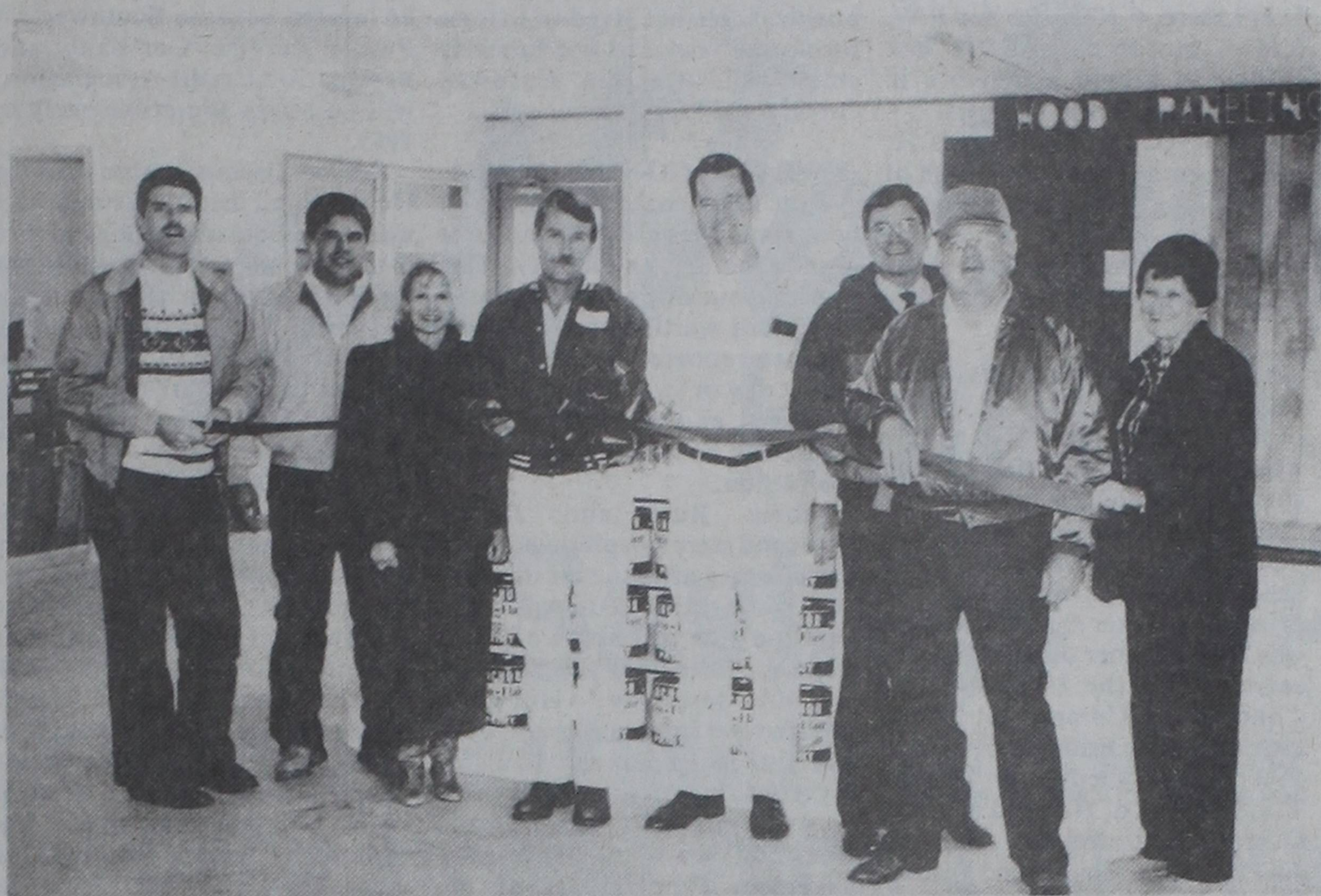

The Parmer County Commissioners approved a \$1,900 expenditure Monday for the county's share of the Adolescent Residential Drug Treatment

Band Sets Xmas Music

Friona High School Band will hold its dinner-concert on Sunday, December 17. Dinner is at 12:15 at the Friona High School Cafeteria, with the concert at 1:30 p.m. Admission is \$5 for adults and \$4 for children.

Songs included on the program will be "Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas," "The Christmas Music of Irving Berlin," "Sleigh Ride," plus soundtrack from "Batman" march entitled "Them Bass

Program in Plainview, Texas.

The program, sponsored by the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center, is a 90-day education and family therapy program for adolescent males involved with controlled substances.

Commissioner Raymond McGehee said the program was necessary and the commission should pay for it immediately.

County Clerk Bonnie Warren said the 1989 budget will have to be amended to compensate for the payment.

In other business, the commission voted to accept a contract with the Texas Department of Human Services for child welfare.

The contract states the commission would appoint a board and establish and maintain a foster care program. The program pays the cost of board for any child needing protective placement who is ineligible for state or federal funds.

The county would be reimbursed by the state for any funds used for foster care.

The commission also: *Approved a request by sheriff's office to begin advertising for bids on a new vehicle;

*Approved payment of an inmate's blood test for AIDS virus because he was arrested for child molestation;

*Approved a transfer from the right-of-way to a newly-created right-of-way;

*Approved services of a contractor for the construction of a building.

Arctic Air Blasts Area

The Friona area has been reeling under the onslaught of Arctic cold this week, which brought the season's coldest temperatures, but very little moisture.

The first cold spell, which blew in last Sunday, brought a low temperature of seven degrees and wind chill of -20 by Tuesday morning, and a frigid "high" temperature on Monday of only 19 degrees.

Just under an inch of blowing snow was measured in the official Friona gauge, and the "melt" amounted to only .05 inches, so it was very dry as well as light.

Temperatures moderated during the week, reaching a high of 55 degrees on Wednesday, which was a very pleasant day, but residents awoke on Friday to another Arctic front, which saw temperatures fall to six degrees.

Moss Resigns Grid Position

The Friona School board accepted the resignation of head football coach and athletic director Tommy Moss at its regular meeting on Monday, December 11.

Moss' contract was slated to be reviewed by the board in early 1990. He was on the second year of a two-year contract with the school.

He will leave after posing a 47-44-2 record as Chieftain coach, making him the winningest grid coach in FHS history, as well as the one with the longest tenure (nine seasons). The team's 3-17 record of the past two years pulled his overall record down considerably.

"I felt it was time to move on," commented Moss.

Moss became head football coach in 1981-82, and stopped a losing trend. He guided the Chieftains into the playoffs on two different occasions, and had them challenging in other years.

Moss coached Friona's first-ever football win in post-season play, a 14-10 win over Perryton in 1986. That year the team also compiled its best season record ever, of 9-3, dropping a last-minute 15-13 game to Kermit in the area finals.

The school is currently accepting applications for a new head coach and athletic director.

In other business Monday night, the board approved an ordinance to continue taxing freeport goods. Superintendent Hal Ratcliff said that due to the unpredictable nature of the state's school financing, the board felt it could not at this time exempt the freeport property.

The board also voted to refinance the district's series 1980 bonds at a lower rate, and accepted the 1988-89 school year audit report from Bernie Gowens of Brown, Graham and Company.

The board adopted a curriculum policy on drug education, sex education and AIDS education and voted to adopt the curriculum, "It's My Decision."

If letters are addressed to Santa Claus, in care of the Friona Star, a copy will be forwarded to the North Pole and will also appear in the Star's Christmas issue.

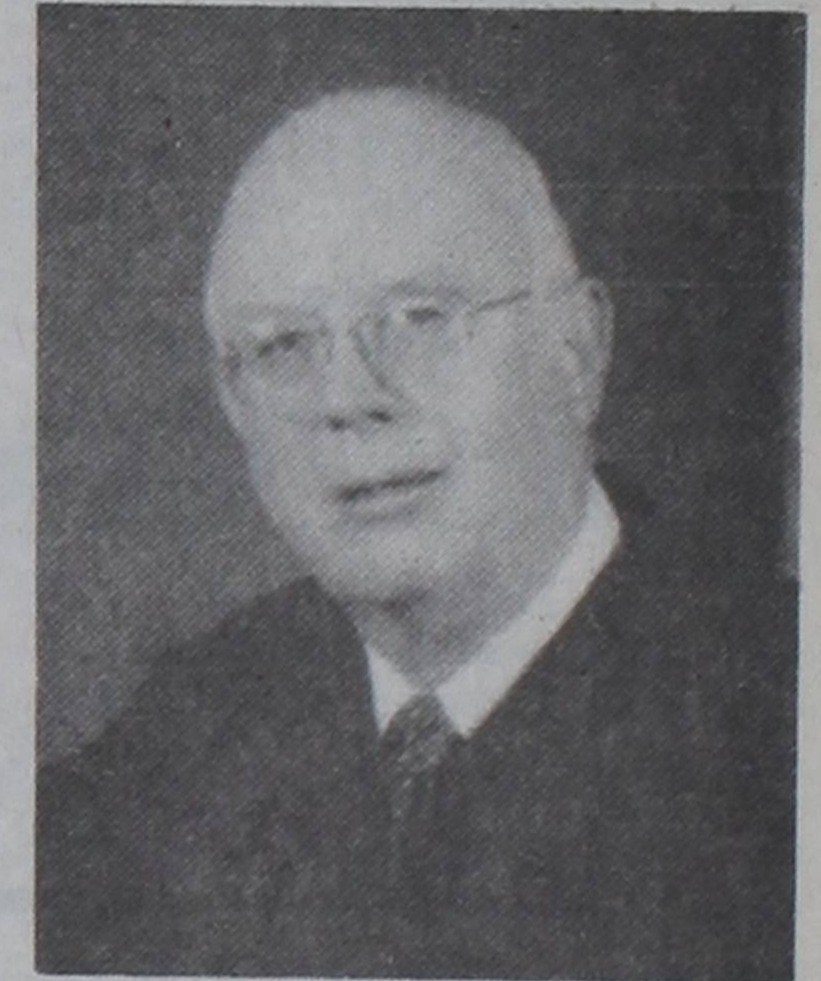
Due to the deadline for the Christmas edition, please be sure to get your letters in to us by December 15. They will appear in the Star on December 23.

Relatives And Other Strange Holiday Visitors

By John Ingram Walker, M.D. (AP) A psychiatric research team in New Braunfels, Texas, announced yesterday that they had discovered the cause of Holiday Blues. In a 4-year cross sectional study of over 32,000 individuals and families, John Ingram Walker, M.D. and Associates have discovered that seasonal depression is directly related to the number of relatives who visit household families during the holiday season. "The more relatives visiting, the more frequent and profound the depressive symptoms," said Dr. Walker, director of the study.

Walker went on to report that his group discovered that the lack of knowledge regarding the personality types of the visiting relatives contributed significantly to the depth of depression. "We found that families who did not understand their relatives had great difficulty coping with their idiosyncrasies," said Carolyn Morris, CSW-ACP, director of the Family Studies Section of Holiday Blues Research.

The research team gave the following guidelines for recognizing and dealing with four basic personality types:

THE DRIVER. This relative is forceful, impatient and action-oriented. He demands that the holiday meal be served on time. He bolts down his food and rushes to the television set, where, with the use of the remote control, he manages to follow five football games at the same time.

The driver becomes frustrated with long family stories--so just give him the facts and skip the details. He will appreciate the dinner prayer being short and to the point, also. Walker and Associates found that the driver-type relative is the best one to have visit, as they don't stay a long time. They leave as soon as they get bored and they bore easily.

THE EXPRESSIVE. These individuals are emotional, demonstrative, excitable and undisciplined dreamers. They love to recount old family stories and they tell long, drawn-out jokes with three or more parts. They wave their arms around when they talk, so don't seat them near the gravy bowl.

The best way to get along with this relative is to listen and don't interrupt. To get them to stop talking, offer emotional

incentives. For example, you might say, "Uncle Bob, hearing your stories makes me feel (talk about feelings) that you might enjoy a long walk around the neighborhood. It's so nice around here; just like walking in a dream." Even with the best leaving techniques, the expressive will probably have a prolonged visit.

THE ANALYTICAL. These relatives are cautious, controlled and unemotional. They take a long time to complete tasks so don't let them carve the holiday turkey. If they do carve it, you'll notice that every piece is exactly the same size and weight--and very cold. The analytical does not like to take risks; they will generally seat themselves a long way from the gravy bowl.

When talking with your analytical relative, be certain that you center on reasoned thought and offer accurate evidence. For example, you might say something like this, "The temperature is supposed to drop to 22 degrees tonight and it's predicted that we'll get one-fourth inch of rain, making the streets slick. Therefore, it might be best to leave while it's still safe to travel." Give this fact early in the day to allow the analytical time to think it through. If you wait too late, he'll not have enough time to decide and may elect to spend the night.

THE AMIABLE. These relatives are relaxed, friendly, warm and affectionate. They want everyone to get along and they kiss and hug a lot. They laugh at all the expressive jokes, offer reassurance to the analytical, and shake their head in a kindly way when the driver rushes out of the room.

With these relatives, talk about family and friends and offer assurance and support. You'll have to hug them at least three times before they leave and remind them that you'll visit soon and often.

Walker and Associates found that those who understand family dynamics get along better with their relatives and have less seasonal depression. Becoming a student of communication styles can help prevent the Holiday Blues.

60 YEARS AGO--DEC. 20, 1929

Six Friona citizens, H.L. Vance, J.B. McFarland, E.B. Whitefield, L.F. Lillard, F.N. Welch and F.W. Reeve, motored to Tulia last Friday to attend a meeting in interest of the Wheat Growers.

County Commissioner D.H. Meade reports that the stretch of road leading south from Friona to The Hub is now in prime condition, he having just completed thoroughly grading it.

55 YEARS AGO--DEC. 21, 1934

Quite a number of people were in Amarillo on Thursday of last week, representing the various communities and towns of Parmer County at the big Chamber of Commerce meeting that was called at that city on that date. The principle speaker for the occasion was A.D. Skinner of Washington, secretary of the United States Chamber of Commerce. Those attending from Friona were Mayor F.W. Reeve, George A. Heath, T.J. Crawford, Howard Morris, Otho Whitefield, Milford Alexander and County and District Clerk, V. Rushing and County Judge Elect, Walter Lander.

50 YEARS AGO--DEC. 22, 1939

Last Thursday, Friday and Saturday, one of the best basketball tournaments ever held in the Friona gym was staged. There were ten boys' teams and eight girls' teams entered. In all there were twenty-three basketball games played. Many of the visitors expressed their views that they had never been to a better tournament. Mr. Ezell and Wilbur Meade said that they had never officiated in a tournament where more sportsmanship was shown. Dimmitt won first place, Canyon second and Springlake third in the boys' division. Lazbuddie won first place, Dimmitt second and Oklahoma Lane third place in the girls' division.

45 YEARS AGO--DEC. 22, 1944

J.H. Hinds has announced that he will open his grocery store in the Warren building on Sixth Street, to be known as "Friona Food Market," on Friday, December 22. Mr. Hinds is experienced in the management of grocery and food stores, and has his store furnished

with all modern equipment. He will have a meat market in connection with his regular grocery business. He has lived in Friona for several years and was formerly employed with the Cashway Grocery and Market here.

35 YEARS AGO--DEC. 16, 1954

Over 15,000 bales of cotton had been ginned yesterday by the three gins in the Friona vicinity. This was not counting several hundred bales still waiting in the yards. Ginmen reported that they were only a day or two behind in most instances, and the cotton harvest seemed to be nearing an orderly completion.

Jackie Rule and Jimmy Norwood were hospitalized early this morning after the car in which they were riding plunged into a highline pole just north of Hub. Neither of the boys was believed injured seriously. Norwood suffered two broken ribs and both had numerous cuts and bruises. Investigating officers believed a blowout might have caused the Norwood car to leave the pavement. The impact of the vehicle on the pole broke an insulator allowing wires to touch, throwing Friona out of electricity for some three hours after the 4 a.m. collision.

30 YEARS AGO--DEC. 17, 1959

With temperatures tumbling from Sunday's high of 68 degrees in Friona to the low 20's Monday a cold front moved into Parmer County spreading damage to rural utility lines and leaving an estimated 1,000 persons without electricity Tuesday morning. The front brought snow to this area which in places drifted to several feet in depth and covered the ground with an estimated fall of about four inches up until late Monday night.

25 YEARS AGO--DEC. 7, 1964

Ground was broken and the foundation poured this week on a

building which will house the Friona Star and Graphic Arts Printing. The building, which is to be located between Southwestern Public Service Company and Production Credit Association, will be ready sometime early in 1965.

Wayne Clausen, chairman of the United Fund drive in Friona, this week requested all captains to turn in their money and prospect lists to him by Monday, so that a "clean-up" campaign may be begun. A total of \$3100 had been raised toward the goal of \$7000 as of Tuesday.

20 YEARS AGO--DEC. 18, 1969

Friona's outstanding citizens for 1969 were honored last Saturday night at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet. Louis Welch was honored as the Chamber's "Man of the Year." Mrs. Robert Alexander was chosen "Woman of the Year," and Mrs. Cleo Gauna of Gib's Cleaners was cited as "Most Courteous Employee." The committee which selected the "Teacher of the Year" from the Friona School system came up with a novel choice when both Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Hodgson were chosen.

15 YEARS AGO--DEC. 15, 1974

Five new directors have been named, plus officers for the 1975 Friona Chamber of Commerce. Elected in recent mail balloting by the Chamber members for two-year terms on the Chamber's board of directors were Jerry Brown, Gary Cook, Jay Beene, David Lee Carson and Jim Johnston. Selected to lead the 1975 Chamber as president was George Rushing. Jerry Brown will serve as vice president, and Jim Johnston will be secretary-treasurer.

The 1974 Project Christmas Card will attempt to raise around \$3,000 to purchase an anesthetic machine for use by Parmer County

Community Hospital, it was announced this week.

10 YEARS AGO--DEC. 16, 1979

Porter V. Roberts of Friona was appointed Monday as acting County Judge by the County Commissioners, and will replace Judge Paul Fortenberry beginning January 1.

An open house has been scheduled by Friona's Tri-County Savings and Loan Association branch, at the new location on Highway 60.

5 YEARS AGO--DEC. 16, 1984

A 54-year-old Friona man was critically injured Wednesday in an accident at Elgin, two miles south of Friona. Carl Brewer sustained a severely cut left leg, a broken left arm and punctured lungs after being caught in the equipment for about 15 minutes.

The Friona FFA senior farm skills team placed second in the state leadership contests recently. Members of the team were Gena Wright, Dana Berend and Corrie Lundy.

Five new members have been elected to the Friona Chamber of Commerce board of directors. Elected were Diane Tatum, B.K. Buske, David Hutson, Mike Rietmayer and Bill Stovell.

- 1 cup roasted, unsalted sunflower seeds

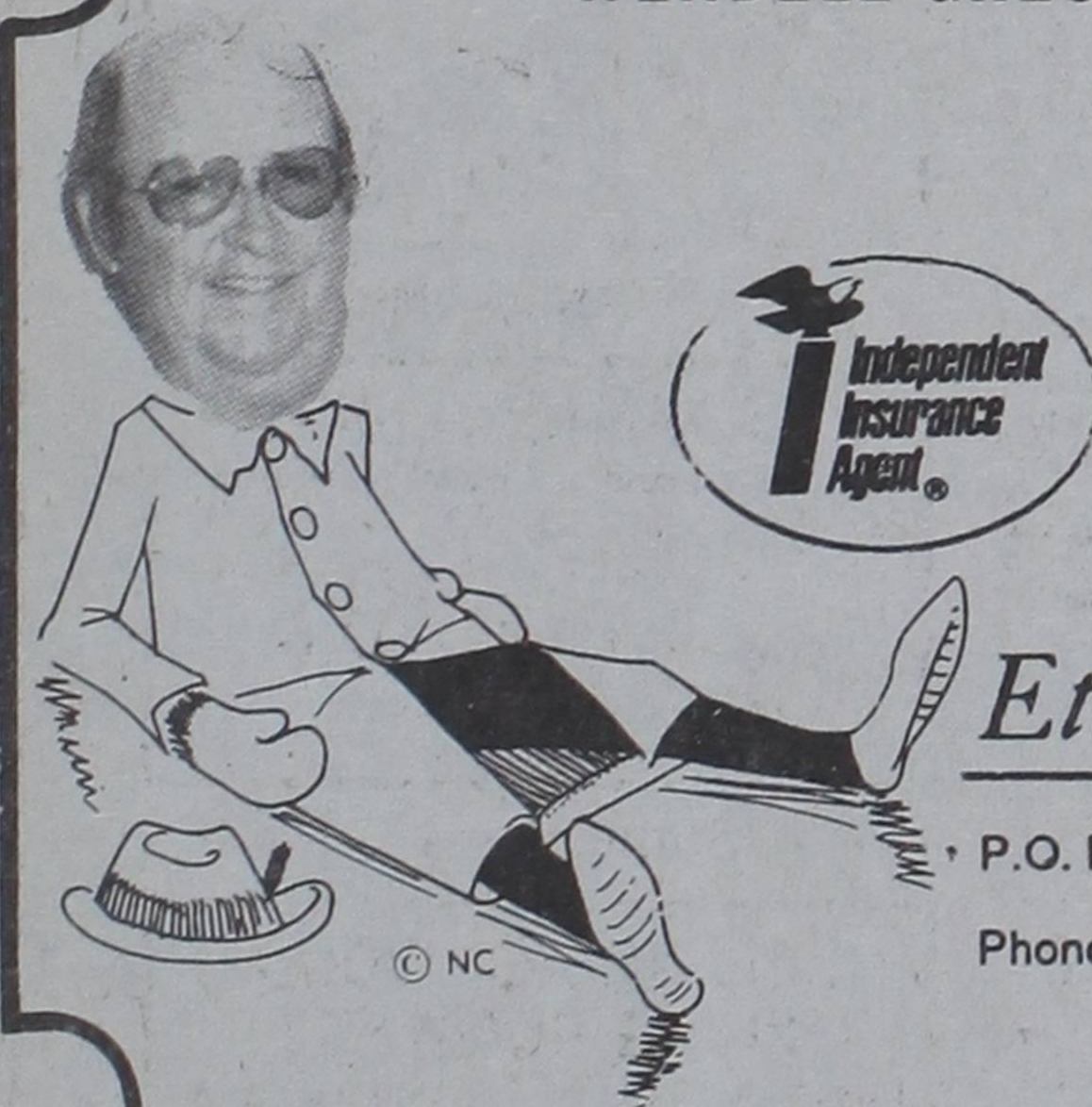

Of these 550 farms needing a plan, 518 have had plans developed by the SCS and the owner or operator of the farm and approved by the district. This represents 94% of the plans which need to be written.

If you have fields on your farm which are classified as highly erodible, you need to have a conservation plan developed and be applying it by December 31, 1989. This plan needs to be fully implemented by December 31, 1994. It is very important that you make sure that you are applying the conservation treatment that is in your plan, simply having a plan written is not enough. If you do not have a plan by December 31, 1989, and you are farming highly erodible land, you will lose the following benefits:

1. Commodity Loans and Purchases (ASCS)
2. Cotton Production Stabilization (ASCS)
3. Emergency Loans (FmHA)
4. Farm Operating Loans (FmHA)
5. Farm Ownership Loans (ASCS)
6. Feed Grain Product Stabilization (ASCS)
7. Storage Facilities Equipment Loans (ASCS)
8. Wheat Production Stabilization (ASCS)
9. National Wool Act Payment (ASCS)
10. Beekeeper Indemnity Payments (ASCS)
11. Rice Production Stabilization (ASCS)
12. Federal Crop Insurance (FCIC)
13. Soil and Water Loans (FmHA)
14. Conservation Reserve Program (ASCS)
15. Loans to Indian Tribes and Tribal Corp. (FmHA)

As you can see, there are a lot of benefits which can be lost if you do not have a conservation plan on your highly erodible land by the December 31, 1989 deadline. If you need a plan developed for your farm, or if you are not sure whether or not you do, please feel free to contact us at the SCS in Friona.

Also, prior to breaking out any new ground (sodbuster) or doing any work that may alter a playa lake (swampbuster), contact us first. You may need a conservation

plan on the new ground being broken out. Altering a playa lake may make you ineligible for USDA benefits.

If you purchase, cash lease, or start operating a different piece of land, please check with the SCS to see if it has highly erodible land and a conservation plan on it suitable to the operation you need. Call the Friona SCS at 247-2220.

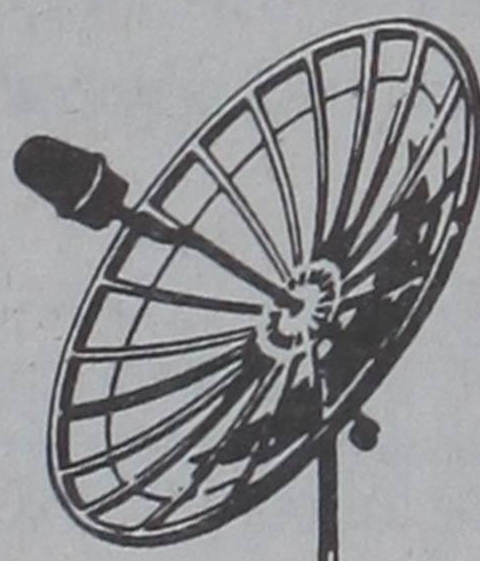

FERC Order Backs SPS' Credit Policy

A recent order from the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) supports a court decision upholding Southwestern Public Service Company's (SPS) treatment of investment tax credits for its wholesale customers including rural electric cooperatives.

"This order finally brings to a conclusion a case filed back in 1980 by SPS to adjust rates charged to some of its wholesale customers," said Gary Gibson,

SPS vice president of marketing. "This decision will not change rates currently being billed. It acknowledges SPS's past proper treatment of these tax credits and will be reflected in two pending wholesale cases before the FERC."

Initially involved were those wholesale customers whose rates were directly affected. In 1982, SPS's rural electric cooperative customers intervened. Later, during the case, Golden Spread

Electric Cooperative, which now represents 11 of 16 cooperatives served by SPS, continued to challenge SPS's treatment of these tax credits, prompting a long-running legal battle and regulatory process.

In March 1988, the U.S. 10th Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver, Colorado, upheld the company's treatment of the tax credits prior to 1983 and sent the case back to FERC for resolution.

Investment tax credits were created by Congress in 1971 to encourage creation of jobs and expansion by American industry and continued until the Tax Reform Act of 1986. The credits allowed companies like SPS to reduce their federal income tax payments by a percentage of their investment in new plants and equipment.

In 1983, the FERC changed the way in which SPS could record the credits to its earnings. It also ordered the company to retroactively restate its financial results as if the FERC-preferred method had been in place since 1972. The appeals court said the retroactive portion of the FERC's order was improper.

On November 22, 1989, the FERC issued its final order, in compliance with the court's ruling. SPS last week completed its analysis of the FERC's order.

The FERC's decision preserves the rate-making treatment used by SPS prior to 1983. The decision also established the guidelines for future rate-making practices.

"Both SPS and the wholesale customers it serves have been involved in this legal entanglement for the past few years," Gibson said. "With this final decision by FERC, we hope to put this matter behind us and continue our efforts to provide competitive electric service to the cooperatives and other wholesale customers."

Mejia Named To BSA Board

Joe Mejia of Friona is among those recently elected to the 1990 executive board of the Golden Spread Boy Scout Council, according to C. Warren Fatheree, president.

Fatheree noted that the Golden Spread Council serves youth in 26 counties of the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles, in 56 communities.

The Friona Chieftains finished second in the Farwell Invitational Tournament last weekend.

The Chiefs rolled to easy wins over Lazbuddie (94-36) and Bovina (85-60), before meeting the host Steers in the finals. Farwell, which has a 9-2 season record, downed the Chieftains, 86-66.

For Friona, it turned out to be a "Parmer County Tournament," as they played all three of the other high school teams in the county.

Lazbuddie, still trying to get their "basketball legs" after a 13-game football season that saw them reach the six-man quarter-finals, was playing only their second cage game of the season.

These gifts are arranged in a store atmosphere so that selections can be made by the patients in the VA Hospital. The gifts are selected by the patients for their families and then are gift wrapped and delivered to the rooms of the patients where the families can pick them up or the packages can be mailed to the families of the veterans.

All of this work is done by the Auxiliaries and Legion members and there is no expense to the veterans.

"This is just a small part we can have in helping Christmas be a little better for the veteran and his family," says one of the workers.

The estimated value of the Gift Shop was approximately \$3,000 and an estimated 200 veterans were

assisted. Some of them only had a spouse and others had large families including grandchildren.

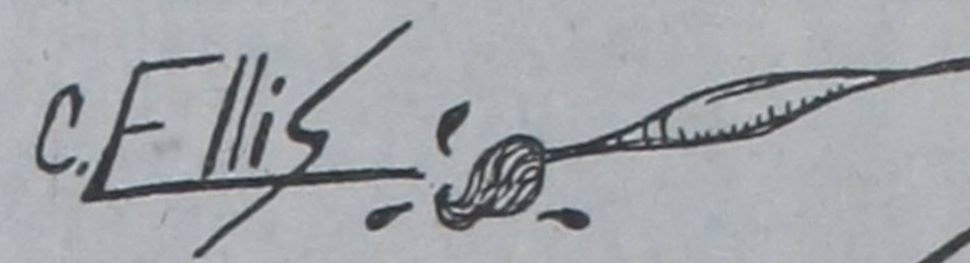

Court Discusses County JP Change

The Parmer County Commissioners last Monday received the resignation of Pct. 1 Justice of the Peace Albert Smith, effective December 31.

Smith, 78, has decided to retire and not seek re-election next year. He has served in the post 10 1/2 years.

The commissioners likely will appoint a successor to Smith shortly. But they also discussed the possibility of eliminating one of the three JP posts in Parmer County.

Currently there are three JP positions: Pct. 1, Smith (Farwell); Pct. 2, Frances Euler (Friona), and Pct. 3, Bonnie Clayton (Bovina).

All three posts are part-time. The commissioners questioned whether they could just do with two full-time JPs, one in Farwell and one in Friona. If this occurred, the JP districts would be split on a line through the Bovina area.

No decisions were made but more study will be given to it.

In other business, the commissioners met with the courthouse project engineer on the proposed

elevator. Tentatively, bids will be accepted in February.

The elevator will be built where the west door to the courthouse currently is. That door will be sealed off, so only the south door will be used as an entrance. (The north door is used for the sheriff's department.)

A letter was received from the state attorney general's office on the controversy over whether Parmer County has to pay the state \$1,500 as a settlement in closing the former Lazbuddie dump site.

The state says the county must pay; the county says the state officials said at the time (a year ago) they wouldn't have to if they acted promptly.

The state still insists on remuneration so the county instructed County Attorney Charles Aycock to offer \$500. If the two sides cannot agree on a sum, the state says it will sue the county.

The commissioners scheduled the annual hearing on continuing taxing tangible property for December 22.
