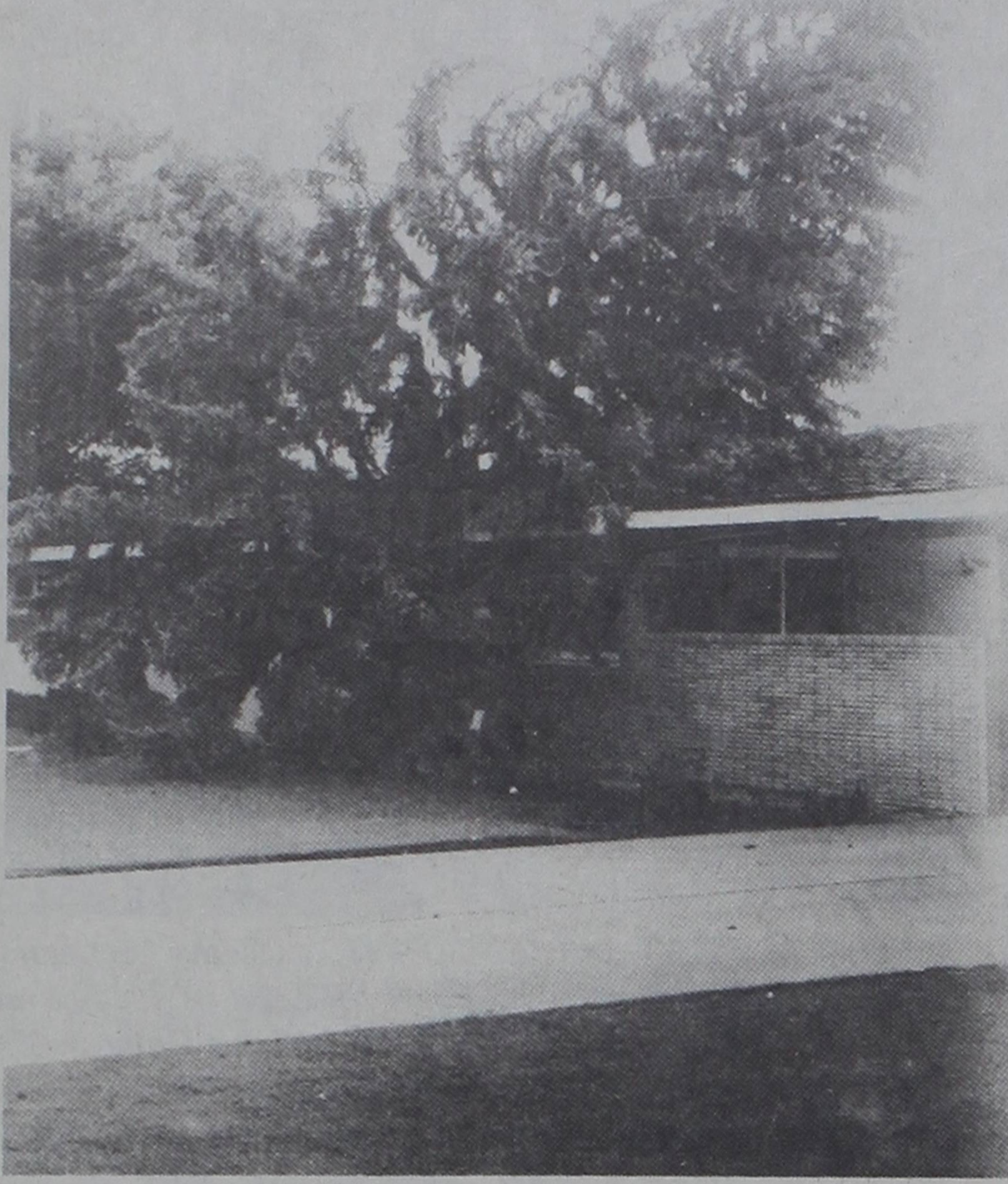
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TREE TOPPLED...This large spruce tree at the Paul Spring residence was blown over, onto the roof of the house during Monday's storm.

The ceremony will begin at 3 p.m. that day.

Teeny Bowden, chairman of the Castro County Historical Commission, said the date was chosen to coincide with the arrival of a delegation of former prisoners of war from Italy who were held at the camp during World War II.

The commission received word this week that the Italians will be here from June 17-21.

Approximately the same number of former Italian servicemen will be on hand for the dedication as were here in April 1988, Mrs. Bowden said, although they won't all be the same men. Many of those who came last year donated money toward the chapel's restoration.

Twenty-three former POWs and

guests will arrive from Italy in Amarillo June 17. They will stay at the Harvey Hotel.

Other entertainment is being planned for the Italians, including "TEXAS" on the night of June 20 and a meal in Hereford. They will leave on June 21.

Contributions toward furnishing of transportation for the group while in Texas will be accepted by the Commission.

The chapel is on land donated by Charles Schlabs, who has been a big benefactor to the project. The Castro County Historical Commission has spent the past year restoring the chapel, in repairs and painting of the building itself, fencing, walks, underground watering system and grass planting.

A marker bearing the names of the POWs who were originally buried there, has been laid.

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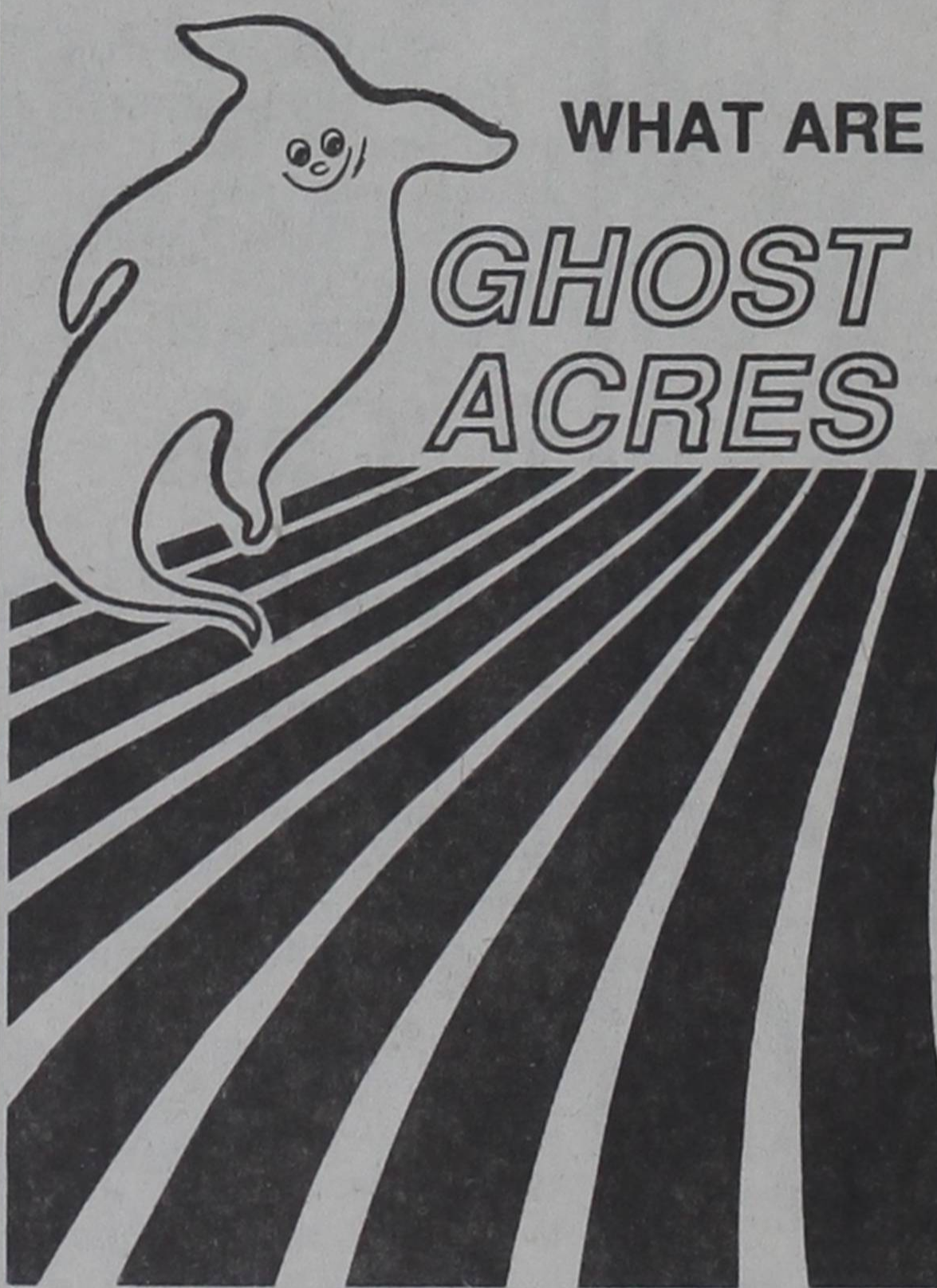

The bride's table was decorated with a bouquet containing two dozen pink roses. The multiple tiered white wedding cake was decorated with fresh pink flowers.

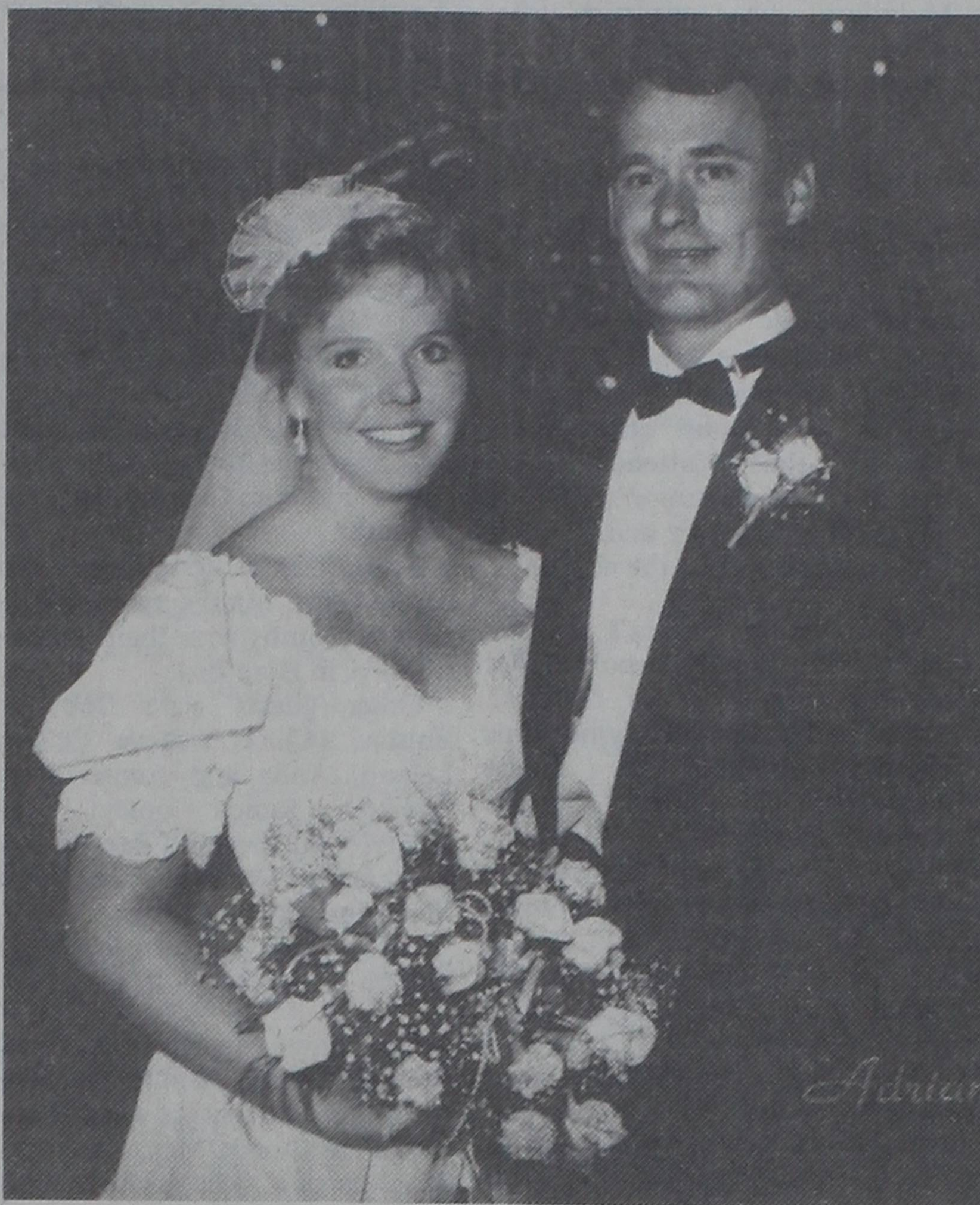

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Salesman Confesses

Claims newspaper is best salesman

On Monday, Jules Wintner, owner of a local retail establishment, confessed his job as a salesman was obsolete due to the impact of newspaper advertising. Wintner, in an exclusive interview, said sales were made in the local paper instead of in the store.

"Sure, we get a chance for additional sales," Wintner commented, "but the newspaper has become our best salesman." Wintner reported that consumers name the local newspaper as their usual source of "Best Buy" information, 10 times more than radio or television. This conforms with a recent Consumer Data Service report that indicated 60% of the consumers seek "Best Buy" information from the newspaper versus only 6% for radio and 7% for television.

Wintner later remarked that because the newspaper is read by all Texans, regardless of income, his business was able to sell both upper end products as well as value priced items. "No matter what we're selling, we get good response in the newspaper," he said. "In fact, the more expensive the product, the better our response seems to be." This fact is substantiated in a survey by the Texas Newspaper Advertising Bureau that documented readership of the newspaper increases as income increases. In the survey, almost 75% of Texans with incomes exceeding \$50,000 a year read
