THE CARELESS KILLER.

Not long ago three little children ran joyously down their front steps and along the path to the sidewalk. The occasion of their running joyously was that they saw their mother approaching from across the street. She had been down town shopping and had promised to bring them something. But just before the mother could reach the curb an automobile going fifty miles an hour, when the law said it must not exceed twenty, struck the mother and killed her. She had not realized that the car was coming so fast,

Of course the driver of the killer car was sorry he wouldn't have killed that woman for anything had he thought about it in advance. But he hadn't thought about it; so he had taken from three little children the only mother they had, and he had given them the terrible experience of seeing her slaughtered. The driver of the death car was careless of the three little children's only mother and of their father's only wife. He was willing to take a chance on killing that woman or anyone else by going fifty miles an hour where the aw ordered that he must not go faster than twenty. Of course he wouldn't have done it had he known he

Wouldn't this be a wonderful world if folks wouldn't take a chance on doing the other fellow damage? Wouldn't it be a splendid place to live in if everyone would measure what he does in terms of what might result to the other chap? Of course, in the final analysis, that is merely an application of the Golden Rule; but we hear that Golden Rule so often ittis formal phraseology that we do not get the meanng; we hear the words but we do not catch the sentiment; we miss the principle. So we drive cars fifty miles an hour when we should go twenty, and run over some little children's mother and some man's wife, or somebody's father and husband.

"My God!" said the man whose wife had been killed by the careless autoist. "Just for the sake of ithulging his desire for speed he killed my wife_ Just link of it!
