## Area Gets Moisture Friday!

Now, that brings us to the other news that we heard this week. Don't know how to say this tactfully, so just bear with us.

It seems that another so-called expert has come up with the startling news that the threatened hole in the earth's ozone, which up until now has been blamed on vehicle emissions and other similar type pollutants, has been traced to another, more threatening source.

It seems that the biggest threat, this specialist maintains, is from feedlot and farm animals flatulating.

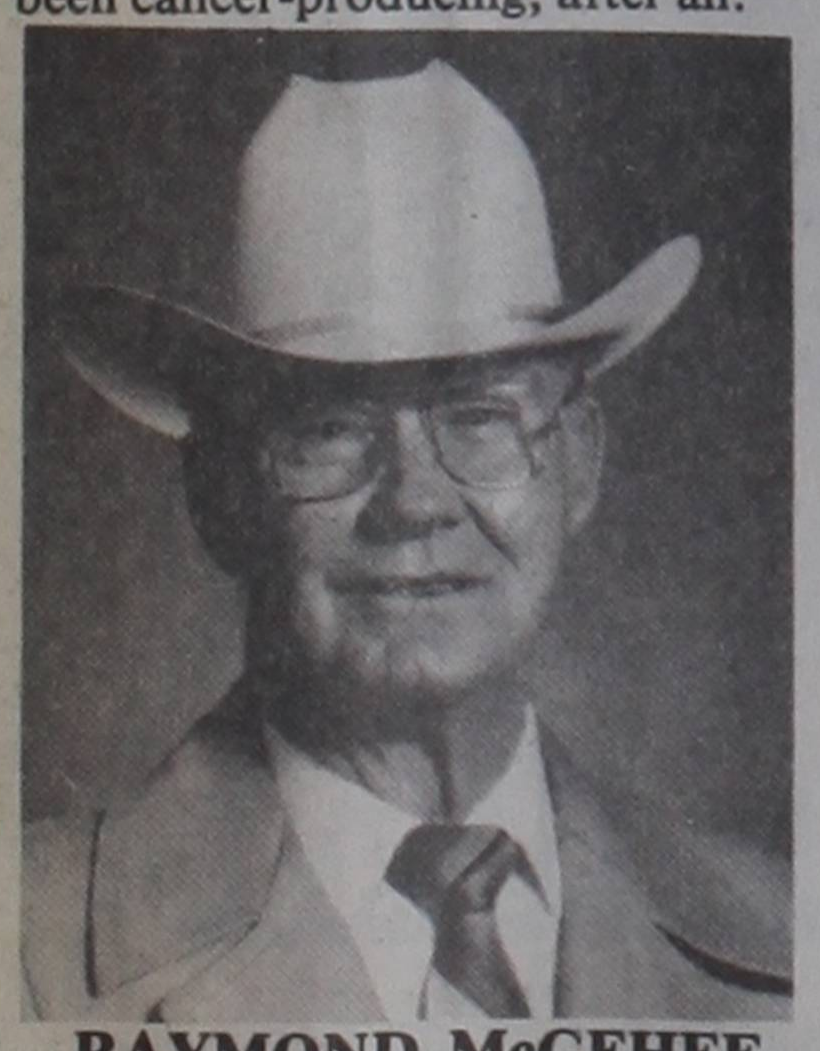
Now here is a real problem for the E.P.A.!

The first moisture in over 50 days was registered in Friona Friday morning, when a rain-snow mix deposited .17 inch in the official Friona gauge.

The rain was not received in time to keep the month of November from ending without even a trace of moisture on its record. It is the first calendar month of the year, and in quite some time, to end without so much as a trace of moisture.

November also ended on a chilly note, with a low of 13 degrees, the season's lowest reading, on Wednesday morning, November 29.

November ended with 15 days in which the high temperature reached at least 70 degrees. This was on the heels of an October in which a similar number of days found the mercury reaching into the 80s.

The fact that it never fell below the freezing mark Thursday night enabled the snow to melt as it fell.

The Chiefs will then play the winner/loser of Bovina-Sudan game in the second round, either 11:30 a.m. or 5:30 p.m. Friday.

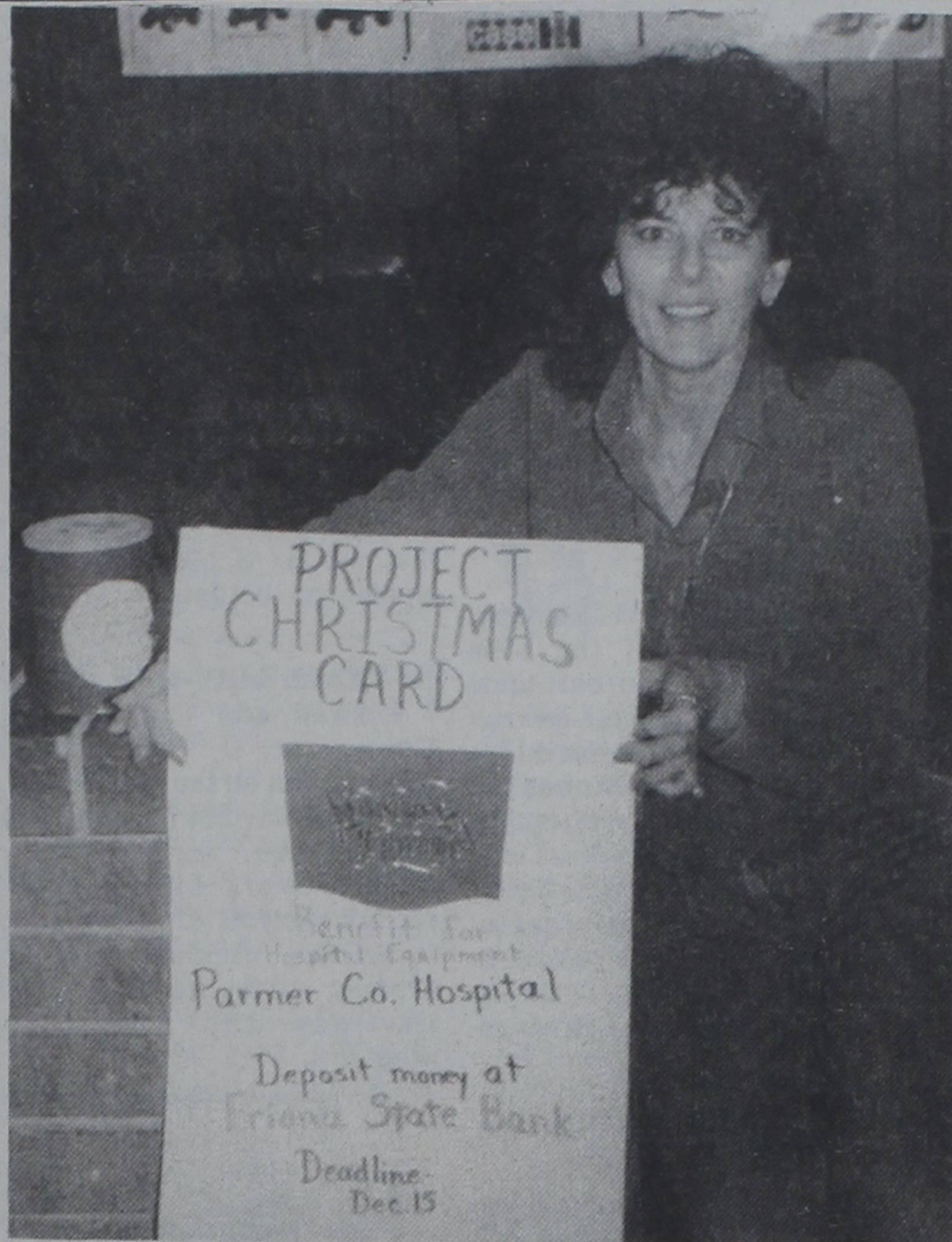
Other teams in the boys division are Olton, Farwell, Texico and Grady, N.M.

## Project Xmas Card Begins

Hospital administrator Elda Hart says that this year's fund will go to purchase updated equipment for the hospital.

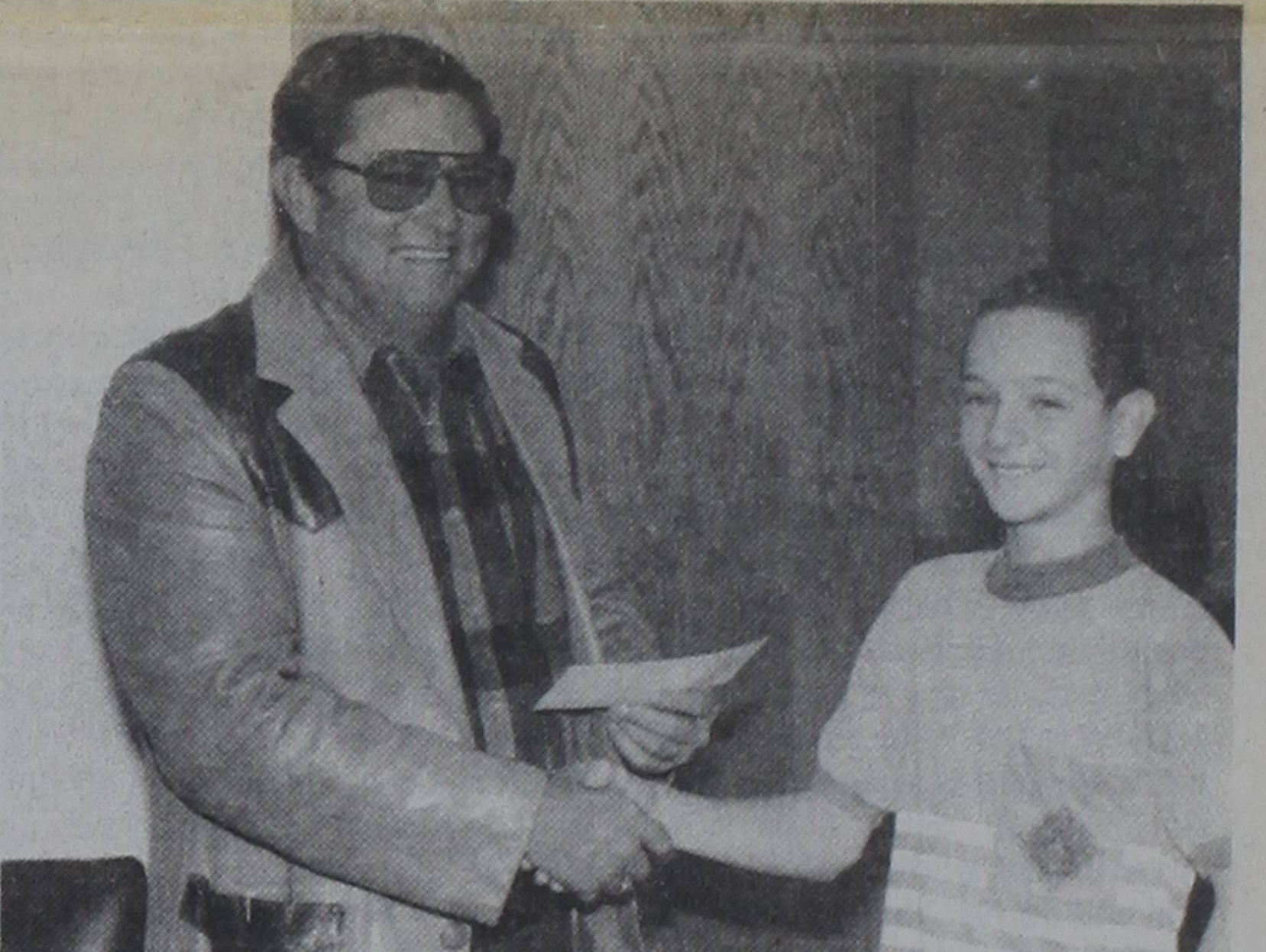
"One of the possible machines we would like to have is a pulse oximeter, which measures the oxygen content in the blood," Ms. Hart said. This machine costs in the neighborhood of \$3,000, but the hospital chief would like to secure a machine on a trial basis if possible, to let the physicians decide if it really is worthwhile.

Another possibility is a new "I-Vac," which is a pump that measures the drip in I.V. solutions, making them more accurate. This machine will cost in the neighborhood of \$1700.00.

Then, there is the need for an ultra-sonic nebulizer, which is an aid to respiratory patients, helping them breathe. The cost is \$650.00. This machine releases a warm mist of air.

If the fund raises what it has in recent years, there is the possibility of providing all three of these needs for the hospital.

Donations to Project Christmas Card may be made at Friona State Bank, as well as at a number of businesses in the community.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

## 60 YEARS AGO--NOV. 29, 1929

What might have been a most destructive fire at the gin Tuesday evening was averted by wise management and presence of mind of the overseer, Mr. Waddell. Some cotton became ignited, and Mr. Waddell kept the machinery in motion until the burning cotton reached the press, where it was covered with other lint and bound up in a bale and discharged, so that the only loss was the bale of cotton.

## 55 YEARS AGO--NOV. 30, 1934

Many farmers of this locality are still busy sowing wheat; the rain that fell two weeks ago delayed planting. Some of these farmers had been waiting for the moisture to complete their seeding operations; others had not sown any, and still others find themselves obliged to resow much of their acreage that had already been sown earlier but failed to get a stand on account of lack of moisture.

## 50 YEARS AGO--NOV. 24, 1939

Reports reaching the Star office are to the effect that work on the

Parmer County REA project is progressing at a most satisfactory rate, and that present indications are that the lines will be ready for energizing by the early part of December. Workmen are busy wiring homes of the subscribers so as to be ready for the current as soon as the lines are ready to receive it.

## 45 YEARS AGO--NOV. 24, 1944

The biggest crowd in Friona's history is expected for the district title game which will be played on Thanksgiving Day in Friona between Friona and Hereford. Friona and Hereford won the right to play last week when the executive committee of the district met. Three teams, Friona, Hereford and Tulia, tied for the district's co-championship, but Hereford and Friona drew the right to play to see who represents the district in bi-district play.

## 40 YEARS AGO--NOV. 25, 1949

The Rev. George Meyer of Baker, Montana, will arrive here during the week, and will preach at the Congregational Church Sunday morning. Rev. Meyer is

coming here to look over the situation with a possible view to accepting a call to locate here as pastor of the church.

## 35 YEARS AGO--NOV. 26, 1954

Less than \$9,000 stands in the way for construction planning for the new Parmer County Community Hospital, manager Jimmie Baxter said this week. The organized drive is still underway to secure the needed funds in the next few days, and over one-third of the contacts remain to be made in Friona alone. At last accounting, \$32,594 was in hand on the project with another \$8,688 on the books as pledged.

## 25 YEARS AGO--NOV. 26, 1964

Nine members of the 1964 Friona Chieftain football team were named to the all-district teams chosen by District 3-AA coaches at a meeting Monday at Olton. Four of the players, tackle, Dale Milner; fullback, Doug Dodd; tackle, Gene Weatherly; and halfback, Milton Hargus, were selected to the first teams. In addition, halfback, Danny Murphree; tackle, Ray Braxton,

guard, Bob Sims; center, Bing Bingham and end, Larry Buckley, were named to the second teams.

## 20 YEARS AGO--NOV. 27, 1969

Lazbuddie's Longhorns, out for their second straight class B bi-district championship, will face a Groom team bent on revenge when the two meet Friday night at 7:30 p.m. at Panhandle.

The last service to be conducted at the old building of the Union Congregational Church will be held next Sunday morning at 11 a.m. The adobe building, which the members of the church have been using for 47 years, will see its last use as a place of formal worship on this date.

## 15 YEARS AGO--NOV. 24, 1974

Boswell and Crafton, Inc., Contractor, has begun construction on the first section of State Highway 214 from the Bailey County line, north to Clay's Corner. Work will include the reconstruction of the grading, structures, flexible base and asphalt surfacing to a 26 ft. travelway with 9 ft. paved shoulders.

Lars Asbrink of Stockholm, Sweden, was a visitor in Friona the week of November 8-14, in the home of Mr. and Mrs. W.A. Cochran. The Asbrinks were the host family for Kay Cochran, who was an American Field Service exchange student to Sweden during the summer of 1973.

## 10 YEARS AGO--NOV. 25, 1979

Friona's 1979 United Fund drive topped the 100 per cent mark this week. Co-chairmen Danny Kendrick and Larry Knowles, reported that as of Wednesday noon, a total of \$10,934 had been deposited at Friona State Bank. This represented 103 per cent of the 1979 goal.

As of Thursday, November 22, 8,005 bales of cotton had been ginned in Parmer County.

## 5 YEARS AGO--NOV. 25, 1984

Funeral services for W. Doyle Elliott, 58, of Midland, were held Monday, November 19 at 1 p.m. in the First Baptist Church of Friona. Funeral services for Homer A. Hyde, 95, were held at 2:30 p.m. Friday at the Calvary Baptist Church.

## Self-Soothing Function

Here's one I've been thinking about for quite a while. Several different sub-types of patients with psychiatric illnesses display a core defect in self-soothing function. As I go through these for you, see if you recognize anyone near and dear.

**DYSTHYMIA.** These people have been depressed all their lives. They have a hangdog mood, have difficulty finding enthusiasm for anything, and their lives are filled with joyless striving. These individuals have difficulty nurturing and soothing themselves. Deep down inside they have inadequate feelings and terrible self-esteem. They use a depressed mood to get people to take care of them, and soothe them, and make them feel better. Unfortunately, the depressed mood eventually drives people away and they continue to spiral downward in depression. The key to treating these people is to teach them ways to take better care of themselves and to build their self-esteem.

**NARCISSISM.** These individuals look almost exactly opposite from the dysthymics. They seek wealth, power and beauty and demean all other things. They come across as grandiose and self-inflated. They may appear pompous and arrogant. They drive the fastest cars, like to be surrounded by beautiful people and will do just about anything for money. Their core problem: lack of self-soothing function. They,

too, feel deeply inadequate and attempt to make themselves feel better through their grandiose thinking.

**SUBSTANCE ABUSERS.** It's easy to understand how individuals that lack self-soothing abilities often turn to drugs or alcohol to numb their inadequate feelings. When they are drinking or using drugs they feel a little bit better about themselves, but when they are sober they feel horrible. The key to treating substance abuse is not taking away substances, it's helping the individual feel better about himself or herself.

**TYPE A PERSONALITY.** These people are workaholics. They're always in a hurry. They like building numbers. They are driven to acquire more and more of everything. Their coat of arms is a stopwatch. Their obsession with time and numbers and hurry masks inadequate feelings. They need to learn to comfort themselves.

Regular readers of this column note that most of the messages have to do with self-soothing functioning: balance in life, humor, turning over your problems to God, meditation, prayer, taking time for solitude, learning to appreciate yourself, paying attention to those small things which make life valuable and truly enjoyable. Boil all these self-soothing functions down and you're left with love.

In *The Sermon on the Mount*, Emmett Fox wrote, "There is no difficulty that enough love will not

conquer; no disease that enough love will not heal; no door that enough love will not open; no gulf that enough love will not bridge; no wall that enough love will not throw down; no sin that enough love will not redeem...it makes no difference how deeply-seated may be the trouble, how hopeless the outlook, how muddled the tangle, how great the mistake, a sufficient realization of love will dissolve it all. If only you could love enough you would be the happiest and most powerful being in the world."

Jesus gave us a wonderful example. Caring, assertive, tough, but kind, Christ personified perfect love. When He said, "Ye must be perfect as your heavenly Father is perfect," I believe he was speaking of love. What is God but perfect love?

How, then, can we teach love? We can teach love by loving. Indeed, the psychotherapist's main goal involves cultivating a loving, understanding, empathetic, honest relationship with each patient. Through the therapist's example, the patient can begin to love himself or herself and then, in turn, to love others. All of us can be therapists for each other, using the same principles. Love is the best, the only, self-soothing function.

# Chieftain Football Leaders Are Listed

Final statistics compiled this week on the Friona Chieftains' 1989 football season revealed some low figures for leaders in most offensive departments, although some of the leaders sparkled during a 1-9 season.

Sophomore Ismael Rocha led the team in scoring with 32 points, appearing in only four of the team's ten games. His leading total points are the second lowest of any leading team scorer for the past 27 years, however.

Senior Andre Duran led the backfield in rushing yardage, with 503 yards on 126 attempts. Duran's total is the least for a team leader since Nelson Jackson led the rushers with 411 yards in the fall of 1980.

On the positive side, the team had four pass receivers who averaged at least 19.3 yards per completion.

Senior Jeff Stowers led this category with ten receptions good

for 208 yards, including two touchdowns. Rocha's six catches in his four games were good for 116 yards (19.3 yards per catch) and second place.

Sophomore Scott Houston had five catches for 22.8 yards per completion, and senior Mike Sutter added two catches for 20 yards per play.

Stowers also led the Chieftain kickoff returners, averaging 21.6 yards per return on 22 runbacks.

Punt returns were not one of the team's strong points during the season, but Duran led the team in this category, and had one gem, a 63-yard return against Hart that set up a touchdown.

Duran's run is the sixth-longest punt return among those on record at FHS, and second in the 1980s decade only to a 65-yarder by Alfredo Mata in 1984.

Another senior, safety Shannon Cochran, was the leader in pass interceptions with seven, and this was the highest figure since Shy Burney swiped ten opponent passes during the 1985 season.

Duran averaged 34.1 yards on 48 kicks, lacking only 100 yards punting the ball a mile during game situations.

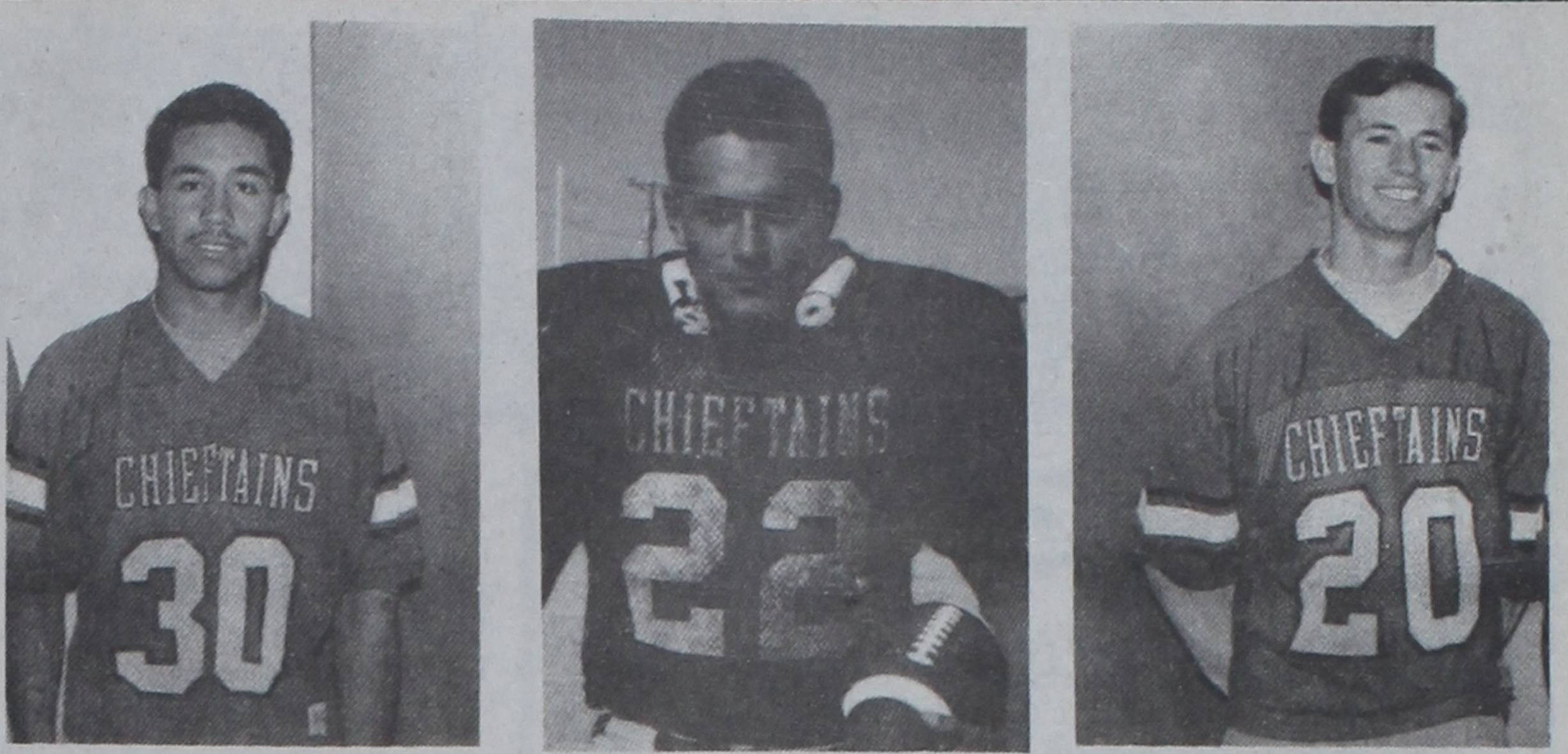

# Lazbuddie Wins Area With Easy Victory

The Lazbuddie Longhorns were playing in the state quarterfinals Friday evening in Wink, after capturing the Area Championship for the second straight year last Friday with a 49-6 win over New Home.

Also for the second year in a row, the Longhorns will be facing the top-ranked team in the state when they meet the Fort Hancock team (from near El Paso), in their third-round game.

Fort Hancock was last year's six-man state champions, and Lazbuddie coach C.W. Williams said that they had all starters returning from the 1988 team.

In the second quarter, Kirk Jesko scored on a 51-yard pass play from Williams. A pass for the PAT failed, but LHS had a 19-0 lead.

Williams then hit Jesko on a seven-yard scoring play. Luis Gonzales kicked for two PATs (kicks are worth two points in six-man). When Zamora plunged in from the one, and Gonzales ran for the PAT, Lazbuddie went to halftime with a 34-0 lead.

Lazbuddie kept it up in the third quarter. Zamora raced 60 yards for his second touchdown, Gonzales running the PAT for a 42-0 Longhorn lead.

New Home kept the game from being called due to the 45-point lead rule by scoring first in the final quarter when their touted runningback finally got in from four yards out for a 42-6 score.

Lazbuddie's final TD came from Casey Russell on a ten-yard pass

from Williams. Russell made it eight points when he snagged a pass from Zamora on the PAT for the final margin of 49-6.

"We out-quicked them. New Home was considerably slower than we were. We were able to slow down their runningback and almost shut him out," said Williams in regard to Coby James, who carried 35 times for New Home and still managed 160 yards.

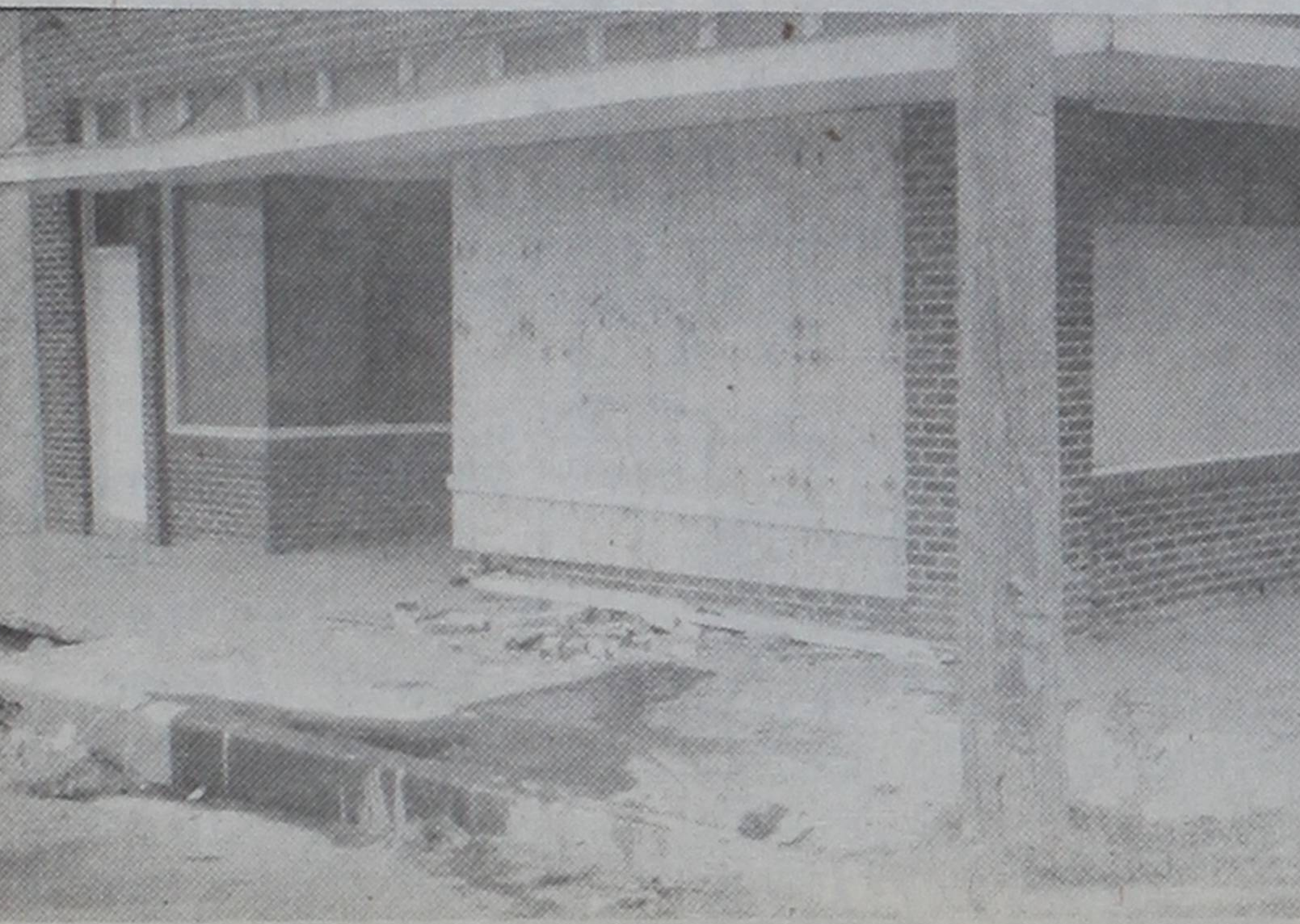

House Bill 82 further provides that the governing body of a taxing unit, may by official action, begin the taxation of tangible personal property.

The County Commissioners of the Parmer County, Texas, will conduct a PUBLIC HEARING to begin the policy of taxing vehicles on December 22, 1989, at 5 p.m. at the county courtroom in the Parmer County Courthouse, Farwell, Texas.

All interested persons are entitled to speak and present evidence for or against the taxation of vehicles. This notice is published in compliance with the provisions of House Bill 82.

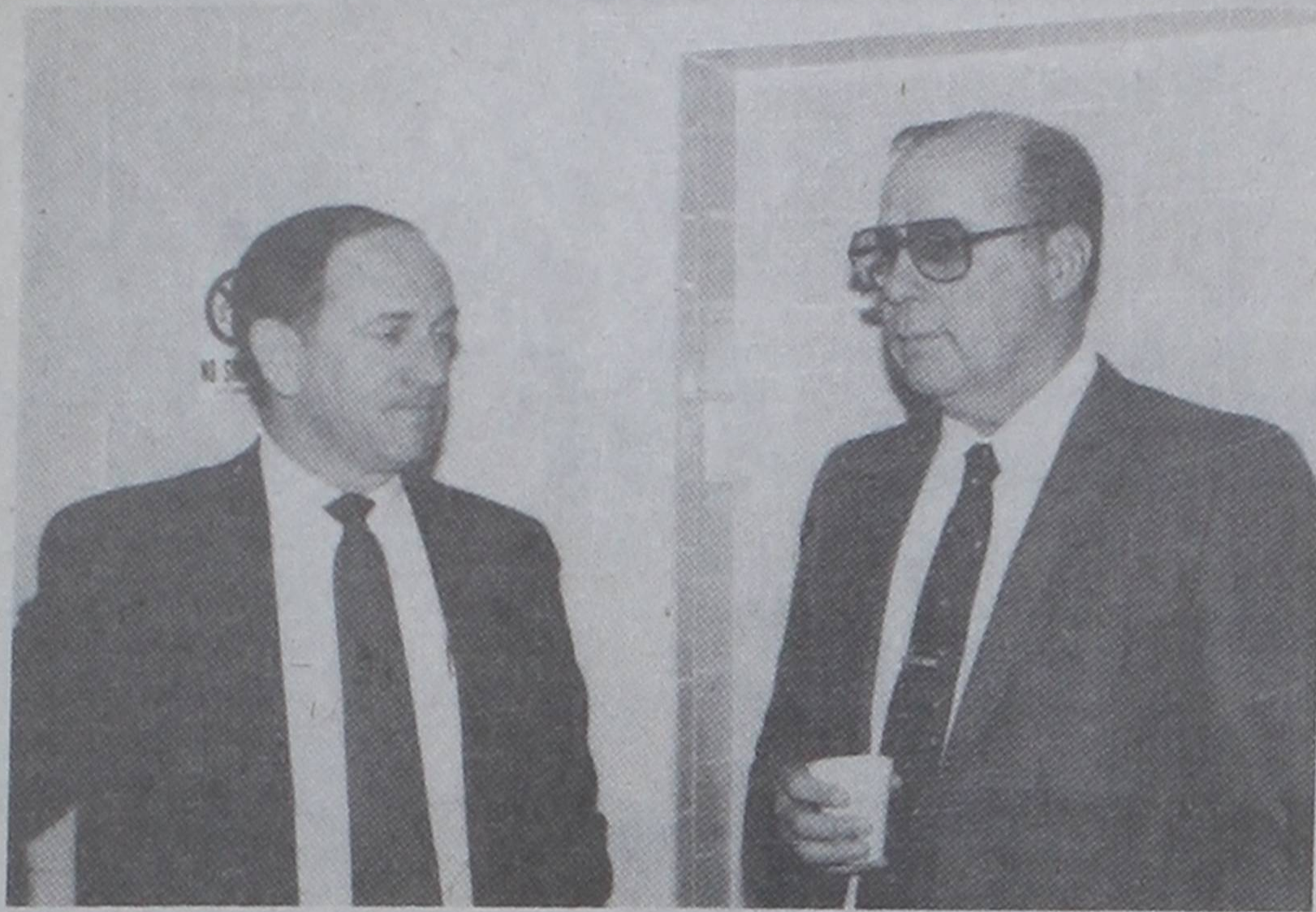

### Module XIV: Mutual Funds and Diversification

Two reasons many investors choose mutual funds is diversification and diversification. No, you're not seeing double. It simply means that spreading risk is often the most important factor in an investment program.

For this reason, many investors choose mutual funds that can offer a diversified portfolio of a hundred or more individual securities. This often satisfies the diversification requirement.

Unfortunately, even by spreading risk it is still possible to lose principal. While many mutual funds offer a meaningful history of consistently positive results, none guarantee future performance. Diversification among mutual funds, however, can increase the safety factor.

To illustrate, all you need is a current *Standard and Poor's Stock Guide*, which is available at most New York Stock Exchange Member Firms. In the back of the book is a mutual-fund summary with a wealth of statistical information. One fund column shows what \$10,000 invested as of a particular date, usually five or more years, is worth today. That's all that's needed for the diversification game.

Before beginning any multi-fund diversification program, however, two points should be understood. First, plan on leaving your money invested for at least five years. Second, diversify into at least five different mutual funds.

Using these guidelines, we hypothetically placed \$10,000 in each of our five favorite mutual funds. All are managed by the same family of funds. Although this is not necessary, it does offer

the benefit of discounted charges and swapping privileges. It also prevented us from using 20/20 hindsight to select only the best-performing funds. For illustration purposes we chose only middle-of-the-road growth-and-income funds.

Chart A shows that a \$10,000 investment made in each of five selected mutual funds on Dec. 31, 1982, grew to \$117,580. Chart B shows the value of the same \$50,000 divided equally into the first five worst-performing funds shown in the Stock Guide. Even had you selected the five worst-performing funds, as in Case B, your investments would have grown to \$61,034, a gain of \$11,034. Individually, one fund lost slightly, and one was unchanged, but collectively they managed to produce a modest overall profit. Although it offers no guarantee of future results, this little game does make a strong case for diversification.

By doing your homework, a careful selection of diversified funds dedicated to your goals and risk tolerance can not only increase your safety factor but can also offer the opportunity of reasonable financial rewards.

### LEARN WHAT CHRISTMAS SAFETY'S ABOUT!

#### A CHRISTMAS SAFETY CHECK

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.
