## VALUE OF TERRACING IS PROVED BY DRY WEATHER

### Form of W. L. Parmer Holding Up While That of Neighbors Without Terraces Is Suffering for Rain

The continued dry weather is having a disastrous effect on the crop of the Cisco Country, according to W. L. Parmer, who owns an extensive farm and ranch about 15 miles west of Cisco. Practically all the corn in my community is burned up," Parmer says. "However, my corn crop is looking well, and has a good yield, but that of my neighbors is practically ruined. I attribute the loss of my corn remaining green to the fact that my lands have been terraced and held the moisture better. Our last rainfall was about 1/2 inch, which fell in about 30 minutes. Most of this water ran off the terraces, and the rows of the terrace, held the water and allowed it to soak into the ground, thus conserving this soil that is now badly needed, in sustaining the crops on lands that were terraced. Most of the maize and other crops are looking well, and will be a good yield if the rains do not delay too long. Cotton is doing well and allowed it to soak into the ground. In fact I do not seem to have any planted. My son has seven acres that he is cultivating for his own spending, just to encourage him to be the money that he spends. I want him to learn how his money goes and to encourage him in his own money. "I have been living on this farm for 39 years, and in all that time I have only paid out for feed. One year, when the grasshoppers consumed the feed crops I had to buy \$80 worth of feed for my stock. I have never had a crop failure and we have had some very

# FARMERS NEED INFORMATION, NOT ADVICE, LEE DECLARES

## Candidate for Congress to Spend Remainder of Week in West Part of 17th District in Campaigning

R. Q. Lee, candidate for congress from this district, will spend the latter part of this week in the extreme western end of the district. He is advocating a business man for a business position in Washington and continuing his campaign for diversified farming and improved farming methods. It is his opinion that farmers in general do not need advice but that they do need and want information. "If I am permitted to go to Washington and it looks certain that I will be—I will make my primary object to furnish farmers of this district and of the country at large if they so desire, the vast fund of agricultural information that has been compiled in Washington but which has never been given general distribution."

The candidate declares that vast sums of money have been spent by the department of agriculture and the national government gathering farm data and other agricultural information which would be of great benefit to the farmers of this district if they could but have it in their disposal. "I expect to make my congressional office a clearing house for information and other information helpful to the farmer," he says. "I expect to see that the farmers, particularly of my district, are given every bit of knowledge and information that will help them in improving their position on the farm."

Lee is contending that in view of the fact that agriculture is the principal industry in this district too much cannot be done for the farming class.

"When you aid the farmer of this section of the country, you aid the banker and the merchant," declares Lee, "and indirectly you aid every business endeavor for in the end they depend on the welfare of the farmer."

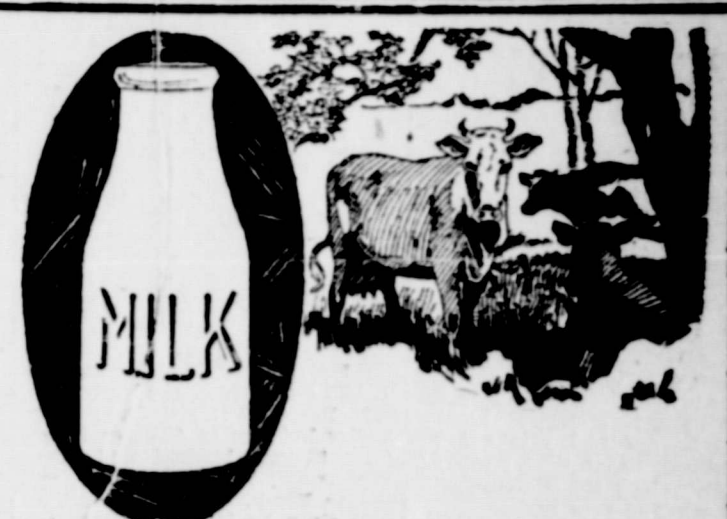

TULSA, Okla., July 19.—Estimated daily production of crude oil in the United States increased 4,616 barrels during the week ending July 14, the Oil and Gas Journal will say in its current issue.

The Hendricks area of West Texas increased more than 6,000 barrels, but this was more than offset by a decrease of 11,000 barrels in the Yates field. 

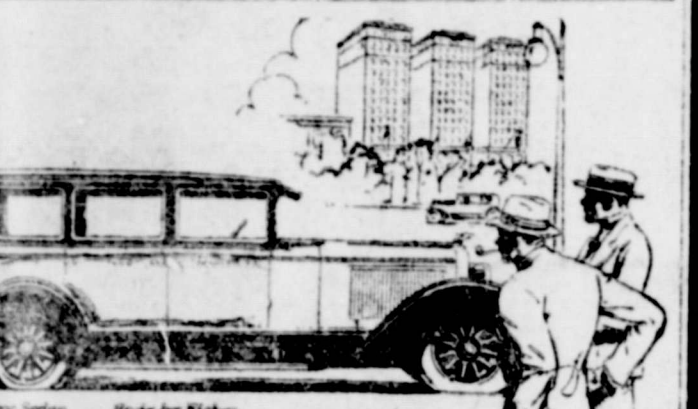

TOMATOES ONE OF BEST CROPS, SAYS MRS. WALTON

"Tomatoes are one of our best crops here," so says Mrs. J. E. Walton of the Cottonwood community, who, with her husband, was shopping in Cisco Tuesday and disposing of a load of tomatoes, okra, canteloupes and roasting ears.

Mr. and Mrs. Walton came here a few years ago from the tomato growing section of East Texas near Tyler. They had learned much about tomato culture and pruning while there, and began to experiment with them here. Each year they have had from one fourth to an acre set to tomatoes and have not failed to get large returns any

season. One thing they have found is that most of the land here is short on phosphate which makes fruit rather than vine. They use acid phosphate and pour all their wood ashes on their tomato land. Proper pruning is a big factor in getting the vines to produce fruit properly, says Mrs. Walton.

It is very dry now and crops are suffering in the tight land sections more than in the sandy parts where the natural dust, mulches of the sand tends to retain moisture which rises from the interior of the earth. The heavy soils allow the moisture to evaporate during hot, dry weather. Corn has been cut short already where it has not matured. Where corn was planted early and was not injured by the frosts, it has escaped dam-

age because it was matured before the dry weather became pronounced. Maize is showing the effects of the dry weather as meien patches, peas and other den vegetables. Cotton has been damaged any is yet a more or less of a natural plant. Perhaps it is well for us as it will lessen damage to boll weevils or worms. 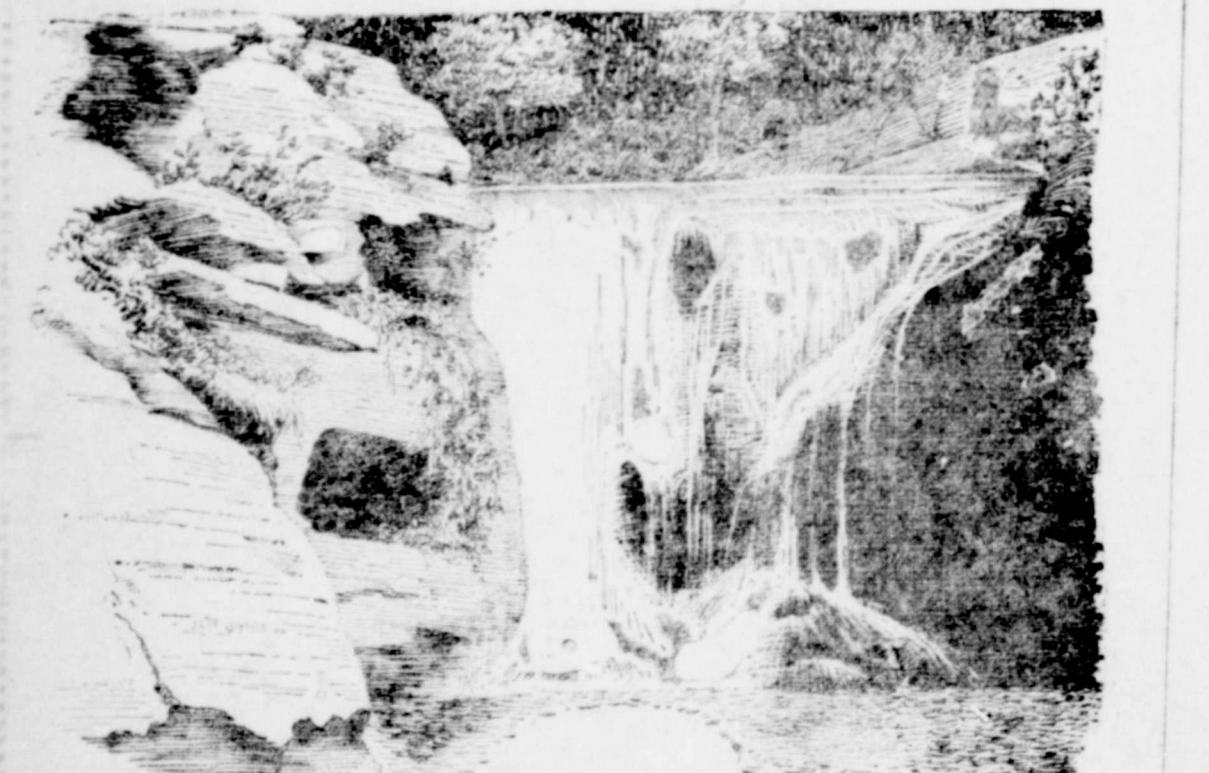

LOWENSTEIN'S BODY IS FOUND OFF BOULOGNE

BOULOGNE, France, July 20.—The body of Captain Alfred Lowenstein, noted Belgian financier, who disappeared from an airplane while it was crossing the English Channel at a height of 4,000 feet, on July 4, was found here Thursday.

The body of the Belgian banker was taken to Calais in the evening by a sailing boat and the identity was established by means of a wrist watch.

The tragic end of Captain Lowenstein caused a sensation that had quies on the stock exchanges of London, Paris, Brussels and Berlin. A police inquiry in France developed only that his valet and stenographers, who were accompanying him on the trip noted his disappearance when he failed to return from a lavatory at the rear of the machine. They found a dogpen and later the Captain's collar and tie were discovered in the lane.

Samises as to the tragedy ranged from theories of accident death to suicide. Members of the Lowenstein family and intimate friends of the financier strenuously denied that he had any reason to commit suicide.

The finding of the body will serve to expedite settlement of the estate. He was a citizen of Belgium and the laws of that country provide that liquidation of the estate of a deceased citizen may be adjourned for four years unless there is positive proof of death. An application for a death certificate was refused by a Brussels court on July 9.

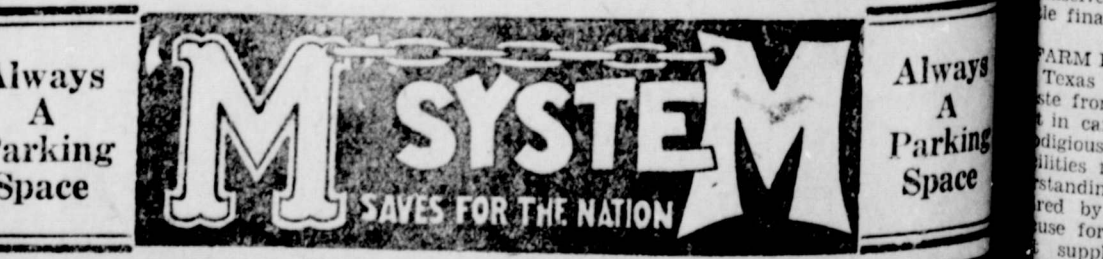
